CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

ANNUAL MEETING SEPT. 9TH, 1897.

THE annual meeting of the Canadian Kennel Club was held on the above date, the President elect, Mr. Geo. B. Sweetnam, in the chair.

Minutes of last annual meeting taken as read.

The Secretary-Treasurer's annual report as follows was distributed and taken as read subject to Auditors' report:—

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING
AUGUST 31ST, 1897.

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

Herewith I beg to hand you my annual report for the past year. To me, for many reasons, it is the most unsatisfactory I have ever presented to you. You, however, may think differently.

Registrations.—As the Stud Book closed on July 17th, the date of the now existing A. K. C.-C. K. C. agreement, I am unable to give a comparative record of this year and last, but the following will show an actual increase over the corresponding period of last year:

Number of registrations from Sept. 1st, 1895 to July 17th, 1896	190
Do. from Sept. 1st, 1896 to July 17th, 1897	218
Increase	28

The total number of registrations in the Stud Book is 4,396.

Membership.—From its vacillating policy the Club during the past year has not been in a position to permit of an effort being put forth to increase the roll of membership. The books show that 63 have paid for the year ending August 31st, 1897, and 14 for the year ending August 31st, 1898. Since the new agreement has come into force there have been many resignations, including such prominent names as Dr. Wesley Mills, Mr. James Lindsay, Montreal; Mr. L. Farewell,

Toronto; Mr. W. Wade, Hulton, Pa.; Mr. A. A. Macdonald, Toronto; Mr. H. Parker Thomas, Belleville; Mr. G. Barclay Bruce, Calgary, etc. Many others I have personally induced to leave the matter in abeyance for the present.

A comparison with last year's finances shows that on July 31st, 1896, the cash account showed amount received (including balance carried over from previous year) \$419 43. To same period in 1897 \$445.85. The latter amount includes a show deposit of \$25, but on the other hand \$10 was paid the A.K.C. as a show fee. The amount received in August, 1896 was \$98, in August, 1897, \$26.25.

I have gone very fully into these details, as up to date of agreement it will be noticed there was an increase both in the number of registrations and in the cash account.

In General.—Some member has been kind enough to nominate me for Secretary-Treasurer, and being unopposed the nominee was elected. I have to thank him and the Club for this mark of confidence, but I fear that I will not be "the right man in the right place" as—I have before stated this unofficially—I am entirely and irrevocably opposed to any such arrangement as now exists between the C.K.C. and the A.K.C. In my opinion we have lost our independence as a Club, in fact have lost all usefulness and power, and it is merely a question of time until the Canadian Kennel Club ceases to exist in any degree. It lives now as a Canadian club in name only, better to close at once than succumb to inevitable and painful decay. I can see no use for the existence of a large and cumbrous organization working simply to elect a committee of the American Kennel Club. Far better that the A.K.C. should appoint a small committee to advise in Canadian affairs if Canadians themselves are unable or unwilling to support an independent club.

Seeing no use for the C.K.C., I naturally do not see the necessity for a Secretary, nor do I see how funds are to be raised to pay such an official. If, after what I have said, you still want me as Secretary, then you doubtless will devise means whereby we may continue. It has now resolved itself into a simple matter of business with me. Some little time ago, as you possibly are aware, I was willing to undergo considerable financial risk in an attempt to place the Club on a sound basis, but your executive did not see as I did.

My Dear Sir,—I find it impossible to attend the meeting on Wednesday to say in words what I now write.

From what I can make out of the agreement which has been made by the Canadians interested in kennel matters the C.K.C. has ceased to exist except as an Advisory Board for the A.K.C., in other words we have given up our franchise and become a part of the club in New York.

Now as one of the oldest members of the C.K.C. I wish to enter my protest against any such agreement and consequently if I remained a member I should only be a hindrance to the business of the Executive of the A.K.C. I am sorry to leave the Club, but I cannot be of any use to the present management and therefore I think it much better to leave the field to those who I trust will make a success of the new arrangement.

THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

FROM the official report of the annual meeting of the C.K.C. it will be seen that the Club has again assumed its independence and will cut loose entirely from the A.K.C. unless that body sees fit to accept it on an equality. We congratulate the members who so decidedly and determinedly asserted their desire to stand by a purely Canadian organization and we feel fully satisfied that such course was the wisest. Our own ideas on the subject are pretty well known so there is no use reiterating them here. Better no club in Canada than one which is a mere committee.

TORONTO'S BIG SHOW.

Mr. Fraser is to be congratulated on the large entry he secured for this year's show, seven hundred and seventeen must be considered as worthy of first and cup. was a model one. the one dog one number system prevailing throughout, good printing, good paper, and correct proof reading combined to turn out an unexcelled list.

THE JUDGING

was begun sharply on time, four rings going at once, and was gone through with despatch except in the case of some specials the awarding of which dragged out to some length. The usual amount—no more—of dissatisfaction was displayed by exhibitors.

THE INCREASED ENTRY

was largely, indeed we may say wholly, from the other side, we wish we could say otherwise, but rather think the number of Canadian entries was if anything less than last year. This we greatly regret.

MR. MCEWEN'S ENTRIES

unfortunately arrived too late to compete, indeed did not turn up until after all the Collie classes, including specials, had been judged. Otherwise some changes in the places occupied by the lucky dogs would doubtless have occurred.

ONE OF THE MOST POPULAR WINS

was that of Mr. Macdonald's Aldon Radiance in the open class for smooth Fox Terrier bitches. Mr. Mortimer spent a long time over this decision and viewed the competitors from all points. Radiance is a lovely bitch all over, very typical head, ears and expression and grand front, and was shown in beautiful condition. She is full of character, or she could not have displaced such good stuff as Warren Dusky, Banker's Daughter, etc. Mr. Macdonald is to be congratulated on the possession of such a sterling specimen, and in a class where Canada has always been weak.

THE DOG SHOW LUNCH.

As the directors dining hall was not large enough to hold all the visitors who accepted invitations on Wednesday, an overflow lunch was served in the adjoining dining room, at

which the exhibitors and judges of the dog show were present. The chair was occupied by Mr. Geo. H. Gooderham, and among those present were:—Messrs. F. F. Dole, Jas. Mortimer, C. H. Mason, J. Cary Curr, Louisville, J. A. Caldwell, Philadelphia, H. C. Bates, T. A. Carson, C. Y. Ford, Kingston, Jas. Lindsay, Montreal, Geo. B. Sweetnam, A. A. McDonald, J. J. Kent, F. S. Steadman. Mr. Jas. Mortimer replied to the toast on behalf of the visitors and complimented the directors on the magnificent show of dogs and upon the excellent arrangements. He said that in the class of dogs in which he was judging it was the best show he had ever witnessed, Mr. Caldwell also spoke briefly in approbation of the Exhibition. In the evening the visiting and local exhibitors to the number of 75 were entertained by Mr. Gooderham at the Yacht Club House on the Island.

THE ATTENDANCE

at the Toronto Dog Show, we learn since the close, was very greatly diminished, in fact the total number who passed the turnstiles was only about half that of last year. This augurs badly for future shows, some method must be devised to induce visitors to "take in the dog show."

THE CLEANING

was not in the Superintendent's hands this year, but under the care of the fair officials and was not well done, to say the least of it. Ten a.m. is too late to see filthy litter lying around and on Wednesday and Friday at that hour the sight and odor were repulsive in the extreme.

VICTORIA B. C. SHOW.

From the copy of premium list sent us we notice that Mr. H. Chapman who at one time owned the great Plinlimon will judge St. Bernards, Newfoundlands and Mastiffs, and Mr. E. Davies all other classes. No regular money prizes are offered but a percentage of the entry fee is given as follows:—1st, 50 p. c., 2nd, 25 p. c., while a diploma is given for 3rd. The entry fee is \$2, and this includes the fee for listing. The specials are numerous and valuable. Entries close October 7th, the show dates being October 14th, 15th and 16th. 1897.

English Fox Hounds—All the entries in the open dog class, with the exception of one, were made by the Country and Hunt Club of Toronto. Some of them have been good dogs, but all now showing age. Ringwood, the winner of first in open dogs, has a good head, front feet, bone and eye, is not well ribbed and is poor in ham. Harbinger, 2nd, loses to winner in head and front but is better behind. Wonder 3rd is a fairly good all around dog, not quite as good in head as Ringwood, but is better in throat than any in the class and should have been placed 2nd. Druid, V. H. C., has a good head and body but is aged and gone a trifle in front. In the open bitch class, Bracelet, the winner of the blue, is a fair bitch, is light in muzzle, loins and bone, and was not shown in condition. Racket 2nd is a trifle loaded in shoulder, has good loins, legs, feet and back, and was shown in whelp; no great harm would have been done had she been placed first. Witchcraft 3rd is a good big strong bitch, rather inclined to be coarse in head, and was properly placed. *American Foxhounds*.—Open dogs. Legal, the winner of 1st, is a grand bodied dog, good bone, legs and feet, but is poor in head and muzzle, was shown well. Vulcan 2nd has good bone but loses to the winner all over except in head and eye. Clunker 3rd is a grand bodied dog, with good neck, legs and feet, and if it was not for his Pointer looking head might have been placed second. Hanks Ringwood, the reserve dog, is poor in head and light in bone and shown in poor condition. In open bitches, Veracity, winner of 1st, was the the best hound shown, and would have had to be in the challenge class had one been provided. She is a grand bitch all over, having but few faults, her greatest being a trifle long cast. Valley 2nd is a fair bodied bitch, good feet, is light in bone and muzzle. Music 3rd is better bodied than Valley, has good legs and feet but is poor in head; she should have been placed 2nd. The majority of the winners in the American Hound class are owned by the great and only Jack Gibbs, and it goes without saying that what Jack don't know about Hounds is not worth knowing. All of his dogs were shown well. *Pointers*.—Challenge dogs and bitches, heavy weights.—The Pointer classes on the whole were considerably below the average in regard to quality to what have generally been exhibited in former years at the Industrial. Urada

alone in the class is a grand all round bitch with the exception of being a trifle weak in pasterns and was shown in miserable condition. Open dogs—Gamester 1st is a good bodied dog with great bone and good legs and feet but is rather coarse all over. Sport 2nd is a large coarse dog but has a fair body and feet with a head on him like a mongrel. Uncle Sam 3rd has a very fair head, good legs and feet, is a trifle light in bone for a large dog not quite bent enough in stifle and a little out in front, yet showed much more Pointer quality than the 2nd dog and should have been placed above him. Open bitches—Lady Graphic the winner of first is only fair headed, rather short in muzzle, is good in body and eye, fair in neck, bone, legs and feet, but is a trifle sway backed. Floss 2nd is better in head, but is out in front, is light behind, with not very good feet. Jess 3rd, a lemon and white bitch, has a fairly good head, has good feet and bone, too straight in stifle and is very much sway backed. This class was far from being a good one. Challenge dogs and bitches (light weights)—Shotaway had no competition. She was shown in good condition, as are all the dogs handled by Ben Lewis. She has far from having a perfect head, is short in muzzle, large in eye, good body, neck, shoulders, feet and a trifle high on her pins, but taken altogether is quite a good one. Open dogs (light weight)—Kent placed first is only fair in skull and light in muzzle, good neck, shoulders and legs, with well sprung ribs, trifle long cast with feet that might be improved. Bert of Hessen, 2nd, loses to winner in head, having a coars: one is short in neck, beats the winner in coupling and feet, about equal in bone. Count D, 3rd, not in the same class with the others is only fair in head, is long coupled, poor feet and bone, is out at the elbows. Open bitches—Kent's mate, the winner in this class, is a very nice headed bitch, good square cut muzzle, good neck, legs, bone and feet, with a fair body and hindquarters. Maud W. placed 2nd is only fair in head and body. Blackbird 3rd a rather nice bodied bitch with a fair head, a trifle light in bone, might have exchanged places with Maud W. *English Setters*.—Challenge dogs and bitches, Albert's Ranger had a walk over in his class; he was looking well, and outside of being somewhat dishfaced and light in muzzle is quite a good one. Open dogs—Selkirk Bolo, winner in open dog class, I can't say that I like; he is rather large and has only a fair head with a fairly good body, trifle long coupled and has good legs and feet. Selkirk White, 2nd, I liked a great deal better for the position of winner, as he beats him in head, ears are better put on, has just as good a body and is better coupled. Admiral Drake, 3rd, a very taking marked dog rather light all over, is good on top of skull but inclined to be weak in

muzzle; shows any amount of Setter quality, has good legs and feet. Rodfield's Glad, V H C R, a nice youngster, trifle weak in head, with age may improve. Open bitches—Ruby D III. winner of first in this class, wins in head only, she has only a fair neck and shoulders, ribs fairly well sprung and might have much better feet. Luna 2nd is a large one and rather inclined to be coarse all over, is only fair in head and body, good legs and feet and was shown too fat. Dido III. 3rd, a sweet little bitch with any amount of Setter quality, only loses to the winner in head a trifle, having far from a bad one, far surpasses either of the ones placed above her in neck, shoulders and body; good feet and legs, and notwithstanding her being shown too fat should have been placed 1st with Ruby 2nd and Luna 3rd. Lady Jane Grey, V H C R, is quite a nice youngster, head not quite right, but with age should improve. Monk's Nun, V H C, is also rather a nice bitch, showing any amount of the Laverack type. Novice dogs and bitches—In this class the winners were Selkirk Whyte 1st, Dido III. 2nd. Here the little bitch should again have come out on top. *Irish Setters*.—Challenge dogs and bitches, Champion Kildare 1st, with Champ Queen Vic 2nd. These dogs are so well known and often described it is only necessary to say that they were both looking well. Open dogs—St. Elmo, 1st, shown in best of condition is a grand headed dog with any amount of Irish Setter quality, has a good body, legs and feet. Glen 2nd also a good headed dog of the right type and was shown well, loses to the winner in head being a trifle coarse and not having as nice a slope on the hind quarters. These two dogs made a beautiful showing in the ring; they are a pair that will take a lot of beating. Shaun Rhue II. 3rd loses to winner in head and Irish Setter type, being a rather heavy dog all over. Toronto Bleaney also loses to winner in head but is of much better Setter type than some placed over him, having good body, legs and feet, but was shown in poor condition. McGinty H C has rather a nice head, trifle light in muzzle, and is inclined to be coarse, was rightly placed. Open bitches—The bitch class was not as good as the dogs. Lalla Rookh, the winner of first, has far from having a first class head, she is rather small in size and wavy in coat, and lacks that upright carriage so much admired in Irish Setters, yet she has a very nice body with good legs and feet. Kildare Doris 2nd while not having a perfect head, consider her better in skull, neck, shoulders and body, and might have changed places. Kitty 3rd, loses to both in head, is short in neck and only fair in body and shoulders. Toronto Mollie, reserve, shown fairly well, while not having a perfect

head has a fairly good one, is a good bodied bitch with lots of character and should have been placed higher. The novice classes were a repetition of the open classes. In the dogs Shaun Rhue 1st, Toronto Bleaney 2nd and Bangs 3rd, who is rather a fair bodied dog, a trifle coarse and not quite right behind, got all he deserved. *Gordon Setters*.—Challenge dogs and bitches—Lady Gordon looking well received the blue. In open dogs, Forest Guy shown well had it all his own way. He is a good all around dog having a good body, legs, feet and the best of tan, with a perfectly flat coat, might be a trifle better in marking. In open bitches, Mount Royal Wanda, also alone, received the blue, was looking better than she has for some years having let go some of her surplus fat. In the novice classes only two very common ones were shown, the best being Roy, 1st, who has too much daylight under him with very poor tan, Gordon 2nd with a wavy coat and very little tan markings.

AMERICAN AND CANADIAN KENNEL CLUBS.

Editor Gazette:

THAT I have never heretofore agreed with Dr. Wesley Mills is so well known that I need not apologize for mentioning the fact, in now agreeing thoroughly with his statement "The C. K. C. has become merely the servant of the A. K. C. to carry out its rules"; A further "use" of the C. K. C. is set forth by you, to see that "The A. K. C. gets everything going" (money understood). I have taken issue with C. K. C. action in the past, and probably would do it in the future if it continued as anything, (that it, and all Canadian dogmen are veritable nothings now, is sufficiently evident) but it has never disgraced itself by pandering to the meanest private animosities, as the A. K. C. did in the Bell disqualification case and others. Therefore it is with regret that I find that there is no Canadian Kennel Club to resign from, and I can only refuse to continue a member in what has become a disreputable tail to a very discreditable kite.

Let me protest against one feature in your imaginary drama. It is utter nonsense to say that it is incongruous for the same exhibitor to be a sinner in the U. S. and a saint in Canada, in other words that a disqualification in one country should carry with it the same penalty in the other. The Canadian Kennel Club had the written opinion of a most respected member of the Ottawa bar that a contract of mutual recognition of disqualifications was unlawful and an enforcement of it rendered the C. K. C. liable to damages. Further than that, the "saint and sinner" idea is mere claptrap, as it is perfectly legitimate for either club to disqualify an exhibitor for an offence committed in the other country. But to disqualify a man, without giving him any hearing in his defence, simply because a foreign body has disqualified him, is such evident denial of a fundamental principle of

justice and common sense that I am surprised at it's ever having been maintained, even with the endorsement of the *American Stock-Keeper*.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

I HAVE had a number of inquiries lately on the subject of the glycerine and carbolic treatment which I recommended some weeks ago for skin diseases. It would appear, from the questions asked, that the readers of the paragraph do not quite distinguish between glycerine and carbolic acid and glycerine of carbolic acid. The latter is a preparation of the British Pharmacopoeia, and can be supplied by any chemist. One tablespoonful of that should be put in an ordinary 10 oz. medicine bottle, and the bottle be filled up with water. This makes an excellent lotion for skin diseases, and should be applied with a sponge morning and night, a little aperient medicine being given to the dog at the same time.

It is a good plan with dogs, especially the larger breeds, to give them once a week a good feed of boiled bullock's liver, as this acts as a natural lubricant to the bowels and is an excellent means of preventing and remedying habitual constipation. Many dogs do not get the amount of exercise nature requires them to have, and, as a result, their owners are constantly physicking them, whereas if ordinary methods were tried the difficulty would often be got over without any recourse to medicine. There is always something to be said in favour of a good heavy meal as a means of causing the bowels to act; it is a mechanical process—a sort of forcing onwards—and has very good results at times.

Speaking of aperients, castor oil is the commonest thing used among dog fanciers; but the reason of this being so extensively used is not very apparent, since its effects are not, as a rule, without later complications. Castor oil, to my mind, can best be described as an urgent aperient, and should only be given when there is real necessity. Very often a dose of ordinary sweet oil is sufficiently effective, or, failing that, a very mild dose of Epsom salts may be administered. (It must be remembered that Epsom salts act much more powerfully on dogs than on human beings.) A podophyllin pill is very useful, especially if the dog be habitually constipated. A recipe was given in this column recently for pills containing podophyllin.

There are a great many cases in which, instead of giving aperient medicine, quicker relief can be afforded by using a syringe. The best liquid for this purpose is soap and water; an ordinary syringe, with a bone nozzle, can be used. It is better not to use a syringe made of glass, because there is always a danger, if the dog is refractory, of getting the glass broken. Most dogs, as a rule, object to the operation at first, and it is necessary that they be taken in hand firmly, so that the matter may be carried through completely at one attempt.

Very often correspondents to *Our Dogs* are advised to give their animals horse flesh as food. This should be freshly killed, and may either be given raw or cooked, according to circumstances. By horse flesh, a novice should not understand the flesh of any animal that has been suffering from disease, as a great many horses that have been destroyed have. The best plan of getting good horse flesh is to make the acquaintance of the nearest horse slaughterer, and arrange with him to let you have a joint now and again from the carcase of any healthy animal that has had to be destroyed either through meeting with an accident or on account of old age.

I cannot too strongly condemn the practice which prevails with many people of giving their dogs any nasty sort of offal that happens to come in handy. I feel quite sure that many diseases are caused by this means. A dog has a great deal more delicacy and refinement in his nature, if it be properly understood, than many people take the trouble to imagine, and there is no reason why these qualities should not be cultivated instead of being repressed. If paunch be given to dogs, it should be well cleaned first, and may also be boiled to advantage. This is infinitely preferable to the practice of many people, who get a paunch and hang it up without being cleaned for three or four days, until it becomes most objectionable, and fit neither for dogs nor for pigs.

Many dogs show a much greater tendency to nervousness than others so. By nervousness, I do not necessarily mean fear, but rather a sensitiveness and tendency to be startled by any sudden noise or other occurrence. This is not in itself a disease, necessarily, but is an indication more of hereditary temperament, the study of which subject is highly interesting. Some dogs seem to have sufficient self-control to remain quite unmoved under circumstances when one of the "nervous" kinds would have jumped straight up. The

tendency to this nervousness is to be found in almost every breed more or less, although undoubtedly some breeds are more disposed to it than others.

Thrashing has no doubt a great deal to do with dogs in this respect. For instance, it is a well-known fact that a dog that is constantly being thrashed and threatened will be constantly in dread of thrashing and threatening, and will never have any spirit like another dog which is encouraged from puppyhood in daring and activity. So, too, dogs which are petted and pampered, particularly those which are the property of ladies and are kept most of their time indoors, and are not allowed to rub noses with other dogs, and not only so, but are fed on antibilious dainties, do not possess anything like the nerve qualities of their brother dogs who have had to experience a more Spartan rule of life.

There is another matter in connection with nervousness in dogs which must not be lost sight of, and that is, that it is impossible, just as it is in the same way with ourselves, to over-work them; and no form of over-work is more trying to the dog than over-showing. Some men get hold of a good dog, and send him to one show after another, until between the excitement and the necessary dosing with tonic medicine which showing involves, the animal's constitution becomes seriously impaired and he will never be the dog which he might otherwise have been. It is good advice, therefore, that I am giving to the novice, when I tell him that the less he shows his dogs and the more attention paid to each individual animal the better.

One of the most important principles to be observed in the feeding of dogs is "regularity." Some people—the greater number, probably—have no method whatever in their treatment of dogs (unless it be methodical neglect), and they seem to think that so long as the unfortunate animal is not starved, it matters neither how or at what intervals he is fed. But the laws of Nature are similar with dogs as with ourselves, and habit, in all things, governs them as it does us; and whether it be in feeding, exercise, clothing, training, or what not, Nature and habit will always adjust themselves; so that absence of regularity in any respect is tantamount to direct interference with natural law.

The question which novices usually ask is—How many times a day should my dog be fed? The answer is, that everything depends upon the breed and surroundings. For a dog which only has a limited amount of exercise and is chain-

ed up a good part of his time, a light breakfast and a heavy supper are sufficient. If, however, it be a sporting dog (say, a Spaniel), with work before him, a light meal is necessary also at midday. Very hard-worked animals, as Greyhounds, in training, need special treatment, which must follow the discretion of their trainer; whilst the delicate varieties of pet dogs, on account of the comparative fragility of their constitutions, need to be fed at more frequent intervals, too.

The secret of the art of feeding dogs lies in the stopping of gluttony. Most dogs—all, in fact—are by nature gluttonous, and when hungry they will, in their brute unthinking, "bolt" far more food than is good for them. A hungry dog should never be given a big dish of soft food right away; he should have either a substantial bone or a hard dry biscuit to gnaw first, by giving which we achieve the double object of improving the state of his teeth and of modulating the rapacity of his appetite, which, if allowed to satiate itself unchecked, would end in an attack of indigestion, and by oft being repeated would pave the way for a chronic state of dyspeptic unhealthiness.

So, having taken off the edge of appetite, we can proceed to the substantial part of the meal, and as soon as it is seen that the dog begins to turn over what is before him, choosing the daintiest of its morsels, it should be removed. "Leave off when hungry" was a sage piece of advice given to humanity long before the day of *Oliver Twist*; it adapts itself admirably to the case of dogs. Now, an observant master or mistress will very quickly learn to foretell the pulse of appetite in his or her dogs, and by giving only what experience has taught suffices, will be able to regulate, without waste of time, the daily meals for each.

It needs not to be emphasised (let us hope) that all food given to dogs should be fresh and clean. It matters not how coarse the meat or how hard the biscuit; but let it be clean and wholesome. Dog's inclinations are what they are made by their owners, to a very great degree, and surely it is as well to increase in our brute friends such refinement as we have the power to increase. A dog which has been always accustomed to clean food is never wilfully partial to what is filthy. (Of course I am well aware how troublesome some dogs do become—particularly pet dogs, at times—but there are explanations—worms, depraved appetite through indigestion, and so on—to account for that.)

When a dog neglects his regular allowance and seems disinclined to eat, he ought not to be interfered with. His food, if untouched (or only partly eaten), after a time should be taken away, and not be presented to him again until the time for his next meal. This is far more rational than forcing him to a condition of repulsive loathing by leaving it for a long time under his nose. How many of us, I wonder, are there who have never known what it is to be "off our appetite," and have not felt the benefit of a few hours' abstinence? So it is with the dog. If he is disinclined to eat, and the food he declines is fresh and wholesome, take it away; he is indisposed.

Failure of appetite is, of course, an index often to the progress of an illness, and though the procedure recommended in the preceding paragraph is to be followed, it does not remain that no further notice is to be taken of the incident. Loose the animal if he be fastened up, and let him have a good run. May be that will put him right, or, if not, it will enable the owner to take further note of his condition and to form some conclusion as to whether or not he is nearing an attack of illness, which may then be anticipated and by early curative measures may be modified perhaps stayed off altogether.

It is a great mistake to leave the feeding of dogs to servants and employees. No such neglect ought to be indulged in by even the laziest or the busiest of dog owners. Nor is it necessary. Of course so sweeping a rule as this has modifications, and if feeding is to be done at all by a servant of the owner it should always be so done, not by the owner one day and the employee another. The writer knows several instances of ladies in the highest rank of society who yet find time to feed (or

at least to supervise the feeding of) their dogs as regularly as they are present at their own board. This is as it should be, and no one who is too dainty or too dignified to attend to such matters deserves to own a dog at all—*Our Dogs*.
