MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, APRIL 6th, 1893.

(Official Minutes.)

MEETING of the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club was held in the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, on April 6th, beginning at 8 p.m. Dr. Wesley Mills, (President) in the chair, others present being Dr. J. S. Niven, Messrs. A. D. Stewart, T. G. Davey, C. A. Stone, J. G. Mitchener, H. Bedlington and H. B. Donovan, (Secretary).

Minutes of last meeting, with one amendment, read and adopted. The President read several letters from members of the Executive relating to matters in connection with the World's Fair.

World's Fair Show.—The following letters were read, also extracts from letters from the acting Dominion Commissioner to the President.

Hamilton, Ont., 27th Mar., 1893.

HON. W. I. BUCHANAN, Chicago, Ill., U.S.A.

Dear Sir,—As I have already told you in previous letters, a trial show is to be given in Toronto on 18th and 19th April, at which a selection of Canadian dogs is to be made, in order that a typical exhibit may be sent to the World's Fair Bench Show in June.

The idea of the Canadian Commissioners is that only really good and typical dogs should be sent to your show, instead of sending several hundred inferior animals. The Canadian Commissioners are anxious that the exhibits sent from Canada should be a creditable and thoroughly representative one, and I am sure that you will heartily agree in this view.

Some Canadian breeders, however, profess to have heard from you that Canadian dogs will be received by your management whether chosen by the Canadian Kennel Club or not, and apart altogether from the approval of the Canadian Commissioners. If this is the case, there will, obviously, be no use in our holding our trial show, and I write now to ask you if you will kindly inform me how this matter stands.

As I understand it (and my view is shared by the Canadian Commissioners) the Canadian dogs are to be chosen by the Canadian Kennel Club so as to ensure a good exhibit, and entries made to you outside of this will not be received, but referred to the Canadian Commissioners.

I do not at this time think that we have any entries from Canada, but I had naturally supposed that they would be made up in some way mutually agreeable to the Canadian Kennel Club and the Dominion Commissioner. I have to request that we have this information as to the number and the different breeds that will be represented at the earliest possible day. We are acting on the basis that it will amount to 200 dogs. Am I correct in this?

Dear Sir,—I am glad to receive your letter of 31st March because it settles finally the question of our Canadian Dog exhibit. Your decision is exactly in accord with the understanding arrived at with Prof. Saunders and Mr. Awrey, representing respectively the Dominion and Ontario Governments, some time ago.

Your letter now gives me the opportunity to state publicly and officially that no Canadian dogs will be received by you unless selected and approved by the Canadian Commissioners, who in turn will be guided by the Canadian Kennel Club.

This information I shall make public without delay, as it will have the effect of dispelling a rumour that has lately got abroad to the effect that you intended to take all entries that came along whether sent in by the Canadian Commissioners or not.

As I have already stated in previous letters, the Canadian Commissioners are not aiming at an enormous entry of worthless dogs, but rather at such an exhibit as will be representative, and up to such a standard as to do honor to the Dominion.

We hope to be able to sent you about 200 dogs, and as these

F. H. F. Mercer case. - The following communications were read :-

Secretary, Canadian Kennel Club.

SIR,-I hereby protest against the sentence of disqualification passed upon me by the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club in May, 1892, on the ground that the said Club had no jurisdiction, there being no rule nor by-law in the Constitution of the Canadian Kennel Club which forbids the entry of a dog without the owner's consent or knowledge.

Committee at a meeting held in Toronto, on the 20th December, 1892, in the matter of charge No. 2, of the charges preferred by Mr. Bell against T. Wesley Mills, M.D. President of the Canadian Kennel a right grounded on precedent and previous ruling, that I be immedi-Club, which charges as follows:

"That at the show (Ottawa) Dr. Wesley Mills did judge his Great of disqualification passed upon me be at once removed. " Dane bitch ' Minerva's Fawn,' in conjunction with another judge.

The ruling of your Committee on this count of indictment was as Ottawa, Canada, 10th March, 1893. follows :-

"No. 2-Moved by Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Bedlington, "that the Committee finds that the charge is sustained, Dr. Mills "admitting that he judged the Great Dane classes with Mr. Corbett, animals will soon be selected now, we can send you particulars very "but in the absence of any rule forbidding such action, and there "being no competition, the Committee exonerates Dr. Mills from " blame in the matter. Carried."

The act for the commission of which I was illegally disqualified is exactly on a par in all essential points with the charge of which your President was found guilty, save in that I was innocent of such an

Five Clumber Spaniels entered in the Challenge Class were my property, namely, Champion Johnny, Champion Boss III, Champion Bromine, Johnny Jr. and Lady Belle. The sixth was Champion Newcastle, a dog unwarrantably entered by me. The entry fees for all these dogs were paid by me, thus the contract with the Bench Show Committee was fulfilled. There was no competition in these Challenge Moved by Dr. Niven, seconded by Mr. Davey, that all Classes and the prizes were competed for among my own dogs. Conknown breeders, members of the C.K.C., and all Canadian sequently, no one was injured in the slightest degree by my entry of the dog Newcastle. I acknowledged my culpability without hesitation

We, your President and I, each wished to win a prize, and did so. Moved by Mr. Bedlington. seconded by Dr. Niven, that The value of each was \$5. He retains his; I voluntarily returned all entries received by Mr. Stewart be brought before this mine to the Ottawa Bench Show where it was competed for by order of the Superintendent as a special prize at the show held at that place in October last. Your President retains his prize and has been "exonerated from blame." I, who voluntarily returned mine, have been sentenced to disqualification.

I further draw your attention to the fact that I notified Mr. J. L. Little by letter of the entry of his dog, as proven by affidavits attached hereto. Mr. J. L. Little's statement that I did not notify him of the

I also protest against the ruling of the last retiring President of your Club as being unconstitutional and contrary to rule or precedent, when in the matter of Mr. A. D. Stewart's motion for my re instatement, he, ground that the Constitution of the said Club requires that appeal against decisions of the Executive Committee be made by the aggrieved party before such case may be considered in General Meeting.

Rule No. 9 of the Constitution enacts that :--

"The Executive Committee shall have full power by a two-thirds "vote of those present at any of its meetings to suspend or expel any "members, &c., &c., &c. Such members shall have the right of "appeal to the Club from the action of the Executive Committee at "the Annual Meeting, &c., &c., &c."

I submit that there is nothing in the rule quoted making an appeal from the person under sentence of suspension or disqualification essential before his case may be considered in General Meeting, and especially is it inapplicable when due notice of motion has been given to the Secretary by a member in good standing. The aggrieved party In support of this contention I cite the ruling of your Executive possesses the right of appeal, but the rule does not constitute an appeal a matter of necessity.

The Secretary stated he had misinterpreted Mr. Mercer's contention and had written him regarding the ruling of the late president. The following is Mr. Mercer's reply :-

Ottawa, Canada, 29th March, 1893.

H. B. DONOVAN, Esq.,

Sec'y C. K. C.

DEAR SIR, -Accept my thanks for your courtesy in informing me of the ruling of your ex-President at the General Meeting of the C. K. C. in September last.

In your letter you state that: "The president of 1892 at last annual meeting did not rule the Stewart motion out of order on the ground not appealed to the Club.'

On again reading my letter of protest you will find the following "(the President) ruled the question out of order on the ground that the Constitution of said Club requires that appeal against decision of the Executive Committee be made by the aggrieved party before such case may be considered in General Meeting.

I do not state that he ruled an appeal to the Executive necessary; but that he ruled an appeal against the decision of the Executive essen tial before consideration of the Stewart motion could be proceeded with in General Meeting.

This ruling I have shown to be entirely erroneous and unconstitutional. Section 9 of the Constitution grants the RIGHT of appeal, and that is all, The Constitution does not state that an appeal must be made.

I take this opportunity of stating that I was disqualified by your Committee without being given an opportunity to present a defense. I was not even notified of the meeting at which my case was to be dealt with. Your official notification of the decree of your Committee did not reach me for ten days after the meeting was held, and I received the first news of my disqualification through the medium of the public

I repeatedly informed you of my desire to be present in person when the Newcastle entry affair was to be considered, that I might be able to conduct my defense, yet as soon as I left the country I was tried, convicted and sentenced on the evidence of the prosecutor's side of the case, only. Such "justice" (?) savours of the Russe, and after this experience of the way in which such matters are dealt with by your Committee, no man of intelligence or reason would demean himself by an appeal.

Mr. Stewart's motion for my reinstatement was made entirely without my knowledge or consent. Perhaps the C.K.C. might disqualify him

No appeal was requisite prior to the consideration of his motion in General Meeting and no appeal would or ever will be made by me in this connection. I now demand my rights and am prepared to go to any lengths to regain them.

I entered the Clumber Spaniel Newcastle without a thought of ill intent. It was done when there was no time for reflection. My motive was to make up a large entry of Clumber Spaniels and also to oblige Mr. James L. Little. It was not essential that there should be six challenge class Clumber Spaniels before the class could be divided by sex. I made five entries of my own dogs in the class. Directly and indirectly I spent over \$175 dollars out of my own pocket in insuring the success of the Ottawa Show of 1891. It would have been a very simple matter for me to have had the class divided. I had only to insist upon its being done. It is nonsense to say that I entered Newcastle with a view to winning a meagre prize. My dogs have won too many honours at the largest shows in England and America for a paltry prize at a small and unimportant show to inflame my cupidity to that extent some would have it thought it impelled me to go.

Pray read this letter to your Committee immediately after the reading of my letter of protest, dated the 11th instant, and the affidavits thereto attached.

My Dear Sir, -I have before me, your letter of Mar. 30th, '93, asking me for facts in the case of F. H. F. Mercer disqualified for "irregular or frandulent" entry of my clumber dog "Newcastle" at Ottawa in Oct. 1891. He now asks as you say for reinstatement, and I have no desire to do anything to prevent it, and on first thought had almost decided not to say anything more regarding the affair referred to, but I feel bound to state the facts as they are from correspondence which I have of Mr. Mercer's and copies of my own letters in my press copy-book. I feel it but just and proper to all parties to say that I have never seen Mr. Mercer and had only a knowledge of him as far as this affair is concerned through correspondence, action of certain clubs regarding it and the public prints.

My first knowledge of him began at the time I purchased champion Newcastle and Tyne, and his request by letter dated 15th Dec., 1890, that I enter both these dogs at New York in Feb. 1891 at the Bench Show of the Westminster Kennel Cub. He proposed to visit that show and taking his dogs, offered to take mine also. I thanked him for his offer. I did not send any dogs. I then again got a letter from him urging me to show at Boston in March, 1891, saying that he would be there with a "good display of his best dogs." I entered seven of my Clumbers and he did not put in an appearance, nor did his dogs.

March 28th, 1891, Mercer wrote me and said, "I hope you'll send to Ottawa in Sept." April 22nd, 1891, Mercer again wrote at length saying "We have appointed for our judge in Sept. W. B. Almon Hill. You must send us some dogs for him to place. Now do think this over and have your dogs placed by a competent man, I should like nothing better than to be "downed" by better dogs." May 30th, 1891, I wrote Mercer I shall not go into any more shows with my dogs, (I had been in March, 1891). June 5th, 1891, I wrote Mercer, "I shall not show any more dogs. No one is safe in my opinion against distemper. I am out of it thank you!" June 8th, 1891, Mercer writes, "Many a time I have sworn never to show another dog. Witness the result! I do not fear that you will not exhibit again and 'I sincrely trust one of your first entries will be made here (Ottawa) in Sept.'

As will be seen by the above I had distinctly stated to Mercer I was out of Bench Shows with my dogs. Notwithstanding this he entered champion Newcastle for the Ottawa Show (to which he solicited my entries several times and I had declined), Sept. 29th to Oct. 1st, 189t. He put him down as \$1000 in value. I had no knowledge that this had been done until I went to Boston, Oct. 5th, '91, and called at the office of the

among other published matter the catalogue of Ottawa Bench Show. Here I first saw the entry and read that Newcastle had been entered. Upon returning home, I next day, Oct. 6th, received a letter from written five days after the show had closed.

"I took a liberty for which I trust you will pardon me. One rule was that any challenge class containing six or more entries should be divided. I had but five challenge Clumbers at time of closing entries and to make the division entered your dog Newcastle; duly paying for same. I send you a catalogue-Under the circumstances I trust you will pardon me. There was no time to write you in the matter.

Comments :-

The above proves that I was not told of the entry until after the show had closed five days. It also proves that Mercer did an unwarrant able thing or he would not have asked for pardon. It also proves that he had reasons on his own account for the unwarranted entry as he states it. I never have up to this time received the catalogue he says he sent me, but this is not strange as he had promised several times to send me articles and they have never come. He says there was no time to write me. He now says in his protest and request for reinstatement, " I had written a brief note to the same effect at the time the entry was made which said letter was never forwarded having been mislaid for several days." "I do further declare that the letters and copies of letters herein before referred to have been lost or mislaid." The conclusion to draw from this seems to be that Mercer is not competent to appear in his own favor from the fact of the peculiar way he has of doing things -of all kinds so far seen.

In answer to Mercer's letter of Oct. 5th, 1891 above referred to I wrote under date of Oct. 9th, 1891, "Regarding the entry of my dog "Newcastle" in the Ottawa show as you did, I am very indignant, and am not surprised at your statement of having enemies if you are willing to perpetrate a clear fraud of this kind. I shall take immediate measures to make the facts public that I did not exhibit and that the whole proceeding was a fraud. I cannot on any account permit such a thing to be done and make myself a party to it as I should if I remained silent. I do not propose to allow myself to be unconsciously made use of to aid in any deception at any time."

12th Oct. 1891. I received the following from Mercer signed "F. H. F. Mercer, p. C. de M."

" Regarding the entry of Newcastle the entry money as required being duly paid and six entries as required by rule having filled it was strictly legal to divide the class whether the dogs would be present or no, I entirely fail to see where' the "fraud" comes in. I regret exceedingly that you should take exception to my action in entering your dog and may say that it is not an unusual thing to make entries without the proper forms being received from owners. In this case I clearly had no right to enter Newcastle but presuming on our friendliness hitherto I entered him as stated to fill up the class. It is only what I should be glad to allow you to do with my dogs at any time. Of the five challenge entries made by me I never intended to show more than two or three and certainly no one expected to see Newcastle there. It is for you to say what action you may take in the matter but I venture to point out to you that publication would, be of no use whatever, the question being of no public interest, it certainly cannot injure me as I was merely guilty of an indiscretion entering a dog without authority."

Now, Dr. Mills, you know the subsequent attempts to defend himself in the public prints which Mercer had recourse to and his attempt (a nasty one) to injure me by his counter charge which he filed with

ed, and nevertheless I have an idea, as I wrote Mr. Donovan, your hon. Secretary of the C.K.C., that Mr. Mercer has had far more odium and injury to himself out of all this than I ever have. I went in to estab-Mercer dated Ottawa, Oct. 5th, 1891. I quote verbatim from this let- lish a principle which I firmly maintained that the whole affair was a fraud on the public, the Bench Show Committee and me. I need not point out in closing, that while I would gladly do anything to remove the odium from Mr. Mercer, the C.K.C. have a great responsibility before them to decide if the case presents any different aspects to-day from those of October, 1891. I do not wonder Mercer desires to be reinstated. It seems to me, however, that the protest and application for reinstatement which he makes under date of 10th of March, '93, is a cover to attack the Hon. Pres. of the C.K.C. same as his appeal to the public to exonerate him from the charge of fraud which he made under the caption of a "Roland for an Oliver" was a blind under which he could make an indecent attack on me.

Do not make any mistake in the case before you, as a large majority of the kennel world have already endorsed the first action of the C. K. C. in disqualifying Mercer.

I hope I have given you all you need in the premises, if not please command me.

The following has been going the rounds as the official list of judges for the World's Fair. Forest and Stream, however calls it a "fake" as will be seen from the subjoined paragraph. The signers of the protest at Detroit and elsewhere will feel themselves placed in rather an awkward position:—

"The judges at the World's Fair Dog Show are at last announced, and are as follows: Miss Anna H. Whitney, of Lancaster, Mass., St. Bernards and Newfoundlands: Dr. Richard H. Derby, of New York, mastiffs: G. Muss-Arnold, of Tuckahoe, N.Y., Great Danes and dachshunds: Roger D. Williams, of Lexington, Ky., deerhounds, greyhounds: Russian wolfhounds, or borzois, and foxhounds: Pottinger Dorsey, of Maryland, beagles and bassethounds: James L. Anthony, of New York, pointers: Major J. M. Taylor, of New York, English setters and Chesapeake Bay dogs: Dr. William Jarvis, of Claremont, N.H., Irish setters: Dr. H. Clay Glover, of New York, Gordon setters: A. C. Wilmerding, of New York, Irish water spaniels, cocker spaniels, clumber and field spaniels: H. Jarret of Philadelphia, col-

lies: T. S. Bellin, of Albany, N. Y., fox-terriers and bull-terriers; John E. Thayer, of Lancaster, Mass., bulldogs; Dr. M. H. Cryer, of Philadelphia, pugs, toy spaniels, and Italian greyhounds, Irish, Scotch, Welsh, Dandie Dinmont, Bedlington Skye, Clydesdale, black and tan, Yorkshire, white English, and toy terriers. Some of the names publised are those of judges; some are not—among the latter for mastiffs, pointers, and toys."—Forest and Stream.

DR. MOLE'S ARTICLE IN FEBRUARY GAZETTE.

Editor Gazette :-

R. Mole's article in your February number contains some unquestionable errors and some unfounded deductions that demand correction. First, the statement that Collies are the most treacherous of

any breed of dogs cannot be sustained, in fact it is positively incorrect. In my observation Collies are shy and reserved, perhaps suspicious, and I fancy do not accept advances amiably, but that by no manner of means justifies the appellation of "treacherous". I do not propose to make the too common mistake of defending one breed by attacking another, but I can assure you that there are some pet breeds that are much more likely to bite in shows than Collies are. In their order of safety, I would rate dogs about thus-Bulldogs, Psovie, Mastiffs, bobtails, Setters, Collies and Spaniels. Some breeds not included above had always better be let alone, while others are very variable in temper, some very safe and some unsafe. Putting Bulldogs at the head may be startling, but my experience in shows justifies it, I can only remember one very bad tempered Bulldog, allthough he was bad enough for the whole breed. Some may except to the position I give Psovie, all I can

bad as they are with other dogs. Dr. Mole makes another without even stopping to think about it. statement that he cannot produce the least evidence in support of when he says that the Collie is the result of a Hulton, Pa, March 9, 1893. cross with the fox. This is absolutely without any support. The Collie certainly belongs to the fox, or wolf-like division of the family, but that by no means indicates fox blood in him. It might as well be said that the bobtail has a cross of bear, often being so strikingly bear-like in appearance. The Bulldog in the early part of this century was illustrated with a very cat-like head, will anyone therefore say that these dogs had a cross of cat? Then Dr. Mole says Collies get their red color from the fox. Holy Moses! Where do the black and tan Collies get their color from then? And where do red Mastiffs, Spaniels, Dachshunds, Terriers, St. Bernards, Setters, etc., get their fulvous colorings from? Thunder and lightnig! What we call "sable" in Collies is an exceedingly common color in all dogs! The Bulldog Romulus was of that color and did he have a strain of fox? Then we are told that the whole family of shepherd dogs inherit from the fox their disposition to hunt hares. Hunt fiddlesticks! Shepherd dogs hav'nt the disposition to hunt hares half as strong as Hounds and Terriers have. In fact I once had a big lumbering Mastiff bitch who picked up rabbit trails quicker than nine out of ten Terriers would, and she was about as much like a fox as Daniel Lambert was like me. But still further, there is no sufficent evidence that the cross between dog and fox is fertile, authorities differing most strongly on this, nor is there any 'particular reason for con-cluding that it was from the fox that the Collie got it's foxlike head, the wolf would be a much more likely suggestion, and the craze of fanciers for ridiculous heads is the most probable explanation. Anyhow, the Collie illustrated by Bingley in 1809, is very little, if any, fox like. If resemblance to a wild type establishes descent from the wolf prototype, where would Dr. Mole find the source of the Mastiff, Bulldog, Pug, and Toy Spaniel heads? Yet Assyrian sculp-tures show a Mastiff whose head would not be utterly discreditable today, certainly better than many seen in shows. A canine mummy recently unrolled and illustrated, showed a dog decidedly of small Greyhound type, and so on ad infinitum. The fact is that anything like a supported theory of the wild original of dogs, is utterly impossible, the more it is guessed at, the wilder the guesses become. I admit that the wolf might possibly develope into the Collie, that the wild dog of South Africa might evolve the Hound, and the various divisions of the fennecs might arrive at some other breeds if bred for it, and that crosses between these breeds might do great things, but "mights" are the only things in the theories, and guesses are poor stock. I would add another "might" (worth as little as any of the others) a wild original "might" have existed and have become extinct. would be a good disposal of guesses on scientific subjects.

In justice to Dr. Mole, it should be said that his article has every appearanc of having been hastily prepared, and it is more than likely that he has made these statements hastily without carefully considering their scope, but I must point out to him that the professional man must not make hasty utterances on scientific subjects, that may pass with us Daphne and Cleopatra, H.C.


