EXECUTIVE MEETING.

(Official Report.)

THE Executive Committee of the C. K. C. met May 6th, at Queen's Hotel, Toronto, the following members being present:—Messrs. T. G. Davey, (President), and S. F. Glass, London, H. Gorman, Sarnia, J. S. Williams, C. A. Stone, J. G. Mitchener and H. B. Donovan, (Secretary), Toronto. Mr. A. D. Stewart, Hamilton, was present as a visitor.

World's Fair.—The Secretary read the following letter in response to an enquiry from him as to the necessity of applying for any specific amount of space at the Bench Show of 1893:

CHICAGO, ILL., May 4, 1892.

H. B. Donovan, Esq.,

Sec'y Canadian Kennel Club.

DEAR SIR:

Referring to your letter of the 27th ult., I have to say that no limit has been placed for the number of dogs from Canada at the Kennel Show of the Exposition. It is not necessary to make application for a certain amount of space. I think it will be possible to provide space for all dogs sent from Canada, entitled to admission under the rules. I will send you blank application for space as soon as printed, and in the meantime suggest that you correspond with, or see Mr. William Saunders, the Commissioner from Canada, regarding the dog exhibit from the Dominion.

Moved by S. F. Glass, seconded by C. A. Stone, that the Secretary be instructed to correspond with the Government and proper authorities with a view to appropriating a sum of money for the purpose of employing a Superintendent to be appointed by the Canadian Kennel Club to generally supervise and arrange necessary details in connection with the exhibit of Canadian dogs at the World's Columbian Exposition Bench Show, 1893. That the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club representing all Kennel Clubs in

the Dominion of Canada unanimously recommend that Ald. A. D. Stewart, of Hamilton be appointed for such position.—*Carried.*

Registrations.—It was decided that cross bred Setters cannot be registered, and that the required three generations on both sides must be given even where sire and dam are well known and both registered.

Duty on Dogs.—Mr. A. D. Stewart kindly volunteered to use every effort to bring this matter to a successful issue.

F. H. F. Mercer disqualified.—The Secretary read the following communication from the Secretary of the Ottawa Bench Show Committee, and also produced the original entry blank and a copy of the catalogue.

"At a meeting of the Ottawa Bench Show Committee, held the 16th day of March, 1892, in the matter of the complaint of James L. Little of Brookline, Mass., that Mr. F. H. F. Mercer one of the Committee of the said show, without his knowledge or consent, entered his dog, Champion "Newcastle" at the show held in September last, in order that the challenge class might be divided, thereby enabling him to win a prize to which he was not justly entitled. We, the Committee, find the charge proven and hereby suspend the said F. H. F. Mercer in accordance with rule No. 23 of the C. K. C. Rules, in that behalf, and the Committee recommend

that the win thus obtained be cancelled and that Mr. Mercer be requested to refund \$5, being the amount of the prize won.

Breeder's Certificate.—Notice of motion was given by Mr. Gorman, that at the next annual meeting he would move that a breeder's certificate be attached to each registration sent in for record in C. K. C. R.

Prefixes and Affixes.—Moved by S. F. Glass, seconded by H. Gorman that any member of the Canadian Kennel Club may claim any prefix or affix for use in registration of his or her dogs, providing that such prefix or affix has not been previously claimed by any other member, upon making application in writing to the Secretary, accompanied by a fee of \$1.—*Carried.*

C. K. C. Certificates.—Moved by S. F. Glass, seconded by J. G. Mitchener, that special diplomas shall be given by the C. K. C. at one show of each year, beginning with Toronto in 1892, for (a) the best kennel of not less than four; (b) the best brace; (c) the best dog; (d) the best bitch; owned or bred in Canada by members of the C. K. C.—*Carried.*

TORONTO BENCH SHOW.

At a meeting of the Bench Show Committee, held April 26th, Mr. J. S. Williams, the well-known St. Bernard breeder, was elected in the stead of Mr. W. S. Jackson who, this year, will be unable to act. In compliance with a request from the National Beagle Club, who are supporting the show, the classes for Beagles were changed to read under 13, and from 13 to 15 inches.

Kennels' King of Obos was 1st in challenge class, but was protested for being over weight. In open dogs, a six months old Bob Obo puppy, Bob Obo, Jr., was 1st in both open and puppy classes, and A. and M. Kennels' Amusement 2nd in both. A. and M. Kennels' Queen of Spades won 1st in open bitches, and Tiney Obo, dam of Bob Obo, Jr., 2nd. Several others received Res. and V.H.C. in their respective classes. The A. and M. Kennels won the kennel prize. Mode took the special for best Mastiff.

THE MONTREAL EXPOSITION

Directors are desirous of holding a bench show this year, and have tendered Dr. Wesley Mills the management if dates can be arranged. As it now is the show would clash with that of London. Dr. Mills will not advise the holding of a show if London decides to retain their dates nor unless proper accommodation can be supplied. Inflammation of the lungs was the cause of death.

MR. P. J. KEATING'S, TORONTO,

bad luck has not all gone yet. His last loss is that of the black field Spaniel Bob (Bob Obo—Nellie) who was first in the puppy class at Toronto last fall, and has several times been placed since.

THE RIDEAU KENNELS,

Ottawa, are having hard luck with their young stock having lost 11 since January. Bitches have no milk, consequent on too much "grub" and lack of sufficient exercise. This will now be remedied and with six bitches due in season a different tale should soon be told.

AFTER JULY 1ST

Obo, Jr., now in his ninth year and as lively as ever, will be withdrawn from the stud. His last two litters totalled 11, ten dogs and 1 bitch. He will be missed.

OTTAWA WHISPERS.

THE three Greyhounds belonging to the late Dan Gordon, V.S., were raffled on Monday night last. Over five hundred tickets were sold. Justinian was won by Mr. J. W. Wurtele, a member of our Bench Show Committee, Jetsam, by Mr. John Abbott, and Stylish Girl, by Mr. C. Roger, the two former will be remembered as the winners of 1st and special at our show last fall.

At a recent meeting of the Bench Show Committee, the prize list was revised and several new classes added. The names of F. Robson and F. H. Cunningham were added to the Committee, and the following were appointed as Hon. members: Dr. Wesley Mills, Montreal; C. H. Corbett, Kingston; T. G. Davey, London; A. D. Stewart, Hamilton; C. A. Stone and H. B. Donovan, Toronto. Several changes will be made in the building, in order to make the dogs more comfortable.

Mr. Alfred Geddes has received from Mr. J. F. Campbell of Montreal, a six months old black-and-tan bitch pup, by Kaiser ex Desdemona, which promises to be a good one. He has cristen her "Mona." It seems rather strange to find the 1st Vice-President of the C. K. C. publicly prejudging a case; but we must make every allowance for "Mount Royal."

I cannot allow Dr. Mills' communication under the above heading in your April number to pass without challenge and my most emphatic condemnation. No man has any right to assume every-

thing, as Dr. Mills does, or to hand in a verdict before even the jury is selected. He writes of Mr. Mercer bringing "trumped up charges." *He did no such thing*, the charges were not "trumped up," they had a perfectly sound foundation on the records and how was Mr. Mercer to know the secret facts of the case? Neither did Mr. Mercer "trump" them up, I did that if any such thing was done, as I was the first to bring them, although, owing to my letter being missent, it did not appear in *Turf, Field and Farm* until after Mr. Mercer's, but it was written and mailed about a week before his. I subsequently learned the facts that put Mr. Little beyond any suspicion of wrong doing, and promptly made them public, but his complete innocence did not make my action an "attempt to trump up charges" against him. Nor was Mr. Little "so seriously injured;" I cannot, for the life of me, see where he was injured at all, and I think that Mr. Little will come to this conclusion himself, if he has not done so by this time.

Dr. Mills' cool assumption that all "straight-forward people" must be disgusted and indignant at Mr. Mercer, is intolerable. I dislike to blow my own horn or set myself up as an example, but Dr. Mills forces me to say that I have established a *longer* reputation for straightforwardness than he has, and I defy the production of a man who has earned that reputation more thoroughly than I have, and I am not in the least disgusted or indignant at Mr. Mercer. He was exceedingly imprudent and thoughtless, and he thoroughly deserved the censure that the Spaniel Club gave him for an indiscretion, that if unchecked, would lead to great complications and abuses, but I distinctly affirm that he was guilty of no moral wrong and that my respect and friendship for him has not been lessened one jot or tittle. Finally, I throw down the gauntlet right

here, and assert that nothing or everything that Mr. Mercer has ever done, has wrought the mischief to doggy interests that Dr. Mills' *ex cathedra* utterances and ill considered assumptions have done. I believe him (Dr. M.) a man of honest intentions, but he must learn that we dogmen are not a lot of schoolboys to be dominated in his style.

IT need hardly be said that the judging of dogs is the most important matter in connection with shows. It concerns not merely the management of the individual show but the whole kennel world, and it sometimes involves as in the case I am about to discuss, questions other than kennel ones.

Ability to do the work assigned is a prime requisite, but it is by no means the only one. There is no reason why we should employ at any show in this country a man who is both at loggerheads with the rest of the kennel world and hostile to us or at least holds us in contempt. Yet such a man has been employed at Toronto show for some years past, and I wish to enter my protest against his employment in future feeling sure that many if not all will agree with me.

It is perfectly well known to those who are conversant with kennel affairs that Mr. C. H. Mason is no longer employed as a judge in the United States, and that he has lost ground as a reporter and critic, and this because of a persistent attempt to write down practically all other leading judges, editors, reporters—in fact one might say everyone almost with the exception

of a small clique of supporters. The readers of a certain U. S. journal are aware that for months this paper has been the medium of abuse of almost everyone in the kennel world of any prominence except Mr. Mason and a few of his known adherents. No one doubts who is at the bottom of all this.

To mention only two cases, Messrs. Lacy and Haldeman, among our most esteemed editors, because alike of their ability and good-will, have been fairly persecuted in that journal, and it is well-known that Mr. Mason has quarrelled with both of them, and written directly against them over his own name, so that we need not be in any doubt as to the source of this persecution.

The last New York show was reported by Mr. Mason for the English *Stock-Keeper*. This journal opened its columns to the effusing of anonymous writers from this side the water, in which again nearly every prominent dog man of America was misrepresented and vilified. The same paper has all along spoken contemptuously of our American kennel world, and it was no surprise to find it employing the man that has done more than any other to make bad blood in America, and to set us in the worst light before the English kennel world, to report the N.Y. show.

His report did not disappoint those who knew him. He writes like a man utterly soured and determined to say the worst of everything.

To begin with he cannot deny the success of the show, but says the good attendance was owing to a "fad" of the New York public. The accomplished judge and manager, a kindly man that has done much for American kennel interests, is spoken of usually by this critic as the Westminster Kennel Club's "kennel man."

Nearly all the judges were according

to this critic had failures; but Major Tracy is fairly reduced to mince-meat. Not satisfied with devoting nearly a quarter of a column to him in the general report of the show, later when speaking of Pointers the critic returns to the charge and says, "As he cannot judge dogs, because he does not know how, he might, in justice to himself as well as to others step down and out and *remain out*." (Italics mine). The last two words show the true inwardness of this assertion. It illustrates the intense bitterness and hostility of the man, the utter lack of gentlemanly regard for the *feelings* of others.

It is bad enough to tell a man he knows nothing, but to add that he never can——!!!

Again a list of men prominent in kennel affairs is given and such leaders as Messrs. Lacy, Haldeman and others are spoken of as "recruits." In fact here as in all this individual's writings, there is a studied effort to insult men, to lacerate their feelings and to lower them in their own estimation and that of the world.

Not to occupy too much of your space, Mr. Editor, I pass over the partizan spirit and the unfairness of many portions of the report on the dogs, and allude to another matter which I consider an indirect insult to Canadians and one we should resent.

In a letter in the *Fanciers' Journal* which was evidently written with the direct object of insult, in reply to a gentleman who happened to couple Mr. Mason's name with that of our former London friend, Mr. Wheeler, as proposed judges in a match, Mr. Mason derides Mr. Wheeler's qualifications as judge, and speaks of his having got his knowledge of dogs "up in Canada," as if indeed a man could not get his knowledge anywhere—the only question being—has he got it?

What I maintain then is, that as

there are good men, both in Canada and the United States, well disposed to us and to the kennel world at large, capable of judging at Toronto or anywhere else, that we show some self-respect and some regard for the rest of the kennel world and leave this man, who thinks so well of himself and so ill of others, severely alone. Every year there have been many that would not show under him at Toronto. He is constantly alienating more and more people. Because Toronto prizes are large, and the standing of the show good, the management should none the less consider the feelings of exhibitors, the general interest of dog men and the self-respect of Canadians. It is not a question in this case of knowledge of dogs; far more important ones are at stake, and I trust that the Toronto management and all others will consider those principles that concern us as men and as Canadians.

Personally I do not know the man but I am opposed to the sway in the judging ring or elsewhere of those that make heartburnings and who persistently attempt to discourage and crush others.

This time the bid came from Chicago, and the sum offered was so tempting that Billy very nearly parted with his pet, but after thinking the matter over for a couple of days he decided to hold on to the "red un" as he thinks he can sweep the decks during the fall circuit with the much desired youngster.

The Hamilton Kennel Club contemplates giving a monster out-door entertainment on Dominion Day, by which it is hoped that the deficit from last year's Bench Show may be made up. This year's show will be held on the 6th, 7th, 8th, and 9th of September and from the enquiries already being made about it, it is safe to predict a larger and better affair than ever.

Dog poisoners have been hard at work here for some time past, and many valuable animals have been destroyed by the miscreants. The Hamilton Kennel Club has taken the matter up, and will not only offer a reward for information that will lead to the detection of the scoundrels who are doing the dirty work, but will employ counsel to prosecute any cases which may be brought to its notice.

THINGS CANADIAN.

Editor Gazette:—

I WAS very much pleased with the letter of "Canadian" which appeared in last month's issue of GAZETTE, for the views expressed by the writer were ones in which I fully concur.

I do not think that too much encouragement can be given to Canadian breeders; and if prizes were given at our Fall shows by the C. K. C. not only for the best Canadian kennels, but for the best pair of dogs, and for the best dog and best bitch of the most popular breeds owned or bred in Canada, I am sure they would be appreciated and keenly competed for.

I am one of those who think that the breeder deserves infinitely more credit, and therefore much more encouragement than the owner, who is simply a buyer and nothing more. Any man whose purse is long enough can buy and import good dogs, although perfectly ignorant perhaps of all that appertains to breeding, raising, and caring for them. No doubt good follows in the train of his purchases, because good dogs must produce good stock, but the poor man who breeds conscientiously and scientifically in the face of discouragement and difficulty, doing all the hard work and running all the risk, should certainly, I think, take precedence of the man who does nothing except open his purse strings to buy dogs which others have bred for him.

It would not be necessary, I feel certain, to offer cash prizes for Canadian kennels, although if money can be found to give such prizes well and good. Diplomas given by the C. K. C. would suffice to draw good entries, as their possession would bring honor to the

winners, and thoroughly advertise their kennels throughout the Dominion.

"Canadian" suggests that more Canadian judges should be employed at our shows; I agree with him in this also; but I think that there are few men, if any, in Canada, who can successfully, and with credit to themselves, pose as all round judges. This is not written by any means in disparagement of Canadian judges. We have some thoroughly good men amongst us quite capable of judging certain breeds anywhere; but the all round judge is indeed a *rara avis*, and I doubt if half a dozen can be found on this entire continent. If, however, Canadian judges were chosen to judge certain breeds with which they are familiar, I am satisfied that they would command large entries and do good work.

It is just such letters as that of "Canadian" that we need from time to time in the Canadian dog world, because they show that our own breeders are thinking for themselves, and the interchange of progressive ideas tend naturally to draw us closer together day by day, in the bonds of that good fellowship which should ever encircle us.

As I am speaking of things Canadian, I take this opportunity of saying that I have for some time past been writing and speaking to many of our Fox-Terrier men, with a view of forming, if possible in the near future, a Canadian Fox-Terrier Club. I think the time has come when such a club would do good work, and I hope to see a meeting of those interested in the matter held at Toronto during the progress of the bench show there in September. Meantime, this will set the ball rolling, and I shall be glad to hear, either privately or through your columns, from those who, approving of my suggestion would like to join such a club, and help to popularize one

of the best and staunchest breeds known to the fancy.

There is still another matter which I think worthy of more than passing thought, and that is the advisability of holding annually a Canadian breeder's show. The show would be Canadian, pure and simple, the entries being confined exclusively to Canada. The entries I am satisfied would be large, and the fixture would prove a direct encouragement to our own breeders, owners and exhibitors. The show should be held, I think, in Toronto, as being the most central point, and after the success attendant upon the late local ventures in Toronto and Hamilton, there can be no doubt as to the result.

THE one day local show of the Toronto Kennel Club closed May 6th, at 11 p.m., a most pronounced success in every way. The entries were confined to Toronto and suburbs and totalled 215,
