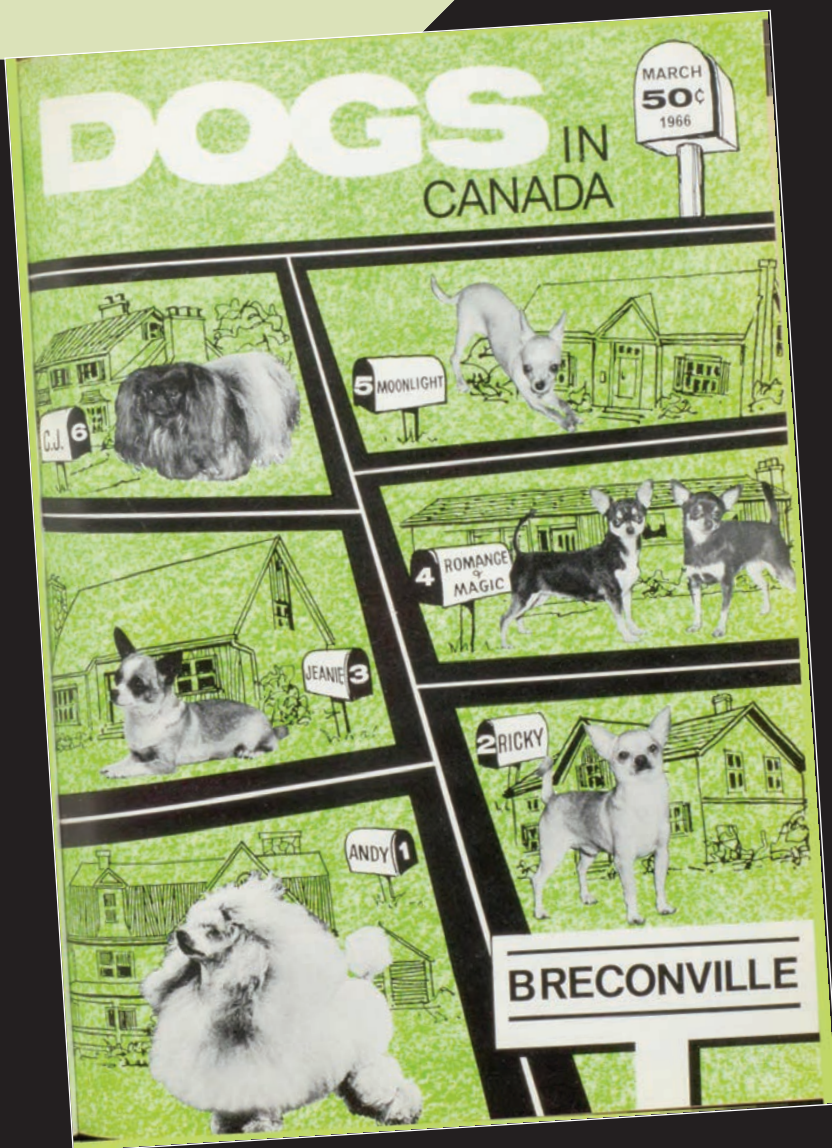

WINNING MOMENTS FOR CANADIANS AT WESTMINSTER 2017

With an entry of 108 dogs, Canadians shone once again at the 141st Westminster Dog Show, accumulating 65 'brags.'



A tribute to the quality and depth of Canadian-bred dogs, Boxer GCh. Mephisto's Speak Of The Devil won the Working Group Tuesday night, after placing Group 2nd last year. 'Devlin,' bred by Michelle and Peter Yeadon and Monika Pinsker of British Columbia, has been a fixture in the American dog-show scene, rising to the No. 2 dog, all breeds, in 2016, with over 54,000 points. (She was the No. 9 dog in 2015.)



Hound group winner GCh. Vin-Melcas Daggarwood Delight was bred by Nicole Casavechia and Kevin Richard of Halifax, Nova Scotia, and was handled by her owner, the incomparable Pat Trotter. Duffy was Canada's #1 Elkhound in 2013 before leaving for the U.S., where she has been the #1 Elkhound for the past two years. This win marked Mrs. Trotter's 11th Hound Group 1st. Her previous 10 wins were all as a breeder/owner/handler.



Canadians were also cheering on American Eskimo Dog GChEx Nuuktok's Atka Inukshuk as he attempted to break the tie for the Best of Breed record. The consummate showman, Inuk held his own in tough competition and the judge awarded him Select Dog. Congratulations to Inuk's breeder/owner Sharon Robertson and handler Graeme Burdon for making

Inuk's ninth consecutive appearance at Westminster a moment to remember. The Akita, Ben, did not return to Westminster after his eighth show, so it would appear that Inuk is still leaving his mark in the history books.

Bud had a long and rich history with CKC. He was a long-time, dedicated volunteer and Life member of CKC. In addition to his tenure as a long-serving member of the CKC Board of Directors, Bud served on the Discipline Committee for three years when it was first

formed in the early 1980's, and was the Chair of the Judges Committee for several years in the 1990s.

Bud was also Honourary Chair in 2003 and served as the Registration Committee Chairman for many years in addition to serving on many other CKC committees. A dedicated advocate for the purebred dog community, Bud was a respected All Breed Judge, renowned both in Canada and internationally.

HAVANESE CRACKS TOP 5 IN CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB'S TOP 10 MOST POPULAR DOGS



Toronto, February 15, 2017 - The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) is thrilled to announce the top ten most popular breeds for 2016. For the first time on record, the Havanese has taken over the coveted fifth spot, previously held by the Shetland Sheepdog since 2005.

"This is the first time in recent history that one of the toy breeds has made it into the top five," said Andrew Patton, CKC Marketing Communications Manager. "The Havanese is a charming and intelligent breed with a big heart and its compact size makes it ideal for urban and suburban living, so it appeals to many dog lovers."

The Havanese has consistently won puppy owners over since the breed was first registered by CKC in 1999, with Calgary dog lovers now owning the most CKC-registered Havanese, followed by Toronto and Edmonton.

"Havanese are everything that you would ever want in a dog, all rolled up into one small, adorable, and non-shedding package" said Rose Kimber, President of the **Havanese Fanciers of**

Canada. "They are natural clowns, yet smart and easy to train. If you have a Havanese, you can do just about anything with them!" For the health and safety of the puppy, the Havanese National Breed Club is keen to remind puppy buyers to research breeders and ensure they conduct health testing and follow the guidelines of the national breed club.

Not to be outdone, the French Bulldog continues to make great strides, becoming Canada's eighth most popular breed, moving up one spot from the previous year and shows no signs of stopping.

After a two-year hiatus, the Miniature Schnauzer burrows its way back into the top ten, reminding us that we cannot count out this trusted terrier.
