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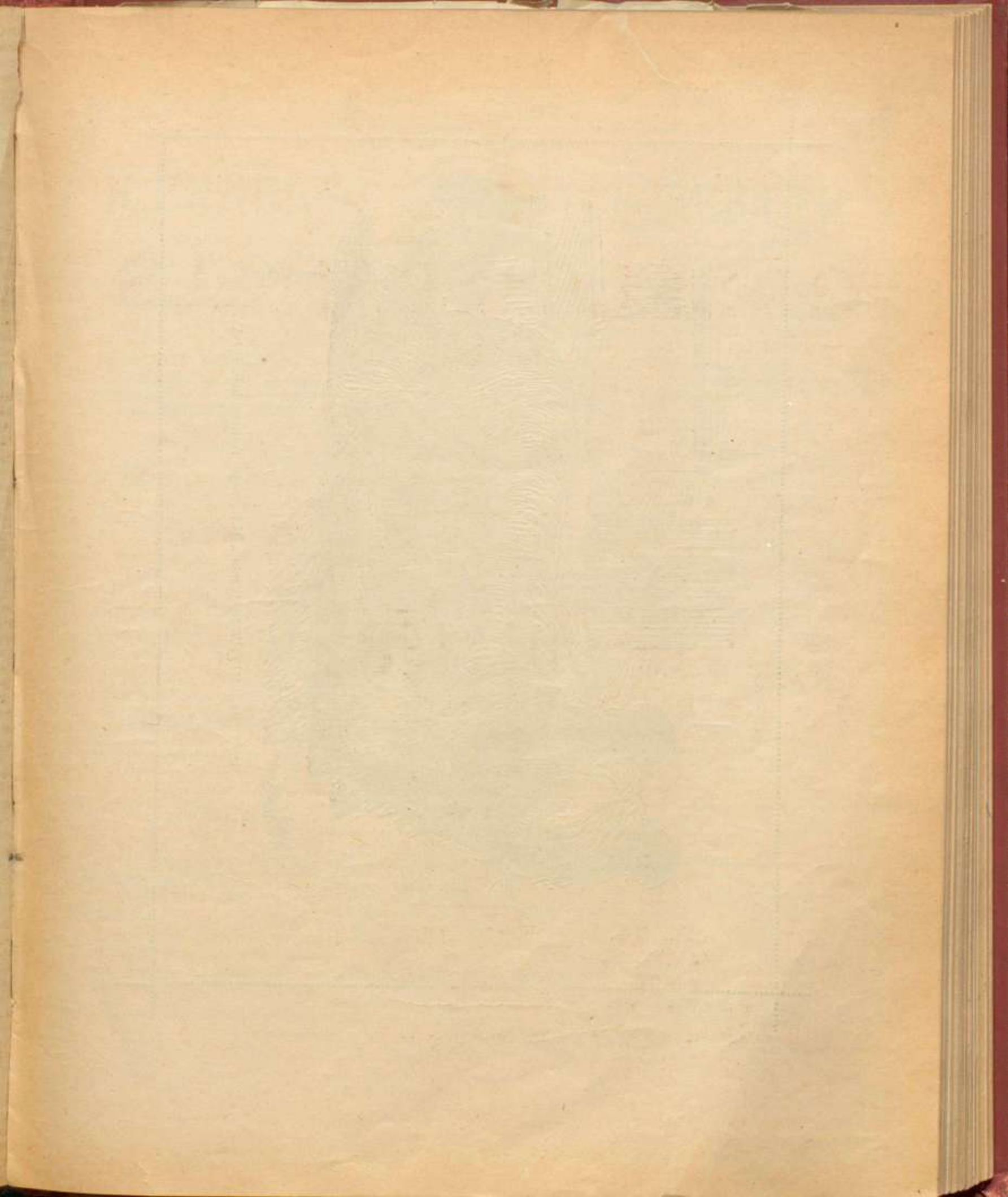
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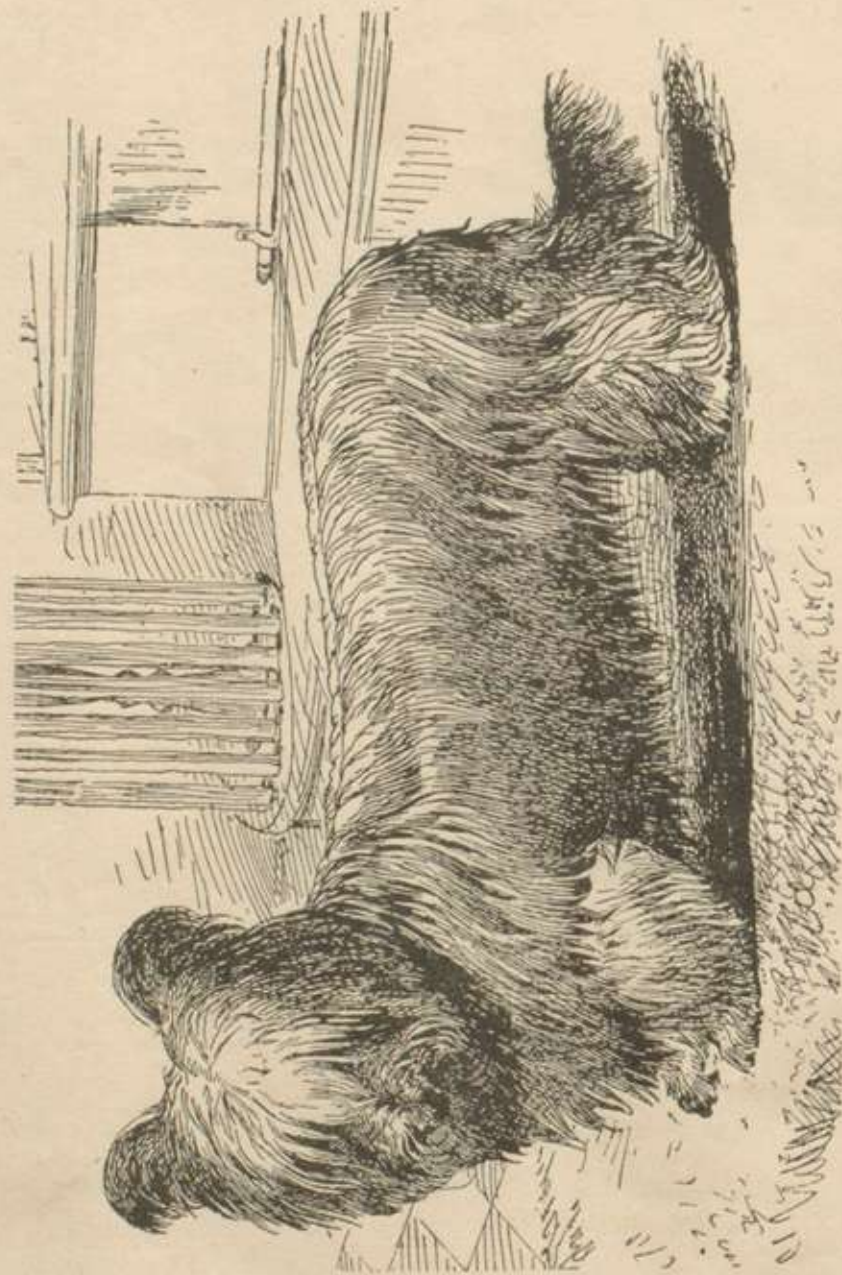

the famous Bull Terrier whose portrait appears in this issue is described as a pure white dog, grand head, wonderfully deep in rib, best quality of bone, with the finest legs and feet, well cropped ears and well carried stern. His face has a good length, with small, well-placed eyes. As a stock-getter he is prolific, two bitches having whelped

ten pups each to him. He has a combination of the very best blood of his breed; is game from his nose to the tip of his tail, active in his movements as a cat, and full of true Bull Terrier characteristics. He is by Streatham Flyer by Gully the Great out of Daisy, out of Trentham Baroness, by Trentham Dutch, out of Miss Glendyne, was whelped July 6th, 1889, and was imported from his breeder, Mr. Cope-man, England, in Aug 7th, 1891, by his present owner, Mr. John Moore-head Jr., Pittsburgh, Pa. The subject of our illustration this week is the Skye Terrier bitch Islay, who was exported, per s.s. *Celebes* under the charge of Spratt's Patent, on the 4th inst. to Mr. C. H. Smith of Canada, a very ardent admirer of this breed. She has only been exhibited once, winning 1st and special puppy class Inverness in 1890, under Mr. L. P. C. Astley. As a bitch she is unusually lengthy, has a thorough Terrier head and expression, and a nice coat which is not too long. Her colour is a light steel grey, with black points. She was bred by Mr. McRay, being sired by Fruachan (27,824), a well-known winner ex Helen Mc. Gregor, by Champion Old Burgundy ex Lowland Lass. Before leaving she visited Mr. Nichols' stud dog Port, which should give a good start to Skyes in Canada.

has bred the celebrated bitches: Duchess Graphic, A.K.C.S.B. 20234, litter sister to Count Graphic, winner of 1st and special in Cleveland, 1891, and 1st in Chicago, 1892, to Beppo III., full brother in blood to the great King of Kent and sire of Champion Tribulation and Tempest; Lillie Lansdowne was bred to Champion Lord Graphic sire of Promotion, the absolute winner of the Central Derby, and Count Graphic winner of the 1st and special at Cleveland, 1891, and 1st at Chicago, 1892. The issue of these two bitches, bred as they are, should be of great improvement to the pointers of Canada.

BARKLETS.

AGAIN we are informed that a brace of Canadian Cockers will cross the sea to try conclusions with the English cracks. If I am not mistaken a similar announcement was made a few months ago, but nothing came of it. As an advertising dodge it must soon lose its effect unless carried out. There seems to be a "Fascination" about this harmless "Amusement" of sending dogs "across the sea" (on paper), but "I Say" wont there be "Amazement" in England when it happens?

Mr. A. D. Stewart, the energetic Secretary of "the largest and most intelligent body of dog lovers in Canada" announces his intention of asking those present at the next annual meeting of the C. K. C. to pronounce upon the changes recently made in the rules relating to the novice and champion classes. This being the case, it is highly important that these changes should be well considered beforehand, in order that the business for which the meeting is called, may not be delayed. So far the discussion has been confined to "Ye Editor," Mr. Stewart and one or two of his friends. Surely this question, like every other, has two sides, notwithstanding the negative tone assumed by those who have criticised the action of the Committee.

Personally, I am of opinion that the C.K.C. has quite as much as it can properly attend to in keeping a record of the dogs and dog breeders of the American continent, without undertaking what at the most must prove a doubtful venture—that of recognizing the prize-winners of Great Britain. Following this idea to its natural sequence, I would expunge that part of the rule re novices, which, as it now reads, discriminates against the dogs of

Great Britain in favor of those owned on the continent, and seek to encourage by every legitimate means the importation of the best dogs that money could buy—for in no other way can we so quickly improve the stock we now have. If a chance to win in the novice class be any inducement to import, I would say, let us blot out the past record of the imported dog—about which we may have very little definite knowledge—and permit him to be shown in that class. Our knowledge of the dog ought to begin with his first appearance under C. K. C. rules, or at a show recognized by the rules of our club.

* * *

But there is a principle involved. I hold that the man who imports a good dog does as much for the species in this country as the man who breeds one, and for this reason is entitled to equal consideration and encouragement at the hands of a club that has for its object the improvement of the dog. Do not suppose that I lightly esteem the man whose judgment or experience, or even good luck, enables him to breed successfully, and produce a winner for each succeeding season, for such is not the case. I give place to no one in admiration of the fortunate breeder of a circuit winner. But, as virtue is said to be its own reward, so this fact ought to be considered ample compensation to the breeder, for it adds to his reputation, and eventually puts dollars in his pocket. Why then should he be placed on a higher pedestal or allowed privileges that are denied to the importer? Let us amend the novice rule, and place every man and every dog on the same footing.

* * *

The amended championship rule ought to go a long way toward accomplishing the object intended, but it would, I think, have better served the convenience of exhibitors without in any way impairing its usefulness, had

a first prize in the open class at a show having the requisite number of entries, been considered equally as good as a win after the dog had qualified for the challenge class. To attempt legislation for classes, by fixing the number of entries required in each to qualify for champion honors, would prove a doleful failure. A Philadelphia lawyer would not be able to gauge the popularity of the different varieties one year in advance, and we should be called on to change the class number for each breed annually. Such a system would entail endless confusion, and after all, what improvement would it be on the present arrangement?

* * *

"Uncle Dick" still manifests a dogged preference for the contemporary cocker of his boyhood days, forgetful of the fact that "the sun do move." Why is it we thus cling to the hallucinations of childhood with such tenacity of purpose, when our better judgment tells us we are wrong? Perhaps its natural that we should do so after all. Which one of us cannot remember the faithful four-footed friend that was so happy, if but allowed to share our rambles in the fields or woods, when life was young, some forty years ago? and the look of satisfaction that came over his wise old face, when we threw off coat and cap, I almost said boots, but we scorned footwear in those days, in order that we might the better climb the tree up which a squirrel had taken refuge? Was there ever such another dog? "Poor Uncle Dick!" He still lives in the past, and with a perseverance worthy of a better cause continues to sing the praises of his early love and to ridicule the "trash" bred and exhibited so successfully by the present generation. But let him alone, like Ephraim of old, he is joined to his idols.

* * *

There is much in "Amateur's" letter re Toronto Bench Show to commend it

to the Industrial Committee. To charge the same entry fee for a Terrier or Beagle as for a St. Bernard or Mastiff, and give only half as much in prize money to the smaller dogs, is a gross injustice to the exhibitors of the former, and ought to be resented. The boot would fit better on the other foot. The small dog occupies less space, requires less food and attention, and is in every way more profitable to the Exhibition Association. Why then should his owner be asked to pay the same entry fee as that demanded for a large dog, with the chance of winning but one half the amount of prize money?

There are doubtless a few breeds that require some protection in the matter of classification, and a special prize for the best dog and bitch of each variety and owned in Canada, would serve to draw out home productions, and go a long way toward popularizing our bench shows. Now that our dogs are practically shut out of the United States, owing to the absurd customs regulations recently enacted by that country, we should try in every possible way to nationalize our shows, and encourage careful breeding, so that the quality of our stock will soon be such as to attract the attention of foreign buyers, and like the tight little island over the sea, enable us to retain our home market as well.

* * *

"That reminds me" that the *Selling Class* is most popular in England at the present time, and always well filled. I believe there is room for such a class here, and that a trial would please many exhibitors. The maximum price of dogs allowed to compete should be a reasonable one, so that the cracks would not have to be reckoned with. It might supercede the novice class to some extent, and thus serve to equalize competition, for frequently the novice winner proves to be premier of the

open class as well. It is needless to say the open class winner would not likely be a graduate of the selling class, unless the maximum price was fixed too high. It is especially suitable for the last of the circuit, when novices have become scarce, and other attractions are necessary to secure entries.

If team prizes, for three specimens of each breed, could be substituted for the ordinary kennel prizes, the competition would not be confined to two or three exhibitors in each breed as it now is. There are as yet more good threes than fours owned by Canadian exhibitors.

Every little while we are asked to gaze on some new constellation which appears in a night and flashes with meteoric velocity across the doggy world, the wonder and admiration of all beholders. Like a comet in the sky it shines with great brilliancy for a season, and then as suddenly fades away, perchance to cross the orbit of another fancy and lighten for a time another sphere, or may be to lose its light and remain forever as cold and cheerless as the Sphynx. How different the career of the true fancier! with a faith as steady and unwavering as the light of a fixed star, he learns to "labor and to wait." Storms, clothed in the mantle of disease or misfortune, may overtake him, but these do not lessen the love he has for his dumb friends or cause him to lose faith in the possibilities of the future. Years of patient toil serve but to garnish a rich experience, and at last success crowns his efforts—his life work.

A great light has recently gone out in the Fox Terrier world. Another in the St. Bernard fancy is fast receding from sight, and even now we hear rumours of a black and tan—but why moralize? *Sic transit gloria, mundi.*

ENCOURAGEMENT OF CANADIANS AT OUR OWN SHOWS.

Editor Gazette,—

WHILE I do not agree with all that "Amateur" has advanced in your last number, I think the question of how best to encourage Canadian exhibitors and especially Canadian breeders is one that deserves special attention at the present time.

(1.) As to challenge classes there are always so few competitors that it would pay to make entries free, and in these as in all other classes as far as possible, separate dogs and bitches even if smaller prizes must be given. I have never realized the advisability of giving only one prize for this class, for often it is known that a certain dog is likely to turn up and take that prize, while the owners of other good animals naturally keep them at home.

The general public take great interest in challenge classes and except in the case of very old specimens whose day is past, challenge dogs are well worth seeing.

(2.) Would it not be wise at the fall shows this year to give prizes, even if small, for Canadian kennels and best dog and bitch. We should encourage the breeder as much as possible and if the prize was for "best bred in Canada," rather than "owned" the effect would perhaps be to encourage owners of good bitches to secure the services of the best dog available whenever they are to be found; and certainly they will often as yet be obliged to seek for such stud dogs outside of Canada. I should be opposed, however, to giving these prizes except when the animals were decidedly of sufficient merit to constitute them show dogs in the proper sense of the term, otherwise we mislead instead of encourage breeders. Perhaps for this year it

would be better to give the prizes referred to above to animals owned or bred in Canada.

(3.) Has the time not come to encourage our own students of the dog and employ more Canadian judges? I have no sympathy with opposition to outside judges because they do not reside in Canada; that is a narrow spirit, but when we have men amongst us who can judge, they should not be overlooked. Moreover, expense would be saved, a great matter for all but the very largest shows.

We would do well to extend occasionally the courtesy of an invitation to judge to some of our brethren across the lines, but that we should now feel wholly dependant on outsiders seems to show a want of confidence in ourselves. As we trust U. S. judges when we show, these exhibitors from across the borders may well put confidence in the men we select, some of whom have spent both time and money on dogs for years chiefly because of the interest (not the profit) they found.
