MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

(Official Minutes.)

A MEETING of the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club, was held at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, on May 3rd, 1893, beginning at 3 p.m. The following members were present: Dr. Wesley Mills, President (in the chair), Dr. J. S. Niven, Messrs.

T. G. Davey, A. D. Stewart, C. A. Stone, J. G. Mitchener, H. Gorman and H. B. Donovan, (Secretary).

Minutes of last meeting as published in GAZETTE taken as read.

After selecting the dogs for the World's Fair the meeting adjourned till 7.30 p.m.

Meeting resumed business at 7.30 same members being present.

Communications with reference to Mr. Bell read and tabled.

Field Trials.—Moved by Dr. Niven, seconded by Mr. Davey, that 1st, 2nd, and 3rd winners in all stakes at all Field Trials run in Canada receive C.K.C. Diplomas.—*Carried.*

Mr. F. H. Mercer.—The following letter was read:

Ottawa, April, 18th, 1893.

DEAR SIR,—Replying to your letter of yesterday would say that I would be obliged by your sending me a certified copy of the Rules of the C.K.C. at the time when I was disqualified, also of those in force in October, 1891, and a copy of Mr. J. The Secretary stated he had declined to send Mr. Mercer the papers asked for without the sanction of the Executive. Moved by Mr. Gorman, seconded by Mr. Davey, that in the opinion of this Executive, it is not the duty of the Secretary to furnish the certified documents asked for.—*Carried.*

List of Members.—Moved by Dr. Niven, seconded by Mr. Mitchener, that a list of members in good standing be supplied to any one requiring same at a fee of \$2.00 to pay for the clerical work.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Gorman, seconded by Mr. Davey, that a list of members in good standing be published in official organ the month previous to date of nominations.—*Carried.*

Constitution and By-laws.—Several changes were made and ordered to be published in GAZETTE for discussion and final adoption.

New Members.—Mrs. C. M. Nelles, Brantford, and Dr. Armstrong, Toronto, were received as members.

CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

PROPOSED ALTERATIONS TO CONSTITUTION, BY LAWS AND RULES.

The changes noted in the following are made for the purpose of discussion and final adoption at the annual meeting. Members are requested to peruse them carefully and send the Secretary any further changes or ideas that may suggest themselves.

CONSTITUTION.

1. This Club shall be known as the Canadian Kennel Club.
2. The objects of the Club shall be to promote the breeding of thoroughbred dogs in Canada, to protect the interests of owners and breeders, to formulate rules for the government of Dog Shows and competitions, and in such other ways as it may see fit, attempt to guide and advance the welfare of dogs and their owners.
3. The officers of the Club shall be a Patron, an Honorary President, President, a 1st Vice-President, four other Vice-Presidents, a Secretary-Treasurer and an Executive Committee of twelve members, to be elected at the annual meeting; and a Stud Book Committee of four members to be appointed by the President.

Voting for members and officers of the Club shall be by ballot.

4. Nomination to any office shall be restricted to those who are then duly accepted members, and shall also be restricted to those who consent to stand as candidates.

The President, Vice-Presidents, Members of the Executive Committee, and Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected annually.

Should only the requisite number be nominated to fill any office or offices, he or they shall be declared duly elected; but in the event of more than a sufficient number being nominated, a suitable ballot slip, showing the nomination for officers and members of the Executive Committee shall herewith, also be sent by mail to each member, requesting him to signify his choice thereon, and return the same duly signed to the Auditors of the Club, so as to reach them not later than the morning of the day appointed for the election.

Retiring officers shall be eligible for re-election if duly nominated.

5. The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as shall be decided at the previous annual meeting; but the exact date shall be fixed by the Executive Committee.

A special meeting shall be called at the request of ten members of the Club, or may at any time be called by order of the Executive Committee.

6. Applications for membership, accompanied by the requisite fee, having been proposed in writing, shall be sent to the Secretary and passed on by the Executive Committee. One black ball shall suspend the election until the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

7. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill vacancies on the Committee until the next annual meeting.

8. The annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable in advance, and afterwards on 1st September. Members shall be charged 25c for registering or listing. Non-members shall be charged 50c per dog for registering or listing. For every certificate of registration after the original, 25c shall be charged.

9. The Constitution or by-laws of this Club may be amended at any general or annual meeting of the Club, provided notice of the proposed change is given in the official organ (*Canadian Kennel Gazette*) of the Club, and provided also that two-thirds of the votes represented at the meeting are cast in favor of the amendment so proposed. In case no notice shall have been given, a majority of three-fourths of the members present shall be required.

10. The Executive Committee shall have full power by a two-thirds vote of those present at any of its meetings, to suspend, disqualify or expel any member and the member so suspended, disqualified or expelled shall have no claim against the Club, or be allowed to enter into any competition held under the Rules of this Club. Such members shall have the right of appeal to the Club from the action of the Executive Committee at the annual meeting, or at any special meeting, provided notice of appeal has been given to the Executive Committee. Suspension, disqualification or expulsion shall be either for a definite period or for life; and the member thus suspended, disqualified or expelled shall be reinstated only on application to the Executive Committee.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

Duties of Officers.

Section 1. The President shall order all meetings of the Club and Executive Committee, and when possible preside at the same. He shall see that the affairs of the Club are managed according to the terms and spirit of the Constitution and By-Laws; and shall at the annual meeting report on the working of the Club during the past year; and may make such suggestions as he shall see fit with a view of advancing the objects and interests of the Club.

Vice-Presidents.

Section 2. The 1st Vice-President, or one of the other Vice-Presidents shall perform all the duties of the President in his absence.

Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of each meeting of the Executive Committee and of the Club, conduct the correspondence, and have charge of and be responsible for all the books and papers of the Executive Committee. He shall have charge of all monies of the Club, collect all fees, pay all accounts after being duly signed by the President or his duly authorized representative, and make a report on the same and on the general financial standing of the Club at each ordinary meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Sec.-Treas. shall make an annual report on the affairs of the Club, including its financial condition. He shall keep a book containing the names and addresses of all members of the Club.

ARTICLE II.

Stud Book Committee.

Section 1. A Stud Book Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Committee at the first regular meeting.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Stud Book Committee to scrutinize the registrations appearing each month in the *Gazette*, investigate each, and send them initialed to the Secretary for a final insertion in the Annual Stud Book; and all complaints of errors or omissions in the pedigrees of dogs registered shall be referred to this Committee to investigate and report to the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE III.

Meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 1. The meetings of the Executive Committee shall be ordinary and special.

Ordinary meetings shall be held quarterly. Special meetings may be held when deemed necessary.

Section 2. All ordinary or special meetings shall be held at the call of the President or of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The President may call a special meeting at his own discretion, and must call a special meeting at the request of five mem-

bers of the Executive Committee. Should he fail to do so within five days notice, the Secretary shall call such special meeting.

Section. 4. At least sixteen days notice of all meetings of the Executive Committee and of the Club must be given to each member of the Executive Committee, such notice to be reckoned from the date of mailing the same, but exclusive of the day of mailing and the day of meeting.

Section. 5. A schedule of all the items of business to come under consideration shall be duly supplied with the notice of meeting.

Section. 6. At all meetings of the Executive Committee, five members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IV.

Payment of Bills and Auditors.

Section 1. All bills shall be presented to the President or in his absence to his constitutional representative and shall be audited by him. In case of approval the Secretary-Treasurer shall at once pay said bills.

Section 2. At each annual meeting two Auditors shall be elected from the members of the club, whose duty it shall be to audit the Treasurer's books prior to the annual meeting following and submit report duly certified at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

Registration and Listing of Dogs.

Section 1. No dog can be registered in the C. K. C. S. B. unless pedigree for three generations is given or it has won not less than two first prizes at any bench show recognized by the C. K. C. or A. K. C.

Section 2. A listed record shall be kept for dogs not eligible for registration under above rule.

Duplication of names in either case is not permissible.

ARTICLE VI.

Order of Business :

1. Roll Call.
2. Reading of minutes.
3. Reports and Communications.
4. Unfinished business.
5. New business.
6. Election of officers.
7. Adjournment.

ARTICLE VII.

8. The *Canadian Kennel Gazette*, Toronto, shall be the official organ of the Club, and all notices of meetings, &c. are to appear therein.

NOTE.—Change of Rule 26, Section 2.

The following change was made final as these alterations are to go before the club at the annual meeting for its approval, too late to effect shows held this fall. The rule will now read "changes in list can only be made up to date of closing of entries."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

A NEW COCKER KENNEL.

DR. ARMSTRONG, one of Toronto's well known medicos, has, with a partner, bought three Fascination puppies, a dog and two bitches, as the nucleus for a kennel of Spaniels. Mr. Barclay of George-

town, who bred Mr. Bell's Champion, I Say, I Guess, &c., was the vendor, and the GAZETTE the medium of sale. They will be shown at the Toronto local show.

MR. J. LORNE CAMPBELL,

so well and popularly known in the "doggy" world, has left Simcoe and is now residing in this city. Mr. Campbell while in Simcoe had many honors showered upon him; he has been reeve of the town, served as mayor for two years, and was permanent President of the Norfolk Agricultural Association. To our readers he will be better known as one of the first to become connected with the Canadian Kennel Club, and as a breeder and exhibitor of Gordon Setters. Mr. Campbell was for some years on the Executive of the Club and also acted as President for a term.

DR. H. S. GRIFFIN, HAMILTON,

has sent Dr. McNulty of Duluth, the Bull Terrier, Duke of Wentworth, a son of Principio. Dr. Griffin's brood bitches, Kathleen Mavourneen and Edgwood Robin, have both recently received Principio's amorous attentions.

MR. C. E. IRESON, TORONTO,

has disposed of the Greyhound bitch Lady Barnard II, by Jack Macpherson, out of Lizzie Agnes, to Dr. W. Schall, Moline, Mich. She is a fawn about five years old and was imported from England by Mr. Ireson.

MR. R. P. ROSS, WHITEWATER, MAN.,

while spending a holiday in the east, bought several dogs to take back with him. They comprise St. Bernards and Collies from Mr. P. Hart's Kennels and Cocker Spaniels from Mr. H. Parker Thomas.

WHO OWNS BIG BOB?

A "misplaced dog" case of some interest was tried before Judge Morgan last month. Some years ago Mr. Thompson of Woodstock, presented Rev. Father Molphy of Ingersoll, with a St. Bernard puppy, which the latter named Barry and transferred to His Grace Archbishop Walsh. Barry, Father Molphy told us, was shown in Buffalo some four years ago and won in the puppy class. Presumably the same dog was exhibited here last fall and was given an hc. card by Mr. Mortimer in the open class, but then under the name of Big Bob, and shown under the ownership of H. E. Jenkins. Not being present in the court until near the conclusion of the case (which occupied nearly an entire day), we did not hear the first part of the evidence, but from a local paper we

find that about two years ago the dog was lost and nothing seen of him until recently, when he was found in the possession of H. E. Jenkins, a commercial traveler, of 16 Bulwer street. The latter called the dog Bob, but it was identified as the missing Barry. By an order of the court the dog was replevined by the Archbishop, and the action yesterday was to determine his ownership. A large number of witnesses were examined, who swore that Bob was Barry, and a photograph of Barry was also used as evidence. On the other hand, Mr. Jenkins swore that he bought Big Bob, the name by which he calls the St. Bernard, in May, 1892, from one Jonas Foster, who is now in the States. He produced a receipt for \$5 and a watch, the consideration alleged to have been paid. He also produced Bob's pedigree, which showed him to be orange and white in color and entered in the Canadian Kennel Club's Stud book. He was whelped March 4th, 1889, at Coatesville, Pa. His sire was Celtic Relman, and his dam Maggie of Pinegrove, with the genealogical line of grandsires and granddams on both sides. The judge decided that Barry was Bob and Bob was Barry, and ordered that he be returned to the Archbishop.

Big Bob, however, though shown in Toronto with the letters C. K. C. attached to his name in the catalogue, is not registered, or even listed.

Mr. Jenkins appears to have been quite innocent of any wrong intent and has since replaced Bob by a dog purchased from Mr. J. S. Williams.

GONE TO THE DUMP.

We declined to publish in its entirety a letter containing an attack on our New York reporter as it showed to us an unnecessary amount of animus on the part of the writer from whom we really expected better, if only because he is a member of the Executive of the C.K.C. and holds a responsible position at the Chicago World's Fair. MR. HUGH M. WILLIAM'S, CARLETON PLACE,

rough coated St. Bernard, Guess Not, visited Mr. Akerleys Mount St. Elias on March 1st. We hear of several very promising puppies who own this day as their sire and are glad to know that his owner is getting a share of what business is going.

MR. A. D. STEWART, HAMILTON,

was taken seriously ill during the meeting of the C.K.C. Executive and was unable to leave his hotel that night,

staying over until the morning. We are glad to hear that he is much better and hope that the rest and change entailed by his proposed trip to England will result in the entire restoration of his old time vigor.

NO SHOW IN HAMILTON.

No one caring to undertake the preliminary hard work in connection with the show, in Mr. Stewart's absence, it is likely that Hamilton will not hold a show this fall.

VOL. II, C.K.C. STUD BOOK.

So little interest has been taken by the members of the Club and so little financial help in the way of advertisements and subscriptions tendered us in the publishing of Vol. II of the Stud Book that we fear unless more comes in in the near future we must abandon the idea. The publication of Vol. I resulted in a heavy loss, which it seems unfair should be borne by the publisher individually and it appears as if the publication of further volume would but lead to a still larger deficiency. We must ask breeders and owners, and especially members of the C.K.C. to assist in the publication or else let the matter drop.

WORLD'S FAIR SHOW.

At this writing there is nothing entirely new to bring before our readers notice. The promised revised classification list has not been issued nor has a judges slate yet been announced. These delays, we cannot but think, will tell against the show and result in a reduction in the number of entries that would otherwise be made. As far as the Canadian exhibit is concerned everything is right up to date, and Mr. Stewart and the Secretary of the C. K. C. are now arranging for the final list of entries, the issuing of the certificates required by the Exposition people &c. There has been an immense amount of work in connection with this exhibit and we for one will be glad when it is all over. We would impress on exhibitors the extreme necessity for showing their dogs in the very highest possible condition attainable, and of course it is understood that each and every dog will be as *clean* and *bright* as hard work can make him. We are desirous, and we are sure all dog lovers in Canada join us in this, that every entry may be shown in such "fit" shape that it shall be a credit to the kennel from which it is sent, and to the Canadian exhibit as a whole.

RED FELLOW AT STUD.

Messrs. R. S. & F. M. Gowans, Cobourg, have placed the winning red Cocker Red Fellow at stud at a nominal fee. He is by the well known Red Roland out of Mona, and won second in the open class at last New York Show, a fact which we unintentionally omitted to announce. He occupied a like position at Philadelphia.

GREAT DANES.

The Mount Royal Kennels are still reducing stock, and we learn that all their Danes are for sale. These include three of the Melac-Minerva's Fawn litter and that beautiful bitch herself. It is to be hoped that she will remain in Canada where there are so few good Great Danes. The puppies referred to above are now over a year old.

Entries for the Derby close June 1st. Forfeit money \$2.50 must accompany entry, second forfeit is payable September 1st, and \$5 additional for starters. The stake is for Setter or Pointer puppies whelped after January 1st, 1893. First, 40 per cent. of entrance money, second, 20 per cent. third, 15 per cent. fourth, 10 per cent. The trials will be held at Chatham, November 7th.

FOX-TERRIERS AT STUD.

The Cloverhill Kennels, Toronto, offer their stud Fox-Terriers Tom-Tom and Tee-Totaler to owners of brood bitches. Tom-Tom did well at Toronto and was placed first in open and first in novice classes at Ottawa last fall, taking also the special for the best Fox-Terrier in the show outside of challenge classes. Tee-Totaler has not yet been shown.

Mr. Chambers of Victoria received on April 19th a bitch by Rob Roy Macgregor out of Jennie Deans and is negotiating for a first-class stud-dog. Mr. Carmichael has also gone "Collie" and has bought a good young bitch Metchley Flurry, by Claremont Garry out of Roslyn Lena. She is a sable and white, seven months old.

MR. MERCER AND THE C.K.C.

Since Mr. Mercer's disqualification by the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club, nothing but abuse has been showered on the heads of the members by him and one or two of his friends, and for what reason?, for but carrying out the penalty laid on him by the Ottawa Committee of which he was then a member. Personally we have none but the kindest feelings towards Mr. Mercer, and the members of the Committee who considered his case, have also so expressed themselves to us. Here in our opinion is where Mr. Mercer errs, he imagines the members of the Committee are actuated towards him by a feeling of personal spite, an idea which for a moment we cannot entertain.

A brief *resume* of the case may throw light on some facts which mayhap are forgotten, or have been overlooked. First, Mr. Mercer claims the case was settled without giving him a chance to defend himself, well let us see; the following are extracts from the official minutes. From minutes of meeting held Dec. 19th, 1891, almost three months after the date on which the show was held. "The Secretary stated he had written Mr. Geldes * * * but owing to the illness of Mr. Mercer the matter had been left in abeyance." From minutes of meeting held February 1st, 1892. "The Mercer case was deferred owing to the continued illness of Mr. Mercer who wishes to appear before the Committee in person." It was not until May 6th that action was taken in the case and then not until Mr. Mercer had been suspended by the Ottawa Committee. The following is a copy of the letter forwarded by the Ottawa Committee to the C.K.C., and which appears in the minutes of meeting held May 6th, 1892. "At a meeting of the Ottawa Bench Show Committee, held the 16th day of March, 1892, in the matter of the complaint of James L. Little, of Brookline, Mass., that Mr. F. H. F. Mercer, one of the Committee of the said show, without his knowledge or consent, entered his dog Champion "Newcastle" at the show held in September last, in order that the challenge class might be divided, thereby enabling him to win a prize

to which he was not justly entitled. We, the Committee find the charge proven and hereby suspend the said F. H. F. Mercer, in accordance with Rule 23 of the C.K.C. Rules in that behalf, and the Committee recommend that the win thus obtained be cancelled and that Mr. Mercer be requested to refund \$5, the amount of the prize won.

The original entry blank and a copy of the catalogue showing the false entry in question were also produced at this meeting.

The case in a nutshell stands as follows: Mr. Mercer entered another man's dog without his knowledge or consent, for which he was suspended by the Committee of the show at which the illegal entry was made and of which Committee he was a member. Following up this suspension and acting on the evidence produced, the Executive Committee of the Canadian Kennel Club disqualified Mr. Mercer, and we fail to see how the action taken was unfair or unjust. A perusal of Mr. Little's letter read at the Executive meeting of April 6th and published in April GAZETTE gives the facts of the case fairly and squarely, without fear or prejudice.

we learn has just received a brace of Cockers from the old land a black dog and liver bitch, no further information has yet reached us other than they are of the "long and low" type.

ANOTHER KINGSTON MAN,

Mr. T. A. Carson, has given Mr. Farrow a commission to purchase for him a brace of Irish Water Spaniels to add to his kennel of this breed, of course good ones.

MR. A. A. MACDONALD

wishes us to again state the terms upon which he has offered a cash prize of \$100 at the Toronto Show of 1894. It will be open to any Fox Terrier under 20 months, sired by either his wire-haired importation Dark-Eye or his smooth Champion Blempton Trump. THE COLLIE-FOX SUPPOSED CROSS.

Editor Gazette:—

MR. W. Wade has been good enough to criticise my paper read before the Toronto Kennel Club, on The Dog as a Domestic Animal for which, he will please accept my compliments and thanks.

In the first part of the article I expressly pointed out that a man without opinion was a man without opposition etc. so that it is quite in order for Mr. Wade to make any remarks on the subject that he may feel disposed.

I give my opinion from handling a great variety of dogs of all sorts and conditions; in the course of my experience, there is no dog of any breed that I have had so much trouble

Were I asked my opinion as to the relative merits or demerits as to safety, I would place them thus: Collies, Retrievers, Bull Terriers, Spitz and the rest in relative situations, or I would divide them into two classes and say pure breeds and half breeds. It is quite in order for anyone to give their experience. With regard to color it is personally in my experience that the shepherds of Cumberland England take their bitches to the kennels and have them lined with the tamed dog fox, from that fact I am of opinion they gain their bushy tail and red colour.

It is quite in order for the opposition to advance another theory.

I do not think that Mr. Wade can point to any statement where I dogmatically assert that my statements were to be taken as actual facts without refutation nor do I claim any originality of expression. I have no acquaintance with Holy Moses or the Great Jehoshaphat but by the Living Ginger when I do meet the gay old dog from Hulton Pa., I will give him a Holy Smoke and load him up with a "Dogs Nose" with the hair from the tail of the dog that bit him, in great shape, that is if this pup does not get cropped and buried by the load of letters showered on his defenceless head by the admirers of the Collie.

JAUNDICE.

(Continued.)

BY DR. A. J. SEWELL IN *Kennel Gazette* (ENGLISH).

AS to diet, it must be light, at the same time nutritious. Soup made by boiling sheeps' heads with green vegetables, which should be strained, and all fat removed, may be given with bread or biscuit. If this is refused some boiled fish may be offered; failing this the patient must be drenched with beef tea, which should be given in a jelly form if there is sickness. It is important to keep the strength up, and when sloppy food and fish are rejected I frequently offer a small quantity of lean raw mutton several times a day,

rather than let the dog get weak. Sometimes milk will be taken, and may be given providing it can be digested and vomiting is not induced.

In the severe cases of jaundice, due to gaul stones obliterating the bile duct—this may sometimes be recognised from other forms by the patient showing symptoms of great pain, as previously mentioned, which is not otherwise the case—the medicine previously recommended should be given as well as the following pills:—

THE PILLS.

Ext. Belladonna	gr. iv.
Powdered Nux Vomica	gr. vi.
Excipient	q.s.

Mix and divide into 12 pills.

One or two, according to the size of the dog, to be given three times a day.

It is particularly necessary in these severe cases to keep the strength up, and concentrated food, as Brand's beef essence, is to be given in the jelly form every hour in teaspoonful doses.

When jaundice is due to growths in the liver or in other abdominal organs, and press upon this part, there is no cure except an operation and this is seldom of much use, for the percentage of deaths the result of abdominal sections in dogs is very great. When the growths are not large or situated in or press upon any vital organ, the jaundice which is of a chronic nature may often be subdued for a time by constantly giving the medicine recommended for this disease.

A DOG LESSON FROM CANADA.

SIR,—At a late meeting of the Toronto Kennel Club, a paper on "The Origin and Development of the Dog" was read by Dr. Wm. Mole, M.R.C.V.S. (England). This seems to be fulfilling one of the legitimate objects of a kennel club, for to improve the dog we must know something more or less, of what he is. The discussion of such subjects must lift those who take part in them to a higher level than the consideration of the details of a prize-list and the appointment of judges, necessary as all that is. Indeed, it is one of, and probably the very best, means that could be adopted for enabling us to make a wise classification of our dogs and a judicious arrangement for the premium-list.

It is unfortunate that in this country our dog clubs constantly ignore the intellectual pleasures that their association and its professed purposes seem to offer them as their prescriptive right. In reading the reports of meetings of our dog clubs, we find nothing but trivialities dealt with. There is always some change or other in the means of giving artificial value to dogs—through the operation of the premium lists and the laws governing their distribution—to be discussed, but anything of a higher mental order is unheard of.

Many years ago there was some faint whispering about the establishment of some sort of canine museum that should prove educational, if only by the preservation of representative dogs of various breeds. Even that would be excellent, and would at least provide object lessons on the changes in style of animals, nominally of the same variety, that become popular for a time and give place to something new and different.

A few years ago the Collie Club awarded a special prize in a Veteran Class to that grand Collie Charlemagne. I wrote, on hearing of the old dog's death, to the Rev. Hans F. Hamilton, expressing the hope that a cast had been made of the old dog's head, but I was too late with my suggestion, which was equally regretted by Mr. Hamilton and myself. If we had such Collies as Charlemagne, Trefoil, Old Cockie, and others, preserved by the taxidermist's art we might still prefer Collies of the present popular type, with their Borzoi-like head and ears on the summit of their narrow skulls, but we should at least be able to see at a glance how far we had gone away from the type considered to be correct at a date when dogs were not so completely severed from all connection with their natural work, and so entirely bred to take prizes and earn stud-fees, as they are to-day. The same deviation from what was once considered the best form has taken place in other breeds, and in some, no doubt, the changes are improvements; but that would make it no less interesting to be able to trace and mark the course of the change by actual illustration.

That, however, is only one small way of raising interest in dogs above the present level; and a good addition to such a museum would be sets of skeletons, paintings, engravings, and photographs of representative dogs of the various breeds at different dates.

Our Kennel Club is too exclusive, and our special clubs too small, to efficiently carry on the class of culture suggested by the action of the Toronto Kennel Club, but some friendly combination of such clubs might provide for the study of dogs, and of the dog, apart from the standard of prizes, without derogating from their dignity or diminishing their usefulness whilst, at the same time, one would think, greatly adding to the pleasure of one and all of their members, and benefitting outsiders.

I once heard a lecture on dogs, delivered at the *Workmen's Hall, Clerkenwell*, by my friend the late Mr. Arthur Nicols, and I can say safely that the man who did not learn more about dogs from that lecture than he could by a dozen visits to dog-shows, had solely his own mental incapacity to blame.

Dog-shows have many attractions and advantages. All I contend for is, that among true lovers of the dog, some steps forward and upward seem invitingly open, and would repay the exertion in taking them.

There are many ways besides those referred to which will doubtless suggest themselves to readers. To my mind, from observation of what is going on, I think the standard of dog-shows is lower than it was, and that—at the Agricultural Hall show a fortnight ago, for instance—there is seen an immense increase in the number of merely "pot hunting" exhibitors,

and as decided a decrease in the sportsman-exhibitor and those who in non-sporting varieties exhibited from honourable emulation without a view to ulterior gain. There is of course nothing wrong in dealing in dogs any more than dealing in railways; but the difficulty is to know among exhibitors who is the dog-dealer and who sportsman and dog-lover. And one would like some way of labelling them, just as we insist on grocers distinguishing their margarine from butter. Experts readily detect the dog-dealer under the guise of philonon; but unlabelled he is a puzzle to the public at large, and only one thing is certain about him, and that is, that he will aid in nothing that does not promise to bring grist to his own mill.

Let it be understood that I have nothing personally against Mr. Mercer, I had rather a high opinion of his abilities till he, as he himself declares, began to play blind chess, since then my opinion of him has altered and I think the C.K.C. is very well rid of persons who deal in the hidden art

which has resulted so "triumphantly." I leave it to the public to judge if the C.K.C. is right after reading Mr. Mercer and Mr. Little's letters.

Dr. Mills can very well take care of himself, for him I have nothing to say, but I feel that as one the originators of the C.K.C. that I cannot allow myself and the Club to be besmirched with dirt, without a protest. I am very sorry in this letter to appear personal, but there is no other course open to me, and I must defend myself or it would be supposed that all Mr. Mercer with his "little game" says is true, and that the Executive Committee have no minds of their own, but are led by the President to do his bidding.

If Mr. Mercer thinks he has not broken any rule of the C. K. C. allow me to call his attention to Rule 22, Sec. 1, and if he can prove that he has not broken that I will be only too glad to see him reinstated, or having broken it I think it is only justice to the Club for him to acknowledge his fault and ask (not demand) the Club to the remove disqualification.

THIRD ANNUAL SHOW.

THE Toronto Kennel Club is to be congratulated on the grand turn-out at the Show held May 12th and 13th. The entries totalled two hundred and sixty-five which considering no money prizes were put up is unprecedented, and shows that at any rate some breeders here are not in it for any financial gain.

The building, the Granite Rink, was suitable in every way, large, well lighted and ventilated and at no time was the faintest ill-smell noticeable. The aisles were wide, the benching new for the occasion and sawdust and straw plentiful and good. Dr. Mole, V.S., looked well after his part of

the work, and the Secretary, Mr. Fraser, proved himself exactly the right man in exactly the right place. The building was ready for the dogs and just as soon as they arrived were well bedded down and watered. Spratts Biscuits fed dry were used as feed.

The Show was opened on Friday forenoon by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Kirkpatrick and Mrs Kirkpatrick, both of whom took a lively interest in the exhibits. Mrs. Kirkpatrick was presented with a beautiful bouquet of sweet peas by little Miss Kirk the daughter of the genial President.

The officers and executive committee were attentive to exhibitors and exhibits, and every one seemed greatly pleased with the arrangements.

A pleasant and informal little dinner was given at the Granite Club on Friday evening, at which we noticed amongst others, the President, Mr. J. F. Kirk; 1st Vice-President, Mr. J. S. Williams, Messrs. C. A. Stone, G. B. Sweetnam, H. P. Thompson, J. O. Bennett, F. L. Mabee, George Bell, A. D. Stewart, Jno. Maughan, E. Tinsley, Dr. W. Mole, J. G. Mitchener, J. A. Spracklin (familiarly "Old Sprack"), H. B. Donovan and others. A pleasant hour was spent in discussing the good things provided and in social chat, and that bugbear of such gatherings, formal speechifying, was left severely alone.

Mr. Bell went about his work coolly and methodically taking plenty of time in giving his decisions and finished up a hard days work as calmly as when he began. Mr. Stewart ran his classes off in good shape and his awards were extremely well taken. The other judges Messrs. Tinsley and Maughan, (both well up in years), went into the ring like old veterans.

The awarding of some of the Specials was tedious but caused a good deal of fun, especially that offered for the best dog exhibited by a lady, the competition for which finally dwindled down to two, the Great Dane Casino, a very fair one and shown in grand condition and the Japanese Spaniel Jap, handled by Mrs. A. J. Rattray; the latter was eventually handed the prize, a beautiful basket of roses. The special for the best Terrier brought several really good ones into the ring including the Bull Terriers Principio and Vesper Belle, the Fox Terrier bitch Bonnet, the Irish Terrier the Canadian Ambassador, the black and tan Terrier the Black Earl, and amongst these, which have all won in good company, the decision lay; after a hard tussle Principio came out in front. Vesper Belle has lost all the shyness she at first exhibited in the ring, but was shown very fat and not clear in skin. She had afterwards to give way to Mr. Brodie's recent importation the wire-haired Fox Terrier Bonnet, for the best Terrier bitch.

MASTIFFS, dogs came first on the list, the winner, turning up in Minting Minor, a very fair dog failing a little in head properties. The only entry in Mastiff bitches failed to put in an appearance.

In GREAT DANES a young dog of exceptional merit won easily from the well known Don Caesar Jr. and Bismarck. At present he is rather timid, but if again exhibited is sure to render a good account of himself. In bitches Ruth a nice blue secured the award, the winners in both puppy classes are hardly up to first class show form.

ROUGH COATED ST BERNARD dogs made a good show although nothing of importance turned up, the winner Kenmore is a fine big upstanding dog, good in legs, feet, bone, and body, his chief fault is his muzzle which is not quite square enough, his skull fair and expression good. Laddie second also fails in muzzle and his expression is anything but good. The winner in bitches is just fair rather on the small side and not quite good in head properties. The winner in the puppy dog class is a fairly well developed youngster, but it is doubtful if he will ever make a flyer; he afterwards won the special for the best St. Bernard in the show.

NEWFOUNDLANDS brought out a really good one in Rover, in fact one of the best yet seen in this country. Major the second prize winner is too weak in head and he was not shown in the best condition. Turk's coat is his worst fault, Topsy the winner in the bitch class is just fair.

GREYHOUNDS proved one of the best classes in the show, both in regard to quality and numbers. Johnny Stringer the winner is a fine big upstanding dog, exceptionally deep in chest, with good legs and feet although the latter might be a bit closer, he would be improved if his neck was a trifle longer and cleaner. I considered Common who was sent out of the ring without mention, quite as good as anything in the class, and he should certainly have been and which award went to Mr. Sinclair's fawn dog Skinny. In bitches Erminie won easily from Elsie II and Topsy, both fair long tails.

In BEAGLES, the Albion Kennel supplied most of the winners, and the way in which the dogs were turned out reflects the greatest credit on their owners, some exceptionally promising young stock putting in their first appearance.

The POINTER classes brought out some very good ones and the awards seemed to give the utmost satisfaction.

ENGLISH SETTER DOGS saw the well known Sultan at the head of affairs, he was however closely pressed for this position by a coming youngster in Forest Rex, one with very few faults, and for which we predict a bright future, he afterwards won in the puppy class. In bitches the Forest Kennels again supplied the winner.

In IRISH SETTER Dogs it must have been a close thing between Larry Lisburn and Toronto Sport, the former winning in style and general symmetry, the later excelling in head properties and color. Hero a fair dog shown in bad condition. Rex is too light in eye and color.

The IRISH WATER and CLUMBER SPANIELS were very moderate specimens. In FIELD SPANIEL dogs champion Samson added another bracket to his already long list, a good one in Rosedale Teaser coming second, Footpath and Nap are also fair ones. Bitches saw a grand one in Rosedale Romp to the front she certainly had a hot rival in Mr. Spracklin's Grace, Rosedale Princess and Empress are both above the average.

ROUGH COATED COLLIES made a grand show and quality on the whole was much better than we expected to find. Finsbury Dude a much improved dog won easily from Scotsman a showy black and white his head is not quite correct in formation, stop too pronounced, which entirely spoils his expression he also gets his tail too high up. Dude on the other hand is a fairly good headed dog, possesses a grand coat of correct texture while his bone is first class. Macduff is a young dog that should again be heard of, he carries a magnificent coat, his head is above the average, and he possesses all the requisite points that go to make a good collie; Mr. Williamson's unnamed entry is also a grand coated black and tan. Collie bitches brought out a first class one in Nora, at present she is not in the best of coat but when in form should be able to hold her own in any competition. Strathroy a youngster of quality won in the puppy class, it is doubtful if he will ever be big enough for open class competition.

BULL TERRIERS turned out in great numbers some really good specimens being exhibited. Ch. Principio not only secured the award in this class but afterwards won the special for the best terrier in the show. A nice little dog in the unmentioned Bendigo jr. his fore legs might be a bit straighter but as this is his only fault it was too bad to penalize him so much for it. The Duke of Wellington 2nd is completely gone behind, while Chatham Bob is entirely wrong in formation of head, the others are all fair specimens but not good enough to win in this class. Bitches saw the New York winner Vesper Bell to the front, this is probably the best Bull Terrier bitch we have in this country, Kathleen Mayoureen is another good one she is evidently suffering from a severe cold and it was a mistake to exhibit her in her present condition; Snowflake is by no means a bad one and may do better where there is less competition.

FOX TERRIERS proved the best classes in the show, both in point of quality and numbers, quite a number of noted dogs meeting to do battle once again. In challenge dogs, Ch. Blemton Trump had no opponent, he is looking remarkably well and looks as if he had taken a new lease of life, we are glad to see so many of his descendants in the show and feel sure that if he only gets a chance his success at stud is but beginning. Smooth dogs, open class (17 entries) first Tom-Tom, a beautiful fronted dog whose expression is spoilt by a light eye. Belvoir Huntsman second should have given place to Calchas, a grand bodied terrier just a trifle full in cheek, he is one of the most showy terriers we have seen and had he even been placed first few could have

grumbled. Several good dogs had to be passed over in this class without mention. Open class, smooth bitches brought out a good one one in Belvoir Becky, her head and ears are very fair, her front about perfect while in other respects she is far above the average. Stardale Belle, should certainly have come next in order, however the award went to Tam-bourine, Belle beats her in nearly every point, and were her eye a shade smaller she would take a lot of beating by the very best. Puppy dog class saw a lot of promising youngsters that must some day make their mark. Thorne the winner is a flyer, spoilt by having one of his fore legs broken and has not been properly set. Tee-Totaler, is another good one. Puppy bitches, it must have been a stiff job to separate the winners here, however Mr. Stewart eventually landed about right, the third prize one Vixie was far too young to show, but she is certain to render a good account of herself ere long.

WIRE HAIRED FOX TERRIERS. Dark-Eye although entered did not arrive in time from England to show up, not a few of the fanciers felt dissatisfied at not seeing this grand Terrier make his *debut* in this country, we however expect him to arrive in the course of a few days. In wire haired bitches, Bonnet was the only competitor. Owing to the special for the best Fox Terrier in the show being presented by her owner she did not compete for it, but she afterwards proved her superiority by winning the special for the best Terrier bitch of any variety in the show.

IRISH TERRIERS. The Canadian Ambassador had no apponent, he afterwards won the special for the best Irish Terrier in the show. We certainly prefer the second prize bitch Peggy to her daughter Killarney Girl, in their present form, Peggy is a beautiful headed bitch with a perfect front. She is also in grand coat just now but she is shown in a far too obese state, Killarney Girl's expression is spoilt by a light eye and she is at present entirely devoid of coat, when in form she is without doubt a really grand terrier.

The SKY AND YORKSHIRE TERRIERS were just pasable.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS brought out two new ones both bred by Secretary Fraser, Jock the winner is fit to take a high place in the very strongest competition; Rob Roy is a grand black brindle whose future chances are marred by a crooked foot; Lovat is a grand Terrier too big for exhibition. In bitches Mr. Fraser's recent importation Braw-Lass a grand little terrier just rather timid at present won easily from Thistle and Highland-Lassie.

In BLACK AND TAN TERRIERS there was nothing good enough to stop the upward career of the Black Earl, he is looking well after his first winter here. Mr. Farrow's Sambo is a well marked young dog that should come to the front yet, while Rochelle Scott begins to show age. In Bitches the neat little Dina had no apponent.

BEDLINGTON TERRIERS were very poor and contained nothing worthy of mention.

Four good AIREDALES were exhibited and we are glad to see this useful breed making some headway in this country. The miscellaneous classes contained nothing startling unless it was the nondescript called a Japanese Pug, this dog looks as if it were bred between a Toy Spaniel and a Pomeranian. The selling class was a large one and contained quite a number of dogs well worth their catalogue price.
