MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.
Nov. 11th, '92.

THE following members were present Messrs. A. D. Stewart, Hamilton, J. G. Mitchener, C. A. Stone, and H. B. Donovan, Secretary, Toronto. It was moved by Mr. Stewart seconded by Mr. Mitchener, that Mr. Stone take the chair.—*Carried.*

The Secretary's report was read, also the two letters following:

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

I beg to submit for your consideration the following business and correspondence:—

"*Troublesome*" Protest. The following case has been submitted to the C.K.C. for action, and the necessary amount (\$10) accompanying Mr. Bell's protest has been deposited with me.

DEAR SIR,—I beg to enclose all letters relating to the '*Troublesome*' protest. I beg to state that the protest put in by Mr. Spracklin was sustained at a meeting of the Bench Show Committee, held during the show. A meeting of the members of the Executive of the C.K.C., who were in Ottawa at the time, was held at the Grand Union Hotel, on Tuesday evening, September 27th. Present—W. Mills, (Chairman), Messrs. Stewart, Gibson, Keyes and Geddes. Mr. Geddes was requested to act as Secretary. After a lengthy

discussion on the '*Troublesome*' protests, it was moved by Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. Stewart, 'That the matter be referred to the Executive Committee of the Kennel Club.' *Carried.*

Acknowledgment was sent Mr. Geddes of his letter and enclosures, and I have advised Mr. Bell, as requested, of the time and place of this meeting.

St. Bernard, Sir John—Since last action the following correspondence has been received and despatched. You will remember that this dog was disqualified by the A.K.C., and after a considerable time had elapsed a pedigree was handed in by Mr. Bell, sent him by Mr. Jas. Watson, Secretary of the A.K.C. Stud Book Committee, but lacking one name in the third generation. The C.K.C., decided that if this blank were filled in and the pedigree certified to by Mr. Watson, registration would be given. Mr. Watson has not yet certified to the pedigree as being correct. The following is a translation of a letter received by Mr. W. Wade from Herr Schumacher, relating to the missing name.

"Mr. Wm. Wade,
Hulton, Pa.

The pedigree of '*Schamyl*' is correctly given. The pedigree of the mother of '*Belina*' is not known, and I am not able to give you the names; I have therefore given the parents and grand-parents of '*Medor*.'

'Barry IV' and 'Sirius' were brothers, of the same parents, but not the same litter. The pedigree of 'Blass' was not known to us.

After some further correspondence with our Stud Book Committee, Mr. Bell and Mr. Wade, the following letter was received by me to lay before you:—

"HULTON, PA., Oct. 22nd, 1892.

H. B. Donovan, Esq.,

Sec'y Canadian Kennel Club.

MY DEAR SIR,—Yours of 19th received. The A.K.C. disqualifying Sir John is not of any significance; he was simply debarred from one specific prize he won for incorrect description. If I remember aright, Sir Charles was put in a generation ahead, and if a proper pedigree is furnished, and this is verified, it is absurd to deny the dog registration, unless either your rules say explicitly that the names for three generations are given, or that the contract between the A.K.C. and C.K.C. is that pedigrees refused by one shall be refused by the other without further enquiry. It is utterly of no significance to say that the name of Schamyl's granddam should be given, and barring that, the pedigree cannot be accepted. All through pedigrees of all breeds you find such notes as 'a bitch of the Duke of Devonshire's,' or 'Bill Guppy's bitch.' Mastiff pedigrees rest on 'George White's dog.' In this case (Sir John) you have 'Herr Schumacher's bitch of no pedigree.' What more do you want?

From what I know of the matter, the A.K.C. Stud Book Committee behaved in an outrageous manner in this case, and the A.K.C. sustained it by censuring Bell for carelessness in following the course of Mr. Jas. Watson, Chairman of that very Committee; for the pedigree of Sir John is in Mr. Watson's handwriting. I will tell you frankly that I started on the investigation of Schamyl's pedigree thoroughly distrusting it, and I wrote Schumacher that I believed it bogus, but he completely upset my ideas, and has given that pedigree a weight that very few others have. You have the pedigree, you have

Schumacher's letter authenticating it, and what in the world more can be wanted? Bell can overcome the technical difficulty (if that difficulty is the one in the way) by simply filling in, in the third generation, 'bitch of Hy Schumacher's, as per his letter of — to Mr. Wade.'

I notice that in the beginning of this I wrote of Sir John's disqualification being for only one prize, and should correct that by saying that I do not know the number of prizes he was disqualified out of, but that is non-essential, for no disqualification applies in futurity to a dog as it does to an owner, unless the owner is disqualified for fraud, when (I believe) the disqualification follows the dogs, instruments in the fraud.

I know nothing about the inner history of this case before the A.K.C., but am puzzled to understand the spasm that body got into over this pedigree; the original mistake was a very trifling one, i.e., one very easily made, and by no means making fraud probable, and the A.K.C.S.B. has set forth pedigrees, that were publicly exposed as forgeries both here and in England, years before that book published them.

I would simply say in conclusion, that Miss Anna H. Whitney is probably the most deeply versed in St. Bernard pedigrees of anyone in this country, and as I take it for granted that your Committee desire to insert all pedigrees, properly vouched for, it might be well for you to send her a copy of the pedigree and of Mr. Schumacher's letter and ask her views.

Frankly, I must say that I cannot avoid being very suspicious of the peculiar way this pedigree business was handled by the A.K.C. and its Stud Book Committee. Refusal of a pedigree and censure on the owner, is a most peculiar proceeding, when the designated officer of the club for pedigree investigations, was the party who wrote it out.

Another unfortunate complication has arisen in this case in that the owner of the dog placed next to Sir John at Toronto 1891, now claims he is entitled to Sir John's wins. Following is his letter:

"BUFFALO, Sept. 29th, 1891.

MY DEAR SIR,—In looking over the rules of the Canadian Kennel Club, I notice rule XX. 'A dog that has been disqualified—the next dog in order of merit as placed by the

Judge shall be considered first. And the win shall count in every respect the same as if it had been the original award.'

I was informed that 'Sir John,' the R.C. St. Bernard, owned by Mr. Geo. Bell of Toronto, had been disqualified some four or five months ago. If so, I feel as though I am entitled to the two first prizes 'Sir John' won over 'Hesper Son' in Novice and Puppy classes, Sept. 14th 1891. If it meets with your approval I wish you would be kind enough and credit me with the same. I have very little time to show my dogs, and want them to have all the credit they are entitled to. Being on the police force, I have but seven days vacation, which I have spent in Toronto showing my dogs for the last two years. Please let me know by return mail what your opinion is in this matter, and oblige,

English wins are not under present rules recognized by the A. K. C., or C. K. C., except by the latter in the novice class. Enclosed I beg to hand you a copy of C.K.C. rules. Those of the A.K.C., as you are no doubt aware are practically the same.

DEAR MR. DONOVAN,—Your letter of Oct. 3rd, would have been replied to sooner but for my absence in Chicago. During an interview with the Hon. Minister of Agriculture to-day, I brought under his consideration the proposition of your Kennel Club to the effect that the dogs which it is proposed to send to the World's Fair be brought together for final selection at Toronto at the expense of intending exhibitors during the early part of February, and that a committee of five be selected by the Canadian Kennel Club to adjudicate upon the dogs and finally decide as to what dogs shall be forwarded. The Kennel Club ask that the Government contribute \$300 towards the expenses of carrying out this work. I am pleased to be able to advise you that the Minister has instructed me to consent to that appropriation being made, and \$300 will be available to your Kennel Club, to defray the necessary expenses connected with the selection of dogs at the time named. I sincerely trust that the earnest efforts being put forward by the Kennel Club, and the liberal action of the Dominion Government in this matter will result in a very creditable display in this Department of the World's Fair.

DEAR SIR,—I regret that I shall be unable to attend the meeting of the Executive called for Nov. 11th. I however, give you my opinion on the business to come before the meeting in so far as I can with the information before me.

1. "Troublesome" Protest.

A judge is always supposed to follow some standard. In America when no standard is named for Spaniels that of the American Spaniel Club is supposed to be the guide. This standard defines the weights which are allowable.

About 3 years ago, a Cocker "Rufus" was disqualified at Kingston for being a little over

weight, at the instigation of Mr. Geo. Bell I think though no standard was designated. Mr. Bell, I understand, allowed his bitch "Troublesome" to be weighed at Kingston so that it would seem that he acknowledged the weight qualification.

All things considered, I am decidedly of the opinion that the protest and disqualification are valid.

2. "Sir John" Disqualification.—I have no opinion to offer as to the disqualification of the St. Bernard "Sir John" but I must express my regret that one of the correspondents in this case has expressed himself so disrespectfully regarding our friendly ally the A. K. C.

3. Champion "Starlight" Protest.—By our rules the protesting of Champion "Starlight" must be allowed, and I regret that our show committees have not exercised more care in taking entries. As President of the C. K. C. it was not pleasant for me as a judge in the recent circuit to be passing on dogs in open classes that I knew had been champions for years. I am strongly opposed to Champion dogs in any case being admitted to open classes and was one who was instrumental in getting the rule passed, and which has been so disregarded at our recent shows.

4. "Pious Pembroke" Protest.—So far as I can see, the owner of this dog acted in good faith in making his entry and should be dealt with leniently, especially as he shows a good spirit in his letter on the subject.

5. Fixing Show Dates.—This matter deserves the best attention we can give it.

6. Incorporation.—I have no opinion to express on this subject.

7. World's Fair Bench Show.—I enclose a letter from the Dominion Commissioner and my reply to the same from which you will be able to gather my views on the subject. It is plain to me that it is the wish of the Dominion Government that the entire control and expense of the show shall be theirs and this view seems to me eminently proper and to be respected.

DEAR SIR,—I am in receipt of your notice calling a meeting of the Executive for Friday, 11th inst. I am sorry that I cannot be with you owing to numerous statements, returns, etc., that must be prepared pending the opening of Parliament. I regret this the more

because of the protests to come before the meeting, some of which had their origin at our late Bench Show. In the matter of Mr. J. A. Spracklin's protest against Bell's "Troublesome," my committee unanimously sustained the same for the reason that a dog weighing less than 18 lbs. is not a Cocker according to established usage or the general acceptance of the term as understood by all Spaniel breeders in America, the Standard universally used and accepted being that of the American Spaniel Club which specifies that a Cocker must not weigh less than 18 lbs. or more than 28. "Troublesome" weighed exactly 16½ lbs. And further, had it been the intention to depart in any way from established custom by including other weights than those required by the Standard, it would have been so announced in the premium list.

Personally I cannot help thinking that had Mr. Bell been present in person, my committee would not have been troubled with this 2nd "Troublesome" protest, but his representative on that occasion not being a Spaniel man, it could not be expected that he should be conversant with Spaniels or the Standard governing their exhibition, hence his frivolous protest.

In re the "Starlight" protest my committee, while deeming itself competent to deal with the matter under C. K. C. rules thought better to refer it to the Club, for the reason that the entry is of itself *prima facie* evidence of the offence against the rule and left my committee no alternative; but in consideration of the fact that entries of a similar character were made, not only at Ottawa but elsewhere, it was considered expedient to refer the case to the Club in hope that a plan might be devised by which all can be dealt with in a spirit of equity and justice, and not make a scape goat, *a la Marrier*, of one man, or one dog, when there are others who have transgressed and are equally deserving of censure.

It was decided that protest against Ch. Starlight at Ottawa was not taken within the time specified in Rule 22.

Moved by Mr. Stewart seconded by Mr. Mitchener, that protest lodged by Mr. Wurtele be sustained, and that Mr. Purbeck refund prize money. The dogs placed below Pious Pembroke to be moved up. — *Carried*.

The following committee was appointed to confer with the committee from the A.K.C., to arrange show dates: Messrs. H. B. Donovan, J. G. Mitchener and C. A. Stone. The matter of incorporation was laid over.

A letter was read from Professor Saunders relative to the superintendence of the Worlds Fair Bench Show. It was resolved that Mr. Stewart confer with Messrs. Saunders and Awrey on the matter.

Letter read from Mr. Bell complaining of irregularities in the judging at the late Ottawa Bench Show.

Moved by Mr. Stewart seconded by Mr. Mitchener, that a sub-committee consisting of the mover and seconder, and Messrs. G. S. Oldrieve and H. Gorman, be appointed to investigate the charges made by Mr. George Bell against Dr. Wesley Mills and report to this committee.

It was decided to have the C.K.C. Diplomas engrossed before sending out.

The following new members were elected: Messrs. R. Barnes, G. Bowman, H. Stableford, J. H. McNally, and A. McKinnon.

STIFLE JOINT LAMENESS.

NOTHING more serious can happen to a big dog than to badly sprain or otherwise injure the stifle joint: it is far worse than a broken leg, for that, in

most cases, can be cured, and the dog is sound and well in the course of a couple of months; but a severe sprain of the ligaments, or an inflammatory condition set up in consequence of a blow to this weak and most complicated of joints, is a very serious matter, for under the best circumstances the limb never again regains its full strength, though in many cases the dog may sufficiently recover in course of time to be able to walk sound for a short distance, but any unusual exertion at once makes the weakness of the part apparent, which is still more noticeable after a rest following a run.

Many of the cases do not terminate so favorably, but as the result of the accident the dog often becomes a confirmed cripple, being permanently lame.

Of late years this form of lameness has seemingly become of a very frequent occurrence; this, to a certain extent, is perhaps to be accounted for by the increase in numbers of large dogs bred and kept. Then, again, I do not think dogs, especially those of the larger breeds, are as strong as they used to be, partly from want of exercise, and partly from the modern mania of making dogs as fat as bullocks. This fattening process is commenced as soon as puppies are weaned, and, as a consequence, the legs often give way; at any rate they become weak from the great weight of the body, and are, therefore, much more liable to sprains and strains.

All dogs are liable to injure the stifle as people are to injure the knee, which is a corresponding joint, but no doubt the big ones, as St. Bernards, Mastiffs, and Great Danes, are more liable to this form of accident and consequent lameness than smaller dogs. Toy Terriers and Pet Spaniels, &c., are very apt to dislocate the patella, which is the small bone situated in front of the stifle joint. In little dogs, with weak hind legs, this bone has a tendency to slip

inwards, which makes the dog extremely bandy. This is not a serious matter if the case is taken in hand early, as the dislocation can be easily reduced and kept in its place for a time with an adhesive bandage.

Returning to the subject of this paper, Stifle Joint Lameness, it is astonishing how easily this part may be injured, for anything that causes a sudden twist of the leg, as a dog slipping upon some greasy ground when galloping, or being knocked over by another when playing, or getting the foot fixed and struggling to get it free, or a blow to the part may so injure the joint that inflammation is soon set up, and how it will terminate it is very difficult for some time to tell.

The Symptoms.—The lameness in most cases comes on quite suddenly, and is very acute, the dog scarcely being able to put the foot to the ground, in fact it is often carried for some time; the joint is tender to the touch, but not to that extent one would expect from the extent of the lameness, but this is accounted for by the inflammation being at first deep seated and thus protected from pressure by the external bony material, and this being the case also accounts for the seat of lameness at first being overlooked by owners of dogs. When the limb is extended, however, which is best done by lying the patient down on his side, with the lame leg uppermost, and then taking firm hold of the stifle with one hand, and with the other drawing the foot forward, unmistakable pain is induced, showing clearly the injured parts. The position of the lame leg when the dog is standing at rest is also very indicative of stifle lameness: It is as follows: the leg is placed behind the sound one, the toe just resting on the ground, and, as a result of the constant pain, the dog keeps just raising the foot from the ground. In course of time the joint becomes generally enlarged; this is

particularly noticeable on the inside, where an oval, hard swelling forms, due to expansion of the heads of the bones. The joint also becomes very stiff, and movement now causes a good deal of pain, and, as a result of the limb being kept constantly at rest, it becomes much wasted; in fact, to about half the size of its fellows, and the continued pain too, lowers the dog's constitution, and there is a general loss of condition. In course of time, perhaps months in some cases, as the inflammation subsides, the dog is just able to put the foot to the ground when he walks, but the back is arched and locomotion is evidently difficult, and when at rest the toes only just touch the ground. The foot, as during the acute stage, is still being frequently raised, which makes the dog appear fidgetty, and the weak leg is still kept behind the sound one, which position seems to give the dog the most ease.

Later, about eight or nine months after the accident, the dog commences to walk fairly well, but any extra exertion always increases the lameness: however, in the course of another four or five months, if everything goes on satisfactorily, the dog is able to take a fair amount of exercise, but never regains that freedom of movement which he had before the accident happened, but the leg is carried as if the joint were stiff, which it is; the limb is more flexed than the sound one, the parts remain thick, hard, and enlarged, especially on the inside of the joint.

Some dogs with upright legs, as previously stated, are predisposed to this form of lameness; and, in such cases, it often happens that, when one stifle has been seriously injured, and in consequence of all the weight of the body being thrown on the other limb, the corresponding joint of that leg also becomes similarly affected, and the animal then, as can be imagined, is a dreadful cripple; he is only able to rise from the

ground with the greatest difficulty, and, when up, stands with back arched and evidently afraid to move. When locomotion is attempted the dog goes, as it were, all in a heap, with back up and legs carried forwards as stiff as if they were wood.

In these cases it is often supposed that the back is injured, and I have frequently seen a blister applied to the loins, the supposed seat of the mischief; but a careful examination of the legs should always prevent such a mistake.

Treatment.—If the injury is recognized directly the dog goes lame, and energetic treatment be at once adopted, the case may sometimes be cut short, and, without the joint is very severely injured indeed, the dog may by the end of a month be sound; but, as is often the way, the injury is treated lightly at first, and the dog allowed to move about on the damaged leg, the owner thinking it only a slight sprain, and as a result the case is aggravated and, perhaps, prolonged for months.

Directly a dog has injured the stifle joint he should be placed in a quiet closed kennel without any bench, where he can neither see nor hear other dogs, the object being to keep the dog at perfect rest. From this kennel he should never be removed until all inflammation has subsided.
