**D**R. WESLEY MILLS, on request, took the chair. *Ballots.*—Moved by Mr. Bedlington, seconded by Mr. Boyle, and carried, that Mr. J. H. Saunders and Secretary act as scrutineers, to count ballots and declare results. Scrutineers reported as follows:

#### SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT.

Mr. Bedlington here took the chair. Secretary-Treasurers report read as follows:

*Mr. President and Gentlemen:*

Below I beg to hand you my annual report for the year ending August 31st, 1894:

*Registrations.*—The total number to date is 3,929; number entered from Sept. 1st, '94, to date, 352; for the

corresponding period of last year the number was 531, showing a decline of 179. This, it is to be inferred, is caused by the raising of the registration fee.

I may state that during the past year a complete index of every dog entered, properly classified by breed and name, has been written up at considerable time and expense.

*The Executive Meetings* have not, I regret to say, been attended by as large a number as is desirable—in fact in two cases where meetings were called by the usual printed notice no quorum could be procured, and the meetings had to be deferred and called again. This may be due to two causes, either indifference or the feeling that now the Club had adopted a settled and independent policy that the members do not feel it incumbent on them to attend Executive meetings at a loss of time and money. I trust the latter cause is the correct one.

*Membership.*—The roll now stands as follows:

*Finances.*—Following will be found the Financial Statement for the past year. All things considered, in my opinion, the Club has done excellently in this way.

Under the head of liabilities should perhaps be included the cost of publishing the annual Stud Book for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1895, which I roughly estimate—on terms almost unanimously agreed upon by the Executive—at about \$160. This is really a liability, though not yet actually incurred.

*Field Trial Rules.*—As recommended by Executive, adopted and referred back for necessary revision and modification.

*Constitution and By-Laws.*—Referred to Executive for revision.

*Incorporation.*—Moved by Dr. Mills, seconded by Mr. Gilbert, that Mr. Sweetnam be a Committee to interview Capt. Harston regarding the charter of the defunct Dominion of Canada Kennel Club. *Carried.*

*Cropping.*—Moved by Dr. Mills, seconded by Mr. Gilbert, that this subject be referred to Executive Committee with power to take a vote of the Club on the question. *Carried.*

*Letter of Resignation* as First Vice-President read from Mr. J. S. Williams. On motion resignation was accepted.

*First Vice-President.*—Dr. Mills nominated Mr. R. W. Boyle. Nomination carried unanimously and Secretary instructed to cast one ballot for same.

*Ballot Tie.*—A ballot was taken on the three names which tied in the first ballot and Major J. C. Guillot, Windsor, declared elected.

CH. SOUTHPORT PERFECTION SOLD FOR £1,000.

The theme of conversation in Collie circles at Birkenhead, was the plucky purchase by Mr. A. H. Megson, the "Collie King," of that "King of Collies," Champion Southport Perfection, for the large sum of £1,000. This is probably the highest price ever paid for a Collie, or indeed any show dog, save the St. Bernard, Ch. Sir Bedivere. The sum obtained by Mr. T. H. Stretch for Ch. Christopher is the nearest approach to this amount, and is reputed to equal £1,000 in cash and value combined. Both these transactions, however, big as they were, were somewhat inflated from the fact of the price being represented in American dollars. The sale of Southport Perfection, who is a better dog than ever Christopher was, and without doubt, the best in Britain, or indeed living—being in England and sold for English money, is therefore a more sensational sale. Both Mr. Mason, as the vendor, and Mr. Megson as the vendee are to be con-

gratulated upon the deal. When Mr. Mason bought the dog from his breeder, Mr. Hugo Ainscought Perfection's name was to make, and there was a doubt as to whether he would get sufficient coat, the only thing necessary at that time, in the opinion of the writer and many experts, to make him the best Collie living. The dog, however, had his detractors, but in the face of their prophecies, and risk referred to, Mr. Mason pluckily planked down his £450 for him. Perfection's development and career have shown the soundness of Mr. Mason's judgment, as his present position and prospects point to the wisdom of Mr. Megson's purchase, for from a show bench point of view, Perfection was perhaps never so good a dog as he is to day, whilst as a sire, he has no compeer. He has seen cracks brought to beat him, rise and fall, as he will no doubt live to see again, for he is still a young dog. The purchase will take effect after Belfast show, which precedes Wiesbaden, which show will thus be bereft the dog's august presence, unless Mr. Megson elects to carry out Mr. Mason's intentions of furnishing our continental Collie friends with this model.—*Our Dogs.*

IMPORTATION OF FOXHOUNDS.

Mr. Irving L. Smith and Mr. J. N. Morris, of St. Lambert, Montreal, have just received from the Duke of Beaufort's Kennels, a very fine pair of English Foxhounds, which they expect will be winners in the coming bench show. These gentlemen have quite an extensive kennel of hunting dogs at St. Lambert, no less than six different breeds being represented.

MR. J. H. MCNALLY, MONTREAL,

has added to his kennel a brace of Russian Wolfhound dog puppies of Mr. Virtue's breeding; they are by Adrooski out of Viatka. One is all white with black head, the other black and white.

ADROOSKI,

by the way, we learn is not in show shape just now, the result of disease contracted at the local show, and so will not be benched at Montreal.

TORONTO SHOW.

Dog shows as a rule get so many hard cracks that a little praise now and then, especially from one entirely disinterested, is quite in place. In a letter to the Editor of GAZETTE, Major J. C. Guillot writes: "I was delighted with the show, everything was clean, ventilation good, and



attendants polite and willing to help exhibitors in every way possible. I hope it will be a success financially and I think both directors and superintendent are to be congratulated."

Guillot," and in the novice class, where he topped the lot, the dog's name is spelled correctly but the owner is given as "Geo." C. Guillot.

GREAT DANE SALE.

Messrs. Stewart & Johnston report that at the Toronto Show, they sold their brindle pup The Defender to Dr. Campbell, Thorold. They also report a grand litter of pups by Augustus Caesar—Brenda, (two wellknown winners), all solid colors.

BLOODHOUNDS AND CRIME.

MY attention having been drawn to several letters from your correspondents suggesting the formation of a club to keep and train Bloodhounds to assist the police in tracking criminals, I should esteem it a favor if you will allow me to relate my experiences upon the subject.

Some years ago I was fired with an ambition to train a canine Sherlock Holmes, and for this purpose I worked with two young dogs (champion bred), each possessing the points and qualifications which have rendered this breed so famous.

I found that the dogs would readily follow the track of anyone who had previously allowed them to scent their clothing, etc., but in cases where this was not done their tracking was faulty, and could not be relied upon. Moreover, good results depend considerably upon the shortness of time which has elapsed since the trail was laid. Atmospheric conditions also played a most prominent part; a strong wind blowing up the track—i.e., in the direction of the object chased, much dust, or the trail passing through running water, being detrimental to success.

It is a proper fallacy to suppose that the Bloodhounds of the present day possess scenting powers superior to any other breed of dog. We must bear in mind that for generations the Bloodhound has had little or no practical training, and any special gifts they might have originally possessed have not been allowed to develop. Of one thing I am

quite certain, and that is, that if the trail does not lay in unfrequented districts, tracking with dogs would be entirely useless. Allow me to put an imaginary case. A murder-say, has been committed, and soon afterwards discovered. The dogs are sent for and brought from their kennels some miles away; in the meantime the ground for some considerable distance around the scene of the crime has been disturbed by spectators. Now, I am of opinion that, unless the murderer had actually stepped into the blood of his victim, the dogs might nose around for miles without striking the actual trail; and in any case, a brace of well-trained sporting dogs, worked by an experienced man, would do just as well.

I am not writing this in order to discourage any enthusiast in attempting a most praiseworthy experiment; in fact it would be an act of presumption on my part to do so. Any movement tending to bring this noble breed before the public should, in my opinion, be encouraged.

In conclusion, I would suggest that if a club be formed for this purpose, each member should—after proving to the District Police that the dog is a trained worker—be exempt from payment of the usual license. A special badge and collar should also be provided free of charge to the owner of the dog.

Bloodhounds as detectives may be a success if properly managed, but you will remember in the case of the White-chapel murders how absurdly futile the attempt to trace "Jack the Ripper" was made by the mismanagement of the police in not getting quickly enough the dog on to the trail; and the owner, fearing some harm might overtake his dogs in such a locality, withdrew them. The whole question is as to the practicability of "Ivy's" proposition.

THE ONTARIO GAME LAWS.

56 Victoria, Chapter 49, as amended by subsequent Statutes.

Parliament Buildings,

Toronto, August 9th, 1895.

DEAR SIR,—I have pleasure in enclosing herewith a copy of the Ontario Game Laws in special pamphlet form. As the game season is approaching, I would feel obliged if you should think it a matter of sufficient public interest, to draw attention to some of the provisions of the Act, and I have underlined some of the



sections which I think are of the greatest interest to the people who take any interest at all in these matters.

2.—(1) No deer, elk, moose, reindeer or caribou shall be hunted, taken or killed between the fifteenth day of November and the first day of November of the following year; but the period hereinbefore limited shall not, as to moose, elk, reindeer or caribou, apply before or until the first day of November, 1900, and no moose, elk, reindeer or caribou, shall be hunted, taken or killed before the twenty-fifth day of October, 1900. 58 V. c. 108, s. 1.

(2) No owner of any hound or other dog, known by the owner to be accustomed to pursue deer, shall permit any such hound or other dog to run at large in any locality where deer are usually found, during the period from the fifteenth of November to the first day of November of the following year. Any person harboring or claiming to be the owner of such hound or dog shall be deemed to be the owner thereof; and any hound or dog found running deer between the 15th day of November and the first day of November following may be killed on sight by any person, and the person killing such hound or dog shall not be liable to any penalty or damages therefor. 58 V. c. 108, s. 1.

(3) No one person shall during any one year or season kill or take more in all than two deer, elk, moose, reindeer or caribou.

(5) No common carrier, or other person, shall transport or have in possession for that purpose, in this Province, after the same has been killed, any wild deer or the raw skin thereof, or any venison, save only from the first day of November to the twenty-second day of November in each year, unless accompanied by an affidavit that the same was hunted and taken during the open season. 55 V. c. 58, s. 1; 58 V. c. 108, s. 1.

3.—(1) (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to catch, kill or destroy, or to pursue with such intent, any grouse, pheasants, prairie fowl or partridge, woodcock, snipe, rail, plover, or any other water fowl or other game bird or animal (including black and grey squirrels, and hares) not herein otherwise provided for, at any time between the fifteenth day of December and the fifteenth day of September in the following year.

(b) Or any quail or wild turkeys between the fifteenth day of December and the fifteenth day of October of the following year.

(d) Or ducks of all kinds, at any time between the fifteenth day of December and the first day of the following month of September.

(5) The possession of guns, decoys, or other implements of shooting or hunting at a time and in places where the game-birds or animals above named are usually found shall be *prima facie* evidence of pursuit thereof with intent to catch, kill or destroy the same.

(2) No person shall kill or shoot at any bird or wild fowl protected by this Act, between half-an-hour after sunset and half-an-hour before sunrise. R.S.O. 187, c. 221, s. 5; 55 V. c. 58, s. 5.

(4) No person shall have in his possession any of the said hereinbefore mentioned animals or birds, no matter where procured, or any part or portion of such animals or birds during the periods in which they are protected; provided that they may be exposed for sale for five days, and no longer, after such periods, and may be had in possession for the private use of the owner and his family at any time, but in all cases the proof of the time of killing, taking or purchasing shall be on the person so in possession. R.S.O. 1877, c. 221, s. 2; 55 V. c. 58, s. 5.

(5) No person shall by himself, his servant, clerk or agent, expose or keep for sale, or directly or indirectly, upon any pretense, or device, sell or barter, or in consideration of the purchase of any other property, give to any other person any snipe, woodcock, partridge, no matter where killed or procured, before the fifteenth day of September, 1897, or any wild quail or wild turkey before the fifteenth day of October, 1897, 55 V. c. 58, s. 6; 57 V. c. 57, s. 1.

6.—(1) No person shall at any time, hunt, take, or kill any deer, elk, moose, reindeer or caribou, partridge, quail, woodcock, snipe, ducks, of all kinds and any other game-fowl or animal for the purpose of exporting the same or export the same out of Ontario.

(2) But any person not a resident and domiciled in the Province who has for any year been granted a licence under the provisions of section 14 of this Act and paid the fee therefore, shall so far as the authority of the Legislature of Ontario extends, be at liberty to export out of the Province the two deer which under the provisions of this Act he is allowed to kill. 58 V. c. 108, s. 2.

14.—(1) No person not a resident and domiciled in the Province of Ontario or Quebec shall be entitled to hunt, take, kill, wound or destroy any moose, elk, reindeer, caribou, or other deer, otter, sable, beaver, or any other game animal or bird referred to in this Act, or any other bird or animal, whether protected by this Act or not, without having first obtained a license in that behalf; every such license shall be signed by the chief fish and game warden and be countersigned by the Provincial Secretary or his Deputy and shall be in force for one season only, and shall be subject to the provisions of the game laws in force in the



Province at the time the said license was granted; the fee to be paid therefor shall be \$25 and shall be payable to the Provincial Treasurer to be applied to the expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of the game laws. Such licenses shall not be valid unless the signature of the person to whom it is issued is endorsed thereon.

(3) Any non resident who shall obtain a licence to hunt in Ontario pursuant to the provisions of this section, shall, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act contained, be at liberty to take with him out of the Province fifty ducks or any less number lawfully hunted and taken by him; provided that before so doing he shall obtain from the chief warden or any of the wardens a permit authorising him so to do; and such permits shall only be granted on satisfactory evidence being furnished that the ducks to be covered by the permit applied for were actually hunted and taken by the applicant in person.

21.—(1) Any person offending against any of the provisions of sections 2 and 14 of this Act shall be liable for each offence a fine not exceeding \$50 and not less than \$20, together with costs of prosecution, and any person offending against any other of the provisions of this Act shall be liable for each offence to a fine not exceeding \$25 nor less than \$5, together with the costs of prosecution, and in default of immediate payment of such fines and costs, shall be imprisoned in the common gaol of the county where such conviction shall take place for a period not exceeding three months.

22. All guns, nets, decoys and ammunition found in the possession of violators of the law shall be confiscated and sold by public auction.

23. One half of every fine collected under the provisions of this Act shall be paid to the prosecutor or person on whose evidence a conviction is made, and the other half shall be paid to the Treasurer.

30.—(1) No person shall at any time shoot, hunt, take or kill any partridge, prairie fowl, quail, woodcock, snipe, wild turkey or other bird or fowl whatsoever within the boundaries of the Rondeau Provincial Park.

## THE TORONTO DOG SHOW.

**S**PLENDID weather, excellent quality of exhibits, building clean and attendants civil, all tended to make the show of this year the pleasantest yet held under the auspices of the Industrial Exhibition Association. The weather was true show weather except on Wednesday when it was uncomfortably hot, and the large dogs on the south side of the building suffered considerably from the extreme heat, even with all the windows open. The addition of blinds, on rollers to these windows would be pleasant. The building was kept clean and sweet and more ventilation than in former years was provided. Yet more is desirable, though hard to get without causing draughts. The enlarged office was much appreciated, and Mr. W. Mole, V.S. and Mr. Stone, jun., did all possible to meet the wishes of enquirers. C. A. S. himself, was here, there and everywhere, and things as far as we could see ran in a smooth groove, and with little friction. The judging commenced on Monday between three and four p.m. and notwithstanding Mr. Mason's absence everything with the exception of a few of the specials was concluded by Wednesday afternoon. Few "kicks" were made at the awards and the classes were sent into the ring with that promptness which is so desirable.
