EXECUTIVE MEETING, MAY 5TH.

PRESIDENT JOHN G. KENT occupied the chair at the Executive meeting held on May 5th. The members were unanimous in the large amount of business done.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT

as follows, was read :

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to lay before you my report on the following matters :

THE LATE PETERBORO SHOW—The dispute regarding the win of the black and tan Terrier Canadian Duchess (class 39) has been settled by the following wire from Mr. Lacy, as has also the error in amalgamating the two Setter classes :

I may add that the prize money due Mr. Wilson on the win of Canadian Duchess has been forwarded to him through the channels of the C.K.C.

Mr. Tilley disputes the award made for special "for best exhibit shown in the ring by a lady."

The letters, catalogue, etc., are here for your consideration. I have sent Mr. Tilley and Mr. Terrill, the show secretary, notices of this meeting.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS—It is absolutely necessary that this matter receive immediate attention. I am being asked for the papers every day.

RE ANNUAL LISTING—Notice of motion and recommendation from open meeting at Toronto are before you. Personally, I strongly favor the annual fee.

EXPRESS RATES—It has been recommended that a petition be sent out. In case you decide to act favorably on the suggestion I have drawn up a rough form for your approval.

RECOGNITION OF WINS—Our very active Vice-President in British Columbia wired me asking if the C.K.C. would enter into a mutual recognition of wins with the Pacific Coast League. After conferring with the President, and on his authority, I wired in reply that we would do so on the understanding that shows in British Columbia were held under our rules. This

has been received with great favor and has resulted in a very material increase in our membership on the Coast, so that I trust there will be no bar to your ratification of the action taken.

The matter of recognizing A.K.C. wins has been recommended and awaits your decision.

NEW MEMBERS—It is with great satisfaction that I am able to again bring up a very substantial list of applications for membership. Rev. J. W. Flinton proposes the names of eleven prominent breeders of the Pacific Coast. I cannot do better than give you the letter from him accompanying the nomination papers.

Dear Sir,—Just got home from the Seattle Show—the most successful one I have attended in this part of the world. The entries numbered 200, and the quality, especially in English Setters, (43 entries) was particularly good. Mr. H. T. Payne, Editor of "Field Sports," judged Setters and Pointers, and Mr. E. Davies, of Dewdney, B. C., all other breeds. Their decisions were favorably received and I heard of no complaints. There were twenty-nine dogs from Victoria and most of them occupied prominent positions in the prize list.

I rejoice to be able to tell you that I succeeded in getting eleven new members for C.K.C.. I enclose money order for \$22 and names on separate paper. I hope you will be able to issue their cards of membership from present date to Aug. 31st, 1900, giving them the benefit of the remaining three months of the present year. If you cannot do that, wait until Aug. 31st, as none of them felt like paying full dues for three months' membership. Amongst the names you will find Dr. D'Evelyn, President P.K.L. ; N. J. On the authority of your telegram and letter I announced that C.K.C. would recognize P.K.L. wins, and I arranged that the Secretary should forward to me a certified list of awards, which I will send you as soon as received.

The P.K.L. favors the holding of B.C. shows under C.K.C. rules, now that there is to be mutual recognition of wins, and when our autumn circuit for B.C. is arranged you will find that C.K.C. rules prevail.

THE MINUTES of last meeting, as published in GAZETTE, were accepted as read.

P. K. L. WINS—Moved by Mr. Gooderham, seconded by Mr. Thomas and carried, that Secretary's action referring to wins made under Pacific Coast League Rules be ratified, we thereby recognizing their past and future wins.

A. K. C. WINS—Considerable discussion ensued on the broaching of this subject. It was finally moved by Mr. Gooderham, seconded by Mr. Fraser, and unanimously carried, that we recognize all A. K. C. wins, past and future.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS—The President, Secretary and Mr. Sweetnam were appointed a committee to see to issuing same in neat shape at once.

ANNUAL LISTING CARRIED—This matter gave rise

to a free discussion of the whole subject. One member was in favor of making the annual fee 50c. It was finally moved by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Dr. Boulton and unanimously carried, that listing fee be 25c. per annum, to expire Dec. 31st of each year.

THE LATE PETERBORO SHOW—Mr. T. J. Tilley protested the award made for the "best exhibit shown in the ring by a lady." Several letters were read from Mr. Tilley, his protest to the Peterboro show committee, the Secretary's reply, etc. The catalogue containing wording of conditions under which special was offered was also put in as evidence. The matter was given careful thought and viewed from all sides. It was moved by Dr. Boulton, seconded by Mr. Fraser and unanimously carried, that according to evidence of catalogue and further evidence before us we are of the opinion that Mr. Tilley is correct in his contention.

EXPRESS RATES—Moved by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Jacobi and carried, that a petition for a reduction of express rates be drawn up and circulated through the GAZETTE for signatures, at a cost of about ten dollars. An extra number will be issued for the use of those who can use them.

It was decided to accept new members from date until Aug. 1st, 1900, at the regular annual fee of \$2. The publisher of GAZETTE to receive 15c. each extra for the additional four months.

The following letter was read:

Victoria, B.C., April 25, 1899.

My Dear Sir,—I see by the GAZETTE received to-day that there is to be a meeting of the C.K.C. Executive on May 5th. I wish I could be present, but it is impossible. However, I accept your invitation to give my views on some of the questions to be brought forward.

And first, on behalf of the fanciers in this part of the world, I wish to enter a vigorous protest against the proposed clause in the Winners Class, "two of which have been won at shows either giving \$500 in cash prizes, or having not less than 400 entries." If that clause is adopted it means a death blow to kennel interests on the Coast, as we, none of us here, would ever be able to own a champion, unless we imported one already possessed of the title—a thing which anybody could do who had money enough. But it is far more creditable and gratifying to produce one for ourselves.

So far as I am aware there has never been a show on the Coast, outside of San Francisco, that can boast of 400 entries, or that has given \$500 in cash prizes. Yet who will say that the quality of our dogs, especially in Setters, Collies, Cocker Spaniels and Fox Terriers, is so very much inferior to the dogs shown in other parts of the Continent. After all, it is the quality and correctness of type that should make a dog worthy of champion honors, rather than the number of its competitors or the amount of cash awarded. Of course I am well aware that where the entries are large, the competition is likely to be keener, and the wins more creditable, but it by no means necessarily follows that a dog that wins first, say at Toronto or New York, is so vastly superior to a dog that wins first at Victoria, or Seattle, where the entries do not

exceed 200. I also know that it is not desirable that a dog should be deemed a "winner" if he is the only one of his variety exhibited. But would not this difficulty be met by a clause reading something like this? "No winners class shall be provided unless the entries in a class number at least six."

I do not wish it for one moment to be thought that I am in favor of easy championships. Let them be made as difficult of attainment as possible. Let the requisite number of wins be as many as you like. But what I maintain is that the limit of 400 entries or \$500 in cash prizes is wrong in principle. You have no right, it seems to me, to say to us, as you practically do, "Because you live on the Western side of the Rockies, where dog shows are infrequent, and the entries not very large, and the prize lists miserably poor, therefore you can have no champion dogs unless you buy them, or unless you go to the trouble and expense of shipping them east, to compete at our larger and wealthier shows."

Far more reasonable and equitable to my way of thinking is the "point" system to be submitted to the A.K.C. committee on rules, referred to on page 71 of the CANADIAN KENNEL GAZETTE, for the A.K.C. are wise enough, from their long experience, to know that small shows are worthy of being fostered, and are willing to allow even the smallest show, one point out of ten required for championship honors.

What I ask on behalf of the dog lovers of the Pacific Coast is, that the proposed clause if it should be adopted, be so amended as not to apply to shows held west of the Rockies (as was done in the old A.K.C. classification), or better still, that the new "ten point plan" to be brought before the A.K.C. receive due consideration by the C.K.C. Executive, when, I fancy, it will be decided to be the best scheme as yet devised.

May I ask you to bring before the Executive the two rules suggested in my letter of March 15th. The first, I think, speaks for itself, and the reasonableness of the second becomes apparent when it is realized that show committees are surely far better qualified to decide as to whether fraud was intended in making wrong entries, than an outside official living 3,000 miles away.

The next matter on which I would like to say a word is the recognition of A.K.C. and P.K.L. wins.

I am strongly in favor of both. The claims of the latter have surely been intensified by my last letter, containing as it did the names of eleven P.K.L. members, applying for membership in C.K.C., and more will follow. If the C.K.C. is wise enough to welcome the P.K.L. and recognise their wins, they will find in them a source of great strength in every way. Of course the mutual recognition of wins becomes of no consequence to us, if the 400 entries and \$500 clause is made to apply to us. We shall then have to be satisfied with P.K.L. championships.

There is another point in this connection to which I wish to call your attention. In the Seattle catalogue which I send you (marked correctly so far as it goes, but the official one has not yet been received), you will find the P.K.L. rules, and will notice that they differ from the new rules to be adopted by C.K.C. Under P.K.L. rules, the Winners Class is practically the old Challenge Class, which I must confess I do not like, as it has a tendency to make championships easily obtained. But what your Executive will have to decide is how can the P.K.L. classification be made to harmonize with that of the C.K.C.

I see that the late New Westminster show is to be discussed. I hope that all C.K.C. requirements have been complied with (President Corbould and Secretary Malins promised me they should be) and that the wins will be recognized, and past misdeeds overlooked. If there is anything more I can do in the matter please let me know.

There is one more suggestion I would like to offer. I do not know what the diplomas issued by the Clubs in the East are like, but here they are far from satisfactory. I am a Fox Terrier man, and do not care to see on the diplomas I receive the head of a St. Bernard or a Bulldog. Is this not a matter that C.K.C. could take up, and perhaps make a little money out of. Why not take the principal breeds at least and design a suitable diploma for each, ornamented say for Fox Terriers with a typical Fox Terrier, and for Collies with a typical Collie, etc., etc., and then the Clubs holding shows under C.K.C. rules, could purchase from the Secretary, official diplomas, as required.

Apologizing for troubling you with so long a letter, and hoping that the matters contained in it will receive fair consideration, Believe me,

SHOW CLASSIFICATION—The following show classification was finally adopted. There is some slight amendment to that submitted at the open meeting :

1. The Puppy Class shall be for all dogs over six months and under twelve months of age, and no entry can be made of one under six months, or whose date of birth is unknown.

2. The Novice Class shall be for all dogs never having won a first prize at any recognized show, wins in the puppy classes excepted.

3. The Limit Class shall be for all dogs never having won four first prizes at any recognized show, wins in the puppy and novice classes excepted.

4. The Open Class shall be for all dogs of any age over six months. No prize winner shall be debarred from competing.

5. The Winners' Class at any show shall be open only to the winners of first prizes at that show, and the winner of four first prizes in this class, two of which have been won at shows either giving \$500 in cash prizes or having not less than 400 entries (in the case of Manitoba and British Columbia, \$300 in cash prizes or 200 entries), will thereby become a champion of record, be so registered by the Canadian Kennel Club, and will, if registered in the Stud Book, be entitled to a Canadian Kennel Club champion certificate. Before awarding "reserve" in this class, the dog or dogs having been placed second to the winner in any of the regular classes must be brought before the judge for competition with the remaining dogs in said Winners' Class. No class-winner can be withdrawn or withheld from competition in the Winners' Class, and no entry fee shall be charged for said competition in this class. A dog that has already won one or more first prizes in the late challenge class shall retain these wins to its credit toward becoming a champion of record, the remaining qualifying wins to be gained in the Winners' Class. The Winners' Class can be divided by sex, provided other classes are also divided by sex.

6. The Miscellaneous Class shall be open to all dogs of established breeds for which no regular class has been provided in the premium list. Entries in this class must specify the breed of the exhibit. Failure to comply with this condition shall disqualify the dog and cancel the award.

Dr. J. S. Niven wrote suggesting the appointment of an efficient man for the management of a Western show circuit who would act for a moderate remuneration. The Committee thought most favorably of the proposal but were unable at the moment to suggest the name of anyone who would act in such a position.

WHAT THE COLLIE CLUB'S PRESIDENT SAYS.

WE extract the following from a letter to the President of the C.K.C. from Mr. Joseph Reid, Montreal, in which some points are brought out that are worthy of notice:

"I am pleased to see you adopt the A.K.C. classification, but think you might have left out the limit class, or perhaps you do not intend to enforce on all small shows the necessity of providing for four classes, i.e., puppy, novice, limit and open. Sometimes I think the three classes would be enough for the treasurer to settle with, and in almost every case the limit and open classes produce the same dogs. Am entirely satisfied with exclusion of American or English or any other country's first winners, many times, from, competing in our novice classes. (Show committees can make their own selection from these classes.—ED.)

The most perplexing question re circuit shows, to my mind, is judges, and I would like to see your Executive take the question up, as I believe the C.K.C. should rule in this matter: That local show committees be compelled to submit to the C.K.C. officials the names of judges for the different classes before finally appointing them, as while the Standard of rules governing a show may be all right, according to the C.K.C., the committee may often err in the selection of a judge, and exhibitors from a distance would feel confident if the judge had to be approved by the C.K.C. In circuit shows judges should not be repeats.

The second spring show of the Canadian Collie Club will be held in Logan's Park, Montreal, on the 24th of this month. A show of exceptionally grand Collies is ensured. Mr. H. B. Hungerford, of Belleville, Ont., is bringing his best blood for competition; also Mr. R. G. Steacy, of Brockville, Ont., will be in evidence with three. Mr. John Cumming, one of Canada's most enthusiastic breeders and fanciers, will be a strong exhibitor with about fifteen dogs, from his Craikstone Kennels. Auchcairnie Kennels will be

represented by Auchcairnie Hieland King and Auchcairnie Patti. The President, Mr. Reid, is showing, among others, Apple Blossom (by Auchcairnie Gun), winner of ten first prizes, including a cup for the best Collie in the Montreal December show, 1898.

Mr. H. L. Jeffrey has acquired an interest in Mr. Reeves' kennel of Collies and all except Benedick will in future be located in Stratford. Mr. Reeve finds he has not sufficient time to devote to such an extensive kennel, hence this step. Change of business announcement will be found elsewhere.

Mr. E. E. Starr, Montreal, refused a most tempting offer for his sable and white bitch Winsome Josie, from a Melbourne, Australia, fancier, who was greatly taken with her good looks. As she is the particular pet of Mrs. Starr, why, money could not buy her.

We have been asked for our opinion as to the advisability of forming a Collie Club for the West. While desiring to see all breeds fostered by a specialty club, we cannot advise the formation of a second Collie Club. It would but divide the interest in and efforts put forth now for the good of the breed, an end no one looks forward to with pleasure. We know Western breeders have the feeling that the present club is "all east," but is not that rather unsportsmanlike? We feel sure, if approached, that the club's management would be more than willing to help out at our Western shows as far as it lies in their ability to do so.

Mr. Joseph Reid, Montreal, writes us a chatty letter anent the coming "free and easy" to be held by the Canadian Collie Club, of which Mr. Reid is President. He also alludes briefly to the joint stock company being formed for the purpose of holding a fall show. "I am sorry we did not agree to hold our show under C.K.C. rules, but it is only a local small one, Collies only, confined to members of Canadian Collie Club, entry fee twenty-five cents each dog, one class or four classes the same charge, with the exception of the club's medals and any specials we may get. The prizes will be ribbons; the classes are veterans, open, novice, limit, and puppy, of course the limit is only if the C.K.C. adopt that as an established class. We are to try the three judge system, and will make the entry form serve the purpose of a premium list as well. We will print a catalogue and to make sure everyone gets one will distribute them free of charge. Being held in the open grove surrounding my house no admission fee will be charged. Members will bring all their puppies, however young, for exhibition and we expect to make a few sales. Our joint stock company is going along, about the 24th we expect to have the required number of subscribers.

SPANIEL SPARKLE.

THE COCKER SPANIEL.

THE STANDARD ADOPTED BY THE CANADIAN SPORTING SPANIEL CLUB, MAY, 1899.

GENERAL appearance is that of a well built, graceful and active dog showing strength without heaviness. Weight—Bitches, 18 to 24 lbs.; dogs, 20 to 26 lbs.

Head fair length, muzzle cut off short, tapering gradually from eye; not snipy. Skull rising in graceful curve from stop, and with same outline at occiput, the curve line being flatter, but still curving at middle of skull. Head narrowest at eyes, broadest at set on of ears. Stop is marked and a groove runs up skull, gradually becoming less apparent, till lost half way to occiput, thus preventing King Charles domed skull. Jaws level, teeth strong and regular; nostrils sufficiently wide and well developed to ensure the exquisite scenting power of this breed, and always black in color, excepting in liver-colored, and in reds to be dark brown or black, never light-colored or pink; eyes round and moderately full, dark in color; ears lobular, set on low, leather fine; well clothed with long hair, which must be straight or wavy, no curls or ringlets.

Neck sufficiently long to allow the nose to reach the ground easily, muscular, with shoulders sloping. Ribs well sprung, chest of fair width and depth, body well ribbed, short in couplings, loins strong with length from tip of nose to root of tail, twice height at shoulder. Forelegs short, strong and muscular, straight; pasterns straight, short and strong. Hindlegs strong, with well bent stifles, hocks straight and near the ground. Feet of good size, round, turning neither in nor out. Soles with hard, horny pads, with plenty of hair between toes. Coat abundant, soft and glossy, straight or wavy.

Chest, legs and tail well feathered, no topknot nor curly hair on top of head.

Stern—Usually docked; a characteristic stamp of blue blood, should never be cocked over the back or twisted and should always be carried not higher than a direct line with the back.

Color—Black, red, buff, liver, and parti-colored; white feet should disqualify in any specimen of self-color; much-white on breast in solid colors very undesirable.

Awards—Head 5, muzzle 5, eyes 5, ears 5—20; neck 5, shoulders 5—10; ribs 5, back 5, loin 5—15; legs 10, feet 5—15; coat 10, feather 5—15; stern and tail carriage 10; movement, character and general appearance, 15=100.

Penalties—Light eyes 5, undershot 5—10; overshot 5, erect tail carriage 5—10; curled ears 5, curled coat 10—15; knock knees 5, toeing in 5—10; too much white on breast 5=50.

Charlesworth, agent. We make this correction at the request of Major Howden, as he has had enquiries as to whether he still owned the dog and has no intention whatever of parting with him.

We are sorry to announce the death of the very excellent little black and white dog shown at Toronto by Mr. Tomlinson and purchased from him by Mr. Geo. Douglas. Pneumonia was the cause of death.

Mr. Dunn's kennels sent out many winners during the late spring circuit, and Mr. Douglas' dog won pretty well all through, especially so at Pittsburg and Cincinnati.

At Baltimore Mr. Douglas' Black Duke Jr. won first open class and at the same time attained his championship.

Speculator, whose demise is noted above, at Pittsburg won amongst other prizes the Premier Puppy Bowl for best puppy in the show.

Mr. C. Y. Ford has sold the red Cocker bitch Otterburn Dollie, first Pet Dog Show, New York, first Peterboro, first Montreal, etc., to Mr. Churchman, Wilmington, Delaware.

Dr. G. L. Milne, Victoria, B.C., who on his previ-

ous visit to the East, took back with him a red Cocker dog from Mr. Twigg's kennel, has been down again and this time no less than five have "gone West." Included in the lot is a very good Premier dog, a black, from Mr. R. W. Boyle, and one from Mr. Farewell. The other three, we understand, are from Mr. Dunne.

The meeting of the Executive of the Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club on May 5th was well attended. Besides the local members, Mr. H. Parker Thomas journeyed up from Belleville to attend this meeting as well as that of the C.K.C. Mr. George Douglas came down from Woodstock and Mr. McDonald from Hamilton. The constitution and by-laws were adopted and will at once be printed and circulated.

In addition to the Cocker Standard printed in this department, which it will be seen is somewhat different from any existing, the English Standards for Field, Clumber and Irish Water Spaniels, were adopted. The officers show a commendable degree of activity, and the Club should have a useful existence.

TO JUDGE BY SCORE CARD.

EDITOR GAZETTE.

THE ranks of fanciers are continually being recruited from amateur sources, and as a member of this fraternity I would like to say a word or two about judging.

Suppose an amateur purchases a dog; a fair specimen whether a prize winner or not. When shown, the dog stands third in a good class. The exhibitor does not know how near his dog came to those above him. This, a system of score-card judging would remedy. Some judges take pleasure in letting novices know the merits and demerits of their dogs, but other judges are quite unapproachable, except to the favored few who are already well posted.

Again, a novice may have a dog for which he has paid a long figure, and he is unable to win with him, but if the dog were scored he would be able at a glance to see where the defects are and act accordingly in breeding. It is often a puzzle to a beginner to see his dog beaten by one he has previously beaten. There

are always knowing persons around a dog show, not usually any better informed than the novice himself, who volunteer their opinion, which is generally, I am sorry to say, taken as gospel. If he has his dog's score-card, then he would have reliable and official information as a guide.

Could we not have one show a year under the score-card system with judges who are recognized authorities?

It is said that comparison judging is preferred in poultry, but the cases differ. The average excellence of fowls is far ahead of dogs seen at shows. This superiority in poultry, I believe, has been the outcome of score-card judging. When we get up to the high Standards in our dog shows, which we see at poultry shows, then we can drop the score-card if desired.

If shows and clubs aim to get the support of the dog loving public, they must do something to foster the amateur interest, for if he has to learn simple facts by experience, not one in one hundred will have the necessary patience, and he will rapidly lose all interest.

Again, there is no danger of judges jumping from one type to another in the awards, for the judge's reputation would be at stake, and chances of further opportunities would be increased or lessened according to the ability showed.

This is the way to school up a set of Canadian judges, which everyone advocates so strongly now. Let us try the

He adds: "I have just completed a new kennel, 12 feet square, double boarded, tar felt, shingles, and put up in sections. Will use this little house for a brood house. I have two bitches in whelp to a New York winner and expect something pretty good. You will remember I had five pups by Ch. Young Phenomen, well, four of them died and I have a red bitch pup left out of that litter, which will be bred to the best in the land when she comes in season. One of the first mentioned bitches is the dam of Ochre, that little red that won a couple of firsts and specials at the Toronto Spring Show, 1898, also two firsts at Braintree, Mass., '98, and second and third at Boston, Mass., 1899. The stud dog I used is of the finest imported stock. The other bitch mentioned is a litter sister of Mr. Johnson's Vera."

MR. GEORGE BELL

is again back in Toronto, probably to stay. We met him the other day, attached to a Fox Terrier, by the usual apparatus.

VACCINATION FOR DISTEMPER

HAS often been attempted, and Masters of Hounds have tried the experiment, some having great faith in it as a preventive. We have none; as it frequently fails to take successfully, and, when it does take, we have observed in many cases that it has failed to mitigate the severity of the symptoms in the slightest degree. We, therefore, recommend our readers to spare themselves the trouble and expense of having their favorites unnecessarily annoyed.

Inoculation is a totally different thing, being the direct transference of distemper virus from a diseased to a healthy animal, and this is sometimes done so as to get all the youngsters in a kennel through the disease at once. Each must judge for himself as to the advisability of this course. We do not advise it, because many dogs go through life and never have this disease at all. There are at present investigations being made by scientists with the object of cultivating the poison which causes distemper, and reducing its strength, so that by inoculating dogs with this weakened or attenuated virus, they may be given the disease in a very mild form and be thereby made safe against dangerous attacks.

Great things are also expected from the use of diphtheria antitoxin, and we ourselves, with the assistance and under the direction of Dr. T. G. Sherwood, M.R.C.V.S., have been conducting a number of experiments for some time past with very encouraging results. Administered in the early stages of the disease, it would almost seem to insure immunity.

It is a very common error to take dogs recovering from distemper out for exercise before they are strong enough to bear it, by which a very dangerous relapse is often caused. A dog should not be taken out until all symptoms of the disease have disappeared and the temperature has been normal for at least ten days.

The dog's freedom should be limited to gentle exercise, and that only in genial weather, until the strength is re-established. Our Tonic, of course, should not be given during the active stages of the disease.—Spratts' "The Common Sense of Dog Doctoring."

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

THE Bull Terrier is, of course, a dog on totally different lines to his original part progenitor, the Bulldog, in fact, almost the opposite in everything. Head in this breed is a great feature. In a puppy those with the longest and most level heads and smallest eyes, would be the ones to select.

Body, etc., is a secondary consideration; shortness of body and tail, which latter property should be fine, are the points to choose for. Forelegs should be straight, ears small, their carriage being left to luck. Since "cropping" was abolished the ear question has been a theme of great controversy amongst Bull Terrier breeders, and the style of ear is still an unsettled question. Previously, when cropping was in full swing, the big, coarse ear, with a strong cartilage, was the best sort of ear for cropping, since it was more certain of "getting up." Hence the ear was purposely allowed to run riot on this account.

This being so, most Bull Terriers born of cropped parents inherit the once desirable, but now objectionable form of ear, and for a time a sort of semi-erect ear, the legacy of the cropping days, is most favored. This, however, is only an emergency pattern of ear, and as the ear is now being cared for, will, in course of time, have to give way to a small, drop ear, which is the ideal and aim of all breeders. Light eyes, coarse or ring tails, and short heads, or those which give any indication of developing cheekiness, should be discarded.

The white English Terrier is a very near relative to the Bull Terrier, and so far as puppies go, almost the same identical traits are required throughout. There is one exception, however, and this is rather an important one, viz., instead of choosing the biggest puppies, which would be a safe rule to follow in the case of Bull Terriers, the opposite of this should be observed in the case of white English Terriers, the "least" puppies being the likeliest to turn out the best, except, of course, the out and out ricklings.

We now come to a very popular, perhaps the most popular of all the Terrier varieties, viz., the Fox Terrier.

Before offering a few hints to our readers on how to select the best puppies in a litter of either variety, we will essay to explain the true meaning of two words, which are more or less applied to most breeds, but more often to Fox Terriers, and which we know to be somewhat mystical in the minds of many novices. We refer to the terms "expression" and "character."

Before explaining the precise meaning of these terms in connection with this breed, we ought first to state that in all breeds an ideal has been set up, and Standards of "points" have been laid down which describe in detail the various points and properties that are calculated to produce that ideal specimen in the aggregate.

Every breed has its special features and its "character," but "character" as revealed in one breed is not the same as is found in another. "Character" and "type" are almost synonymous terms. What we mean is this: The characteristic features of a modern Field Spaniel, which compose its "character" as a whole, are length of body, shortness of leg, and flatness of coat. On the other hand, the principal features or characteristics of an Irish Water Spaniel, which likewise go to constitute its "character," are shortness of body, moderate length of leg, and a long curly coat, with, of course, other minor details in each case, which contribute to their "character" as a whole.

"Expression" is a part of "character," and is much more important in some breeds than others, to some extent varying in all. In a Greyhound "expression" is nothing; in a Fox Terrier it is everything. The expression required in a Sporting Spaniel differs somewhat in each variety of the same family. For instance, in a Field Spaniel a dark eye, with a soft pellucid expression, is wanted. In an Irish Water Spaniel, the eye is lighter, more wicked-looking, showing more determination, yet equal intelligence.—"Our Dogs."

WALTER P. ANDERSON HEAVILY
FINED FOR TAKING A DOG.

The "Hamilton Times" of April 28th reports an interesting legal dog case as follows: "Magistrate Jelfs was on the bench this morning for about two hours, hearing evidence in the case of Walter P. Anderson, Jarvis, who was charged with temporarily depriving Alfred Baker, Poulette Street, of his dog. The evidence showed that Anderson wrote to Baker, asking him for the services of his dog for "mating" purposes. Baker did not reply to the letter and Anderson came to the city and went to Baker's house. Baker was not present and Anderson took the dog to Douglas' wood yard and kept it there from Saturday till Sunday. Baker learned where the dog was and took it home. The dog was seen in Douglas' yard again on Monday afternoon, and when Anderson left for home that night he took it with him. When he arrived in Jarvis he sent a post card to Mr. Douglas, asking him to tell Mr. Baker that he would send the dog back in two or three days. In the meantime Baker swore out an information against Anderson, and three days later a Jarvis constable took possession of it. Mr. Baker valued the canine at \$35, and said he would not have allowed Anderson to have the services of it. Anderson was found guilty and fined \$20 and all costs. The costs amounted to about \$20 also. He settled. The alternative was two months in jail. Anderson says he will appeal the case to the County Court sittings in June.

This is a little different to the decision of a Toronto Magistrate who recently awarded a complainant the magnificent sum of two cents for the loss of a canine.
