



THE A. K. C'S. PACIFIC ADVISORY BOARD, which was held up as a model for Canadian breeders and exhibitors to follow, seems, as our tragedic friend would say, to be "tottering on its base." Play on the last word. The A. K. C. Committee on Constitution and Rules has reported as follows regarding this committee: "Your committee would further recommend that Article XIII., Section 4, Constitution, be amended by striking out the entire section. The reasons for such recommendation are, first, that it is found to be impossible to create enough interest to be able to secure a quorum, and as a consequence, no meeting has been held since August last, notwithstanding the fact that matters are in its hands that should have been attended to promptly; second, it is the opinion of a number of members of Pacific coast clubs that the existence of such a body on the coast is not necessary. It has been for months practically a dead letter, and its abolishment is recommended.



The editor of the "American Kennel Gazette" then adds: "Note-The above report of the Constitution and rules Committee was mailed to the secretary of each club on the Pacific coast, on January 26, 1898, together with the following questions to be answered and reason for answering such questions. To Pacific Coast Members.-What are your wishes regarding the continuance of the Pacific Coast Advisory Board? If you are in favor of its continuance, in what manner would you desire its formation? The reason for asking these questions is that several members of Pacific coast clubs have expressed a wish for its abolition. Further than that, no meeting of the Advisory Board has been held since August last because of lack of a quorum, and important business that cannot be acted upon by the A. K. C. until reported upon by the Advisory Board is thus delayed. Meanwhile, as no alteration of the Constitution can now be made except at the annual meeting, and of which notice has been published in the January issue of the "Gazette," the committee has paved the way for any desired change by giving notice of an amendment to do away with the Advisory Board altogether. If nothing is heard of the recipient of this notice the presumption will be that the member favors the abolition of the board. All suggestions will be presented as amendments at the annual meeting by the Committee on Rules if the member is not represented by a delegate.'

#### A. K. C. CLASSIFICATION.

The same committee also recommend the adoption of the following classification in lieu of that now in use: Classes.-1. The Puppy Class shall be for all dogs over six months and under twelve months of age. No entry can be made or accepted of one under six months of age, or whose date of birth is unknown. 2. The Novice Class shall be for all dogs never having won a first prize at any recognized show, wins in the puppy classes excepted. 3. The Limit Class shall be for all dogs never having won four first prizes at any recognized show, wins in the puppy and novice classes excepted. 4. The Open Class shall be for all dogs of






MR. J. SEATH, JR'S. "ALDON QUIVER."

MORE SHOWS NEEDED IN CANADA.

EDITOR REVIEW:

NOWING of the success of the late dog show held at Peterboro, I cannot see why we in Canada cannot have a number of such shows held during the year. The trouble has been, in the past, that a large number of our Associations want to try and copy the large ones by holding a four days' show and give large prize money. The consequence is that if the gate receipts do not pan out, the committee has got to go down in their pockets to pay the prizes or let them go unpaid. Now, I see no reason for this. We have in Canada just as good fanciers and just as good dogs as are found in any other country and as the American fanciers represented by the American Kennel Club refuse to have anything to do with anything Canadian, I would suggest the following remedy, whereby we will be perfectly independent. For instance, let clubs be formed in the following places: Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Hamilton, London, Kingston, Brantford, Guelph, Galt, Woodstock Chatham, Windsor, Sarnia, Belleville, Lindsay

Peterboro, and many other places, and let a committee be formed to arrange circuits for the purpose of holding two days shows in each place. For instance, Peterboro holds a show, say, Monday and Tuesday: Kingston, Wednesday and Thursday; and Belleville Friday and Saturday. The distances between the places are short and can easily be covered between eleven o'clock of one night and eleven the next morning, and that without losing any sleep. By this plan the Clubs would only require to put up about \$500 in prizes, with \$1 entry fee, and I am sure that exhibitors would prefer to show under these conditions and would make more towards covering expenses, as they would have, say, three \$4 prizes to compete for under different judges, than they would to travel all the way to Boston to compete for one prize of \$8 and pay \$4 entry fee for the privilege. A number of circuits could be found: London, Chatham and Windsor, Hamilton, Brantford and Woodstock, Toronto, Guelph and Galt, and many others. The shows in many places could be held in connection with poultry shows, etc., which would ensure a large interest and attendance in each place. I would like to hear from others on this matter. In the meantime

#### NOTES FOR NOVICES.

N dog keeping and breeding it is of the utmost importance to have suitable kennels. Brick built kennels, with concrete floors and loose wooden benches for the dogs to lie upon are the best form of kennel, but where such are impossible, the next best kennel is a wooden one, but portable.

The ordinary wooden oblong kennel with sloping roof and entrance at end, without any other protection is, probably, the worst form of habitation that could be devised, and the source of untold suffering

puppies, and rheumatism in adult dogs. Results are the same in wintry weather when the "poor dog suffers from exposure.

To continually chain dogs up to such torturing habitations is little less than cruelty. But this is a common form of keeping a dog, we regret to think, and, with culpable thoughtlessness, we have seen dogs so kept with the entrance of their kennels fixed to face the bitter north and east. All kennels should have a south or south-west aspect, and if no other kennel but the one we have described be practicable, let the dog's entrance to it be at the end of one side, instead of at the end. In such a case the dog should have a loose wooden platform on which to lie, placed near the entrance to his kennel, and kept scrupulously clean. A thoughtful owner, too, would give him some kind of a covering as a protection from shower or shine. Sunshine is good for dogs, and indeed, necessary for them and almost all living things, but they ought to be in a position to take as much or as little of it as they feel they require. Dogs kept in such kennels should have frequent exercise.

The best and most humane portable wooden kennel we know of, is one which we hope to shortly illustrate. The kennel is the result of a long experience in dog-keeping, and, it will be seen, is eminently adapted to the varying English climate. The dog can have the choice of four distinct degrees of climate condition, and at the same time have protection from storm and sunshine. This kennel can be made in any size to suit any breed of dog, and either in an expensive or cheap form, according to the owner's purse.

There are many other more or less sensible kennels in the market, which it would be well for owners who value their dogs to turn their attention to, and dispense with the very objectionable form of kennel to dog, large or small. which we have referred. Indeed, we should like to see this canine prison-house become obsolete.

long periods, which is a fruitful cause of rickets in yard does not furnish dogs with sufficient exercise ground, although on the principle of half a loaf being better than none, it is, where practicable, preferable to the chain.

> A dog, like his kinsmen, the wolf and the jackal, is constituted for unlimited open air exercise, and the more he gets the better he likes it and the better he is for it, and, of course, vice versa.

> The nearer, too, his habits of life and diet approach that of his wild confrere the better, with some little allowance for domestication of course. Take drovers' or butchers' dogs, whose mode of life more approaches that of the dog in his wild state than any other. Skin disease is almost nnknown amongst them, and where they are attacked by distemper contagion they rarely die, but almost invariably recover, and this with little or nothing being done to them.

> Less cooking there is and less coddling dogs get the better, but it is essential that when kept in confinement the dog's nature should be studied, and a common-sense view of his requirements prevail.

> Dog biscuits and hound meal must, in the dog's present state of domestication, always constitute his staple food. As a diet for the dog this form of food has been brought to such a state of perfectness as to form an almost complete food for the species cancede. We say almost advisedly, because perfectness in one particular form of cake or meal has not been reached quite, and all dogs will thrive better and enjoy better health with these foods supplemented by their original and natural form of subsistence in the shape of raw animal food, bones, etc. Two meals per week of raw, sound, lean horse, sheep or ox flesh-minced in the case of puppies-varied with a meal of butcher's offal uncleaned, will be found to be very beneficial to any

A light meal in a morning and heavy meal at nightas much as the dog will eat-are the correct rations. Puppies should never be chained up until full Some owners only give one meal per day, viz., at the nutrition, which with his active and excitable nature could not be expected to accrue to him as the result of a morning meal. These instructions refer to adult dogs, say from nine months upwards.

Puppies from six weeks to six months cannot well be fed too often; the oftener the better. Their diet should begin with milk and farinaceous foods, puppy biscuits, hound meal, bread, broth, and vegetables being gradually introduced, and with occasional meals of minced flesh meat, as stated. Young puppies, too, should always have large bones to gnaw at, especially during teething operations, and such as they can eat afterwards.

Puppies on leaving their dam are invariably infested with worms, which are not only often fatal, but in all cases injurious to their growth and development, rendering them an easy prey to other forms of canine disease and disorder. In this way we would advise owners to begin treating for these pests, in a mild form, before they leave lhe dam, and periodically until they arrive at the age of matnrity.
