PETERBORO SHOW.

THE new Peterboro Kennel Club can certainly be congratulated on giving a really creditable little show. The management this year was of a superior order. The building is an excellent one for the purpose, and considering that the mercury fell several degrees below zero, the building was fairly comfortable. Mr. Alf. Terrill, the Secretary-Treasurer, is a well-known literary man; his attention to his duties and his kindness and courtesy to exhibitors will long be remembered. Dr. Poole occupied the responsible position of Superintendent and "Vet."—all will agree, I am sure, in saying that he was "the right man in the right place." Mr. C. B. McAllister, Chairman of the Committee, is a thorough sportsman, and together with his excellent co-workers, who represent the "brains" of Peterboro, nothing but success could possibly follow anything they undertook to "push." The show was patronized by Peterboro's "smart set"—the pretty girl's being a show in themselves—naturally. The judge, Mr. H. W. Lacy, is too well and favorably known for comment. He discharged his duties in a masterly fashion, which inspired confidence, even to the novice.

The dogs were remarkably good, the quality being up to any show in Collies, Fox Terriers and Cockers. Many well known exhibitors attended the show in person, a flattering compliment in these days. Messrs. J. G. Kent, President of the C.K.C., A. A. Macdonald, W. P. Fraser, H. Parker Thomas, H. L. Jeffrey, Jos. Reid (President Canadian Collie Club), H. B. Hungerford, Wm. Carnew, H. G. Charlesworth, and many others.

MASTIFFS—Two. Laddie, first, is big but lacks expression and character. Sport, second, shows more quality but is small.

ST. BERNARDS—Not nearly up to last year, nothing really worthy of note being shown. The Abbot, first, has size but is devoid of expression and shadings. Lord Bute, second, is fair in skull and good in body. Plinlimmon, about the X, I should think, was best in skull, expression and shadings, but was suffering from an injury to one eye. Bitches—Bayview Linda lacks expression. Lady Aberdeen, second, is very common in head.

GREAT DANES?—The two exhibited were of a "special type."

GREYHOUNDS and WOLFHOUNDS—The Terra Cotta Kennels showed two representative specimens of each breed.

FOXHOUNDS—The winner in dogs, Hanks' Dreadnaught, is a big strong black and tan, good in body, legs and feet. Nora, first in bitches, is a really good English hound from a well known pack.

BEAGLES—A mixed collection, the winner being a pretty little hound.

SETTERS—Toronto Mollie II was in poor shape and showed badly, so was beaten by Jack, who is too strong in head.

COCKER SPANIELS—Black dogs—Mr. Dunn's Black Knight had no difficulty in landing the money, scoring heavily in head, ears and front. Sambo, second, has a good body but is too strong in skull and is poor in front. Park Crow, third, has a good body. Tattoo is a smart little dog spoilt by a wavy coat. Bitches—Meteor won in a strong class. Capital Obeta is quite good in head and ears, but much too fat. Queen Quality I could not find. Miss Peggy, V.H.C., is too light in muzzle but has a good body. Any other color dogs—Otterburn Rufus repeated his New York and Montreal victories. Mickey, second, was in Montreal, and Red Coat, third, is well known. Red Barney, Res, is a trifle strong in skull but otherwise good. Bitches—Otterburn Dollie had no trouble winning here. Pitti Sing promises to grow into a good one—quite smart in head and ears and good in body. Judith, a black with a suggestion of tan was as good as any, all but muzzle and eye.

FIELD SPANIELS—Grouse, a very typical and well bred specimen, can win at most shows.

CLUMBER SPANIELS—Lord Chumley has greatly improved since Toronto.

FOX TERRIERS—Wire dogs—Sapperton Turk by his grand coat, good body, legs and feet and correct size, won comfortably from Aldon Vizier, who shows great quality but is too small and light in body. Bitches—Aldon Sequel, looking well, had a very easy win. Otterburn Contralto, second, is good in body, coat and bone, but just fair in head and ears. Both of these are by Aldon Quæstor. Silver Bee, third, is too old-fashioned. Puppies—Otterburn Contralto, first, closely followed by Dewey, much above the

average in head, ears, front and general style but wrong in coat. Smooth dogs—Norfolk Victorious won all the way. The St. Legnard Type (Geo. Bell's of course) came all the way from Chicago, and a rare Terrier he is in coat, front, neck, shoulders and body; character lacking but head and ears good. Elmwood Varsity, a very smart black headed dog, was third for Mr. Carnew. Bitches—Norfolk Polka won easily in everything but head. Conny, second, is good in body, coat and front, but wont last in head. Puppies—Elmwood varsity first, Conny second, Aldon Warden third, a high quality son of Warren Safeguard and a gentleman all over. Novices—A big class, the winners appearing before.

COLLIES—A large and exceedingly select gathering worthy of a New York show. Woodmansterne Conrad in head, ears, size and quality won easily—greatly improved since Montreal. Stratford Laddie has a long head and a good body, coat and size: he unfortunately can't get his ears up. Benedick, third, does not seem to get any worse, his head is long and level, but age has told on his ear carriage. Callender Bruce, Res, should have been an easy second, as good as any in all but muzzle. Clyde, V.H.C., is good in size, body and coat, but his head and ears are going. Mountaineer Monarch shows lots of quality. Bitches—Logan's Apple Blossom, first, has great size, body coat and bone—at present her ears are fairly good. Sweet Lassie, second, may beat the winner some day—quite good all over. Snow, third, is of exceedingly high quality in head and ears and good otherwise. Kit, Res, was beaten in size but has lots of quality. Novices were mostly repetitions and a rare lot; the same may be said of puppies.

BULL TERRIERS—Dogs—Duke of Wentworth made a lucky win over Newmarket Flyer, who beats him in head, eye and quality. Bayview Bob was in poor condition. Bitches—Wentworth Thelma, well shown, should never have beaten Newmarket Syren, who loses in muzzle only.

PUGS—Ch. Otterburn Treasure was absent. Otterburn Nora, first, shows lots of quality and will always take a lot of beating.

IRISH TERRIERS—It was indeed a pleasure to see Dr. Niven once again exhibiting, and winning too, with Glenarry Oonagh, good all over and rare in coat. Carleton Kitty has a poor head and ears.

Nutcrack Buttons, smartly cropped, is too light in bone. Black Brook Ben might have remained in the land of his birth; his sort of head, ears and eye can hardly improve the breed. Novices—Carleton Kitty first. Sheila second, a son of Boltonwood's Mixer I thought, barring size, the best Irish Terrier exhibited; lots of quality in head and ears, and modern in coat, bone and front.

TERRIERS—Any other variety—Canadian Duchess, the well known black and tan, won easily.

SCOTTISH TERRIERS—The smart little Highland Fling represented the breed well. C. Y. FORD.

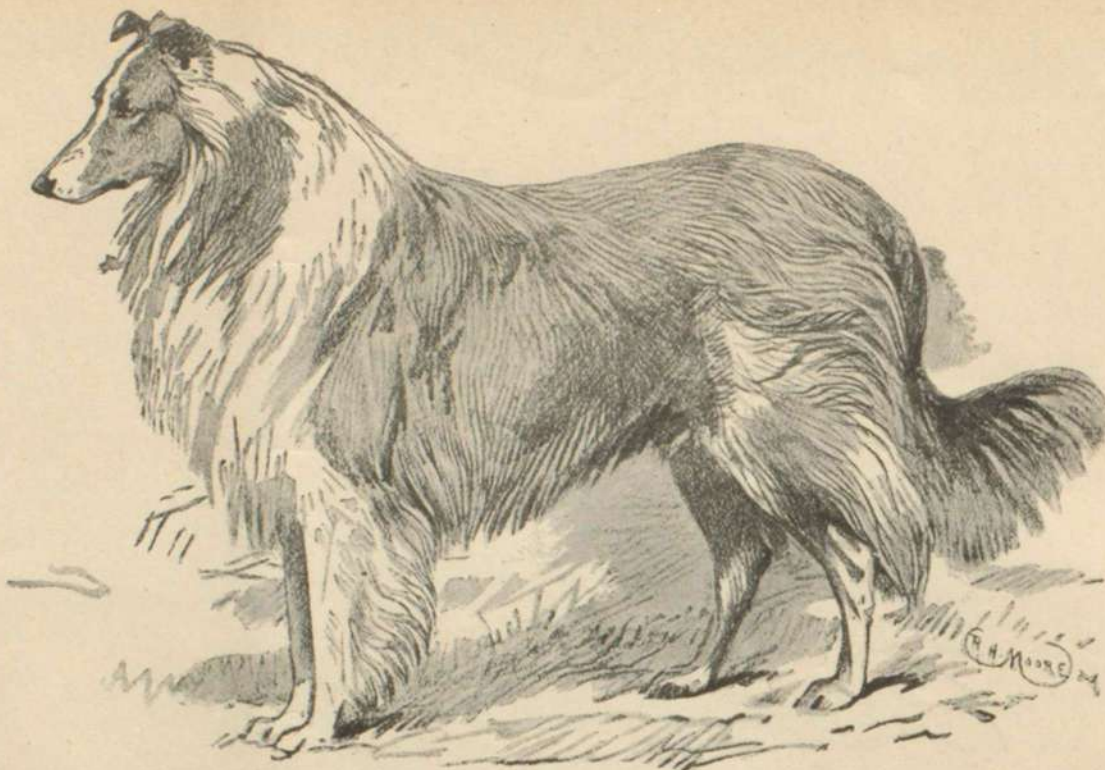

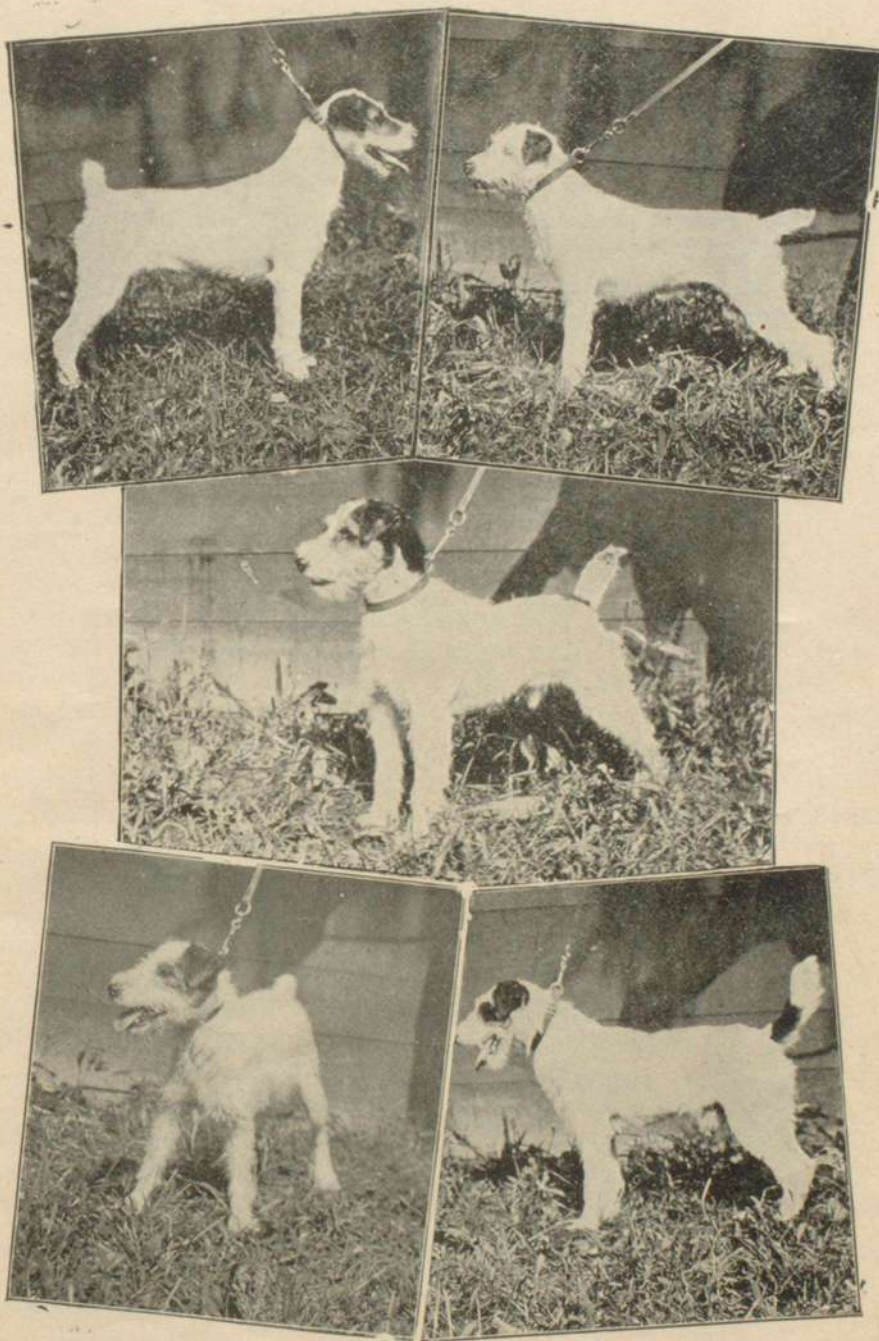

Another thing that I want to say, and I hope many of our old friends will see this and think over it, and that is the feeling of regret that I have at finding so many old members year by year dropping out of the C. K. C. because, possibly, they are not actively interested in breeding or for some other reason, but why should this be? The old Club should grow dearer by old associations, and it seems to me the longer we have been members of it and watched it through its ups and downs, the harder it should be to break away. We newer hands at the helm miss them, for experience counts in dogdom as well as anywhere else, and there is possibly a pang of regret in their own heart when they make the final severance. Now, why could we not have a number of our old members come in this year and take the same interest in the Club they did a few years ago. They would be welcomed back in such a way that would, I am sure, make them feel that even though they had been "away from home" they had not been forgotten.

Now, I hope as I said before they will think over this matter well, and I know if they do they will send in their application right away. I would also like to say that at any time any member has any suggestions to make regarding the general

interests of the Club I would be only too glad to hear from him, and pleased to know that he took interest enough in the Club to write to me.

CANKER IN THE EAR.

LATELY I have had to deal with a case of canker in the ear of one of my dogs, and have had such gratifying success with the remedy I used that I want to present it to your readers.

Besides using it on my own dog I gave it to a friend who had a case in his kennel, and with the same result—a quick cure.

This remedy I saw years ago in the "American Field." It came, I remember, from a medical man, but just now I forget his name, else I would publish it, but anyway, give due credit to the "Field."

Though I forget the exact wording of the receipt, the purport of it is this and as I used it. Wash the ear, gently, in warm soap and water, using a small sponge for the purpose, and then blow into the ear boracic acid, very finely powdered. Three or four applications usually effect a cure.

For my own case I used it as follows: First, I washed the ears as above, then syringed them out gently with a solution of permanganate; then I applied the boracic acid with the aid of a paper tube (made by rolling paper round a lead pencil and fastening with mucilage) in sufficient quantity to cover all sore or ulcerated parts in the ear, and I was more than gratified with the result.

Old time readers of the "Field" may remember this remedy, but I think there are lots of beginners to whom it will be news, and if they have this offensive disease to fight they will find it a Godsend, and will, with me, thank the doctor that gave it to us.

Will any reader of this that tries this cure for so-called canker in the ear, please give to the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE the result of his trial? R.B.

THE BARRIE JUDGE'S REPLY.

EDITOR GAZETTE :

KINDLY allow me space in your paper to give full particulars of the very gentlemanly and sportsmanlike manner I was treated by the Barrie Dog Show Committee. Possibly Dr. Wallwin's friends on hearing all particulars may paralyze their palates on some other person or persons than your humble servant.

When spending my summer holidays in my cottage at Windermere, Muskoka, I received a letter from Mr. Fred Mavor, Secretary of Dog Show, dated August 30th, 1898, telling me that he was requested by the officers of the Central Simcoe Agricultural Society to ask me if I would kindly consent to act as judge on dogs at their coming fair, &c., &c. I did not reply to this letter for some time, being advised by some friends not to act, these friends giving as their reason, that if I did not award the premiums as the exhibitors and committee thought right that it might be made disagreeable for me. These friends words came most true as the sequel will show. In the meantime I received the following letter from Dr. Raikes, of Barrie, one of the committee of management :—

BARRIE, Sept. 7, 1898.

DEAR DOCTOR,

I am instructed by the Secretary of the Central Simcoe Exhibition to request you to be kind enough to judge the dogs at the fair to be held here Sept. 28, 29 and 30. The judging will begin early in the morning of the 29th. I sincerely hope that you will be able to come up and shall be delighted to do all in my power to make your visit a pleasant one. With very kind regards,

DR. NICOL, Cookstown.

I replied that I returned to Cookstown on the 22nd Sept. and that I would be happy to judge the dogs for them. Between this and the dog show I received two post cards, and a letter from the Secretary telling me to be sure to be on hand at 9 a.m. the morning of the 29th. This necessitated my going to Barrie on the evening of the 28th.

In the "Northern Advance" of Oct. 6th appeared an account of the Central Simcoe Fair, also dog show, after saying a few words about dogs it goes on : "The judging was a disappointment to the committee and in most cases exactly contrary to merit. Those in charge of the bench show made the following suggestions : A large space to exhibit, more prominence given to the bench show in posters and advertisements ; a judge or better judges who are competent to award prizes."

Now, I maintain that having or allowing the above to be inserted in the "Advance" was a most dastardly proceeding unbecoming in sportsmen or gentlemen. I also maintain that no treatment is too bad for such men. The position of judge was undesired and unasked by me ; I received nothing for my services ; I am not a professional judge, and keep and exhibit dogs only for my own pleasure. The proper and gentlemanly way would have been, if the judge's judging did not suit the committee, simply not to have asked him to act as judge again, and there would have been an end of it.

With your permission, Mr. Editor, I will briefly reply to Capt. E. G. Bird and Dr. Wallwin. Capt. Bird ends his letter with an apology for rushing into print. Pretty good, after the article that appeared in the "Advance." Capt. Bird asserts that I make several incorrect statements. Capt. Bird is well aware that Mr. Love acted as one of the committee all through the judging, taking the most active part, as he (Capt. Bird) never left the building during the judging, that I am aware of. The Beagle that I wished to withhold the prize from is owned by Mr. Love, and it was Mr. Love who instructed me to award the dog the prize. At the time I did not know who was the owner of the dog. Capt. Bird says in his letter, "doubtless his instructions came from some interested party." I think this needs no comment from me. Capt. Bird says no Mastiff was shown. I assert that a Mastiff was shown—a boy led her in ; I made the remark to him that his dog was very thin. I have the list before me with Mastiff, dog or bitch, marked one. It was also Mr. Love that made the remark, "We do not care a button for the C.K.C. rules." This dispute created rather a fuss with two or three exhibitors. If Capt. Bird did not perceive or hear this latter dispute, I daresay Mr. Scott will give

him all the information desired. Capt. Bird says that in my report I likened the Fox Terrier taking first prize to Mr. A. A. Macdonald's Aldon Boaster. This is not the case; my words are: "The dog winning first in the smooth Fox Terrier class has a good head, with uncommon long, powerful jaws, a head and jaws not unlike A. A. Macdonald's Aldon Boaster." Quite another thing. Capt. Bird writes: "Surely, too, in the second prize dog, it is something new that a dog ought to be disqualified for having a liver-colored head." Now, this is just where Capt. Bird's want of knowledge of dogs comes in. Did I say that this dog ought to be disqualified for having a liver head? What I say is, "The dog winning second prize ought not to have won any prize, but ought to have been disqualified. He has a liver head and a liver nose." No, Capt. Bird, it is not the liver head but the liver nose that disqualifies the dog. A liver head is objectionable in a Fox Terrier, but a cherry or liver nose disqualifies the dog. All judges of the Fox Terrier insist on a black nose. Capt. Bird's terms as applied to the points of dogs I have never heard before—"slovenly, and a tail like a Bologna sausage," are quite new. A good strong tail on a Fox Terrier, I can assure the Captain, is an excellent point, anything approaching a pipe-stem tail being very objectionable.

Capt. Bird again shows his want of knowledge of dog lore, when he requests me to give a few remarks on what I might call the "novice Standard" of Bloodhounds. I will answer Capt. Bird in this way, namely, by asking him if he would be surprised to hear that at the International Dog Show, Toronto, in the years 1896, 1897, and 1898, only four Bloodhounds have been exhibited. I give Capt. Bird credit to understand my meaning without saying any more. The Sussex Spaniel that he speaks about I never saw.

I now come to Dr. Wallwin's letter, which letter is a tissue of incorrect statements, and false quotations of my letter, from first to last. The very second word in this letter is incorrect. Dr. Wallwin says "your September issue," instead of October issue. Does he do this so that interested parties referring to the GAZETTE may not see Mr. Mortimer's very unflattering criticism of his Bloodhound Longworth, which appears in the October number. Two or three lines further on, he says, I write: "One hundred dogs were benched and benched well." My words are:

"About one hundred and ten dogs, including puppies, were benched, and benched well." He wishes to be informed of the meaning of benched well. Well benched when the benches on which the dogs are placed are roomy, kept dry and well looked after. Benched at college and school has quite another meaning, the nature of which, I daresay, Dr. Wallwin does not require to have explained to him. I have already stated that I judged a Mastiff. Dr. Wallwin says I was not present when the Bloodhounds were led out, but a member of the committee informs me he asked to be shown the dog winning first in Toronto; on being pointed out, the judge remarks, "Yes, he is the right color." This statement is false. When I arrived at the show grounds, I had never met with Dr. Wallwin, nor was I aware that there was a Bloodhound in Barrie. Also, I was not aware that a Bloodhound had been exhibited in Toronto this year. I was at Windermere, Muskoka, until the 22nd of September, fishing and sailing, and did not see or read the account of the Toronto Dog Show. Dr. Wallwin writes: "Take, for instance, where he says: Longworth, second, got first at Toronto in September. I cannot say he got first, he was the only entry in his class." Another incorrect statement of Dr. Wallwin's. What I say is: "Longworth, second, got first at Toronto this September. I cannot say he won first as he was the only entry in his class." A very different thing. Any one interested in this controversy can refer to my letter in your October issue, and see whether I am correct or Dr. Wallwin.

Dr. Wallwin, with untold assurance, says that Mr. James Mortimer will have to stand as novice to Dr. Nicol of Cookstown. Mr. Mortimer's criticism of the Bloodhound Longworth is identically similar to my criticism. My criticism reads: "His head is too wide, peak very faulty, little or no wrinkle on forehead." Mr. Mortimer's criticism, as it appeared in the GAZETTE copied from the "American Field": "Bloodhounds do not appear to catch on in the Dominion, Longworth, although sound, being deficient in head properties." This criticism of Longworth by myself and Mr. Mortimer stands in the October GAZETTE, side by side, and are identical, and will stand, in spite of all Dr. Wallwin's incorrect statements and garbling. Dr. Wallwin's statement that he has been made aware of the fact that Dr. Nicol keeps

a copy of his famous letter on hand to show his friends how he showed up the Barrie Dog Show people is a false statement to him. There is not a man that I am acquainted with in Cookstown or neighborhood that takes sufficient interest in a dog either to read the article or listen to its being read.

My reason for stating that the committee of management are novices and know nothing about managing or conducting a dog show, as stated in my letter in the October issue, Dr. Wallwin and Capt. Bird very carefully avoid and are silent on the subject. I judged the Cuban and English Bloodhounds as I would judge an English and an American Foxhound if placed in the same class together. If the American Hound was a better Hound of his type than the English I would award the first prize to him, and consider myself justified in doing so, just as I did with the Bloodhounds at Barrie.

In my criticism of the Foxhounds at Barrie, I write in my letter, in the GAZETTE for October: "The hound winning first prize is a very nice one, well made all round, carrying himself in excellent shape, standing over ground like a thoroughbred horse. Head fairly good, shoulders, chest, loins, quarters, coat and brush much better than average; legs and feet good; a nice short-bodied dog with a short, nice brushed, well carried tail, and not too high a Hound." In the face of the above, Dr. Wallwin writes: "In giving his reasons for his awards, first seems to be 'color,' next the dog with the greatest 'brush on his tail.'" Such an inconsistent statement after the above criticism might be overlooked had a weak, delicate, hysterical woman been guilty of making it, but not when made by a man. Dr. Wallwin says: "Novice denotes the management, also certain standards." This surely is wrong. "Novice—one new in any business, one unskilled, a beginner."—Webster.

Bluff, incorrect statements, and garbling, is but poor argument. Years ago I was pestered by a doctor to go and see a Bloodhound he owned, and to pass my opinion on his points. After a little while I complied with his request. On seeing the dog, I found an animal a cross between a Mastiff and a Bloodhound. I told the man what I considered his dog to be. He immediately disputed my opinion, became angry and then abusive. "Why, he said, 'you have not noticed the only point the dog is deficient in, and that will

debar him from being shown.'" I quietly asked him what point this was. He answered (as well as his pent up anger would allow), "He has some white on chest, feet and tip of his tail." I told him not to let that annoy him, as a small amount of white is permissible on these parts in the Bloodhound.

I have never seen a single instance recorded where a dog from Barrie won a first, second, or third prize, a V.H.C., H.C. or commended card. One would imagine, if they judged by Capt. Bird's and Dr. Wallwin's letters, that the Barrie dogs had been for years sweeping all before them. So, under these circumstances, I hope the Barrie Dog Show Committee will excuse my audacity when I tell them that I do not care one penny piece whether they consider me a judge of dogs, or whether they do not.

I received a letter from a gentleman of Barrie, who can write after his name, "Champion tennis player of Ontario, that is in the hockey champion team of Ontario, and who is an all-round sportsman. He says: "I was very sorry to see the unfair criticism, by the committee, of your judging, that appeared in the "Advance" paper." Without one single exception this is the verdict of every person that has spoken to me on this matter, and the majority have expressed themselves in stronger language.

In conclusion, I leave to the imagination of the public as to what kind of a man this Dr. Wallwin is; a man that because the judge dare criticise one of his dogs unfavorably applies to him a term likening him to dirt, mire, a foul sore, a serpent, etc.

I mention for the benefit of the Barrie Dog Show Committee that it is a judge's privilege to criticise the dogs and management of the show he officiates for.

THE Secretary, Mr. J. D. Kedwell, kindly supplies us with the following notes on the Saturday show held in connection with the Poultry Association. Mr. Stone was greatly pleased with the quality displayed in several classes and augurs great things for the "probable" show to be held in the fall under C. K. C. rules.

A bench show of dogs was held on Saturday, the 17th, in connection with the winter exhibition of the Lambton Poultry and Pet Stock Association. The dogs were benched in the council chamber and although not the most appropriate place in the world answered very well for a first attempt. Sixty-nine entries were out, and amongst them were noticed specimens that are good enough to get there or thereabouts in any company. Mr. Chas. A. Stone, of Toronto, adjudicated upon the merits of all classes in a highly satisfactory manner. Considering that no cash prizes were given the entry was large, and so gratified do the promoters of this affair feel that an up-to-date bench show will likely be held here next fall.

GREYHOUNDS—open—1st, B. S. VanTuyl. ENGLISH SETTERS—open dogs—John Adams' Sport, 1st, is a good upstanding dog, good in bone, legs and feet, rather coarse in head. Robt. Ewing's Mac, 2nd, is a trifle light in eye, poor coat, short in neck, but has good legs, bone and feet. Geo. Parkinson's Prince, 2nd, loses to both in head and general character. Open bitches—F. E. Marcon's Dido III, 1st, and also winner of the special for best Setter in show, is quite a good one, has a grand body, nice head, a trifle flat, good neck, legs and feet. J. Hackett's Bertie loses to winner all over. Puppy dogs—J. B. Dale's Countermark, 1st, is a fine large dog with good legs and feet and any amount of bone, a little heavy in head. Don.

Fraser's Marck Anthony, 2nd, is also a nice bodied dog with good legs and feet, loses to winner in head and is a trifle light in eye. J. B. Dale's Dan, 3rd, is a fine large dog, not shown in condition and is a trifle long coupled. Puppy bitches—F. E. Marcon's Kate Theresa, 1st, is a very fine young bitch showing any amount of Setter character and should be heard of again if she does not grow coarse. Same owner's Fly, 2nd, has a fine body, but is light in eye and loses to winner in head. Don. Fraser's Bang, 3rd, loses to winner in head, but has rather a fair body but is good in bone, legs and feet. POINTERS—Puppy bitches—J. B. Dale's Autumn Queen, 1st, good head, body, well coupled, standing on good legs and feet, but is a trifle small. F. E. Marcon's Queen of Spades, 2nd, loses to winner in body and head, but has good legs, bone and feet. F. E. Marcon's Belle of Koontuck, 3rd, is a trifle light in muzzle and might be better in feet. The above three are all of the same litter and they are very pretty, too. Frank Reilley's black and white dog was alone in the open class. GORDON SETTERS—open—1st D. M. Kennedy. FOX TERRIERS—open dogs (smooth)—1st Frank Reilley, 2nd and 3rd W. G. Fraser. Open bitches (smooth)—1st H. Mann, 2nd Fred Carter. Puppy dogs (smooth)—1st and 2nd F. W. Reynolds, 3rd F. Carter, V.H.C. MR. G. B. BORRADAILE, WINNIPEG, has registered with the C. K. C. the word "Jubilee," both as a kennel name and as a prefix.

THE BOSTON TERRIER.

THIS smart little dog has never found favor in Canada. Perhaps we have been a bit prejudiced against him, the lineage of many of the breed being, to say the least, a trifle "mixed." It is now we are assured, breeding fairly true to type and a Kennel should prove a good investment here apart from any further consideration. Appended will be found the Boston Terrier Club's Standard of points for this dog and in our sheet of plates will be seen a portrait of one of the best of the breed in the Squantum Kennels (Dr. W. G. Kendall, D. D. S., Boston), Shawmut. One of his recent victories was at the Boston Terrier Breeders' Show, where he was placed first in the open class against thirty-four competitors. He also won first limit class and several specials at the same show.

Shawmut weighs 22 pounds, is of rich dark brindle with white markings, very "cobby" body, straight legs, even mouth, large skull and white muzzle and an ideal "screw" tail that alone would be the making of any stud dog. In the ring he is a perfect "shower," trotting around as if he was running the whole show.

THE BOSTON TERRIER STANDARD

The general appearance of the Boston Terrier is that of a smooth, short-coated, compactly-built dog of medium station. The head should indicate a high degree of intelligence, and should be in proportion to the dog's size; the body rather short and well knit, the limbs strong and finely turned, no feature being so strong that the dog appears badly proportioned.

The dog conveys an impression of determination, strength and activity. Style of a high order, and carriage easy and graceful.

SKULL—Broad and flat, without prominent cheeks, and forehead free from wrinkles.

STOP—Well defined but indenture not too deep.

EYES—Wide apart, large and round, neither sunken or too prominent, and in color dark and soft. The outside corner should be on a line with the cheeks as viewed from the front.

EARS—Small and thin, situated as near corners of skull as possible.

MUZZLE—Short, square, wide and deep, without wrinkles. Nose black and wide, with a well defined straight line between nostrils. The jaws broad and square, with short, regular teeth. The chops wide and deep, not pendulous, completely covering the teeth when mouth is closed.

NECK—Of fair length, without throatiness and slightly arched.

BODY—Deep and broad at chest, well ribbed up. Back short and not roached. Loins and quarters strong.

ELBOWS—Standing neither in nor out.

FORE LEGS—Wide apart, straight and well muscled.

HIND LEGS—Straight, quite long from stifle to hock (which should turn neither in nor out), short and straight from hock to pastern. Thighs well muscled. Hocks not too prominent.

FEET—Small, nearly round, and turned neither in nor out. Toes compact and arched.

TAIL—Set on low, short, fine, and tapering, straight or screw, devoid of fringe or coarse hair, and not carried above the horizontal.

COLOR—Any color brindle, evenly marked with white strongly preferred.

MARKINGS—White muzzle, blaze on face, collar, chest and feet.

COAT—Fine in texture, short, bright, and not too hard.

WEIGHT—Light weight class under 23 but not less than 15 pounds. Heavy weight class, 23 to 30 pounds inclusive.

DISQUALIFICATIONS—Docked tail and any artificial means used to deceive the judge.

Mutchmor, an all round fancier, and a man of repute, is pushing things steadily along, and last advices from him say that a membership of two hundred is not too large a number to expect. A meeting of those interested is to be called at once. The Exhibition Association is to be asked to give a show under C.K.C. rules in September, after the Toronto show.

TORONTO SPRING SHOW.

We have frequent enquiries as to whether a show will be held in Toronto this coming spring. We are not yet in a position to say yes, but there is little doubt but that the pleasant and successful effort of last year will be repeated. In fact, we can't do without it.

DR. H. B. NICOL

has been greatly harassed by theft from his kennels the past few months and intends taking drastic measures to bring the offenders to justice. Recently no less than three valuable hunting dogs have been filched. The Doctor tritely adds, "They let my show dogs alone."

RED COAT,

the Terra Cotta Kennels' stud Cocker was being "negotiated" to go to Montreal. We have not been advised if the purchase was settled.

THE CANADIAN FOX TERRIER CLUB

has just had printed in neat pamphlet form their rules, Standard and stakes. Several new stakes are provided for "Produce," "Stud Dog," "St. Leger" and "Derby." Mr. F. W. GO BANG COMES TO AMERICA.

Mr. G. M. Carnochan, portraits of whose dogs appear in this issue, has bought the wire-hair dog, champion of champions, Go Bang, for a price said to be £500. He is by Meersbrook Bristles—Norman Bess, and has won hundreds of first prizes, including two champion cups for the best Fox Terrier, wire or smooth, at the Crystal Palace Show. Go Bang has been insured for one year for the full price paid. The dog will be shipped on the Campania, which is due to arrive just before the New York show.

CHESAPEAKE PEDIGREES.

Mr. Ryan, of Guelph, sold the two Chesapeake Bay Dogs he showed at Toronto last September, to Mr. Borradaile, of Winnipeg, and now is unable to supply complete pedigrees.
