LOSS BY DEATH—The Club has to chronicle with regret the death of its Patron, Hon. Senator Sanford, and of its Past Vice-President, G. Barclay Bruce. In the demise of the latter your Secretary feels he has lost a personal friend.

EXPRESS PETITION—The petition is now ready for presentation, the response has been liberal and from all sections both of United States and Canada. It is for this Committee to decide further course of action.

STUD BOOK COMMITTEE.—The manuscript for the printing of the 1898-9 Stud Book is ready as far as registrations have been received and they are being written up each day. It is desirable that a Stud Book Committee of men familiar with the different breeds be appointed, so that the publisher may submit the M.S. to them for scrutiny before being put into type.

ANNUAL MEETING—It is for this Committee to decide as to place and time of annual meeting. I would suggest the Wednesday forenoon on the Exhibition grounds, Toronto, if the board room is then available.

CLUB MEDALS.—These medals are being made in England from especially cut dies and will be about two inches in diameter and handsome to a degree. I am

assured by the importers that they will be here in time for the fall shows next month. The Club has been liberal to show committees in the numbers offered. I should like to have engravings made of both sides of medal for use in papers, etc.

PLATES OF SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS have been cast and the Club now owns three sets of six pages each for use in premium lists of shows under our rules. One thousand copies of the new rules in leaflet form have been printed and will be sent to each member with the ballot papers and notice of annual meeting.

OUR FINANCES are in good shape and we hope to end our fiscal year with an increased balance notwithstanding a greatly increased expenditure. It can be said without fear of contradiction that no club existing is doing as much for its members as the Canadian Kennel Club, for such a small fee. We should aim for one thousand members in 1900 and could get them if each individual would work as some have done this past year. The increased number of shows being held under C.K.C. rules is a matter for congratulation and indicates a healthy increase in the interest taken in dogs.

DONATION FROM MR. WILLIAM WADE.—The Club owes a heavy debt of gratitude to Mr. W. Wade, one of our oldest members, for a recent donation of books and records. Mr. Wade has been dispersing his collection of kennel books, etc., and his present to the C.K.C. consists of a large number of show catalogues, many of them dating back for years and valuable as a matter of record; two volumes of the A.K.C.S.B.; and lastly, an entire set of the English Stud Book, up to and including the year 1895. The set consists of twenty-two volumes, Volume I for the years 1859-74 and one volume for each succeeding year. When I state that some six years ago I endeavored to purchase a complete set of these books from the headquarters of the Club in England and found that even at that date many of the volumes could not be procured at any price, being out of print, and others could not be secured except at great expense, I give this Committee some idea of the immense value, both from a monetary point of view and as records, of Mr. Wade's very acceptable donation. I feel that our warmest expression of thanks can but faintly express our appreciation of Mr. Wade's thought and kindness.

We should now procure the volumes issued since 1895 and each year purchase the annual Stud Book as issued, thus keeping the series complete.

OFFICERS.—The constitution of the Club now calls for four Vice-Presidents, but does not state from what section or sections of the Dominion they shall be elected, so that there is a remote possibility of the four, or a majority of the four, being elected from the one province, thus causing an injustice to the other provinces. I would suggest that the rule be made to read "a Vice-President shall be elected from each province and territory of the Dominion." And also, as our membership is growing in the United States, especially on the Pacific Coast, I would advise as an act of courtesy, that one Vice-President be elected to represent that country. My reason for taking this course is to avoid any appearance of the C.K.C. being looked upon as a local and provincial institution when in fact it is our desire to make it truly national; personally I am inclined to go further and say international.

The Club also needs a book case, several files for registrations, etc., and I would suggest that your Secretary be empowered to purchase the necessary fixtures.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

TORONTO'S COMING SHOW.

LAST month we were able to discuss the classification of the various breeds in the prize list of the Industrial's big show, but were unable to get the judicial list in time. In the selection of Professor Wesley Mills the committee have appointed a competent man for Great Danes and Duchshunde, the breeds he is asked to give his opinion upon. Doctor Mills spent much time in studying these breeds while on his recent prolonged visit to Germany. Mr. H. Parker Thomas, the popular president of the Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club, made such a great and good impression in the ring at the spring show of the Canadian Fox Terrier Club that he is bound to be greeted with most cordial support here, and we look to a wonderful entry in his classes. Of Mr. James Mortimer of Hempstead we cannot do better than quote our esteemed Boston contemporary, the "Stock-keeper" who, in the language of the dog critic, says: "'Champion' James Mortimer we have often described before." Mr. Mortimer we believe to be a thoroughly consistent judge, who has the courage of his convictions and well able to fill the difficult role of all-round judge at such a show as Toronto Industrial.

THE PREMIUM LIST.

The more we look through the premium list the more does it convince us of the liberal scale of prizes which are offered for the small entry fee of two dol-

lars. Over two thousand one hundred dollars in hard cash, besides a number of special prizes. As a well-known breeder remarked in this office the other day, at what show on the other side can I win as much money as is put up for competition here at the same small entrance fee? And we feel it our duty, in the interests of all, to emphasize these facts: That this show is not run with the object of making money, and that so long as it will just make "ends meet" the Industrial Exhibition Association will continue to give it support; that breeding interests and the fancy generally in Canada would receive a severe set-back should that support be withdrawn through apathy on the part of fanciers and exhibitors. Mr. Fraser tells us that, although his mailing list was much larger than formerly, the enquiries have been greater from new men from all parts of the Dominion, the Industrial being recognized as the Mecca for all breeders in Canada.

THE CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB

Here again the best of the following breeds will do battle for the coveted medal: Airedale, Irish, Skye, Dandie Dinmont, Bedlington, Scottish, Welsh and Black and Tan Terriers. 7. For the best Fox Terrier. This event should prove interesting. 8. For best Toy in the Show, which will bring the best of the diminutive Pugs, Toy Spaniels and Yorkshire Spaniels into the ring. The Canadian Collie Club and Canadian Sporting Spaniel Club also announce the following specials: The Canadian Collie Club—1. Medal for the best dog

DOG LAW.—WHEN IS A DOG NOT A DOG? WHEN HE IS A PUPPY.

Noticing by a despatch in a local "daily" that Belleville was having some trouble over the interpretation of the law referring to assessment of dogs, we wrote Mr. H. Parker Thomas as to the difficulty. With his usual promptness he at once replies and gives quite a different tone to the court decision. He writes: "Yours with clipping to hand; but clipping is all wrong. Our taxes here on dogs are collectable January 1st and we claimed pups not in existence at that date were not liable to be paid for for that year. Mr. Carnew made a test case of it for a client. The city does not enforce payment until midsummer and endeavored to collect on all pups in existence then. The decision was in our favor. Regarding kennel tax, the decision was that dogs, if bona fide property of a kennel owner, are not liable for any separate tax because out on a walk. We often put a dog out on a run during the hot weather on the outskirts of the town, giving them a change, and this, too, our assessor objected to, but we have it all in good shape now." The latter is a valuable decision and is worth noting by owners of large kennels whose dogs of necessity are frequently "not at home." The kennel tax is an Ontario statute and not controllable by municipalities, as is the tax on individual dogs.

IT WON'T HURT US

to ponder on the following paragraphs from the English "Stock-keeper." England is not by any means the only sinner: "Once more the Peterborough Hound Show has come and gone, and we are happy to chronicle another emphatic success for the best managed and most sporting affair of its kind in the world. At the same time we cannot do otherwise than endorse the observations of our representative

when he again lifts up his voice against the persistent encouragement that is being given to Foxhound character by Harrier judges. But there is not much to be gained by protesting, we fear, after the remarks let fall by Mr. J. T. Gibbons, Master of the Boddington, in the course of his speech at the judges' luncheon yesterday, when he expressed the hope that the Harrier would year by year approach the Foxhound more closely in type, and claimed for Peterborough Show that it had accomplished much in this direction. For our own part we can see no cause for self-congratulation upon that point, and if the existence of Peterborough Hound Show is responsible for the Harrier we see much to deplore in connection with its work. Nor do we believe that the Beagle has much to thank the show for, as very little encouragement, except in isolated instances, is given to the old type, which was quite good enough to provide sport for our fathers, and therefore should not be useless to us. We should much like to have heard what the Earl of Hopetoun had to say about the Beagles at Peterborough, but unfortunately he was called away to Windsor and consequently was not present at the judges' luncheon. For our own part, however, we can only repeat our expressions of regret that the tendency of modern judges' decisions is to encourage a breed of Harriers that have pace enough for foxes and a type of Beagles that are too fast for men on foot to follow, and which are entirely deficient in the points which were treasured by old breeders and sportsmen."

MR. ROSWELL GOLDIE, GUELPH,

has bought from the Windholme Beagle Kennels the imported Beagle Bitch Totterededge Lonely. She has been bred to the well-known Leader, and this mating, the bitch also being a winner, should result in something good.

Dr. Robinson, Toronto, is obliged to distribute his dogs amongst his friends for safe keeping, the authorities objecting to the kennel at the Insane Asylum a decision that we differ with.

Where are the numbers of beautiful Gordons we used to see some years ago? Has the inaptly named "old man's dog" been supplanted by the race horse type?

Adams and have just got her through a severe attack of distemper, although a little lame in the hind leg yet, where we had to open a large abscess which had got to a tremendous size before opened."

Breeders of Setters and Pointers owe it to themselves to see that these classes are well filled, not alone at Toronto, but at all the shows to be held this fall in Canada. When we look back some ten or twelve years at the long string of these handsome dogs on the benches it is sad to contemplate the small entry of the past few years. Why is it? We surely have enough dogs in the country to make a decent display and their owners should not lack in a sporting spirit. All cannot win, up to-day, down to-morrow and vice-versa. Dogs so handsome and so useful should not be so much neglected.

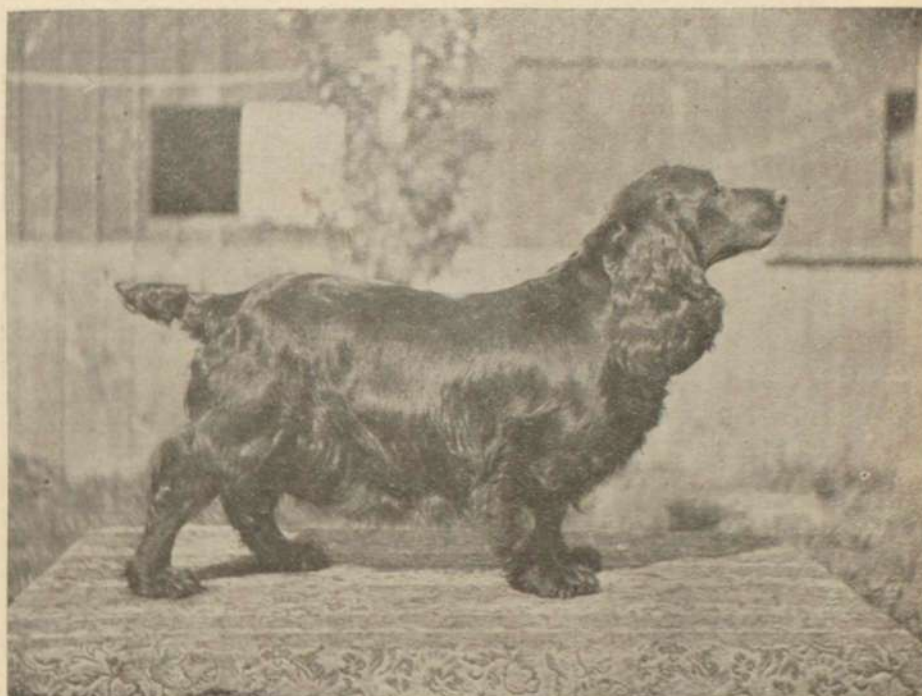
