RISH Terrier brood bitches, to be entered and their produce, born after entry, to be shown uncropped, and as explained below:—Entries close January 1st, 1896, and the stakes are to be decided at the thirteenth annual dog show of the New England Kennel Club, in 1897, competing dogs must be entered in their regular classes.

The proportion of the prizes into which the stakes will be divided will be as follows: 25 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for best in show (dog or bitch, any age). 20 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for best of opposite sex to winner (any age). 10 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for second best dog in show (any age). 10 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for second best bitch in show (any age). 12½ per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for best dog pup (between 6 and 12 months). 12½ per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for best dog pup (between 6 and 12 months). 5 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for second best dog pup (between 6 and 12 months). 5 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for second best dog pup (between 6 and 12 months). 5 per cent. (½ plate, ½ cash) for second best dog pup (between 6 and 12 months).

CONDITIONS AND RULES.

- The produce of brood bitches eligible to the stakes must have been sired and whelped in the United States or Canada.
- 2. Any number of brood bitches, the property of the same owner, may be entered for the stake.
- 3. All bitches must be entered prior to the birth of their produces, and shall only be eligible for entry in respect of produce to be born on or after July 1st, 1895. Entries may be made at any time before the closing of the stake.
 - 4. One entry shall cover only one litter of puppies, but

bitches once entered may be re-entered at any time after the date of closing, if it is intended to breed a second litter from them for competition. Should, however, a bitch entered for the stake, and whose certificate of service has been sent in, prove not to be in pup, information to that effect must be sent to the undersigned not later than one week after the time when she would have been due to pup, and the entry will still hold good for a second service.

- 5. A Certificate of Service (Form A) must be filled up and signed as required for each bitch entered for the stake. In the case of bitches which have been served before the time of entry, this certificate must accompany such entry; and in the case of bitches which have not been served before the time of entry, this certificate must be sent to the undersigned within fourteen days after the time such bitch shall have been put to the dog.
- 6. Within fourteen days from the birth of the puppies of any bitch entered for the stake, the owner shall forward to the undersigned a certificate (Form B), signed by himself and one other person, stating the date of birth, with sex, exact markings and color of each puppy. And inasmuch as alterations have been known to occur in the markings of puppies after they have been declared, attention is called to the strict necessity of giving an exact description of color, such as dark red, red, bright red, dull red, wheaten, etc. also the shade of the toe nails, whether black, brown, or white; an accurate description of any white markings, with the shape of the patches on chest, etc., stating if there are any grizzled or grey hairs on tail, and if the ears are a darker shade of color than the body, also any other distinguishing marks each puppy may possess; and of immediately reporting to the undersigned any changes that may occur in any of these particulars, but the acceptance or otherwise of such amended description shall be left to the discretion of the undersigned Committee, appointed to manage the stake.
- 7. Five dollars to be paid on entering each bitch—the only liability in case of forfeit—the remaining ten dollars to become due and to be paid if and when the owner nominates one or more of her pups for the stake, on or before the date the entries close for the New England Kennel Club's Thirteenth Annual Bench Show in Boston, 1897.
- 8. Any number of puppies of one litter are eligible to compete under one subscription, provided that, if the breeder shall have sold or otherwise parted with any such pappy or puppies no other person shall nominate them or any of them for the stake, unless he also pays ten dollars for such nomination, and forwards to the undersigned a certi-

ficate from the breeder properly identifying the puppy or puppies in question.

- Forms for nominating the puppies for competition will be sent at the proper time to all who have entered bitches.
- ro. If a bitch entered for the stake be sold or otherwise parted with before her puppies are born, the new owner shall forward to the undersigned a certificate of the fact, signed by the late owner, and shall in all other respects comply with the rules hereinbefore set out.
- tr. If any judge appointed shall have made any entry for this stake, he shall have his subscription in respect of such entry returned to him, unless any one or more of the produce of any such entry shall have passed from his possession and have been nominated by another owner under rule 8.
- 12. Any one failing to comply with the above rules may be refused permission to nominate puppies for the stake, and shall in such case forfeit his entrance fee.
- 13. All matters of doubt or dispute arising under these rules and conditions, or otherwise respecting this stake, shall be settled by the New England Kennel Club, and their decision shall be final.

FEW months ago a discussion was started in a contemporary on the subject of the suitability, or otherwise, of the modern Field Spaniel for the purposes for which he is ostensibly intended. The originator of this discussion, who wrote under the nom de plume of "Sport and Show, but Sport," argued that the long, low type of dog who at present carries all before him in the show ring is useless for purposes of sport, and in fact little better than a cripple in the field. Others, taking the same side, went even further, and soaring boldly into the realms of

If a judge cannot trust to his eye for points and symmetry, and his sense of touch for such things as bone and coat, he has no business to judge at all. In my opinion, general style ought to go a long way in estimating the merits of any dog. Mr. J. S. I must say I thoroughly of some sort, either mental or physical, generally both. Another great fault, to my mind, is crooked fore-legs, and it is by no means an uncommon one. No dog with any thing but perfectly straight legs should ever get a prize. With very short, heavily-boned legs, the big knee joint sometimes makes them look crooked to a superficial observer, when they are really all right, but the judge can easily distinguish between the two eases. Feet, I think, have hardly enough attention paid to them. Of course, with a heavy animal like a Spaniel, one cannot expect the round cat-feet of a Terrier, but his very weight makes the soundness of his understandings all the more important. The pads should be very thick and hard, the toes close together, and the space between them well clothed with hair, dog's size and weight.

Most judges, in my opinion, attach too much importance to profuse feathering. Of course a Spaniel should be nicely feathered; it is typical of the breed. But the feathering should not be so heavy as to interfere with his working. I know of one or two Spaniels that win very often under some judges, and that have little else to recommend them except this superabundance of feather, and in some cases it is so much as to constitute to me a regular eyesore. I know one or two dogs that have regular petticoats trailing on the ground, which is, of course, wrong according to the points laid down by the Spaniel Club. Where would these dogs be after an hour's work in snow, or even in a muddy, slushy wood? I have seen snow so balled and matted on a Spaniel's featherings that he could hardly move along at all. To be practical, the feathering on the forelegs should gradually diminish from the point of the elbows downwards, and on the hind legs there should be little or none below the hocks. A dog like this, and handsomely feathered on his quarters and the upper part of his forelegs, looks much better to a sporting eye than one with the sweeping petticoats I have alluded to does. The same remark applies to hair under the throat and on the chest. Some Spaniels are dog's mouth for a long time afterwards. NOTES FOR NOVICES.

ANY dogs are given-especially when hungry, to "bolting" their food. This is a bad habit, and is sure to have an ill effect sooner or later. To prevent a dog from habitually doing this, it is best to give him, before his proper meal, a hard, dry biscuit. This will take off, as it were, the edge of appetite, and so, when the usual basin is given, it will be consumed more moderately.

Large bones should be regularly given to dogs, because they act splendidly as cleaners to the teeth, the rasping of every vestige of meat doing this most effectually. Large bones should be given, because if too small the dog will crunch them up and swallow them, which is not altogether desirable.

I have always found the capsule form of giving malefern oil the best. It is so clean and easy, and the dog does not taste the drug; whereas in the usual emulsion-draught form-there is bound to be a disagreeable flavour in the

THE BEDLINGTON TERRIER.

THE ENGLISH BEDLINGTON TERRIER CLUB'S STANDARD.

Skull—Narrow, but deep and rounded, high at occiput, and covered with a nice silky tuff or topknot.

Jaw—Long, tapering, sharp and muscular, as little stop as possible between the eyes, so as to form nearly a line from the nose-end along the front of the skull to the occiput, the lips close fitting and no flew.

Eyes—Small, and well sunk in head. The blues should have a dark eye; the blue and tan, dark, with amber shade; livers and sandy, a light brown eye.

Nose—Large, well angled. Blues and blue and tan should have black noses; livers and sandy, flesh colored.

Teeth-Level, or pincer-jawed.

Ears—Moderately large, well formed, flat to the cheek, thinly covered and tipped with fine silky hair. They should be filbert-shaped.

Legs—Of moderate length, not wide apart, straight and square set, and with good-sized feet, which are rather long.

Tail—Thick at the root, tapering to point, slightly feathered on lower side, 9 in. to 11 in. long, and scimitar-shaped.

Neck and Shoulders—Neck long, deep at the base, rising well from shoulders, which should be flat.

Body—Long and well proportioned, flat-ribbed and deep, not wide in chest, slightly arched back, well ribbed up, with light quarters.

Coat—Hard, with close bottom, and not lying flat to sides.

Colour—Dark blue, blue and tan, liver, liver and tan, sandy, sandy and tan.

Height-About 15 to 16 in.

General Appearance—He is a light made up, lathy dog.

The Shooting Times adds: "No mention is made in the foregoing as to the weight a Bedlington Terrier should be. Dogs about 20 lb. and certainly not more than 24 lb., bitches 2 lb. less, the lighter weight is however, the most desirable. The most fashionable colours of the Bedlington Terrier are blue, blue and tan, and liver, the latter either of a dark tint or inclined to sandy."
