ANNUAL MEETING.

(Official Minutes.)

THE annual meeting of the C.K.C. was held in Richmond Hall, Toronto, on the evening of September 12th, the President Dr. J. S. Niven, in the chair, and a large number of members present.

The President spoke at some length on the affairs of the Club and said the most important business to come before the meeting to-night was the proposed agreement with the A.K.C.

Minutes of last annual meeting read and adopted.

Secretary Treasurer's Report as follows, read and adopted, subject to official audit, Auditors to report at next meeting of the Executive:

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT.

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

Below I beg to hand you my first annual report as Secretary-Treasurer.

Registrations.—The total number of registrations is now 3,576, number made during year ending August 31st, 1894, 532, number made during year ending August 31st, 1893, 868, showing a decline of 336. This is as was expected owing to the withdrawing of the free registration privileges.

Duty on Dogs.—I understand the duty on thoroughbred dogs coming into Canada for breeding purposes has been removed, though there seems as yet to be no clear understanding with the Customs authorities as to this, as the following correspondence will show. No doubt your executive will at once take steps to have this put right:

Dear Sir,—In further reference to your enquiry re the free admission of dogs for breeding purposes or the improvement of stock, item No. 491, Schedule B., free goods includes dogs, but the Treasury Board has not yet, as far as I know, made any regulation governing their admission. The Regulation or Order in Council passed on Nov. 8th, 1887, does not include dogs.

Until an Order in Council or Regulation by the Treasury Board is made governing the admission of dogs, I do not well see how a free entry can be accepted.

Proposed Agreement with the American Kennel Club read, and after discussion it was moved by Dr. Wesley Mills, seconded by Mr. J. S. Williams, and resolved that in the opinion of the C.K.C. as expressed at its annual meeting the arrangement existing between the A.K.C. and C.K.C. up to a recent date, and as we understand never legally abolished, was satisfactory and that this Club is in favor of continuing the same.

Letter to the President read from Mr. S. F. Glass relating to his late Treasurership.

Moved by Mr. Bedlington, seconded by Mr. Sweetnam, that Dr. Niven with Mr. Smith be requested to close account as soon as possible. *Carried.*

Agreement with A.K.C.—A lengthy and warm discussion ensued, when it was moved by Mr. Wetherall, seconded by Mr. Lindsay, that proposed agreement be reconsidered. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Klein, seconded by Mr. Sweetnam, that draft of agreement be read point by point.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Wesley Mills, seconded by Mr. Davey, that agreement be discussed as a whole.

Amendment carried.

Agreement read again and discussed, when on motion of Messrs. Wetherall and Klein, it was discussed clause by clause.

Clause 3. (Bench Show rules) rejected. Clause 5. (Delegates) made to read the C.K.C. "may" appoint three delegates and added to end of clause "the A.K.C. to be accorded like privileges." Clause 7. (Publication of Registrations in A.K.C.S.B.) on motion of Dr. Mills and Mr. Wetherall, the first line was changed to read "the C.K.C. shall be free to publish its registrations, etc." Moved by Dr. Wesley Mills, seconded by Mr. Klein, that details in regard to clause 7 and also details regarding registration be referred to Executive Committee with power to act. *Carried.*

NOTES AND COMMENTS

THE GREYHOUND RACES

AT Toronto resulted in H. Barker's Cyclone, winning first; W. F. Randall's Miss Never Settle, second; and Grimsby Ranger, third. Cyclone by Justinian out of Jetsam was also first in her class in the show.

MRS. WILLIAMS,

who had a walk over with her grand team of Skyes at Toronto, has we learn just sent an Old Burgundy puppy to the North-west.

MR. KLEIN'S NEW DACHSHUND,

which we expected to see at Toronto, could not be got in shape in time so visitors were denied the pleasure of viewing him.

CANADIAN SHOWS.

We have it on good authority that a dog show will be given in Sherbrooke, Que., next year, if present arrangements can be carried out. Sherbrooke is a thriving city with an active and progressive Agricultural Association, which annually gives one of the best shows in the country. It is also on the tapis that if the Sherbrooke Show eventuates another city in Quebec will fall into line.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS.

We warmly second *Forest and Stream's* assertion that this hardy little Terrier is rapidly growing in favor, as the large classes at the recent Toronto show prove. In quoting from the

Scottish Fancier our contemporary says:—The Scottish Terrier notes by "Stepping Stone" in the *Scottish Fancier* will prove interesting to owners of those smart little Terriers. Scottish Terriers are running a race with Poodles in bidding for popular favor just now, and any hints from the "old hands" will no doubt prove useful to our breeders who are just entering the game. Speaking of ears, such important factors in the smart *tout ensemble* of a Scottish Terrier, this writer says that some Terriers get them up so much quicker than others. Worms very often keep them down, as he has no doubt they often make Fox-Terriers prick theirs. This is rather a contradictory theory, but there is no telling how the presence of these parasites injures a growing puppy. He says: "As the nerve of the ear strengthens, in the event of the puppy not getting up his ears in the orthodox manner, do not fail to try for worms. If that is not the cause, then the owner must use artificial means to get them up. Strong glue, melted and put on the inside of the ear, not too near the root, with brown paper, and not too hot to irritate the animal, is very good. Fold the ear neatly together, the edges on either side meeting exactly, and hold them in position until the glue has got quite hard. Leave this in until it wears off of its own accord." He also suggests a piece of Allcock's porous plaster as a substitute for glue. This writer also gives some measurements of prize Terriers at various stages of their growth which may prove useful to breeders as a guide in the way of comparison with their own stock:

THE TERRA COTTA KENNELS.

In the same issue the Terra Cotta Kennels recent purchase is referred to as follows:—"One of the most important transfers in the American kennel world was consummated last week. Mr. William Tulk, Jr., of the Terra Cotta Kennels, who came down from Hamilton, Ont., on purpose took back with him the Marlborough Kennels' whole team of Russian Wolf hounds, composed of Ch. Argoss, Zerry, Princess Irma, Modjeska, Odrooskie, Daiskie Riga and two Argoss-Lobedy pups four months old. This represents a team of Wolf hounds that has with one exception, Detroit, landed the kennel prizes wherever competed for this spring. Such

crack dogs as Argoss, Zerry, Princess Irma and Modjeska, are household names in this particular fancy and Messrs. Kent and Tulk in securing such a team for Canada, must be congratulated upon their enterprise, and we trust that the success of the team will be continued. The price paid, as may be supposed, was a long one but not more than dogs of such merit should command. Mr. Huntington will, we believe, devote his fancier's energies to some smaller breeds. The Terra Cotta team will be benched at Toronto and will meet again their old antagonists from the Seacroft Kennels, with the exception of poor old Leekhoi, who met his last Waterloo at Louisville."

"By the last CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE, we see that R. A. Cunningham, of this city, has been elected to the executive of the Canadian Kennel Club. We are sure the club could not have made a better selection, and, as a result, we expect to note an immediate improvement in kennel affairs in this section."

SALES AT TORONTO.

We did not learn of many sales taking place at the Toronto Show. Mr. T. A. Carson, Kingston, bought that good Irish Water Spaniel, Marguerite to add to his kennel of the breed, and we heard indirectly that the Maple Leaf Kennels had disposed of the Collie dog Dude to a gentleman on the other side.

NEW COLLIES

Mr. R. H. Seymour has just brought out with him from England two promising young Collies of good breeding, a dog by Old Times out of Foxteth Queen and a bitch by the same sire out of Carmel Daisy. They will not be in condition to appear at any of the shows this fall.

MR. MORTIMER'S RETURN.

The English *Stock-Keeper* devotes several paragraphs to Mr. James Mortimer and his purchases, which we repro-

duce. All the dogs mentioned arrived safely and in good shape. Mr. Mortimer had more than one tempting offer to leave King Orry in the land of his birth:

"Mr. Jas. Mortimer left London, Wednesday evening and accompanied his canine charges to Liverpool, whence they will sail to-day by the White Star Line freight steamer "Bovic," which at this calm period of the year may be expected to make a comfortable and speedy passage. Mr. Mortimer himself has booked a berth on the "Etruria," which sails to-morrow, and is due on the other side by the 8th proximo. If she should keep her time Mr. Mortimer hopes to be able to spend a day in New York before proceeding to Toronto Dog Show to keep his judicial engagement there on September 10th. Mr. Oldham, of Spaniel fame, who has also been spending a short time in his mother country, is returning for the same purpose.

After his last visit to this country, some two years ago, we described Mr. Mortimer's position as "landed with both feet," and our talented friend Phil May illustrated the idea, showing Mr. Mortimer with one foot in the American and the other in the English kennel world. *Apropos* of this illustration, we may relate an amusing incident. A few evenings ago when Mr. Mortimer was with us Phil May called. The artist had never seen his subject, but made the clever sketch from a carte-de-visite size photograph. When they met, we said to Mr. May, "Do you know this gentleman?" Phil focussed him with his eyes, and then with a recognition smile raised his hands above his head in the attitude of Mr. Mortimer in the sketch as he alights with a foot on each continent.

If after that visit our visitor left in the fullest sense *au fait* with the Fancy in both countries, how much more must that now be the case after a sojourn extending from the 20th June last, and after visiting our leading dog shows and living in our doggy midst. In fact, it only remains to be admitted that Mr. Mortimer is now as much at home in the English kennel world as any resident. We have met him with fellow fanciers from across the pond at Bicester, he attended the great hound gathering at Peterborough, we met him in the sunshine at Barnet, and on the lawns at tuneful Ealing; he journeyed west to Bristol, and south to Portsmouth, where he caught cold and was rather queer for a couple of days; the list is complete with Edmonton, Swiss Cottage, Reading, and Bolton. He has also visited Mr. Raper, and inspected the Bulldogs at Sedgemere, Mr. Sidney Woodiwiss's Dachshunds at Upminster, and Mr. Joachim's team of Beagles, and finally spent a few days in Paris among the astute *marchands des chiens*. The Bovic will carry some

thirty of Mr. Mortimer's purchases, and an enterprising passenger with such an entry might organize a capital dog show in mid-Atlantic. One dog King Orry, accompanies his owner on the Etruria.

Of all his purchases this was, no doubt the happiest and best timed, as the value of King Orry must have been nearly doubled by the death of Dockleaf. There are excellent judges of the breed who believe that in parting with this specimen England is losing its most valuable stud dog. Orry's conspicuous point of excellence is the breadth of turn up of underjaw; he has proved his show excellence by a number of wins on the bench, scoring firsts at Brighton, Cruft's Bulldog Club, Birmingham, Enfield, Romford, Nottingham, Portsmouth, and Preston, where he secured also the 25 guinea and the 50 guinea challenge cups. He showed his soundness when he beat Dockleaf in the walking match, and among others the famous Facey Romford and Storm Fiend, Burglar and Prince Orry may be adduced as evidence of his quality at stud. Of the four prize Bull bitch purchases Hucknall Gipsy, Grosvenor Lass, Miss Mischief, and Enfield Vixen, the first named went on in advance with the Schipperkes, Gipsy before leaving, was served by Sir Garnet Wolseley; she is also a well known winner, having won first at Preston, Bath, and Bicester. Miss Mischief went on a visit to Facey Romford, before sailing. There are two good Bobtails in the party, Boxer III, a good sized dog of much merit, and Mayoress of Newport. There is one black and tan Terrier bitch named Surrey Gem, and four Schipperkes, one of which has been put to Mephisto. The hound family is represented by three Beagles from Mr. Joachim's kennel, they are Ringleader, Raffler and Robino, and in their pedigrees combine the blood of the only two champion Beagles in England. From Mr. Krehl's kennel Mr. Mortimer has taken the stud and show Irish Terrier Brian O'K, and the wire-haired Fox-terrier Marden. The party is completed by a team of foreigners, eleven black Poodles of the "fuzzy" kind. Since Mr. Mortimer bid us adieu we have received a letter from a Parisian vendor of Poodles to whom we gave Mr. M. a letter of introduction. This person writes:—"Mr. Mortimer peut se flatter d'avoir été servi en ami, tous sont des sujets de premier choix." So that is all right.

RED AND CREAM COCKER SPANIELS.

Editor Gazette:

IN reply to friend "Croaker" I would say that my reason for saying that the cream and reds came from the Obo cross, I think it was in 1882 that I received a letter from Mr. G. R. Cummings, South Acworth, N.H., in which he stated he had in one litter from a black Spaniel by an Obo dog, two cream pups, I may be wrong in this, as I have not the letter, but it was about that time. Shortly after that "Uncle Dick" wrote me that he had a red pup from the Obo strain. As I had never heard of either red or cream in Spaniels before this, I naturally put it down to the Obo's train, and I think if "Croaker" will look up the pedigrees of the red Cockers he will find that nearly all trace back to Obo. I am writing from memory so I cannot give my data but I think I have heard from J. Ottis Fellows something of the same sort. Perhaps it would be interesting to "Croaker" and some of the other Spaniel men to know something of the ancient history of the modern Spaniel. When I went into Cocker Spaniels in 1880 I wrote to one of the best and oldest authorities in England, asking him what is a Cocker? Subjoined is his answer which I think will be rather an eye-opener to some of the present fancy:

WHAT IS A COCKER?

"He was a dog of the olden time, of 14 to 20 pounds in weight. His head was round with the forehead raised, nose somewhat pointed, ears of good length but somewhat light and covered with soft wavy hair. His eyes were not prominent and were of medium size; the body of medium length with the shape of the Setter. Cockers were well feathered with a thick wavy coat; the colors were dark liver, liver and white, black and white.

The Cocker Spaniel is a cross, produced by crossing the old Cocker with the Norfolk Spaniel or the Sussex Spaniel. The get of these have been inbred and interbred, producing Spaniels varying in weight from 18 to 40 pounds, with colors varying from liver, liver and white, black, black and white, chestnut, chestnut and white, orange and white to lemon and white. The rounder the head, the greater the proportion of the old Cocker blood; the more prominent the eyes appear, especially when accompanied with tan markings, the greater the suspicion of the King Charles, cross, and the greater the number of ticks over the face, legs and body, the greater the quantity of Norfolk blood does the animal contain. The intense black specimens appear to be produced by crossing the old Cocker with Sussex Spaniel, and then by judiciously crossing their get, to have

established the black Cocker. Lemon and white and orange and white Cocker Spaniels are produced by inbreeding the liver and whites.

For the bench, I would suggest that if the old Cocker still exists in his purity, that he should be awarded a place in the show; and that he should have a round head with the forehead raised; of 14 to 20 pounds. That the Cocker Spaniel should be divided into two classes, large and small; large from 28 to 35 pounds in weight; small, not to exceed 28 pounds. The colors, liver, liver and white, chestnut, chestnut and white, orange and white, and lemon and white. Then the dark division to be made up of the black, black and tan and black and white, weight not specified."

Mr. Jacobs, of Newton Abbot, writing to me in 1881 says: "The medium black Spaniel is a cross between the old Cocker liver and white and the Sussex Spaniel golden liver. Anyone who knows these two breeds can easily judge if they should be the shape or style that has lately been the rage. The old liver and white or black and white Spaniel was crossed on Norfolk and gave orange and white and lemon and white. No such color was ever mentioned in olden days as red Cockers. There were several shades of orange and often there was a chestnut, with tan markings, this I think is a sort of black and tan, as we sometimes get in the Gordon Setter."

What I contend is that red is not a Cocker color as was ever known before five or six years ago and has been cultivated by selection to my mind to the detriment of the older and more useful colors of liver and white and liver and the black which is a made breed by crossing on the Sussex.

What I would like to see again is a dog built a little on the old plan. Modern improvements are sometimes the reverse of useful, as a rule they are of alab or saving character, therefore the most modern Cocker is in that line, as he is certainly built for the purpose of saving labor, as he is not fitted by style or shape for any sort of labor, consequently he is a labor saving animal, which comes up to the modern idea.

Twenty years ago Bestor McKarn and "Uncle Dick" had Cockers that would do any amount of work and not feel it, I do not say that "Romeo" or "Pansy" were the *beau ideal* of what Cockers should be, but they were very much better than any big boned, large eyed dogs that we see to-day that are only fit for walking round the judging ring at a dog show, and are very tired after that. To have something useful as well as ornamental is the desire of,

In support of his opinion that the modern Cocker suffers entirely too much from "that tired feeling," Dr. Niven asks us to reprint the following letters from the *English Stock-Keeper* which appeared under the head of

SHOW V. WORKING SPANIELS.

I should like to say a word respecting Show v. Working Spaniels, the fact of there being two characters of a sporting dog is quite enough to prove that there is some fad of the fancy to suit. Now, sir, there will always be some discontent while we see those little cripples being placed before good sound dogs, capable of working weeks and months at a stretch, simply because they chance to have a wrinkle in their coat, or their ears set on too high, or some other little thing amiss not according to the recognized type of Spaniel. I say it is not argument to speak of the value of such dogs apart from the show bench, and yet they are put first in sporting classes. I might be told I have been unsuccessful at shows, so I have, but I would not change my breed for the Dachshund type of legs that wins.

Now, sir, I believe in a Spaniel being as low and as heavy as you can get them, with plenty of bone and muscle, able to retrieve a hare or pheasant, and work a whole season and finish as well as the man with the gun.

You will always hear of the short of entries cry while there are those fads of the fancy to contend with. Let good sound animals win and you will have more entries is the opinion of

THOMAS CLARKE.

I believe I am responsible for having started this correspondence by a letter published in your issue of May 11 last. My object in doing so was, if possible, to draw the attention of breeders of show Spaniels to the fact that the show dogs of to-day are useless to sportsmen generally, and that owing to this fact a very numerous class of Spaniel owners and breeders fail to take an interest in shows, hence perhaps one strong reason for the notorious paucity of entries at our shows, large or small. I appreciate the reply of Major Cane, a most representative and successful owner of show Spaniels, and doubtless a good sportsman, but I can only conclude that his country must be of an easy open character as compared with what I conceive to be a rough shooting, and what I have personally been accustomed to. Perhaps, also, game may be plentiful and a short distance, also a short day be sufficient to obtain a bag.

My experience on rough shooting, with "long and low," and also with Spaniels of a more sporting build, has been that out of scores of dogs during many years very few will work hard for six or seven hours, and the former are glad to become "followers" in half that time. Take the black

Spaniels at any show of note—and they compose a very big majority of the Spaniels shown—and on inquiry from owners or keepers one finds that it is quite the exception for one of these dogs to be worked, and further inquiry would, I expect, elicit the fact that the exception saw nothing more of work than a quiet potter in turnips, stubble sides, or pastures. I maintain, and I never yet met a sportsman who did not agree with me nor saw the Spaniel that proved the contrary, that these heavy, enormously-bodied dogs with masses of superfluous bone, in fact overloaded all round, are physically unfit to work the precipitous dingle sides and strong covers of thorn and gorse one meets with on a rough shoot. They cannot reach rabbits, let alone force them to fly to the open, nor can they stop a wounded rabbit or bird. A "leggy" or wild Spaniel I abhor. All the good points advocated by the Spaniel Club are good if carried out in moderation and with proper regard to the end desired, but I say most emphatically that some of them have been carried to such gross excess by leading showmen that if they alone were responsible for the production of Spaniels, one of the oldest and most sporting breeds of dogs would for practical purposes be ruined. Happily—whatever may happen to dog shows and those who run them—thousands of good sportsmen will continue to breed the Spaniel for the love of the dog and what he can do, and with a view of his doing it. Shows may go on while they pay, not otherwise, but sport has always been and ever will be while Britishers survive. As a pet dog the Spaniel will never succeed, would it therefore not be worth the while for the showmen to encourage the breed on sporting lines to the advantage of all concerned?

TORONTO DOG SHOW.

THE raising of the entry fee to three dollars and the fact that the Pittsburgh Show being on at the same time, both combined to reduce the total number of entries, which this year, according to the catalogue totalled 529, a reduction on last year's entry of about one hundred. The quality in many cases was high, and in the Terrier classes exceptionally so. "Spratts" looked after the *cuisine* and did it well, Murphy being in charge. Disinfecting was well looked after and attendance prompt.

Judging commenced on Monday and was got through with fairly well, with the exception of the Spaniel classes, which owing to Mr. Oldham's unavoidable absence, being delayed on board ship on his return from England, were not judged till Wednesday afternoon.
