CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

EXECUTIVE MEETING OCT. 28TH, 1898.

THE first meeting of the newly-elected Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club was held in Toronto, October 28th, 1898, at which Mr. Jno. G. Kent, the President, occupied the chair.

The President opened the meeting by outlining what in his opinion should be the program of the Club for the coming year, as referred to by him in his open letter published in October GAZETTE.

THE MINUTES of last meeting were taken as read.

REVISION OF CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS. This matter was thought to be too lengthy and of too great moment to go into without preparation, so Messrs. Sweetnam, Stone and the President were appointed a Committee to draft a revision and report at next meeting.

LOCAL CLUBS REPRESENTED ON THE COMMITTEE. This was discussed from all points and the necessity of some such move was fully recognized. Finally, on motion of Dr. Boulton, seconded by Dr. Niven, the following resolution was unanimously passed: "That any Kennel Club which sends to the Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club the names of ten members or over, accompanied by a fee of \$1.50 each, shall be entitled to one representative on the Executive Committee, on payment of an additional fee of five dollars. Members to be entitled to the full privileges of the Canadian Kennel Club, consisting of a copy of the GAZETTE, monthly, the annual Stud Book, one free registration, and subsequent registrations at half the regular fee.

ENLARGED PRIVILEGES.—The offer of the publisher of the GAZETTE, as requested at the annual meeting, to supply each member with the GAZETTE for the year of his membership, and a copy of the annual Stud Book at a reduced rate, to be paid out of the Club funds was accepted. The Stud Book to run each year from September 1st to August 31st.

NEW MEMBERS.—Mr. Jno. McCormick, Winters, Cal., and Mr. F. W. Wilson, Montreal, were accepted as members.

EXTENSION OF DATE OF CLOSING OF ENTRIES.—The Secretary read a telegram from the New Westminster Secretary, asking for an extension of one week of date of closing of entries, owing to the disastrous fire in that city. The Secretary's action in granting the extension was confirmed, but not to be taken as a precedent.

LETTERS.—The following letters were read: Secretary of the Canadian Kennel Club, Toronto.

Dear Sir:—I am glad to see that our newly-elected

President, Mr. John G. Kent, is pushing matters so assiduously.

Under existing conditions, many of the members of the Canadian Kennel Club—most of whom, I daresay, are one dog men—derive but little apparent benefit from their membership. I am strongly in favor of a yearly stud book, and also of a monthly journal to be furnished gratis to each member of the Club; and I fully agree with the President that the membership list would be largely increased were matters pertaining to our national organization better known. However, I do not consider that it would be wise to venture on publishing a monthly paper, but could we not come to some terms with the publisher of the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE, whereby he would furnish a copy of our interesting, well-printed, official organ to members of our Club? I would think this more advisable, for the present at least. As suggested by the President, were each member to contribute his mite in the way of sending interesting news, the publisher of the GAZETTE might derive some benefit from it, as it should tend to increase this smart little paper's popularity. To defray any extra expense, the membership fee could be increased from \$2 to \$3. This, I am sure, would be considered very reasonable were the members to be furnished with free copies of the Stud-book and of the GAZETTE in addition to the privileges they now enjoy. I approve of the sustaining membership fund of \$5.00, and I feel confident that many of our members would subscribe to same.

I would think it very advisable for the Canadian Kennel Club to recognize the American wins, and also to arrange our classification as much as possible like theirs, as it really is a pity to see exhibitors from across the line entering their challenge dogs in our open classes, and in many, if not most instances, carrying our prize money away with them.

with it—in tone and spirit wholly—and largely as to the propositions it contains.

Certainly the average member expects some tangible advantages from joining the Canadian Kennel Club, though it must be apparent that for the success of such an organization, in its present stage of development, many sacrifices must be made.

I think we should maintain cordial relations with the American Kennel Club as far as is consistent with a perfectly independent and manly attitude; and I presume it would suit better on the whole to follow their show classification. I think the Canadian Kennel Club would do well to encourage the formation of local clubs and the holding of small shows. Such develop a Canadian class of judges and make the knowledge of and interest in good dogs more widely known, etc. I am not favorable to the establishment of a second kennel paper, but would like to see our present one so well supported that it could appear twice in the month.

AN UNFAIR RULE CORRECTED. For some time past the permitting of dogs which have won in the United States to come into Canada and compete in novice classes has been sorely felt. AN OPEN LETTER.

TO THE DOG FANCIERS OF THE PACIFIC COAST IN
PARTICULAR AND THE REST OF THE WORLD
IN GENERAL.

AN article under the heading "The California Situation," appears in the September number of the A. K. C. Gazette and is the reason for the following remarks. While commenting on the article it might be well to give the causes which led up to and the reason for the formation of the Pacific Coast Kennel League; and having done so, leave the justification of the act in the hands of those most interested, the dog fanciers West of the 110th degree of longitude.

To begin with, the meeting of delegates in San Francisco, to which the Gazette refers, was called by the San Francisco Kennel Club. The invitation was sent to not only clubs who were members of the A. K. C., but to all the clubs on the Coast; as every club was interested in the classifications to be adopted, whether it was a member of the A. K. C. or not. Eight clubs responded to the call, five of whom were members of the A. K. C. The majority decided that a return to the "old rules" was best for the coast, and a resolution to that effect was carried, showing that such was the desire of the majority of the clubs present.

The fact that a person under suspension by the A. K. C. voted, or that three of the clubs represented were not members of the A. K. C., is obviously not of the slightest importance, when one remembers that the invitation to send delegates was sent to those clubs. The delegates voted as directed by their clubs and not as individuals, and therefore it is a matter of no moment whether any or all were under suspension by the A. K. C.

The Gazette unfortunately makes a statement too personal to be allowed to pass without comment. It says: "Dr. D'Evelyn was elected Chairman, and was one of the delegates of the San Francisco club. The meeting was practically called by the San Francisco club, and the club was in favor of the adoption of a classification set forth in the call. The wishes of the San Francisco club were, however, thwarted by the vote of Dr. D'Evelyn, who sided with the non-members

at the convention and gave them a majority of two." It would be extremely interesting to know what authority the Gazette has for this statement. As a member of the San Francisco Kennel Club I should like to say that no meeting was ever called to consider the classification which the Gazette says the San Francisco club favors. As no meeting was called it is to be presumed that Dr. D'Evelyn was merely directed to act as he thought best for the interests of his club, and consequently the Doctor voted as he thought best for the general interests of dog-dom on the Coast and of San Francisco in particular.

The fact that the A. K. C. refused to consider the requests of the San Francisco convention is known to all. On advice being received here that such was the case, the meeting of delegates was reconvened. Three show clubs, who had not sent delegates to the previous meeting, now attended. These were the Sacramento, Oakland, and San Jose Kennel Clubs, all members of the A. K. C. After considerable informal discussion a classification, based on the "old rules," was decided on. These rules could not, however, be adopted, because of the refusal of the A. K. C. to grant different rules for the Coast. It was therefore decided to form a Pacific Coast League of Kennel Clubs. The California State Kennel Club, the oldest organization of its kind in California, the San Jose, Stockton, Tacoma, Seattle, and California Collie Clubs, voted in favor of the formation of the League. The Mastiff and Fox Terrier Clubs, both specialty clubs, who could not be expected to appreciate the difficulties of a show club, voted against it. Oakland voted with the specialty clubs. From this it will be seen that six show clubs were in favor of the League and only one against it. San Francisco did not vote; one of the delegates, Mr. Barker, saying that he had not been instructed by his club as to its desire in the matter. This bears out the assertion that the San Francisco Kennel Club had never held a meeting to consider the new rules, and therefore the Gazette's statement that it is in favor of them, is not only wrong, but seems a deliberate attempt to mislead people into the belief that the San Francisco Kennel Club is a solid factor in favor of A. K. C. Rules and Classification. It might be well to say here that the League was formed not in any antagonistic spirit to the A. K. C., nor with any bitter feeling against it, but simply as a business proposition.

We think the change of rules (two of them in two years) and the tinkering which they were constantly undergoing, and which after two years still continues, is partly responsible for the falling off in our shows from seven to three, and is also partly to blame for those three being financially failures. We also think that we are capable of investigating and disposing of such cases of fraud as may occur on the Coast, instead of sending them to New York, where they are decided, apparently, not on their merits, but on the private advices of A. K. C. friends here, which bear more weight than affidavits or club resolutions. We are further of opinion that the listing fees, the arbitrary fines, and the annual ten dollars for membership are amongst the chief causes of the exhausted condition of our club treasuries, and all of which we hold to be unnecessary. Supposing the existing state of affairs to be reversed, and the headquarters of the A. K. C. to be in San Francisco, how long would the Atlantic Coast clubs remain members? Can any person imagine that they would send 25 cents listing fees, or endure being fined for errors in catalogues to support an A. K. C. in San Francisco? Would they endure the tedious wait of ten days which would occur in every case they had cause to request an opinion or decision upon? How long would they continue to appoint delegates to meetings where everything was already cut and dried, and where the suggestions of delegates were treated jocularly, as were Captain Knocker's recently? They would soon find that the A.K.C. located in San Francisco would make rules favoring the Pacific Coast and which would probably not suit the different conditions existing on the Atlantic Coast. If after many attempts to obtain redress they got none, the day would soon come when the Atlantic Coast would do what the Pacific Coast has just done, that is, form a Kennel League of its own, and adopt such rules and classifications as it might think best suited to the conditions existing in its territory.

As will be seen from the Rules and By-Laws of the Pacific Coast League, A.K.C. wins are recognized by the League. It also permits A.K.C. shows to be held in its territory. Personally I do not think they would be a success if tried, as the League's classification is so much better and simpler, that the majority of fanciers here say that they will show under no other. How-

ever be that as it may, these acts prove the earnest desire of the League to promote harmony and good feeling in the fancy, to coerce no one, but to give everyone the right to show his dogs under whichever rules he pleases and to recognize his dog's wins. A glance at the rules of the League will show the very excellent system of local government enjoyed by each club a member of it; by which the club tries all offences committed against it, or at its shows. The club has power to punish an offender by suspending him, so far as its own show goes and may bring the matter before the League if it thinks the offence deserves a still greater punishment. This is surely a step in the right direction and one which, if it proves a success, will be likely to be adopted by other kennel organizations.

The Pacific Coast League also recognizes foreign wins, as is surely only just. It has always appeared to me to be irresistibly funny to think that the A. K. C. would not recognize Canadian or foreign wins. Does it think it is the only "Simon Pure" kennel organization in the world, or is its classification so elaborate that its Secretary and staff are unable to compute the number of Canadian wins which shall be equal to one "Open" or "Winners" Class win under A. K. C. rules?

It is to be hoped that foolish people will not try to stir up any bad feeling, at the root of which is usually to be found personal enmity, under the mistaken idea that they will be doing the A. K. C. or themselves any good. There is no reason for the A. K. C. to have any but the kindest feelings towards the new League, and I feel confident that when the gentlemen who constitute the A. K. C. understand the reasons for the formation of the Pacific Coast League, they will give their sister association a hearty welcome; and all cause for discontent being removed, no reason will exist why the two associations should not work harmoniously together, for the good of our canine friend throughout the length and breadth of our great and glorious country.

OVER THREE HUNDRED ENTRIES AT HAMILTON'S ONE DAY SHOW.

THE Gore Kennel Club's show in Hamilton, held on Saturday, November 4th, had the phenomenal entry of 304, consisting of 225 dogs of all breeds. This but shows how ready exhibitors are to support these gatherings—we have the dogs, all that is wanted is the opportunity to show them. The location was in a store on one of the principal streets, not an ideal place by any means, but central, and "the people" came. As but about half the number of entries received was expected quarters were crowded, the dogs having to be placed from cellar to garret. Light was none too good, but then one must not expect too much from these one day shows. The chief thing is to get the dogs together and to get the people to view them.

The officers of the Association and show are: Rev. T. Geoghegan, President; W. J. Jackson, Vice-President; Myles Hunting, 2nd Vice-President; R. McClenahan, Treasurer; F. C. Mills, Secretary; R. M. Raw, Registrar; Executive Committee: R. M. Raw, M. O'Rourke, A. Benzie, Wm. Stevens, Jas. Hughson, Ed. Hayes; Show Committee, Officers, Executive Committee, Frederick Small and J. J. Tulk; Superintendent of show, R. Wodehouse, Richard Davis, Assistant Superintendent. The judges chosen were: Chas. Lyndon, Toronto, all Terriers, except Manchester; John Walsh, Hamilton, Manchester Terriers; Frank R. Close, Hamilton, Newfoundland, Great Danes, Mastiffs, St. Bernards; Wm. Sutherland, Hamilton, Collies; Ed. Tinsley, Hamilton, Spaniels, Deerhounds, Greyhounds, Wolfhounds, Pointers, Setters, Beagles; Rev. T. Geoghegan, A. Murdock and the Superintendent, Miscellaneous classes.

A local paper says: "The only unpleasant feature of the show was in the evening about 7 o'clock, when some of the outside exhibitors wanted to take their dogs home. The management was firm, however, and would not permit the removal of any of the exhibits till 10 o'clock. The assistance of the police had to be solicited in one case. One man, however, broke down the rear door and got one of his dogs away."

Mr. Geo. H. Gooderham, who visited the show, was

so pleased with the entry that he very kindly augmented his donation of two cups by two others. The four Gooderham cups were won as follows: Mr. Wm. Morris, Toronto, cup for the best wire-haired or smooth Fox Terrier dog, with Meersbrook Ned; Mr. F. W. Jacobi, Toronto, cup for the best wire-haired or smooth Fox Terrier bitch, with Iona; Mrs. E. Martin's Ballynahinch Tim won the cup for the best Irish Terrier dog, and Rev. T. Geoghegan the cup for the best Irish Terrier bitch. The Terra Cotta Kennels won the prize for the best dog on exhibition, with the Champion Wolfhound Kyula. A feature of the show was Ingleside Princess II., the English Bloodhound, owned by Mr. J. A. Laurin, which traveled up all the way from Montreal to win a bloodless victory.

A criticism of the dogs under the circumstances would be unfair, the quality in many classes was surprising, the best dogs in the country, as the appended list will indicate, were shown. Many outside visitors were present, including Mr. Cox, Paris; Mr. Dunn, Woodstock; Mr. Fraser, Mr. Donovan, Mr. Jacobi, Mr. Gooderham, Mr. Trimble, Mr. Reeves, Mr. Morris, Dr. Boulton, Mr. Bennett, Toronto; Mr. McEwen, Byron. Mr. Stableford, Watford, and others whose names we failed to note.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

DECAYED teeth are more frequently to be met with in lap-dogs than in dogs of the heavier breeds—or to be more precise we ought to say that house-kept dogs get rid of their teeth at an earlier age than dogs kept on plainer diet than usually falls to the lot of the pet dog. This is only what may be expected, and we fear it is idle to protest against dogs being fed on sponge cake, ices and chocolates. We take leave to doubt whether, after all, a pet dog (however much pampered with sweets) would not prefer coarse plain food to the most exquisite confectionary. However that may be, it seems needful to point out once again, that unless a dog gets proper work for his teeth to do, the said teeth will literally become rusty, and finding no further need to exist will begin to commit suicide by falling out.

A dog has, nominally about forty teeth, more than half of which are "grinders." These teeth may be likened to a powerful piece of machinery, which by constant usage will keep itself always smooth and polished and ready for its work. If it be neglected it will soon become dull and coated over with the rust of idleness and practically will be useless for all the purposes for which it was designed. So it is with a dog's teeth. Mother Nature, foreseeing the life of her dog-offspring will have to pass through, furnishes him with these powerful grinders—strong enough to crush bones. It is the very use of them that keeps them smooth and polished—that preserves their hard enamel surfaces and keeps them bright and sweet and healthy. But if they are not used they very soon become stained, the enamel softens and there is an end of them. The teeth, by the way, are liable to the ravages of minute organisms, which, of course, regular use keeps them clear of. Well, the moral of this topic is, that a dog should frequently have hard substances to gnaw so as to provide plenty of work for his teeth.

When a dog's teeth become decayed, the mouth becomes sore and "cankered," and the animal is, as a rule, a very unpleasant companion. It should be borne in mind that one decayed tooth if left to itself will contaminate the rest of the teeth; so if our previous advice be carried out, and the dog's teeth be examined from time to time, any decayed stump will be at once removed—this ought to be done by some competent person—and not only will the patient be given relief from present pain, but he will be spared future pain also probably. If the mouth should be tender, with sores forming on the lips—which will soon give out a very offensive discharge—a mouth wash will be necessary. This can be made quickly by adding a few crystals of permanganate of potassium to a teacupful of water. Get a soft sponge and bathe the lips with this solution for a few minutes. Another good mouth wash can be made by dissolving a little borax in some hot water and adding a few drops of the tincture of myrrh. Myrrh has a most excellent effect in hardening gums which are tender; and when a tooth has been extracted there is nothing better to apply to the wound than simple tincture of myrrh.

We think a word or two ought to be said in this

column once more upon a matter that may well be brought frequently under the notice of amateurs, and that is, upon the need for giving all dogs occasional but systematic doses of aperient medicine. If we consider for a moment what are the principal ailments of dogs we shall see how very necessary this little bit of advice really is. These are distemper, skin disease, and worms. Now it must be obvious to the most unscientific of our readers that every one of these troubles can be modified by attention to the state of the bowels. A dose of aperient medicine will cool the whole system and check the feverish symptoms which are usually the first indication of distemper; when the blood is out of order, charged with impurities, what is better than a dose of medicine which will give relief to the system and assist in enabling the kidneys—those blood sifters—to perform their functions more thoroughly? Again, if a dog is subject to worms, it has been proved over and over again that an occasional dose of laxative medicine will check their development, by clearing away the foetid matter on which they thrive. Therefore we advise regular doses of aperients for dogs.

As to the question, what is the best general aperient for dogs, that can only be answered by reference to the particular case. Aperients act very differently on individual dogs. Some dogs benefit wonderfully by a dose of podophyllin, whilst podophyllin entirely upsets others. Podophyllin is a stimulant to the liver, and hence is valuable for dogs possessed of sluggish livers; sometimes a dog will be violently sick after a small dose of podophyllin—and a second dose may have an entirely opposite effect. Cascara sagrada capsules we have found to be an excellent general aperient—this medicine is said to act also upon the liver, but its effect is less drastic than that of podophyllin. Again, there is another excellent medicine in common Epsom salt, which, as a rule, acts proportionately upon a dog with greater vigor than upon a human subject. Castor oil is not to be recommended except as an urgent physic; its use tends to the opposite effect. When mixed with buckhorn, however, it is more suitable. Another good and wholesome drug is the compound powder of colocynth, which most good chemists can supply in the form of pills. Magnesia is not of much use.

Amongst other medicines the old familiar "compound rhubarb" pill is never out of place in the canine medicine chest, its simplicity and excellence commending it to a very high position in the list of "reliables." Those who purchase compound rhubarb pills should take care that they smell strongly of peppermint—a most important constituent, and one which (on account of the expensiveness of the peppermint oil) is often omitted by "cheap" chemists. The following is the correct recipe for making compound rhubarb pills. Any fancier who possesses a small stone mortar can purchase the ingredients and make up the mass himself, giving a small pinch rolled up in his hand as a dose. Take of powdered rhubarb 60 grammes; aloes 45 grammes; powdered myrrh 30 grammes; powdered hard soap 30 grammes; best oil of peppermint $3\frac{3}{4}$ cubic centimetres, and treacle a sufficiency. To be beaten up into an uniform mass. It is best to mix the powders together in the dry state first, then add the oil of peppermint and the treacle, taking care not to add too much of the latter, otherwise the mass will be too soft and sticky for convenience.

In our last series of notes we dealt with the various phases of distemper which affect dogs, and how they may best be treated. Now, according to the promise with which we concluded, we proceed to refer to the dieting of dogs during an attack of distemper, and to give also some hints on the management of convalescents. First of all we want to refer to a matter that is of great importance to all owners of valuable dogs, and that is the need of having always at hand one of those very useful little instruments known as "clinical" thermometers. By the aid of one of these the most inexperienced of kennelman (when once he has been shown how to use it) can detect a change in the temperature of the dog, which will enable him to take prompt measures for dealing with the feverishness which is to follow.

How to diet a dog during distemper, is a question to which the answer must vary according to the circumstances of the case. It goes without saying, however, that in all cases solid meat must be tabooed—anything likely to raise the temperature being highly unsuitable. If the dog is purged violently, milk,

with a small percentage addition of lime water, would be good, as would also port wine beaten up with egg. As a general rule the safest plan is to dispense with solids altogether, and feed on gruels, broths, beef tea, etc., remembering that, as with a human invalid, so with a canine, it is equally of importance to provide only light, easily-digested nourishment, since the stomach is effected with the rest of the body, and what it could easily assimilate during health it has no means of dealing with during sickness.

Dog biscuits and all farinaceous solids are to be avoided. A little gruel made with fine oatmeal and boiling milk will usually be taken, especially if not too thick. Again, though we dispense with meat, gravy may be offered and soup made by boiling bones. As the animal regains his strength meat may be recommenced by slow degrees, but it should be thoroughly well cooked, and it might also be minced with advantage, as the dog, even in sickness, is prone to his natural habit of "bolting" food. There is another point which may be introduced here, and that is, that it has been asserted by eminent authorities that dogs fed wholly upon meat usually fare much worse under an attack of distemper than dogs which have only had a very limited allowance of this class of food. This, taken in conjunction with the known tendency of meat-fed dogs to eczema and other skin complaints should operate to restrain the novice from a too liberal expenditure upon meat for his dogs.—"Our Dogs."
