CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB ANNUAL MEETING.

HELD IN TORONTO, SEPT. 6, 1899

THE President, Mr. Jno. G. Kent, in taking the chair thanked the members present for their attendance and congratulated them on the work and success of the past year, expatiating at length on the Secretary-Treasurer's report.

MINUTES of last meeting, as published, taken as read.

SECRETARY TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING AUGUST 31ST, 1899.

Mr. President and Gentlemen,—I have pleasure in submitting to you my annual report for the past year. I have already made known to you through the reports made at the executive meetings, so much of the business done that it leaves little for me to say now, other than mere routine detail. It has been a year of great progress. You will find that our membership has doubled, the number of registrations has largely increased and the number of shows being held under our rules has never been so great. If I can see any cloud in the horizon it is that the present facilities of the Club will not long be sufficient to carry on the increased business satisfactorily. This is for future thought.

AMONGST THE IMPORTANT ITEMS OF BUSINESS transacted during the year are: 1. Arrangement made to supply GAZETTE and Stud Book to each member. 2. The circulation of petition to express companies, now ready. 3. Manufacture of special dies and medals from same offered at the different shows. 4. The adoption of a new show classification. 5. The purchase of plates of show rules—three sets—for use of show committees. 6. The acceptance of representatives from local clubs to the executive board. 7. The recognition of A.K.C. and P.K.L. wins. 8. The adoption of an annual listing fee.

NOTICE OF MOTION.—Dr. Boulton has given notice of motion to change number and election of Vice-Presidents, so that one may be elected from each Province and Territory in Canada, one from the Eastern States and one from the Western States. The printing of the revised Constitution and Bylaws has been withheld pending your action on this matter.

MEMBERSHIP—We have a membership for the year ending August 31st, '99, of 143. Last year it was 92—two years ago 63. We have made a grand beginning for the 1000 mark we hope to reach by August 31st, 1900, 111 having already paid their fees.

REGISTRATIONS—The total number to date is 5063. The number for the year 397.

RECIPROCAL WINS.

A win in the Puppy Class under C. K. C. Rules shall be equal to a Puppy win P. K. L. A win in the Novice Class under C. K. C. Rules shall be equal to a Novice win P. K. L. All wins of first in the Open and Winners Classes under C. K. C. rules, shall be counted as equivalent to a win of first in the Open Class under P. K. L. Rules; and if a dog has more than four Open and Winners Class wins to his credit, then the excess of four shall be counted as Winners Class wins (P. K. L. Rules) towards his Championship.

e. g. A dog has won 3 firsts in the Open Class and two firsts in the Winners Class (C. K. C. Rules). These five wins are equivalent to five Wins in the Open Class, under P. K. L. Rules, and consequently the dog would be entered in the Winners Class under P. K. L. Rules, with one win in such Class to his credit, requiring only two more wins in such Class to become a Champion.

We suggest for your consideration that a Puppy win under P. K. L. Rules be equivalent to a Puppy win under C. K. C. Rules, A Novice win under P. K. L. Rules be equivalent to a Novice win under C. K. C. Rules. An Open win under P. K. L. Rules be equivalent to an Open win under C. K. C. Rules. A Winners win under P. K. L. Rules be equivalent to a Winners win under C. K. C. Rules. Your Open Class does not advance a dog towards a Championship so that a dog with only 4 Open Wins (P. K. L. Rules) would require to get three Winners Class Wins to become a Champion under C. K. C. Rules. He would also require to get three Winners wins with us.

H. B. Donovan Esq., Sec. Canadian Kennel Club.

Dear Sir,—I was pleased to notice in the papers that the Victoria Kennel Club will hold a bench show in September under C. K. C. Rules. I have received communications from the Seattle and Tacoma Clubs, (P. K. L. Clubs) asking what classes their dogs are eligible for under C. K. C. Rules. When in Seattle last year I had the pleasure of meeting the Rev. Dr. Flinton; after talking with him I advised the P. K. L. to recognise C. K. C. wins and was instrumental in getting our President and the others to join the C. K. C. We desire to work in harmony with all kennel organizations and were very pleased to see that the C. K. C. had decided to recognise our wins. I enclose a reciprocal list of wins which was approved at our last meeting, and a suggested list of wins for your consideration.

As you will see from our Rules (enclosed) a dog with us requires 7 wins to become a Champion. With you he may do it in 3 wins. I think however that our proposal is equally fair to both Canadian and American Dogs.

I should be much obliged if you would bring this matter to the attention of the C. K. C. at your next meeting, as the Northern fanciers will be unable to

make their Victoria entries until this matter is settled.

I regret that I shall be unable to be present at the next meeting of the C. K. C. but I send you my proxy and trust that you will use it as you see fit for the best interests of the "Fancy."

It is proposed to offer quite a number of medals and already the President of the Club, Mr. C. B. McAllister has offered to contribute two. Being a one-day show benching for the dogs will be unnecessary. They will be fastened by chains pegged to the ground and the show will take place in large tents which will be secured for the purpose and erected in the Exhibition grounds. TORONTOS' BIG FALL SHOW.

NOW, what can we say of Toronto? Nothing but good, at any rate.

The entry despite the absence of the professional handlers, Ben. Lewis, Joe. Lewis, Eberhardt etc., made one more than last year, a safe escape. The number of exhibitors showed an increase, and this is a most healthy sign and one we are pleased to see.

Mr. Fraser as superintendant, carried out details in his usual style and this is high praise. He had every item at his fingers end and the show ran like a piece of machinery.

The aisles and benches were kept beautifully clean, enough food was supplied, the attendants were, though over worked, courteous and civil, and the building with the windows on the north side open, was pleasant and sweet. The attendance was about the same as last year, and all in all the show was a pronounced success and the cheapest attraction on the ground.

The judging was a bit too prolonged, Mr. Mortimer not getting through his specials, etc., until Wednesday night. There can be no doubt but that the new classification adds greatly to the work of both the office staff and judges, and a great number of specials had to be decided.

An innovation was the "checking" of crates and hampers and no "lost dogs" was the result.

We fear some delay ensued at the Bridge in the case of part of the exhibit from the United States. This is annoying and Uncle Sam should be called to time, it apparently is not the fault of the Canadian Customs but of the U. S. officials.

Dr. Wesley Mills was the first to enter the judge's ring and was conscientious in his awards, withholding the ribbons where in his judgement the quality was not up to the required Standard. As both Dr. Mills and Mr. Thomas have promised us their criticisms for next issue, we refrain from further remarks.

Mr. Parker Thomas fully justified the warm words of praise that were showered on him at his debut in the spring.

Mr. Mortimer we never saw more painstaking, every dog had a fair chance to look and do his best, in fact some hints were thrown out that just a little

too much time was consumed. His task was an arduous one and he acquitted himself well. Criticism of the dogs we leave to next issue, when a full report will appear.

And now we want to touch on a pleasant feature of the week and that was the chairman, Mr. Geo. H. Gooderham's entertainment of the visitors. On Thursday he gave a lunch in the director's dining room at which we noticed the following: Dr. Wesley Mills, Montreal; J. G. Kent, W. P. Fraser, G. M. Carnochan, New York; C. Y. Ford, of Kingston; James Mortimer, of Hempstead, L. I.; H. W. Lacy, Boston, Mass.; B. W. Rodman, New York; James Lindsay, Montreal; Robert McEwan, Byron; J. J. Lynn, Port Huron; A. A. Macdonald, H. B. Donovan and others.

At 4 o'clock these gentlemen and others were conveyed in royal style to Mr. Gooderham's commodious kennels in an eastern suburb of the city. It is not necessary to say that the gentlemen present took the greatest interest in the magnificently arranged and provided kennels, in which, without the eight or nine in the show, there are some forty-five aristocratically-bred dogs, not including puppies and a splendid brace of Collies, and that subsequently they thoroughly appreciated the entertainment at the club. After dinner at the Country and Hunt Club, a number of speeches were made, all more or less dealing with doggy matters. Mr. Mortimer said that the present show was the strongest ever held in Fox-Terriers, but was

rather weaker than usual in Pointers and Setters. Dr. Mills, who spoke very eloquently and with great knowledge of his subject, was rather severe on the exhibit of Great Danes, splendid types of which he had seen on a recent visit to Germany. He thought when the exhibits did not come up to the Standard the prizes should be withdrawn. Mr. Tyler Morse expressed surprise that Canada, having a pronounced weakness for things English, did not go in more for Bull Dogs.

Both Dr. Mills and Mr. Lindsay referred with regret to the fact that while the Canadian Kennel Club recognized American Kennel Club wins the latter did not recognize Canadian wins. They thought there should be reciprocity, a sentiment that received general approval. Although reflecting on the Great Danes, Dr. Mills acknowledged there was a general improvement in the exhibits. Mr. Carnochan felt before he came here that he would have keen rivalry to the famous Go Bang, and he was doubtful of the result. He had asked a well-known authority to recommend him a book on dogs, and without hesitation that authority had suggested Dr. Wesley Mills' "Book on Dogs." He did not think he had ever seen so exciting a competition in his life as there was at Toronto Exhibition in the championship for the Fox Terrier class. He would give a cup to be considered a permanent challenge trophy to be competed for at Toronto Exhibition bench shows, and would give a silver medal annually to the winner. The cup and medal were to be awarded to the best Fox Terrier in the show.

Mr. J. J. Lynn referred to the manifest improvement in Fox Terriers, and paid a high compliment to Mr. Gooderham for the admirable work he was doing in that direction. He advocated the giving away of bitches of blood in preference to their destruction, as they might produce better than themselves. Mr. Gooderham then announced that he, too, would give a permanent challenge trophy and silver medal for the best Fox Terrier, the competition to be open to all. At the same time he thanked Mr. Carnochan for his generous gift. Mr. Carnochan said he would do his best to further entire reciprocity between the American and Canadian Kennel Clubs. Messrs Rodman, Fred Cox and other gentlemen spoke and after a discussion on the desirability of registering pedigrees

and only admitting pedigreed dogs to shows, the gathering boarded the drag and Mr. Jeffreys cleverly touted them home, a most jolly evening having been spent.

MY business being finished in Zurich, I ran up the Alps to spend Sunday and visit the famous St. Bernard Kennels of Pius Rickenbach of Mount Rigi Staffel. His kennels stand first in Switzerland in the Alps, but am sorry to say his best dogs were away at a fair and I only saw his brood bitches and one of his famous sires, Mentor Von Arth, a fine dog, wonderful head and chest, stands 80 centimetres (32 inches); they don't like high standing dogs here, about from 28 to 30 inches please them best. But they pride themselves in symmetry and also in face, head and expression, and the rich mahogany is very much desired. On markings they don't seem to put much stress when past the head which of course must be large, full and square with the eye dark and must be drooping, of the body it may be solid color or white patched, but the head, the eye, the white blaze and white chest and collar must be. I tried to buy a bitch for 1,000 francs but you might as well offer them 10,000 francs (\$2,000) for the dams they will not part with; could buy a good dog puppy for 250 francs (\$50) but he said they wouldn't stand the trip to America. I should have liked to see his prize dogs, he spoke of one pup 11 months old, 80 centimetres, 32 inches tall, weighing 180 pounds, dark mahogany, but he was away, price 3,000 francs (\$500) but as he will send me his photo, if you care for it I will let you have it. But taking all in all we shouldn't be ashamed of our St. Bernards. Leader Jr. of Watford has a wonderful head and chest, and Trumpeter though short coupled is a good dog, but head we must have and for that as far I have seen Leader is the best for a sire and Zanthia and he should make a wonderful cross. In looking over this neat little booklet published by the Sherwood Kennels we note several items that strike us as of special significance. The first is in general appearance, "small * * neither crippled, cloddy nor clumsy, but weasle like and slender * * *". It is evident from this that a sound active dog is required, a dog quick in action and able to run if necessary.

Classification is given by weight (not height, as misprinted) and there are no less than three divisions i.e., light weight dogs up to 16½ pounds bitches up to 15½ pounds, middle weight dogs from 16½ to 22 pounds, bitches from 15½ to 22 pounds, heavy weight dogs or bitches over 22 pounds. Under the head of serious faults "too low to the ground" is given as an item that will surprise most breeders here.

I was glad to note of the addition of stud record books which Mr. Wade had made, also that they will be completed to date, I think it was something that was needed very much to keep in line with so many imported dogs coming over.
