CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, FEBRUARY 15,'99

HE Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club met on February 15th, in Toronto, with the President, Mr. J. G. Kent, in the chair, and worked through a large amount of business.

MINUTES of last meeting, as printed, taken as read.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN :---

It has not been usual to present a detailed report at executive meetings but so much of importance is to come up for your consideration at this meeting that I think it wise to do so.

FINANCES. I am glad to be able to say that we have been enabled to increase the balance accruing from last year by a very substantial sum. The figures are here for your perusal.

MEMBERSHIP. We have to-night a list of 63 new members to elect, the largest number ever proposed at a meeting of the Club. It is a matter of regret, however, that so comparatively few of the old members have yet paid their fees for the current year.

Two hundred and five letters written by your President have been sent out to members, or those who once were members of the Club. This has resulted in much good, though the return has not been as free as was expected. Replies from different locations have brought out some curious enquiries. One man wanted to know what more members were to get than the privileges enumerated on the application blank.

THE STUD BOOK. Some misapprehension appears to have arisen as to this matter. The first volume printed contained the names of sire and dam only, as extended pedigree was not required for registration. Now three generations are asked for and full details will be printed in Vol. III (Vol. II must wait until the Club has sufficient funds to publish it). Vol. III will consist of the registrations received from Sept. 1, 1898, to August 31, 1899, and will be issued as soon after the latter date as the compilation, printing and bind- bitches were amalgamated and one first and one second ing can be consummated. This will be some time before awarded. As there were but two entries, one dog and the end of the year 1899.

free. Failure in the past to issue an annual Stud Book was due to the Club's lack of funds but owing to an arrangement with the publisher of the GAZETTE this trouble has now been overcome.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS. The committee will report to you at this meeting.

SHOW RULES. These are to be corrected and printed. I feel that we should work carefully here. It was suggested to copy, as far as feasible, the rules of the A.K.C. but it appears to me they are as yet far from a solution of the difficulty. I trust whatever is done may be of a permanent character-that changes may in the future be few and well considered.

LISTINGS .- I find it impossible to keep any correct record of "listed" dogs, and it seems to me that of late "listing" has been taking the place of registration, leading to endless trouble in the tracing of pedigrees. Listing was never intended to displace registration and should not be allowed to do so. Some action should be taken to correct this. I agree with Mr. Vredenburgh, the A.K.C. Secretary, who finds the same difficulty that I do, that the listing of a dog should cover only the year in which the entry was made, compelling relisting each subsequent year. Possibly a rule that "no dog eligible for registration should be listed " sounds too drastic, but it is worthy of consideration and discussion.

NEW WESTMINSTER SHOW. I have been unable, after repeated enquiries, to get returns from the secretary of the show held under our rules in New Westminster, B.C., on Oct. 5, 6, 7 and 8, 1898, and would ask for instructions as to how to proceed.

NEW MEMBERS. The following nominations for membership have been received. (See list next page).

SPECIAL PRIZES. The President and myself took the liberty of donating cash specials from the Club funds to the Montreal and Peterboro shows and I have told the Canadian Fox Terrier Club, who have decided to hold a general show in March under our rules, that we would donate them ten dollars. PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Gentlemen :--

I am sure that the report of the Secretary will be received with a great degree of satisfaction.

We will have the pleasure of electing to membership the largest number of applicants (some 63) ever yet proposed at one meeting, and it is, I hope, only the forerunner of still greater things, while our finances, regardless of the fact that we have donated a cash special for every show held under C.K.C. rules during the year, are still flourishing, and our balance on hand is, I think, satisfactory in every way. You will notice in the report that I have written some 205 letters to our various members. This is an affliction that I do not intend to impose on them very often, but I regret that I have not seen better results from some, from others I was more than satisfied and must express my thanks for the interest shown on the whole by our membership, and I hope it will grow and every meeting will find a good list of new members nominated and elected.

The Stud Book, Vol. 2:- One proposition regarding this is that a sinking fund be started and a certain amount laid aside annually until such time as we have sufficient funds to pay the cost of printing. Another suggestion was, that the book in two or three years would be so old that it would be of little practical use, and therefore it would be a waste of money to publish it, but that, instead, the money be expended for wire or other benching, which could be loaned to clubs throughout the country holding shows under our rules. This matter might be discussed to-night with a view to deciding on a plan at a later date.

Listings :- You will notice the Secretary has brought the question up, and I think it is one that will stand filing purposes. looking into, though possibly not acting upon, at this meeting. It certainly does not seem proper that it

should ever take the place altogether of registering, and personally, I think the Secretary of the American Kennel Club has struck the right key in his suggestion to his club.

C.K.C. shows :-- I felt that it would be in the interest of the club if I should pay a visit to as many of the shows held under our rules as possible, and therefore I had the pleasure of being both at Montreal and Peterboro and was delighted to find that there was a strong feeling in favor of keeping the C.K.C. alive, and a promise of taking more active interest in doggy matters in the future, and I hope at no distant date we will have the satisfaction of welcoming both the clubs into the C.K.C. as club members. Upon invitation I paid the Gore Kennel Club a visit on February 3rd, and discussed C.K.C. matters pretty fully with them with good results I hope. It was suggested by them that the rules re clubs joining should be amended so as to give larger clubs a greater representation on the executive upon paying an increased fee. For instance clubs of 50 members or less should join as the present rule reads, but where membership is over 50 they may elect two members to the executive upon doubling the entrance fees and number of members joining. To this I see no objection.

I have been asked to bring up the question of express charges and try to have some scheme devised whereby the express companies should be made to be less unreasonable in their charges, and I would like to see this matter fully discussed and suggestions made in the next issue of the GAZETTE as to how best to grapple with the question. Another member has written regarding "classes" and feels that we have too many classes, and could with profit do away with all but open and challenge.

I would suggest that we have stereotypes of rules governing shows held under C.K.C. made for the purpose of loaning to show committees holding shows under our rules, as the expense of setting up type each time is considerable and really unnecessary, and this, I think, would be appreciated by many of the smaller clubs at any rate. It would also establish a uniform size for catalogues, which would be very handy for

LETTERS FOLLOWING WERE READ.

To the Secretary Canadian Kennel Club, Toronto. Dear Sir-

In the matter of show classification I would be strongly in favor of the following :

Puppy, Novice, Limit and Open classes. Puppy and Novice classes to be as they now stand. Limit to be for all dogs having won less than 4 firsts-same as our now existing open class, excepting that prizes would not count towards any higher honor. The open class being open to all-equivalent to the American "free for all." Eight firsts in this class, four of which are to be won at shows having no less than entries, to entitle the winner to a "champion" certificate. This would make the coveted title far more difficult to attain, and therefore more meritorious. Under our existing classification after a dog has won night. The only suggestions that I have to offer are 4 firsts, entitling him to "challenge" honors, one might say he is comparatively "out of reach," and may become, although only a fair specimen, a champion of record before being defeated. It is of the the end of the C.K.C. year. I do not think there is highest importance that only the "cream of the fancy' should get this honorary prefix. We can hardly make it too difficult to attain. In the less popular breeds there is hardly ever a challenge class provided with classes quite numerous enough. I would like to see the consequence that, when the challenge class is reached, dogs have to remain at home and the show people thereby lose the entries ; whereas, if they were allowed to compete in the "open class" they would Stratford, Feb. 8th, 1899. surely be shown.

This classification strikes me as being more useful when one takes into consideration that it would save prize money to the show people-we must help the smaller shows along, as they tend to increase the interest in dogs, which means more members and a more substantial club, etc.-in this way, that in the less popular breeds an open class could be provided which would draw all the entries, yet would not mean any more prize money, if not less. Take, for instance, our largest show, Toronto, one will find that out of some 20 challenge classes that were provided 12 had but one entry each-meaning a net loss of \$74-one had 2 entries—loss \$4—one had 3 entries—loss \$2—the other 6 not filling. The total loss for the above is \$80 and it might have been some \$36 net more had these classes filled. Challenge wins could be counted towards the

class to be eligible to registration.

I have not been able, owing to pressure of work, to give that careful attention to the by-laws, constitution, etc., of the C.K.C. which would enable me to express an opinion on the whole subject in detail. One rule should, I think however, be made if it is not already in existence, viz.: A rule prohibiting exhibitors from posting in shows any advertisements, any lists of winnings, prize cards, or indeed, anything relating to the animals exhibited prior to the completion of the judging, and at no time prize cards obtained at other shows.


