Moved by Dr. Niven, seconded by Mr. Stewart that the fiscal year and membership year end on 31st August for the year 1893 and every subsequent year, with the understanding that the membership fee be due and payable on Sept. 1st after that date.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Bedlington, seconded by Mr. Stewart, that in clause 4 in the constitution, the paragraph "absent members may be represented by duly authorized proxies," be eliminated, and the following inserted: "An executive meeting shall be held one month previous to the annual meeting at which any member of the club can nominate any other member in good standing for any executive office. Nominations can be received by letter, providing the member nominated has given his consent to stand for the office. At the nomination, a record of all members nominated shall be kept by the Secretary, he to be authorized to send a ballot paper to each member by mail, stating on it the number required to fill each office, and a cross to be affixed opposite the names of the nominees the member wishes elected, each ballot paper to be signed by the member. The ballots to be counted on the night of the annual meeting by two scrutineers appointed by the President for the purpose, the ballots to remain in the envelopes, and only opened by the scrutineers. All members in good standing at time ballots close shall be entitled to vote and hold office. Ballots shall close, by resolution, on night of annual meeting.—*Lost.*

World's Fair.—Messrs. Wm. Saunders, Dominion Commissioner and N. Awrey, M. P. P., Ontario Commissioner, here entered, when it was moved by Mr. Glass, seconded by Mr. McEwen that order of business be suspended, and Messrs. Saunders and Awrey be heard.—*Carried.*

The Commissioners explained at length on what terms the exhibit of dogs would be taken by the Government, and on motion of Mr. Campbell supported by Dr. Milne it was unanimously decided to refer the whole matter of World's Fair to Executive Committee. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the Commissioners.

Breeder's Certificate.—Mr. Gorman's motion that a breeder's certificate, or other satisfactory evidence be sent in with each application for registration was declared. *Lost.*

F. H. F. Mercer.—Mr. Stewart's motion to re-instate Mr. Mercer was ruled out of order by the chairman.

Election of Officers.—On motion rule of procedure was suspended to permit of the election of officers which resulted as follows:

Patron.—Mr. Stewart's motion to appoint a patron.—*Carried.*

The following notices of motion were withdrawn, Mr. Stewart's to amend Section 7 of Rule 15; to change Rule 18; to change Rule 26. Mr. Murdoch's to amalgamate offices of Secretary and Treasurer.

Duplication of Names.—Mr. Mitchener's notice of motion that no two dogs of the same breed shall be registered in the C. K. C. S. B. under the same name, unless with a registered prefix or affix, was *Carried.*

Other notices of motion on paper were referred to Executive Committee.

By-laws.—Moved by Mr. Sweetnam, seconded and carried that constitution and by-laws be referred to Executive Committee for revision.

Secretary's Salary.—Moved by Mr. Glass, seconded by Mr. Stewart, that Secretary be granted a gratuity for present year of \$50, and that his salary for coming year be \$200.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Geddes, that meeting adjourn to Walker House at 7.15 p.m. to-day to devise plan and submit same to Commissioners.—*Carried.*

ADJOURNED EXECUTIVE MEETING SEPT

NOTES AND COMMENTS

THE POTTSBURG ST. BERNARD
KENNELS'

ST. BERNARD bitch, Phyllis, died a few days ago under rather suspicious circumstances. Phyllis was imported from England by Mr. Glass and was the dam of Champion Claudius recently

purchased by Dr. Warner, of Bridgeport, Conn., from Mr. Duerdon Dutton.

DR. WM. MOLE, V. S.,

of Hamilton, purposes shortly removing to Toronto, where he hopes to find a more extended field for the practice of his profession.

CANDOUR SOLD.

Mr. William Brodie did not long retain the crack Irish Terrier bitch, Candour, after her arrival in Canada, she being purchased by Mr. Jarrett of the Chestnut Hill Kennels, for \$500. This bitch won 1st in the open class and C. K. C. diploma for best bitch at Toronto, her first time out on this side.

THE SAME KENNELS

also bought Mrs. H. P. Harrison's Collie dog, Toronto Wonder.

THE A. K. C. REGULAR QUARTERLY MEETING

was held on the 15th September. C. M. Nelles' application for re-instatement was considered when it was decided that disqualification should continue till January 1st, 1893.

THE ATTENDANCE AT KINGSTON,

we are sorry to learn was very poor and the gate necessarily small. It seems hard to stir the townspeople up to a proper appreciation of the show and no doubt the fair having been held but two weeks before took much of the spare cash.

MR. A. D. STEWART

was a prominent figure running the St. Bernards for the best mover. The unanimous opinion was that he was the right man in the right place.

MR. H. P. THOMPSON, TORONTO, on Thursday evening, removed his Fox Terrier dog, Tom Tom, from the Ottawa show, supposedly for the night, but did not return it on Friday, taking it home with him. The Superintendent, Mr. Geddes, on finding the dog not benched on Friday grew quite anxious, fearing it had strayed away. Mr. Thompson, by his action, made himself liable for the forfeiture of his prize money.

ECHO OR PIOUS PEMBROKE?

A protest has been lodged with the C.K.C., against the win at Toronto of the Greyhound Echo, who was first in the open class. The protestor asserts that the dog is none other than Pious Pembroke, and was eligible for the challenge class and in that class should have been entered. He was afterwards shown at Kingston in the open class and at Ottawa in the challenge class under the name of Pious Pembroke. Mr. Geo. Thomas, who handled him for Mr. Purbeck and who made the entries, states that his kennel name is Echo, and that the dog was entered under this name by a mere accident.

PROTESTS AT OTTAWA.

A list of some dozen dogs who were entered in their wrong classes was made out to be protested for wrongful entry, but as the C.K.C. rule differs on this point from that of the A.K.C., and as some of the dogs had been previously shown at Kingston and Toronto under like circumstances, protest for this year was waived. It must however be distinctly understood that in future all dogs competing in Canada must comply in every detail with the C.K.C. rules or protest will be entered.

CHALLENGE CLASSES FOR ALL BREEDS.

We would here draw the attention of Canadian Show Committees, to the

importance of supplying challenge classes, no matter how small the prize may be, for all breeds. We have now in the country challenge dogs of almost every breed, and under the present rule if no challenge classes are provided these dogs are entirely cut out from competition as they are not eligible to compete in the open classes.

RED OBO SOLD.

Mr. T. McKay Robertson, Kingston, has bought from Mr. J. A. Spracklin the red Cocker dog, Red Obo (Red Roland—Devon Beauty), who won first at Kingston and first at Ottawa this year in the open classes.

MR. JOE LEWIS,

has bought from Mr. Alfred Geddes, Ottawa, the black Cocker dog, Donovan, who won first in the open class there. He has also to his credit second Montreal, first novice and third open class, Ottawa, 1891. He is well bred being by that great old stud dog, Obo Jr. out of Woodstock Flirt and is a little over two years old. As he has never been shown in decent condition he should do better in the hands of his new owner. Mr. Lewis also bought from Mr. Geddes, the Beagle bitch, Snow, (Champion Royal Krueger—Trissa W.) who won second in the open class, under 13 inches, at Ottawa.

MR. GEO. BELL'S

Cocker bitch, Troublesome, was awarded the blue ribbon at Ottawa by Mr. Curtis, but the win was protested on the grounds that she was not up to standard weight, weighing but 16¾ pounds.

MR. FRANK F. DOLE'S

Bull bitch, Lady Venus, by Rustic Swell—Ch. Rustic Lass, and who won first at Kingston was found dead in

her box on arrival at Ottawa. It is supposed that suffocation was the cause of death.

THE BOWMANVILLE ST. BERNARD KENNELS

have imported the prize St. Bernard bitch, Lady Alton. She is supposed to be in whelp to the famous Marvel, (Ch. Alton—Rennie.)

THE BULL TERRIER, CH. PRINCIPIO, has in this issue, been placed in the stud by his owner, Dr. Griffin, of Hamilton. It is unnecessary for us to do more than draw attention to this announcement, the dog being one of the best known of his breed in the world and his services should greatly advance the quality of future Bull Terriers in Canada.

THE RED COCKER DOG, RUFUS, was found dead in his stall on Thursday morning. The cause of death is being investigated. Since writing above we have learned that death was due to inflammation.

AN INHUMAN ACT.

If Canada had a Humane Society worthy of the name, Mr. F. W. Wilson, of Chatham, would ere now be called to account for the barbarous treatment received by an unfortunate boxful of dogs shipped to him at Toronto. Mr. Wilson may claim his man was inexperienced, and endeavour to lay the blame on him, but this would most certainly not relieve him of any responsibility. No less than seventeen large Great Dane puppies and two Fox Terriers were literally crammed into a carpenter's tool chest about 3 feet by 2 feet 6 inches. No ventilation

was provided except through a knot hole. On the box being opened nine puppies and a Fox Terrier were found dead of suffocation. We can find no words strong enough to express our disgust of such an occurrence and cannot but regret that no steps were taken to bring the guilty parties to justice.

BREEDERS ASSOCIATION.

So few fanciers responded to the call that the idea of forming a Canadian Breeders Association has, for the present, been abandoned.

MR. HENRY BROOKS OF WEST MEDFORD, MASS.,

suffered a heavy loss during the Toronto Show, by the death of his grand Scottish Terrier bitch Gerda. Gerda was lately imported from England and was a sister of his Kilroy. Rupture of the stomach was the cause of death.

ROCHESTER DOG SHOW

closed with an entry of about 100. "Straws show how the wind blows."

PRICK-EARED GREYHOUNDS.

Considerable fun was had at Toronto because of the judge awarding 3rd in the bitch class to Leonie, a decidedly prick-eared one. The past two years we have heard a good deal about a supposed prick-eared Greyhound, the judge at Toronto making considerable comment of it. It now remains for him to explain to an expectant public how he came to award 3rd prize to a bitch that frequently carries both ears as erect as it is possible for a dog to carry them.

AN INTERESTING CASE AT LAW.

The following dog case tried at Uxbridge, Ont., before Judge Dartnell in the Division Court on Sept. 20th, will no doubt be of considerable interest to dog owners and will form a precedent in future cases, and will prove that a dog is personal property and that no one has the right to take the law in his own hands. John A. McGillivray, Q.C., of the town of Uxbridge, owned an English Setter. A neighbor's son by the name of Twohy, was bitten by the dog, Mr. McGillivray being away from home at the time. Upon being informed of the matter, he ordered the dog to be taken out to his farm until such time that he could return home and attend to the case. The boy's father instead of waiting, followed the dog out to the farm, took him out of the barn where he was tied, and shot him. The following is the ruling of the judge: "The law permits the killing of a dog by any one by whom he is attacked, but it does not allow the aggrieved party to take the law into his own hands by killing the animal on subsequent occasion still less when the attack or injury has been inflicted upon another, even if a member of his own family. Anyone who adopts this course renders himself liable to a criminal prosecution. I find that the Plaintiff's dog was unlawfully killed by the Defendant, and I assign the damages at \$60. As to the counter claim it is essential to show that the dog is not only vicious but was vicious with the knowledge of the owner or harborer. There is no evidence as to this and I dismiss the counter claim." Judgment for the Plaintiff for \$60 full extent and costs, payable in fourteen days. Counter claim dismissed.

Mr. C. A. Stone was a witness in this case to prove the value of the dog, owning some of the same litter, and also to prove that the breed of English Setters as a general thing were not vicious.



TORONTO DOG SHOW.

THE entry this year was greater than ever before in Canada, numbering no less than 733, and quality in most classes showed improvement, though in a few there was a falling off.

We wish we could speak as warmly of the running of the show as of the entry, but must say that in many points it was lacking. Mr. Stone has entirely too much to do. The Superintending of the show would be ample for one man, who should have nothing to do in the way of clerical work. The catalogue also is a big undertaking and should be the work of one individual who has plenty of spare time. Several dogs were in the building before any straw arrived, and this caused loud complaints. The rings (two of them at least) were quite inadequate, and as no sawdust was forthcoming they became very dirty during the first day's judging. This was rectified later; we had the pleasure of acting as steward to Mr. Wheeler, and as his classes were large it was perhaps more noticeable. No can for disinfectants being provided, two of the committee paid for one out of their own pockets. As no chalk could be had anywhere in the building the blackboard in Mr. Wheeler's ring (?) was of course useless. During the first two days of the show some of the benches were dirty and untidy, and the men seemed to need the guidance of an experienced foreman. The feeding at least was well done, Spratts biscuits being used augmented by meat, and was plentiful. The plan of the catalogue was quite imposing, a description of each breed being given, but the printer, having in the first instance lost about half the

copy, made a fearful mess of the names, and misprints of all kinds were too common. No index of breeds or of addresses of exhibitors was given.

Part of the Committee worked and part, well—did not. Capt. Harston and Mr. Mitchener gave their entire time to the show, and were on hand early and late. Messrs. Kirk, Wilson and others also did well, and volunteers who did good work were Messrs. W. F. Fraser, A. Smith and R. G. Wilkie.

It was the general consensus of opinion that Mr. Stone had entirely too much to do and that he should have at least two more assistants. The show has outgrown the present arrangement. A little outlay of this kind will well repay the association, as the show has now assumed national proportions.

The criticisms on the awards—other than those on Spaniels and Fox Terriers which were penned by a Canadian specialist—were written by Mr. William Brodie, who, as we before announced recently arrived in Canada from Dunbar, Scotland.

JUDGES.

MR. JAMES MORTIMER, for Mastiffs, St. Bernards, Bloodhounds, Newfoundland, Great Danes, Deerhounds, Bull Dogs, Boston Terriers, Scotch Terriers, Dandie Dinmont Terriers, Skye Terriers, Black and Tan Terriers, Yorkshire Terriers, Toy Terriers, Poodles, Pugs, and the miscellaneous classes.

MR. JOHN DAVIDSON, for Pointers, English, Irish and Gordon Setters, Collies, Foxhounds, Beagles, Harriers, Whippets, Dachshunds, and Retrievers.

MR. C. H. MASON, for Irish Water Spaniels, Clumbers, Cockers, Field Spaniels, King Charles, Blenheims, Prince Charles, Ruby, and Japanese Spaniels, Greyhounds and Wolfhounds.

MR. F. C. WHEELER, for Fox Terriers, Bull Terriers, Irish Terriers, Bedlington Terriers and Italian Greyhounds.

MASTIFFS.—Challenge class—Only one entry in Elksen, a very fair dog, that is hardly characteristic enough in head properties. Open dogs—Beaufort's Beau, a big leggy, light-boned and poor-headed one won, Grimsby Caution and Minting Minor two very moderate specimens getting 2nd and 3rd respectively. Open bitches were also a poor lot, I preferred Bess, the 2nd prize winner to Attraction, she shows far more Mastiff character throughout, she certainly does look a bit aged, but still good enough to win.

ST. BERNARDS.—Aristocrat was the only entry in the four challenge-classes provided for this breed, he is a fine big upstanding dog, just long enough in fore face and hardly square enough in muzzle. In rough-coated dogs, open class, Lord Melrose had matters all his own way, he is not a particularly taking dog, he wants shadings, shows too much haw and could stand quite an amount of filling up in body, and is not the best of movers. Hesper's Son, 2nd, houndy in head and particularly slack in loins. Don Phyllis, 3rd, is far too long and narrow in face, he also fails in bone. Monk, 4th, slack in back and bad behind. Pre n'ier, V. H. C. is too small, not quite good in head, he is also very badly marked. Benmore, C. shows age and was badly turned out, hence his curly coat. In rough-coated open bitches, 1st Lady Ann, a very fair bitch, still a long way behind her kennel companion, Lady Gladwin who beats her in front, feet, massiveness and all round quality. Altonette from same kennel came 3rd, a leggy, badly-marked, narrow-faced one. The remainder are weeds. Smooth-coated dogs, open class, 1st Melrose, neither a rough or smooth, still a fair St. Bernard. Smooth-coated bitches, open class, 1st Miss Alton, a very nice bitch, just houndy enough

looking and her big ears help to make this more apparent. Neither Oscar nor Dictator the first and second in novice class will ever make good ones.

BLOODHOUNDS.—None worthy of note.

GREAT DANES.—Open dogs—Although numerous, contained nothing specially worth notice, except Maloch, who arrived too late for competition, we hear he was afterwards awarded an equal first. The winner in bitches turned up in Minerva's Fawn, a snipy faced one, who should have given place to the uncropped brindle, Kelpie, a really good one all round.

RUSSIAN WOLFHOUNDS showed up poorly. The fight in open dogs lay between Argos and Sarvanets. Argos got the award, which in my opinion should have gone to Sarvanets, a dog much after the Krillut type, that can beat Argos in every point except length of fore-face. Argos is a black, tan and white, and as smooth in coat as a Greyhound, while Sarvanets carries a beautiful long silky coat and is nicely fringed throughout. In Russian Wolfhound bitches, Princess Irma at present out of coat, won from Floyddeyka, a bigger and stronger made one, but failing in quality.

DEERHOUNDS.—Only two very poor specimens put in an appearance, and were each awarded the blue ribbon in their class.

ENGLISH FOXHOUNDS.—Open dogs, 1st Finder, a well made hound, splendid mover, and really good shower, still I preferred the old warrior, Genius, a most characteristic specimen. Benwell who came 3rd fails in head, and his neck and shoulders are all wrong. In open bitches, Vexation, a good quality one, all a stayer, won from a nice one in Gaylass, just small enough for a Foxhound.

AMERICAN FOXHOUNDS I don't know anything about, to me they appear a breed between a weedy Bloodhound and an English Harrier.

The so-called **HARRIERS** at this show must at some recent date have owned the crooked legged Basset hound as an ancestor.

In challenge **POINTER** dogs, 55 lbs. and over, Count Graphic had no opponent; and in bitches, over 50 lbs., Revelation won, with something in

hand from Devon Nell, a good bitch, showing age. Open dogs, 55 lbs. and over, 1st Westminster Drake, a very taking dog; 2nd Molton Banner, his wrinkled face, light eye and heavy shoulder tell against him. Count Grover is too wide between ears, and out at elbows. Pointer bitches over 50 lbs., open class, Josie Bracket wins well from Ighfield Madge, in head, eye and bone, the latter is also slack in back. Pointer dogs, under 55 lbs., challenge class, no entries. In bitches, under 50 lbs., Lady Gay Spanker, a very fair bitch, looking really well, had no opponent. Open dogs, under 55 lbs., 1st Rock II, a well got up dog, but far too cheeky; 2nd, Donovan, completely out of condition, also too light before eye, and evidently weak in back. Duke Graphic is not straight in front, and makes up for it by being too stilty behind, still with these faults he might have been 2nd as he is a far better all round dog than his fortunate rival. In open bitches Miss Rumour, not by any means a good one, was well ahead. Chaira, very bad in head properties, coming 2nd. Novice dogs or bitches, saw a really nice youngster in Brighton Don, at the head of affairs; it is a pity he is afflicted with St. Vitus' Dance. Axtels Baby 2nd, is too short in head, and full light eye. Really the remainder are not worth mention.

ENGLISH SETTERS.—Challenge class—Edgemark and Cambriana took the prizes in the dog and bitch section. Open dogs—1st Sultan, about the only English Setter dog in the show won, still he is far from being a flyer, all the rest in this class fail in head properties and are weak in bone. In open bitches a really good bitch in Lady Patch came out streets ahead of anything in the class. Esmeralda who got 2nd is wrong in ear carriage, and really a weed. In a country like this where so many sporting dogs are kept, why do not fanciers go in for the right sort. I am sure it would pay them far better in the end.

IRISH SETTERS made quite a show in themselves, some very good ones turning up. In challenge dogs a nice one in Tim got the award over Kildare only a good head to recommend him and might have given place to a really good bodied and typical dog in Duke Elcho. In challenge bitches a good

old one in Laura B. won, it must have been a close thing between her and Norma, a really grand-headed bitch failing only in size and substance to her fortunate rival. In open dogs, Pride of Patsy, 1st, is all wrong, he is peaked in skull, then his throatiness, even although he is got up for the occasion, wont pass muster, his neck and shoulders are extremely bad, he is what I should call dickey fronted. The best Irish Setter in the show was the V. H. C. Toronto Brownie, who although not in the pink of condition was streets ahead of anything in the class. He is a beautiful headed dog and his neck and shoulders are a study, his front legs and feet exceptionally good, a beautiful mover and in hind quarters very strong, a big, handsome workmanlike dog, the 2nd prize dog Kildare Glenmore is gone in front, and Montank Jr. is a weed. In open bitches Rose Sarsfield won well, but the 2nd, Irene, should have given place to her daughter, Toronto Mollie, one of the best youngsters in the show, her neck and shoulders are perfection, her head very good, and her legs, feet, front and hind quarters pronounce her a worker as well as a high-class show specimen. In novice class a good colored one in Toronto Jim won, he could stand some improvement in head properties. Elfrus 2nd, is out in front. In puppies, Don and Seminole Betsy won in their respective classes.

GORDON SETTERS.—Leo B. and Duchess of Waverly won in the challenge classes. In open dogs, 1st Count Noble, a bitchy looking dog with badly set on ears, Mount Royal Rush 2nd, I much preferred to him, he is a fine, big well-made dog, a trifle short in neck and hardly clean enough in shoulders. Duke of Wellington, 3rd, was not in it with the winners, he is completely wrong in type and formation of head. In bitches, Lady Gordon, a nice quality one, won; her kennel companion, Princess Louise, making a good 2nd. Mount Royal Wanda, 3rd, fails behind. All the winners in the novice classes are already noticed.

FIELD SPANIELS.—Black Field Spaniels were more numerous than last year, and the quality was better. Two well-known dogs competed for challenge honors—Beverley Negus and Newton Abbot Laddie. The former won. He

scores in head, coat and length of body, does not stand quite straight in front, is weak in pastern. N. A. Laddie, short in head, wide in chest, body deep, ribs well sprung, coat a little rough, moves badly behind. What Not alone in challenge bitches was given first. Some very good dogs mustered in the open class. Judex, 1st, has a fairly good head, ears long and well placed, nice coat, and stands on short, straight, well feathered legs. Warwick, 2nd, typical in head, nice, long, deep muzzle, eyes a shade light, a trifle up on legs which are not straight but will probably improve, shown short of coat and feather. This dog afterwards won first in the puppy class. Rab, a puppy of seven months was placed 3rd. He is fairly good in head, eyes too light, body long and ribs well sprung, legs strong but not straight. Corktown Cupid, a nice bodied dog, received the reserve card. He has a good skull but is rather shallow in muzzle, coat flat, legs strong and straight, might have been better placed. Wonder is a weed, head short, eyes light, body shallow, light in bone, was a lucky dog to get V. H. C. in this class. Black Pete II., V. H. C., thick in skull, undershot muzzle, too much top-knot, body too short for a Field Spaniel. Rosedale Bob, H. C., short in head, ears set too high, nice coat. Many of the dogs shown in this class were overgrown Cockers. In bitches, Grace, short in head and light in eyes was placed 1st, and Daisy Deane her sister, a little better in body, but faulty in head, 2nd. Dot Smirle, 3rd, (Dot Snivel in catalogue) has a beautiful head, nice straight legs, short in body and feather. Rosedale Princess, res., nice type of head, light in body and bone, coat good. Rosedale Romp, V. H. C., has a nice skull and muzzle, eyes rather light in color, bone light and short of feather. In the liver class for dogs and bitches, Queenie, 1st, has a long, lean head, good ears and body, shown in poor condition. Carlile's Napoleon, 2nd, is undershot, short in coat, and does not stand quite right in front. In the any other color class, the oft shown Billy met a judge who appreciates his quality (?) Billy is black and white, has a thick, chumpy head, undershot muzzle, short body away up on legs, and Mr. Mason must have been in a generous mood to place

him at the head of a class, H. C. would have been more correct. Carlile's Sam is Billy's Siamese twin, but a trifle better in body. Neither of these dogs should have been "in the money." In Field Spaniel puppies Warwick again scored, with Rosedale Brush a bit strong in skull, eyes light, good body and coat 2nd, while Rab was again placed 3rd.

COCKERS.—The quality of the Cockers, especially in the open class for black bitches, was quite as good as in former years, although the total number of entries shows a considerable falling off. This may be owing to the fact that the judge has had so little modern experience in judging this breed that the exhibitors of to-day could form no idea of the type he might prefer. However, all doubts upon this point were removed when he placed Fascination over Black Dufferin in the challenge class. Fascination is not nearly so typical as Dufferin judged by the Standard. He is short and chumpy in head, stop too deep, eyes too prominent, undershot muzzle—serious faults that ought to keep any dog from the top. He has a nice coat and body, ribs well sprung, does not move well behind, a trifle out at elbows except when posed for the judge's inspection, was shown in good condition, as usual. Black Dufferin has a more typical head, at times he carries his ears and tail a little gaily, body, coat, and feather first-class, stands on the best of legs and feet, looks as though he were good for a day's work; our choice for first place. Black Duke, well known, received the reserve card. Brant was on hand "for specials only." Back of the head he is probably the best dog before the public to-day. I Say had to give way to Amazement, better in head and body, eyes too light, straight front, coat rather short. I Say has grown strong in skull, which does not improve a muzzle always too light at the point. In challenge dogs any other color than black, Red Jacket was rightly placed first. He beats Red Roland in head and front, both are good in body; Roland is short of coat and feather. Bambo, res., has a fair head and body without a good leg under it. In bitches, King Pharo's Sister, rather toyish, beats Jessie C. in front and condition. Jay Kay, but a puppy, won in the open class for black

dogs. He is typical in head, except ears, which are rather short, coat short, and he stands a trifle up on legs, is probably at his best now. King Raven, Jr., 2nd, is a coarse puppy that won't be "in it" next year. Black Brant, 3rd, has improved on his last year's form, has very good legs, nice body and coat. Dono, 4th, is the same old dog, has a Dachshund front, and was not shown in his usual bloom. Black Graf, like most of the useful dogs got V.H.C. Bendigo, good body, short coat, and does not stand straight in front, eyes light. Fine Furs is sour in expression. Black bitches were a strong class, and the decisions proved a veritable surprise to Spaniel men. How a judge who has been credited with bringing that good bitch, Miss Obo II, to the front, and keeping her there, could place such miniature specimens as Troublesome—probably under 18 lbs.—at the top of such a class, is one of those things which "no fellah can understand." More especially is this the case when it is considered in connection with the fact that Miss Obo II had to be shown before breakfasting in order that she might not exceed the weight limit of 28 lbs. It was a sharp curve, but he took it. Troublesome is typical in skull, rather fine in muzzle and light in bone, good body, coat thin and short, lacking in substance throughout. Rideau Reine, 2nd, has a good skull, deep square muzzle, nice body and bone, straight front, was shown in poor condition. Madam Patti, 3rd, is not quite as good in head as the winner, but beats her in bone, body and coat. Rideau Flossie, 4th, has a beautiful head of the proper type, nice expression, strong straight legs, well feathered, should have exchanged places with the winner. Molly Bawn, V.H.C., is not a bad one, a bit heavy in head and light in eye, otherwise very typical. Ina, coarse in head, too long in body, nice coat and bone. Volo, sour in expression, and pinched in muzzle. In Cocker dogs any other color, a nice puppy, Red Obo, won. He is much like his sire (Red Roland) in head and front. Nugget, 2nd, coarse in head, ears set on high, not straight in front, nice body, coat and feather; must be near the limit of weight. Brownie B is pinched in muzzle, good body. In the other color bitches, Cherry Ripe,

a pretty little apple-headed Toy, won 1st. This bitch cannot, by any stretch of the imagination, be considered typical, and ought not to have been placed. Vick, 2nd, like most of the reds has a nice body, head not unlike that of a Beagle, shown too fat. Mono, 3rd, is weak in head, light in bone and out of condition. Rideau Robina, Res., is a nice headed bitch with the best of bone and coat—a useful sort and therefore could not win. Lady Roza, not right in muzzle, good coat and bone, looks like a worker. In the novice class, Jay Kay again scored with Red Obo and Red Fellow 2nd and 3rd respectively. The latter loses in head and front. Nip, Res., is on the large side, coat too profuse. In novice bitches Troublesome again won, Rideau Reine 2nd, same as in open class. Rosedale Duchess, 3rd, crowded Madam Patti out of the money. In puppy dogs, Jay Kay, Red Obo and Rosedale Roy, was the order, and in bitches, Troublesome, Raven Belle and Rosedale Duchess were the winners. The latter has not a good expression, eyes too prominent, nice ears, short coat and feather. Woodstock Bessie is short in ear. Many of the decisions rendered were most disappointing to the Spaniel men present, and we heard more than one breeder so express himself. "The Cocker fancy has been put back five years," remarked a prominent breeder, after carefully examining the dogs. We sincerely hope this may not prove to be the case. There is yet a chance to undo much of the wrong, and we trust this will be done if not in whole, at least in part.

IRISH WATER SPANIELS.—Dan Rice, 1st in the open class, is short of feather and topnot, and poor in coat. Justin McCarthy, 2nd, coarse in head, coat too open, legs straight without feather, but this cannot be said of his tail, which is profusely feathered. A lucky dog. The open class for bitches had Marguerite, for 1st. She is very typical, grand topnot, rich brown eyes, legs well feathered, coat very fair indeed, with little indication of feather, poor tail—probably the best bitch in Canada, if not in America. Flo Shaughraun 2nd, fairly good head, ears long, open coat,

and tail feathered. Biddy Donnelly, 3rd, was a lucky dog to receive notice. Sea Moss was absent. In puppies Dennis, a son of Marguerite's was 1st. He is now an undeveloped puppy but shows evidence of quality.

CLUMBER SPANIELS.—Champ. Boss III. was given 1st. He is well known. In the open class, Fop, was turned out of the ring on account of his eyes, which appear to be diseased, and the leggy Drake, although showing evidence of skin disease, was given 1st. Fop simply smothers his competitor in quality, and the judges decision was deemed harsh.

KING CHARLES SPANIELS.—Toronto Royal Duke, 1st, large and domy in skull, deep stop, face short, beats Royal Roy 2nd, in coat and color. In open bitches Topsy won over Ruby, rather small in head, eyes and coat good. La Fleur 3rd, has nice full eyes, and dense straight coat. Romeo alone in a mixed class, was given the blue. A single "Jap," rather pinched in muzzle, nice coat and feather, won in his class.

GREYHOUNDS.—Gem of the Season not in the best condition, won in the challenge class for dogs and Bestwood Daisy in that of bitches. In the open dog class Echo, first is a very plain headed one and considerably out in front. Justinian, a racy looking red and white, getting 2nd. Ranger a good looking one, fails a bit in head, neck and shoulders. In bitches Jetsam shown too fat and not in running condition got the award; 2nd, Lily of Gainsboro is not good in front, feet and hind-quarters; 3rd, Leonie, is prick-eared, and her head is none too good, she is also loaded in shoulder.

RETRIEVERS.—Only two entries, both wavy-coated and shown in very bad condition.

WHIPPETS.—1st, Boston Model ran a neck-and-neck race for his place with Maggie, a nice quality one who got 2nd; Tip 3rd was hardly worth his card.

BEAGLES.—Made a grand show. The majority are light in bone and could not possibly stand up to a hard day's work, it seems a pity that utility should give place to fancy. Tricotine the only entry in challenge dogs is not right in head, his coat is also on the soft side, in challenge

bitches Twintwo a good boned one, hardly correct in type, won from the good headed but heavy shouldered and soft coated Elf. Open dogs 15 to 13 inches; 1st, Joe, a typical dog, still light in bone; 2nd Diamond Forest is too wide between the ears; 3rd Sherry is snipy in face. Rallywood II., reserve, I liked as well as anything in the class, a good boned nice headed dog, with capital legs feet and coat. Another of the same stamp is Dustar, a great hound, but I hear he is over-sized, and consequently debarred from competing. Open bitches, 1st Parthenia wants stop, and should not have beaten that good bitch Rally, a grand headed and coated one, good in front and bone. Under 13 inches—The typical Royal Krueger was the only entry in challenge dogs, and Lou won well from the toyish Ada W. in the corresponding bitch class. In open dogs under 13 inches, the crooked fronted Laddie won well from the bitchy looking Little Wonder, who came 2nd; Bob Krueger, 3rd wants character, and his front is bad. Bitches under 13 inches, 1st Flora K. too throaty, off in muzzle, and her mouth is gone. Topsy S. is a good one all round, and should have won. Periwinkles, 3rd, a good coated high quality bitch should have come 2nd. The Reserve Butterfly is off on her legs, and her coat is softish.

FOX TERRIERS.—Perhaps no other breed in Canada has improved during the past year more than Fox Terriers. These active, gamy little dogs, are to be seen everywhere, and Cocker breeders must bestir themselves or be left behind in the race. The entries at this show exceeded those of any other breed, and were far in excess of last year. Very little fault can be found with the judging, considering the limited space allotted to the judge to do the work. The challenge class for dogs had but one entry, the well-known Blemton Trump. He is a bit wide in front, and does not move well behind. Beverwyck Punster, 1st in open class dogs, has a long head with small ears well carried, and stands on the best of legs and feet. Blemton Rattler, a heavily marked, long headed dog, of rather large size, capital front, 2nd Ruxton, 3rd, too strong in head,

eye light, nice straight front, bad feet, will probably grow too coarse. Rideau Rivet, res., is a nice size, a trifle cheeky in head, with the best of ears, appeared to be sick, or must have been better placed. Pawnbroker, V.H.C., stands a little wide, feet open, coat short. Stormy, a rather taking type, with well carried ears, good legs, feet too open. My Fellow has a nice long head, small eyes, ears a trifle heavy, but well carried, body not quite so cobby as we like. Tom Tom, too strong in skull, eyes shade light. Grouse II, first in the open bitch class, is cheeky, heavy in shoulder, grand body and coat—a good type. Rosa Canina, 3rd, a nice headed little bitch, with capital body, eyes rather full. Boscobel, nice head, ears large and badly carried, fair body, feet large and open. Hillside Baroness 2nd is a bit strong in head, nice body, heavy shoulders. Suffolk Riot, V. H. C., cobby body, good expression, ears a trifle large, stands rather wide in front. Bonaily Bell like most of B. Trump's progeny, is too strong in skull, and wide in front, grand body and coat. Speck has nice little ears and a good body with the best of legs and feet, ought to have been noticed. Damson, ears badly carried, nice body and coat, feet open. In puppy dogs My Fellow won, described in open class. Calchas, 2nd, heavy in skull and shoulder, ears large, feet turn out at pastern. Silver Saint, nice front, good coat, eyes light. Boscobel lacks substance, and does not carry her ears well. Timbrel has a good coat. The wire-haired Tinder Box won 1st in open dogs. He has a very good head, small well carried ears, good wirey coat, but is a bad mover, and lacks in quality throughout. Adswood Jim, 2nd, is a bit coarse all through, but has plenty of character, coat good, rather wide front. Stanley, 3rd, strong in skull, cobby, coat rather short. Suffolk Trimmer, V.H.C., long head, soft coat, legs too long, grand front. Suffolk Teaze, hard in coat, fine in head, does not carry her ears too well, capital front, feet rather long. Sister Trick, too large in ears, nice straight bone, short in coat. Novice winners were nearly all in open class, Ruxton 1st, Tom Tom 2nd, My Fellow 3rd. London Splinter, light in eyes, and large in ears.

Flash, heavy ears, hard coat. Pewter, strong in skull, small eyes, stands a little wide on good straight legs. In novice bitches Bonaily Bell won, with Boscobel 2nd, and My Queen, large in ears and eyes, 3rd. Tambourine, capital head with well carried ears, too heavy in shoulders, coat short. Dorothy, 3rd in puppies, is not cobby, and ears are large.

BULL TERRIERS—Mr. Wheeler began his work with these dogs and really deserves some leniency considering the difficulties under which he labored. His ring, or space allotted to him for such, was an alley-way between two rows of Terriers, and one row of Fox Terriers was benched on the floor, if such a "bull" may be allowed in this report. Consequently there was a continual trying to "get at" that was mutual between the dogs and, of course, this aided the judge immensely in his endeavors to get the right ones right. Streatham Monarch and Starlight were the challenge aspirants and worthily filled their positions. In open dogs (10) Principio, although gone off, still landed an easy winner. Second, Count II., is too cheeky. Third, Chatham Prince, has a very conspicuous Dudley nose, long, lathy body, narrow dickey front, a really shelly got up one. V. H. C., Silveo, a rare big one, great front and bone, really good head and an all-round, well-made one, in the pink of condition, should have been an easy second, while the other V. H. C., Ted Pritchard, an aristocratic looking small one, made a good bid for third place. In bitches (9) Lady Dinah was first, a small Dudley-nosed one, shown in nice order. Second, Kathleen Mavourneen, falls away below the eye and wants more bone. Third, Vesper Belle, one of the best Bull Terriers it has been my lot to look upon for a long time, a really grand one and should have won everything she was entered for. In justice to the judge, we must explain that she did not show herself to advantage in the ring, being young and timid, but venture to predict a great future for her. In puppies (8) Chatham Prince was first Vesper Belle second and Vixen third. I should have placed Vesper Belle first and the two unnoticed, Sweet Marjoram and Lorna Doon, second and third respectively, both are un-

cropped, but there is no getting over them, both having nailing good heads and in shape and substance all that can be expected at their age.

BOSTON TERRIERS were a mongrel-looking lot, small, bad bull-dogs with cropped ears.

Bijou was the only POODLE shown and was not the right sort.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS turned up well, in both numbers and quality. The principal faults in the exhibits being lightness in color of tan and want of thumb and pencil markings on legs. The majority are far too cloddy, not greyhoundy enough looking. In challenge dogs, Sultan won from Sir Wallace, the bitch class had no entries. Open dogs, 1st Salishury is not by any means a good one, he is light in tan and far too big and cloddy; 2nd Merry Monarch another of the same, he is also too long in body. The Black Earl shown in grand form is the correct size, and both colors and markings are perfect, had he won no one could have grumbled. Open bitches, 1st Lorrie; 2nd English Lady, both faulty in color and markings; 3rd Rochelle Topaz, a very nice one that might have won. Puppy class, 1st Lady Don, a nicely marked one showing a deal of quality, she is too snipy in face, and should not have beaten the Black Earl who got 2nd.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS are far from what we are accustomed to meet in the old country. There might have been some good ones amongst them, but it is quite impossible to pass any opinion on them, seeing all were shown in the rough, not even getting a rub down before judging.

IRISH TERRIERS.—A small but select lot of the "dare devils" turned up. They seem to be gaining in popularity on this side, and no wonder, either; their "hareum scareum devil may careum" look and character, and their kindly and affectionate disposition, endears them to all they happen to come in contact with. As companions they are unequalled, and as all round "sports" where is the dog that can look at them? In the challenge class Boxer IV. had a walk over, he is a fairly representative specimen of the breed, but is much over-sized. Open dogs saw that nice-sized, game-looking Terrier, Jack Briggs well to the front; he has improved much of late and is

now quite a first-class dog. I believe this win qualifies him for the challenge class; second, a fair dog of nice size in Saltus, is well built, and bar his weak, snipy muzzle and really bad coat I have little else against him. Commissariat, a fair uncropped dog, far too big, got third, and for once in his life Hanover Boy got his proper place at the foot of the class; his light gooseberry eye, dark shadings, snipy muzzle and extraordinary wide front are enough to keep him out of any competition. Bitches, the recently imported Candour won hands down here, and Mr. Jarrett, of the Chestnut Hill Collie Kennels, became so infatuated with her that he made her owner an offer of \$500 for her, at which price she passes into his hands. When it is considered that Candour is probably the best Irish Terrier bitch living, and that she is as yet little over her puppyhood, the price does not seem very big after all. Killarney Girl, a very fair cropped bitch, just full enough in eye, came in for second honors, and Salem Witch made a good third.

BEDLINGTON TERRIERS—Not a decent one in the lot.

DANDIE DINMONT TERRIERS—Open dogs, Amphion, a very characteristic mustard, got the coveted card. He is very washed out in color, and I preferred his "pepper" kennel companion, King of the Heather, to him. The latter is a good sort of Dandie, but not quite good enough in front. Rodger, a promising pepper puppy, made an excellent third, while Laird of the Heather and Goyoa brought up the rear. In bitches, Heather Madge, a very fine bitch, but badly turned out, won with a lot in hand. Kirsty has a good topnot, but is at present sadly out of condition. Mena, who got third, is also a fair good sort, but badly shown; Ainsty Daisy did not put in an appearance.

SCOTCH TERRIERS—These made a particularly meritorious turnout, and included some really first-class dogs. In open dogs Kilroy beat his kennel companion, Kilcree. As they stood to-day I would reverse the decision. Kilroy has the largest and strongest head, but it does not possess the quality or character of Kilcree's. Then in size, shape and carriage of ears, in legs and feet, and in shape and formation

of body Kilcree has it by a bit. Both are good dogs, and had the third prize one, Lovat, been a size smaller, either of them would have had to look to their laurels. A rare old-fashioned stamp is Scotch Hot, but he is not what is wanted nowadays. In open bitches, Culbleau won easily. A rare character bitch, full of quality and all over a Terrier; second, Grey, another old style one; third, Gipsy Yet, another of the same sort. Mr. Brooks of course won the kennel prize.

SKYE TERRIERS—The winner in dogs was old Sir Stafford, and he smothered Toodles. Islay, a capitally made one, won in bitches, though Endcliffe Maggie ran her close in head and coat. Scotch Rose was well behind these two.

TOY TERRIERS—All apple-headed specimens, fair as they go.

PUGS—These turned out well and some of the best we have were on hand. Bonsor scored his first win under his new ownership, beating Bob Ivy in body especially. Cassina was the winner in bitches. That good little dog Dixie won well in open dogs, I spoke of him fully in Lexington report last year. He beats Patsey Bolivar in body and head and carriage of ears, the latter's head being dark and coarse but well shaped, rather large sized. Drake Howard, third, does not carry his ears right and is rather long in body. Penrice boy has not improved on puppy form. Sara Bernhardt, well-known, won in the next class, beating Midget who is quite a nice one, though her ears are carried wide. Mint, third, is too flat in skull. The winning pup is quite a promising one though rather dark. The kennel prize fell to "Square Deal" Eberhardt. (From *Forest and Stream*, our report having mis-carried.)

COLLIES—Made a good show. Taken as a whole, the general quality is far from being up to the mark. Certainly such dogs as Christopher, Wellesbourne Charlie, Conrad II, Charleroi II, Ch. Flurry II. and a few more old country heroes and heroines helped to elevate the tone and saved this section from being a failure. In challenge dogs Roslyn Wilkes and The Squire did not put in an appearance, and as Ormskirk Shep turned up too late for competition, Charleroi II. had no opponent to dispute his right to the

coveted honor. He is at present in very good form, although I should like to see his coat flatter. He looks good for a long while yet. Bitches saw old Ch. Flurry II. again to the fore, a remarkably fine headed bitch for her years. (I am informed that this is the last of her on the show bench; her owner intends giving her a rest for the remainder of her pilgrimage here.) Ch. Metchley Surprise, a small but very typical black and tan, getting the reserve number. In open dogs Christopher, "the beautiful," experienced no difficulty in winning from Conrad II, who was looking remarkably well indeed, and, bar his gayly carried tail and faulty ear carriage, would take some beating. Both were shown in faultless condition, and considering the trying weather they have recently passed through, I think a word of praise is due to their kennelmen for the excellent trim in which the dogs from these two representative kennels were turned out. I refer to the Chestnut Hill and Hempstead Farm kennels. I could not agree with the award that put Samson third. He is a very big dog, but that's about all that stands to his credit. In no instance should size give place to Collie character and quality. This dog has really no Collie character about him; he is far too long in body—a regular funeral—while his expression is sulky and sour, and he gets his tail over his back like a Pomeranian. I should have put the H. C. Toronto Wonder in this position; he is a really a high-class Collie, beautifully marked, very showy sable and white, good head; nice ears, fair legs and feet, and although not in first class condition, carries a great coat of the proper texture; bar the winners he is streets ahead of anything in the class. The Reserve Moonstone is far too cloddy. Drury, V.H.C., is too short and thick in head. Bute V.H.C. is thick in skull and ears badly carried. Open bitches (11) were not a brilliant lot by any means. First, Nancy—a Ch. Eclipse bitch—a big roomy one, carrying a great coat; her head is a bit faulty, but she should make a valuable brood bitch if suitably mated; second, Dudley Chris, is wrong in type, a lank-ey, settery looking animal; third, Highland Floss, is a dark sable and white, small but full of character, at present

out of coat, but looks as if she carried an enormous one when in form; fourth, Auchairnie Lassie, a racy looking, showy black, tan and white puppy; beautiful head and ears; good coat, legs, feet and front; tail carried correctly, all over a good one; had she been placed first no one could have grumbled. Reserve Crissey, a very smart black, tan and white, at present out of coat, will do better some other day. In novice dogs (8) Wellesbourne Charlie was first, the rest nowhere. This is a remarkably fine dog; his head and ears are just as near perfection as it is possible to get them; he carries an enormous coat of correct texture; in legs, feet and front he is unexcelled, and in size, shape and substance all that can be desired, in other words, "a flyer." Novice bitches, first Dudley Chris, second Viola, too toyish, very bad feet, wide in skull and short in face; she carries, however, an enormous coat of very fine texture; third, Beulah is too weedy; V.H.C., Auchairnie Lassie should have easily won, with the small but typical Orange Lass second. Dog puppies: (7) Lawrie, a black, tan and white, with good head and ears, fair coat, nice bone and showing a deal of quality, won; a very promising sable and white puppy in Roslyn Charlie, by Wellesbourne Charlie, getting second; he only requires time to make a good one. Third, Forest Boy, a thick skulled brute, a long way behind. Bitches: (5) third Auchairnie Lassie, bad luck still clings to her, two small, weedy, unattractive puppies in Stell and Christian getting first and second respectively.

BULL DOGS.—These classes did not fill to expectation. Our old friend Carisbroke led in challenge dogs, and I never saw him looking better. The ladies' class did not fill and in open dogs only one, Brian Boru, who has not a bad head, he needs a sturdier body and is a little leggy. Lady Venus took an unopposed first in her class, she shows a good foreface, though skull should be fuller and higher, she is well out at shoulder and is a smart dark brindled little bitch.

THE KINGSTON BENCH SHOW.

THE show was held in the same spacious rink as last year with surroundings unequalled in America, and it is not surprising that the handlers looked forward to Kingston as a place at which they might rest and enjoy themselves, and feel that their dogs would improve or at least not go back in condition. The weather was favorable for the opening. The judges were all present and ready to begin on time. It was generally felt to be a mistake to commence on Monday. It is a pity that some arrangement was not made this year as last as to keeping dogs in the intervals between the shows.

The show was kept perfectly clean and so well disinfected that not even the smell of a dog could be detected. The Sanitas special apparatus is used in various parts of the building. The work of the show is systematically done and general satisfaction prevails. Mr. Corbett, the Superintendent, was in still better form than last year and the genial H. C. Bates was as courteous and useful as ever.

Unfortunately the attendance of visitors as compared with last year was very poor, and under such discouragements the Kingston Kennel Club has shown great pluck and enterprise

in holding a show at all, we trust they will not lose heart. There is no show in America at which the dogs can be so well seen perhaps, as the rink can hold a vast number of people without crowding. The dogs have most comfortable roomy stalls littered with plenty of good straw. They were unusually well supplied with water and had Spratts biscuits with meat and broth for food.

The entries numbered about 240 and quality on the whole was better than ever before. Mr. Laidlaw wanted to get away and Mr. Tallman had a large number of classes, so they went to work in two spacious rings on the first afternoon. The former had finished his work before night and Mr. Tallman had got through most of the sporting classes. Dr. Mills began on Tuesday morning and concluded his task in good time.

The judging all through was carefully done and has given general satisfaction so far as the writer is aware.

Dr. Mills in judging acted up to the principles he advocates, and Mr. Tallman was very careful and moved all his dogs well. In fact, when judging Dr. Mills' special for the specimen with best limbs and movement in the Mastiff and St. Bernard classes, the way in which he raced the big ones up and down the space in the big rink for 50 yards caused much merriment, and eclipsed entirely anything seen under the judging of Setters, Pointers and Spaniels of last year. But it is what we must come to and a great deal more that now is unusual. No one will complain that Mr. Tallman was too generous in his awards though some may think he was at times rather severe. The writer is himself of that opinion, and will point out instances in the various classes. It is well to avoid muddling and befooling exhibitors as to the character of the dogs they show, but we must also beware of discouragement.

It would be a grave omission not to mention the catalogues. Kingston is always away ahead in printing. A neat catalogue was ready the first day and a correct and beautiful marked catalogue was to be had for 10 cents

on Wednesday. The rags that some shows call catalogues are to be discouraged.

MASTIFFS.—This breed is plainly declining at present, as only six specimens were shown in Toronto in the open classes and but one at Kingston. Attraction winner of 1st in the open bitch class at Toronto was the sole representative here. She is a fawn with good dark markings; a fair all around animal shown much too thin. The ribs of a Mastiff should not appear as in a Pointer, much less a Greyhound.

ST. BERNARDS.—Very properly the St. Bernards were divided into rough and smooth. Altogether the display of this breed excelled anything that has been seen in Canada before this year, and most of the dogs were fairly good, some in excellent condition. There were also few downright poor ones, while some are among America's best. Challenge dogs and bitches—Aristocrat was no mean representative. He is well known. He was not a good competitor for the prize for the best mover, nor was the grand Lord Melrose either. Rough dogs, open class, Lord Melrose well known was easily 1st, in fact the only good one in the class. The judge was rather liberal when he gave Baldus 2nd, Oudius was so bad in coat, head and expression H. C. was all he could get. Rough bitches, open class, two fine specimens from Col. Ruppert's Kennel put in an appearance. The 2nd prize winner has a wonderful skull, and the whole head is suggestive of high quality, but Lady Gladwyn is not only the largest but to my mind the best bitch on the whole, and has fewer weak points. Both move well. Smooth dogs, open class—This class brought out that rare good one and excellent mover, Melrose. It is a great pleasure to see a St. Bernard that can gallop like this one, and at the same time be as he is a typical representative of the breed. His disposition also seems to be all that can be desired. Smooth bitches, open class—I do not like this winner so well as her brother. She moves well, but her head is suggestive of the bloodhound. Time may remedy this to some extent possibly.

GREAT DANES.—Dogs and bitches were classified together. The judge did not allow Minerva's Fawn to compete,

she being owned by him. First was given to the winning dog at Toronto, Don Caesar, Jr. He has a poor eye and uninviting expression; is weak in muzzle and throat; but his body is of nice formation and his legs, feet and movement rather good. He has a ring tail and an almost undecipherable color. He looks however a Dane, which is more than can be said of many shown during the last two years at Toronto.

MISCELLANEOUS CLASSES.—Divided by sex, the quality of the dogs in these classes was much above the average as there were no nondescripts. Dogs—First was given to the Dachshund Fritz, a fairly good specimen that might have a little more quality in head; 2nd went to a black poodle of pretty sound formation, but not in the best of coat; 3rd to a Deerhound without conspicuous faults and much more true to type than the Wolfhound Sarvanets. The latter has good legs and feet and is fairly well muscled. His head is not bad but his coat is almost curly and his back and loins are quite straight so that he is far away from type. A Pomeranian was given V. H. C. He is too large and not right in head. In the bitch class three nice specimens and an indifferent Yorkshire terrier were the competitors. The wolfhound Flodeyka is a fairly good representative of the breed and was given 1st. Jesse Victoria a dachshund bitch of much quality but shown too thin was placed 2nd, and a rather nice whippet 3rd. It was close between these three. Newfoundland had no entries.

By our Special Reporter.

As many of the dogs shown at Kingston have been noticed in the report of the Toronto show and others will be described in the Ottawa report, a detailed account of some classes will not be given as it would only lead to repetition.

GREYHOUNDS.—Challenge class—Gem of the Season, seen in better condition, was placed over Bestwood Daisy. In the open class, dogs, Justinian being absent, Pious Pembroke got 1st without opposition. Open class bitches, Lilly of Gainsboro was placed over Jetsam, a reversal of the Toronto decision which was correct. Jetsam

moves without spirit and none too freely.

BEAGLES—Not numerous but fairly good. The Rambler won 1st in the challenge class and a special; 2nd in the open class was won by a local dog, a well made specimen, but rather too large.

ENGLISH SETTERS.—As a whole these were not of the best type, many of the dogs being too much up on the leg. Challenge dogs—Edgemark was the only competitor. He does not improve in head which is a little lacking in quality. Was given 1st. Open class, dogs.—Sultan the winner is a nice dog, though a bit leggy. Has a good head, outline, front, etc. but is somewhat straight in stifle and has not the best action behind. Ben Hur, 2nd, is heavy in skull. Locksley II, 3rd is coarse and rather short in head. Sir Harold V.H.C. could be improved in head and stifle. Open class, bitches.—Forest Louise, 1st, is much nearer modern in type than most of the English Setters shown. She has poor feet, but on the whole is not a bad one. Maid of Kent has good legs and feet, but lacks the quality of the 1st bitch. The Oak Grove Kennels Irish Setters and Mr. J. Lewis' dogs were entered but did not put in an appearance at the show. Novice dogs and bitches—Jack the Ripper had as bad a head as name and was properly not noticed. *Sultan was an easy winner in this class. H. C. was given to Earl, a tall, ill-made dog, with an Irish Setter head while a fair specimen in Jess Howard got nothing. These two awards are hard to explain.

IRISH SETTERS were a great improvement on last year. The Challenge class was divided by sex, Ch. Tim being alone in the class for dogs got 1st of course. Laura B. in fair condition won over Elfreda shown in good form. Open class dogs—The Toronto winners were ahead here. A local dog, a fair specimen, won 3rd. Elfrus and Elfrin are not yet developed. Open class, bitches—Claremont Heather defeated the bitch placed over her at Toronto, easily as it seemed to me, in fact is a very nice specimen of a good type. Novice class—A promising seven month's puppy was given 3rd. The others won before.

GORDON SETTERS were much in advance of last year, not a downright bad one being shown. Challenge class divided by sex, which placed Leo B. alone and 1st. In the challenge bitch class the Duchess of Waverley was correctly placed over Hilda. Open class, dogs—Mount Royal Rush won easily, the 2nd dog stands on good legs but is too high and is heavy in head. Mt. Royal Spruce afterwards 2nd for the special for muscling and general condition to his sire, Leo B. was not placed in the open class. He is low on the leg, not good in tail action, but is soundly built though with a rather heavy head, the judges entirely overlooking him was, in the writer's opinion, the worst error made by him in the entire judging. Open class, bitches—The Toronto winners were 1st and 2nd again. Mt. Royal Wanda was 3rd and Mt. Royal Floss V. H. C. Annie Gordon has the most quality. There is room for difference of opinion as to 2nd and 3rd. Wanda is the most soundly made, being better in bone, pasterns and muzzle and is a nice mover being very free in shoulders. Louise excels in bone and stifle. Floss loses in character of head.

POINTERS.—Devon Nell looking well won. Open class, dogs.—The dogs were not of a good type, both of them rather coarse, but Donovan the worst. Open class, bitches—Chaira won easily, Juno is a tolerably all round bitch. Smut M. is a block, poor behind and in action, with a fair head but too lippy. Frivolity, 3rd at Toronto was unnoticed. She has excellent body and legs and is a grand mover. The judge objected to her on the ground of bad tail, short head, defect in eye and lack of symmetry in face, a purely imaginary fault. I cannot agree with him. In novice dogs and bitches, Charia repeated her win with Juno 2nd, Bell Bird was 3rd: she is a nice mover and well made in body with rather good legs and feet; is poor in head and shown too soft.

IRISH WATER SPANIELS, divided by sex.—Dan Rice, Biddy Donnelly and Marguerite all seen at Toronto were the competitors here and placed in the same order. Maguerite is a beautiful specimen that will do much to give true ideas of the type. Spaniels

were satisfactorily judged by Mr. Andrew Laidlaw.

CLUMBER SPANIELS.—Only one, Darby, a fair specimen shown in pretty good condition and he took 1st.

FIELD SPANIELS, open class, dogs and bitches.—Queenie 1st is of correct type but in only fair condition. Wonder 2nd has a straight coat but might be better in head and front legs. Sport 3rd is crooked in legs, coat curly, high on the leg, wrong in head and in fact not a Field Spaniel. The prize should have been withheld in the writer's opinion.

COCKER SPANIELS were fairly numerous. The judging of this breed seems to be encouraging a small dog with head not far removed from that of a toy Spaniel, and, without exception almost, conduces undershot jaws and crooked legs. The writer's views have undergone no change. So long as we breed dogs so small, so low and so long we will get crooked legs, and until judges penalize undershot jaws and bad teeth as well as crooked legs, will unsound dogs be bred. I doubt if a single winning Cocker can be found to-day with absolutely straight front legs. Very heavy bone is also often associated with curvature. Challenge dogs and bitches, divided by sex.—Fascination badly undershot won 1st; Ch. Brant is not right in muzzle. Amazement won in the bitch class. Open class, dogs.—Jay Kay better in legs than most specimens is a nice little dog, on the small side, coat of good quality but not abundant enough. He is young but is already a little undershot. Dono 2nd, is very bad in front legs, shown in poor condition. Open class, bitches.—Rideau Flossie defeated the Toronto winner Troublesome. She is better in size, bone, quality of coat, muscle, &c. She is a really well muscled bitch and quite small enough, Volo 3rd is fair as to size. Molly Bawn was V. H. C. Other than black, challenge dogs and bitches.—Ch. Red Jacket won over Jessie C. in legs and head, though he is not all that could be desired in skull. Other than black, open class, dogs.—Rufus, thick in skull but excelling in bone, muscle and movement had to yield to Red Obo. Red Fellow is a promising puppy of

4½ months the catalogue states. Why was he shown? All this as well as litters at Toronto is an evasion of the C. K. C. rules. Open class bitches.—Cherry Ripe the Toronto winner was 1st here also; very small and with a head that suggested to many people the Toy Spaniel. Certainly a very nice toy dog Lady was 2nd. Novice class, any color. The judging was a little puzzling in one or two instances. Rusty one of the soundest dogs in the class got only C. If he was quite wrong in type he should not have been noticed. He stands higher than most Cockers but is a good all-round specimen. But it really looks as if a sensible sort of dog cannot win under present standards and judges.

COLLIES were much the best lot seen at Kingston as yet. They were placed as at Toronto, Roslyn Dandy being put over Metchley Surprise in the challenge class for dogs and bitches. Metchley Bob 2nd last year in the open class got V. H. C.

BULL-DOGS had two entries, Carisbrooke won in the class for challenge dogs and bitches and Lady Venu in the open class. Both were shown at Toronto.

BULL TERRIERS showed much improvement. Ch. Starlight won 1st unopposed in the challenge class for dogs and bitches. The open class was for dogs and bitches. Ch. Principio was absent and the others were shown at Toronto.

FOX TERRIERS made large classes. Blempton Trump was alone in the challenge class and was given 1st. The awards in the open classes were in the main the same as at Toronto; but some of them are hard to reconcile with some of Mr. Tallman's other work. If it is right to completely ignore the English Setter Jess Howard, the Gordon Spruce and the Pointer Frivolity, how is it right to give a Fox Terrier with such ears as Dudley Slave V. H. C. But I suppose there are some things past finding out in the awards of all judges. In wire-haired dogs, Tinderbox 1st at Toronto was 2nd here, while Suffolk Trimmer V. H. C. at Toronto was 1st. The classification in Terriers was not worthy of the entry which was large in the case of Scotch, Skyes and Dandie Dinmont. I cannot agree with the award that

placed the Dandie 1st in this class. He has not enough character and should have given way to one of the Skyes or Scotch; but it is a hard task to judge so many breeds together. Irish, Bedlington and Airedales had to be entered together regardless of sex with the result that several of the Irish in the estimation of the judge proved too much for the Bedlington.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS brought out some good ones, but they were all seen at Toronto.

THE TOY SPANIELS were also shown at Toronto.

PUGS.—Challenge class, dog and bitch, Bonsor was again placed over Bob Ivy. In open dogs, a local specimen fair in head won 3rd. He is perfection in color, and in these days a pug of good color is a rarity.

FOX-HOUNDS had two fair entries, though one Jack was shown grossly fat.

While in some instances the writer could not agree with the judge's awards and has stated this candidly, he also records with pleasure that he has never seen dogs judged more in harmony with the views he holds and advocates than by Mr. Tallman. This gentleman has done his work well and made many friends in Canada, by the fair and kindly spirit he has shown.—*Mount Royal*.

INTERNATIONAL FIELD TRIALS.

Owing to the fact that the judges selected for the International Field Trials, to be held near Chatham, November 8th, were not able to give decisive answers as to whether they could act at the time of the closing of the entries for the Derby, October 1st, the date of closing has been extended to October 15th, at which time the entries for the all-aged and amateur stake will also close. The judges who have kindly consented to act are:—Wm. Brailsford, of Whitchurch, England; F. W. Eddy, of Detroit, Mich.; and Montague Smith, of Forest, Ont. Already entries enough have been received to ensure success of the Derby, but more are expected. Everything points to a successful meeting. Birds are plentiful, although owing to the early nests being destroyed by the heavy rains in June they are still very small. By the time of the trials, however, they will be well grown. The fields are well covered with rag weed, so that the work will be more in the open than last year, when the fields were almost bare, the birds going to the bush on the first flight. A new feature of the trials will be the amateur

stake which will be run on November 7th, the day before the regular trials begin. It will be for dogs broken and run by amateurs. All those sportsmen who have good ordinary shooting dogs should show that they appreciate the action of the club in providing a stake especially for them by entering their dogs. The entrance fee is \$3, all of which will be given to the competitors in either cups or cash; 50 per cent to first, 35 per cent to second and 15 per cent to third. The judge for this stake will be chosen by the competitors on the ground.

DR. W. H. DRUMMOND, MONTREAL,

advises us of the safe arrival of a fine litter of Irish Terriers from his Annandale by Commissariat. They were whelped on September 15th, six dogs and two bitches. It may be remembered we noted the arrival of this brace of Terriers, from Belfast, some few months ago.

It is intended, early next year, to give if possible, a Club Show at which Fox Terriers only shall be exhibited, for it is thought that such a fixture as this if held annually will do much to stimulate the breeding of pure Fox Terriers, and encourage local breeders to persevere in their efforts in this direction, and it is hoped also that Club Cups or Medals may be provided for competitions annually amongst the members. Pressure will be brought to bear on all Bench Show Committees in Canada, in the hope of inducing them to provide separate classes for smooth and wire-haired dogs, and to give prizes of the same value for the Fox Terrier classes as are now given for larger but by no means more important dogs.

You will understand that whilst all are welcome to our ranks, we require most of all those who admire the Fox Terrier and are interested in his breeding and welfare.

OTTAWA DOG SHOW.

THIS nice little show passed off pleasantly in all respects with the exception of the unfortunate Troublesome incident. The entries show a falling off since last year, the deficit lying mainly in the Spaniel classes, but the quality in most classes was all that could be desired, and in many cases far in advance of former years. Being the last show of the Canadian circuit, most of the poor ones were weeded out and but the cream of the "rounders" competed. The building though not extravagantly put up is suitable, well-lighted and airy without being draughty. It was large enough for the number of dogs benched, but would not comfortably hold many more. The committee hopes to be able to induce the Association to either renovate and extend the present building or else put up an entirely new one.

The feeding was well done, "Spratts" being used, and there was plenty of it. The aisles and benches were kept clean and sweet and disinfectant was plentiful, "Sanitus" we believe was used. The exercising yard is of fair size and always dry; during the last day which was very warm it began to be a little unpleasant. Mr. Geddes the Superintendent, had the details of his work well in hand, and every thing as far as we could see moved along smoothly and with little friction. Mr. Keyes the chairman, and other members of the committee were on hand to make things pleasant for exhibitors, but the main portion of the work lay

on the Superintendent's shoulders. Mr. Keyes took charge of the catalogue which was neat in "get up" free from errors, and nicely printed on good paper. These minor things are appreciated by visitors and exhibitors alike.

The attendance was poor which is to be regretted. The catalogue called for 192 entries, which with few exceptions were present.

POINTERS—*C. H. Corbett, Judge.*—The competitors were all at Kingston. Devon Nell was alone in the challenge class. Rock II. and Donovan were the competitors in the open class. Donovan is a poor specimen, with a head and a body to match. Rock II. is rather cheeky, very square at back of skull, heavy and coarse in head, very straight behind, coarse in tail and with foxhound rather than pointer character. He is a very strongly made dog, with lots of bone and muscle, and good legs and feet, but is withal a poor dog as a pointer. In the open bitch class the competitors were placed in this order, Chaira, Lord Graphic's Juno and Frivolity, which is correct. All have been referred to before.

ENGLISH SETTERS—*C. H. Corbett, Judge.*—Edgemark, alone in the challenge class, won. He does not improve in head, which lacks refinement. Sultan, now well known, won well in the open class for dogs. Ben Hur was second and Tony Gladstone, third, rather coarse in head, was placed over Kent's Rex, better in head, but out of condition. Locksley II. got H. C. He is very coarse in head. In the bitch class Annie, good in bone, poor in head, long coupled, in poor condition, and knuckling over when walking, was placed over Forest Louise, light in bone and open in feet, but otherwise a nice bitch. This award might have been reversed.

IRISH SETTERS—*C. H. Corbett,*

Judge.—These made the best showing yet seen at Ottawa; in fact were a show in themselves. With the exception of two local dogs, there was not a poor one in the classes. The Oak Grove Kennels furnished five challenge dogs, and these, with Elfreda, made a grand lot. The judge selected Duke Elcho for first place, but it might better have fallen to Norna or Kildare, for Duke Elcho has become coarse in skull. The open class for dogs furnished two good ones in Pride of Patsey and Kildare Glenmore. Pride of Patsey won well. He is light in color, might be better sprung in ribs and carries his tail very high; but in all other respects he is such an one as is rarely met. His rival loses to him in head, depth of chest, outline, etc., Elfrin, Res, and Elfrus, V. H. C., are still young and undeveloped. Bismark in open dogs and Mona among the bitches are very poor ones. Rose Sarsfield, first in bitches, wins well from Irene. She is beautiful in head and good generally, though rather straight behind and light in color. Irene loses in head, coat, outline and general quality. Pride of Patsey was given the special for the best of the breed. To place him over all the challenge dogs and bitches was a bold step, and only warranted after careful comparison.

GORDON SETTERS—*C. H. Corbett, Judge.*—With the exception of Royal Nibbs, a coarse and poor specimen, the dogs shown were seen at Toronto and Kingston, and were placed here in the same order. Leo B. and the Duchess of Waverly were given equal firsts, and Leo B. the special.

JUDGE'S REPORT—*DR. WESLEY MILLS.*

I have at the outset to thank the superintendent, ring stewards and others for their courtesy and assistance, and the exhibitors for their readiness in placing and moving their dogs, thus

assisting me to get at their real qualities. It was a pleasure to find the show so clean and sanitary in all respects.

MASTIFFS.—Mastiffs were not well represented, as only three specimens competed, not one of these being first-class or in thoroughly good condition. Eaufrid was the best of a medium pair in the open class. He has a bad light eye, a deformed skull, and is smutty in color in parts. His head and form generally are passably massive, his legs fair and feet good. Hero, second, a young dog, is clearer in color, with a fairly good coat. Ears not black enough. He is much undershot, while the winner of first is level in jaws. At present he is light in build. Ealderman was absent. Attraction, the only bitch, was seen at Toronto and Kingston. She was shown very thin. Her muzzle is not right, but her color is fairly good and her mask excellent; feet and legs fair.

ST. BERNARDS.—St. Bernards were few, all from Col. Ruppert's kennel, but made the best show of this breed yet seen at Ottawa. They were well looked after by this kennel's competent and gentlemanly representative. Aristocrat, alone in challenge class, seems to bear the wear and tear well. He is too well known to need description. I preferred Lady Gladwyn, not in as good condition, for the special for the best of the breed. As at Kingston, Lady Gladwyn was placed over Miss Anne. The latter has a head of much quality and character, losing to Lady Gladwyn in squareness of muzzle, but superior in some respects, *e. g.*, ear; but in legs, feet, general build, massiveness, she is superior, and taking her as a whole I had no doubt about placing Lady Gladwyn first again. Both move well and are very fine bitches. Altonette is of a different stamp, too tall for her bulk and generally much behind these two.

NEWFOUNDLANDS.—A single dog represented this breed, and but for a curly coat and rather close hock movement he is not a bad one. In head, expression, color, texture of coat and eye he is a good one.

GREYHOUNDS.—Gem of the Season seen in better condition easily defeated Pious Pembroke and Bestwood Daisy, a beautiful animal, lacking in substance. Pious Pembroke competed for the first time in the challenge class. These are all so well known they do not need description. In the class for open dogs Justinian had an easy win. At first sight he is not a taking dog, wanting those curves which add so much to a greyhound's appearance. He bears examination well. His head is good, legs and feet excellent, front straight but might be a little narrower, shoulders well placed but with too much width between the blades, ribs well sprung, back straight and well muscled, loin rather flat but strong and quarters good with second thighs not equal to some other parts; hocks good. Gem of the Season easily beat him, however, for the special. Jack of Napanee, second, is weak in head with brow too marked, straight in shoulder, short coupled and in soft condition. In the open bitch class Lily of Gainsboro defeated Jetsam. The latter was shown fat and soft, which exaggerated her faults and possibly concealed her merits, for no man can tell what a fat animal may be when in proper condition. She has a very fine head, good legs, neck and feet, is strongly rather than gracefully made, and was rightly defeated by Lily that has both strength and grace. Jetsam is a poor mover, is flat in loin and rather straight in stifle. Lily is not so good in head, is narrower in front but moves in a way that raises a suspicion of weakness in front. She excels in chest and is good in loin and quarters; the arch in loin begins and ends too soon. Galatea is a poor one,

very wide in chest and not straight in legs, rather low in the leg and flat in loin.

DEERHOUNDS.—Harvie, just a fair one all around, defeated a big, coarse specimen, Robin, shown grossly fat and with a doubtful movement behind.

FOXHOUNDS.—Only three good ones shown in both classes. Mack, the winner in open class dogs, is not correct in head, especially skull, but back of the head he is a rare good one with lots of character as well as strength. Genius, not correct in head either, is showing age and was not in good condition. He toes in a little. The other three were poor ones. In the bitch class Vexation was absent. Rose is essentially a bad one, and I hope I may be forgiven for awarding her a second prize. The expression of dogs, like that of men, does not often belie them, and those that tried to get this bitch off the bench would probably appreciate "Uncle Dick's" advice: "Never have anything whatever to do, with a dog with a yellow eye." Gyp is a nice hound of excellent head formation and expression, but in body and character as a whole she was surpassed by the winning dog for the special.

HARRIERS.—I would recommend to the executive to abolish this class until we get some real, undoubted harriers, Dogs and bitches competed together—three in all. Two of them arrived late, having been detained at the railroad station. But for his grossly fat condition, Dandy, one of the late arrivals, would have won outright. As it was he was given an equal first, the only dog, Hunter, having been judged before Dandy arrived. The bitch Daisy is light in body.

BEAGLES.—Not a good lot nor numerous. One dog, Bob Krueger, was the best of them—just a fair specimen. Butterfly was absent. Elfie, barring a weak muzzle, is good in head and expression and beagle character,

was placed over, Snow, not the right stamp in head, though fairly good in body. Dot was a ball of fat, with a little beagle visible.

GREAT DANES.—Minerva's Fawn scored her first win in the challenge class, being alone. In the open dog class, Tonko defeated Don Caesar, Jr. He is better in size, bone and Dane character, though he is wide in skull, too short in head, and is somewhat dish-faced. He is light in loin and not well developed in quarters and second thighs; does not move very well behind. Tail rather poor. Don Caesar, Jr., is throaty, has a bad eye and expression, poor in color and ring-tailed. He is moderately good in body, and is more symmetrical, and moves better than his rival. In the open bitches Juna, alone, won. She is small and weak in head, but moves well, and is better put together than her larger kennel mate, the dog Tonko. As Dr. Mills's bitch was shown in the challenge class, Mr. Corbett was associated with him in the judging of Danes, the Doctor declining to judge his own dog. If there had been competition she would have been withdrawn.

COLLIES.—Ottawa is slow to get rid of poor collies. At the first show here in recent years all prizes were withheld, and if this year the same course had been followed, with the exception of the firsts, no injustice would have been done. McEwen & Gibson's Samson won in the open dog class. He is a very big dog, well and strongly made, with good coat, fair head and collie expression. He is without that full eye so foreign to true collie character, yet so often seen in the winner of the present day, as, e. g., in Samson's kennel mate Dudley Chris. Jack Broman is not a collie in head at all and was passed over. Colie has a very bad light eye, and though he would not put up his ears in the ring I suspect they get beyond half prick at times. But for

the very bad ones that have been shown here I would have withheld the prize. The dog is pretty fair in coat, body, legs and feet, and his head is not wholly wrong. In the bitch class Viola was absent and Dudley Chris won. A bitch of nice coat, head outline and quality, but with very light bone; could not stand work in rough country.

BULLDOGS.—Carisbrooke, well known, won, opposed only by a specimen of which it may be said, "let him pass, he is a bulldog!" He is such an one as I can believe was seen in the long ago. Unfortunately Lady Venus, taken sick at Kingston, succumbed on the way to the Ottawa show. She was a taking little creature that I would have liked to see often.

BULL-TERRIERS.—With the exception of two local dogs, all wrong in type, the entries were good. Count II. was placed over Chatham Prince, which he excels in head, musclings, quality and character. This dog's muscles stand out in beautiful form, as they would on more dogs if they were in proper condition. Coming to the bitches, champion Starlight, though in whelp, on comparison was found to be much in advance of the others. Grove Duchess excels Loumont Kit in bone and strength generally. Kit is light in bone, otherwise not a bad one. Champion Starlight won the special.

FOX TERRIERS.—A great improvement over the past here in one respect—not many downright poor ones shown. Blemton Trump was alone in the challenge class and, of course, won. He wears pretty well. He was given the special for the best fox-terrier in the show, as he excels the winner in open class dogs in coat and eye. In the open class the winner of first, Tom Tom, might be better in head, has a rather light eye, not of the worst by any means, turns his feet in slightly and might be better in coat: but he

has excellent neck, body, legs, feet and stern, and shows much terrier character. Take him all in all, he wins well. Rideau Rivet and Calchas were placed equal second. But for cheekiness and defective movement I should have placed Rideau Rivet over Calchas, as he has an excellent coat, front and general make-up, with good hard muscle, he has also very nice ears. Calchas might have a much better head and be narrower in front. He is well muscled and shows much character, combining activity, strength, etc. He looks a worker. My Fellow, third, I should be disposed to place very high in a puppy class. He is of a nice sort, with beautiful head, though his ears are rather thick and are not carried quite right. His feet are somewhat open and look large; coat abundant but not flat enough and rather soft. In an open class in comparison with old dogs he does not show enough character, strength and making; has not enough substance yet, but when he gets older he may turn the tables on some placed over him now. Seacroft Bourbon, reserve, has a good head including ears, though his eyes are bad, which show all the more on account of the head being so black; good legs and feet and nice front. But he is too high in the legs and too big, and on the whole he does not compare well with the others. Though his owner had a high opinion of Bob, the people could not see it in the same light and passed him by. In the bitch class there is not much to choose between first and second, as both have similar excellencies and defects. Both are wide in front, have fair heads and hard coats, but Grouse II. excels in bone. Damson is a very bad shower, but has some merit; head, front and coat good; legs and feet poor. It was difficult to judge of ears, body and character, she showed so badly. Seacroft Fuss, reserve, is rather wide in

front and not quite straight; feet rather large and flat, head fair. Lady was scarcely worth notice. Clytie is not of the modern type. In the novice class the winners were the same mostly as in other classes.

A moderate wire-haired one turned up; My Queen, reserve. She has a fair head, legs and feet, but coat is not hard enough and she did not show well. Pincher a poor one got C. For the best in the open classes the dog Tom Tom was preferred.

IRISH TERRIERS were much the same lot as was seen at Toronto. Boxer was alone in the challenge class. He is big enough, coat poor now, is rather wide in front and getting thick in skull. Jack Briggs, first in the open class dogs, has good legs, fair feet, moderate coat and color, and some character, but not enough. His head is decidedly good. He is, however, very light in body, lacking both breadth and depth, and seems to me to have been over-praised. Gallies, second, is rather wide in front and loaded in shoulders; good in expression, only moderate in coat, which shows silkiness on head. He has, however, so much character he gains on one the more he is studied. Hanover Boy, third, has a bad eye, is rather cheeky, and shows dark shadings about the head, otherwise he would have stood higher, for his character is not to be denied. Commissariat, uncropped, and with fairly good head and ears, was reserve. He abounds in true Irish character, has an excellent coat and is grandly muscled. He is much too big, but is not coarse, and I regret exceedingly that so good a dog had to be put back for size simply: but if we have standards judges should keep to them. In the bitch class there were only two competitors, Salem Witch and Killarney Girl. The latter had the best head, and is the strongest and best muscled, but in all respects Salem

Witch excels her. The latter is a poor shower, but in releasing her in the judging space in the yard and petting her to frisk about, her fine front action was evident, which was quite in keeping with beautifully placed shoulders. She was the best colored Irish terrier in the show, and has a first-rate coat, and as these two together count 25 per cent., she seemed to me to win easily, for her rival has but an indifferent coat. Jack Briggs won the special for the best Irish Terrier.

BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS made good classes. Sir Wallace, alone in the challenge class, is wide in skull and rather cheeky, very wide in front and not quite straight. His tail is fair and tan and markings good. In open class dogs a very good and a very bad one came together. Salisbury, though not in the best condition, was still able to win the special for the best of the breed easily. He was, of course, first in the open class here. His competitor, Slick, is bad in tan and worse in temper; a coarse big one in bad condition, with but little to recommend him. In the bitch class there was plenty of competition. For first place the choice lay between English Lady and Louie. The former's tan and markings are fair, tail medium, head rather good, but she loses in this feature to Louie. The latter is rather wide and not perfectly straight in front and has wretched tan. Both are of good size and made well. Louie lost in condition so much that, all things considered, I thought Lady deserved first place. Unfortunately, all things were not considered. I made it a point to look at the teeth of every dog that came before me, and especially in the terrier classes; but in some unaccountable way I missed Lady, that is very defective in teeth. Had I seen her mouth I would certainly not have placed her over Louie, making all allowance for the latter's poor condition. Mona, third, is a

daughter of Kaiser's, with many of that dog's excellencies. She is rather high on the leg and not deep enough in chest, but has a fine long, lean head and the best kind of an eye, correctly placed, good legs coat and muscle, fairly good tail, excellent tan, but without the thumb mark. Her ears do not now stand well. Her condition was nearly perfect. Rosette was given reserve. Though large and rather wide in front, her formation is good head fair, tan and markings and character first rate. Rochelle Topax is a small uncropped bitch with ears good enough to make one wish that cropping were a thing of the past. She is good in tan and markings, in nice condition and of good size, but her head is a good deal spoiled by eyes wrong in color, shape and position, and overhung by brows, a feature foreign to this breed.

SKYE TERRIERS.—Sir Stafford readily won from Toodles, but a moderate specimen, while Jack is in coat much more like the Paisley terrier than the Skye. The bitch class contained two good ones, Islay and Endcliffe Maggie. Islay has a long coat of proper texture, but it is not straight, and in front this gave the bitch an unkempt appearance that greatly detracts from her Skye character. On the other hand Endcliffe Maggie is thin in coat now, but one can judge of its texture. To the eye she shows much the most character and excels the rival in head, loin musculing generally. I have no doubt that she deserved the first position. Prairie Flower, straighter in coat than Islay, is inferior in other respects, while Scotch Rose is much behind in the head, etc.

BEDLINGTON TERRIERS.—Sentinel II. was entered but did not appear, so that no prizes were awarded in this class.

DANDIE DINMONT TERRIERS.—Some good ones were on hand. Dogs and bitches competed together. King of

the Heather, not first rate in color and unduly crooked in legs, but with good head, strong and long body lots of character, won from a nice bitch in Heather Madge, well ahead of Laird of the Heather. Amphion was absent.

YORKSHIRE TERRIERS.—Three rather nice specimens and one moderate one put in an appearance. Little Pop, though taller, excelled in coat and movement, but is too high on the leg. Baby Bunting was much the better of the two bitches and was given the special. Mrs. Pitt's specimen's were better in body, color and tan than those usually seen.

PUGS.—Bob Ivy, alone in the challenge class, won. He is getting a little wide in front and off in front legs. On this occasion he carried one ear indifferently. The open class dogs comprised three fair specimens, a great improvement over what has been seen in Ottawa on former occasions. Meddler, just a moderate one, with neither great merit nor conspicuous faults, won from Jim, too large, rather harsh in coat, wide in front and light in bone, but with beautiful clear color, good mask and nice black ears. Trixie was smutty, quite as large and not so good in head color.

POODLES.—Biglow, a dog of moderate merit, was given the prize without competition.

POMERANIANS.—The owner of two local dogs, that had up till this year had it their own way, could not understand why they should not be at the head of affairs this year also; the fact was that a better one than either from Toronto turned up. Jumbo, first, is too large, but his coat is straight, his formation of body and movement good. The coats of the others are bad, and they have weeping eyes and only fair heads. The blue with which they had been rinsed was also evident enough. There was little between

them and the smaller was chosen for second prize.

DACHSHUNDS.—Jessie Victoria, shown very thin, was clearly superior in head, coat, skin and general quality, Fritz is coarse all through.

IRISH WATER SPANIELS.—Only one shown, that excellent bitch Marguerite she has already been described in the Toronto and Kingston reports.

TOY SPANIELS.—The competitors were seen at the other shows and have been already described.

Before closing I cannot but remark on two or three matters that impress me unfavorably. At this show some six or eight dogs competed in wrong class, according to C. K. C. rules. As president of the club, I would have protested these dogs, but that I think exhibitors from the United States should have been warned through the press that challenge dogs cannot compete in open classes on this side.

Many of the dogs were greatly broken up from unpleasant little meetings among themselves. Who are to blame for this?

Not a few of the dogs had lost flesh and failed in condition generally more than they should since the circuit began. I fear that at some of the shows the dogs were insufficiently fed. In one at least the windows were kept open too much. There was no necessity for it. On the whole, the Ottawa show and the entire circuit was a success.

SPANIELS—Special Report. The farce which originated at Toronto, terminated here, and yet Spaniel breeders do not seem quite happy. A feeling of dissatisfaction pervades the ranks, and vague rumors of half price sales which are to take place in the near future, reach us as we write. The good work of last year has been brought to a standstill, and the question is being asked, "Whither are we drifting?" Are we to breed toys,

suitable only for the drawing-room, or shall we continue to cultivate that lively little sporting dog that gave us so much pleasure afield in days gone by? We leave the question for the future to answer.

CLUMBERS.—Boss was III., the only entry in the challenge class. Darby, first in the open class is small, but is a very taking specimen. His head, like most of the Clumbers shown here, is of the Field Spaniel type, body and bone are his strong points. Quester beats the winner in muzzle, but in no other particular. Darby won the special for the best dog of the breed.

FIELD SPANIELS found Wonder at the head, a decision with which we cannot agree. Corktown Cupid should have had the place. Both were shown at Toronto. Bounce, third, is strong in skull, and has too much white on chest. In the class for bitches, another reversal would have been in order. Dot Smirle should have given way to Queen, more typical, but shown in poor condition. Both are well known.

COCKERS.—In the challenge class Red Jacket, Fascination, Red Roland and Brant competed. Red Jacket won. He beats Fascination in head and is his equal in other respects. All these were described in Toronto report. Donovan, the winner in the open class for black dogs has grown a trifle heavy in skull, eyes a shade light, throaty, grand bone and character. He was afterwards sold to Mr. Joe Lewis, and will try conclusions with the New England cracks. Jay Kay and Dono, 2nd and 3rd respectively were described in Toronto report. In the open class bitches, black, Bell's Troublesome was selected for premier honors, but a protest having been entered she was disqualified for being under standard weight. She weighed only 16¼ lbs., and lacks in substance throughout. The second and third winners, Rideau Romola and Molly Bawn were moved

up to fill the vacancy. Both are now well known. We understand that a second protest has been made by Mr. Bell who contends that the minimum weight of a Cocker is not defined by the standard. This will be a question for the C. K. C. to decide. Rideau Reine, third, was not shown in good condition. Volo, V. H. C., pinched in muzzle, and sour in expression. Other than black dogs found Red Obo at the top, with Nerve, a black and white, domy in skull, muzzle undershot, front not straight, second. Vic, first in other than black bitches was shown too fat. She is not a crack. Cherry Ripe has a toyish head. Rideau Robina, third, was the best in this class. In novice dogs, Corktown Comet was placed over Nerve, and in novice bitches, Corktown Cleo, downy in skull, was given the blue, Rideau Rhea, a good sort, second, and Rideau Romo, a poor shower, third.

I am not going to attempt to criticize the criticisms of the "Canadian specialist" for that would occupy a life time, but I cannot help alluding to his opening sentence where he speaks of Mr. Mason as having had "so little modern experience." As a matter of fact, Mr. Mason has forgotten more, a hundred times over than the "Canadian specialist" has ever known. What I do however desire to find fault with is the vindictive bitterness with which the "Canadian specialist" has spoken of and criticized the dogs exhibited by me. It must be a great grief to Mr. Mason to find that according to the "Canadian specialist" Rideau Flossie who got 4th prize in the open bitch class for Cocker should have been placed 1st, instead of my bitch, Troublesome, and it will be equally amusing to the public to learn that Rideau Flossie who gets this free advertisement is herself the property of the "Canadian specialist" and would be critic. Since the "Canadian specialist" is so sure of the superiority of his bitch and so confident that my "miniature specimen" as he has over and over again remarked is too small and toyish for field work, I have a proposition to make to the

"Canadian specialist" which he should not be slow to consider. I will wager the "Canadian specialist" \$100 that my "miniature specimen" Troublesome, can beat his 27½ pound bitch, Rideau Flossie in a day's work in the field or bush. I will wager that the "miniature specimen" can find bird for bird with Rideau Flossie; get through and over obstacles that neither the "Canadian specialist" or his bitch can overcome, and work the "Canadian specialist" to a stand-still before the day is over,—provided that the "Canadian specialist" bitch will attempt to keep pace with my "miniature specimen."

Let there be no misunderstanding about this challenge; it is a case of put up or shut up once for all with the "Canadian specialist." My money is ready and will be deposited at the office of the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE the moment that the "Canadian specialist" accepts the challenge. The field trials which take place next month at Chat-ham, will afford a grand opportunity for this trial. I will name one judge, the "Canadian specialist" can name another, and the two judges so appointed can name a third to act with them.

I might add a word as to the criticism of the "Canadian specialist" upon his Fox Terrier Rideau Rivet in which he says that the animal is "a trifle cheeky in head," but this note is long enough already. Did any one except the "Canadian specialist" himself ever hear of a cheeky head?

Two hundred and sixty fiddlesticks sir! and this is why we have such a contempt for "offers" that have been refused. They are simply the refuge of the thrifty advertiser. "Offers" indeed! Why, anybody can imagine them by the dozen, and who is to prove the contrary?

SIR,—In "Whispers of Fancy" in *Stock-Keeper*, of 23rd September just to hand I note remarks as to the Irish Terrier the Irish Ambassador and myself. If *Forest & Stream* is rather indulgent at times *The Stock-Keeper* can be decidedly nasty and mean when it suits it. Your insulting personal remarks I will treat with the contempt they deserve, and pass on to the statement made by *Forest & Stream* namely "Mr. Brodie is known to all Irish Terrier men as the owner of the great little dog 'Irish Ambassador'" if this statement wants qualifying, why do you in the same paragraph admit the name of the Irish Ambassador, as to the other part of it can your correspondent name any other party who owns him. *The Stock-Keeper* evidently forgets that in one of its recent issues, when giving Champion Brickbat "a lift" it stated that a certain price (I forget the exact amount just now, but I think it was somewhere about £250) had been offered and refused for him, and again in your issue of 26th August you say £160 had been offered and refused for Poor Pat, and this is how we show such a contempt for "offers" that have been refused. "Offers indeed why anybody can imagine them by the dozen and who is to prove to the contrary."

As to the genuineness of the statement made by *Forest & Stream* in reference to the price that has been refused for The Irish Ambassador. In May, 1891, Mr. Neil Gow, 9 Rose Terrace, Perth, (a gentleman well-known as a buyer of the best stock procurable in both dogs and poultry, and frequently mentioned in your journal as a purchaser and exporter of such) made me an offer of £200 for The Irish Ambassador and on my refusal to accept it he afterwards increased it to £260, still I refused to sell, and I have no reason to regret having done so, for since that time considerably over a hundred bitches have visited him, and those from most of the leading Irish Terrier fanciers in the United Kingdom. This number includes only those for which a stud fee has been paid and do not include my own bitches from which I have bred quite a number that I have sold at very fair prices. I am considerably within the margin when I state that he has doubled the price I refused for him at that

time, he is still mine, and I would not take £260 for my chances with him yet. As far as offers are concerned the value of all the Irish Terriers in existence put together cannot separate The Irish Ambassador and your humble servant,
