#### RED AND CREAM COCKERS.

N your last issue Dr. Niven tells us that because Mr. Cummings had two cream puppies from an Obo dog, out of a black bitch, and that "Uncle Dick" had a red pup from the Obo strain, therefore Obo is responsible for the reds and creams.

the old saying: "It takes more than two swallows to make a summer;" and I am sure that he knows that more than sonal experience, now for my personal observation. I know two facts are needed before a strictly logical inference can be drawn.

The worthy Doctor also says that if I shall look up the pedigrees of the red Cockers I shall find that nearly all trace to a son of old Obo, produce all black pups; a red or buff back to Obo. I might say in reply, first, that there are very few Spaniel pedigrees now-a-days of any color which do not somewhere contain the name Obo, and second, that if the pedigrees of red Cockers be examined, the name of Kelly's Tippo will be found as frequently as that of Farrow's Obo. Might we not, therefore, just as reasonably infer that Tippo is responsible for the reds; and, by the way, a number of breeders believe he is. Moreover, Obo's pedigree is for the most part black, while that of Tippo is an unknown quantity, which fact might, perhaps, lend weight to the Tippo side of the argument. But again, there are red dogs, Cherry Boy for example, which trace back to Obo but not to Tippo; and I have no doubt that there are others which have Tippo and not Obo in their composition. Besides, there are to be found some red Cockers which trace neither to Obo nor to Tippo. (By the way, the three generation rule usually shuts these out from registration). Where then, does the red color come from? Some say it is a "sport," while others Floss Obo, Obo III., Brock, Ipswich Boy and Rideau say it is an old Spaniel color still to be found in some parts of England.

If the Doctor should look up the pedigree of a few crooked legged Spaniels and were to find that they all traced back to Easten's Beau, would he come to the conclusion that all crooked legged Spaniels had their origin in Beau? I am sure he would not; and yet, the inference would be a natural one, for we know that Beau was crooked legged and that he produced a number of dogs that were out in front. few years I have owned and bred considerably over one hundred Cockers, using black bitches and for the most part breeding to dogs of strong Obo blood. Of these, three were livers, seven were black and tans, and the rest blacks, only a very few of the latter having sufficient white on them to qualify for the "Any Other Color" class, and nearly all of these few came from the old style Cocker of the Bestor, I have no doubt that the Doctor is well acquainted with McKoon and "Uncle Dick" stock; but I was never fortunate (?) enough to produce a red. So much for my perthree or four breeders who have used Obo blood extensively, and have never had the luck to get a red. I have known a chestnut colored bitch, not of Obo extraction, bred bitch with Obo's name in her pedigree, bred to the same dog, bring forth an all black litter; a liver bitch, not of the Obo strain, bred to another son of Obo, produce a litter of blacks and livers; a liver bitch, no pedigree, bred to a grand son of Obo, throw blacks and livers; a liver and white bitch, of unknown pedigree, produce black and black and tans to the same dog; and this last bitch was said to have produced reds to previous matings. Again, I know of three black Obo bitches, bred to a black dog that was reported to have sired several reds, and whose full brother was a red, throw nothing but blacks.

Now as to my general observation. I have always considered it strange that Obo should be blamed for the reds when he himself has never, as far as I know, produced one. Pitcher's Chloe II. bred to him gave us the blacks Obo II., Hornell Silk and Black Gem. Besides these the following have been imported: Miss Obo II., Obo Jr., Bob Obo, Flossie, all blacks and sired by Champion Obo. To the best of my knowledge and belief, only Obo II. and Hornell Silk have produced reds. The stud books can be searched in vain for reds from the others. In August number of GAZETTE, Rideau Flossie is credited with producing five blacks to Red Obo, a dog with, perhaps, more red blood in his veins than any other stud Cocker in America. Now, why should Obo II. and Hornell Silk throw reds while the others do noi? I do not propose to answer this question, but I wish to call attention to a fact which has generally Willey says that this fact has been ignored as to "quality," In my last letter I promised to give my own experience. and I have no doubt that he is right, but I think it has been I may say that I have never bred very extensively, but that ignored as to color as well, although it ought to be wellback to the same blood on the dam's side as they do on the stuck on the big-headed crooked-legged brutes that they call sire's, so that, if Obo's pedigree is black, theirs is every whit as black. The pedigree of Obo III., Brock, Ipswich Boy and Rideau Flossie can be traced on the dam's side for several generations back, and in it will be found but one liver and that far enough back to do no harm, all the others being black.

In a very interesting letter on this subject which appeared in Forest and Stream, in 1888, "J.W." says: "It is somewhat strange that although this strain (red) is a proceed from the Obo family, Mr. Willey, who has so much of that blood in his kennel, has never shown any, nor, to the best of my recollection, have I ever heard him say, that he had bred any among his blacks." I do not remember whether Mr. Willey ever made any correction of the above statement. If not, I suppose it must have been substantially true, and from my own experience, I would infer that it was because he had so much of the Obo blood in his kennel that he bred no reds.

In conclusion, I would like to draw Dr. Niven's attention to a few marked characteristics of the red Cockers which are not usually found in dogs sired by Obo. These are the short flat coat, scanty feathering and shortness of ear.

EPLYING to Dr. Niven's letter in your issue of September, I would say that I bred and exhibited the first red Cocker in America but before I had courage enough to keep one, I had drowned four. There can be no doubt but what Obo blood is responsible for the red or buff Cockers seen now a days. I told Mr. Jas. Watson, who was then editor of the American Kennel Register about it, he sent a marked copy to Mr. Farrow. I also wrote Mr. Farrow but he never replied, the fact is that Mr. Farrow does not know himself much about the Obo blood. Mr. Macdougall told me that Fred the sire of Obo weighed 40 lbs. and was a Field Spaniel which would account for the heavy heads and general Field Spaniel character seen in most of the Cockers shown to-day, but of course you can't expect the present generation to know what a Cocker should

Cockers that they do not care to see a good one.

Dr. Niven says that twenty years ago I "had Cockers that could do any amount of work and not feel it." The Doctor is right and I breed the same kind yet. I guarantee every dog I sell to be a natural hunter and retriever and that he will hunt when a year old longer than any man living can follow. Twenty years ago the coat was thick and wavy, now it must be soft and silky (a nice coat that for a sporting dog). Now if a Cocker has a few crooked hairs on his back the judge (?) will jump on his neck and the reporters will show their ignorance by telling about the bad coat, but they say not a word about the big heads and crooked legs. Don't let us forget that a Cocker is a sporting dog, in fact the only all round dog known.

I owned black and tan Cockers 35 years ago, and they did not have big eyes or show the King Charles cross, nor did my old Hornell Belle imported in 1872 from Dr. Boulton's kennel. I think black and tan is older than solid black, the foundation of all English Cocker and Field Spaniel pedigrees was black and tan.

#### TORONTO DOG SHOW.

CRITICISM OF THE MANAGEMENT AND THEIR REPLY.

IN the Toronto Globe of September 26th, appeared a lengthy letter subscribed Hank Watson, criticising the management of the recent Toronto Dog Show. This was replied to officially in the same paper of October 13th, and we give both in extenso. The Committee have gone so minutely into the charges made by Mr. Watson, that little is left to add to their letter of rebuttal.

To Sporting Editor Globe:

Sir,-As a journalist who supports the principle of fair play on all occasions, I rely on your giving the following a place in your paper. The decisions given and the treatment received by exhibitors at the late Toronto Dog Show make it imperative on their part to be up and striving to effect a great alteration both in the selection of judges and award of prizes. Every one interested in dogs who has the pleasure of knowing the members of the Dog Show Committee must be perfectly satisfied that no better selection of gentlemen could have been made as far as integrity is concerned, but with two or three exceptions they are not qualified to carry be for the fact is they never saw one. And they are so out the object of their appointment and to fulfil the duties

connected with their onerous and ungracious task. The free from guile begin to question whether a moral impos-Secretary and Superintendent, Mr. C. A. Stone, displays sibility may not really be a practical fact. Their interests marked ability in many ways. He can handle the easygoing, good-natured members of the committee, and get handle his own and his personal friends' dogs in the ring under the same judge with every success, and is never at a loss, but can always offer an ingenious solution of a Stonehenge enigma, and does it with a wonderful air of authority which plainly says, "I am Sir Oracle, and when I ope my mouth let no dog bark." But I should be very much surprised to learn that his name carries any weight in canine circles.

In every instance the grave and palpable mistakes made in the awards were in classes where the gentleman high in authority or his personal friends had dogs entered, and it appears to be the owners of the dogs that were adjudicated upon rather than the animals. Nothing could be more hollow and open to suspicion and, no one can exonerate the judge from the charge of partiality and unfairness. No fault could be found with the way the Pointers were placed, as there was only one man in the world courageous enough to enter and show a dog against Messrs. Stone and Davey. In English Setters grave mistakes were made in every class. and the Superintendent, with a lot of rubbish that never should have left their owner's premises, scored several wins. The only merit in the lot was that four of them were bred by Dr. Kime. How the judge could give Mr. T. G. Davey the kennel prizes over Dr. Kime's lot, and that, too, without bringing them into the ring, every breeder and judge of dogs who attended the show were at a loss to discover. In Irish Setters favor as flagrant was shown, when he placed Killane, a great big wasteral, over two such excellent specimens of the breed as St. Elmo and Don, and several at the ring side were unkind enough to remark that the position of the dogs would have been reversed had not Secretary Stone taken Killane's chain out of the hand of his trainer and handler, Mr. McGregor. Now the above examples may be considered ample to convey a perfect idea of how the show was run, and no one can make exhibitors believe that anything like justice or fair play was shown them. As a by gone let it teach a salutary lesson for the future, and spare exhibitors the annoyance of finding themselves in the hands of speculators. Will it pay? Is the first and last question in mental arithmetic, the Alpha and Omega of the mind of the projector. I do not say that this is a very high view to take of any business, but it is a very natural one, and one which has governed the world since the invention of current coinage, theoretically long before. The man therefore that does his devoir in this way best thinks he is entitled to the highest reward, and no doubt he gets it, not in his own conscience, whose praise he values but little, but in his domestic self-applause, when he contemplates the money he has taken in his chest at home; in other words, when he looks on the credit side of his banker's book.

Sir,-A letter appeared in your issue of September 26th criticizing the management of the bench show recently held in Toronto in connection with the Industrial Exhibition Association, and making certain charges of incompetency and dishonesty on the part of those connected therewith.

The letter was printed over the signature of a well-known sporting man of this city, and therefore demanded and has received the careful consideration of the Bench Show Committee, and though the writer has indulged in speculation and insinuations which might be considered to exceed even the licence of newspaper scribblers, yet the committee overlook this breach of etiquette and have considered the matter from a purely business point of view.

Junor, seconded by W. P. Fraser, and in opposition to Mr. Stone's nominee. The charge of undue influence with the committee in the appointment of Major Taylor therefore falls to the ground, and is in direct opposition of the facts of the case.

Then follows a sweeping charge that "in every instance grave and palpable mistakes were made," and that "the owners of the dogs were judged rather than the dogs." This is too general a charge for the committee to be able to consider, and appears to be rather the gross exaggeration of a disappointed exhibitor than the honest opinion of a sincere man. Mr. Watson, however, probably feeling that he has made a mistake in his generalizing hastens to particulars. He admits that no objection can be taken to the placing of the Pointers, much as he might desire to object, but the Setters furnish him with a grand opportunity and he eagerly embraces it. The Superintendent showed a "lot of rubbish, etc." Well, what if he did? He paid entries for each piece of "rubbish" and got no prizes for them; so much the better for the show and the receipts. Mr. Watson has no right to object to this. Any man can exhibit who chooses to pay the entry money, and if he wishes to help the show by sending dogs not qualified for prizes, and which he must know would not win, and which do not win, it is rather an act of magnanimity than otherwise, and only a critic determined to find fault and who has allowed himself to be biassed and prejudiced against the show and against the exhibitor would take exception to this. All Mr. Stone's winnings in the English Setter class was a third prize for a novice dog and a V.H.C. in the open bitches. This does not prove that Mr. Stone had much success in influencing the judge, even if he attempted to do so. With the charge regarding the integrity of the judge the committee feel they have nothing to do. He must defend himself. "The award of a judge is final," so says the by-law, and the committee cannot go behind it. The judge was elected or appointed in good faith, his services were paid for and as he has judged in many American bench shows the com-

Whether the Superintendent acted wisely in going into question, and the committee is somewhat divided in opinion in this matter. It is proved, however, that the Superintendent had no interest whatever in the dogs who won that he had handled, and that it was merely done in justice to the dog and fairness to the owner. It is held by many that a dog unaccompanied by his owner shall have the same chance as one whose owner is showing him, and that the Superintendent or committee man or anyone else is justified in making any effort that may be needed to show a dog not thus accompanied by his owner to the best advantage. This seems only fair to owner and to dog.

The "big wasteral" (wastrel?) spoken of by Mr. Watson gained first prize at New York and third at Detroit, and both awards were given by Mr. Davidson. The classes in both these shows were very large, so that Major Taylor could not be far astray in his selection here. Of course it is easy enough to find fault, and to some persons this is toothsome employment and about all they can do. "Every crow thinks her chickens the blackest," and many owners of dogs are blind to the faults in their own canines and very alert to those in their neighbors, but this is a matter for the judge to decide, and with him the committee have no right to interfere. The propriety of committeemen showing dogs has more than once come up for discussion, but the difficulty of forming a committee of dog men who do not own dogs or who will refrain from exhibiting them cannot easily be got over, besides it is a general custom in the United States, and honest judges would not allow themselves to be influenced by any such consideration, while it is a regulation here that committee men who handle dogs while being judged shall remove their badges before entering the ring.

Sporting men who have referred to Mr Watson's letter hold the opinion that the writer's object was either pure spite against Mr. Stone or a desire to break up the Toronto bench show. The committee hold a different opinion, and entertain the hope that a fair and open discussion may allay all feeling detrimental to the show or any one connected with it and satisfactorily answer all objections,

Clumbers, but two were shown, neither extra.

Field Spaniels, Brantford Mohawk was alone in challenge dogs. Rosedale Bess is better in head than Daisy Dean but was not well shown. Staley Baron, shown thin, won first in open dogs rather easily, he is lengthy with a good skull. Maid, first in bitches beats Black Queen, shown in nice good over the back loins, and hips and has capital legs and fit, in head. Nancy is a bit up on leg and is pinched in feet on which she stands truly, coat soft and short. Shepmuzzle. Coles Hill Rufus won easily from Napoleon, badly shown this time and thin. The rest were not good. Pickpania in nice fit was alone in challenge black dogs, Black Duke being in "for specials only." The bitch class was drawn blank. Brantford Red Jacket, as lively as ever, but showing the grey of old age, won over Red Obo. Still in the Ring, Mr. Bell's latest, a good allround one of a sensible scores in quality of legs and feet. type won. Commodore loses in head to winner. Woodland Clipper is wide in front. Tim is high on his pins and a trifle heavy headed. The good headed Baby Ruth won in bitches from Nellie, a nice bodied one. The rest good, of which Rideau Renie is the pick. Keswick, badly shown, lost to the light-bodied Hamilton Jack in any other color dogs. The bitch class was a corker, fifteen entries of which fourteen turned up. A nice bodied liver, in light coat, won in Fannie, though Brantford Beauty with good body and front, must have run her hard. Raglan Russette, a bit long and low, good legs and feet and fair body. Red Rose, full big, heavy in shoulders, plain head. This was a nice class indeed. The puppy and novice classes were mostly repeats.

COLLIES.—Were not a strong class either in quality or numbers, wanting the entries from those American Kennels we have become so accustomed seeing at this show, for it is to them we still must look to avoid having blank Challenge Classes as we had this year. Whether dropping puppy classes had the effect or not it certainly is noteworthy that excepting five the exhibit was made up of imported indivi-

Ightenhill Chief, the winner of 1st in open dogs is a good upstanding dog and the best headed one in the class. What coat he has is of proper texture, but he might have more of it; his eyes are too light in color and his hocks weak. Second went to a good type in Finsbury Hero, but for his decidedly ragged condition he had to be penalized. He is too straight on stifles and not straight enough in front. He is good in head and ears and is built on galloping lines. Finsbury Dude, third prize, excepting for his coarseness in head, bad eyes, low ear carriage and want of height, was looking well. He has a good body, nice quality of legs and the only one in the class possessing undercoat. Mr. R. G. Steacy's unnamed son of Southport Perfection, a big upstanding dog with a domed skull and heavy ears got 4th, and the same owner's Clip, of a similar stamp, without coat received V.H.C.

In open bitches 1st went to Old Hall Perfect. She has a good head but it should be longer, ears are well carried, Barrie, Ont.

pardess got 2nd. This is a pretty sable and white puppy in nice condition and well shown, not just right in muzzle, poor in feet, light in bone, did not show proper action, ears nicely carried, coat fair in quality but soft. Nora 3rd, the winner of a year ago, not in the best of form, fails in having too prominent eyebrows and wide carriage of ears, but

Rufford Whitefriar, a mostly white son of Rufford Athol made his debut in Novice dogs and won. His head is fairly well shaped but lacks that clean cut appearance from the looseness of skin covering it, giving it a fleshy look, has a good body, nice straight harsh outer coat but no under coat and first-class legs and feet. Ightenhill Chief, already described, won 2nd, and Canadian Monarch 3rd. The latter is a good stamp of a Collie, with a lean head of good length, and good ears but he is in wretched coat. MacLeod, V.H.C., is a ten months old black and tan puppy with a very long clean cut level head, but his ears are set on too low and his eyes are light.

Sheppardess won in Novice bitches. Strathella and Stratford Nellie, 2nd and 3rd, are a nice type but too small, and Otterburn Peggie V.H.C., a strong boncd and lengthy black and tan puppy refused to show herself.
