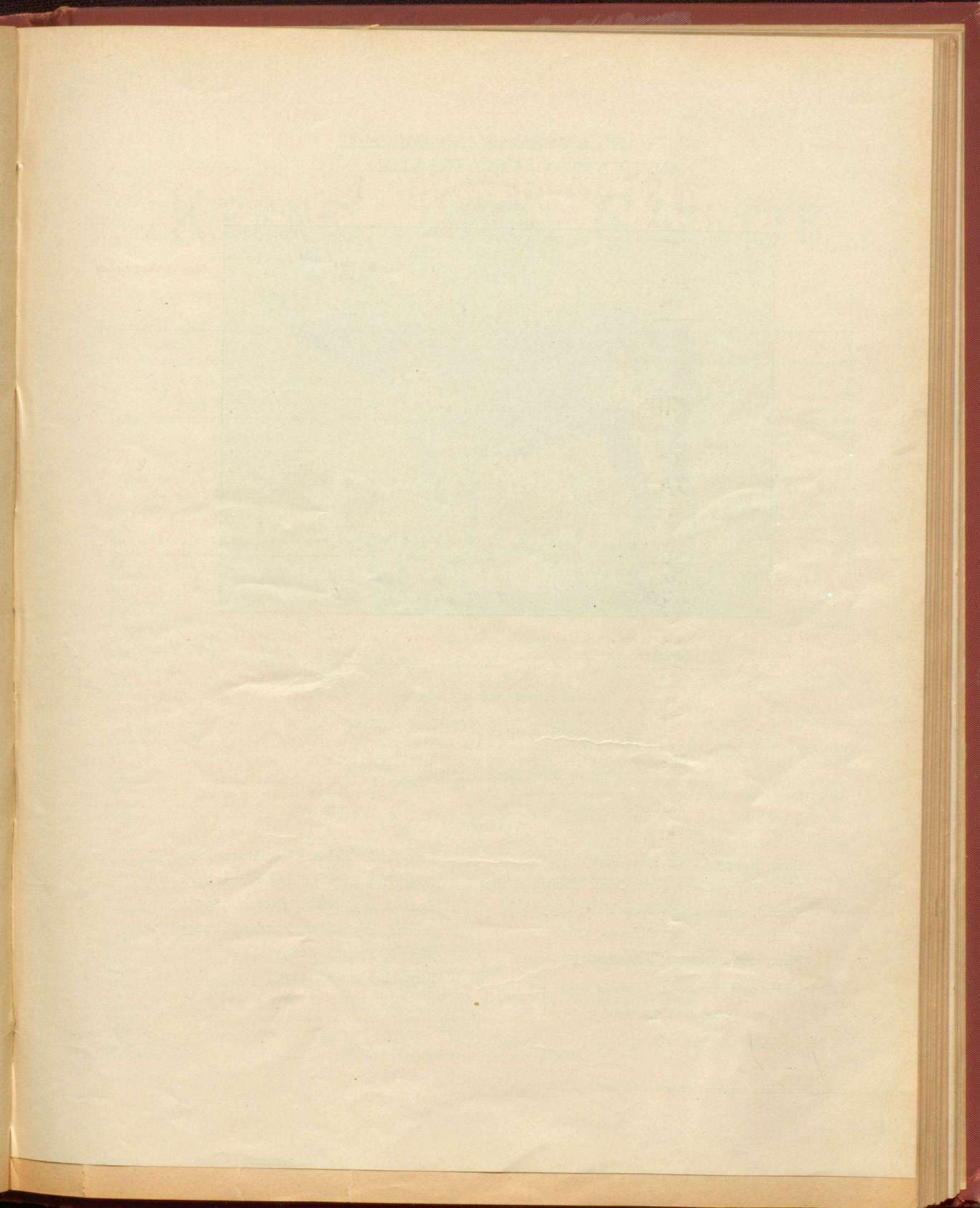

NOTES AND COMMENTS

THE MOUNT ROYAL KENNELS.

THESE Kennels, as for some time past, we learn, are going quietly as regards sporting dogs. They are this year breeding Collies, Fox Terriers, Irish Terriers, Bull Terriers and Dachshunde. They lost a very promising Fox Terrier bitch puppy when pretty well raised, and a beautiful Russian Wolfhound dog when ten months old, a son of the well known Adrooski. The Kennels were so well pleased with the last litter of Fox Terriers by that great sire, Warren Safeguard, that they again bred to him their bitch, Warren Faithful (First Flight-Warren Vice), first and special at the last Montreal spring show, and this has resulted in a litter of six fine puppies. They have a litter of Irish Terriers, sired by the imported dog, Red Inquisitor, also Dachshunde puppies by Mr. Klein's imported Puck. Their Bull Terrier, Newmarket Syren, first Toronto, first Montreal, that produced a litter to Little Flyer, among which are several that are likely to be winners on the bench, is again on a visit to that famous light weight. The Gordon Setter, Count Leo, winner at Toronto and Montreal, has found a new home in the United States. A litter of St. Bernards, whelped somewhat prematurely, and at a very inclement period of the spring, was unfortunately lost. The Collie, Royal Squire, as a stud dog, has met expectations completely and in the opinion of his owner is a better dog to-day than ever. He has not grown the least thick in skull and preserves his fine outline and pacing form, in fact he is now in his prime. These Kennels have a dog from a former Warren Safeguard litter a year old, with excellent coat, bone, character, etc., which they think specially suitable for bitches lacking in coat, too high in leg, or, again, too big and coarse. Such a dog is needed in and around Montreal, and he is likely to be put in the stud shortly.

THE NUBIAN KENNELS.

Mr. Guy Crane, of Detroit, has been admitted as a partner in this kennel, the other members being Messrs. Howden, of Port Hope, and Knowlson, of Detroit.

"SEPSIA," IN THE *Scottish Fancier*,

writes: "I understand Mr. Alexander Smith is taking out a complete kennel to Canada with him. There is no chance of the fancy dying out owing to his change of address, as I

may put it. Meantime he has commissions (outside his own interest) for a typical Yorkshire Terrier, a couple of wire-haired Fox-terriers, and a noble-looking companion for an aged fancier. He has already secured the last named, but is open for offers of Terriers as above." As we mentioned a month or two ago Mr. Smith intends residing in Montreal.

THE *American Stock-Keeper*,

over the kennel interests of which Mr. H. W. Lacey presides, gives the A.K.C. a rather hard rub over the decision arrived at with reference to the proposed partial reciprocity with the C.K.C., and takes the same view of the nonsensical "no official communication" clause that we did in last issue. The following is the paragraph referred to: "The A.K.C. Advisory Committee, which assumes the same foolish trait ascribed to the ostrich in its endeavour to avoid publicity in its doings, adopted the following resolution at its late meeting: 'Whereas, the Committee has no official communication before it upon which to act, and in view of the virtually unanimous expression of opinion by delegates at the last annual meeting, therefore, be it resolved, that this Committee does not feel justified in entering into any agreement with the Canadian Kennel Club.' This is a most unsatisfactory and shilly-shally shelving of an important question, and the excuse offered of having no 'official communication' is neither true nor dignified. Mr. Vredenburg's report of Dr. Mills' appeal on behalf of the C.K.C. was official and the Committee should have acted upon it, as they were instructed to do by the delegates. There is no question about it, reciprocity should exist between the two clubs, so far as recognizing each club's disqualifications, at any rate. At the same meeting Dr. Bigelow and B. Alton Smith were suspended, but for what reason the public is not informed. How long will intelligent dog men stand that sort of thing. The Advisory Committee is a necessary body, but its doings should be made public, so that we may judge of its capability."

MR. JAS. LINDSAY, OF MONTREAL,

a Terrier lover through and through, is importing a "dare-devil," of which he writes as follows: "I have just had word to-day that a pretty good Irish Terrier dog, Dunowen, has been shipped to me from Belfast, Ireland, which I should receive in about a week or ten days. I intend to put this dog at stud, and from his breeding and size I think he should be a valuable acquisition to Irish Terrier breeders here in Canada. He has won in Belfast, Strabane and

Armagh, where the classes are most hot and large ones. He is now two years old and was sired by the well known winner and stud dog, Ch. Breda Mixer, the sire of most of the winners of to-day. His dam, Dundonald, is also by Breda Mixer. As I got him to breed to some coarse, heavy bitches, Mr. Geo. Jamison, who purchased the dog for me, highly recommends him as a stud dog, he having bred to him several times. He has a good color, some 23 lbs. weight, and is a game, hard, yet good tempered Terrier. On arrival of dog I will send you a concise description of him." To give the dog a good start, we understand the fee will be put so low as to be within reach of any who desire to breed to a good stamp of dog.

MR. GEO. BELL

has also imported for a breeder in the United States an unusually good dog—the name has at the moment escaped us—which arrived in tip top condition a few days ago. He is a nice size, having splendid legs and feet, powerful and good head and jaws, and coat of the right texture. We understand he has been a frequent winner in England.

MR. SHIRLEY STEWART

states that he sold his Great Dane dog Augustus Caesar winner of first prize at Toronto last fall to Mr. H. G. Joyce, Prince Albert, N.W.T., through an ad. in the GAZETTE. That he bred his new bitch True-Blue-Beats-All to Augustus Caesar before he took his departure for the North-west. That he found a blue Dane dog out in the country a week ago and would like to find an owner for it. That his Terriers are boarding at the Cathcart Kennels in London. That his Dane bitch Ouida has a fine litter of pups by a son of Earl of Wurtemberg ex Minerva's Fawn. That though his Danes and Fox-terriers were entered for the Hamilton show he was greatly disappointed at not being able to get away, so none of his dogs put in an appearance at the show. That his name is Shirley Stewart not Shirley Shireley as it appeared in his ad in last month's GAZETTE.

MONTREAL SHOW.

The Montreal Kennel Association has decided to hold the next show in Montreal, on Sept. 14, 15, 16 and 17, 1896, and these dates have been claimed with the C.K.C. They will therefore follow Toronto and this arrangement should lead to an increased entry for both Toronto and Montreal.

CANADIAN FOX TERRIER CLUB SHOW.

An entry of one hundred and ten in all classes was the

result of the efforts of the Canadian Fox Terrier Club to make their initial club show a success. The quality all through was as a rule better than heretofore been seen in Canada, but we still lack even a moderate number of good bitches, most improvement has been shown in the opposite sex. Until this is altered we may not look for a rapid advancement in Canadian bred stock.

THE SHOW

was well managed, kept beautifully clean, and roomy benching had been newly erected for the occasion. The ring was upstairs, of good size and the dogs were brought in promptly and the classes kept going with a swing.

THE DOGS.

In the smooth challenge classes Warren Safeguard and Warren Capture had bloodless victories, there being but one entry in each class. In the open dog class occurred one of the sensations of the show, Warren Smuggler being placed over Norfolk Joker (late Cambridge Joker) who was thought by most present to have a sure thing. Smuggler is a dog who improves on acquaintance, his light eye, spoiling a very long and clean head, his skin was not in good shape, one very ugly looking red patch showing, and this as far as condition goes about equalizes things with Joker, who was shown far too soft. Norfolk Regal (late Cambridge Regal) which we always preferred to his kennel mate, was shown in this class for specials only. In the ring he is a Terrier from tip to tip, and all over an attractive dog. Kingpin is a strong dog rather on the coarse side but a useful sort. Warren Dusky won well in bitches, Norfolk Pattern a typical bitch of good formation coming second, and Aldon Vanity, rather ring shy, but a nice typical bitch, third. She should do better later. Guardian, the winner in open class Canadian dogs was protested as not being eligible to compete in this class. His dam was bred on the other side, but Guardian was whelped in Kingston and according to C. F. T. C. rules we understand this constitutes a "Canadian bred," one though in opposition to the C.K.C. rule to this effect. The protest was not sustained and so the win stands.

IN WIRE HAired,

Norfolk Brisk, rather under the weather, a taking dog with good head and front, but coat in poor shape, won in challenge class. Norfolk Fidget a roomy bitch of quality was alone in the bitch class. Thornfield Knockout a newly imported one, won in dogs, Norfolk Bang a Regal dog and a good one was second and Lance reserve. Bitches outside the winner were but fair.

MR. A. A. MACDONALD,

immediately after the judging, claimed the winner in smooth open dogs, Warren Smuggler at his catalogue price of one hundred dollars. He is a dog whose length of head should stamp itself on future progeny and this is a property we are looking for and need.

MR. W. P. FRASER,

while at Hamilton show purchased a good young wire haired puppy by Bodo out of Jess, Bodo by Dark Eye out of Iocaste. He has a good long head, small, correctly carried ears, a coat of the right texture and is a free mover.

MR. A. A. MACDONALD'S CASH PURCHASE

Warren Smuggler is at stud this month. He is inbred to the two greatest strains of blood in existence, and with Venio, Vice Regal, and two crosses of Stipendiary among his immediate ancestors, he should leave his mark in Canada.

MR. C. Y. FORD'S OPINION

of Mr. Laidlaw's new bitch, Miss Phyllis, must be considered worthy of support by several, as her owner had several good offers for her, up to \$350, but as he has fixed her price at the even half thousand she still remains in his kennel.

STADACONA CHIEF,

a good Cocker dog is now offered at stud in Quebec at a very moderate fee. A decent stud dog is needed in the far east, and this son of Still-in-the-Ring should go far to supplying that want.

LOST DOG!

The Dominion Express Co. have just notified Mr. Shirley Stewart that they have lost the Great Dane dog Augustus Caesar in Toronto. Mr. Stewart sold the dog to H. G. Joyce, Prince Albert, N.W.T. It seems the dog escaped while in Toronto on Monday night, May 11th. Mr. Stewart states that he has signed no paper relieving the Company from any responsibility and that he will enter suit against them for \$500 unless the dog turns up. Augustus Caesar is described as a dark mouse color with slight signs of brindle, ears cut. Any reader of the GAZETTE knowing of the whereabouts of this dog might notify the Express Co. and so save a lot of trouble by his kindness.



CANADIAN FOX TERRIER CLUB SHOW.

IN the wire-haired section, open and novice dogs, Mr. G. M. Carnochan's Thornfield Knockout was an easy winner and the same can be said of same owner's Thornfield Nora in open bitches. In open class for smooth dogs, first was awarded to Warren Smuggler, a stylish Terrier, a trifle light in eye being his principal fault; in head, expression, ears, neck, shoulders, body, bone, coat and Terrier character he is a high class Terrier and easily disposed of the local dog, Norfolk Joker, who some few thought must be a certain winner, having recently been sold for a long figure; in head, eye, expression, body, coat and Terrier character he is a long way behind the winner, in fact he was closely pressed by the reserve dog, Beverwyck Kingpin, who is much the same dog as when he won two years ago; even to-day he scores over Joker in length of head, liberty and coat. Aldon Quæstor, V.H.C., is a Terrier that should improve, to-day he was shown hog fat, but in head, bone, legs, feet and coat he is above the average. Open bitches, Warren Dusky was an easy winner, second to Norfolk Pattern, a hard-bitten sort, makes the most of herself, but is beginning to show age. Reserve to Aldon Vanity, quite a nice sort, very shy at present, and had she shown herself, she would have been rightly placed second, as in head, ear, bone, coat, and outline she is quite a nice one, and just the sort, if properly mated, to breed a flyer. Novice dogs, the young dog, Norfolk Visitor, sired by Prisoner, was awarded second, a dog in many points much like his sire and all round quite a Terrier. Novice bitches, the winners were second, and reserve, in open class.

Canadian class, Guardian, first, is a dog with a long head, quite a good texture of coat; fair bone and front, and a dog with liberty; second to Norfolk Upright, who loses to winner in head and texture of coat, in neck, front, bone, legs, feet, body, coat and action, he is all a Terrier. Dux, reserve, is a dog much on the same lines as second prize winner, but loses to him in head and expression, in other points is quite a good sort.

Open bitches, Aldon Vanity, first, previously described; second prize, Verus, is a very nice Terrier, in head, eye, ears, expression, front, legs, feet, body, bone and coat, a little wanting in liberty, and dips slightly behind shoulders.

In puppies the bitch winners were moderate.

Wire-haired, open challenge dogs, first to Norfolk Brisk (late Endcliffe Brisk), shown in very poor form, rough and open in coat, light in bone, when fit quite a good Terrier, but to-day in poor shape. Second to Undercliffe Cornet, a grand sort, in fact, a good old has been who in his best day would have smothered the winner.

Challenge bitches, first, Norfolk Fidget (late Endcliffe Fidget), is a good sort all round, perhaps on the large size and a trifle full in eye, to-day she was not in the best of form, but when put down fit she will take some stopping.

Open dogs, first went to the lately imported Thornfield Knockout, a gay, corky Terrier, in head, front, body, bone and size a good one, at present wanting in texture of coat; Norfolk Bang, second, is certainly a Terrier in head, expression, legs, front, coat and outline, is a credit to his sire, Norfolk Regal. Open bitches, Thornfield Nora, the winner, is another importation and a charming Terrier with nice expression, good ears, neck, front, bone, body, size and action, and extra good jacket. Endcliffe Nimble, second, was put down in poor shape, rough and open in coat which is wanting in texture and fluffy on head. This bitch has a nice Terrier head, fair ears and body, and no doubt when put down fit is quite a fair Terrier, but to-day her condition handicapped her, not that I mean to say that she will ever be capable of beating the winner, Nora, who won easily and who should always be able to do the trick in the company she met here. Norfolk Promise, reserve, is another old slave, looking aged in head and eye; still a grand old sort in front, bone, outline and jacket; still, age will tell. Other classes were simply repetitions, except open class wire dogs, in which Bimbo, second, is quite a good Terrier, a little wanting in length of jaw, but in ears, shoulders, legs, feet, body, bone and coat is quite a nice one.

There was an entry of 110, which is, I believe, a record for Canada. I was much pleased with the push and go there is with the fanciers of the Fox Terrier in this section, and am quite sure they will go on improving the breed, which is only to be expected from such good fanciers as Messrs. Gooderham, Gibson, Thompson, Macdonald, Bell, Wetherell and others.

Now for a little advice. Fox Terriers require showing in good, hard-working condition; many dogs brought before me were not in good shape, simply from want of exercise. I am a great stickler for condition and it should and will always count in close competition. Allow me to thank those many kind friends and fanciers I met in Toronto for the pleasant time I had with them, and I trust this coming autumn to find them competing successfully on American

soil, where I am sure they will always meet with a hearty reception.

THE HAMILTON SHOW.

MOST enjoyable, in spite of a broiling "July sun," was the bench show of the Hamilton Kennel Club, held in the Drill Hall in that city on Saturday, May 9th, and the hard working committee deserve the warmest congratulations and greatest possible credit for the splendid exhibition of both dogs and cats. With 350 entries there was quality as well as quantity to satisfy the most fastidious fancier. Although only a "ribbon and glory" show, breeders from a distance

lent their patronage, while Toronto was well represented in almost every breed.

St. Bernards were capital, the best of which were the good dogs Eboracum and Artile, from the Belle Isle Kennels, Detroit. The Typical Kennels, Toronto, were to the fore with their Great Danes, and the crack Newfoundland, Sir Edwin Landseer. The Greyhounds and Russian Wolfhounds belonging to Mr. John G. Kent, were, as usual, a trump card. Pointers were only moderate. English Setters very fair, with, perhaps, the best specimen, a nice blue Belton, owned by that good sportsman, the popular President, Mr. Edward Tinsley. Messrs. Douglas & Chambers of Toronto were well in front with the Irish Setters Toronto Blaney and Toronto Irene, while the Maple Leaf Kennels of Harriston and Bay View Kennels of Trenton fought it out in Collies. The Spaniels, as usual, were strong classes, particularly the field variety, and the long line of red and black Cockers was a pretty sight. The Terriers, without a doubt, were the best classes in the show. Bull Terriers numbered some more than useful specimens. Fox Terriers, headed by the celebrated Norfolk Kennels, were really good, and a huge attraction to lovers of that gay little dog. The veteran Brian O'K was first in a good lot of Irishmen, with St. Clair Don, Highland Fling, and General Coxey a good trio of Scotties. Dashchunde were strong classes and Pugs more numerous than usual, and included some good specimens from the kennels of Mr. C. Y. Ford of Kingston. The Manchester Terriers were a particularly level lot, and Rhodesome and Darkie, the latter owned by the ubiquitous Mr. Dave Gillies, were put down in perfect trim. The attendance, which was good all day, was largely increased in the evening, and included all that is fashionable and sport-loving in Hamilton.

Mrs. Dick Lauder judged the cats, which numbered 35, and had some good ones of her own on exhibition. Miss Phylliss Hendrie had one by Potomas—Susquehanna, with a pedigree like a race horse, and bred by Mrs. Grover Cleveland.

Among those present we noticed Mr. Andrew Laidlaw, in the Spaniel ring, Mr. Saunders of Harriston, C. Lyndon, John Taylor, (the Norfolk Kennels man.) John O. Bennett, C. A. Stone, J. B. Carlisle, Geo. Bell, P. J. Smyth, Jacobi, W. P. Fraser, C. H. Noble of Toronto.

The dogs were attached to a ring on the floor on sawdust which was kept in by a sort of double wooden rim above which was a screen to which were tacked the numbers and prize cards. This arrangement answered well enough for a one day show. The committee all worked hard, none

more so than the genial and kind-hearted old President Mr. Edward Tinsley, who was in great form. The show was a financial success.

NOTES ON THE BOSTON SHOW.

THE New England Kennel Club gave its twelfth annual show, from April 20th to 23rd, and despite the extraordinary state of the weather was probably a success. The usual lot of exhibitors were on hand, and with such excellent judges as Messrs. Mason, Mortimer and Davidson to place the awards, there was a great deal to be learned. A few Canadians were present, Mr. Laidlaw having a number of Cockers, and Mr. Klein his Dachshunde which have gone the circuit and were pretty well played out. As is usual, the lunch given by the Kennel Club was enjoyed by many, and most of the "boys" could be found at the Copley Square Hotel, where, by the way, Mr. Mortimer showed a few of the would-be's that he was not only an expert on dogs but could handle a cue with any man at billiards or pool, an interested spectator of which was Mr. George Bell, who came down to show his new dog crate. Owing to the lateness of the season, and probably the increase of entrance fee, and the slightly cut down premium list, there were but somewhat over five hundred dogs benched.

St. Bernards show a great falling off, and such specimens as Sir Bedivere, Princess Florence, etc., are greatly missed, of course. Such dogs as Lead's Barry, Altoneer, and a few others, help to keep up the breed. In *Mastiffs* Dr. Lougest scooped in everything, also in *Bloodhounds*. Most of his dogs were seen at Toronto last fall. *Great Danes* were very poor, the winning dog, Marcus Antonio, has a nice clean neck and head, and does not require a derrick to get him into the ring but moves very well. In *Deerhounds*, Col. Thayer showed his usual grand dogs from the Hillside Kennels; however, I venture to say that they were no better than those shown at the Montreal Show last spring. *Greyhounds* are also falling off, as are *Russian Wolfhounds*. The winning dog, Optimist, was on three legs, having been badly "chewed" by a Bulldog on Sunday. *Cocker Spaniels* showed a large number of entries, also of types. Take, for instance, Middy, a very small, cobby little dog who was placed behind Woodland Prince, a rather racy dog somewhat high on leg and gone behind; then in open dogs we come to the winner, Brother S., somewhat of the same type as Middy but badly out in front; then, again, that good dog Paro (late Still in the Ring) V.H.C. Res., one of the low and long order but a useful dog that should have

put a hole in the winners. Baby Ruth, "the beauty," won in challenge bitches; her head is a study but her front is all wrong. Woodland Princess, second, is somewhat curly in coat and high behind. Gabrielle, the winning black bitch, is poor in front and should have given way to Miss Phyllis, who, barring a wavy coat, is far the best in head, bone, front, and style; in fact there were at least four better bitches than Gabrielle. The others were of so many different types that it is hard to know which is right. *Field Spaniels* were fairly represented, and Mr. Carson's grand brace of *Irish Water Spaniels*, Mike C. and Champion Marguerite, were in great form.

Collies, of late years, don't seem to be attracted to Boston, and the days when the Chestnut Hill Kennels showed such a grand string have gone by. There were, however, a few good ones. Old Woodmansterne Trefoil, with an immense coat on, was alone in the challenge class. Hadfield Don has a long head and correct ears, but is full in eye and short of coat. The same applies to Kris Kringle, a lovely headed dog. Old Hempstead Chief has passed his show days. The rest were very ordinary. In bitches *Scottish Gen.*, by her excellent head and ears, landed first, pressed closely by Stratford Queen, a daughter of Ightenhill Chief, and bred by our up to date Canadian breeder, Mr. H. L. Jeffrey, who is turning out some really good *Collies*. The Reserve dog Otterburn Fox was also one of his recruits. Two really good dog puppies were shown. In *Bulldogs* the Woodlawn Park Kennels scooped in everything with King Orry, Facey Romford, and their other set of flyers. I understand that this is the last appearance of the Woodlawn Park dogs, as they are all to be disposed of. *Bull Terriers* were the same old staggers that are seen at nearly all the shows, except the winning heavy-weight dog, Tommy Tickle, shown by Mr. Bellin. He has a long clean head, neck and shoulders, a well ribbed body, and good stern.

Boston Terriers have not yet reached a definite type, but they were a show in themselves, having ninety-nine entries. The judge may be complimented on his constancy in trying to follow a certain type and avoiding the modern Bulldog lot. *Fox Terriers* were another grand show, and as a number will be at Toronto, I won't attempt to say anything about them. *Scottish Terriers* were well represented by the Wankie and Newcastle Kennels, the former showing an extra good American bred one in Wankie Nettle, excelling in head and coat, but at present a little light all over. *Irish Terriers* were a study. Briggs' Best, by his long head, a beautiful little ear, and correct size, beat Merle Grady, a cropped one. Tory, the winning dog, just arrived from

England, having been sent out by George Raper. He has a long lean head and little, natural ears, but his coat is wrong and he appeared light in front for his size. His companions across the Atlantic, Brat Bridget and Banshee, were out of condition, the former a bit heavy in ear. Owen Rowe, 1st at New York, could only get H.C. in dog puppies; he has lost his New York form and does not look nearly the dog I saw there. *Black and Tan Terriers* were few in number. In open dogs Rochelle Ratrap wrongly won over the Hamilton dog, Darkie, who is much better in head, body and stern. *Toy* dogs had a very good exhibit, the Canadian Pug, Otterburn Treasure, again winning first. *Sporting* dogs were an excellent exhibit, Mr. George Gould's string, mostly having belonged to Mr. T. G. Davey, won nearly everything in Pointers. Setters were very good, the Oak Grove Kennels winning well in Irish and Mr. John Brett in English. In Gordon's Dr. Dixon's dogs were greatly missed. There was not one to touch the young bitch shown at Toronto last fall by Dr. Clarke of Kingston.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

IN St. Bernards, as in most breeds, except Toys, it is policy to have a big, roomy bitch to breed from. The bitch forms the basis or foundation of the breeder's operations, out of which he hopes to raise the finest specimens of the race. It would be as absurd for a breeder of St. Bernards to attempt to breed winners from a small and weedy bitch as it would for an architect to erect a colossal building on a weak foundation.

Crack St. Bernards have been known to be bred from small dams, but they have been "flukes." Ch. Sir Bedivere is an illustration, and as a proof that he was a fluke we may point to the fact that with all his marvellous opportunities he has begotten but few, very few, winners, and the best of his get is not more than moderate. Moral: Never breed from "flukes."

It does not follow that every big dog, bred from a little bitch, is a fluke, or *vice versa*. We have in our mind's eye a very celebrated Spaniel, long, low, and good in almost every point, who is bred from a leggy bitch. We once heard it remarked that he was a "fluke," which we promptly contradicted, and proved the assertion to be a libel on the dog. It was his dam that was a fluke, for she was bred from long

and low parents on both sides, whose ancestors were long and low for generations back.

In all breeding operations, therefore, to be successful, it is necessary to study the history of your breeding stock, the nature and characteristics of their immediate ancestors, for as a notorious English "handler" has justly said "Blood will tell."

Let it be understood, then, that where size is a desideratum, it is half the battle almost to begin with it by having a big bitch. Rearing has a lot to do with it; but however well puppies are reared, if the foundation is faulty the result will be disappointment.

In the St. Bernard size, although from a breeder's standpoint the first consideration is by no means all that is required. Under a sound judge, type and character will always have precedence over mere bulk.

If, then, your bitch is a big one, and on the coarse side, go to a dog who is full of character, as shown in a short, deep foreface, massive yet beautiful chiselling of head, good stop, pellucid eye, giving that soft and benevolent expression, so essential in the "holy" breed, whose mission is to save human life.

The head of a perfect St. Bernard is undoubtedly the very noblest of all the canine species. The dog's mein is so majestic, his expression human. In view of his calling, he should be a massive framed dog, mounted on powerful limbs, perfectly sound, and his symmetry good. The ears should not be large and lay flat so as to cover the orifice, and thus keep out the snow.

The only difference between the rough and smooth varieties is in the coat, which should in both cases be dense, for the object we have already described, being in the one case short and in the other long by comparison.

In this way, then, providing the bitch be either large herself or bred from large parents, size may to some extent be made subservient in the dog to type and character. Without size in the bitch, or her ancestors, it should by all means be sought in the dog.—*Our Dogs*.
