SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit to you my first annual report and to save time at the annual meeting and give members who may be unable to be present at that meeting an opportunity of expressing an opinion, I have had it put in type and have mailed each member a copy.

I am happy to state that the Club is flourishing, growing in importance and activity and daily increasing its mem-

bership. At this date (September 2nd) there are one hundred and forty-five members in good standing, and doubtless many more will make good their membership before the close of 1892. Of these no less than eighty-nine have joined since last annual meeting. Membership is distributed over a vast territory, Ontario naturally having the greatest number, followed by Quebec, Manitoba, British Columbia, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and a few in the United States.

The finances have been satisfactory, the Club having kept expenses within its income and having a small balance to the good. The Treasurer will submit his report for your approval. As the financial year begins January 1st and ends December 31st, I would suggest that a Treasurer's report (audited) from last audit to end of present year be mailed each member as early in January, 1893, as possible, and after that an annual report be mailed early in January of each year. The report of finances tendered at the annual meeting (if held in September) might be received as an *interim* report.

The number of Registrations, owing to the raising of the Standard of qualification has slightly decreased, but I think the deficit will be fully made up by the large number of dogs now being "listed" to enable their owners to enter them at the fall shows.

I regret being unable to report favorably on the removal of the duty im-

posed on thoroughbred dogs coming into Canada, but if each individual member would make it a point to press the matter with his legislative representative I feel sure it would at next adjustment of the tariff be made right. The Canadian Kennel Club is too representative a body to have its claims ignored.

Professor Wm. Saunders, Dominion Commissioner to the World's Columbian Exposition has expressed a desire to be with the members of the Club at the annual meeting and will there tender his views as to the terms on which Canadian exhibits will be received.

Without wearying you with unnecessary details I may allude to what has been accomplished during the past year:

1. The correspondence of the Club has been carried on in a business-like way and with *promptness*.
2. Under no consideration has a registration been received unless it complied with the necessary qualifications.
3. The Constitution and Rules of the Club put in shape, printed and sent to each member.
4. Vol. I. of Stud Book, up to end of 1891, corrected as far as possible and published. This has really been a private enterprise undertaken by the Secretary.
5. The registrations published each month in *Canadian Kennel Gazette*.
6. Recognition from the World's Fair Bench Show authorities in placing the C.K.C. on a par with the A.K.C.

in accepting registrations in the C.K.C. Register.

7. The offering of Canadian Kennel Club certificates to Club members at one show in each year.

8. All meetings reported in detail and given every publicity, through the medium of the press.

Many other matters of greater or less importance have been regulated, but these have all been reported in the official minutes. The Sporting Editors of the Toronto papers have taken a personal interest in the Club's affairs and have been present at and reported all meetings. This has been appreciated and I am sure the Club will join with me in tendering them a most cordial vote of thanks.

Amongst other business the following notices of motion will come up for discussion and action.

By Mr. H. Gorman :

"That a breeder's certificate be attached to each registration sent in for record in the C.K.C.R."

By Mr. A. D. Stewart :

1. "That the penalty of disqualification imposed by this Club upon Mr. F. H. F. Mercer, of Ottawa, be and is hereby removed and that the said Mr. F. H. F. Mercer be and is hereby eligible for re-election in the Canadian Kennel Club upon payment of the usual fees."

2. "That Section 7 of Rule 15 be amended by striking out all the words after the word "class" in the 6th line of the said Section."

3. "That Rule xviii of the C. K. C. be struck out and the following substituted therefor, viz.: 'No dog eligible for special prizes can be withdrawn from competition in the regular class or classes in which it has been entered.'"

4. That the following clause be added to Rule xxvi :

"Exhibitors at bench shows held under the C.K.C. Rules, may nail hang up or fasten to the back of the

bench, cage, or section in which their dogs are exhibited, a printed card containing the name of the dog, the name and address of its owner, and a list of the prizes which the dog may have previously won. No other particulars of any kind shall be allowed to be printed on the said card, nor shall any card, notice, or printed or written particulars of any sort other than the card above alluded to be nailed, hung up or fastened in the cage or bench occupied by the dog. But nothing contained in this Rule shall prevent the nailing up by the Secretary or Superintendent of the show any prize cards awarded to the dog during the progress of the show at which the dog is being exhibited."

By Mr. Andrew Murdoch :

1. "That the office of Treasurer be abolished, and that the duties appertaining to that office shall be performed by the Secretary, under the title of the Secretary-Treasurer, said Secretary-Treasurer to give a bond for \$1000.00 to the Canadian Kennel Club annually as security."

2. "That a Patron be appointed."

3. "To amend clause 4 of Rule 15."

By H. B. Donovan :

"That in Constitution, Rule 5, after the word "membership" in the first line insert the words "accompanied by the necessary fees."

By Mr. C. A. Stone :

1. "That Section 6, Rule 15 of the C. K. C. be changed from the present reading to read as follows: "The Open class shall be for dogs of any age which have not already qualified for the Challenge class and for which no Challenge class has been provided,"

2. "That Section 2, Rule 26 be struck out of the rules."

By Mr. J. G. Mitchener :

"That no two dogs of the same breed shall be registered in the C. K.

C.S.B. under the same name, unless with a registered affix or prefix."

IN BRIEF.

"UNCLE DICK," won't you tell us in a quiet corner of this paper who that exhibitor was that won in so many classes with the same dog?

"Leastwise," perhaps you'll tell us where he lives or what breed he cultivates—we mean pushes.

You did not kick "Uncle Dick;" but you ought to have kicked like a steer, then we would have called you the Grand Old Man of the kennel world during life, and sainted you after death.

Nevertheless we owe J. O. F. a good

deal for working for years to establish sound views about Spaniels. It is bound to come "Uncle Dick," and when it does we hope your efforts will not be forgotten.

Look well to your hat "Uncle Dick" before you go to Kingston.

Remember the people of K. are very "tony" and we are not sure that some of them did not take you for a Wild West Show the last time you were there.

You are not a bad sort "Uncle Dick," but don't we pray you, imagine you are the Delphian Oracle. It will spoil you.

ABOUT CLUBS.

At the present juncture in our kennel affairs we need a breeders' association.

Canadians had better go slow with specialist clubs.

If they are formed they should be managed, if possible, in harmony with those in the United States.

Better be cautious in meddling with standards and types.

It is well for people to understand them, but it is serious to alter the work of decades.

SOME DON'TS FOR THE BEGINNER.

Don't beforehand put any ribbons on your dog. Let the judge do that.

Don't brag about your dog before he is taken into the ring.

Don't brag after he is taken out, if he wins. He may get nothing next time.

Don't sulk or fume if he loses. People will know you don't know, "don't yer know."

Don't walk around the show to get sympathy from sore-heads.

They are always plenty.

They get better without medicine when left alone.

SOME DON'TS FOR THE OLD STAGER.

Don't impress on the young exhibitor that you are the sole fountain of knowledge and wisdom.

He may find out you are not, and then despise you.

Don't assume that because a man is new at dogs that he is devoid of ordinary intelligence.

Don't assume that the novice is without brains and eyes.

Don't forget that some men learn more in a month than others in years.

Don't sympathize with any man that abuses a judge. The office is honorable and protect that, if you don't like him who fills it.

FOR YOUNG JUDGES.

Don't forget to provide yourself with a skin as thick as a rhinoceros' hide. You'll need it.

Don't fail to examine the poor dogs. They are very likely to be in the hands of the beginner, and he has feelings.

Don't send a dog out of the ring if it is not crowded. It wounds some men to the quick, and is usually an unnecessary blow.

Don't talk with exhibitors in the ring. It arouses suspicion.

The ring steward can ask all questions for you.

Don't hope to please everyone. You can't, and if you try you will lose the respect of the best.

Don't discuss with an angry or insolent exhibitor at any time or place.

Be kind to the man really seeking for information.

Remember you are to apply, not invent Standards.

TO RING STEWARDS:

Don't look and act as if you owned the show.

Don't act as if you were the captain and the exhibitors Jack tars to be ordered about by you.

Don't believe that you are there for any other purpose than to be courteous to and assist all concerned.

Don't take office if you don't mean to be in your place on time and all the time, otherwise you may cause a vast amount of confusion and dissatisfaction.

FOR REPORTERS.

Don't undertake to criticise a breed you know nothing about. The report of an ignoramus may do a lot of harm, especially to the beginner.

Don't consider that, because you differ from the judge, he is wrong. Usually he has better opportunities than you to see and handle the dogs, and before they are wearied.

Don't be so small and mean as to wreak private revenge on the judge. People may read between the lines and take your measure.

Don't forget that it is the duty of all to magnify the judge's office, while not screening him from criticism.

Don't say nasty things. Be courteous always.

FOR US ALL.

Don't let us believe that, "we are the people and wisdom will die with us."

There will be better men and better days after we are all gone.

Don't forget that we all make mistakes and need the forbearance of others.

Life is short. Let us all avoid putting any drops into that cup of bitterness all men have to taste—some to drink. Our dogs are affectionate long suffering animals and there is much in their nature we may imitate with profit.

BARKLETS.

IT is a notorious fact that our bench show catalogues have been the laughing-stock of the American kennel world, and it is high time a change was effected. Heretofore they have been prepared too hurriedly. In the rush for entries the lists have been kept open until there was scarcely time to do the printing, to say nothing about revising copy, etc. With the advent of the rule respecting the closing of entries, let there be an improvement in the quality of our catalogues. Let

us have names properly spelled and numbers correctly given. When stating the age of a dog, in place of $10\frac{1}{2}$ months" or "9 months" as the case may be, let us have the *date of birth*, as well as all other particulars required by Rule 2. Our catalogues would then become reliable records, and worthy of being kept by the careful breeder for future reference. Those we have had in the past are comparatively worthless. It often becomes necessary to know the exact age of a dog when entered in both puppy and open classes, or when competing for specials, and it is due to exhibitors that this information should appear in the official list of entries. Doubtless the most of us have smiled at the trivial objections brought before the English Kennel Club with respect to inaccuracies appearing in their Schedules of shows held under Club rules, but what we in Canada stand most in need of to-day, is a little more of this same spirit—the desire to have things right. There has been too much forbearance already on the part of the Canadian Kennel Club, but I much mistake the temperament of our present Secretary if such sins of omission and commission are longer tolerated.

We might also with advantage follow the plan of some English catalogues, and preface the entries with a brief description of the breed. This would be a novelty, and doubtless one that would be appreciated by the ordinary bench show visitor, who has but an imperfect knowledge of Standard requirements, so far as relates to dogs.

* * *

The Chinese, says a contemporary, notwithstanding the fact that they eat the flesh of the dog and esteem it a great delicacy, honor their dogs more highly and take better care of them than any other race of people. In every large Chinese city there is a workman whose sole trade is that of making

coffins for departed canines. We in Canada have a better way. We neither eat the flesh nor enclose our defunct canines in a useless coffin, but we quietly plant old Tray beneath our favorite grape vine, and in after years we eat the grapes.

* * *

"Our Cocker Spaniels are fast becoming little black Beagles" said my doggie friend the other evening as we sat on the verandah enjoying our pipes and discussing the coming Canadian circuit, the judges, etc. "Some of the winning dogs have no more coat or feather than a ——" "What about the reds?" I interrupted. "They are even worse than the blacks" replied my friend, "not only are many of them short of coat and feather, but they are short in ear as well." "And yet," said I, "these dogs win whenever exhibited and because they *do* win are oftentimes used by breeders who have never seen them." "That's just the trouble, and if this sort of thing keeps on, we may soon expect to see winning Spaniels with a coat but one remove from that of a Mexican hairless. Our judges are responsible for this state of things" continued my friend, "for if we would win, we must either breed these short coated dogs or call in the services of an expert hairdresser." "You don't suppose Champion —'s coat was made to order, the same as your own do you?" I asked. My friend smiled at what he termed my "freshness." "It was, said he, only by different workmen; mine was made by a tailor, Champion —'s was made by a barber." After my friend had said "Good night," I quietly took down my CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE for December, 1891, and turning to the "Cocker Standard" read:—"Coat (10) should be *abundant*, soft and silky, straight or *wavy*, but without curl; chest, legs and tail *well feathered*," etc. What's the matter with the Standard anyhow?

It would appear that Rochester is not content with having crowded Hamilton out of the circuit, but must now do its little worst by holding a show on same dates as Ottawa. Whether it is successful in the attempt to work further harm, much will depend upon Canadians themselves. Ottawa should find no difficulty in securing as many entries as it can accommodate, and I trust that Canadian exhibitors will be governed by a proper national sentiment when deciding which show to patronize. There is a sufficient number of good dogs in Canada to assure the success of any show, and it is really too bad that Hamilton did not exhibit more independence, and refuse to be crowded out. In order to have peace it is sometimes necessary to fight for it, and that is what should have been done. The sequel proves that the time devoted to missionary work was lost.

* * *

Some agitation has been going on with the view of effecting an arrangement with the A.K.C., which will prevent the holding of Bench Shows in the United States under Club rules, on dates claimed by Canadians, and *vice versa*. In my humble opinion such an understanding would prove most disastrous to our kennel interests and lead to endless turmoil and confusion. We would soon see shows held independent of Club rules, for not one of the cities which now compose our Fall circuit (unless it be Hamilton) would consent to be crowded out by a show held in the United States—perhaps a thousand miles away—and which would not affect a Canadian show to any appreciable extent. It is only a question of time when there will be five Fall Shows in the United States to every one in Canada, and with such a treaty in force as has been suggested, we would fare none too well. The day has passed when we must rely upon United States

breeders for success in the show business, and the sooner we realize this, the better.
