### MONTREAL KENNEL ASSOCIATION.

CCORDING to the constitution the Montreal Kennel Association met early in October to nominate officers for the ensuing year, the election to take place at the annual meeting in November. The President stated that he was not willing to accept any nomination to office for the next year. The nominations for President were Mr. Leslie Gault and Dr. W. H. Drummond. Mr. Geo. Lanigan was the only nominee for the office of Secretary-Treasurer. A very large number of nominations were made for the Executive Committee. Dr. Wesley Mills, the President of the Association, declined to accept at that time the honor of being made Honorary-President, though repeatedly urged to do so in view of his efforts in founding of Trenton, has received a blow to his kennel of Bull and in advancing the Association in every way in his power. A provisional report on the recent show was made, by which it appeared that there were 235 entries and that the expenditure was in excess of the income by an amount which the present bank account of the Association can well cover. A generous amount, but not above what was deserved, was voted to the Secretary Supt., Mr. Lanigan, who was untiring in his efforts on behalf of the success of the recent show. A vote of condolence was passed in connection with the death of Mr. Alfred Geddes, who was an honorary member of the Association and a judge at the Spring show, The meeting having appointed auditors adjourned.

A resident of London, without means, was some time ago bitten by a dog alleged to be mad, and sent to the Pasteur Institute, New York, and now the city is asked to pay the cost. In Toronto such a case has not arisen, but in country districts there have been instances where the municipality contributed to the cost of treatment.



sad ending of poor Alfred Geddes, so well and favorably known to most exhibitors in Canada. He was probably best known to GAZETTE readers as the Secretary and Superintendent of the Ottawa Dog Show, but had also judged, and taken all through, most acceptably. It may be remembered he had the lion's share of the work at the last Montreal Spring Show. As a breeder and exhibitor of feathered stock he was also quite well known, and for many years was Secretary of the Eastern Ontario Poultry Association, one of the two Associations in the Province subsidized by the Ontario Government. From a local paper we glean the following information :

"Mr. Geddes was born in 1862, being a son of the late Wm. Allan Geddes. Fifteen years ago he entered the employ of the Government, and since then has been a faithful official, his latest duties being in connection with the Postoffice Department. In 1886 he married Miss Steven, daughter of Mr. R. Steven, of the House of Commons staff. Three children, twin daughters of eight and a boy of six blessed the union, and survive to mourn the death of their parent. His wife is also left behind as well as his mother, four brothers and two sisters, one of whom is the wife of Judge Wilkinson of Napanee, the other of John Delmage, of London, Eng.

The deceased was taken ill a week ago Saturday and an examination of his condition showed that the was suffering from appendicites. It was found that an operation would be necessary and this was performed on Saturday last by Dr. Bell, of Victoria Hospital, Montreal. The patient began to weaken and at 12 o'clock last night death came and took him from his sufferings,"



MONTREAL DOG SHOW.

HE Superintendent Mr. Lanigan thinks we wrote rather harshly regarding the catalogne at this show, but having since had further opportunity of perusing it we fail to see how other than condemnation could be expected. It is literally full of errors. We do not write this in any carping spirit, but as a mere matter of fact and do not lay all the blame on Mr. Lanigan, as we understand he was greatly over-worked. The total number of entries was 235 the overplus being made up of half and quarter numbers which at first sight we did not notice. Twelve thousand five hundred and forty-seven persons paid for admittance which we think a very fair number, though the committee evidently think otherwise. A small deficit resulted but the Association had funds on hand to more than make this up.

Mastiffs-In challenge bitches Ethel was alone. She is E hear nothing but expressions of regret for the a good sized bitch, showing quality; symmetrical in head, body and limbs, rather short of bone. Open dogs-Nero was the only competitor ; a dog of good size, fair in character and color, head and muzzle rather long, ears carried too far back, well reared and good mover, body somewhat shallow and light. Open bitches-Jessie is a smart, stoutly built bitch, head and muzzle only fair, ears badly carried, open feet, straight legs, small bone; timid and a bad shower.

> Eboracum, the first prize St. Bernards-A good show. winner, was in poor condition and consequently was closely pressed by Duke of Wellington. My notes on the two read as follows : Eboracum-Good head and excellent type, perfect markings, expression very good, color good, tail of good length, double dewclaws on one leg, straight in hocks and stifles, very poor in condition and stiff in movements, stern not bad, undershot slightly. Duke of Wellington-Good size, excellent body and fore legs, carries tail in a curl, well marked, hardly deep enough in shadings, single dew claws, cow-hocked and weak behind, awkward in movement ; head quite good, showing character. Don PLyllis, third, is a medium sized dog, well reared and in good condition ; poor expression, which is spoilt by pointed muzzle; ears hung too far forward and causing wrinkles on cheeks, too timid to show well, stern well covered, but curls, half red and white, markings pretty near right. The reserve ticket

with a moderate head, thin in condition, single dew claws, shoulders and fair quarters and stern. Jezabel is a dark mostly white in color, markings tolerably good. The open fawn, light built, and a good mover, stern rather curled, and bitch class brought out two good ones, with a fair string Dora is a small, dark brindle, looks like a puppy, which First went to Artilla, a good sized bitch, short of behind. coat and rather poor in condition, fine head and expression, a trifle long in face and might be darker in shadings, straight front, medium bone, stern lacking coat, single dew claws, a good free mover. Lady Nora, second prize, is well marked and good in color, with shadings deep and rich in color though scanty, fair size and in good condition head and expression not just right, muzzle too pointed, long and weak, expression affected by narrowness of face, which is accentuated by wide white blaze, good mover, carries fairly good stern rather gaily. Lady Melrose, third, has good body and legs, indifferent in head and expression, markings weak and no shadings, fine mover and carries stern well. Lalla Rookh, reserve, weak in head, poor expression, small bone, good mover, stern carried too gaily. In smooths, the Belle Isle Kennels showed a nice pair in Clovis and Sunol. The latter especially is a fine bitch, in good condition, with good head, coat and color, a good mover. The dog is rather small in size and light in body, fair head and expression, good coat and markings, light in bone.

Newfoundlands-The only entry worth criticising is Sir Edwin Landseer, which is a small symmetrical dog, short of coat and not high class in head, but quite superior to the average now seen on our show benches.

and Dina, redeemed the classes from mediocrity. The dog is a large, fine, up standing fellow, head and type very good, excellent front legs, good and beautiful stern, fine mover. The bitch Dina is a light brindle, with beautiful head and expression, good size, fine front, good coat and condition, might be better in hocks and stifles, but not very faulty there. Myrtle Navy, third, is a dark slate of moderate size with a light eye, weak behind, in good condition. Brutus, H.C., a small, dark brindle, seems to be a puppy, and may improve into a fair one, though small. General Gordon, second, is a very large red fawn dog, rather soft in condition and slack in muscles, coat a bit soft, color not attractive, head very long, altogether a fine dog but more of the Irish Wolfbound type, and coarse, with a thick head. The only entry in open bitches was Florence, a fair one, low at shoulders, wide chest and wide in skull, fat and soft, looks well bred.

Greyhounds-In challenge bitches Maud Torrington, looking fat, old and out of condition, was alone. In open dogs, first went to Lord Torrington, fawn, brindle and white in color, good head, body and condition, fair front, fine shoulders and feet, good quarters and tail, and an elegant mover. Prince, second, is a large fawn dog of some quality, rather coarse in head, good in shoulders and very good in chest, body and legs, light and somewhat straight in hindquarters and carries a shortish, gay tail. Justinian II, third, is red, fawn and white, large ears, fair head and neck, good shoulders but lacking depth of chest, long in coupling, light Great Danes .- Dr. Peine's two entries, Ralph the Great in middle and a bit awkward behind. In bitches, first prize was won by No. 361/2 (not entered in catalogue). She is a black of good type, nice head and ears, good neck and shoulders, good quarters and thighs, fair tail, looks a bit lacking in depth of chest and might be wider across loins, good front legs and feet. White Rose, second, is pure white, with only a fair head but well developed body, chest, loins, quarters and thighs, thickish neck and trifle wide at shoulders, stern might be better. Austin's Fly is a small bitch, fairly good in neck and shoulders and of good general quality, soft in condition and not showing any special merits or defects ; shown in hard condition her chances would be much improved.

> Russian Wolfhounds-Adrooski, the only specimen, is a worthy son of Argoss, and inherits from him good size and a black coat. He was short of feather but quite a good one. English Foxhounds-Bugler and Grafton, respectively first




