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
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

"THE KING IS DEAD."

Writing of Omo brings to our mind the recent death of Champion Black Duke the "King of Cockers." He died on June 7th at the Woodland Kennels of his owner, Mr. George Douglas of Woodstock. He had only been sick a week, and his loss is almost irreparable. No dog of any breed ever had in America so long a career of distinction on the bench and at stud, and even when he was retired from the ring, except for stud specials. Mr. James Taylor, the English expert who judged at New York a couple of years ago, declared in his report to the Stockkeeper that Black Duke was the best Cocker he had ever seen in any country. Mr. C. H. Mason wrote of him last year that the title of "champion of his class and the best stud dog of his breed in America" belonged to Black Duke by reason of his exceptional merit. Black Duke was bred by Mr. Joseph Luckwell, and on the bench carried everything before him, winning all over America steadily for the past eight years. He was awarded the American Field Cup and the Whitehead Cup so often at the big shows that both these valuable trophies became the permanent property of his owner. This year he competed for stud specials only, and won the cups and specials at New York, Boston, St. Louis and Chicago shows. These shows were marked too by the appearance of some crack dogs of his get, such as Havoc, Premier and Village Belle. Among the most noted of his numerous prize-winning progeny may be named Oban, champion Pickpania, champion Woodland Prince, Omo, and champion sible for a large increase in the male portion of Spaniel Woodland Duke. He was sire of four silver cup winners, circles. The owner of the kennels Mrs. A. M. G. Warner Oban, Miss Phyllis, Jummie II. and Premier. Black Duke (congratulations, by the way on the recent change of name) was whelped June 26, 1887, and was just completing his

Moreover if he can point it out to us in the report printed some weeks later in the American Kennel Gazette, "equally liable or more so" with us we will provide him with his new fall head gear when he visits the Toronto show. It is printed in this issue, the first opportunity we have had since its re jection by the A.K.C.

A U. S. PAPER'S TRIBUTE TO MR. STONE.

Mr. C. A. Stone, late Manager and Superintendent of the Toronto show has received so many hard knocks from time to time that the following clipping from Mr. Lacy's paper the American Stockkeeper must prove to him that they don't represent the undivided opinion of fanciers "across the line."

Personally we can say that Mr. Stone has at all times as far as has largely added to his list of stud dogs which now includes we could judge had the interests of the exhibitors at heart, and if anything Uncle Sam had rather the warmest corner. The press were well treated by him and if any news was going, they got it. Stockkeeper says: - Mr. C. A. Stone has been handled on certain occasions pretty roughly in the press on this side the line for his sins of omission and commission in connection with the Toronto show. A good deal of it, however, was because he had not catered to certain self interested fellows. But Charlie Stone has always done his utmost to serve the interests of the exhibitors from this side, both socially and in his business capacity. In the interests of his show, he worked the press in a manner to command admiration, but with it all, while he received much, he also recognized the fact that kennel journals are not run on wind, and there was always a good fat "ad." forthcoming to even up matters. He has done a great deal for the Toronto show in past years, and we cannot allow his retirement to pass without a word for "auld lang syne."

TORONTO DOG SHOW.

Mr. Fraser and his committee are hard at work on the schedule and list of judges for the big show to be held next September, and so far we are enabled to announce the appointment of the following gentlemen who will place the ribbons, with others yet to hear from. Mr. Henry Jarrett who has bred and exhibited Collies for so many years will take this breed, and also Old English sheep dogs; Mr. Frank Dole, especially well known to all Bull Terrier breeders will judge Bulldogs and all Terriers other than Fox, and Mr. Jas. Mortimer the popular "all rounder" will be assigned several classes. As we stated above the list is not yet complete but the other judges will be prominent for their ability to handle and knowledge of the breeds that may be assigned them.

THE MONASTERY KENNELS OF PORT HOPE,

THE IRISH WATER SPANIEL STANDARD

FROM STONEHENGE'S "DOGS OF THE BRITISH ISLANDS."
ADOPTED BY THE AMERICAN SPANIEL CLUB.

THE HEAD (value 10) is by no means long, with very little brow, but moderately wide. It is covered with curls, rather longer and more open than those of the body, nearly to the eyes, but not so as to be wigged like the poodle.

THE FACE AND EVES (value 10) are very peculiar. Face very long and quite bare of curl; the hair being short and smooth though not glossy; nose broad, and nostrils well developed; teeth strong and level; eyes small and set almost flush, without eyebrows.

THE TOPNOT (value 10) is a characteristic of the true breed, and is estimated accordingly. It should fall between and over the eyes in a peaked form.

THE EARS (value 10) are long, the leather extending, when drawn forward, a little beyond the nose, and the curls with which they are clothed two or three inches beyond. The whole of the ears are thickly covered with curls, which gradually lengthen towards the tips.

CHEST AND SHOULDERS (value 7½).—There is nothing remarkable about these points, which must, nevertheless, be of sufficient dimensions and muscularity. The chest is small compared with most breeds of similar substance.

THE BACK AND QUARTERS (value 7½) also have no pecularity, but the stifles are almost always straight, giving an appearance of legginess.

Legs and Feet (value 10).—The legs should be straight and the feet large but strong, the toes are somewhat open, and covered with short crisp curls. In all dogs of this breed the legs are thickly clothed with short curls, slightly pendant behind and at the sides, and some have them all round, hanging in ringlets for some time before the annual shedding. No feather like that of the Setter should be shown. The front of the hind legs below the locks is always bare.

THE TAIL (value 10) is very thick at the root, where it is clothed with very short hair. Beyond the root, however, the hair is perfectly short, so as to look as if the tail had been clipped, which it sometimes fraudently is at shows, but the natural bareness of the tail is a true characteristic of the breed.

THE COAT (value 10) is composed of short curls of hair, not wooly, which betrays the poodle cross. A soft, flossy coat is objected to as indicative of an admixture with some of the land Spaniels.

THE COLOR (value 10) must be a deep pure liver without

white; but, as in other breeds, a white toe will occasionally appear with the best bred litter.

THE SYMMETRY (value 5) of this dog is not very great.

THE TORONTO SHOW-GIVE CANADA A CHANCE.

Editor Gazette :

THINK something should be done about the American breeders bringing over dogs that have won in the challenge class on the other side and come over here to be shown in the novice and open classes. I can name a dozen dogs that were entered in the novice and open classes that have won from six to ten first prizes at the largest shows on the other side. If things are allowed to run as they have been it will sap the life out of the Toronto show. It is hardly a square deal to be competing against the best dogs in America in the novice and open classes. Bear in mind I would like to see the C.K.C. remain as it is only to remedy this one particular. The American breeders and handlers are pleased with things here and are taking advantage of it and are showing more dogs than they otherwise would, but it is knocking the bottom out of the fancy in Canada. If the Toronto Bench Show Committee would figure more for Canadians it would be much better than the way it has been working. A few American breeders and handlers get the big end of the money and the show moves on to the next place. For instance take the kennel prizes, as a rule the Americans get the money and we get a bronze medal. We can't buy dogs with medals. Give us a little protection and in a few years we will have the dogs. For my part I will just show what dogs I think can win against the best in America and no more. I am not the only breeder that is feeling just this way.

THE CANADIAN AND AMERICAN KENNEL CLUBS.

C. by the Executive Committee of the C. K. C., and the discussion which took place on the same at the A. K. C. meeting. A new agreement has now been submitted to the C. K. C. by the A. K. C. Committee, and we have no doubt but that some basis of amalgamation will be shortly arrived at.

ARTICLES OF PROPOSED AGREEMENT BETWEEN C.K.C. AND A.K.C.

- 1. Canada to have an Advisory Board of A. K. C. composed of the C. K. C. Executive. The C. K. C. to have three duly credited representatives to the A. K. C., of which the President shall be one, and by virtue of his office he shall be a member of the A. K. C. Executive Committee.
- 2. The A. K. C. shall not accept any Canadian Club as a member except through the C. K. C.
- 3. The C. K. C. agrees to pay to the A. K. C. ten dollars for each show held under the C. K. C's jurisdiction, but shall be exempt from any further dues or assessments.
- 4. Power of dealing with matters of discipline in Canada to be left in the hands of the C. K. C., subject to appeal to the A. K. C.
- 5. The C. K. C. shall publish an annual stud book in the same form as the A. K. C. Stud Book.
- 6. Each registration and listing shall be made in the country in which the dog is owned and the same shall be recognized by the other country.
- 7. The A. K. C. to supply the C. K. C. with free copy of Annual Stud Book and Kennel Gazette, and vice versa.
- 8. The Secretary of the C. K. C. shall send to the Secretary of the A. K. C. two certified copies of awards at every show held under C. K. C. auspices.
- In the matter of qualifications, the C. K. C. to have similar privileges to those given the Pacific Coast Clubs in regard to challenge classes, and qualifications for champion honors.
- 10. This agreement, if ratified by both Clubs, is to be duly attested by the Secretary of each Club, and copies filed with both.
- 11. This agreement may be cancelled at any time, upon six months' notice in writing, given by either club to the other.

Mr, Vredenburgh reported "The special committee to which was referred the matter of an agreement with the Canadian Kennel Club has taken the matter up and given it careful consideration. Your Secretary visited Toronto and conferred with the Canadian executive and with the fanciers at a general meeting held April 21, 1897, and arrived at a mutually satisfactory agreement. The memorandum agreed upon was submitted to the executive of the Canadian Kennel Club at a meeting held May 7th, 1897, after which an amended memorandum was filed with this club, which will be submitted to you at this meeting.

"At the annual meeting representatives of the Canadian Kennel Club, as you are all aware, came before us and requested that a committee be appointed by the American Kennel Club to confer with it in regard to a satisfactory agreement of reciprocity between the two clubs. The Hamilton Kennel Club sent a demand to the Canadian Kennel Club that they should call a meeting of the fanciers to be held in the city of Toronto, during the Toronto show in April, and notified this club to that effect, and invited this club to send a representative to be present at that meeting. The Canadian Kennel Club's Executive Commttee called a meeting of the fanciers, and also sent an invitation to the American Kennel Club to send a representative. The special committee that was appointed by this club held two meetings at this office and came to the unanimous conclusion as to the conditions of such an agreement that this committee would be willing to recommend at this meeting, and also recommended that I should be appointed as the representative of this club to be present at this meeting in To-I sent this recommendation to members of the executive board whom I could find here in New York, and they concurred with the recommendation, and consequently I went up there as the accredited representative of the club. I was in session with the Canadian executive committee for two hours, and stated to them as plainly as I could upon what conditions the American Kennel Club would recognize the Canadian shows. We finally had a meeting of the fanciers after this session of the executive committee, and they aired their views. The following morning there was an adjourned meeting of the Canadian executive committee, at which I was present, and we finally arrived at this c nclusion, which was exactly what the special committee of this club had agreed upon-that the Canadian Kennel Club should be the Canadian Advisory Board of the American Kennel Club; that all questions relating to Canada should be acted upon by that committee, or that board, subject, however, to confirmation or appeal to this Club; that every show held in

and that every show held in Canada must pay to the American Kennel Club the sum of \$10, the same as we exact from our members; that the Canadian Kennel Club must the head of new business. cease receiving money for registrations; that all listings for Canadian shows must be made with the American Kennel Club. That was agreed upon by the Canadian executive, they adding to it a few conditions, viz., that so far as challenge classes are concerned we should make the same exception in their favor that we did upon the Pacific coast; that Canada should be entitled to a representation in the American Kennel Club, with three delegates, one of which was to be Chairman of the Canadian Executive Board, and, by virtue of that position, he was to have a seat upon our Executive Board.

The Chairman-Where do the other two come from?

Mr. Vredenburgh-They are to be appointed by the Canadian Kennel Club.

The Chairman-What became of registrations in the Canadian Stud Book?

Mr. Vredenburgh-The question of registrations was touched upon and settled in this way, that all living dogs that had been registered with the Canadian Kennel Club could be registered with the American Kennel Club free of charge, provided application for said registration was made within a stated period of time and was certified by the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, that dog was living and had been registered to them- The question was then asked as to whether we would reognize the wins made under Canadian Club rules, subsequent to the rescinding of our seciprocity treaty of 1892. I told them that that was out of the question, and, so far as I was concerned, as a member they finally abandoned that question. That was practically the agreement that we arrived at, and which this special committee was ready to recommend for adoption at this meeting. They promised to send me a memorandum of this agreement immediately. Upon my return to New York I received a letter from the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club saying that they thought best to call a regular meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club and have it formally adopted by them before sending to us. They held that meeting on May 7, and two or three days thereafter sent me the memorandum, but this memorandum is not what we agreed upon. They had changed it materially, and the committee-or at least Mr. Watson and myself, Major Taylor being on the Pacific coast-thought best to simply make this statement that I have made, to read the memorandum they have sent

Canada must be held under American Kennel Club rules, us, and to leave it to the delegates at this meeting to do as they saw fit without any recommendation whatever from your special committee. That will properly come up under

> Mr. Schellhass moved that the report of the special committee be received and placed on file.

Motion seconded and carried.

Mr. Vredenburgh said later in the meeting, "now we come to the Canadian Kennel Club. I think you are familar with the action that was taken at the Toronto meeting.

The memorandum of agreement drawn by the representatives of the Canadian Kennel Club after the conference with Mr. Vredenburgh, on behalf of the special committee appointed by the American Kennel Club, was read.

Mr. Burritt-It appears that in the drawing of that proposition they have endeavored to keep as conspicious as possible the words "Canadian Kennel Club," whereas, as I understand Mr. Vredenburgh's proposition to them, they should be known as the Canadian Advisory Board of the American' Kennel Club.

Mr. Vredenburgh-That was it exactly. The Club is composed of individuals, and they pay \$2 a year dues. In consideration of that they are allowed so many free registrations in the Stud Book.

The Chairman-We do the same thing. Why can't they come in under that same rule?

Mr. Vredenburgh-They cannot under that agreement. How would they hold their organization? They say we have got to offer some inducement to the members to retain their membership. I told them they would have to devise some means for doing that. Here is the Canadian Kennel Club Stud Book for three years. It is comp sed of fiftyof this special committee, I would certainly oppose it, and five pages, and they have not published a Stud Book for six years. Their Secretary told me that a most liberal estimate of their yearly registrations would be two hundred and fifty, and how they can expect to publish a Stud Book annually on an income of \$250, I am unable to see. They give nothing for the price of registration. They simply give the dog's sire and dam, and there it ends.

> Mr. Burritt-I move that, as the proposition submitted by the Canadian Kennel Club is totally at variance with the report to us by our special committee appointed to confer with them, the proposition be returned to the Canadian Kennel Club with the advice that we cannot accept it, or any proosition which is not entirely in line with the report made to us by our committee, a copy of which is enclosed herewith.

Motion seconded by Mr. Hunnewell.

Mr. Watson did not favor sending this memorandum of

agreement back to them, but advised further consideration thereof, is certainly the simplest and most reasonable course. of the matter.

Club is still fighting for its existence and its individuality. The proposition which was brought here by our committee to-day thoroughly wiped them out, and as I look at the sitagreement as was laid down by our representative, or the day is coming when the individual bench show clubs of Canada will solicit membership in the American Kennel States. If that day comes, we receive a delegate from Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal, or any other bench show club that pleases to organize, and secures membership here, and we get their membership fee and they are under our control just the same as any United States club. I think Canada recognizes that fact, and does not want to see such a situation. In the proposition they have sent here to-day, they refuse to sink their individuality. In every word and in conquered and annexed by Hawaii or Alaska, every line of that contract which they offer us, they force to the front, as prominently as they can, the Canadian Kennel Club. They ignore the title, "Canadian Advisory Committee of the American Kennel Club," which, as I understand it, was the name by which they should he known. fail to see what we have to gain. They have everything to gain. We have nothing to lose; we are in the position where we can offer to these gentlemen: "You take our terms, or you stay out of the game." We do not need them. They need us, and I think we can afford to stand squarely on our feet and tell them so.

Personally I am utterly and entirely opposed to any amalgamation or affiliation with the A.K.C. except on terms of perfect equality, but as Secretary of the Club I am bound to carry out to the best of my ability the wishes of the majority of the executive to which body the whole matter has been transferred by the Canadian Kennel Club, and if the majority of the members say unite then it is my purpose, my business, to see that the best possible terms are made with the A. K. C., and to see that a unity is arrived at. Any personal feeling I may have shall not stand in the way of the majorities wishes, though I may honestly believe the course they wish to pursue to be an unwise one.

If more Canadian dog owners had expressed themselves in the spirit in which Mr. Stone has written, the uphill work encountered by the officials of the C. K. C. during the past few years would have been greatly lightened. The C. K. C. is doing a good work apart from dog shows altogether, as referred to by Mr. Stone. For one thing I may mention that through the strenuous and continued efforts of the C. K. C. thoroughbred dogs are now admitted into Canada free of duty. It is not long since, that such was not the case. Is this of no benefit to A. K. C. members and others on your side? A like privilege is not accorded Canadian breeders with the owners-or, rather, the lovers-of the dog in re-

by the authorities at Washington. Why? Mr. Stone is correct as to the license fee enacted in this city on unregistered bitches, namely five dollars. Last month in Toronto alone twenty-eight bitches were registered to secure the reduced license fee of two dollars. Twenty-eight by three. equals \$84, not at all a small sum to be paid extra out of dog owners pockets in one city, and this rule is now being enacted in several Canadian cities and towns. What Canada wants is MORE CANADIANS.

Editor American Field: - Those parties in Canada who seem so desirious of abolishing the Canadian Kennel Club and delivering into the hands of the American Kennel Club the full control of the doggy affairs of Canada had better pause and consider very carefully what they are trying to do

In the abolishment of the Canadian Kennel Club a tranchise would be parted with that interests not only exhibitors at dog shows but every owner of a thoroughbred dog in Canada. Take, for instance, our registration, which the American Kennel Club insists must be done away with. In the city of Toronto a kennel license can now be procured for the sum of ten dollars, but the application must be accompanied by a certificate from the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, stating that the dogs are registered. This regulation applies to other towns and cities. Now this only affects exhibitors, as they are about the only parties except hunt clubs who keep a large number of dogs. But we have any number of owners who only keep one or two, and the city of Toronto demands that the sum of five dollars be paid for every female dog kept; but if the application for a tag is accompanied by a certificate from the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club stating that the dog is registered in Canada the fee is reduced to two dollars, consequently it is quite a saving-and perhaps to those that can ill afford it, and it is not at all likely, nor could it be expected, that any other than Canadian registration would be accepted by the

The great trouble is, we have a lot of so-called new fanciers who imagine what they don't know about everything doggy is not worth knowing, and they are the parties who are doing all the clamouring and causing all the trouble, as all they care about is to make wins so as to enable them to sell their dogs, forgetting the fact that it is to the general public they have to look for their customers.

As an old exhibitor, and I am quite sure that I voice the sentiments of other exhibitors, I am prepared to join hands

taining our nationality, government, and control of the canine affairs in Canada, and if the mug-hunters want to join the American Kennel Club, let them do so, and we can get along all the better without them. In conclusion I would ask all interested to give us a helping hand.

Copies of the correspondence will also be sent to the kennel press and to the daily papers, with a request for publication.

As this will be the final opportunity afforded of settling the question of amalgamation, we advise extreme caution. Read the agreement point by point carefully and vote as inclination and intelligence then dictates.
