

But still his bad luck was not over, for he lost his bitch from distemper. But he was not to be outdone, and so bought two more Setter bitches from Mr. Dunbar and a brood Fox Terrier bitch from me, and informs us that we may look out for him in the near future.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

The expression required in both varieties of the Fox Terrier is the same. The eye should be dark, but must not be too small, or else it becomes too cruel looking, and causes the expression to partake of the Bull Terrier, which is altogether wrong. On the other hand, if the eye be too large, the keenness and intelligence of expression required and, to that extent, lost, since a large eye denotes a want of quick intelligence. The set-in of the eye, too, has much to do with the expression. If the eyes are set in too wide, the true expression is an impossibility, as it is, if the dog is devoid of stop, that is, has a very level head, with little or no indentation immediately below the temples.

This is one definition of the details which go to give a Fox Terrier the true and correct expression, and expression in its turn is one of the details which constitute character.

Another important factor is the dog's coat. If the coat in a smooth is too short, it takes away from the true character, giving the dog, again, a Bull Terrier-like appearance. The top and set-on of stern of a Fox Terrier has a great deal to do with its character. A short back and hound-like set-on and carriage of stern, which should be a decent length, contribute largely to, just as a long back and short back detract from, the desired character.

The limbs of a Fox Terrier have little to do with his character. A dog, of either variety, may not be quite true in front, and a bit cow-hocked behind—both serious faults—and yet be very characteristic, or, in other words, possess the true character required. Ears have more to do with character than limbs, since a large ear, carried at the side of the head, would give the dog a somewhat "Beagle" appearance about the head, which would detract from the Terrier character, as would ears too small or thin.

We think we have said sufficient to place the novice, or amateurish portion of our readers, "au fait" with these very important features in the modern show Fox Terrier.

The same points apply in the selection of puppies, to both varieties, except the coat. In both cases a coat harsh to the touch is required, being a little more profuse in a wire-hair, but really there is, as a rule, very little difference at the age at which they leave the dam. A heavily-coated puppy at this age would be one likely to grow too much coat—a sort of dog that would everlastingly require "faking" before he could be exhibited. Such coated dogs are to be avoided. A coat that is going to be soft—which, as a rule, is also too profuse—is indicated most on the top of the head and legs.

The main points to choose for, are shortness of body, hard coat, straightness of forelegs, short feet, a fairly long head, dark eyes, set in as we have described, and ears neither too large nor too small, good bone, clean shoulders.

The size of the puppies to select must be regulated, to some extent, by the size of the parents, and the tendency they have to breed them, if this can be ascertained. The tendency of small brood bitches is to breed dogs either too small or too large, one of their progeny of such, the correct size, being the exception rather than the rule. A roomy brood-bitch is best for all purposes, the puppies of such being likely to grow up to the best size. This is, when full grown, 16 to 18 lbs., half a pound either way mattering little, if the dog is good in most other points.

As regards the "novice" section of the readers of "Our Dogs," for whom this particular series of notes is written, we endeavor as far as possible to base our suggestions either upon some question that has been asked, or else upon the subjects which are always a source of inquiry. Some of these are subjects almost continuous, as, for instance, "distemper"—a trouble that always visits the unfortunate novice. There is no apology needed, therefore, for reverting to this or any similar topic from time to time. If we may begin here with some more remarks on distemper, we should like to point out how necessary it is, before jumping to the conclusion that a dog has got it, to carefully notice whether the symptoms his case presents are those which distinctively point to distemper. Often when a dog has nothing more than a slight cold, his owner begins to treat him for distemper; prompt action is always to be commended, but there

should be some evidence to go upon, and the mere fact of a dog having a cold, or discharge from the nostrils, is not of itself sufficient to indicate distemper.

What then are the symptoms of distemper? Well, in the first place the animal shows evident signs of being "not up to the mark." He is listless and dull about the eyes; he is inclined to shiver now and again, yet seems hot and thirsty; has no appetite for solids, and loses flesh rapidly (which latter is an important sign clearly indicating something serious). Sometimes there is, and sometimes there is not, a cough, but there is usually a more or less severe attack of catarrh. As the disease progresses, various symptoms present themselves, according to the locality of the disease, which usually affects one part of the body more severely, although there are plenty of cases which seem to present all the complications known. An attack of diarrhoea, or alternate purging and constipation, point to what is known as "bowel" distemper; a fit is a sign that the brain is the chief organ affected; an attack of short, quick breathing shows the lungs to be affected. Obviously each of these different phases needs different treatment, and the main thing to be done when several are present is to determine which to treat first, as being most serious.

The symptoms which are most dangerous, and as such need earliest attention, are fits, kidney trouble and difficulty of breathing—each one of which indicates inflammation—the brains, kidneys and lungs respectively being attacked seriously. On the other hand, the most favorable symptom is an eruption; as a rule this is looked upon as a bad sign, and gigantic efforts are made to suppress it. But this is an error; the eruption acts beneficially by unloading the blood of the impurities with which it is charged, and it is only advisable to apply to the skin some simple lotion, such as warm water containing a grain or two of permanganate of potash. This should be sponged on as often as is necessary to keep the skin clear of any discharge. It is a curious coincidence—well, perhaps not curious in view of the explanation above—that very few cases of distemper accompanied by a skin eruption are followed by the much-dreaded "chorea"—a paralysis of the limbs, from which recovery is very difficult, and in many cases quite hopeless.

As we have quite recently given in this column full details as to the medicinal treatment best suited to each of the different phases referred to in the preceding paragraph, there is no need to go through them again; but a few lines on diet, and on the "after-results" of distemper may be useful. A little ordinary common-sense should determine the former; no hard and fast line can be drawn—so much depends upon details. The food must be very light—not calculated to increase feverishness, nor to cause constipation, nor ever to be difficult of digestion. Boiled milk, with a little oatmeal; beef tea or mutton broth; egg and port wine, with milk, and a little extract of malt. The patient will need to have a little at a time, and that little often. If dysentery supervene, arrowroot or corn-flour must be given, with milk and a little port wine or brandy may be added to that. In many cases there occurs the most extreme weakness, and the greatest care is necessary; in fact, in some instances only the most attentive nursing will pull the sufferer through. Should an aperient medicine be needed during a critical period, it may here be mentioned that a little olive oil is best, particularly for small, delicate dogs.

In regard to "after-results," the most to be feared is, of course, "chorea;" but apart from that, there are various forms of weakness, such, for instance, as impaired eyesight, a constantly recurring eczema, or a troublesome liver, which seems to give perpetual trouble to its possessor. These things can be minimized, or at least they can be prevented from being as bad as they otherwise would be, only by careful nursing and by wise management during convalescence. The animal must not be overtaxed when in a weak state; nor on the other hand is it desirable to keep him from enjoying the tonic effects of fresh air as soon as possible. Cod liver oil and Parish's Food ought to be given—a small dose three times a day, which is much more rational than to give one large dose once a day. Mild—very mild—aperient doses may be given advantageously when the dog has got over the main attack; and ordinary quinine pills make an excellent "pick-up," as is also syrup of hypophosphites (what is known to chemists as "Fellow's syrup"). We hope to deal further with these matters in a few weeks' time.

SPANIEL SPARKLE.

FIELD SPANIEL STANDARD.

ADOPTED BY THE CANADIAN SPORTING SPANIEL CLUB.

GENERAL APPEARANCE.— Considerably larger, heavier, and stronger in build than the "Cocker;" the modern "Springer" is more active and animated than the "Clumber," and has little of the sober sedateness characteristic of the latter. He should exhibit courage and determination in his carriage and action as well as liveliness of temperament, though not in this respect to the same restless degree generally possessed by the "Cocker." His conformation should be long and low, more so than the "Cocker."

Intelligence, obedience, and good nature should be strongly evident. The colors most preferred are solid black or liver, but liver and white, black and white, black and tan, orange, and orange and white are all legitimate Spaniel colors.

HEAD (value 15) long and not too wide, elegant and shapely, and carried gracefully; skull showing clearly cut brows, but without a very pronounced "stop;" occiput distinct and rising considerably above the set on of the ears; muzzle long with well developed nose, not too thick immediately in front of eye and maintaining nearly the same breadth to the point; sufficient flew to give a certain squareness to the muzzle and avoid snipiness or wedginess of face; teeth sound and regular; eyes intelligent in expression and dark, not showing the haw, nor so large as to be prominent or goggle-eyed.

EARS (value 10) should be long and hung low on the skull, lobe shaped and covered with straight or slightly wavy silky feather.

NECK (value 5) long, graceful and free from throatiness, tapering towards the head, not too thick but strongly set into shoulders and brisket.

SHOULDERS AND ARMS (value 10).—The shoulder blades should lie obliquely and with sufficient looseness of attachment to give freedom to the forearms which should be well let down.

LEGS AND FEET (value 15).—The forelegs should be straight, very strong and short; hindlegs should

be well bent at the stifle joint with plenty of muscular power. Feet should be of good size, with thick, well developed pads, not flat or spreading.

BODY AND QUARTERS (value 20) long with well sprung ribs; strong, slightly arching loins, well coupled to the quarters which may drop slightly towards the stern.

COAT AND FEATHER (value 15).—The coat should be as straight and flat as possible, silky in texture, of sufficient denseness to afford good protection to the skin in thorny coverts, and moderately long. The feather should be long and ample, straight or very slightly wavy, heavily fringing the ears, back of forelegs, between the toes and on back quarters.

TAIL (value 10) should be strong and carried not higher than the level of the back.

"UNCLE DICK" DOES NOT LIKE THE NEW COCKER STANDARD.

YOU ask what do your readers think of the change in Cocker weights? Well, for one I think the Standard and weights will produce more baby Cockers and runts than the American Spaniel Club Standard. Why not call it the Non-Sporting Spaniel Club? What would the late lamented Messrs. Kirk, of Toronto, and Mr. Kelly, of Woodstock, think of such a dog as the Standard calls for, and does Mr. Tinsley, of Hamilton, think it would fit his old Busy, or Dr. Niven, of London, think it would fit Frank, Black Bess or Lass O'Breda? The above were Cockers and they could work. Did the men (or women) who made that Standard ever see a twenty pound Cocker work in a black bog, or retrieve ducks? If

they call them sporting dogs let them be able to do their work. Because a few dude judges have put toys and baby Cockers to the front the new beginners think they are the right sort, but these same judges are physically and mentally incapable of working a Cocker a-field.

All breeds of animals produce "cunning little things," as the ladies call them, but unless the human race is degenerating or has degeneracy, they cannot and must not accept with credit or profit to themselves such toddlers and assorted runts with big heads, weak eyes, knotty legs and abnormal ears that one sees on the Cocker benches at the dog shows now-a-days, which is the direct result of incestuous breeding and lack of work.

Head (value 20), "fair length"; muzzle, "cut off short." Better cut the whole head off and put on a Cocker's head, not a Pug's or Mastiff's.

I helped to make the A. S. C. Standard, but it was changed after the committee had all agreed. My draft was as follows, and any old breeder will tell you it is right:

Head—Not so heavy in proportion and not so high in occiput as in the modern Field Spaniel, with a nicely developed muzzle, or jaw, lean but not snipey and yet not so square as in the Clumber and Sussex, but always showing a well developed nose; forehead perfectly smooth, rising, without too much stop, from muzzle into a comparatively wide and well developed skull with plenty of room for brain."

How is a "stern that is docked" a characteristic stamp of blue blood? They had better dock that part also. Laidlaw used to dock so they had no stern, so I suppose his were royal purple blood.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE CANADIAN SPORTING SPANIEL CLUB.

ORGANIZED IN TORONTO, 1899.

ARTICLE I. CONSTITUTION.

Section 1—This Club shall be called the Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1—The object of this Club shall be: To promote the breeding of the various varieties of Sporting Spaniels.

Section 2—To define precisely and publish a definition of the true type of each variety, and to urge the adoption of such types on breeders, judges, dog show committees, etc., as the only recognized and unvarying Standard by which Spaniels are to be judged, and which may in future be uniformly accepted as the sole Standard of excellence in breeding and in awarding prizes of merit to Sporting Spaniels.

Section 3—To do all in its power to protect and advance the interest of Sporting Spaniels by offering prizes supporting certain shows, encouraging the development of working qualities and taking any other steps that may be deemed advisable.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1.—The membership of this Club shall consist of the present members in good standing and such other members as may be hereafter elected.

Section 2—Candidates for membership must be personally known to and be proposed and seconded by two members over their own signatures.

Section 3—The entrance fee shall be \$2. The annual dues shall be \$2, payable as provided by the by-laws.

Section 4—The power of electing to membership shall rest with the Executive Committee, majority vote to elect.

ARTICLE IV.

MANAGEMENT.

The officers of the Club shall be Honorary-President, President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of five members, who shall be elected at the annual meeting, to hold office for one year or until their successors are appointed. Three members shall constitute a quorum. Vacancies in the membership of the Executive Committee arising from any cause shall be filled by the Executive Committee until the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

MEETINGS.

Section 1—The annual meetings of this Club shall

be held in April, the time and place to be fixed by the Executive Committee.

Section 2—A special meeting of the Club shall be called by the Executive Committee on the written application of five members in good standing.

Section 3—At all meetings of the Club seven members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI.

DISCIPLINE.

Section 1—The Executive Committee shall have power, by a majority vote of the members present, to suspend any person from membership in this Club who, in the opinion of this Committee, has been guilty of fraudulent or dishonorable practices in connection with bench shows or field trials.

Section 2—No person shall, however, be suspended as aforesaid unless ten days' notice of the charge against him, as well as of a time and place where he may appear in his own defense, shall be served upon him. Notice by registered mail to his last known address to be sufficient service.

Section 3—No member may make the Club a means of private speculation or trade in any way whatever, and if found to have done so, he is liable to expulsion.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1—No addition, alteration or amendment shall be made to this Constitution except by a two thirds vote of the members present, and those voting by mail.

Section 2—A mail vote to be taken on all important questions.

Section 3—At least thirty days notice must be given the Executive, of which notice shall be at once sent to each member of the Club.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section 1—The President shall preside at the meetings of the Club and Executive Committee, appoint two auditors and order meetings of the Committee whenever in his judgment he may deem it necessary.

Section 2—In the absence of the President his duties shall be performed by the Vice-President.

Section 3—The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of each meeting of the Association and Executive Committee, shall have charge of and be responsible for all books and papers, and shall forward to each bench show at which this Club's prizes are offered a correct list of all members entitled to compete for same. He shall have charge of all moneys belonging to the Association, shall pay all bills when properly approved and submit a report thereof to the Committee whenever called upon to do so.

Section 4—The Executive may adopt such rules as

may be necessary for the transaction of the duties of the Committee, provided such rules shall not conflict with anything contained in the By-laws or Constitution of the Club.

ARTICLE II.

PRIZES.

Section 1—It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to endeavor to obtain the adoption of the Club's classifications at all bench shows, and that at such shows as agree to abide by the Standards of the Club, and appoint a judge who has been elected to the Club's list of judges, the Committee shall have full power to offer such of the Club's challenge prizes as they may deem advisable.

Section 2—All prizes offered by this Club shall be known as "Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club Prizes."

ARTICLE III.

JUDGES.

Section 1—A list of gentlemen willing to officiate as judges of Spaniels shall be annually elected by the members of the Club.

Section 2—It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to request a ballot for Club judges from the members of the Club not later than the first day of April in each year. The persons receiving the five highest number of votes shall be declared elected, and, upon their acceptance of the position, their names shall be placed upon the official list by the Secretary.

ARTICLE IV.

DUES.

Section 1—The entrance fee shall be \$2. The annual dues, \$2, which must in every instance accompany application for membership.

Section 2—In event of any applicant being refused admission to membership of this Club by the Executive Committee. The money will be promptly refunded.

Section 3—Provided however, That all persons elected to membership, subsequent to January 1st and prior to April 1st, shall be exempt from payment of dues for such portion of the current fiscal year.

Section 4—Any member in arrears for dues shall not enjoy any of the privileges of membership until his dues are paid.

Section 5—Any member in arrears for six months shall thereby forfeit his membership.

Section 6—Any member in good standing may become a life member upon the payment of \$25.

Section 7—The accounts shall be presented at the annual meeting, duly audited by two auditors.

ARTICLE V.

EXPENSES.

Section 1—All expenses incurred by any officer or any member of the Committee, for or on behalf of this

Club, and on authority of Executive Committee, shall be defrayed out of the fund of the Club.

Section 2—All moneys received from initiation fees shall be used for the purpose of acquiring challenge prizes.

ARTICLE VI.
DISCIPLINE.

Section 1—Any member who has been suspended by the Executive Committee may appeal to the body of the Club at its next meeting, at which time the sentence of suspension may be annulled, ratified, continued, or the suspended member may be expelled from membership by a majority vote of the members present.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1—These By-laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote of the members present and those voting by mail, as provided by the Constitution.

Section II—Thirty days notice must be given of such proposed alteration. Notice of which shall be sent to each member of the Club.

Section 3—All members will be immediately notified of the adoption of any change or addition to the Constitution or By-laws of this Club.

The Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club will offer a prize of \$25 at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition for the best Cocker, any color, never having won a first prize.

It is also the intention of the president, Mr. H. Parker Thomas, to offer a cup, but under what conditions he has not yet decided.
