CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, NOV. 14, 1896.

(Official Minutes.)

The members present at the meeting were Messrs. H. Bedlington, in the chair, G. B. Sweetnam, C. A. Stone, R. W. Boyle, and H. B. Donovan, Secretary.

Great Dane Pedigrees.—The following letter from Mr. Breay was read and he appeared in person to offer evidence:

Toronto, 19th Oct., 1896.

H. B. Donovan, Esq., 124 Victoria St.,

Dear Sir,—In looking for some pedigrees of Great Danes for my own information, I came across some dogs registered by Shirley Stewart, in which appears grand sire imported Lord C.K.C. 226 which I believe to be incorrect and grand dam Honey, which I believe was a Mastiff. Kindly look into this and oblige.

The Secretary read a very voluminous correspondence on the case and also produced some of the pedigrees in question. The following letters give direct evidence:

Toronto, Oct. 20, 1896.

Mr. Shirley Stewart, Ingersoll.

Dear Sir,—Re your registrations of Great Danes 3113, 3114, 15, and 16 and others. I am informed that 1st, Honey was a half bred Mastiff. 2nd, was never bred to Lord C226, and that 3rd, no pedigree of Honey is known. I shall be glad of any explanation by return mail.

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of your favor of yesterday. Three or four years ago I bought a bitch or an interest in a bitch called Chamois, said to be by imported Lord out of

imported Honey. Since then I bred a litter of pups from her and registered some of the pups. Chamois died about a year ago. I used the pedigree I got with the bitch when registering her pups, believing it to be true and accurate. I afterwards heard rumors circulated by a jealous exhibitor whose dogs I had beaten with a pup by Don Caesar, Jr. ex Chamois. If you have any conclusive evidence showing that the pedigree be untrue, any course the C.K.C. may take in the matter will be satisfactory to me. Be good enough to let me know what, if any, evidence you have in the matter at your earliest convenience.

Dear Sir,—Yours of Nov. 4th received. Would say that my dog Lord (Great Dane) died shortly after the Toronto show of poison I think in 1891. Only one bitch was here from Hamilton but found out later that she had no puppies, she was owned by H. Boden, Crystal Palace Hotel. The bitch was very poor bred, in fact no good at all. You will excuse me for not writing sooner as I only came home last night from deer hunting in Muskoka.

Dear Friend,—Your letter of the 1st inst. received and contents noted, and I beg leave to state that to the best of my knowledge and belief, that the following questions which I now answer are correct, viz., that the Great Dane bitch named Chamois, owned by Mr. Gullidge, of Oakville, was a pup won at a raffle or drawing at Hamilton. The said pup was bred from Mastiff bitch owned by Mr. Wm. McPherson, of this city, and a Great Dane dog owned by Senator Sanford. I trust you will keep this for your own information only as Mr. Gullidge is a particular friend of mine.

To this letter no reply was received.

After a careful consideration of the evidence and reference to the correspondence put in, the committee were of the opinion that the evidence, especially that of Mr. Roedler owner of the alleged sire and Mr. Thompson, very plainly showed that the pedigrees were incorrect, and the Secretary was instructed, after writing Mr. Stewart, to cancel all registrations involved in this decision. Furthermore the committee expressed itself in strong terms as to the absolute necessity of keeping the Club's register free from false or incorrect pedigrees and stated that all such cases would be thoroughly investigated where evidence was given through the proper channel.

A general and lengthy discussion as to the affairs of the Club in general took place, and it was agreed to adjourn and meet again in about one month.

New Member.—On recommendation of the President, Mr. E. E. Starr was elected a member of the Club.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

THE LATE MONTREAL SHOW.

IN giving the number of entries at Montreal as about four hundred we committed an error—owing to the catalogue arrangement—which it gives us pleasure to correct, the entry really numbering nearly one hundred more than we gave it.

FROM A PRIVATE SOURCE

we learn that the deficit was larger than expected, but that energetic efforts are being made to at once materially reduce this debt and finally wipe it out. As an open secret we may say that Mrs. Virtue, Mrs. Pitt and other enthusiastic lovers of the dog of the fair sex, are at work getting up a fair and by this means hope to raise enough to partly reduce the Association's indebtedness. Insignificant "male man," not to be left behind, is also getting up a "money raiser" on plans somewhat similar to those adopted by Hamilton some time ago. A significant paragraph in our informant's letter reads "men who were glad to have their names on committee, do not care to take any share of the worry now." It is ever thus, success all are willing to share; in failure we blame it on "the other fellow."

"UNIFORMITY OF JUDGING"

under this head the *British Fancier* of October 9th devotes a leader to the paragraph recently appearing in the GAZETTE referring to the judging of Great Danes at Montreal, and with the usual blundering of those who have no intimate knowledge of the facts and persons, fails to see the plain inference conveyed to those who do know. Following is the article:—"The CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE, the official organ of the Dominion Kennel Club, makes a rather sweeping demand for uniformity of awards in its criticism upon a recent case to the effect that "dogs good enough to win" under one judge "at Toronto should the following week be good enough" for another judge at Montreal. The case arose out of an appeal by an exhibitor against the decision of the Montreal judge who, withheld the prizes for Great Danes on the ground of defective merit, although dogs were exhibited which had won at Toronto and other places. Of course, this was an extreme case; but the remarks of the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE might be given a very extended application; for, in this country at any rate, it by no means follows that dogs good enough to win under one

judge one week are equally good enough to win under another judge the next." This says exactly what we did not say. For our contemporary's enlightenment let us extend a little part of the paragraph which arouses its criticism, and read as follows: Without at all going into the merits of the case, we should suppose that dogs good enough to win under Mr. Mortimer (one of our most popular all round judges, who has a good knowledge of the breed and a man who has kept his ideas right up to date by personal investigation both here and in England) at Toronto should the following week be equally good enough for Mr. Muss Arnolt (——). Does the *B. F.* see?

SINCE WRITING ABOVE

we learn with sorrow, through the *Stock-keeper* that the *British Fancier* has ceased to exist and that its failure has been a bad one. The paper was too good to deserve this fate.

PENINSULAR FIELD TRIALS

In the Derby the prizes were awarded as follows: T. G. Davey's Pointer dog Brighton Joe 1, H. M. Graydon's English Setter Heather Bloom 2, Leamington Kennels' Pointer dog Joe Handy 3. In the All-aged Stake there were eight starters, and all the dogs entered were excellent ones. In this trial only four beavies of birds were found and the work of the dogs was very difficult. The prizes were awarded as follows: Dash Antonio, owned by R. Bangham, 1; Brighton Dick, Thomas G. Davey, 2. The third prize was divided between the English Setter dog Luke, owned by W. B. Wells, Chatham, and the English Setter Lock, owned by R. Bangham, of Windsor. The \$175 trophy given by F. H. Walker in the all-age class was won by Brighton Dick, Dash Antonio being barred. The Derby Cup, valued at \$45, and the Breeders' Stake Cup, value \$35, both given by the Peninsular Field Trial Club, were won by T. G. Davey's dog Brighton Joe. Major J. M. Taylor, of New York, was the judge, and never had a judge a more difficult task to perform owing to the disagreeable condition of the weather and the scarcity of birds.

in her laudable efforts to breed a few good toy Spaniels did not end with the failures chronicled in last issue. We learn now that Little Nell gave birth to but one puppy which has since died, and that a similar fate befell the unit whelped by the King Charles little Madge. Some one has cast envious eyes on this lady's beautiful brace of Japs and she has had to firmly decline a big offer for them.

A. K. C. VERSUS C. K. C.

AS the members of the C. K. C. are probably aware, for several years we had a contract or arrangement with the A. K. C. to recognize and accept all winnings at shows held under C.K.C. rules, all disqualifications our Executive Committee might make, and accept our registrations.

This agreement was brought into effect through the efforts of Messrs. Davey, Stone, Dr. Niven, Wheeler, and others. For a number of years everything worked smoothly and harmoniously, not a single complaint of any kind was made to my knowledge, when suddenly and without any warning we received word from the Secretary of the A.K.C. that the agreement would be terminated forthwith. I believe that this decision was not come to at an annual meeting, but at an ordinary meeting of the Advisory Committee.

We then arranged to send delegates to the next annual meeting of the A.K.C., and Dr. Niven and Mr. Davey were appointed. After a careful deliberation of the matter they returned with an offer of the following terms:

An addition would be made to the A.K.C. Register, called the Canadian, each entry would be charged fifty cents, we to have jurisdiction of all local affairs, and recognition of wins and disqualifications to remain as formerly.

The debate on the reception of this report was full and exhaustive, and we were reluctantly compelled to come to the decision to refuse the offer, as we found if we did accept we would be unable to offer the membership any compensating advantage for the amount of the membership fee.

We next delegated Dr. Mills to lay our claim before the sister Association, which we know he did in an eloquent and patriotic way.

So you will see that the Executive have not been unmindful in looking after what they considered was in the best interests of the members of the C.K.C.

From all that has transpired it is evident to me that a realization of our position is not fully understood by the Advisory Committee of the A.K.C.

There is this great difference between them and us: Their Club is made up or composed of elected delegates from local and specialty Clubs, it acts in an executive way through its Advisory Committee, *all Clubs are contributors to its funds.*

With us we have some three or four local Clubs that only contribute to our organization when they happen to hold a show under our rules, and the amount is seldom over \$20. Our membership is scattered across the continent; we act as the arbiter for all individual members or Clubs.

It would appear to me as if the A.K.C. only recognize us as a local Club, and don't seem to realize we are a sister organization on a smaller scale, but still possessed with that dear patriotic love of our grand Dominion that we are not prepared to relinquish that sentiment of loyalty to our own institutions, or that we would merge ourselves into their institution and thereby lose our standing as a purely Canadian Club.

It would appear to me that a working arrangement could be effected with the A. K. C. whereby we could contribute some nominal sum for each registration, keeping our own register complete as heretofore and the other favorable rules in the previous arrangement.

Personally I shall never be a party to any arrangement which would propose or include the merging of our institution into the position of a subordinate character to the A.K.C.

MANGE AND FILTH.

Editor Gazette:

IN your October number in "Notes for Novices," you quote the statement of some English writer that mange "is caused by a parasite which bores into the skin and is invariably an accompaniment of filth and neglect."

Now that final is utter rubbish, take it which way we may: If it means that mange—the true parasitic mange—results from filth, or that filthy dogs always contract it, or that cleanliness prevents it, it is equally mere rot and rubbish. A dog may be one mass of filth, and if he does not come in contact with the acari of mange, or their eggs, he will not get the disease. He may be as clean as dog can be, and if the insects or their eggs get a chance at him, mangy he will become.

The acari that produces itch in man, mange in dogs, scab in sheep, or that infest raw sugars and produce "grocer's itch," or those that live on grain weevils, are "all one breed of cats" although it is curious that the insects specially belonging to one animal, will not propagate their kind on another. Thus if a man handles dogs with true mange, the varmints may get on him, burrow under the skin, produce all the symptoms of true itch, yet will not produce their kind and in a matter of two or three weeks, they die and the man is free from the disease (Alfred Sewell, Canine Specialist of London, is my authority for this) although in the two cases of true mange I have seen and handled, I certainly did not contract itch. In the case of the grain-weevil-acari, the men working in elevators got the disease

but when they left that employment, they got well (Prof. A. E. Verrill was the authority for that, twenty years since.) Old women—the “docterin” kind—will tell you that well-to-do people have more trouble getting rid of itch than the poor ones, the reason being that the poor have so few clothes that they can burn or disinfect those the itch patient has worn, while the greater supply of clothing of their better-off neighbors affords more abundant hiding places for the insects. The sum total of the foregoing being that there was as much sense in that precious rubbish that the Boston S.P.C.A. paper (*Our Animal Friends*) used to publish about damp, dark stables producing glanders, as that filth produces mange or cleanliness prevents it.

One case of true mange I dealt with was in a cat, on her forehead, and I cured her by dressings of Canada Balsam, and of all the sticky jobs I ever tried, that was the worst. The other was in a dog and it was easy, I simply kept that dog's coat soaked with crude petroleum for three weeks, and he was well. As I understand the ways of the insects, they come out of their burrows to copulate and lay the eggs, when they die. Now if when they come to the surface of the skin they encounter any insecticide, they are killed and that's the end of the disease. So don't stuff novices with that rubbish any more.

KINGSTON AND MONTREAL SHOWS.

Editor Gazette:

IN your last issue a letter from Dr. Mills appeared, which seems to me will do a great deal to hurt both Kingston and Montreal shows in future. An article of the same tone also appeared in the *American Field*, signed “Canadian,” why the writer who is well known did not sign his name is perhaps a private matter. As I stated before, all exhibitors were paid up as soon as their accounts were made up. The local exhibitors at Kingston were quite satisfied to wait till the affairs of the Autumn Carnival were generally wound up. To my knowledge every outside exhibitor was paid every dollar due him. As far as the 25c. and 50c. on the dollar goes, if anyone was offering such a concession he was not authorized to do so, as there was ample means to pay the prizes, which was done, as I stated before, to outside exhibitors. The only “state of dissatisfaction” that prevailed was with the very bad weather. Considering that the A. K. C. did not recognize the wins, the entry and quality was excellent. The true state of affairs can be summed up in this way: Dr. Mills, as all know, is very antagonistic to Mr. Charles H. Mason (from natural causes), the result being that Montreal and Kingston are sacrificed. I am sure that all loyal Canadians have wondered that a gentleman of Dr. Mills' caliber should, whether from dislike to a judge or not, have tried to blast future shows at the above named places—however time will tell. TORONTO DOG SHOW.

Editor Gazette:

IN the September issue of your valuable paper you give an account of the Toronto Dog Show, which to a certain extent is incorrect. I refer to the Cocker Spaniel class. Now, if you will allow me I will correct the error.

Permit me to say that I was an exhibitor in the open class for red Cockers. Upon examining the catalogue I discovered that Hamilton Jack was entered in this class, and the very entry itself showed that he having won four first prizes in an open class was disqualified for this class. I at once called the attention of the Secretary to this, and his answer was, “enter a protest.” I did so and paid the usual fee of \$5. I then saw the gentleman with whom I entered the protest, Dr. Mole, I believe his name was, go right into the ring with the protest. I may say that the dogs were all in the ring at this time ready to be judged. I then had to leave to catch my train for home. On the following Friday I sent my brother over to bring my dog home, and gave him instructions to enquire at the office of the Secretary as to the result of my protest. Mr. Stone paid him the \$5 which I had deposited with my protest but did not say whether Hamilton Jack was disqualified or not, but gave my brother a V.H.C. card which was awarded my dog Red Jerry. The information I received not being satisfactory to me, I wrote to Mr. Stone asking if my protest of Hamilton Jack had been sustained, and I received a reply stating that my protest had been sustained. Now, your report shows Hamilton Jack as a third prize winner and Red Jerry with a C, instead of showing that Hamilton Jack was ruled out and Red Jerry got a V.H.C.

I think this correction should be made, in order that exhibitors may know that in future their dogs will not have to compete against dogs which have already been ruled out of this class.

2. Will you kindly give me the following information for the benefit of the dog fanciers of this place: How many points are counted for a perfect head, in a Cocker Spaniel class?

3. How many points are counted against a Spaniel with an undershot jaw?

He felt sure from the interest shown that the financial burden resting upon the Association would be removed as soon as possible in a manly and honorable way.

The Secretary's report was then read, the report of the Treasurer being held over until next meeting as a number of accounts had yet to be received.

The following officers were then elected: President, Dr. W. H. Drummond, re-elected; 1st Vice-President, Mr. J. A. Pitt, 2nd Vice-President, Mr. W. T. Virtue, Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. G. K. Lanigan, re-elected; Executive Committee, Messrs. Alex. Gibb, Alex. Smith, A. H. Hersey, Irving L. Smith, Chas. Thompson, C. P. Simpson, J. K. Kennedy, Henry M. Childs. After steps were taken and Committees formed to deal with the deficit the meeting adjourned.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I take much pleasure in reading to you a report of the work of the Association during the past year.

The Association held six monthly meetings, during which the following papers were read: "Man in his Relation to the Lower Animals," by Dr. W. H. Drummond; "Homes for Friendless Dogs," by Rowley James, Esq.; "The Dachshund," by L. A. Klein, Esq., Black Lake, Que.

The question of founding a home for friendless dogs had been fully discussed, but owing to the difficulty in securing suitable ground the question had to be shelved for the time being. The reading room was discontinued for lack of interest. Sixteen members' names had been taken from and sixteen added to the roll during the year. Next in importance came the Second International Bench Show. Upon this question your Committee spent a great deal of time and energy, not only to make the exhibition an honor to the city of Montreal and a credit to the Association, but to offset a malicious and unwarranted attempt of some, not only to injure the possibility of a successful show but to bring the Association into contempt. I am sure Mr. Presi-

dent, Ladies and Gentlemen, that you can look upon their efforts in this respect with pride, and although it did not bring the reward it deserved, it gave us a renewal of the confidence that exhibitors have always had in us, they retain that confidence still, and it is, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, the best proof, the very best proof, that the management of your affairs by those in whom you had placed your trust has been honorable and above board, in spite of what has been said to the contrary.

All has not been harmonious, we have had some little differences, but it is to be hoped that the coming year may do much to obliterate what has been unpleasant in the past. Encourage that happy unity of purpose, and let not poverty discourage you for we might have to learn that should it be prohibited an asylum would have to be found for the poor dogs, as their best friends seem now to be those who can least afford to keep them.

The thanks of the Association are due those who remembered us at our late show, especially Sir Donald A. Smith, Miss Simpson, Hall Miller, Messrs. Henry Berks & Sons, J. A. Pitt, Esq., and others, not forgetting the press.

Your Committee regrets having to record the death of one of our most active members, the late Mr. Crothern.

Thanking you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, for the services rendered your Committee and myself during our term of office.

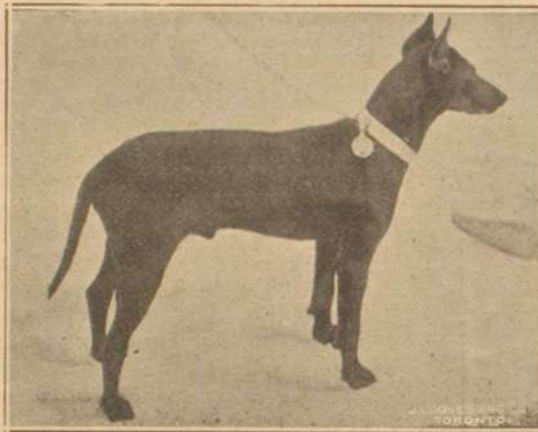
