CKC ADDS NEW QUALIFYING SHOW FOR CRUFTS 2019

In collaboration with The Kennel Club, the CKC has added another avenue in which exhibitors can qualify their dogs for the world's largest benched dog show. The Renaissance Dog Association Show held in Chilliwack, B.C. has been designated as a qualifying show.

All group-placement winners (i.e., first, second, third and four in each group) at the Renaissance Dog Association show on Saturday, April 14, 2018, will be eligible to enter Crufts in 2019. The designation of a qualifying show is in addition to the system already in place: A dog may qualify for Crufts if it has placed within the Top 5 in its group according to the Dogs in Canada Top Show Dog point system, or has won Best of Breed, Best of Opposite, Select Dog, Select Bitch or Award of Merit at its Breed National Specialty, as agreed by the Canadian Kennel Club.

IT4YOU UPDATE: THE MEMBER DASHBOARD - YOU TOLD US WHICH FEATURES MATTER MOST

IT4YOU, the new CKC computer system, promises to provide valuable technology that will bring an improved online experience to our membership.

In the IT4YOU August update we discussed plans for a Member Dashboard, which serves as a landing page from which users can check the status of their documents and applications and access a variety of commonly used functions. Then, to determine how best to configure the dashboard, we created a survey and invited CKC members to rate the value of several proposed features.

Here are the results of the IT4YOU Dashboard Features Survey:

- · A list of your dogs with links to further details: 90% rated this important or very important.
- A list of applications and their status: 76% rated this important or very important.
- A list of recent invoices: 72% rated this important or very important.
- · Quick links to common tasks: 89% rated this important or very important.
- Access to enhanced help: 71% rated this important or very important.

- CKC member news: 67% rated this important or very important.
- A top 10 event list and your dog's ranking: 62% rated this important or very important.

RECENT OBEDIENCE AND RALLY **OBEDIENCE RULE AMENDMENTS**

At the September 2017 Board Meeting, the Board approved a high profile amendment to the Obedience Trial and Rally Obedience Trial Rules and Regulations, Chapter 12 -Open Class that we wish to share pending approval of the official Minutes.

The Board supported two equal open streams, one of which includes out-of-sight stays and a new stream that includes changes of position and an in-sight sit-stay. The change of position exercise was modified to reduce the distance to 10 feet, the number of positions changes to four in total and allows command and /or signal. The second stream remains as current Open class. Both streams result in the same titles and qualify for high-in-trial.

Feeding Performance Dogs

Top Dogs need a top performing diet. During training or working periods, working and performance dogs engage in intense physical activity that requires extra energy compared to adult dogs that are not as active. This article highlights the key dietary components of a canine athlete.

Sources of Energy

Fats and carbohydrates are the main sources of energy during exercise. The energy requirements for canine athletes varies with the duration, frequency and intensity of the exercise.

Fat

In addition to exercise intensity, dietary fat requirements are affected by the duration of exercise. The longer the canine athlete exercises, the more dietary fat it requires.

Maximal oxygen uptake (VO₂ Max) = the highest quantity of oxygen that can be used by the body during exhaustive exercise. A study of sled dogs showed that when the dietary fat increased from 15% to 60% of the calories. the VO2 Max increased by

almost 50%¹. A high VO2 Max and maximal fat oxidation means better performance during the exercise.

Carbohydrates

Carbohydrates are broken down into sugars like glucose and are stored in the muscle and liver cells as glycogen. These stores provide energy for canine athletes during periods of increased intensity in exercise. Once glycogen stores are depleted, the body will shift to fat as an energy source. It is important to find a complete and balanced diet to help meet a hard-working dog's carbohydrate needs when it comes to exercise.

Additional Dietary Factors

Fat and carbohydrates aren't the only important components of a balanced diet for performance and working dogs. Increased protein in the canine athlete's daily diet supports healthy muscles and more efficient use of fat as an energy source.

Amino acids, the building blocks of protein, are used to build new muscles and repair damaged muscles. As tissue mass tends to increase with training, this increase must be supplied by extra protein in the diet. Increasing dietary protein has also been shown to decrease injuries².

Amino acids are also used to make red blood cells which carry oxygen to the cells. An increased level of oxygen in muscle cells means there is an increased capacity of the muscles to use fat as an energy source. This allows for a more efficient use of fat during prolonged exercise and a delayed onset of fatigue. Endurance dogs should be fed a formula with high protein for best results. If protein is consumed in excess amounts, it can be used as an energy source so be sure to find a formula that is complete and balanced for your dog's needs.

Digestibility

Feeding working and performance dogs requires more than increasing the quantity of food in a canine's daily diet, especially where stomach capacity is a factor. A highly digestible diet provides the necessary calories more efficiently than a lower digestible diet, supporting canine athletes with the necessary energy sources in smaller volumes.

Water

Always provide adequate amounts of water for hardworking dogs. Small amounts of water should be offered throughout exercise to maintain hydration.

Complete and Balanced: Performance Formulas

Feeding performance and working dogs for optimum performance during exercise requires a deep understanding of the canine athlete's needs both during exercise and for recuperation. Support your canine athlete with a complete and balanced formula, tuned specifically to the needs of the Top Dog in your life.
