Then we find the Pug Peoria Jerry credited with a second prize in the catalogue, although this same Jerry was dead and presumably in his grave, having been run over in Buffalo. Was he stuffed "Uncle," or was he present in the spirit?

MR. G. M. GIBBS,

formerly of Galt is now living in Sarnia, and has named his kennels the Ontario Kennels. With Mr. Gorman, Mr. Gibbs, Mr. Wanless and some others in the town and near by, Sarnia is growing quite doggy.

A NEW COLLIE.

Messrs. A. J. & H. L. Jeffrey, Stratford, have imported the Collie dog Ightenfield Chief one of Mr. Walter Curl's breeding. He is a sable and white about a year and a half old, by Burnly Enterprise who is by Edgbaston Excelsior out

of Walton Lassie, out of Prairie Flower by Denver out of Lady Flora; Denver by Champion Squire out of Champion Princess Sheila. He has won amongst other prizes, first, puppy class Rochelle, first puppy, first novice, second open and special, Halifax; first novice, and third open Middleton; second puppy, third novice, at Preston, &c., so has done pretty well for a youngster. He arrived too late for Toronto Show.

CHAMPION GREAT DANE.

The Mount Royal Kennels' Great Dane bitch Minerva's Fawn has now attained championship honors, being the first of this breed in Canada to secure this standing. She has won under Messrs. Lacy, Davidson, Mortimer, Mason, Fellows, Miss Whitney and others. She is as yet only a little over three years old and is in perfect health and condition. She was never mated but once—to Champion Melac, the produce furnishing three of the winners at the recent Canadian shows, the Mount Royal Kennels winning the Canadian Kennel prize at Toronto Show for this breed.

CHAMPION BLEMONT TRUMP

probably the best known Fox Terrier in Canada is soon leaving the land of the beaver for that of the bird of freedom, his owner, Mr. A. A. Macdonald having sold him to Mr. Waterman of Santa Barbara, California. He will remain one month longer in his old home, and puppies the product of his amorous affections during that time will be eligible to compete for the hundred dollars offered by Mr. Macdonald, at the Toronto Show of 1894, but of course the contract ceases once he leaves for the south.

THE "ASHMONT" TROPHY.

We have no desire to get tangled up in the controversy over this award, but may state that Mr. Stone had no positive knowledge of the conditions of competition and any thing he sent out was inspired by his general idea of the conditions from previous decisions. The conditions under which it was offered at Toronto, were that it was to be awarded to the best dog in the show competing dogs to be judged by Mr. Mason. As far as the show Committee is concerned the trophy was placed according to published rule, be that rule right or wrong.

MR. H. BEDLINGTON, OF HAMILTON,

has for years bred that breed of Terriers bearing his name and has had some good ones including his well known Sentinel who however is, we regret to say, no more, having recently died (cause unknown) at the kennels of Mr. R. Wanless, at Sarnia. Mr. Bedlington may now take a turn at the Dandies.

Forest & Stream SAYS:

"In the Toronto show catalogue there is a rule to the effect that where novice classes are provided they shall be judged before open classes. This is a good rule if it were adhered to. It has been so at former shows in the Queen City, but this year it was not, and the show management distinctly violated one of the rules of the C.K.C. While on this subject it might be proper to ask of what use are novice classes, anyway? Dog shows are supposed to be a medium whereby the best dogs of a district or districts are brought together to ascertain which are the best in the several breeds. Now, what is the use of a restricted

class that does not appeal to the public as an educator. Lately we have seen novice classes which are simply a repetition of the awards in the open and practically saddled the management with two classes, where one, the open, would have been sufficient. Dog shows are supposed to bring out the best dogs, but a dog not good enough to win in open, perhaps is able to do so in novices. There an inferior dog is credited with a position and a sort of fictitious value that in comparison with the open class winner he is not entitled to. A puppy class, if we will give puppy classes, should be enough for the youngster, as novice dogs as a rule are. The class is superfluous and only a drag on the show committees, who might better add the money given to these classes to the challenge, which often is too poorly provided for. Instead of restricting the challenge classes to one class for both sexes, or the amount of prize money, as we find in so many cases, where novice classes are given, abolish the latter and give more inducement to the showing of dogs which presumably (of course there are exceptions) are superior exemplars of their breed, and as such are public educators, and in many cases worth a dozen of the novice class winner, who very seldom gets above vhc. when he competes in the open class. We should like to hear the opinions of others on this subject, as we believe it has been discussed among dogmen in a desultory fashion from time to time. Every dog that is over twelve months old, we contend, unless he is eligible for the challenge classes, should when shown take his chances with those in the open class, and those under twelve months are provided for by the puppy classes, and their status is conveyed as such to the public. The fact that they, the novice class awards, don't count on reckoning wins for the challenge class shows that they are a superfluity. If we are to have novice classes, however, let them be judged first, before the open."

The rule referred to is an additional rule of the show committee and is not a C.K.C. regulation. With the remarks of our contemporary we in great part agree, but the reference as to these classes being a drag on show committees is certainly not correct. The money offered in novice classes is as a rule small and the show gets the benefit of the extra entry money with no additional expense for benching, feeding, etc., as nine times out of ten a dog eligible for the novice class will also be entered in the open class, as well as in the puppy class, if one is provided, and he is the right age.

JUDGING REQUIRING EXPLANATION.

Editor Gazette:

I NOTICE among other reversals of Mr. Davidson's Toronto decisions at Ottawa Show the following: Irish Setter bitch 4th (V.H.C.R.) at Toronto, 1st at Ottawa over the bitch 1st at Toronto. Both bitches were in about equally good condition, we may assume. As both judges hailed from the United States it is not likely that Canadians will say that either was incompetent. They might have taken this ground if they had been their own countrymen. It is highly improbable that the American press will assume it.

Such a great difference in the awards can hardly be explained by mere "difference of opinion" i.e., such difference as may rightly exist. We have not yet read the report of either judge on these two bitches.

Is this not a case that among other things illustrates the need of judges reports? Now if both these bitches had been scored to the scale of 100 by these judges anyone could ascertain the opinion of each judge as expressed with mathematical accuracy. Such is constantly done in the case of fowls and other animals. Anyhow something is radically wrong somewhere and this case shows it. Others might have been selected of a similar kind.

I am personally not concerned but write in reference to the principle involved.

TORONTO DOG SHOW.

SPANIELS—In field spaniels, challenge dogs, Judex scored another win. He looked well and had no difficulty in beating Samson, who had to be content with hc., rather hard on him, I think. No entries in corresponding bitch class. Open dogs (black) first prize withheld and second awarded to Pedro, a medium specimen whose poor head and short, cocker body will always handicap him; Nig, third, shows no quality. In open black bitches Mona was first and rightly so, beating Grace, second, in head and body. Both show their cocker breeding. In liver dogs and bitches, Napoleon first, Queen, second third and fourth prizes withheld, was the order. I cannot agree with the placing of this class, Queen scored in head, muzzle, set on of ear, legs and feet, about equal in coat, but losing in condition. Any other color dogs and bitches, Workman won with some to spare, beating Antique, second, in head and set on of ear, both have well-ribbed bodies; Leslie, third, is high on leg and coarse headed.

In challenge cockers, only two entries, Black Duke and King of Obos. The judge was very careful in making his decision, but Black Duke could not be denied, and amid much excitement received the coveted blue, with the second edition of King of Obos, second. Spaniel men wondered at the change in this old timer. "What!" they said. "A new set of teeth?" "Well, well, what will friend George be able to turn out from his world-renowned cocker factory next?"

But alack-a-day! subsequent demands for the recipe showed that "Uncle Dick" had got the Bell entries mixed and brought the wrong dog to the show, and the second prize winner was Black Jacket, an unknown quality, with nothing but the afore mentioned set of teeth. Mr. Bell's attention being called to the case, he withdrew Black Jacket and the award was cancelled. Black Duke the winner, is well-known, a shy dog in the ring, he does not show himself to the best advantage. He looked better than I have ever seen him before, and the good work he has done in the stud, he having sired Woodland Prince, Oban and many others, will always leave his name on the roll of fame as one of our best cocker sires. In challenge bitches, I Say, not looking in her usual good condition, was alone and added another blue to her long string of prizes.

In challenge cockers other than black that good red dog Red Jacket won well in hand from Red Roland, second, beating him in head, body and cocker character. In challenge bitches other than black, Jessie C had a walk over. Open dogs (black), competition was very keen and the issue long in doubt. The judge finally selected Pickpania for first, Black Dufferin II. second, Woodland Prince third, and Black Brant fourth. The winner shows much quality, has filled out nicely in head, and was properly placed first. The third prize winner, Woodland Prince, should, however, in my opinion have been a very close second, beating Black Dufferin II. in head, muzzle, body, in front and behind. The last named is not right in skull or muzzle; his lips do not set right, giving him a poor expression. Black Brant, fourth, is a taking little dog of quite some quality, but loses to the three first placed in head, body and front legs. Beau Kay, reserve, ran him closely for fourth honors. In open class black bitches, competition was also very close. Rideau Reine, Realization, Kitty and Cora II were selected for the honors in the order given. I looked this class over very carefully and agreed with the placing of the first three, but am of the opinion that Cora II should have given place to Lady Dufferin, who more closely resembles the winner in head and general formation. Realization is not at her best and did not show to advantage, moving very sluggishly. Had she moved freely and not been quite so heavy in flesh she would, I think, have run the winner very closely. Kitty, third, is a good little dog of much quality and moves well. She will, I think, improve.

In open class, other than black, Hamilton Jack was awarded first, Red Obo second, Red Justice third and Golden Rod fourth. The winner loses in head and body to the second winner, does not move so freely and should have been in my opinion, second, with Red Justice third and Brantford Red Star fourth; he beat Golden Rod in head and

front. In corresponding bitch class Tonita was selected for first honors, with Bessie Warner second, Gipsy Queen third, and Raglan Russette fourth. I cannot see how the judge arrived at this decision. The issue, it seemed to me, lay between the second and fourth prize winners, the winner losing to them in body, eye, legs and feet. Between the second and fourth it is very close, but I think that although Raglan Russette loses to Bessie Warner in coat and a trifle in head, in other points she shows such excellent quality, nicely ribbed body, better colored eye, good legs and feet and moves so freely she should have won, with Bessie second, Tonita third and Gipsy Queen fourth. In the novice classes the winners are to be found in the open classes. In novice dogs Woodland Prince, second, should have won over Hamilton Jack, who was, I think, wrongly placed first. Cocker puppies were not a very promising lot, but cockers change so much in the days of their youth it is hard to say. Black Dufferin II., who was second in the open class, was first in puppies. His head will, I think, improve as he matures.

In Irish water spaniels the challenge dog prize was withheld from Trouble, who, although shown out of coat, might have had the ribbon. Although not altogether a good one, he is above the average shown in this country, and shows enough quality to entitle him to be more kindly treated. We must encourage this useful breed, and withholding the ribbon on account of the dog not being in the best condition does much to dishearten an exhibitor. In open dogs Musha won, with second to Dan Rice, who loses to the winner in head, topknot, coat and condition; neither are good ones. In bitches Shellia won, with Rose O'Neil second; both bad in front; the winner gains in coat, head and curl.

Two Clumbers were shown, one in each class. Darby winning in challenge class and Rake II in the open class. The former is well-known; Rake II has a good body and coat and moves well; his head is somewhat poor and lacking in type.

The field spaniel cup was won by Judex, and this being Mr. Foster's fourth victory for this honor, the cup is now his property.

The kennel prize was awarded to Mr. Laidlaw's team. To my mind the more even team of blacks shown by Messrs. Luckwell & Douglas should have won.

On the whole, spaniels were a fair lot, not showing much improvement, but about holding their own. Mr. Wilmerding, the ever popular, did well except in the cases I have referred to. He did not "raise them up," as he was expected to do, but in one or two instances lowered them. We do not want to come to the Type specimen of a cocker, and if we go slow and feel our way, as breeders have been doing of late years, I think we will before long be able to select a

truly typical cocker as our standard bearer. It is much to be regretted that Mr. Bell lost that grand little dog Fascination and that good bitch Troublesome; but tucked away carefully in his most secure hiding place, it is dollars to cents "George" has something that will astonish the natives in the coming year.—E. M. OLDHAM, in *Forest and Stream*.

The following reports on Mr. Mason's classes are from the *Fanciers Journal* of which periodical that gentleman is editor.

Collies—There was quite a bit of quality here. Challenge dogs had The Squire and Roslyn Dandy. The former, of course, won. In bitches, Metchley Surprise was alone. Open dogs was a good class of nine and a most difficult one to judge. Wellesbourne Charley, though not in full coat and shown lighter in loin than we have ever seen him, won comfortably from Chesterford Marvel, that was also not at his best. This is a nice-headed young dog, but he is on the small side and not Charlie's equal in either coat, bone or expression. His outline is correct. Finsbury Dude is not quite one of our sort, and he got the position simply because in his grand coat as compared with the seedy appearance of those behind him he deserved it. His head is on the coarse side, ears not well up, shoulders rather heavy, hocks and gait not all that is desired and loin flat. Against this he has size, good bone, fairly good muzzle, proper feet, correct brush, nice color and the best coat in the class. Chesterford Hero, reserve, is out of coat, under size, light in bone and only moderate in feet. Still, he is of vastly better type than Finsbury Dude, and had he been in full coat would have beaten him. Yardly Fox, vhc, is a good-fronted young dog, standing too high for his length of legs, too short in loin and not very nicely turned behind the hips. He is all out of coat and, notwithstanding his English record, we placed him vhc. Curzon is also very short in coat and seemed leggy and tucked up. Metchley Bob, hc, is coarse in head, but much above the average in coat and bone. McDuff, unnoticed, is a prick-eared one. In bitches, Nora, not just right in front of the eyes and too large in the ears, won. She was crowded by Bertha II., that had she been in good coat might have won. Dawn, short and soft in coat, out at elbows and with not the best of ears, was a good third. She was second at New York. These are good bitches. The fourth prize winner was too plain in front for such company. Bernier, vhc, is wrong in ears, besides being short and soft in coat. Invercauld Beauty, hc, lacks in coat and ears. Her legs and feet are not of the best. Mona and Flora C., unnoticed, are not show dogs. Chesterford Marvel, Finsbury Dude and Chesterford Hero repeated in novice dogs. Columbus, vhc, is a puppy. He lacks in head, coat and ears. Mac, reserve, is handicapped

with a rather coarse head and he is a bit straight behind and faulty in ear carriage. Rover, hc, is a big coarse dog, whose coat was largely responsible for his card. Clyde, hc, is off in head, ears and hind parts. Glendale, c, will do in mane and frill. He is prominent and coarse in skull and has a very scanty under-coat. Kenneth, unnoticed, is no show dog, prick ears, a badly damaged limb and other defects go to supply the make-up of a very queer looking animal. Nora repeated in bitches. Bodkin, second prize, is altogether too small, but shows much collie character. Mattie, third prize, we have no notes on, but remember her as wrong in ears and short in coat. Cheyne, reserve, a bit too much on the ant-eater order and was not in good condition. Puppies were a poor lot of five. Seminole Kennels easily won the kennel prize.

Bull Dogs—Romance, a good white and brindle, won, unopposed, in dogs, while Mr. Stewart's recent importation was also alone in bitches. The Salem dog, in addition to other defects, and no dog is without, would be greatly improved by more layback, and Mr. Stewart's bitch is longer in front of the eye than we like.

Terriers—Crish, a little off in head, took the prize of \$10 for challenge bull terrier dogs. The bitch class contained no entries. Duke of Rochester, the heavy-weight open dog class winner, I thought a good winner, even though his front is not right and his body too light. Chatham Bob, second prize, was well beaten in head, as was also John L. Sullivan. Billy Bulger, reserve, needs time to let down, but this will not correct his cutaway face. I fancy if this class had been judged by daylight there would have been a turn up in the positions of these three dogs, for one of them has very light eyes, which were quite unnoticed in the twilight, which is a very difficult one for judging color. Competition in the bitch class was very keen and for some time it seemed anybody's plum. One seldom finds three dogs so evenly matched, but the judge, who seemed to be quite at home with them, rendered a sound decision when Edgewood Robin won, with Vesper Bell second and Lady Velmer third. Strange to say, they all have the same defects, in muzzle and eyes, Robin's though, were least marked, and she won, hard pressed. Principio was too good for Ted Pritchard and Earl of Rochester. His head and eyes might be better, but he has a good body. Pearl of Rochester, first prize winner under 30 lbs., weight, is smart and would do better with more strength near the eyes. The others lack in head, only more so. Pups were good. They competed in open class. Scottish were a very grand collection. Kilroy and Tiree are worth going many miles to see. The former never was in such condition. Tiree eventually won,

with Kilroy close on his heels. The winner has it in legs and coat, and in ears and size. Open dogs a grand class. Rhuduman, looking better than I have ever seen him, could not be turned down, even though there was a real good young one pressing him for first honors. Wankie Ted is this pup's name. He was bred by Mr. Henry Brooks, and but for rather poor shoulders would make things interesting for the best of them. He has a good head, excellent body and coat and showed up well under judgment. Kilcree acted very badly in the ring, taking on his most sullen expression and once or twice positively refusing to stand up. When Mr. Green did get him agoing he hung his head as if he were ashamed of its being seen. I doubt, though, if he can beat the pup, no matter how well he shows up. He got third. A son of Kilroy got reserve, and at present he is too lathy and light compared with Ted. The Colored Preacher tried his best to bite everybody and everything. His ears were badly carried as usual. Vhc, was his portion. Lovat is entirely too large and Jock was out of coat. Each got vhc. Wankie Kennels made a clean sweep of the bitch class, winning first, second and third. The recipient of the first prize was bred by Mr. Brooks, whilst the others were from Mr. H. J. Ludlow's kennel. Compton Lass, reserve, is only fair, and Braw Lass was quite distanced by the winners. Wankie Tam won in pups, with Compton Belle second. Dr. Foote took challenge honors for black and tan terriers, Broomfield Sultan winning easily from Rochelle Madge. Sambo in open class of dogs, won by reason of very superior head color and markings. Rochelle Oolah is not in all his equal and has a plain head. The Black Earl third, is far from Sultan's form. Rochelle Lord is light and stood very badly on his legs, showing weakness. Betsey, the bitch class winner, would not have been returned at the head of affairs if Gipse Girl had been "fit." The latter was in poor coat and one of her eyes was under the weather. Rochelle Topaz is known by this time. She needs looking to, as her condition like Lord's was not what one looks for in black and tan. Ruby H., reserve, is worth the \$25 given in the catalogue as her price. Grit, third, is only moderate. Rochelle Mab, hc, is coarse. Rochelle Lord won in puppies and was alone. Dusky trap beat Blemton Trump in the class for challenge smooth coated Fox Terriers. His head is better, so is his type, expression and outline. Grouse II was absent from the bitch class, which left it empty. Mr. R. G. Stewart's new dog that has often been mentioned in THE JOURNAL, won the first for dogs—open class. He is a good terrier, far above the usual form one sees. His head might be better, but it is a hard one just the same. In legs, feet and coat he will hold his own with most of them. Poverina

in the money at Wissahickon, was second. Tom Tom third could be improved in head, body and coat. Calchas lacks especially in head. Lady Roseberry easily won in her class. Cambridge Girl is too leggy and light. Policy is moderate in expression. She has a long head but it is not what I like, and her body and coat are faulty, the former too long. Cairnsmuir Solo, fourth, is a little cloddy one, not right type. The rest were of indifferent quality, especially Chesterford Flurry, who is not a show bitch, very weedy. The winning pup is lathy now, but may improve. He beat the other two very much in front of the saddle. Vixi, the bitch pup in first place was best, but in coat, head front and feet, she will not do for good company. Policy was second and Chesterford Flurry third; the others were absent. Stardale Belle, first for novices, is a daughter of Dusky Trap; quite a fair one that wasn't considered good enough for the open class, where she would have won second at least. The others were in the open classes. Wire-hairs were the best ever seen in Canada. Partney Cornet, a bit open in coat, but the best in head, won, and very promising white puppy was second, beating Dark Eye, a winner of 12 1st prizes in England. Tinderbox, fourth, lacks a good terrier head and his coat handled open. Compton Bruiser, vhc, carried his ears wrong and seemed light. He is a pup and may improve. Bonnet, rather light gave Suffolk Tassel a beating in the bitch class. The latter is of a weedy sort. My Queen is short in coat and I don't fancy her head. She got third. The pup that was second in open dogs got all the money in the novice and puppy classes. He is the best of his sort that has been bred on this side.

Poodles—Berri won for Mr. Biddle in the challenge class. In the ropy class he reigns supreme. Open dogs had Czar, of Dr. Dixon's string, first, and second was withheld from a fluffy little fellow of peculiar type. In corded bitches the Dr. won first and second, while in curls Major McDonald's Doctor Vair, just a fair one, was given first.

Pugs—Bob Ivy, the iron dog, was not opposed in class for challenge dogs. It was the same with Midget in bitches. Royal Dusky, first in the dog class (open), is not right in color, and only just fair in head. The winner of second prize, is not a good-headed one. Little Jewel, third, is known to all of us. Winning bitch moderate, and first prize puppy quite long in face.

Toy Spaniels—Toronto Royal Duke's shorter face carried him ahead of Topsy in challenge class. Le Roi, the open class entry, is a poor-headed one. He had the good luck to be also alone in puppies, where he won. The first prize bitch (open class) has many winning points and should often be in the cash. Romeo, a Prince Charles that was

given a second, is far away from being typical, and he was shown light and out of coat.

Miscellaneous and Selling—Boston Model, the whippet, was in horrible condition, whilst Blinkbonny, a white English that can win when right, was in poor coat and lame as well. No prizes and many tears. Sheffield Lad, a Pom. in the second class, had the selling money at his mercy, as there was no competition.

Mastiffs—These classes were miserably poor in quality, although the respectable entry of twenty-four was mustered. In challenge bitches three were entered, Lady Dorothy being an absentee. Ethel, Lady Coleus' only opponent, was of course simply smothered by Mr. Bunn's new acquisition, although Coleus' coat was in very bad shape. The corresponding dog class had no entries. Grimsby Caution, in spite of his small size won with heaps to spare in open dogs. His is a very nice type of "Minting" head, good expression light eye, mask too light in color, grey on muzzle, although but a young dog. Body color nice, body very light and back weak. Behind the head he has little to recommend him. The winner of second, Raleigh, is of somewhat similar type to the winner, his half brother, and though nothing like so good in front, is better behind the shoulders. Head moderate, eye rather light and not right in expression. Of Tom, third, I have no notes. He was entered in the appendix and I must have missed him. Baron of Chester, fourth, is very poor, and the rest were too bad to deserve criticism. Attraction, last year's winner, was alone here and luckily, for though she shows a little character, the bitch is a really bad one. Long and houndy in head and ears and light and small all over. Prince Imperial, the winner in puppies, is small, shelly and utterly lacking in type and quality. The rest were so bad that I took no notes on them. In novice dogs and bitches, Nige won. He is larger than the rest of Mr. Forbes' dogs and of much the same stamp. Lady Coleus was the only Mastiff shown that could win more than two letters in decent competition, where Grimsby Comet's nice head would always entitle him to slight notice.

Rough-coated St. Bernards—Twelve entries and only two fair specimens. The rest were bad, worse, worst. Two challenge classes were drawn blank and in open dogs, Lord Dante was at the head of affairs. He is a well bred one, claiming Prince Regent for his sire and Lady St. Gothard as his dam. Lord Dante is a well shaped, active dog, a little above the average in size, but shown light in flesh with coat "all on end" and out of bloom. Nice color and marking. Skull well moulded, but not sufficiently massive. Muzzle too long, and both it and skull too much drawn out. Nice expression and is a good mover. Lord Wilton, second, is a beautifully marked dog of good size and nicely shaped body

though by no means right in head and moves badly behind. Coat and condition good. Captain Worts, third, is a rank bad brindle and white, while Dauntless, fourth, might have been third. He is all white except on head and tail and seems an active dog. The remainder is scarcely worthy of comment. Safety, reserve, carries a preposterous curled tail, and Olaf, he, is another very bad St. Bernard. Maypole won in bitches, having only one opponent, Ocean Queen, who was unnoticed. The winner is an active bitch, too light in head and body, the former being entirely wanting in character. Coat nice and she is a good mover, but very small. Ocean Queen, her opponent, shows no St. Bernard characteristics whatever. Lord Aberdeen won in dog puppies. He is long and light in head, small and lanky throughout. Hector, second, is a mighty poor one. The corresponding bitch class had no entries.

Smooth-Coated St. Bernards—Again no challenge entries in two classes, but it was a pleasure to look over so good a dog as the recent imported St. Augustine, after so many bad rough coats. It is scarcely fair to criticise the dog at present, for he is very low in flesh and not being a large framed dog in body, he must be seen to advantage only when carrying flesh. St. Augustine is a beautiful headed dog, though long, and nothing like so massive as Watch, in this or any other respect. Expression excellent, but carries a heavy dewlap. Good bone, color and marking, extraordinary good feet for so large a dog. He is nervous and in the absence of his handler, could not be got off the bench, so that I might see his action. In condition this will be a very good St. Bernard, though I am confident there are smooths in America to beat him. Roscoe, his only opponent, got nothing. Glenwood Goldy won in bitches, she is very small, decidedly poor in head and by no means a good one. Lady Swiss, unnoticed, although very fat and shown heavy in whelp, deserved a letter in such poor company. No entries in the two puppy classes, though there were eight in novice dogs, roughs and smooths, the winners in which have been noticed. Five entries in the corresponding bitch class, but they did not seem worthy of criticism.

Newfoundlands—Four entries, with Rover, the winner, being above the average in size and character, though far from a good one. Carlo, second, is small and worse than the winner in type. Topsy and Charlie Mitchell got nothing.

Great Danes—Minerva's Fawn represented the challenge Danes and far from worthily. As is well known, she is undersized and lacking in the characteristics of her race. She was shown in nice condition and looked well. Lord Wolverton won easily in open dogs. He is a moderate-headed, light, brindled dog of fair size. He has a capital body, good bone and feet and is a nice mover. Senta's

Brutus, second, is but a seven months old puppy. He is a dark slate color, of nice shape, head well moulded, but too young to show. Royal Minor, third, is wrong in head and throaty. Royal Major resembles his brother, but is a worse Dane. Senta a really excellent bitch, of large size, simply smothered her class, although light in flesh and carrying a heavy bag, having just weaned a litter. Consequently it is scarcely fair to criticise her. Her's is an excellent head, beautiful neck and good type throughout. Norimburga, second, is a large bitch but lacking in type and quality all through. Ruth, fourth, is small but shows better type than the winner of second. Melina, fourth, is very small and just as bad. Venus was hc. Senta's Mascotte, another of the typical Senta's puppies, was the winner in bitches. She has a very nice head and neck, good bone and body, and promises to make a bitch well above the average in quality. Senta's Rheda is of similar type to her sister, the winner, but is not nearly so good. Marc Anthony divided second with the last named. He is a mere baby, but showed many good points. Third was his sister, Cleopatra, of the same size and age but not nearly so good.

Greyhounds—Gem of the Season in dogs and Bestwood Daisy had each a challenge class and, of course, deserved their ribbons. Neither was shown in good form, muscle being flabby and they carried too much flesh. Gem of the Season bears age well, but in shoulders time has not improved him. Bestwood Daisy is also too well known to require criticism. Open dogs were a bad lot. The winner, Cheeky, is a very large and powerful dog, wretched in head and lacking in body qualities. His is sound, however, and this probably got him his position over Ranger, who, however, is far from being a good one. First prize might well have been withheld, also the second. Never Quit got reserve, Johnny Stringer, vhc, with Lord of Northcroft, a puppy, who might have been higher up, hc. In bitches two really good ones met, Wild Rose getting the verdict over Southern Beauty, whose condition was much against her. The winner is a very nice type, weak muzzle and too heavy in skull, good neck, bone and front. Ribs well sprung but back not strong enough and loin not right; condition good. Southern Beauty, second, is a big rangy bitch of beautiful type back of the head, which is quite good in muzzle but heavy in skull and a trifle cheeky; capital front, neck and bone, body good but loin a bit long. Bridget third, has a fair head, bad front feet, body well shaped, loin slack and weak. Ermine, reserve, is very common, and Flyaway, vhc, is a bad one. Flirt and Pee-dee-Kee got nothing. Lord of Northcroft won in

dog puppies. He is a big pup, characterless in head, but nice behind it for a youngster. Misterton and Ranger II. divided second honors. The former was by some mistake entered as a foxhound. He is a fair pup, poor in head and short of neck. Ranger II. is far smaller and can never make a good one, and Lawyer, third, is of the same stamp. The winner in bitch puppies was not on her bench, and Pee-dee-Kee was second.

Russian Wolf-hounds.—Mr. Hanks' six entries were absent.

OTTAWA BENCH SHOW.

JUDGE'S REPORT.

THE Fifth Annual Dog Show held in connection with the great Central Canada Fair was not the success it was in former years. The quality was not as good nor the number of entries as large. Only for the personal efforts of Mr. Alfred Geddes, secretary and superintendent, it would have been a failure, he is a hustler. At the show he was ably assisted by the committee, who are workers: H. Kirby (chairman), F. H. Cunningham, W. H. Middleton, L. N. Bate, F. P. Robson, Dr. S. Davidson, A. J. Grant, F. McLean. W. G. Gilpin was Veterinary Surgeon, and I only saw one case that looked suspicious. The building was light and well ventilated, in fact draughty; permanent wooden benches, Spratt's food with good broth, milk and meat for the pets. The dogs seemed happy and contented. "Sanitas" disinfected, and the place was at all times free from bad odors. A large yard furnished an excellent place for exercise. The dogs were all properly exercised, which is more than can be said of many shows. The building was always kept neat and clean. Owing to not making connections I did not get there till late Tuesday night, but started promptly at 10.30 a.m. on Wednesday and had it all finished by 3 p.m. My awards seemed to give satisfaction. Grumblers should remember that a judge must pass his opinion on the dogs as they are shown, not as

they ought to be. In the ring is the time that condition and action counts. It does not make any difference to me how Messrs. Davidson, Mason, Taylor, or any other judge has placed a dog. When I am judge I place them as I think they should be. If a sporting dog is shown to me with a rough, staring coat and will not move unless dragged they will get pegged back every time.

136 dogs catalogued, with only a few absent.

Among the visitors from out of town I noticed Messrs. A. A. McDonald, F. Lyndon, J. Bennett, of Toronto; C. H. Corbett, Kingston; Philip Hart, Belleville; F. S. Wetherall, Compton, Que.; W. J. Tulk, Hamilton; Dr. Mills, E. Bradford and Mrs. Pitts, of Montreal; Mr. Graveley, Cornwall.

Mastiffs—Two, Attraction 1st in Challenge class. Not at all a good one, and should never have been allowed to reach the challenge class; long in head, light in body and shelly, a fair mover.

Grimsby Caution 1st in Open dogs. Head fair, eye light, a good mover, fair bone, but the dog is much too small.

St. Bernards—Open dog class, two entries, with Lord Aberdeen absent. Sir John won; too light in body, head too long and not deep enough, ear large, feet bad, nice intelligent looking dog, a brindle and white. Some said the brindle was black, but I know better.

Bitches—Mr. Hart's Queen Vic 1st, the rest nowhere. Vic was sick and was removed before I took notes, but I remember she was a grand long-bodied bitch, color and markings good, head poor. Maypole 2nd, a snipy long head, bad ears, light eye, too light and weedy all round. Stivia 3rd, very small and very heavy in whelp, not a flyer. Bridget did not deserve the letter she got. Miss Benmore absent.

Greyhounds—Lord Torrington 1st, a dog of good quality, but in bad condition, having just recovered from a month's sickness; head good, eye too full, mouth not just level, feet, legs and shoulders fair, rather flat-sided, lacks in loin and second thigh. Justinian well known, is almost a wreck, beaten by age. Edgewood 3rd, just a fair dog, neck and bone good, shoulders loaded, weak in pastern, head not good.

In bitches the grand old Jetsam could not be denied. She carries her years much better than her kennel mate and moved like a sapling. Both should now be retired. Bed of Stone 2nd, small but fair, flat sided but deep enough, shoulders a bit loaded, neck good, feet and bone good, head passable. Meda, very fair in body, legs and feet, but very poor in head. Galatea, head and front bad, body fair. Pee Dee Qu is N Gee.

Deerhounds—Prince a big, coarse dog, very badly over-shot, 1st; in a good class he would be about V.H.C.

Beagles—Bob Krueger easily won 1st, nice cobby body, good legs and feet, head fair. Friar Tuck 2nd, is not a good one, high on leg and light in bone.

Bitches—Elfie 1st, good ear, coat and expression. She looks toyish, but I know they can go and stay.

Great Danes—The well-known and often described Minerva's Fawn alone in Challenge class and won. She was in fine shape.

Open dogs, Royal Minor 1st is good in body, bowed in front, neck fair, muzzle not right. Royal Major bad in muzzle and face, bone and action good. Rex 3rd is a poor one.

Bitches—Ruth 1st, a fair type of head, eyes light, body fair, but shown too fat, temper bad. Juno 2nd, is small of a very good type. Melina is snipy but not a bad sort.

English Setters—Only one shown, Lady Howard, a sort of pocket edition, very small but symmetrical, nice clean muzzle, head and neck, fair body and the best of legs and feet.

Irish Setters—Toronto Jim 1st, a very fair small dog, head of English setter type, ears large, body fair, color good, too long cast. Madcap II, in blooming condition, defeated Toronto Mollie, who was dull and listless with a rough, staring coat; her handler, the expert Mr. Lyndon, showed her for all she was worth, but could not get a move on her. Mollie has best head, necks about equal. Madcap is best in body; but is a trifle out at elbow, but shoulders are better and she was fields ahead on style and movement, color and coat.

Gordon Setters—Mount Royal Wanda and Floss both lack in head and tan, also in type, both have good legs and feet and are good movers.

Irish Water Spaniels—Dan Rice 1st, a very good dog with the best of legs and feet, shoulders and body fair, coat very good but curl not close enough, although much better than the average with their long soft coat that will hold as much water as a sponge.

Clumber Spaniels—Darby, alone in Challenge class, won. He is a very good dog with a field Spaniel type of head, coat and color good, he lacks size, but is about the best now exhibited. In Open dogs Quester 1st is a good small dog, a bit light all through, feet and legs good, coat and condition first class, eye too light. Rake II 2nd, a very nice mover, good body, a bit short, feet and legs good, ear not good, head lacks type. Grouse 3rd is too short in body and high in leg, ears high, eye light, expression bad, color good, feet and legs fair.

Field Spaniels—Queen, first in challenge class. Good in head, muzzle, legs, body and feet, but shown in poor condition. A very typical bitch. In open dogs Corktown Cupid 1st, head fair, ears too high, body good but too short, bone good, feet open. Nig. second has a cocker head, in fact all the class were bred from cockers, he is small bred in front, but a field spaniel in shape, bone good. Workman is fair in head, body short but well ribbed. *Bitches*—Dot Smirle first, an over grown cocker, flat-sided and short in coupling. Mona, second is of cocker type, also good bone, crooked front, feet open, good body, loin and coat.

Cocker Spaniels—Challenge class, the well known Red Roland won. Open dogs, Black Chancellor first, muzzle good but undershot, ears well set but short, bone light, body and loin fair. Ajax second is a field Spaniel and next to Queen the best type shown. Ray, third, is not at all a good one. *Bitches*—Doris 1st, is heavy in whelp, and did not move well, head fair but a bit long, good ear, well set out at elbows, bone and feet good. Raven Cryo, second, a bit off in head and muzzle, ears, bone and feet fair, body good, not a good mover. Rideau Reine shown much too fat, skull good but too narrow, muzzle fair, good eye bone and front, feet open, good body and loin. Carrie V.H.C., the best mover in the class, body and loin very good, bone and feet fair, skull and muzzle good but too heavy. Dogs, other than black, a good class, the best in show. Red Obo easily won first, a cobby, corkey little dog, about the best mover at the show, all cat-gut and steel springs, a good head and muzzle, jaw not level, nice ears well set, good bone, in fact a cocker smaller than I like them, but he looks like a worker; at anyrate he is built like one. Hamilton Jack 2nd, head not right, ear fair, bone light, body and loin good. Sunlight 3rd, good coat, body and loin, feet and legs fair, undershot. Red Star V.H.C., looks like a workman, but his head is much too heavy for a cocker. Red Justice V.H.C. is too long in head, bone, body and loin good.

Bitches—Rideau Robina 1st, is a bitch of great quality, the best of legs and feet, cobby body, her head is a bit long, and she was shown much too fat. Raglan Russette 2nd, fair in head, bone and front, a bit too long cast and all out of coat. Tonita 3rd, is a stylish liver and white, a bit long in head, body, bone and loin fair, a little leggy. Hamilton Jill is much too small and toyish. Caper is weak in muzzle, eye too prominent, legs good but bone light, body and loin fair but sway-backed. Queen is weak in head and too leggy.

Selling Class—Rideau Rhea 1st, has good eye and expression, head too long, nice ear, well hung, bone good, feet fair but crooked in front, a fair mover, body and loin good.

Mollie 2nd, muzzle bad, skull good, ear well set, bone, feet and loin good, a bit out at elbow and a little flat-sided. Ajax 3rd, described above.

Collies—Jack 1st, is coarse in head and ears inclined to prick, is not deep in chest and rather long cast, coat fair, but not enough of it. Homer 2nd, a setter type, coat soft, no undercoat, body and loin fair, stern well carried. Bruce 3rd, is not a good Collie.

Bitches—Aucharnie Judie much the best Collie shown, good head, body, loin and excellent coat, expression nice, skull just a bit full. Otterburn Lassie is not at all a good one in any particular, and lacks Collie character.

Bull Dogs—Only one shown, Lady Winnie, nice body, shoulders well out, plain in face, legs fair.

Bull Terriers—Principio and John L. Sullivan absent left a walk over for Slick, thick in skull and weak in jaw, stands on good legs and feet, body good but a bit short, tail too high and sandpapered too much. Bitches—The well-known Vesper Belle won, a bit cheeky and long in body, otherwise one of the best. Edgewood Robin and Kathleen Mavourneen absent.

Fox Terriers—Blemton Trump alone won well in Challenge class. He has always been under-rated; he is just a bit coarse, but a Fox terrier is not a toy, and his get proves his value at the stud.

Dogs, Open class, Tom Tom 1st, a little coarse in skull, ears, front and bone good. Tally Ho 2nd, fair head, ears good, coat not right. Calchas 3rd, coarse in head and thick in shoulders, otherwise quite a good one.

Bitches—Stardale Belle 1st, has just weaned a litter, her coat is not right, head, ears and body good, a bit light in bone. Vixie 2nd, skull a little coarse, ears a bit heavy, but well carried. Policy 3rd, too straight in face, muzzle weak, ears large and not carried right, front fair, body and loin good, coat soft. Selling class—Rideau Rosebud 1st, she is not a flyer.

Wires were much the best, Undercliffe Cornet 1st, is a bit coarse in skull and has too much coat, ear is also a bit large, otherwise a very good dog, great bone and the best of legs and body. Compton Venom 2nd, is not deep enough in chest or quite true in front, otherwise a first-class dog. Dark Eye 3rd, behind the head is a little better than Venom but he is not so good fronted, it was a toss up for second place. Tinderbox is not right in front or head. Bruiser is too round in skull and light in body. Marksman is not a good one. Bitches, Bonnet 1st good in body, bone and loin, but is light in muzzle, and ears not well carried. She was not feeling well.

Irish Terriers—Carleton Blarney 1st, has a good head but he is too large, coat good, skull a trifle thick. Carleton Pat is also too large, but his skull is thick, eye, bone and coat good. The Canadian Ambassador is about the right size, skull is thick and weak in muzzle, a good one back of the head. Bitches—Ballymony easily won 1st, she is all out of coat having just weaned a litter of pups, she is about the right size. Bessie G. 2nd, an unfurnished pup I thought, better in head than Biddy Flynn. Neither are first class.

Scottish Terriers—Compton Belle 1st, is not right in head and body, but still is a very fair bitch.

Black and Tan Terriers—Stadacoma 1st, is much too large, but has a fair head, good eye, legs and feet, tail and markings fair. Vortex 2nd, is larger than the 1st prize winner, and he is heavy in head. Darkie 3rd has really the best head in the class, but he was in bad condition and his ears would do for wings.

Bitches—Mona 1st, lacks in head and markings. It was close between her and Rochelle Majestic 2nd, who is a beautiful bitch with a fine head and perfect markings, she looked toyish and was fat and soft. I like a Terrier with lots of snap.

Yorkshire Terriers—Four entries, none first-class. Baby Bunting much the best.

Toy Spaniels—Challenge class, Toronto Royal Duke was alone and won. He is well-known, a short-faced dog. Dogs (have mislaid or lost last page of my notes and write from memory.) Blen much the best of the class, a very good Blenheim, but shown too fat. Bijou 2nd, Romeo 3rd, are too long in muzzle.

Bitches—Ruby 1st, won easily, she has a good skull, short face, body good, not in good condition and a bit leggy. Tum Tum 2nd, a fair bitch, balance of class too long faced.

Pugs—Dogs, two poor ones, Sport being best in body I gave second prize, first withheld; first withheld also in bitches, 2nd to Cherub, too long in leg and body, skull fair, muzzle weak.

Dachshunds—Freda 1st, wide in skull, weak in muzzle, crook not right, body too short, stern coarse. Huldah 2nd is better in color, stern and style.

Miscellaneous Class—Tibbie, a Bedlington, 1st; she is wide in skull, linty coated and out of coat.
