

IMPORTANT UPDATE ON THE 2016 AND 2017 REFERENDUMS

Approvals from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada

The Canadian Kennel Club membership had the opportunity to vote on proposed amendments to the By-laws, recognition of new breeds and Rules of Eligibility (ROE) in the 2016 and 2017 Referendums.

After receiving the requisite support of the membership, an application was made to Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) seeking approval and AAFC has now issued Certificates of Approval, effective July 24, 2019, for both the 2016 and 2017 Referendums.

Key Highlights

- **Membership Categories:** We were unsuccessful in having our application approved to amend Section 7.1 MEMBERSHIP from the 2017 Referendum. This was a proposal to define the categories of membership as well as rights and privileges in Club Policy so that it would be easier to make amendments whenever categories are either re-named or new categories introduced as the Club offers new added value programs. AAFC advises that requirements for membership must be established in by-laws according to the Animal Pedigree Act; however, there was an indication that there may be some other options which will be discussed with AAFC in the future.
- **New Breeds and ROE:** No new breeds or ROE were approved at this time, but we will continue our communications with AAFC in this regard.
- All other by-law amendments were approved as submitted.

The full list of 2016 & 2017 by-law amendments are available on CKC's website.

Further details regarding the impact of these approved amendments will follow in the coming weeks. New opportunities, initiatives and programs have been made possible because of AAFC's approvals. In the meantime, the Club will make any necessary changes to our official documents (forms, policies, etc.) and a new By-laws booklet will be made available for viewing on the CKC website. CKC CONNECTS WITH CVO RE: REVIEW ON SURGICAL PROCEDURES POLICY

The Canadian Kennel Club recently met with the College of Veterinarians of Ontario (CVO) at their offices in Guelph, to learn more about the College's process for reviewing its policy on "medically unnecessary procedures".

While the College's current position states that it does not support "medically unnecessary procedures", as the regulatory body for veterinarians in Ontario, CVO recognizes that the trained, professional veterinarians of Ontario bring a wealth of expertise in deciding the best treatment and care for their patients.

CVO shared that a notice of motion was put forth regarding a review of "medically unnecessary procedures" at their March 2019 Council meeting. This motion was discussed at the June 2019 Council meeting and was not supported by a majority of Council members. CVO is continuing to seek legal advice on this matter and will discuss further at their Council meeting in September. Should proposed changes be brought forth at any point in the future, a full public consultation process will be undertaken.

CKC appreciates the College's open and transparent approach as we work collaboratively through this process. We will continue to keep our members apprised as new information becomes available.

CKC continues to support freedom of choice for breeders who choose to work with their veterinarians to carry out procedures such as cropping, docking and front dewclaw removal, to promote safety in performance activities and support hygienic animal husbandry.


FROM MY SIDE OF THE DESK: CANINE HEALTH AND WELLNESS



Certainly, a prevalent theme from *my side of the desk* over the past several months has been canine health and wellness. This is something inherent in CKC's purpose, mission and strategic

plans - and the discussions, commitment and actions on the subject lately have been very encouraging.

At the Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Winnipeg this past June, there was opportunity to exchange information and ideas, recognize long standing members of merit and generally celebrate the purebred dog fancy. David Trus of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada attended the meetings to address the Board and Membership at the AGM. He brought background on the Animal Pedigree Act (APA) including CKC's role as Canada's largest purebred dog registry and the opportunities within. Some of the concepts challenged long-standing ideologies around the APA and breeding. While at times this was met with opposition, it has CKC considering its role and direction on the subject.



At the same time, Board member Dr. Paul Eckford attended the 4th International Dog Health Workshop along with representative from Kennel Clubs around the world, the science community and other

interested parties. Dr. Eckford returned excited by the material and insights he brought back. It will inform plans for breed improvement and preservation such as those underway with the CKC Genetics and Medical Committee.

Recently, Board Chair, Joan Bennett and I had the privilege of attending the 2nd International Congress of Kennel Clubs hosted by the Swedish Kennel Club. Here we took the baton from the Dog Health Workshop to consider the concepts and recommendations put forth. This was done under a commitment to collaborate on like-minded goals. Examples include considering standard approaches to the use of DNA in breed registries.

Closer to home and our day-to-day practices, we are closely and carefully monitoring the information surfacing around the dog food options and their possible influence on disease.

Combined, these inputs on canine health and welfare create a very broad and complex environment to maneuver in. We recognize that CKC breeders and breed clubs will be a critical source of input, experience, and direction as our strategies evolve.

So it is timely that the CKC Board of Directors is embarking on a new Strategic Plan for the Club. Ideally and eventually this will include support for practical and consistent approaches to breed-specific health plans and meaningful DNA policies, as well as more proactive sharing of information and best practices that breeders across Canada can take advantage of.

FORT GARRY KENNEL CLUB CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

The Fort Garry Kennel Club celebrates its 100th Anniversary with a commemorative dog show.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the Fort Garry Kennel Club. This milestone offers a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the Club's history and the many important contributions it has made.

CKC had the opportunity to talk to Geraldine Taylor, Fort Garry Kennel Club's current president, who gave us some insight into the club's work in promoting purebred dogs and dog sports in Canada for over a century.

The History of the Fort Garry Kennel Club

The first record of a kennel club in Manitoba was in 1882, with the formation of the the Winnipeg Kennel Club. Alexander Logan was the founding president, and also the mayor of Winnipeg at the time.

In 1919, many of the smaller clubs in the area, including the Winnipeg Kennel Club, amalgamated to form a larger club;

the Fort Garry Kennel Club, making it one of the oldest kennel clubs in Canada still in existence. The Club's founding president was Mr. Alex Stuart.

Shows, Events and Classes

In May 1919, the Fort Garry Kennel Club hosted its first dog show. This was the first dog show held in Manitoba since prior to the start of WWI. To this day- 100 years later- the Club continues this tradition, hosting a show in May every year.

In 1964, the Fort Garry Kennel Club added Obedience trials to its annual dog show in addition to Conformation. The Club also offered Conformation and later obedience training classes, until suitable training space was no longer available.

In October 1988, the Fort Garry Kennel Club hosted the first Manitoba Classic, a specialty Conformation competition for dogs who had won a first in group in Manitoba shows. Cash prizes were awarded, and attendees dressed up in evening attire. Two years later, the event expanded to include North-Western Ontario, as well as first-place dogs in Obedience. The Classic ran until 1998, with sponsors such as Ralston Purina and Best West Pet Foods.

On June 28, 2019, the Fort Garry Kennel Club hosted a special 100th anniversary show to commemorate this wonderful achievement. This show was held in conjunction with the Portage Kennel Club Show and was a great success.
