Richard Gibson was also present.

Minutes of last meeting (as published in *Gazette*) taken as
read.

Agreement between C.K.C. and A.K.C.—Articles of agree-
ment, letters from the Secretary of the A.K.C. and from Mr.
F. S. Wetherall read: It was resolved to amend the C.K.C.
rules to agree with those of the A.K.C. Moved by Dr.
Griffin, seconded by Mr. Stone that report of com-
mittee be received and adopted by this Executive. *Carried.*

have a big choice of stud dogs in the list offered by the Compton Kennels including their young dog Compton Vindex, who we notice is restricted to five nominations: Compton Bruiser, his litter brother, Tinderbox and Dartmoor Snowbroom.

DARK EYE,

the excellent little wire-hair, whose picture we present this

month was imported by Mr. Macdonald and is by Carlisle Tyro, out of Ch. Dartmoor Belle. From his stud card we extract the following list of his wins in England:—Kennel Club, '91, 2 seconds beaten by Cribbage and Raby Omen, Mr. Pim, Judge. Leeds, '91, 1 first. Wolverhampton, '91, 1 first, 1 second, 2 thirds, beaten by Cribbage and Daylesford Bush, Mr. Wharton, Judge. Southampton, '91, 1 first, 1 third beaten by Jack St. Leger and Daylesford Bush. Ayr, '91 2 firsts and several specials, Mr. Raper, Judge. Gloucester, '91 2 firsts, Mr. Astley, Judge. Edinburgh, '91, 2 firsts. Gold medal for best Fox Terrier dog, owned by member of S.K.C. Silver Challenge cup and medal for best Fox Terrier in show, owned by a member of S.F.T.C. In this competition Dark Eye beat some of the best Terriers living, among them Hunton Justice, then known as Panel. Mr. Redmond, Judge. Whitehaven, '92 1 second. Ayr, '92, 1 first and several specials. Berwick, '92, 1 first and 1 third, beaten by White Topper and Ayton Tartar, Mr. Procter, Judge.

British Fancier in chronicling the death of the brown-curly coated Retriever bitch Claret, at the good old (dogs) age of twelve years, states that her owner has almost succeeded in producing a *white* variety of this useful breed, so seldom seen and so little known in Canada.

BOB-TAILS THAT ARE *not* BOB-TAILS.

The same journal in answering a correspondent writes as follows:

"A very large percentage of Bobtail puppies are born with their tails on, which should be docked when about three days old. It would be best to let a vet. perform the operation, or a skilled dog man.

Docked Bobtails will stand just the same chance in the show ring as natural Bobtail Sheepdogs if they are as good in points."

Kind of Manx cat business about this.

DOGS AS CHATTEL PROPERTY.

A deputation consisting of Dr. McCully and Messrs. David Kennedy, W. B. Fraser, and Joseph Morgan, and introduced by Mr. Tait, called upon the Ontario Government recently and asked that dogs be declared chattel property. They are chattels when imported, and the duty has to be paid, and when they commit depredations, but when stolen there is no redress except a writ of replevin, which is nearly useless. They asked for a declaratory statute making dogs chattel property, so as to bring thieves under the Dominion criminal law. As Mr. Tait remarked, the dog is a chattel when it counts against the owner and he should have the benefit of it when his property is stolen. Sir Oliver Mowat replied that the case was new to him and that there seemed much force in what was said. The matter would be considered.

MR. FRANK U. STANTON,

of Quebec, (late of Toronto), referring to this matter writes under date of March 22nd.

"Your article in the GAZETTE of this month entitled "Dogs as Chattels" has attracted wide-spread attention, and I sincerely hope the movement will be kept up until such time as a law is passed making dogs chattels. In my own case, my Irish Terrier bitch, (Miss Stout C.K.C.R. 1638) has twice been stolen, and is "out of sight" now, and although I have a fair idea of where she is, I cannot recover my own property unless I steal it. This is evidently a grave mistake and should be rectified legally at once."

Mr. S. C. Stevenson, the Manager of the Exposition Co. Montreal informs us that it is their intention to hold a dog show in Montreal this year. Though no definite dates have been claimed, it is likely that the show will be held the week following the Toronto fixture.

HUSK.

THIS is a most troublesome complaint, affecting dogs of all ages; it is due to inflammation of the mucus membrane of the fauces and larynx, and in course of time, if not checked, it extends to the wind-pipe and bronchial tubes; and though it may, and generally does, arise from a cold or chill, yet it is very contagious, and if one dog in an establishment becomes affected, it generally attacks all the others. It is most prevalent during damp and cold weather, but one often sees cases in the summer-time when an east wind is blowing. In some kennels where a large number of dogs are kept, the disease seems to always prevail more or less, and any new inmate is sure to have an attack soon after arrival.

Symptoms—The dog gives three or four husky coughs, and then retches as if going to be sick, and occasionally a spot of white phlegm is thrown up. The cough comes on in spasms, and is worse in the morning, or in fact, any time after resting or sleeping. Beside this symptom, the patient during the early stages is slightly feverish there is a loss of appetite and condition, the dog is dull, indisposed to take exercise, and occasionally diarrhoea is present. The nose becomes hot and dry, and the mucus membrane of the eye red and injected, but there is no discharge from the eyes and nose as in distemper, or as the result of ordinary nasal catarrh. In old dogs this kind of cough frequently becomes chronic, and then it assumes the form of chronic bronchitis, and as the result of the constant strain on the lungs by the coughing, the small air cells rupture in time, and a condition results which is called emphysema, and, as a consequence, the breathing becomes heavy and laborious, large quantities of mucus or phlegm keep collecting in the throat, causing violent attacks of choking, which is only relieved by the secretions being ejected from the wind-pipe, etc., into the mouth, which the dog promptly swallows, and it then passes into the stomach. As time goes on in these cases, the dog

becomes emaciated, he can only lie down with difficulty, and then only for a short period at a time in consequence of the distressed state of the respiration, which ultimately is generally the cause of death, the dog often dying suddenly from asphyxia, the result of the accumulation of phlegm in the larynx, he not having sufficient strength at last to cough and eject it.

Treatment—An emetic in the early stage is beneficial, as it removes the phlegm, and the dog often does not cough for hours afterwards. For this, tartar emetic acts very well, the dose varying according to the size of the dog, from half to two grains, or the following mixture, which acts still quicker, may be given, but if the patient is of a weak and delicate kind the first one is the most suitable:

EMETIC MIXTURE.

R.
Hydrochlorate of Apomorphia 1 grain
Water to 1½ oz.

Dose—From half to two teaspoonsful.

It is advisable to repeat the emetic every three or four days when relief is derived from it. In addition to the emetic, some soothing medicine is required to relieve the irritation of the throat, and thus allay the coughing. For this one of the following mixtures will be found useful:

MIXTURE NO. 1.

R.
Solution of Muriate of Morphia ½ ounce
Paregoric ½ "
Compound Spirits of Ether 3 drms
Ipecacuanha Wine 2 "
Simple Syrup 1 ounce
Water to 6 "

Doses—From one teaspoonful to a tablespoonful three times a day.

MIXTURE NO. 2.

R.
Tr. Aconite (P.B.) 1 drm
Spirits of Camphor 3 "
Syrup of Squills 1 "
Water to 3 ounces

Doses—From half a teaspoonful to a desertspoonful three times a day.

Some dogs are difficult to give liquid medicines to, especially those suitable for cough, as they are generally of a pungent nature. In these cases the following pills may be tried:

THE PILLS FOR COUGH. NO. 1.

R.
Extract of Hyoscyamus 18 grains
Powdered Rhubarb 12 "
" Ipecacuanha 8 "
Compound Squill Pill 15 "

Mix and divide into 12 pills.

Doses—From half to two pills twice a day.

THE PILLS FOR COUGH. NO. 2.

R.
Tartar Emetic 3 grains
Extract of Belladonna 3 "
" Hyoscyamus 8 "
Powdered Opium 6 "

Mix and divide into 12 pills.

Doses—From half to two pills twice a day.

In other instances powders are more easily administered than medicine in any other forms. In these cases the following may be tried:

THE POWDERS FOR HUSK.

R.
Acetate of Morphia 1 grain
Powdered Sugar 1 drm

Mix and divide into 12 powders.

Doses—From half to two powders to be given twice a day.

In very chronic cases I have found benefit derived from a course of the following mixture. It should be continued for about a week or so at a time.

THE MIXTURE.

R.
Iodide of Potassium 12 grains
Bicarbonate of Potassium 1 drm
Syrup of Squills 1 ounce
Water 2 "

Doses—From one teaspoonful to a tablespoonful three times a day.

In all cases the bowels should be kept well opened. For small Toy Dogs a dose of syrup of buckthorn and castor oil answers the purpose, but for larger dogs the following pills will be found more serviceable:

APERIENT PILLS.

R.
Compound Extract of Colocynth 12 grains
Jalap Resin 6 "
Extract of Henbane 6 "
Leptandrin 3 "
Podophylin 3 "
Gingerine 1 "

Mix and divide into 12 pills.

Doses—Two for Fox Terriers, three for Collies, and four for dogs the size of a St. Bernard. Repeat about once a week. In some severe cases hot linseed meal poultices with a small quantity of mustard added, applied to the throat, are useful, or a good sharp blister may be employed. I have occasionally placed a seton in the throat with advantage.

During the first few days, whilst the dog is feverish, the diet offered should be light, as soup with biscuits, bread, or boiled rice, also a little fish, and at this time, too, the patient should be kept quiet and warm, no exercise being allowed, or acute bronchitis may set in.

TUBERCULOSIS OR CONSUMPTION IN DOGS.

IN your contemporary *The Stock Keeper*, published the 29th December last, a translation appears of an article or lecture by M. P. J. Cadiot, a professor at the Alford School, respecting "Tuberculosis in Dogs and its Danger to Human Beings." From what this veterinary surgeon states phthisis apparently is a most common and frequent disease amongst French dogs, for he mentions that he had forty cases under treatment in less than two years. According to this same authority contamination occurs more readily through the respiratory organs, but it is also said that dogs become infected through licking up the expectorations or spittle from human beings suffering from the disease. Experiments performed by one Tappeine are quoted showing that eleven dogs out of twelve were successfully inoculated with dried spittle from consumptive patients. After all that has been stated by Cadiot, Tappeine, and others abroad, one does not like to say out right that such a disease does not exist amongst the canine race, but I must say I have never seen such a case; in fact, I have never seen the dog that has made me even suspicious that he might be suffering from consumption; and after the many years' experience I have had with canine diseases, both with the live and dead subject (for during my time I have made just over five thousand *post mortem* examinations alone for the readers of different papers, besides hundreds of private ones, as well as attending to thousands of sick dogs every year), to say the least, it is strange that I should never have come across a case if the disease really does exist. Had a dog suffering from tuberculosis come under my notice, I do not think I should have failed to recognize it, for I consider I am well acquainted with this disorder, and I ought to be after all the thousands of *post-mortem* examinations I have made of dead fowls, rabbits and guinea pigs, as tuberculosis amongst these is extremely common. I have also had some experience with tuberculosis in cattle.

The disease in poultry, which is no doubt contagious, is so very palpable in the live as well as the dead subject; the affected bird gradually wastes away until it becomes a living skeleton, the mouth becomes pale, the comb hard and dry, and the feathers ruffled. When the bird is handled the muscles of the breast are found more atrophied, the chest bone standing out like the keel of a ship. The abdomen feels generally full and hard, the liver often may be detected enlarged and nodulated; the same may be said of the mesenteric glands, they in some cases being as large as a big orange. The end generally comes suddenly, often the

result of internal hemorrhage caused by the disease extending to some of the large blood vessels, usually those found in the liver. Tuberculosis is a most disastrous disease to get into one's poultry yard, for, although the progress of the infection is slow, it is very sure, and generally attacks all the birds in a yard, and once infected their doom is sealed, for there is no cure.

Phthisis, unfortunately, is just as common amongst English people as it is with the French, and dogs in England are even more numerous in proportion to the size of the country than they are in France, and no doubt the same opportunity occurs of their becoming contaminated, and of two I should say that the dogs over here run greater risks of infection, as English people are much more inclined to pet their favorites than foreigners. I have known several people suffering from consumption to have a pet dog with them constantly, both day and night for weeks and months, but I never saw any bad effects arise, at any rate, not so far as the dog was concerned.

MM. Colin and Laulaine have noticed a diseased condition of the lungs of dogs due to parasites, and they called it false tuberculosis, because the *post-mortem* lesions resembled, to a great extent, the real disease as seen in man, but the morbid appearances are caused by the irritation set up by the parasite.

We desire further, to bear testimony to your uniform courtesy and good fellowship, and to thank you for the

promptitude with which you have always attended to the interests of the kennel men.

In conclusion, we assure you that no matter what position in life may be yours, you will carry with you the best wishes of the doggy men of Toronto, and we pray that the Giver of all good will protect and watch over yourself and family, and that you may be spared for many years of usefulness in the canine world in which you have so signally excelled.

HINTS TO EXHIBITORS.

THERE is little to be done in the kennels at present, except paying due attention to the comfort of the dogs, and attention to the state of their skins. We like to see the animals hock-deep, in the softest and driest of oaten straw; leave wheaten till warmer weather. The bedding should be most unsparingly given, it pays to treat them so, and if you make it a rule not to put young pups with older dogs, you will find the latter will hardly need changing oftener than twice a week, except in wet weather. We were through a large kennel of dogs a few days ago, when the animals seemed to luxuriate in an abundance of fodder, and yet they seemed unhappy and ailing, several being down with chronic rheumatism. Well, an examination of bedding revealed this fact, the dry straw and shavings had been put down on top of the old and wet. Directly it was no fault of the owner, indirectly it was, as he should have looked after his servant.

Now, if you intend having your dogs look well for the coming show season, you ought to know how to treat them, for healthiness of skin and consequent abundance of coat and feather. Indeed, next to selection of proper stock for proper stock-getting the greatest difficulty we breeders have, lies in the keeping up of the beauty of the coat.

There is one question which we are asked very often, "How can I improve my dog's coat?" and the querists— young men and inexperienced, as a rule—positively expect a specific, something to rub in, a beautiful-for-ever ointment, and one, mark you, that will suit any case. It is absurd, and we will try briefly to show why. Hair, then, is termed an appendage to the animal body; to a large extent a living structure. Now, a hair is simply a rooted tube growing from the interior of a flask-shaped depression in the skin, like a bulbous root growing from a hyacinth-glass. Into this vase, for the lubrication of the hair, minute glands empty sebaceous or fatty matter. The rootlet of the hair

is supplied with minute blood vessels to support its existence and growth; and stimulation of these tiny blood vessels, whether by dandy-brush or Macassar oil, by increasing the nourishment—the blood—at the root of the hair, will in many cases increase its growth. But herein lies a danger: oily stimulants interfere with and clog the ducts of the proper lubricating glands, and they also, in the end, cause dandruff in the skin.

Health in the skin means a *happy medium of temperature in that covering*, and that can never be obtained unless you keep the animal altogether in health. The non-professional reader can have no idea how easily a dog's skin and coat is acted upon prejudicially by such little ailments as irritation of the stomach or bowels from bad food or worms, irregularity of the liver, or kidney, &c. Well, then, what we want to impress upon you is this, that you may wash, and scrub, and brush till your arm aches, and your patience is worn out, without getting the coat to grow if the animal is in the slightest degree out of condition. Pray lay the lesson to heart, and when you find a dry staring coat, and heartless growth of feather learn to look beyond.

Do our amateur readers who keep several dogs ever think of cleaning the *inside* of their collars. The cleanliness and, in many cases, disinfection of dogs' collars is a most essential thing, but one seldom, indeed, attended to. Many a case of disease of a disgusting nature has been produced, fostered and disseminated by means of dirty collars.

Continue to give abundance of succulent vegetables, and if any dog is in a conditionless state without apparent cause, you can hardly do harm by trying for worms; only do not purge too much.
