OFFICIAL REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING.

THE third Annual Meeting of the members of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Rossin House, Toronto, on Wednesday evening, the 16th September, 1891, at 8 o'clock. Present—J. Lorne Campbell, President in the chair; Hon-President, R. Gibson; 1st Vice-President, Dr. Mills; Vice-President, T. G. Davey, London; and Sec'y-Treas., S. F. Glass. Executive Committee—Dr. Niven, C. A. Stone, W. B. Palmer, H. Bedlington, H. B. Donovan, J. G. Mitchener, and P. G. Keyes, were all present as also the following members: F. H. F. Mercer, A. D. Stewart, C. M. Nelles, A. Geddes, John Davidson, Munro, Mich., F. Habart, G. W. Prescott, Major Guillott, C. Bennett, H. Gorman, J. S. Williams, R. P. Forshaw, E. R. Richards, T. Hallam, Geo. Bell, G. S. Oldrieve, R. E. Kent, H. C. Bates, Jas. Douglas, R. McEwen, and Geo. Douglas.

Mr. Waters, representing the *American Field*, and H. W. Lacy of *Forest and Stream* were in attendance, as also Major Taylor of New York, and Dr. Foote of New Rochelle, N.Y.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and duly approved. The President expressed his regret at not being able to have been present at the

Executive meeting held the previous evening, when he expected a report of the Executive would have been prepared for the annual meeting. He was pleased, however, to observe that the Club's affairs were in a flourishing condition and would call on the Sec'y-Treasurer to read the annual report.

The Secretary thought that the C. K. C. should feel justly proud of the advancement the Club had made since the last annual meeting. No more convincing evidence should be required of the Club's growth in membership and the generally increasing interest in kennel matters in Canada than the large and influential gathering of members present this evening. The finances of the Club, he was pleased to say, were in good condition, and the registrations in the Club Stud Book gave evidence of the fast increasing number of Canadian breeders. The total number of registrations for the year amounted to 814, 416 dogs and 398 bitches. Of these Cocker Spaniels took the lead with 224 registrations, 97 dogs and 127 bitches, followed by St. Bernards with 130 registrations, 66 dogs and 64 bitches.

Moved by H. Bedlington, and seconded by E. Richards—That the report of the Secretary and Treasurer be received and adopted.—Carried.

The notice of motion given by Mr. H. B. Donovan at the last annual meeting increasing the Executive from 8 to 12 was carried.

The following motion which was carried by the Executive at their last meeting was duly confirmed and approved.

Moved by S. F. Glass, seconded by T. G. Davey—That the Constitution or By-Laws of the Canadian Kennel Club may be amended at any general or annual meeting of the club, providing notice of same shall be given two months previous to the holding of such meeting in the KENNEL GAZETTE or official organ of the Club, and provided also that two thirds of the votes represented at the meeting must vote in favor of any amendment so proposed, in case no notice shall have been given, a majority of three-fourths of the members present or represented shall be required.

Moved by S. F. Glass, seconded by R. Gibson—That dogs entered at any show, must enter and compete in the regular classes.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by C. M. Nelles—That in future no puppy classes shall be given at any show held under the rules of the C. K. C.—Lost.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by E. Richards—That at no show held under the rules of the C. K. C. shall dogs and bitches be shown against each other in the same classes.—Lost.

Moved in amendment by Mr. R. E. Kent, seconded by Dr. Niven—That the matter be left to the discretion of the Bench Show Committees.—Carried.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by F. H. F. Mercer—That no show held under the rules of the C. K. C. shall last more than four days inclusive of the opening and closing days of the show.—Carried.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by R. E. Kent—That in future no addition or alteration shall be made to any prize list issued by any bench show Committee after it is once printed and distributed, special prizes excepted.—Carried.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded

by G. W. Prescott—In order that every member of the Club may have a chance of voting, the Secretary shall send to each member not less than 14 days before the date fixed for the annual meeting, a complete list of the members of the club, giving the names in full and the residences of the said members. Each member upon receiving such lists shall place his name or initials or mark against the names of those gentlemen for whom he desires to vote, specifying the office as he wishes them filled. Each member shall have fifteen votes, which must be placed in single votes against the names of fifteen gentlemen on the list. No plumping or partial plumping will be allowed, and voting papers which may contain plumpers will be declared void.—Lost.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by C. A. Stone—That at shows held under the rules of the C. K. C., the entries shall close positively not less than 14 days before the opening day of the show.—Lost.

Moved in amendment by T. G. Davey, seconded by Dr. Niven—That it be seven days instead of fourteen.—Carried.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by C. M. Nelles—That the Executive Committee be requested to revise the Constitution, By-Laws and Rules of the Club, and distribute the same when printed to the members.—Carried.

Moved by J. S. Williams, seconded by T. G. Davey—That the Secretary be paid \$150.00 for his services for the ensuing year.—Carried.

Moved by E. Richards, seconded by C. A. Stone—That \$100.00 be voted to the Secretary for his services during the past year.—Carried.

The election of officers was then proceeded with. Upon motion of S. F. Glass, seconded by T. G. Davey, the President and C. A. Stone were elected scrutineers.

Moved by A. D. Stewart, seconded by Dr. Niven—That the official year close the night previous to the annual meeting.

On motion it was decided that the next annual meeting be held in Toronto.

come in well, and closed with a total of
260, Cockers alone numbering over
60. Over 50 late entries had to be de-
clined.

MONTREAL BENCH SHOW.

The car containing Spratt's benching
was somehow misplaced, the benching
was unable to be got to the grounds
till Sunday, and none were up before
Monday. This hampered the manage-
ment a good deal. 340 dogs were
benched, and the prize money all paid
before the close of show. The receipts
were well ahead of expenses, no less
than 23,026 people having paid for
admission to the building. This augurs
well for future shows.

Third round—A. W. Purbeck's Pious

TORONTO BENCH SHOW.

"H. W. L." AS A SPRINTER.

One morning during the Toronto show several of "the boys" determined to get up a few friendly 100 yards dashes, and with this end in view an adjournment was made to the horse ring, where Mr. John Davidson (always ready for sport) was appointed judge, Mr. Ben Lewis starter and Mr. Boggs referee. Fenton and Geo. Thomas ran a neat dash, the latter crossing the line first, then "H. W. L." thought he would have a try and showed the pace to Fenton and Thomas winning handily and proving quite a sprinter.

EBERHART DOES 100 YARDS IN 13 MINUTES AND 15 SECONDS.

Eberhart thought to emulate Lacy and "did a turn" with Mann, the Flour City Kennels handler. Mr. Davidson gave the official time for the 100 yards as 13 minutes 15 seconds but Eberhart claimed two seconds less. Stick to Pugs old man, sprinting is not in your line.

MR. W. B. PALMER, WOODSTOCK, purchased the red Cocker dog, Red-man, winner of three firsts (open, novice and puppy) at Toronto show. We see he has repeated his victory in the open class at Montreal.

THE MASTIFF, MINTING MINOR, though entered was absent from the Toronto show, having, through an accident got almost covered with tar, and consequently being in no condition to appear.

TORONTO is to be congratulated on the large entry which was secured this year and on the high quality of the exhibits. The entries reached the large number of 581 or about 60 more than last year, and this speaks well for Mr. Stone's hard work before the show. In many ways the management was ahead of last year, the Committee worked harder, the rings were well attended and no unnecessary delays occurred.

Mr. Stone's time was fully occupied and he had the details of the show well in hand. He needs more men for a show of such dimensions, for instance it should be the entire duty of one man to attend to the cleaning away of any unpleasantness deposited on the benches by the dogs. "Sanitas" sawdust might be used to advantage here.

The sawdust in the rings should be entirely removed each day at least and fresh supplied. Until enough men are provided to permit of the Superintendent giving each one some particular duty to perform he will be hampered a good deal in the details of the show. The ventilating of the building was much better attended to than last year, especially during the last days. Brass tags were used and were a great advance on the old paper ones. Each handler in the ring had a large tablet bearing the number of the dog fixed to his hat or coat which is something the GAZETTE has frequently advocated and which proved a great boon to those watching the judging, identification of the dogs by this means being quite an easy matter. Plenty of straw was used and of good quality, another point in

advance of last year. "Spratt's" well-known biscuits were used to feed added to which a liberal supply of fresh meat was provided each day.

The service of the veterinarian was poor, at least according to our ideas of the proper duties of such an officer. We are strongly of opinion that the veterinarian should stay at the door the entire time the dogs are being admitted and each one should briefly pass his inspection. The catalogue was excellent, well printed on good paper and had few errors and those of a typographical nature. The headings were large and prominent and the entries were not too much crowded as in the case of some we have seen. It contained a classified list of all exhibitors with their full addresses as well as a list of the varieties.

Taken altogether, the Manager and his Committee are to be congratulated on the success of the "largest fall show ever held in America." A full and complete criticism of the awards will appear in an extra of the GAZETTE to be published in a few days.

head. Don Phyllis, good in front and heavy in bone got the reserve. In open bitches, Republican Belle again beat Zenith.

GREAT DANES.—should have been judged by Miss Whitney, but were brought into Mr. Lacy's ring. Favor alone in challenge is not a good mover. In open class Brutus should have given way to Minervas Fawn, who is better in body legs and feet; her head though not heavy is typical. Pascha II has a fair head but is straight behind. Gelert has a poor front. Ultima Plavia has the same fault and is throaty.

NEWFOUNDLANDS.—But one entry, given second, more than he deserved.

CLUMBER SPANIELS.—In challenge class Lady Bromine better in head, beat Boss III. Both were shown in miserable condition. Johnny Jr. and Lady Joan are well-known and were alone in their respective classes.

FIELD SPANIELS.—Slim classes, Bridford Gladys alone in challenge class. Samson 1st in open dogs beats Mohawk in head. Toby is leggy.

COCKER SPANIELS.—Here is where the fun came in, large classes, good in quality. In challenge dogs Black Duke a bit full in eye won, Red Jacket is toyish but a taking dog. King of Obos is light in eye, fair in front. Rabbi, V. H. C. was placed first in Kingston, he is better than King of Obos in bone and front legs. In the

challenge bitch class nothing special showed up. Miss Obo II. won, is out of coat, but beats Bessie W., second, in skull and muzzle. Black Dufferin scored in open dogs and won easily, he has a good head, is nice in front and well-shaped body. Oban and Obadiah might have changed places, though Obadiah was not shown in good condition. Sport has a good body, but is out in front. Brock is too big and too long in head. In the bitch class I Say out of coat, won. She has a typical head and good legs and body. Flirt is off in muzzle. Several cards given to bitches good enough to win in ordinary classes. In the other color class, Bambo won over Brantford Red Man, broad in skull and poor in front. In bitches Red Riding Hood was put over Gypsy Queen, poor in expression. Lady of Learning third, might have changed places with the vile dispositioned Blushing Rose.

PUGS.—Four showed up in the challenge class. Bob Ivy won handily with Bessie and Casina as named. Eberhart's Cashier, first in open dogs is a bit long in muzzle, but the color of Curtis put him back. Kash Jr. might have been placed 3rd over Fritz. In bitches Sateen, good in head and body won over Mabel E. Fanny K. has badly carried ears. Peggy Pride got the reserve, Fanny, V.H.C., might have taken her place.

TOY PETS.—A Toy Black and Tan, Beauty should have won, she is a moderately good one all over.

MISCELLANEOUS.—First went to the Bloodhound Jack Shepherd, good in head but poor in body, second to the King Charles Spaniel, Calumet Alice, third went to a dog called a Barbet. A fair Airedale was seen in Worry, he stands on good legs and feet and coat of proper texture. REX.

The notes on the other classes are by the Judge, Mr. Lacy, from *Forest and Stream*.

COLLIES.—The Collie classes had a fairly good entry, some good Canadian dogs being on hand. In challenge class Roslyn Dandy, in Metchly Surprise's faulty condition, won nicely, is better in front and bone; Roslyn Wilkes was reserved for specials. In the dogs, the 2nd novice winner at New York, quite a nice one, beat Sir Walter Scott III, in head and coat; the latter is a promising youngster, though a trifle short-faced, and ears a bit big. Rowdy was a little behind in this class, though he was as good as any in head, he is not right in body. Moonstone, reserve, is too cloddy, though he had the best coat in the class, his head is coarse and he stands a little wider in front, evidently a Collie gone off from his puppy form; the others call for no very particular mention, though Ballantine is a fair dog. In open bitches May Flower and Vanity, from the same kennel, won the money, the former beating Vanity in head, coat and front, and is a nice little bitch; Vanity beats Cora II in head and body, the latter being too fat and cloddy, and coat needs straightening. Nancy, reserve, is beaten in head, front and ears. Parton Ella, V.H.C., is beaten in coat and front, is a little out at elbow.

BULLDOGS.—Only one entry in each class, but those were two good ones, Bo'swain and Bloater Girl. The latter should not have been shown as she had scabs on her and her skin was bare in places.

BULL-TERRIERS.—An excellent display, especially for such a show. Starlight, looking quite herself, was alone in the challenge class. The open dog class was a hot one, several new importations appearing. First prize went to Prince Bendigo, who beats the second, Common, in condition and body, the latter is a little long in coat, but has an excellent long head and good eye; he beats Watchful Wagtail

in front, the latter bowing out. Mister Dick is too coarse and short-headed. Duke of Wellington and Baron II, V.H.C., both deserved their letters, as they show a good deal of quality, but are not true in forelegs. Top Sparkle perhaps deserved another letter, but he is faulty in head. King of Hearts is well known. This was a warm class, but was graded according to merit and condition. The bitch class was not so large nor so good. Queen of the Dale, another new one, is better in head, front and body than Edgewood Fancy, who in turn beats Grove Duchess, who is a bit cloddy and snipy muzzled. Bell of Edgewood is young, 6 mos. old, is bad in front and light in muzzle. Bull-terriers are evidently taking a new lease on popular favor.

FOX TERRIERS.—Here was some of the hottest competition in the show, many new English dogs appearing, and these when filled out and in condition will do better. No challengers. In open dogs the Kingston winner, Blemton Trump, again came to the front, beating Painter, as before; Endcliffe Spice, third, is beaten in body, head and front, and he in turn beats Diver III. in head, forelegs and feel of coat, though beaten himself in loin and ribs. Nobody's Child could do no better than V H C in this company, though his head was the best. Bob, V H C is out at elbow and light in muzzle. Jack is beaten in head, carriage of ears and front. Several other entries had no business with the Terriers mentioned and were sent out early. The winner in bitches turned up to be a Thayer-bred one, Hillsdale Baroness, nice front, head and carriage of ears, coat of good feel. Venus, another new one from the other side, is hardly up to the winner in head or the above named points, but beats Rowton Safety, a black-headed, taking little bitch, young yet and not let down, front pretty good

ears carried too high, skull round and full, muzzle bit pinched, good eye, and no doubt will make up into something better than the average. Suffolk Riot is small, loses in head, coat, front and body, not filled out enough yet. Vic, V.H.C., beats Dot, H.C., in head, carriage of ears and forelegs and feet. Wire-hairs were exceedingly well represented, for it is not often we find eight in the dog class. The small ring and the exceeding pugnacity of the competitors made this a bad class to judge, but I liked Adswood Jim II. for premium honors, thinking him better in head, not too wide in front and harder in coat. Stanly second, Eskdale Bloom I did not like so well in head, too thick and wide in front and coat not so wiry. Barton Sting is better in head, but loses to Bloom in most of the points. Green Gale Patch, V.H.C., is a fairly good one, but loses in front and head. Jack is too wide in front, otherwise a fairly good Terrier. Wentworth Wonder is well-known, but did not like its head, nor is it so good in body. In bitches a nice shaped one-Repero Rosanna, short of coat and a trifle long cast, has an excellent front and nice long head, with ears well carried. She also is an immigrant. Sally, second, is a pretty little Terrier, better in head, body and front than the third one, Miss Taylor.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS.—The winners in these classes are well-known. Champion Meersbrook Maiden had her class to herself. She is not in good coat and was not feeling in her usual active condition the first day or two of the show. Broomfield Sultan had an easy win in dogs over Rochelle Scot, who had, though coarse himself, an easy defeat of J. M. Gibson, who is too thick in head and cloddy in body, markings too light. Prince Regent did not compete, was out of condition, and Prince Raglan was absent. In

bitches Matchless, well-known, had the class to herself, Meersbrook Empress not turning up.

SCOTCH, SKYE AND DANDIE DINMONTS.—Here was a troublesome class and not quite a fair one, three good dogs of different breeds standing out before the rest. Eventually the Skye, Sir Stafford's superior condition told over the typical Scotch Terrier Kilston, who was out of shape; the Dandie, King of the Heather, is wide and out in front; Mena, a nice stamp of Dandie, hardly up to King in body and head, was reserve. Fan loses in texture of coat and front too bowed; Valentine, H.C., loses in head and front, no difference between the hair on head and body. This was a splendid show of Dandies for this country, and most of them are owned in Toronto and Milton, Ont.

BEDLINGTON TERRIERS.—Sentinel II. won easily in this class of three, beating Nettle in head and coat, though beaten in arch of loin. Phoebe, too short-faced and not straight in front, was third.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS.—Champion Toon's Royal had an easy win over Venus from the same kennel in the challenge class. Toon's Royal George was given the only prize in the open dogs, and a silver, Tot, from the same kennels, took the prize in the ladie's division.

DACHSHUNDS.—Windrush Rieter, faulty in hind action, but of excellent type, won over Lena L., well-known, better in length, nearer to the ground and better in crook and texture of coat. Felmark should have been second, though he is not so long in body, but is stronger in front. With the judging of the specials for Hamilton dogs and the kennel prizes, this brought the judging to a close.

MONTREAL BENCH SHOW.

COMMENTS ON THE AWARDS.

(By Our Special Reporter.)

ENGLISH MASTIFFS—There was but one entry in the challenge class, Mode, having a walk over. He has been described in reports of other shows. I should have liked to see competition in this class, as Mode to my mind is not really first-class, his head being only fair, his fore-legs are none of the best, is weak in pasterns, his eyes an off color and is lacking in wrinkle. However, he is a dog of considerable character, having lots of bone, deep chest, very good coat and good tail. The open class certainly had quantity if not quality, no less than eleven entries faced honest John. Lord Caution, winner of first, has improved since last year, and is now a very fair dog. His head does not strike one as being exactly right, being too long, he has good bone, and is symmetrical and will yet improve. Victor, the winner of the red ribbon, was in my opinion placed a peg too high. Mr. Short's dogs are rather a handsome lot, but are undersized and are not by any means first-class. The rest are perhaps better not described.

ST. BERNARDS—The challenge bitch class had one entry, Republican Belle well known. In open dogs, Kingston Regent scored his fourth win of the circuit, putting him in the challenge class. The more I see of this dog the better I like him, he improves on acquaintance. I wish as much could be said of his handler. The second dog, Duke of Wellington, is a rather nice dog, and would show up better were Regent absent, as he cannot stand comparison with such a grand dog as the first prize dog. The third dog, Lord Dalhousie, lacks in head and size. The rest were away below standard. Zenith had it all her own way in open bitches. In

challenge smooth-coated, old Hector walked off with the blue. In open bitches, Nun-Nicer received the first prize, having a walk over. She lacks size, bone, etc., but is rather a nice looking bitch.

BLOOD HOUNDS—Had Jack Shepard as a representative, and a very good one he is.

NEWFOUNDLANDS—Czar was alone, and was given first, although the judge seemed in doubt if he deserved the honor. He is rather small, only fair in head, is light in bone, and is inclined to be curly in coat. The breed seems to be dying out, which is a great pity, as the dog is one of the noblest in the canine family.

GREAT DANES—Favor won hands down, and is a grand specimen of a grand breed. In open bitch class, Minerva's Fawn was alone. She is very symmetrical and handsome, and of high quality, but appears to me weak in head and light in muzzle. Her condition could not to be improved on.

DEER HOUNDS—were a fair lot and were placed properly.

GREYHOUNDS—In challenge class Gem of the Season won over Scavenger. In the challenge bitches, Maud Torrington scored over Spinaway; both are well known. In open dogs Ornatus again won over his kennel companion, and deservedly so; he beats Pious Pembroke in head and muzzle, not much difference in loin, if any Ornatus has it, besides his feet are better, and he is cleaner cut in throat, and is altogether a better dog. I liked the third dog, Elcho, better than Pious, who is altogether too coarse to suit me. In open bitches, Second Sight a very nice bitch, received the blue, she is well known, and the other winners have been described before.

IN FOXHOUNDS—Trailer won, has a good body, legs and feet, in head falls off. The bitch Gypsy, is even worse than Trailer and should not

have received more than a red ribbon.

POINTERS—In heavy weight challenge bitches, Ch. Belle Randolph won over Devon Nell, both are well known. Pommery Sec., had a walk over in light weight challenge dogs, he is a grand little dog and worthy of the honor. Fan N won in the corresponding bitch class. In open heavy weights, the fight was between Tempest and Westminster Drake, King Bow's Bow being absent, having strayed from his kennel the day before the show. Tempest won, being better in body, but Drake has much the better head. Revelation had no competition in her class. In the under 55 pounds dogs, Ossining scored over King Don. In corresponding bitch class, Lady Gay Spanker received the blue, while her companion, Miss Rumor, secured second, third going to Frivolity, a nicer bodied bitch, but not quite up to Lady Gay or Miss Rumor in head.

ENGLISH SETTERS—This was, perhaps, the hottest class in the show, a grand lot of dogs facing the judge. Edgemark, the Kingston, Hamilton, and Toronto winner had to lower his colors to Kent II, and rightly so. Kent II is a grand all-round dog and is what modern fanciers call a typical Setter, he is better in head, body and legs than Edgemark, his coat is right. Edgemark is a grand dog also, he carries his tail altogether too gay, and is too thick in skull. Ightfield Rhuilas third, like Kent Rex, VHC, is a trifle out in front, Kent Rex is a very fine young dog, sired by the first prize winner Kent II. He looked much better than at Kingston, and is improving fast, he is well worth watching. The bitch class like the dog, was a grand one and worth travelling a long way to see, no less than nine of the dozen entries appearing in the ring. Nia again beating Forest Heather, Victress Llewellyn, getting 3rd, while Liberty II, Nora III, and Albert's

Nellie had to be content with three letters.

IRISH SETTERS—In open dogs, Seminoe, Glen Jarvis, and Shot won in the order named, and were placed right, all are well known, in the bitch class, Elfreda won the blue, she is a nice bitch with an excellent head, well shaped skull, and good expression, eyes a shade too light, and is rather light in body, coat not in the best of condition, but she will always get a place in the very best of company, and deservedly so. The rest of the class were above the average.

GORDON SETTERS—In challenge dogs Ivanhoe again defeated Leo B. In corresponding bitches Duchess of Waverly took the ribbon from Hilda who was not in very good coat or condition. In open dogs, Kent received first and Jim Dandy second. I failed to see that either was a "Jim Dandy," and in my opinion should have been "pegged" lower. Two bitches appeared in open class, Lady Waverly easily winning over Clip, who is poor all over.

COLLIES—In challenge dog class, Roslyn Dandy had a walk over, as did Metchley Surprise in the bitch class. Both are well known. In the open class for dogs, Drury won, he is rather a nice appearing dog and was rightly placed first. Moss second, is too thick in skull, has good coat and markings. Metchley Wonder II third, is a fairly good dog, slightly cheeky, and is rather slab-sided, good in texture of coat and in markings. Reality is short in muzzle, skull heavy and badly moulded, good coat. The remainder were just fairly good Collies, with no characteristics to recommend them. In open bitches, Bernice won, she is a good bitch of some quality; taking the class as a whole it was anything but first class. It seems strange that Collie breeders do not pay more attention to the coat of their dogs, as there was not one

Collie in the show in really good coat.

FIELD SPANIELS—open dogs, 1st prize withheld, 2nd going to Brantford Mohawk, a dog with little depth of chest, but I was unable to see him properly as his nasty cross disposition prevented him being handled on his bench. The 3rd dog Hindos did not deserve more than H C, if that, is poor in coat, crooked in front, and off in most points. In open bitches, Woodland Sallie a nice bitch, had a walk over.

CLUMBER SPANIELS—In open dogs Darby got the blue ribbon, head better than average, light eyes and bone, capital body and coat. Shell, second, head fair, too high on legs and rather light in bone. In open bitches, Lucy II, very properly won over Vic, who is not nearly first class.

COCKER SPANIELS—The challenge dogs brought out four. First going to Red Jacket, faulty in head, Oban should have had the place, while poor old Brant and Black Duke had to be contented with three letters, while Rabbi got the Reserve. In corresponding bitch class Bessie W had no opposition. In open black dogs first went to Dufferin, a dog with an excellent head, and a fine body, he was well ahead of anything in his class. Donovan second, is a new one and a good one; nice in head and body, coat good, feather rather scant, does not stand very well in front. Major third, is not quite right in head, and does not stand well in front. In open bitch class, I Say won, she is well known. Woodstock Cora second, and Brantford Flirt third, all have been described before. The other than black brought Redman, wide in skull and bad in feet, to first place, with Brownie second. Rufus, a much handsomer dog than either was placed third. Jessie C got the blue in open bitches, while Red Riding Hood stood second, the other two were not in it.

IRISH WATER SPANIELS—Had two dogs and a bitch. Handy Andy received first in dogs, 2nd withheld. In bitches an excellent specimen, Marguerite, received first.

BEAGLES—Roy K, well known, got first, Guy second. In bitch class, Vanity received first, Stella second, Fanny K third. I did not look on this class as first-rate, nothing in it to cause a sensation.

The **DASCHUNDS** were a fairly good lot. Windrush Rioter first. I don't like his action, but he is a very good dog, of correct type. The rest were not world beaters. Jill, Lina L and Lina were placed as written.

BULL DOGS—Bo'swain properly downed his competitors, Billee and Master Dick. Bloater Girl in bitches defeated Gladys.

BULL TERRIERS—Were a strong class and were properly placed.

FOX TERRIERS—Blemton Volunteer, well known, had it alone in challenge class. In open dogs, competition was keen, the Woodale Kennels carrying off the honors with Starden's Jack and Dobbin, while Painter got third. All the dogs in this class have been described in reports of previous shows. In open bitches the Woodale Kennels also carried everything by storm. Ebor Nettle received 1st, Woodale Radiant second; as a whole the class was far above the average. The wire-haired division was represented by Green Gale Patch, Jim II, and Barton Sting, who were as written. The bitch class had but one entry, Rasper's Rosanne, and she got a blue ribbon.

IRISH TERRIERS—Jack Briggs received first, he is a remarkably good all round dog and deserved first. The other two were fair specimens. Exile, a fine bitch won in her class.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS—were a very strong class and many very fine dogs were shown, the winners are well known, and space will not permit us

particularising. The bitch class was every bit as good as the dog class, not a bad one appearing.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS—Had two in the challenge class, Ch. Toon's Royal and Venus, both well known. In open dogs and bitches some really grand specimens were shown, the winners deserving the honors.

DANDY DINMONT'S brought King O' the Heather to the front, with Valentine a close second, Jack Pot bringing up the rear. August was worthy of first in her class, and Miss Dandy is not a bad one.

SCOTCH TERRIERS—Had but one entry, Kilston well known.

SKY TERRIERS—Sir Stafford was given a diploma. Gleniffer and Laddie being placed first and second.

PUGS—Bob Ivy, well known, received first in challenge class dogs, and Bessie in bitches. In open dogs Curtis again won, Fritz Emmett getting second, with Kash Jr third, all well known. In bitches Sateen, Cribbage and Judy II were placed as written.

The **TOY CLASSES** were represented by aristocrats of upper tondom, and received every attention from the judges, Messrs. Jno. Davidson and Joe Lewis.

WINKS—Dog, whelped Nov. 5, 1887. By Fred out of Princess Ida. Color fawn, height 12¼ inches, weight 7 lbs. Winks is a very fine specimen; head long and clear cut; elegant neck; soft, languishing eye; chest deep; legs straight; tail thin, tapering, and gently curved. He is the sire of some very symmetrical puppies and has never been exhibited but once, when he took first prize at Youngston, Ohio, in 1890.

IDIOM—Bitch, whelped Nov. 5, 1887. (A litter sister to Winks). Color fawn, height 13½ inches, weight 10 lbs. Idiom is a perfect picture. One could



not imagine a more perfect miniature Greyhound. She is dainty, artistic, and graceful. While she is a trifle above the average in size, her puppies are always small, being the dam of Roma, Little Boy Blue, Sister Sue, Crispi, Bess and others which are all small and typical specimens. AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB MEETING.

At the quarterly meeting held on Sept. 24 the Secretary Mr. Voedenburgh in his report said:

At the annual meeting of this club, held Feb. 21, 1889, the following resolution was adopted: "That the Canadian Kennel Club, and all awards under its rules, its disqualifications and suspensions, shall be recognized by the American Kennel Club." The purpose

of this action was to bring about a closer connection with the bench show clubs and exhibitors across the border and thus give substantial aid and assistance to the Canadian Kennel Club, then about organizing, and to practically bring together all factions and Kennel interests in the United States and Canada. We are now completing the third year of this agreement, and it would appear that the American Kennel Club receives very little return for the benefits it confers. It is true that we exchange a recognition of each other's registrations, yet we give the Canadian clubs the same benefits and advantages as are given to our own members, who have to pay annual dues therefor. The Canadian clubs do not contribute one dollar toward the support of this club, and our Canadian list of associate members and subscribers to the *Gazette* combined, only reaches the total of nine individuals. I therefore report the practical result of this contract, deeming it my duty to keep you informed upon all matters pertaining to the interests of the American Kennel Club, and now leave the matter in your hands for consideration, and for such action as you deem desirable.

After discussion the matter was left over till next meeting.

RELATIONS OF THE AMERICAN AND THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUBS.

What we quoted in our last issue from a report of the recent meeting of the A.K.C. would make it appear that the functions and constitution of the C.K.C. are not well understood. The expression "Canadian clubs" is used as though they corresponded to the clubs that are a part of the Am. Ken. Club. Such is not the case. The Canadian Kennel Club is made up wholly of members and not at all of delegates. Shows in Canada are usually held under C. K. C. rules but no club as a club pays dues to the C.K.C. except the Bench show fee of \$10. Financially the A. K. C. gets advantage the C. K. C. does not, for while many Canadian dogs are registered with the A. K. C. few if any American dogs are registered with the C.K.C. A large part of the prize money offered on the Canadian circuit is carried away by Americans who reap if anything more advantage from the Canadian shows than the Canadian breeders themselves; and to this they are welcome as they win it. There is only one basis on which the A. K. C. and the C. K. C. can reciprocate good offices, that is a basis of equality. The

C. K. C. does not exact any toll from the A. K. C. nor will it be inclined to pay any. Each must have its own independent existence and extend to the other all the courtesies in its power. It is in the interest of all concerned that it should be so.

CINCINNATI BENCH SHOW.

The following Canadian dogs were shown here Oct. 13th to 16th. Major Guillott's St. Bernard Othello; Seaton Kennels Deerhound, Ontario; H. H. McCrae's Field Spaniel Sir Walter Scott, 1st in his class. Mr. Geo. Bell made a number of entries including the Field Spaniels, Newton Abbott Farmer and What Not, the Cockers King of Obos, I Say, Woodland Pete, Lady Obo, Busy, Woodland Dick, Woodland Duck and Bell's Girl. We don't know the particulars of the awards but he won in all 10 firsts and 3 seconds. Silver cups were given for 1sts and medals for 2nds. Mr. F. C. Wheeler, formerly of London, judged all classes.

OTTAWA BENCH SHOW.

We are pleased to have an official denial to the report in a recent issue of *Forest and Stream* that this show had been a failure. We have it on good authority that far from this being the case it is altogether likely that a show will be held next season and on an enlarged scale. The Ottawa Committee

would be pleased to know who was *Forest and Stream's* informant, he was evidently no friend to the Club or to dogs in Canada.

MR. C. A. STONE,

owner of the Forest Kennels of this city, has bred his English Setter bitch Forest Gladys, to the Mount Washington Kennels, Pittsburgh, late imported dog, Viscount. This is a grand cross, and should prove a good nick, as Mr. Stone has had enough experience to be able to judge and select a good dog when he sees it. Gladys is a good young bitch, blue belton in color, trifle small in size, grand body, legs and feet, her worst fault being rather short in muzzle, which makes her head appear broad and a trifle coarse. She is by Locksley—Forest Queen, and has two crosses of the blood of Druid. Viscount is by Moss—Nora III, and was selected and purchased by G. L. Boggs, the present owner, while in England last July, from the kennels of R. W. Purcell Llewellyn, who bred and pronounced him one of the best dogs he ever sold in America. He is only two years old and is black, white and tan in color, has a grand body, legs and feet with a beautiful long head which is very seldom seen on English Setters in this country. He is thoroughly broken and will run in the coming field trials this fall. His breeding is the finest that can be produced in England having two crosses of that celebrated field trial winner Count Windem his grandsires being Count Windem and Dashing Bondhu and his grand-dams Novel and Nora II. Count Windem is considered the finest English Setter in England being the sire of the grand field trial winner Count Noble. Vero Shaw in his work on the dog, makes particular mention of Count Windem and Countess Bear. We wish Mr. Stone luck in this

venture which will no doubt be a great acquisition to the already grand stock of English Setters in this country.

MR. J. F. KIRK, TORONTO,

has sold the Field Spaniel bitch Bridford Ruby to Mr. Rowland P. Keasby who recently lost the best of his bitches.

A CORRESPONDENT

who does not wish his identity revealed writes as follows:—"I see that at the general meeting of the C.K.C. it was resolved on the motion of Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Mercer, 'That no show held under the rules of the C.K.C. shall last more than four days inclusive of the opening and closing days of the show.' Now surely this is *ultra viris* as the C. K. C. has no jurisdiction in the matter. Personally, I think three days long enough, but I fear this rule would kill the Toronto show. From the Exhibition people's standpoint there is this much to be said, they are obliged to house and keep the dogs for seven days and therefore it is not a very great hardship for them to admit the public five out of the seven. If this rule stands the Exhibition people will probably stop the show or else cut down the prizes and refuse to take the dogs in until the opening day or to keep them on from after the close."

There is a good deal of truth in our correspondent's remarks. We are, as he is, quite in favor of a three, or at most, four days show, but it must be remembered that the great majority of the dogs go the whole circuit, in fact many were this year nearly six weeks away from home, certainly over five weeks. These matters as a rule work their own cure.

OTTAWA BENCH SHOW.

(Special Report).

THE third annual bench show of dogs, held in connection with the Central Canada Exhibition at Ottawa, Sept. 28th to Oct. 1st, was in marked advance on any previous effort. The entries numbered 260, and the quality in many classes was superior. The management was taxed for room, notwithstanding the increased accommodation afforded by the recent erection of an addition to the main building, and a few small dogs had to be benched above others. This plan is not commendable, but could not be avoided. What Ottawa requires is a greater liberality on the part of the Association, a larger building, and a more extended classification. We hope to see all of these next year. The dogs were judged in a large enclosure adjoining the building. This answers very well if the weather be fair—which it was.

Mr. W. B. Hill judged Clumber Spaniels; Mr. W. B. Palmer the Irish Water, Field and Cocker Spaniels and Mr. John Davidson all other classes. The judging was finished early on the first day. The catalogue was a poor affair, and furnished a fitting illustration of the need of such action as was recently taken by the Canadian Kennel Club. Many entries were omitted, also the names of breeders, etc. We are informed, however, that the Committee is not wholly responsible for this failure, as its preparation was given over to what was presumed to be a competent compiler. The management will do well in future to keep a matter of such vital consequence to the well being of the show, in its own hands.

Mr. Alfred Geddes superintended

and kept everything in good shape, in fact it was generally conceded by the "circuit riders" that as a clean, well managed show, Ottawa occupied no second place. Now to the dogs:

MASTIFFS.—But one entry—Eanfrid—was given first. He has not improved on his Kingston form.

ST. BERNARD dogs had two entries one of which was absent. Othello, who was so unfortunate in being wrongly entered at Toronto—where he would undoubtedly have been placed—had the show to himself and took everything offered. He is a large dog with a good deep muzzle, fairly small ears, and has immense bone. In bitches, the smooth coated Nun Nicer, the Montreal winner was again to the front, followed by Mineva, faulty in head, with Trump, a local puppy, third.

NEWFOUNDLANDS.—In the open class for dogs, Champ. Leo again scored. We thought the open class was for dogs that had not qualified for the challenge class. Perhaps we are mistaken in this. Czar, second is light in eye and bad in coat.

GREYHOUNDS.—The challenge class found Gem of the Season again a winner, with Scavenger, reserve. Both are well known. In the open class for dogs, Justinian, first, coarse in head and shoulders, shown too fat. Pious Pembroke, similar in type, second. Elcho third, Nibs and Milo, reserve and V.H.C. respectively—a step higher than at Montreal. In bitches, first went to Jetsam, a new face, nice head, good deep chest, straight front but a trifle wide. Second Sight, second, while Bestwood Daisy, the Toronto winner, was placed third. Lady of Gainsboro, first at Hamilton, good in head and loin, was here given reserve. The others were only ordinary.

DEERHOUNDS.—had one class—four entries—all local. Robbin, first is a fairly typical, strong dog. Hylda, second, is faulty in head and out at

elbows. Brian, V.H.C. is short in head and light in bone.

FOXHOUNDS.—were a motley collection. King, first, is good in head, body well ribbed up, good hound coat. Genius, the Toronto winner, a good second. Vexation was the best of the bitches. Countess faulty in head, was second; the others were unnoticed.

BEAGLES.—Challenge had one entry Champ. Racer Jr. In the open dog's class Roy K. the Montreal winner, had to give away to O'Shea's Courier. Donovan, third, loses in head. Bitches had six entries. Stella, a typical little hound won first, Emeline, second, is light in bone and not quite straight in front. Fanny K., third. She falls back of the shoulders and is out at elbows.

GREAT DANES.—Tonks, an unfinished puppy—a little coarse now—won first, followed by the well known Minerva's Fawn. Juno, third, falls far short of the winners in size and quality.

POINTERS.—In the challenge dogs, Pommery Sec. beat Ossining. Both have been described. Four challenge bitches were entered, the well known Fan N. won, with Belle Randolph out of condition, reserve. There were but two dogs, Tempest and King Bow's Bow in the open class, winning in the order named. In bitches, Frivolity, not first-rate in head, but good in body was alone and won.

ENGLISH SETTERS.—This was a good class and contained the cream of the circuit winners. Edgemark had a walk-over in the challenge class. In the open class for dogs, the typical Kent II was an easy winner. Viscount, second, not in condition. Tony Gladstone, third, Kent's Rex, reserve. In the open class for bitches the plain headed Nia was again the winner. Victress Llewellyn, second, Albert's Nellie, third, loses in size. These are all well known, and need not be described.

IRISH SETTERS.—No entries in the challenge class. Four dogs were shown in the open class, first going to Seminole. Glen Jarvis, second, is a bit coarse. Eleo, third, loses in head. Elfrida proved the winner in the open class for bitches, defeating Irene, the winner at Toronto, who was placed next. Josie D. first at Kingston, here had to be content with third.

GORDON SETTERS.—In the challenge class for dogs Ivanhoe won over his kennel mate Leo B., as usual, while the Duchess of Waverley had a walk over in the class for bitches. In open dogs Hector beat Royal Nibs, coarse in head. In bitches Lady Waverley was alone, and won.

IRISH WATER SPANIELS.—Had five entries—such as they were. Countess Bendigo an old winner without topnot was first and Marguerite, poor in coat, second. The less said about the others the better.

CLUMBER SPANIELS.—Four entries in the challenge class for dogs—one only turned up—Johnny Jr. price \$5000. Boss III was on hand for *specials only*. In challenge bitches Lady Bromine was alone. Eczema still claims her for its own. In the open class for dogs, first went to Pop. He has a deep squarely cut muzzle, long body, flat coat, short strong legs, fairly straight in front, is probably the best Clumber dog in Canada to-day. Rake, second, is leggy, with well feathered ears and a gait not unlike that of a pacer. La Grippe, third, is faulty in head and expression, gooseberry eyes, muzzle not cut off squarely, coat soft and thin. Shell, V.H.C., heavy muzzle, good clumber expression, skull too round, body not well ribbed back, coat good, front legs straight and heavy, but a bit too long. Darby the Kingston winner was absent. In bitches, first went to Lady Nancy, age and pedigree unknown. The absence of any front teeth does not improve the

old lady's muzzle—which is too fine, skull very good, eyes light, liver markings on head, coat soft, shown short of feather, throaty, leggy. Lucy II, second, faulty in head, ears feathered, spot on one eye, good body and coat, legs short and well feathered. Vic, third, has little Clumber expression and is leggy. Lady Maude, price \$5000, is curly coated and snipy, and makes up in length of leg for any deficiency in size of bone. Such specimens as this make one think American bred Clumbers a failure.

FIELD SPANIELS.—The challenge class had but two entries, Sampson and Bridford Gladys placed in the order named. This should have been the reverse. The open class for dogs found Brantford Mohawk alone. He was given the blue. In bitches Woodland Sallie had a walk over—nice head, too short in body, flat coat, light in bone. Both are too near Cocker type.

COCKERS.—In challenge dogs Red Jacket was again the winner while Black Duke and Rabbi were pronounced equal with Oban reserve, and Brant V.H.C. all these were noticed in our Toronto report. Challenge bitches had but one entry Bessie W. In the open class for black dogs Black Dufferin qualified for the challenge class. Bob Obo, second well known. Donovan, a good son of Obo jr. third. He has a nice head, eyes a shade light, good body, coat and bone, a trifle throaty for a youngster, not in show condition or might have been placed higher. Tim Obo, reserve, skull too heavy, short in ears, dark eyes, good body and bone, shown in good condition. Trumps, V.H.C. too strong in head. Rex Obo, H.C., bad head, muzzle shallow, ear thick in leather, absence of stop, coat open but flat, not straight in front—will probably graduate into the next class. Major C. might have had another letter. The open class for bitches was a strong one. I Say, was again placed

first. Rideau Flossie, second, good in head, neck, shoulders, body, legs and feet. Cleo II, third and Brantford Flirt, V.H.C., were described in our Toronto report. Dot Smirle, reserve, beautiful skull and muzzle, ears set low, dark eye, nice straight bone, shown in capital condition, should have been an easy third. Floss Obo, H.C. is worth another letter. Corine was described in our Kingston report. Rideau Romo, C., a nice puppy, fair in head and straight in front. Busy and Woodland Susie were absent. The latter arrived, as did others from the same kennel, too late for the judging. The open class for dogs other than black, had seven entries. Othello, first, a nicely marked black and white with rather long ears, nice expression, flat coat, carries his stern high, lacks in substance. Rufus, second, is known as a workman. Bounce, third, is heavy in head and a bit up on legs—he too looks like a worker. Brush, reserve, a black and tan, too long in muzzle and legs, good coat. In other than black bitches, Red Ridinghood was first. She is well known. Rideau Robina, second, a black and tan puppy with good head, bone and coat. Daylight, C., a fawn puppy and a bad one at that. In novice dogs, Donovan captured first, Othello, second. Tip Obo, a heavy headed black, third, and Trumps, reserve. Major was given two letters. Pataud, a weedy black and white, with long ears, given a C. Novice bitches were headed by Rideau Romola, too domy, in skull, muzzle undershot, nice body and coat—toyish. Floss Obo, second, Rideau Robina and Corine, equal third—all placed in other classes.

COLLIES were not numerous but the quality much better than last year. Roslyn Dandy, the Toronto winner, first in the challenge class. Drury occupied similar position in open class. He is wide in skull and light in eye. Ros-

lyn Conway, second, is not good in coat. Rowdy, 3rd, does not carry his ears well. In bitches, first went to Mayflower, who is lacking in substance. Cora II, second, is quite the opposite type.

BULLDOGS.—Bo'swain, well known, first. He was greatly admired for his beauty of countenance. Nettle and Thunder, second and third respectively. These were simply nowhere with the winner.

BULL TERRIERS.—Duke of Wellington arrived too late for the judging, consequently King of Hearts won easily over the short-headed Mister Dick, third going to Rough, pedigree unknown. Bitches had two entries, both absent.

FOX TERRIERS.—The winners are old faces. Ebor Nettle, first, beats Blemton Trump nicely who in turn was placed over Blemton Volunteer. Stardens Jack, who is now qualified for the challenge class, won first in the open class for dogs, second going to Dobbin, as at Montreal. The latter excels in head and coat. Painter, third, does not carry his ears close. Diver III, reserve, is a bit wide in skull and soft in coat. Woodale Rival V. H.C. is faulty in head and long cast. In the open class for bitches Rowton Safety, good in head and expression, but off in carriage of ears won first, with Woodale Radiant, short in head a good second. Venus, third, is large in ears and too wide in front. In the novice class Woodale Rival was placed over the light and leggy wire haired Barton Sting. Arden Belle, third, is weak in head and a bit up on legs.

IRISH TERRIERS.—Exile, first, is a nice type, good long head, skull not quite right, nice coat and front. Jack Briggs, second, is too cheeky, and somewhat leggy. Nailor, third, has bad feet. Kathleen, V.H.C. nice front but faulty in body.

SKYE TERRIERS.—Only Sir Stafford in the challenge class. He has oft been

described. In the open class Bruce won and Moses, faulty in head was given second.

BEDLINGTON TERRIERS.—Zulo, fair in head and coat, was the only entry.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS.—In the challenge class, the genuine Meersbrooke Maiden and the well-known Broomfield Sultan were both given firsts. Those who were looking on liked the Maiden best. Prince Regent was absent. In bitches, Matchless was again the winner. Grace, coarse in head, second, and English Lady, an old face, third.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS had three classes for two entries. In the challenge class Venus was alone and won. Flossie occupied same position in the open class for bitches.

TOY SPANIELS.—A challenge class was made for Calumet Alice, short-face, good skull and nice length of ear. In the open class for dogs, Royal Duke won first. He is light in tan and a trifle heavy. Second and third went to Mr. Bradford's Spot and Prince, both nice specimens and winners at Montreal. In bitches, Fannie, short in face, first; second and third going to the nice little Spaniels Topsy and Ruby.

PUGS.—In challenge class Cnamp. Bob Ivy was again to the front, with Bessie, reserve. In open dogs, Curtis won, followed by Prince Emmet and Kash Jr. in the order named. These are all old timers, as are the winning bitches Satin, Cribbage and Princess Nellie.

SPITZ.—Two very good ones were shown. Fred and Beauty. Both begin to show age. The miscellaneous class had ten entries, so was divided. This let in the Dacshunds, and Fieldman K. and Gill were given equal first. The Bloodhound Jack Shepherd, the Scottish Terrier, Kilston, the Dandie Dinmont, Fan, and the Toy, Punch were given equal firsts in the original class. All are well known.

THE TORONTO SHOW

IT is not the writer's intention to report on the general management of the show which has been already well done, but simply on the judging especially of some of the more important classes, particularly with a view of showing in how far progress has been made since last year.

There were two rings down stairs which were far too small for the breeds of dogs judged there. If both had been thrown into one the resulting space would have been small enough. When it comes to judging dogs used in the field in any way, in such a small area, the most experienced and careful judge cannot but overlook much that he should know before he can be said to have formed a fair estimate of any dog. Even when the body is of good shape and the limbs well set, one dog may move better than another and thus be a more valuable animal for the work he is to do.

It was absolutely impossible to trot a dog in such rings, not to speak of a gallop. If mistakes were not made it was a sort of accident.

MASTIFFS—The presence of the dogs of the Flour City Kennels exalted the quality considerably over that of last year, and gave breeders and exhibitors a better chance to see what the Mastiff of to-day should be. Ilford Chancellor, in fairly good condition, was alone in the challenge class for dogs. In the corresponding class for bitches, Caution's Own Daughter was placed below Lady Coleus, the latter winning with ease now. It seems to me that C.O.D. has been a good deal overestimated by some of the enthusiastic ones. In the open dog class, Elksen easily won over Mode, though he is very throaty. He is, however, very much of a Mastiff. Mode 2nd is a far better dog or looks it than last year. After Mode the others were poor. Minting Minor was absent as also Grimsby Caution. In the open bitch class there was no really high-class specimen. Miss Caution is fairly good in type, but is small. Bess was placed 3rd here and was better treated than at Kingston. With a more massive head this specimen would be a fairly good Mastiff. Greenwood Juno V H C, has excellent dark markings. Mina Minting 2nd has a good many faults. In puppies, the dog Elksen won easily. There was nothing good in the puppy bitch class.

ROUGH-COATED ST. BERNARDS did not show as much improvement as could be desired. Many of the competitors of a year ago again appeared, naturally somewhat better in head, and stouter in body, but they are most of them not of the right type as was pointed out last year. They lack massiveness in both head and body. They are too tall for the amount of material in them; and the bitches should be bred to the opposite type of dogs if we are to see good young ones in the near future in Canada. Kingston Regent points the way to all the

others though he is not all he might be in expression, and especially in formation back of the ribs. Miss Whitney on the whole did her work without haste and placed the awards so as to meet the approval of the exhibitors. We would however like to see this accomplished lady and in fact most other judges go about their task with a little more system. It would prove more interesting and instructive to the onlookers and more satisfactory to the exhibitors in all probability. But from the limited space at Toronto this was hardly possible. It was gratifying to see the tape measure used by the judge. Monk and Monarch are not bad dogs but fail in the directions indicated above. Among the bitches the two first-prize winners were noticed in the Kingston report. Glenisla, a newcomer (?) was 3rd, and though faulty in some details she comes nearer to the true type on the whole than many others. In puppies, a very big one, Sir John, won 1st. He has a massive, well shaped head, but is affected with chorea of the face. How much should a dog be put back for chorea? His black markings shock those who are wedded to the orthodox orange. Sir John, though now well grown may be greatly improved by judicious management. He also won first in the novice class. In the smooth division there were three good ones, Ch Hector, Othello, and Lady Swiss. This bitch is of the right sort with a beautiful and true St. Bernard expression.

In **BLOODHOUNDS** the typical Jack Sheppard won well, the 2nd prize winner being far behind.

There were no dogs worthy of being called good **NEWFOUNDLANDS**—more is the pity.

GREAT DANES made as odd a collection as could well be got together in the dogs of the Wolverine and one other kennel be excepted. Some of

the specimens might have been taken for a part of some menagerie so far were they from any tolerable approach to respectable canine form. There were three capital specimens and only three: Emperor, Favor and Minerva's Fawn. Emperor was first as he scores in size, head, front and general symmetry. He is, however, rather defective in loin and does not move with the ease and elasticity of a perfect dog. Favor is a good specimen that might move better and show more quality, though far ahead of Brutus, that is cheeky and lacking in spring of ribs, etc. In bitches, Minerva's Fawn 1st, met a judge here that was capable of really appreciating her. Ultima in very bad condition and is not yet matured. Most of the rest, especially those after the winners were beyond description bad.

There was only one DEERHOUND present, a fair specimen.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUNDS were not numerous, but of good quality.

GREYHOUNDS were rather strong in numbers, and so far as the winners go good in quality, but apart from them the class was poor. Some dozen Canadian dogs, including the best in the country were not shown. This was no doubt, owing to the judge originally appointed having been succeeded by another, a step on the part of the management that will not bear investigation it is feared. The smallness of the ring interfered with moving the dogs about. It is a satisfaction to note an improvement in the judging of last year both as to results and method. Dogs were more carefully examined and compared; however, there is great room for more complete and systematic work. In the challenge class, Gem of the Season, Champ. Balkis, and Champ. Highland Chief competed, or rather Balkis was entered not for competition, and just as well for he could not have won with

Gem present. The latter is the best Greyhound shown in eastern America, at all events for some time. In the bitch class Cassandra was placed over Spinaway. The four winners in the open dog class were all good ones. Pious Pembroke, wrong in head and rather coarse, though strong, properly gave way to Ornatus, a black dog with a good skull, long though rather light muzzle, and good general make up. He is well muscled. Old Stone 3rd, is strongly and symmetrically built, but has not enough quality. Highland Donald reserve, is not sprung enough in ribs, nor is his general balance of parts as good as that of the dogs placed over him. Ranger was V H C. In the bitch class, the recent importations, Lady of Gainsboro and Bestwood Daisy were 1st and 2nd; they are scarcely equal to the imported dogs of the same owner. Outside of the winners the class was poor. In the puppy class there were one or two specimens good enough to keep at home from the risks of a dog show.

POINTERS—No class in the whole show was such an advance on last year as Pointers. Mr. Davey went to the right quarter to get show Pointers and he got them, while the individual exhibits of others were generally high class; indeed throughout the entire circuit Pointers have been 100 per cent in advance of last year, very few poor ones being shown. As the writer noticed many of the dogs in his Kingston report the new ones only will be referred to now. In the heavy weight challenge bitch class Devon Nell being absent Belle Randolph won. In heavy dogs Tempest beat another good one Westminster Drake. The latter is the most of a Pointer, the former the best built dog. Revelation was alone in the heavy bitch class till Ightfield Madge was transferred and she is almost alone in her perfection of form. She does not show as much Pointer character as

could be desired. Pommery Sec well known won in the challenge heavy dog class. Fan N. won in the challenge light weight bitch division. Ossining in light weight dogs was placed over Axtel's King Don correctly enough, though the latter might have been 2nd, Shot is too wide in skull, and is coarse generally. The light weight open bitch class was the best class of Pointers yet seen in Canada by far; in fact there was not a poor one in the lot. Lady Gay Spanker was 1st easily and is an admirable combination of strength, balance, quality and character. Miss Rumor and Phantom are good ones that simply met a better in the winner of 1st. Lady Graphic not perfect but full of character and quality was V.H.C. reserve, with Dodo not in good condition V.H.C. The Kennel prize was well won by the New Brighton Kennels.

ENGLISH SETTERS—Though the challenge classes did not fill and the field trial winners of last year were absent, this was somewhat compensated for by the presence of the new importations of the Mt. Washington Kennels and of the New Brighton Kennels. These dogs are of good size, excellent legs and feet, with the proper type of head, and should be an acquisition to a breed already very strong in America. Edgemark was 1st here, and like several other of the dogs of these classes is described in the Kingston report. Kent II was absent. Ightfield Rhuilas 2nd is a beautiful dog, a little on the small side as yet. He shows much quality and character. Viscount 3rd was out of condition. Benzine was 4th, and Tony Gladstone reserve. In the bitch class, the imported Nia was 1st, a soundly made bitch of good size. Forest Heather, fairly good all round was 2nd. Canadian Lillie, when in good condition will press any bitch in the class close. She was reserve. Albert's Nellie 3rd

is a bitch of quality, but has weak spots. Victress Llewellyn was 4th, though 1st at Hamilton. Nothing very good turned up in the novice or puppy classes, not present in the open ones. The Mt. Washington Kennels won the kennel prize.

IRISH SETTERS.—To those looking for advances and with a high ideal of what an Irish Setter should be these classes were a sad disappointment. They are on the whole not equal to last year, and it is scarcely too much to say that not one typical specimen was shown. Seminole, that has not been defeated on the circuit, did not meet a dog good in body (as he is) and at the same time with the proper kind of head, for fine specimen as he is, he is not Irish in skull or near it. Glen Jarvis, though coarse in head is more typical in skull, etc., but his defects in body, etc. are many as noticed in the Kingston report. There is no satisfaction in dwelling on a poor lot. It is to be hoped that the breeders of Irish will seek typical stud dogs and drown the puppies that are only Irish in color. The bitches were an equally poor lot. Irene is not bad in body and limbs but is not Irish in head; the Duchess of Avondale 2nd, is a lumbering specimen, with too much feather. Goldsmith Maid 3rd, is weak in head and light in frame. Many of the dogs and bitches were not bad in color. It is in head and legs improvement must be especially sought.

GORDON SETTERS.—Dr. Dixon's team is always worth seeing; and it was a pleasure to notice the President of the C. K. C. putting a kennel to the fore, though some of the dogs are rather young yet. All Dr. Dixon's dogs were described in the Kingston report. Leo B. has fallen off in condition since then and was placed second to Ivanhoe. Ivanhoe has the best head but Leo beats him in legs and body. The Duchess properly beat Becky Sharp on this occasion at

all events. In open dogs, Clyde won 1st a coarse specimen. Pendennis is not yet enough spread in ribs but has good limbs. Dorothea 1st in the open bitch class is lacking in symmetry. Annie Gordon 2nd is not yet made up; in fact, the class was recruited from puppies to a large extent, so that the puppy classes were a repetition of the open ones. Facts like these rightly considered make it clear that the actual Toronto entry was of about the same dimensions as that of Montreal with very great gain to the show that had no puppies on the benches, whether in "open," "novice" or "puppy" classes. Dr. Dixon's team easily won the kennel prize.

Mr. Davidson's judging was carefully, systematically and with but very few exceptions, correctly done, though he, like the other judges, was hampered for lack of room.—*Mount Royal.*

COLLIES.—Roslyn Dandy and Metchley Surprise were alone in the challenge classes, both only in fair coat. Dowry 1st in open dogs is a bit coarse and short in face but has an excellent coat. Moonstone a strong dog with good bone was 2nd; Sir Walter Scott 3rd is poor in coat; Metchley Wonder II very typical, we liked best of lot. No flyers in the other entries. In bitches Nancy a bit soft in coat and faulty in muzzle was 1st; Dot a little typical one 2nd; Belle 3rd is excellent in front with a moderate coat. The rest of the class were poor. Novice and puppy classes moderate, Fury 1st in novice bitches best of lot, typical; Heather Belle is light in body; Bessy, nice coat, poor head. Sir Walter Scott took 1st in novice; Eglinton a fair 2nd.

BULL DOGS.—But two entries Bo'swain and Bloater Girl both awarded 1st.

BULL TERRIERS.—A good lot, large classes. Dufferin and Starlight well-known had the challenge classes to themselves. Top Sparkle was 1st in

open dogs, rather out of coat with Duke of Wellington a promising puppy not quite straight in front 2nd.; Ben Battle 3rd is short in face and light in coat. The other entries were all good and all adorned. Grove Dutchess again won in bitches; Edgwood Fancy 2nd and Queen of the Dale 3rd. Duke of Wellington beat Belle of Edgewood in the puppy class.

POODLES.—A sad falling off from last year, but one card given, a 2nd. to Friday.

BEAGLES.—Royal Krueger and Una won in the challenge classes. Tricotin and Roy K 1st and 2nd in open dogs are a nice stamp; Roscoe looks like a worker; a bit coarse. Elf, good in body and front, won in bitches; Ruby, a bit off in head and front, 2nd; Periwinkle 3rd, might have done better, she was not looking her best, but has a nice coat and head. In the puppy class, Guy, with moderate feet and coat had to give way to King Krueger too large.

FOX TERRIERS.—No entries in challenge classes. Open dogs, a nice class, 1st Dobbin, a new one, full of Terrier character, good bone and coat, moderate head; Blempton Trump, well-known, 2nd; Starden's Jack and Dion Third, 3rd and Res; Painter and Endcliffe Spice both V H C. Ebor Nettle won again in the bitch class, she beats Rowton Safety 2nd, in head and body; Venus and Woodale Radiant 3rd and 4th; Woodale Refusal has a fair head and coat, but poor ears. Puppy dogs a poor lot, no prizes given. Rowton Safety, Woodale Radiant and Arden Belle were placed as named in the corresponding bitch class. In wire-haired dogs, no 1st was given, we thought Adswood Jun III was good enough for it; 2nd and 3rd went to Barton Sting and Stanley, both a fair type. No prizes given in bitches. In novice dogs, Nobody's Child won, he is good in front and head, but poor in

body. In the bitch class the winners were easily ahead.

IRISH TERRIERS—Jack Briggs beats Nailer in body, coat and legs. Evictor short of coat, 3rd; Exile beats Kathleen in coat and head.

The remaining classes were filled with well-known dogs often described. It is unnecessary to go over them again as you have the awards.

REX.

SPANIELS.

(Reported by a Specialist.)

Spaniels were a show in themselves. Nearly all the noted winners in America, as well as many who are as yet to fame unknown, were on hand. Mr. Wilmerding proved himself a careful judge, and we heard only expressions of satisfaction with the awards.

CLUMBERS—In the challenge class for dogs, Boss III won, and Lady Bromine in the corresponding class for bitches. Both are well known and both were shown in wretched condition. We cannot compliment the exhibitor who enters, or the management that allows diseased specimens to compete for prizes.

Only two dogs in the open class. Johnny Jr., wrong in head, fair in body, with bad front legs, was placed over the straight little Darby—a decision we cannot endorse. Lady Jo, alone in the bitch class, was given first.

FIELD SPANIELS.—Champ. Newton Abbot Laddie was alone in the challenge class for dogs, while the grand headed Sussex, Bridford Ruby was the only entry in the corresponding class for bitches. Both were given firsts. In the open class a new one, Rideau Rab, coarse in head, eye a shade light, grand body and bone, was an easy winner over the well known Sampson, who was followed by Brantford Mohawk, too near the Cocker in type. Bitches, black, had but three entries. The winner Rosedale Bess

is light in eye, body too small, feet turn out. Rosedale Belle second, is short in head and light in bone. Missie was missing.

In the "liver" dogs the Sussex Beau was alone. He has a typical head, plenty of bone and a good coat. In the color class for dogs and bitches, Fancy, cockery in head and a trifle up on legs, won first. Billy, second, is too heavy in skull, ears set on high, undershot muzzle, fair in body, light in bone. Third went to Toby, a black and white, pedigree unknown.

In Field Spaniel puppies, first went to Bob, a nice black, good head and coat, not straight in front. Rosedale Scamp, second, fair in head.

COCKERS.—In the challenge class for black dogs Rabbi proved the winner. He is coarse in head, ears set high, body not well ribbed back, and is not as lively as a Cocker ought to be. Black Duke, second, too fine in head, might be improved in body, a poor shower—lacks Cocker character. The old veteran, Champ. Brant, partially blind, weak in muzzle, good body, coat and character brought up the reserve. King of Obos was not "in it," in this competition.

Challenge bitches found Miss Obo II an easy winner. The old lady begins to show age. She is a remnant of a type that is fast disappearing. Bessie W., small but typical, weak in muzzle, light in eyes, was placed second.

Brantford Red Jacket had the challenge class for colored dogs to himself. He is faulty in head, ears a trifle short, grand body and bone, and stands straight on his pins. King Pharo's Sister—more name than dog—was the sole entry in the challenge class for other than black bitches. She is too toyish and were she black would never be placed higher than V.H.C. She won first. In the open class for black dogs Black Dufferin

was an easy first. Beautiful in skull, ears and stern carried too high at times, might be improved in back ribs—nice type. Oban, too heavy in skull and muzzle, undershot, round body, flat coat, front legs somewhat bowed, won 2nd. Dono, third, is chumpy in head, ears thick in leather, short of coat, very crooked in front legs. Black Brant, fourth, lacks quality in head, not deep enough in muzzle, nice ears, flat coat, good bone, does not move well behind. Litter brother of "I Say" and "I Guess," the winning bitches. Obadiah, reserve, is not straight in front, sour expression, pinched in muzzle, coat harsh, out of condition. Brock, V. H. C., has a head of the Field Spaniel type. Major, H.C., is not right in brow, profuse in coat and feather. I Guess, first, in the bitch class. Typical in head, body not developed, nice straight bone, feet turned out. Woodstock Cora, second, is nice in skull, muzzle a shade too light. I Say, third, head typical, body too small and short of coat, good bone. Brantford Flirt, reserve, is weak in muzzle, good body and coat, legs well feathered. Brant-Topsy, V. H. C., was off the bench when we called. Cleo III, H.C., is too small, muzzle pinched, out at elbow. Woodland Susie, H.C., wide muzzle, eyes shade light, weak in loin. Jealousy, muzzle fine, out at elbows and light in bone. In the dog class for other than black, Brantford Redman, first, is the heaviest headed red we have seen, nice body and coat, a little white on breast, plenty of bone, feet turn out. Nugget, second, is a buff sired by Black Graff. Ears set high, eyes light, shallow muzzle, nice bone, wide front, stifle not well bent. Bambo, third, has improved on his puppy form, but is not yet right behind the ribs. Rufus, fourth, is well known. Bitches other than black had seven entries. Mollie, first, is a black and white, muzzle fine but shapely, ears a

trifle high, eyes a shade light, a bit up-on legs and short of feather. Lady of Learning, second, rather short in head, body nice length and stands on the best of legs and feet. In good condition, should beat the winner easily. Brantford Red Ridinghood, third, houndy in ear and expression, wide front, feet spreading, good body and hind quarters. Brantford Dolly Varden, weak in head and light in bone. Blushing Rose, ears set high, weak in head, nice body, bad disposition.

The novice classes contained many of the winners in the regular classes. Brantford Redman again scored, followed by Black Brant, a six month's puppy. Ontario winning third. Head much like Brant's, (his sire), good body and coat, heavy bone, feet turn out. Von Hood, V. H. C. is weedy. In novice bitches any color, the wins were merely a repetition of those in the open class for blacks. Topsy, V. H. C., has a white frill, pinched muzzle, ears set on rather high, eyes light, bone ditto, is not a flyer. Mirza, H. C., is weedy. Jennie, C., is rather long in head for the class, nice body and coat, shown in excellent condition, might have been placed higher. Puppies were a good lot. Brantford Redman again won, while the winner of fourth in open class scored another second. Black Robbie, third, is not quite straight in front, good body and coat, will improve. Of Mahdi, V. H. C., we have no notes. In bitches, I Guess and I Say were again to the front, with Brantford Red Ridinghood a good third. Beatrice, reserve, is nice in outline, bone and coat, will make a winner for the winter circuit.

THE MONTREAL SHOW.

(By Our Special Reporter.)

THE International Bench Show of the Montreal Exposition Company was held in Montreal, on

September 22nd, being the first show held in that city since 1884. A most liberal prize list was issued, and everything possible done to make the show a success, and a new building erected expressly for the purpose. The building is rather neat in appearance, but was altogether too small to accommodate the number of dogs on exhibition. The 300 dogs filled it to its utmost capacity, in my opinion 200 dogs would be quite enough for comfort; as it was, many of the stalls were too small by half. Crowding dogs is a mistake, and causes grumbling on the part of exhibitors.

The aisles are not wide enough to permit visitors to pass along with any degree of comfort, and it was next to impossible to get dogs off their benches to take them to the ring, the crowd was so great. I expected all the most modern improvements at this show, such as a rail in front of the stalls to keep off the public, and which adds very materially to the comfort of the dogs and the safety of the people. It is a pity the Exposition Company did not take a leaf out of Toronto's book in erecting their building, and make it large enough to permit the judging being done inside the building, instead of in a tent on the outside, where the heat was simply sickening. Handlers, judges, reporters and officials were forced to throw off their coats and appear in their shirt sleeves. This was not to the taste of some, at least, but it was forced on them through the want of a proper judging ring. Again one ring is a mistake, two should have been provided, which would have prevented the judging lagging as it did, which was very unsatisfactory, and caused a great deal of grumbling. If the Company, are responsible for this, they should remedy it. Mr. Davidson judged all but the Spaniel classes and his decisions were fairly well received. However if Mr. Davidson wish e

to keep up his reputation, he will have to avoid the exhibition made in judging Black and Tan Terriers which was simply a fiasco. Mr. Davidson stating his eyesight was defective, called "Joe" Lewis one of the professional handlers present to assist him in determining the marking. "Joe" evidently thought judging "markings" was altogether too small a job, and proceeded to judge the dogs as well. A strong protest from Mr Mercer was not heeded, and the judging went on. Another thing that did not add to Mr. Davidson's reputation for sharp sightedness was the awarding second prize to the bitch English Lady in the dog class. Then the most remarkable somersault in judging took place, the bitch that was awarded second in the dog class was shown in the bitch class, which was not nearly so strong as the dog class and was set back to sixth place, the reason given I believe was that English Lady had lost some of her teeth. Some present were uncharitable enough to think "Honest John" was "getting back" at English Lady for not being a dog. Mr. Keyes made his bow to the public as a judge. I heard no complaints in regard to his awards, and he did not require any professional handler to assist him either.

Through the error of the G.T.R. Freight Department, the car containing Spratts benching did not arrive till Sunday night, and was not all in place until Tuesday morning. This handicapped the management, and was the cause of delay throughout.

A very large number of people visited the show; about thirty thousand I was informed paid admission. The Company, no doubt, will come out well ahead, which will insure the permanency of the dog show. The officials of the show did all they could to make it pleasant for visitors, the energetic Secretary, Mr. Robertson, being particularly active. Dr. Wesley Mills, the

Superintendent, was courteous as usual, and was a very busy man. I imagine the Doctor found it a more difficult task than he thought, to bring his many excellent ideas on show management into real practise—but no doubt, after his experience this year, he will be able to remedy many little defects incident to the first year's management.

EUTHANASIA—HAPPY DEATH.

D R. J. S. Niven, London, writes *Forest and Stream* refuting the allegation by "Clumber" that dogs cannot be successfully destroyed by the use of chloroform.

I was pained to see a letter from your valued correspondent "Clumber," in the issue of the 6th inst., condemning the use of chloroform, and I can only think that the medical friend and the vet. did not know how to kill a dog with chloroform, therefore this letter. As I have used chloroform for the last 15 years for the purpose of killing dogs easily, and never having any trouble, I think I may perhaps save much trouble and impart information on the point in question by detailing my method. As

every surgeon knows at this time that the actual operation is not the difficult part to bring the patient through, but that the proper means be taken beforehand and after to make the operation a success, therefore, in producing death by chloroform the proper steps should be taken so that by no chance it can be a failure. My method, which I have used for many years, is the following:

For a large dog, say a St. Bernard, I need 3 ozs. of chloroform, and for small dogs less. I have a shot bag of coarse canvas which has one side ripped down about three inches, according to the size of the dog's muzzle, so that the entire muzzle is enclosed; no chance of biting allowed. I place in the corner of this bag a pledget of absorbent cotton sufficient to absorb the amount of chloroform I may think necessary. I pour one, two, or three ounces of chloroform on this, and taking a firm hold of the dog by the back of the neck, I thrust the bag over his muzzle with no chance of biting by this means. In from one to three minutes the dog is asleep, then I lay him down, pour a little more chloroform over the cotton at the bottom of the bag, and cover the whole with a blanket or other dense covering to prevent the air getting in, and in ten or less minutes I have always found that death has taken place without a struggle, except at the very beginning of the anaesthesia. Let "Clumber" and others try this method, where the lethal chamber is not to be had, and he will never say that chloroform is not the most euthanastic (if I may coin a word) method of getting rid of old favorites that they ever used.

As I am on the subject perhaps I may trespass a little more on your kennel column, and give my experience of anaesthetics in canine surgery. When I began to operate on dogs about fifteen years ago I always used chloroform and

was tolerably successful, but in two or three instances my patients went through all right, but did not recover well from the effects of the chloroform. I then turned my attention to the other anaesthetic—ether—and it I have found to be the proper fluid to be used in canine surgery. I have never had an accident nor never had a case in which I could not administer it in safety. The greatest difficulty I had was how to administer it easily, which I at length overcame by having a solid leather cone made, which is 6 in. deep and large enough to place over the entire muzzle of the dog; this is lined with a double layer of thick flannel, and holes are perforated through the sides and bottom of the leather to admit air. I thoroughly saturate the flannel with the ether and place it over the muzzle, and if more ether is necessary it can be poured through the air holes. By this method the cone acts as a muzzle, so that there is no chance of biting, and it is not necessary to remove it to give it more of the ether, I consider it just what we want for operations, and in my hands has been most useful as well as successful. I have performed very many operations on dogs, but none of them ever succumbed to the anaesthetic ether, which I cannot say of the other, chloroform.
