MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, JUNE 7TH, '95.

A MEETING of the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club was held at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, June 7th, 1895. Those present were Messrs. T. G. Davy, London; H. Bedlington, Hamilton; C. A. Stone, G. B. Sweetnam, R. W. Boyle, Toronto, and H. B. Donovan, Secretary-Treasurer.

On motion, Mr. T. G. Davy, acted as chairman.

Minutes of last meeting taken as read.

Field Trial Rules—The Committee were requested to report at next meeting.

Fred Kirby—Industrial Exhibition Association—A lengthy communication was read from Mr. Kirby, when it was resolved, "That the Secretary be requested by resolution of C.K.C. to notify F. P. Kirby to remit to the Industrial Exhibition Association the balance of unpaid fees, (\$51.00). On receipt of same the C.K.C. Committee will be prepared to investigate any charges submitted under rule 11, of the Constitution. If such payment be not made within thirty days, the Executive will be prepared to take further action."

Cropping System left over for the Annual Meeting to decide.

Mutual recognition of disqualifications and suspensions by the C.K.C. and the A.K.C.

The following letters were read:—

New York, May 11, 1895.

Dear Sir,—I beg to inform you that at the annual meeting of the American Kennel Club, the communication in the matter of your proposition amending the then proposed compact between the two clubs, was submitted, and it was resolved, "That the proposition contained in the letter from the Canadian Club be rejected." You doubtless were so advised by our then acting Secretary. Another resolution was then adopted to this effect, "That the American Kennel Club will recognize the suspensions and disqualifications imposed by the Canadian Kennel Club." This matter was referred to a committee consisting of Major J. M. Taylor, James Watson, and myself as Chairman, delegating full power to that committee to enter into an agreement with your Club, for a mutual recognition of each others suspensions and disqualifications.

We are now ready to join with your Club in this matter, and would be pleased to hear from you at your convenience regarding your willingness to do so.

Mr. W. Wade handed the following to the Club through the President:

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 23rd inst., asking my opinion with regard to the advisability of an arrangement being entered into between the American and Canadian Kennel Clubs, providing, among other things, that there should be a mutual recognition of disqualifications between the two clubs. I can only speak of the matter with regards to its legal effect upon the Canadian Kennel Club as I would not care to take upon myself to give an opinion based upon the laws of any of the States of your Union. I can say, however, that such an arrangement might result in a very serious embarrassment of the Canadian Kennel Club. Our laws provide that a member of a Club or Society must not be condemned by the Society without hearing the evidence against him and of being heard in his own defence, and that any expulsion made without such full and fair enquiry is illegal and entitles the party interested to claim damages from the Club or Society. An alliance between the American and Canadian Kennel Clubs, as I understand it, would be no more than an alliance, each Club preserving its

own identity. If therefore, the Canadian Kennel Club should take upon itself to convict one of its own members of any alleged misconduct without any evidence further than the fact that the member had been disqualified by the allied Society in the States, this would legally mean a conviction without any evidence at all and the Club acting upon the finding and disqualifying the member would, as I have stated, be liable to an action for damages and the attempted expulsion would have no legal effect. I take it that this alone would be sufficient to satisfy the Clubs that it would be inadvisable to enter into an arrangement with this detail, and I need not, therefore, express my opinion upon the other matters referred to in your letter.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

THE QUALITY AT THE MONTREAL SHOW

was the subject of remark by experienced show goers; and that so many good specimens could be found in Montreal was rather a surprise to the most hopeful. This or rather the almost entire absence of specimens unfit for the show bench is probably owing to the good work the Montreal Kennel Association has been doing, by its papers and criticisms of specimens at monthly meetings.

PUPPY CLASSES,

if one may judge by the Toronto and Montreal Shows, are no longer popular. Though puppies might be entered in the classes provided for every breed, at Montreal, few people took advantage of the opportunity. It looks as though breeders have learned that showing is too risky not only for the puppy that is entered, but for the other dogs of the kennel from which he comes.

A CURIOUS INCIDENT

happened at the Montreal Show. An exhibitor who took his Collie out of the show at night found his chain, left on the stall, missing on his return. But oddly enough, later in the day a well known citizen approached one of the Committee and explained that his Collie that had *not* been entered, was chained on a bench, and as it turned out, with the exhibitor's missing chain. Now how did all this happen? Some one knows—but who?

TORONTO CATALOGUE.

We omitted mention of the Toronto catalogue in the report last month. It was what is familiarly known as a "one dog one number" list and once adopted will not be changed without good reasons. The idea is that when a dog is once

assigned a number, that particular number follows him though whatever additional classes he may be entered in. Thus if entry is made in the open class and again in puppy or novice or both, the marginal number appears but with the first entry, a note following each subsequent time the name appears as "benched at No. —." If an entry appears "150 Don" subsequent entries of the same dog will appear as "(150) Don (benched at 150.)"

As we understand it the regular classes were not brought in after the arrival of these dogs, delayed in transit, and thus no comparison was made in the ring and so the awards were but complimentary and little importance may be attached to their placing, which was not done we believe until two days after the regular judging.

MONTREAL SHOW.

MR. W. B. PALMER, OF HAMILTON

seems to have transferred his allegiance from Spaniels to Terriers as he has lately been investing in two excellent dogs, the Irish Terrier Brickbat, Jr., by champion Brickbat out of Miss Murphy, a big winner, and the wire-haired Fox-terrier Endcliffe Banker winner of firsts at New York, Pittsburgh and Boston.

SOME VALUABLE IMPORTATIONS

from across the lines have been made by the Mount Royal

Kennels; these include the Fox Terrier, Warren Faithful, 2nd Novice Class, New York, etc. etc. This bitch is a daughter of the historic First Flight and Warren Vice. She was placed first in her class at the Montreal Show and won the Special for the best smooth Fox Terrier. She is caring for a litter by the now famous sire Warren Faithful. This kennel has also secured the young Bull Terrier bitch Newmarket Syren, 2nd Rhode Island, 2nd Boston. She not only won 1st and special in her class against all Bull Terriers of either sex, but the special for the best specimen against some other breeds. She is in whelp to the famous light weight dog Little Flyer.

THE BULL BITCH JUNO II.

a good dark brindle has been purchased by Mr. Jos. A. Laurin, Imperial Kennels of Montreal, from the Woodlawn Park Kennels of Saratoga Springs, N.Y. She was whelped June 29th, 1893, and was bred by the Woodlawn Park Kennels. Her wins include first puppy class New York; firsts puppy and open classes, Louisville; first Specialty Show, 1894; second open class New York, second any weight class, Detroit, first under forty pounds class, Chicago, 2nd any weight class, Pittsburgh, first under forty pounds Boston, and first open class Montreal 1895.

MUST BE SHOWN IN OPEN CLASS IN CANADA.

Under the old agreement with the A.K.C.—cancelled some time since by that club—this bitch would have been eligible for the challenge class in Canada, but as her wins in 1894 were not sufficient to place her in this class, she has yet to win two firsts in the open class in Canada to entitle her to challenge honors. An enquiry to the Secretary of the C.K.C. from Mr. Laurin which reads as below, lead to the decision announced in the official report of the meeting: "I see that there is a rule of the C.K.C. that reads as follows:—The challenge class shall be for all dogs having won four first prizes in the open classes. A dog having won three first prizes in this class, one of which shall have been won at a show having not less than 500 entries shall have the privilege of the title champion without further competition. I suppose that Juno II. belongs to the challenge class, does she not? I thought that a dog belonging to the challenge class had this title as "challenge Juno II."

THE MONTREAL KENNEL ASSOCIATION'S FIRST SHOW.

THE cause of the show being held so late, everything being so hurried, class lists being forthcoming only a few days before entries had to be made, etc., etc., is to be sought for in the difficulty of learning in time whether a suitable building could be obtained. The organization for carrying out the work of holding a show was good, but the short time for doing the work with the lack of experience incidental to a first undertaking explains why many things were not perfect. To illustrate, the catalogue is perhaps the handsomest ever produced in Canada, yet in spite of work day and night by those that had it in hand, it shows defects to the experienced eye which were inevitable in an attempt to get it out in three days.

Too much praise cannot be given to the members of the willing and intelligent Committee, and especially several of those that worked incessantly, and such defects as existed were not noticed by the general public, so that the show was on all hands voted a great success.

The rink is a large building capable of holding many more dogs than were benched. The actual number of dogs on exhibition was somewhat over 300, and for a first show the quality was a surprise, the number of positively

bad specimens being comparatively small. The benching was of rough boards but being well put up, looked well enough in their surroundings. Good straw and fresh sawdust were liberally supplied. The bedding was changed daily and at no time was foul smell noticeable. The building might be better lighted but is capable of being well ventilated. The stalls were roomy and the aisles very wide so that there was no sense of crowding. The judging rings were larger than at most shows. The names of the breeds on large cards were placed over them in a position not accessible to the dogs themselves.

The judges were : P. G. Keyes, of Ottawa, for all breeds of Spaniels including Toy Spaniels ; F. S. Wetherall, of Compton, for all breeds of Terriers except Bull Terriers and black and tan Terriers ; and Alfred Geddes of Ottawa, for all other classes. The judging was started soon after the scheduled time though under great difficulties, and throughout owing to the almost entire lack of experience of others the President of the Association had to be almost everything in himself at times and was forced into prominence which he did not court and which is very liable to be misconstrued especially if there are a few mischief-makers or disgruntled exhibitors about. As many of the exhibitors were not present to bring in their dogs there was some delay in getting the competitors before the judges so that the judging, including that of Spaniels, was not completed till the afternoon of the second day.

The Spaniel classes were only moderately filled which is unaccountable ; as there are plenty of fair specimens in Montreal, and Mr. Keyes' judging gave so far as I know entire satisfaction. It was deliberately and carefully done.

Mr. Wetherall judged with more haste and less care and it is understood now, candidly admits that he made some mistakes. He seemed to overlook the fact that he was judging at a club's first show, and in some cases at least was as strict as if he had been in the ring at the Toronto Industrial show or even at Boston. The most important special he had to judge was that in which all the Terriers and one or two other breeds competed. His work in this instance did not meet with general approval. However more experience will set matters right.

Mr. Geddes had a vast task which he discharged beyond the expectations of those who had most confidence in him. Although he had over 20 classes to judge he never once became confused, reversed awards he had already made or relaxed the care he showed from beginning to end.

The dogs that came before him were not only "looked over" but most carefully examined so that persons standing around the ring who knew nothing of the merits of the dogs

were constrained to praise the care bestowed in the task of judging not alone the winners but the merits of all entries that came before him. Few mistakes were made and considering that in several instances the classes were very large—seventeen in one case—the result has given Mr. Geddes an undoubted place as an all-round judge.

While it was easy enough in many instances to pick the winners in some cases this was a trying task which the judge lightened by dividing into groups for closer comparison.

The special which excited the greatest interest was the Sir Donald Smith Cup which is a very large and valuable trophy. It was given for the best specimen of the following breeds: Mastiffs, Bloodhounds, Great Danes, St. Bernards, Newfoundlands, Deerhounds, Russian Wolfhounds, Greyhounds and Collies, and must be won three times by the same person before becoming his property. The competition between the first-prize winners of these breeds finally narrowed down to Mr. Vipond's St. Bernard, Duke of Wellington II., 2nd at Toronto Industrial last year, and Mr. Virtue's Russian Wolfhound, Adrooski, the winner of several prizes. The Wolfhound rightly won it and Mr. Geddes showed that he is competent for a difficult task.

The judging as a whole shows that there are more men in Canada than is commonly supposed, who can judge dogs. Part of the success of the show was owing to adherence to rules, there being no deviation from them in order of judging or other matters without the greatest cause; for once the convenience of one or two exhibitors is consulted, it is astonishing how many people find excuses to get their own ends served.

An attempt was made to have careful veterinary inspection of the dogs, and the general condition of the animals seemed to be good.

Dogs from a distance were returned to their owners by Saturday afternoon or evening trains.

I regret very much that I am unable to send you a full report of my classes, but I was unable to get through judging until seven o'clock Saturday evening, too late to take any notes. The few following notes are written from memory. The Show was a grand success, both as to number of entries and visitors. The dogs were nicely benched, and the building kept very clean at all times. I take this opportunity of thanking Messrs. Mills, Gault, Kennedy, McNally and others for kind services rendered me in the ring.

Mastiffs.—Dogs, a poor class, the winner Miximilian, is a big dog, high on leg, shallow in body, tail carried too high. Bitches, no entries.

St. Bernards.—Were very numerous and classes strong. Duke of Wellington, the pick of the dogs, is large and massive, a little hollow in back and cow hocked, Don Phyllis and Wallace are also good specimens. Bitches, Lady Norah, 1st, is large, grand front, heavy bone, muzzle too long, Roman nosed and not enough stop; Royal Berna 2nd, good in head and expression, compact body, but is very much out in front legs, she may improve with age.

Great Danes.—Dogs, Royal Minor, 1st, good head, splendid action, is small, but has lots of quality, and was shown as hard as nails; Duke of Wurtemberg, 2nd, is very large, bad in action and shown too soft.

Newfoundlands.—Only two shown, one a fairly good one, the other N.G.

Deerhounds.—Large and strong classes, Banff, 1st in dogs, can win in the best of company. Bitches were not so good.

Russian Wolfhounds.—Only one shown, that grand dog Adrooski.

Greyhounds.—Maud Torrington, looking well, was alone in the Challenge Class. Dogs, Lord Torrington, 1st, is a fine upstanding dog shown in grand condition. The owner of these two is a thorough Greyhound man, and always shows his dogs in the pink of condition. Justinian, 2nd, is a good one slightly out in front, feet bad, and not in good condition.

Bloodhounds.—Only one shown, a very moderate specimen.

English Foxhounds.—Had a large entry. The Montreal Hunt Club showed three grand pairs in the pink of condition and won all the prizes.

Pointers.—Only two, Drake a very good one shown in fine form, and the well-known Chaira.

English Setters.—Were very weak classes. Dogs, Noble Furness, a good young rangy fellow won 1st; 2nd went to Bang T, too large and coarse, with hollow chest and bad front legs. Bitches, the winner a blue belton, has a nice head, shown too fat.

Irish Setters.—Were much better classes and contained a number of previous winners.

Gordon Setters.—Dogs, Count Leo, a fine young dog with good head, splendid tan and a good mover; Mount Royal Rush, loses to the winner in color of tan and action, was shown too fat.

Collies.—Very numerous and good. Dogs, seventeen shown, Royal Squire 1st, not good in carriage of ears, wanting in undercoat, head and expression good, brush well carried, full of quality; Braehead Chriss 2nd, is a bit full in cheek, brush carried too high, good coat and frill, ears well carried, not quite so good in expression as the winner.

Bitches, Braehead Beauty 1st, is a sweet little thing, good head, coat, frill and brush, a very taking one; Balmoral Victoria 2nd, is also one of the correct type. Two grand puppies were shown in the dog class and will be heard from again.

Bulldogs.—Only three shown, one a brindle bitch just imported, is a good one.

Bull Terriers.—The usual percentage of big dogs with thick heads. Newmarket Syren is the pick of the lot, she has a few small spots on back and off color a little in eye, otherwise a good one.

Dachshunds.—A good lot, if not very pretty.

Beagles.—Only three shown. Lill, weak in body and light in bone. The other two looked like workers.

Black and Tan Terriers.—Dogs, 1st good size, fine in muzzle, smutty in markings and out in front; 2nd, too large, thick in head, bad in front, smutty in markings and breached behind. Bitches, 1st, a nice little one, a little out in eye and wide in front; 2nd, good size, cut away under the eyes and not so good in markings.

Yorkshire Terriers.—Teddie, a nice size, good coat, but bad in color of tan.

One Dalmation and one Spitz, neither good ones and were lucky to get a 2nd.

Irish Water Spaniels.—Mike, a son of that good bitch Marguerite, was alone in the open class. He is fair in skull and muzzle, top-not and ears very good, coat too open and lacking curl, legs well covered. Nelly Brady was the only representative of the opposite sex. She is not a flyer being small, open in coat and light in eyes.

Clumber Spaniels.—Rake II was the only entry in open class for dogs, and Fidget the only Clumber in the corresponding class for bitches. A second entry consisted of a very good Field Spaniel, that might have been placed if entered in proper class.

Field Spaniels.—Sweep, a miniature Field, was first. He shows considerable quality all through and were he larger would hold his own with our best. Carlo, second, is very good in head, but a bit up on the leg, coat flat. Corktown Cupid is too much of a Cocker in head, body and bone good, coat wavy. Field Spaniel bitches were conspicuous by their absence.

Cocker Spaniels.—In the open class for black dogs, Currier's King C won. He is plain in head, cobby, rather profuse in coat, out at elbow and has a white frill. In Cocker character he ranks high. Popcorn, second, is overgrown and weedy, coat wavy. The other entries in this

class were unnoticed. The bitches were a much better lot. Robertson's Floss, first, is fair in skull, ears long and low set, coat flat, bone and feather very good; was shown too fat. Rideau Restless, second, is a good type, eyes a shade light, muzzle too pointed, character, bone and feather excellent. Obo C has a merry expression, ears set high, shown too heavy. Woodstock Chloe, weak in muzzle, eyes sunken, shows age. Princess Jess, too straight in face and fine in muzzle, eyes full but dark. Laidlaw's Selma was absent.

In the open class for dogs of color, the ubiquitous Red Obo was given the blue. His back action is not what it ought to be, but in other respects he seems to improve with age. He won the special for best Cocker dog any color. Brown Jacket is too full in skull and eye. Pitro, an old fashioned liver and white, lacking in stop and full in eye, with immense ears was given three letters. Tuck, is a surly looking black and white, leggy and out at elbow.

But one bitch—Red Dolly, presented herself in the color class. She is beautiful in form and graceful in action, with the same type of head as that of her sire—Red Obo. A trifle too fine in head and bone are about her only faults. She won special for best Cocker in the show.

In the Novice class Brown Jacket beat Prince, a nice little dog, very much out of condition. Had it been otherwise the tables might have been turned. The others entered in this class were repeaters and have already been noticed. The novice class for bitches contained nothing of merit, except the winner.

Toy Spaniels.—These were numerous, but the general quality was not what one would expect to find in the metropolis of Canada. Mr. Bradford's, Blenheim dog Bijou, and Mrs. Pitts', Little Nell, were about all that would have been noticed in good competition. The latter won the Special for the best dog or bitch in the show.

[We regret we have been unable to get a report of his classes or a photograph from Mr. Wetherall, but the appended is from a communication by him to a Montreal paper of June 4th, in which he criticises his classes.]

Irish Terriers.—The first breed which came before me were the Irishmen. Here let me say a word of praise to Messrs. McLean and Drummond. The latter gentleman may be termed the father of the Irish Terrier in Montreal and vicinity. He has displayed great pluck in getting good dogs and the proof is before us. I believe that Montreal to-day can show Irish Terriers with any other city, and they are all of Kinkora stock. Commissariat has proved himself

to be a great sire, and there were also nice pups by the lost Shargar. Open dogs—Here in my first class I made a blunder. How I did it I do not know, unless it was on account of the light. I placed Canadian Ambassador over a new dog called Hulton Magister. The latter dog, barring a light eye and not a racy enough build, is an exceedingly nice dog. Splendid bone and coat and true Irish Terrier expression. Canadian Ambassador is marred by a snipey nose and prominent eye and a bit crouchy behind, but has enough bone, hard coat, and nice racy build. He should be an acquisition to the breed in this section. A dog by the name of Bob was third. Broad in front, one ear carried badly, good in coat, bone and symmetry. Carleton Blarney does not look the same dog as when I saw him at Ottawa, 1893; he has grown terribly coarse and big. In open bitches two old faces turned up, viz.: Glenary Omagh and Ballymoney. Written as placed, the former is an exceedingly nice bitch with grand expression, but was too fat, which made her look coarser than ever. The latter is a nice little bitch, but she should be kept at home as her day has gone by. Novice dogs—Hulton Magister, 1; Barney, short of coat, thick in head, and bad front, came second, and a dog called Dick third. He was off his bench when I went to look at him the second time. Novice bitches—Here a sweet little bitch turned up, Fairy by Shargar and Tartargoter. Her only great fault was her coat, of which she did not have enough. I had hard work to separate her and Glenary Omagh for specials. If I could have cut them in two, I would have placed them even, but at present Fairy is unfurnished, second prize withheld; 3rd Rhea, coarse head, faulty ears, front might be better, good bone. V.H.C. Colleen is nothing but a toy cub, too fat, has good head. Puppies—1st, Caper, nice long head, good coat and bone; 2nd Molly Bawn, a stylish pup, too young to show; 3rd, Dick mentioned before.

Scottish Terriers—Open dogs.—1st, Rowdy, by Ch. Allister and Carryvansch. Here was a grand little dog, hardly a fault to be found with him; I placed him 1st for the small breeds special. He will show the best of them the blue ribbon before he gets done. This dog and his dam were wanting purchasers at \$15 a few months ago. Such is dogdom. Open bitches—Carryvansch, the dam of Rowdy, bad head, ears and coat, but perfect in body and symmetry; might have a bit more bone.

In *Dandie Dinmonts*, *Skye Terriers*, *Bealington Terriers* and *Airedales* nothing of any importance turned up.

Smooth Fox-Terriers—There were just four or five good dogs in the whole outfit. I had hard work to separate the others, the Belvoirs came on top showing the blood head

and shoulders above the rabble. Open dogs—1st, Belvoir Rambler, an easy first, a nice little dog too low on leg. 2nd Soldier Bob, a gamy looking dog, light of bone and too racy. 3rd, Belvoir Chappie, a grand bodied dog, but is terribly coarse and has a chest on him that would make Bull Dog breeders look. V.H.C., Seymour Viceroy, lacks Terrier expression, long head and long in body. Open bitches—1st, Warren Faithful, a nice little bitch, light in bone and short on leg. Novice dogs—Here some fourteen dogs turned up. With the exception of the winner the rest were very moderate and yet nothing very bad. 1st, Belvoir Jim, an exceedingly stylish pup, nice head, coat, bone, in fact quality throughout, front not extra and a bit tucked up in loin; he gave Warren Faithful a tussle for supremacy as the best smooth, and had he been handled the way the bitch was I fancy he would have got it. He had been bitten the night before, after judging the classes, and when he appeared for the specials his head was a bit swollen, this I did not know till I had awarded the blue. 2nd, Guy, just a fair Terrier, poor in head and eye. 3rd, Soldier Bob. V.H.C., Beth, another of Belvoir blood, should have been reserve. In fact that is what he really was, but no such thing appeared on the judges book, prizes being written instead of numbers of the dogs. He is a high quality Terrier but had about ten pounds of fat on him, thick in head. Novice bitches—1st, Rose B, a fair bitch, a bit short in head. 2nd, Gipsy Dean, poor in head and ears fair otherwise. Puppies, smooth and wire hair—1st, Belvoir Jim, extra closely pressed by an extra good unfinished wire puppy, his name does not appear in catalogue, but the wire will turn up as a fancier has him. 3rd, Wang, a nice little white pup, bad head and ears and tail about an inch long. V.H.C., Risk, too long in body.

Wire Hairs—Here the quality was better; hardly any rubbish. Open dogs—1st, Midsummer Day, grand head and bone, but too leggy, a bit open in coat; 2nd withheld; 3rd, Braehead Razzle, a nice little dog, good in coat, bone and body, a bit short in head. Looking this dog over afterwards I thought I used him a bit hard as he is not a bad terrier. Novice dogs—1st, Brock, an exceptionally nice corky dog, a bit plain in head and coat, too long. 2nd Compton Joe, a big strong terrier, spoilt by bad mouth and head, a nice little pair of ears on him. 3rd Braehead Razzle, V.H.C. Splinter, long head, too long and lathy in body. Novice bitches—1st Goose, a nice little bitch, a bit toyish, 2nd, Beauty, too long in body, poor carriage of ears. FRED S. WETHERALL.

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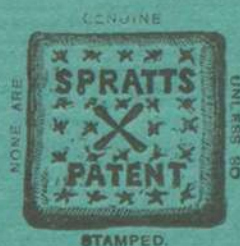
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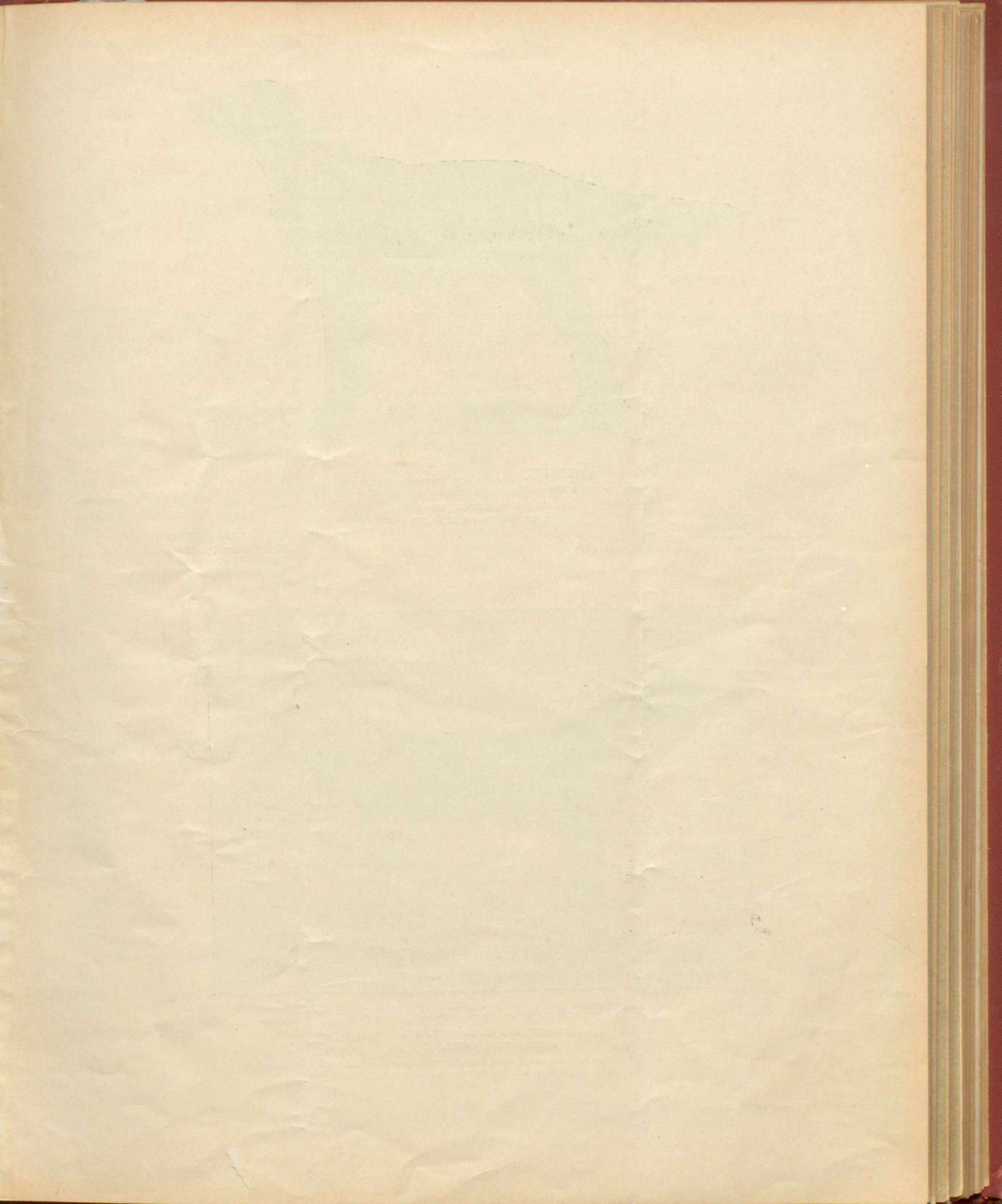
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
