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NOTICE BOARD

NOW AVAILABLE: ONLINE LITTER REGISTRATIONS

CKC has launched Online Litter Registrations on the Portal.

Submit all litters for registration, including:

- CKC Registered Sires;
- Foreign Registered Sires (from a CKC recognized registering body);
- Multiple Sires; and
- Artificially Inseminated litters.

Important information to support online litter registration:

- If you haven't accessed CKC's new online Portal yet, these quick instructions on creating a portal account will get you started.
- CKC has updated its dog registration numbers system as of November 1st.
- Registered dog names can now contain a maximum of 50 characters.
- Online Dog Registrations are now available on the Portal. Complete your business with CKC once your litter application is finalized.

BREEDER SUPPORT NOTICE TO SHARE WITH YOUR DOG/ PUPPY BUYERS

In an effort to support breeders, CKC has created an official notice that can be provided to dog/puppy owners who purchased a dog/puppy to be registered with the Canadian Kennel Club. This official notice is valid until March 31, 2020 and explains that a delay in providing CKC registration certificates is due to circumstances out of a breeder's control. CKC will not penalize any breeder for a delay in providing certificates due to the current backlog.

SHOWS AND TRIALS UPDATE: IT- RELATED DELAYS

Miscellaneous Registrations

Individuals who are awaiting a Miscellaneous Certificate Number (MCN) can temporarily enter events with closing dates no later than March 31, 2020 without a registration number, and the Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) will assign an MCN once the backlog has been cleared. All points and titles earned under the listed entries will be connected with the MCN once assigned.

Listing Fees

Individuals waiting on registration numbers for recognized breeds can enter CKC events as "listed". Those paying listing fees due to the impact of the backlog are encouraged to forward copies of their entries to information@ckc.ca with the subject line "Listing Fee Reimbursements". The body of the email must include the date the registration application was submitted as well as whether it was submitted using the online Portal or emailed/mailed. Pending an assessment by CKC, a reimbursement of the associated listing fees will be issued.

Premium Lists & Judging Panels

CKC's judging panel approval process is currently delayed. In an effort to support clubs in publishing their Premium Lists so that their entries are not impacted, Clubs that are awaiting final approval of judging panels are encouraged to release their premium list marked ***SUBJECT TO CHANGE PENDING CKC APPROVAL***. Exhibitors and participants should note that published Premium Lists may not be final.

Temporary Competition Numbers

With the implementation of CKC's IT system, a new process requires all owners of unregistered, recognized breeds entering events to obtain a Temporary Competition Number (TCN). TCNs will replace the current system of entering events with dogs as "listed" and will allow dogs to temporarily participate in CKC events while they pursue permanent registration or an Event Registration Number (ERN).

TCNs will be required to enter all events with closing dates after March 2, 2020.

Event Results

We understand and appreciate how important accessing event results are to our members and non-members who participate in CKC events. Providing access to event results is a priority for CKC.

2019 event results are current until August 28, 2019.

Currently, our highest priority and attention is focused on ensuring the required updates are made to the functionality of dog and litter registrations on the CKC Portal. Once this is resolved event results will be entered into the system and title certificates will follow. We appreciate your continued patience.

Highlights from the AKC National Championship 2019

The AKC National Championship Dog Show was held for the 19th year in a row at the Orlando Convention Centre. 5,284 dogs from all over the globe competed to be Top Dog. This included 159 Golden Retrievers, 107 Australian Shepherds, 91

French Bulldogs, 82 Cavalier King Charles Spaniels... I could go on, but I'm sure you get the picture.

Best of Breed Wins

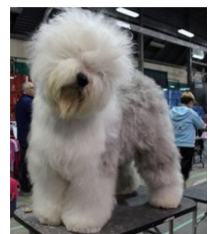
Connie is Saxson's breeder along with Dr. Cindi Bossart.

PLANTING SEEDS

In my blog last week, I was listing activities and events that we, the owners of rare dog breeds, can do to promote our breeds. The Dandie Dinmont Terrier Club of Canada consists of a dedicated bunch who come together several times throughout the year to get their breed known. Recently, at the International Centre in Mississauga, Ontario, the group made lasting memories for a group of young dog enthusiasts.

So much was going on at the International Centre last weekend! The Toronto Christmas Pet Expo was held in conjunction with both the Aurora and District Kennel Club Dog Show and The Royal Canin Crown Classic. And that's just the dog side of the massive Expo! There was also a cat show, dozens of parrots, hundreds of reptiles and a pig being paraded around. On top of all that, the Dandie Dinmont Terrier Club of Canada celebrated

its 50th anniversary with a competition for Junior Handlers on Sunday, November 24th. This competition was unique as the Juniors (ages 14 - 17) had only Dandie Dinmont Terriers to show. With \$500 in total prize money, they had to prove their prowess by handling several different Dandies. Some were well trained Champions, but others were puppies, inexperienced or somewhat reluctant. The goal of this event was to introduce Juniors to this rare breed, let the public see a great bunch of Dandies (thousands attend the Toronto Pet Expo) and to give a youngster a lasting memory of connecting with a rare breed.

As Master of Ceremonies, Canadian Kennel Club Director Richard Paquette kept the audience informed. Shannon Scheer, a renowned professional handler from Calgary who is deeply involved with Juniors judged the first section: "The Handler Most Able to Adapt to Each Dog Given to Them". The Dandie Dinmont Terrier Club of Canada's President Mike Macbeth then judged "Most Patient Handler with a Puppy or Inexperienced Adult". As the breeder of most of the competing dogs, Mike had the advantage of knowing which dogs were the most difficult for the young handlers to demonstrate their skills.

There was also a written test, and the answers, particularly to traits that make the Dandie unique proved that several Juniors had truly studied the standard and the breed's rich history.

The nine Juniors stood on one side of the show ring, and nine owners entered with their Dandies. Each Junior then drew the name of one of the dogs and the owner stepped forward and handed over their dog. Shannon Scheer gave the teens several minutes to play with and get to know the Dandies before she started to put them through their paces.

When Shannon completed judging of the more experienced dogs, Mike Macbeth asked nine owners of puppies, inexperienced or unenthusiastic dogs to enter the ring, and

again the Juniors each drew the name of the Dandie they would begin with, but in both competitions the young handlers were asked to switch dogs so they could demonstrate their ability with a variety of dogs.

Once the winners were announced, Richard Paquette introduced one of the competitors to the audience – Isaac Clark, who won the National CKC Junior Handling competition and will be representing Canada at the world-famous Crufts dog show in Birmingham, England in March. The CKC and a breed club have donated funding for his expenditures. To support Isaac’s journey, the Dandie Club announced that they are pleased to contribute \$200 and challenged other dog clubs in Canada to match their donation.

The event was a hit for both the Juniors and the Dandie owners as well as the large audience the event drew. The Dandie Dinmont Terrier Club of Canada thanked all the supportive members who graciously allowed their dogs to participate with these young strangers. The club also gave a heartfelt thank you to the nine Juniors who now have more knowledge of this wonderful endangered breed. I hope their new relationship with this breed will continue to grow.

This is the type of creative thinking we need to get our breeds seen. I speak often of “planting seeds” when it comes to promoting your endangered breed and it goes without saying that nine seeds were planted last Sunday.
