DISSOLUTION OF THE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE A. K. C. AND THE C. K. C.

Our readers are no doubt aware from various sources, of the annulling by the A.K.C., of the reciprocal agreement existing between the two clubs since the inception of the C.K.C. The following extracts are from the official organ of the American Kennel Club: from Mr. Vredenburgh's (the Secretary's) report to the A.K.C. Executive, "Your Secretary again urges upon you the advisability of rescinding the agreement now in force with the Canadian Kennel Club, there being no possible advantage to this club in its continuance." Following is the official minute. "Dr. Perry offered the following resolution: Resolved, that the compact between this club and the Canadian Kennel Club be hereby discontinued. It was moved and seconded that all disqualifications of members of the Canadian Kennel

Club be now removed so far as this club is concerned.—*Carried.*" Some correspondence of importance has passed between the Secretaries of both clubs which we are unable to lay before our readers until passed upon by the Executive of the C.K.C. At any rate it is our emphatic opinion that the C.K.C. cannot and will not suffer from this action, but quite the contrary.

MR. MERCER AND THE "NEWCASTLE" ENTRY.

Under date of May 12th, received too late to notice in last issue, Mr. Mercer writes us at length regarding Mr. Little's letter to Dr. Wesley Mills, which appears in the official minutes of the meeting held April 6th last. We have not space to give the letter in full but in brief, Mr. Mercer's contentions are, that Mr. Little for the first time admits that Mr. Mercer wrote to inform him of his entry of his dog at Ottawa Show, that the reason he did not exhibit at Boston was that no challenge class was provided and that Mr. Little overlooks the fact that all along he (Mr. Mercer) has admitted having been guilty of an ill-advised act, and that Mr. Little has misjudged him in this.

A LATER LETTER FROM MR. MERCER,

referring to our editorial comments and Dr. Niven's letter in last issue has also been received. Mr. Mercer writes "the Ottawa Show Committee never recommended that I be disqualified as implied by your editorial last month." This is a mere quibble, we did not say the Ottawa Committee asked for his disqualification, what we did say and what actually is the case, is that "following up this suspension and acting on the evidence produced," Mr. Mercer was disqualified. There is no implication of such nature in our remarks. The rest of the letter contains nothing which has not already transpired and as far as we are concerned this ends the discussion of the Mercer-Little case in our columns. Of course if any further evidence should be produced before the C.K.C. it will be reported in the regular course of events.

COLLIE—FOX SUPPOSED CROSS.

Commenting on the letters which have recently appeared in the GAZETTE on this matter, the English *Stock-Keeper* of June 2nd says: "The question of the production of a fox and dog hybrid has cropped up in Canada, the chief disputing parties being Mr. W. Mole, M.R.C.V.S., of Toronto, who believes in the possibility of such a cross, and the versatile Mr. Wade, of Hulton, Pa., who entertains a contrary opinion. Mr. Mole entirely disclaims any desire to beat about the bush, and roundly asserts that "it is person-

ally in my experience that the shepherds of Cumberland, England, take their bitches to the kennels and have them lined with the tame dog fox, from that fact I am of opinion that they gain their bushy tail and red colour." The above quotation is certainly a little involved, but at the same time it is clear that Mr. Mole means it to be understood that he knows of the existence of a *bona fide* fox and dog hybrid. We therefore feel no diffidence in asking him to inform us of the whereabouts of the creature, and when he does so we will pledge ourselves to try and arrange to pay it a visit. In the meantime we prefer to remain on the side of Mr. Bartlett, superintendent of the Zoological Gardens, Mr. A. J. Sewell, and other authorities who inform us that they have heard of, but have never seen, an example of this cross."

OUR IRISH CONTEMPORARY,

The Kennel, etc., also takes up the tail remarking: "Doctors will differ. We have it on the authority of a gentleman who has made careful enquiry into the question that dogs and foxes do not breed; yet in the current number of the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE Mr. W. Mole, M.R.C.V.S., tells us that to his own knowledge shepherds in Cumberland (England) used to take their bitches to kennels where tame foxes were kept, and have them lined by them there. To this inter-breeding with foxes he ascribes the bushy tail or brush and the red colour of some Collies! But in such a case, where do the black-and-tan Collies—which also have bushy tails—get their brushes from?"

THE RELATIONS OF THE C.K.C. AND A.K.C.

Editor Gazette :—

IN view of the dissolution of the compact that has till recently existed between the Canadian Kennel Club and the American Kennel Club some expression of opinion may be expected from the President of the C.K.C. as to the present situation of affairs pending a meeting of the C.K.C. Financially and in most respects it is likely that the C.K.C. will gain by the change. Possibly it might have tended to better feeling if the C.K.C. had been approached in the matter before so decisive a step was taken, especially in regard to the matter of black lists. To me it is perfectly

clear that just as an extradition treaty tends to assist in the administration of justice between the two countries, so a recognition by each club of the other's black list, at all events in those cases involving a moral principle, would have tended to preserve and keep the kennel world pure. The reinstatement by the A.K.C. so far as it is concerned of one individual under the ban of the C.K.C. has been a matter of surprise. This man has had free access to a large part of the American kennel press and for some time has persistently misrepresented the C.K.C. and its officers, though Mr. Little's letter setting forth the nature of the offence for what he was disqualified has not been published by several of these papers thus showing their partizan character; nor do they seem to have taken any pains to ascertain whether the statements published by the individual under disqualification were correct or not. I assert that they were in great part a tissue of misrepresentations of the most malicious kind. The C.K.C. could not reinstate such a person and maintain its self-respect, and I can only believe that the A.K.C. did so either without due consideration or under misconception. For myself I am in favor of the C.K.C. recognizing the disqualifications of the A.K.C. when for a moral wrong, whether the A.K.C. reciprocates or not. The first thing in kennel as in other matters is to preserve integrity of character.

I am not certain that the C.K.C. has in the past taken the best means of gaining the respect of the A.K.C. We have in our show business exhibited too much anxiety to secure American patronage and assistance especially as regards judges. I have for some time felt that we would gain in every way by showing that we are capable of holding and managing shows entirely on our own responsibility. I am and have always been favorable to maintaining the most friendly feelings towards the A.K.C. and American dog lovers; but I hold more strongly than ever that the time has come when a spirit of independence—independence with friendly feeling—will be for the welfare of the C.K.C. and all interested in dogs in Canada. No doubt our American friends will be glad as in the past to compete for our prizes; but if we have not learned to manage our own shows throughout it is time we did, and the sooner we begin the better.

COCKER TYPE.

Editor Gazette:—

AS an admirer and breeder of Cocker Spaniels of some years past allow me through the medium of your valuable columns to say a word or two on

behalf of this to my mind very useful and handsome dog, for I fear that unless someone does so we are likely to lose the breed altogether as a look at the classes assigned to them at our bench shows of the present day will not fail to convince the lover of what used to be in days gone by a merry and active dog, but now is fast becoming a stunted and deformed little animal. As he gazes in astonishment at the various types exhibited therein, I venture to say that it is difficult to find a true Cocker amongst the lot. Now what will he see? First, a short bodied, heavy and clumsy animal, with a coarse head, low on his legs, heavy bone, etc., then a dog longer in the body and generally so in head (more like a Field Spaniel than a Cocker), especially muzzle which is likely to be snipey, legs still shorter, bone heavier and often crooked and turned out in front like a Daschund, next a still smaller little animal lighter in bone perhaps, with a still shorter and clumsier head, dish faced, turned up nose, and if you examine his mouth, almost sure to be under-shot. Surely this little fellow must be in the wrong class, as his owner could never have called him a Cocker, at least not if he understood anything about what the breed should be. Now Sir, these may all be very handsome dogs to look at, but let me ask what earthly use any of them would be in the woods or swamps to follow the sportsman all day long in pursuit of the birds it is their business to find for him, or rather are they not fit only to lie on the hearthrug of some ladies drawing room basking in the light of her sunny smiles, (or may be perhaps frowns,) especially if his feet have soiled the carpet or rug he is at present reclining on. I am sure some of the toys I have seen are only fit for this.

Is it not time for sportsmen to cry out and urge upon the Spaniel Club to fix upon some more useful and uniform type so as to encourage the breeding of a dog that would be fit for use and not ornament only, such dogs as Idstone, Hutchison, Stonehenge and a host of other writers I could mention, speak of, at anyrate if such specimens must be shown let our bench show committees make a separate class for toys. I hope Sir, the day is not far distant when we shall see a revival of the old type which I feel sure would gladden the heart of every sportsman. I have myself owned and shot over a good many Cockers, and I never yet saw a dog such as I have spoken of that could work with a dog of lighter build and higher on his legs. We might then go to a show expecting to see a class of useful dogs and Cockers, not as we see now one made up of a mixture of Field Spaniels, Norfolk, Suffolk, Clumber, King Charles and the Lord only knows what other breed of Spaniel. ARE COLLIES TREACHEROUS.

Editor Gazette:

ON the question of whether Collies are treacherous, I suggest that other readers communicate their views as to whether Dr. Mole or I is correct; Mr. Robert McEwen has had a long experience with the breed and his views will be accepted as thoroughly unprejudiced despite his interest in the breed; doubtless you have many more such in Canada.

As to the existence of fox blood in Collies, Dr. Mole continues the mischief I complain of; unless accompanied with an express qualification, the statements of a professional man on such a point always carry professional weight (bar those who have no weight of any kind professional or otherwise), and I contend that Dr. Mole should not make loose statements on such a point; for mark you, he does not sustain the fox blood idea with proof, but mentions Collie bitches in Cumberland England, being bred to dog foxes, but that proves nothing, the point is, did they breed to the foxes? You can put a she mule to a horse once a day for a year perhaps—but progeny will be nil; but still beyond this, comes the most important question supposing a bitch does have pups by a fox, are the pups fertile or infertile? I doubt not that Dr. Mole reads the London *Stock-Keeper* and he must have seen the calls for any evidence as to the existence of a fox-dog cross, or the fertility of such a cross. Again Dr. Mole's citation of practice in Cumberland is lame, for local practice there would not affect the whole race of Collies everywhere. Another misfit is the derivation of color in Collies from the fox, for that leaves a wide gap in accounting for the color of a red smut bulldog; nor will the theory hold water that the brush of the Collie evinces descent from the fox; the wolf has often the same brush, and it is admitted that the wolf and dog interbreed freely and produce fertile offspring, and as of chasing hares, anything canine will do that, even a Bulldog or Pug. I thoroughly believe that Dr. Mole wrote hastily, failing to weigh all his words. Dr. Mole's writings have struck me as coming from a man of sense, and even men of sense sometimes speak and write mischievously from lack of deliberation.

DIARRHŒA IN DOGS.

DIARRHŒA is a frequent and profuse discharge of loose or fluid alvine evacuations. The disease arises from many causes, and is of very frequent occurrence in dogs of all ages. It is seen in puppies a few days old, the result of the dam's milk being of too acid nature. It is also frequently noticed in puppies that have just been weaned, caused, as a rule, from a change of diet, or from worms. There are several other different forms of the disease, arising from various causes, as for instance simple diarrhœa, the result of something that has been eaten, irritating the membrane of the bowels, inducing an excessive secretion of fluid from the glands, and hence the watery motions. This form of the disorder may also follow a change of diet. In such cases it quickly passes off.

Some dogs of a weak digestion have severe diarrhœa after eating bones. Worms again will induce an irregularity of the bowels, some days the motion being loose or even quite watery, to be followed by constipation for a time and then diarrhœa again, which will often continue off and on until the cause is removed. Mouldy bread or biscuits, food that has turned sour from being allowed to stand too long after mixing, are frequent causes of bowel mischief. Chills, again, will also cause the complaint, and it is very frequently observed in cases of distemper. It is supposed by many that the diarrhœa which so often occurs in this disease is of a specific kind. I am not of that opinion, but believe it to be caused by indigestion, the result of weakness, and it is often of a very severe form. The evacuations in simple or irritative diarrhœa consists first of soft motion, but which are soon followed by watery evacuations of an offensive smelling nature. When this kind of diarrhœa is neglected, an inflammatory form of the disease often follows, the result of the mucus membrane of the bowels becoming inflamed; then the discharges increase in frequency and quantity, mucus, and also at times blood, is mixed with the motions, accompanied by a good deal of straining, and the animal becomes feverish, the nose hot and dry, the point of the tongue red and dry, whilst the back of the mouth is sticky looking, and there are signs of pain when the abdomen is touched. There is loss of appetite, and the dog quickly loses flesh.

Bilious diarrhœa is due to an excessive secretion of acrid bile. In these cases, which often occur suddenly, the motions are very profuse and watery, and there is considerable sickness, the vomited matter being tinged with yellow; the thirst is excessive, and the animal becomes quickly dejected. This form of the disorder is frequently seen in pet dogs, and

is generally the result of over-feeding with food of a rich and greasy description, or from eating some decomposed matter often picked up in the street or the dust-bin. If the sickness is not quickly stopped the attack will often prove fatal. The great point in these cases is to prevent the dog drinking water to excess, in fact, water should be entirely disallowed whilst there is any tendency to sickness, as it only increases the vomiting, which occurs after every draught of the fluid, and if this continues gastritis follows.

There is another form of diarrhœa due to disordered liver, but, unlike the last kind described, it is seldom accompanied by vomiting. The motions in these cases are copious and liquid, and of a greyish white colour, denoting an inactivity of the liver.

Nervous diarrhœa is often seen in dogs, especially when the subject of complaint is disposed to suffer from epilepsy; and, during an attack of the latter disease, the bowel trouble is often very acute, this is particularly noticed in distemper cases, when the nervous system is affected, and no doubt often accelerates death. This form of diarrhœa is frequently noticed, too, in puppies of a nervous disposition, which is often practically demonstrated if the youngster happens to be thrashed, and the same thing again is frequently seen amongst pet dogs when upset.

There is yet another form of diarrhœa called chronic diarrhœa, the result in most cases of indigestion. This kind is not confined to dogs of any particular age, though it is more often seen in those more advanced in years, at the same time it may, and does, occur in young ones, the result of neglected simple diarrhœa, which at first it resembles but as time goes on, if it is not checked, much of the food that is eaten is passed through the bowels quite undigested. The motions in these cases are not very frequent, but when they occur they are copious, and generally of a pale yellowish colour, and pieces of undigested food are noticed amongst the evacuations. The animal loses condition, the ribs and haunches becoming very prominent, and the head and face are drawn and thin, with eyes sunken. The nose is hot and dry, and the mouth palid; the coat is dull-looking, rough, and staring.

In the treatment of diarrhœa great importance should be attached to the diet; food should be given just warm, in small quantities, and often—about every four hours—and it should consist of milk, or weak mutton broth, or beef tea thickened with cornflour or arrowroot, or with rice, sago, or tapioca added; in severe cases the milk or broth may be thickened with isinglass. If the diarrhœa continues the milk should be discontinued. Water alone should not be allowed, but that in which rice or barley has been boiled

may be offered, or else water to which has been added the white of egg. The patient should be put in a dry warm kennel, and in cold weather warmly clothed. No exercise is to be given; in fact, the quieter the dog is kept the better the chance of a quick recovery.

In some cases of diarrhoea, especially those of a chronic nature, a diet composed entirely of lean raw meat may be given, frequently with great benefit. Mutton is the best, as it is more easily digested, but many dogs prefer beef, to which there is no objection. It should be given in small quantities, and often.

As to the medical treatment of this complaint, the mistake is often made of commencing with giving astringent instead of some remedy to try and remove the cause. Of course, an astringent will frequently check the diarrhoea for a time, or, at any rate, so long as they are continued, but it invariably returns as soon as the medicine is left off; besides, there is a great danger in trying to stop the diarrhoea, whilst the cause remains, of inducing enteritis or inflammation of the bowels, which is a serious disease in dogs; therefore, first, give some remedy to try and remove the matter that is setting up the bowl trouble. If worms are suspected, which is, as previously stated, a most common cause of diarrhoea, especially in young puppies, a vermifuge is needed, followed by a dose of castor oil. Then, if the diarrhoea continues after the worm medicine has worked off, give in cases of young puppies, say, from six to eight weeks old, some mercurial preparation. For these young patients I find the homœopathic preparation of Mercurius Sol.^{3x} useful, given in doses from three to five grains, according to the size of the puppy, and which should be repeated three times aday. If this does not succeed in checking the diarrhoea after two or three days, then try carbonate of bismuth, in doses from three to six grains, given every four hours on the tongue.

For the treatment of older puppies and dogs, with simple diarrhoea, give one of the following mixtures or pills, but, before commencing the astringents, give an aperient with the idea of removing the offending cause. Simple castor oil is the best, and the dose, of course, must vary according to the size and age of the dog, from one teaspoonful for small or young puppies or lap dogs, to two tablespoonsful for full-grown big dogs, as St. Bernards, etc.

NO. 1 MIXTURE.

Carbonate of Bismuth	}	of each 1 dram.
Prepared Chalk		
Powdered Catechu		
Chloric Ether	2 drams.
Tincture of Opium	1 dram.
Sol. of Gum Tragacanth	1 ounce.

Water to..... 6 ounces.
Dose: One teaspoonful to two tablespoonsful three or four times a day.

THE PILLS.

Kino.....	1 dram.
Powdered Ipecacuanha.....	1 scruple.
Powdered Opium	6 grains.

Excipient q.s.

Mix and divide into 12 pills.

One or two to be given three times a day.

NO. 2 MIXTURE.

Laudanum	2 drams.
Tincture of Rhubarb.....	1 ounce.
Peppermint water.....	6 ounces.

Dose: From one teaspoonful for the smallest dogs, to two tablespoonsful for the largest ones, three times a day.

As to diet, it should consist of milk, thickened with arrowroot, weak beef tea, or mutton broth thickened with arrowroot, cornflour or isinglass, and rice or barley water, or water with white of egg added, given to drink. When the diarrhoea is persistent, discontinue the milk diet and give only the thickened broth. If the dog seems to require a more solid food than that just mentioned, rice, tapioca, or sago puddings, made with milk and egg, and baked, may be offered. When there are symptoms of inflammatory diarrhoea, and much mucus with blood is being passed with the motions, after giving the aperient (castor oil) the following mixture may be administered, but let the oil first work off before commencing it.

NO. 3 MIXTURE.

Chlorodyne.....	1 dram.
Carbonate of Bismuth.....	2 drams.
Sol. of Gum Acacia.....	1 ounce.
Water to.....	6 ounces.

Doses: Two teaspoonsful to two tablespoonsful three times aday. If the diarrhoea continues after two or three days then try the following pills on the No. 2 mixture:—

THE PILLS NO. 2.

Sulphate of Copper.....	6 grains.
Powdered Opium.....	6 "
Extract of Hyoscyamu.....	12 "

Excipient q.s.

Well mixed and divide into 12 pills.

Full-grown Fox Terriers and other dogs, of similar size, one pill; St. Bernards, Collies, &c., two pills three times a day.
