THE VICTORIA SHOW

UNDER C.K.C. RULES.

THE three days bench show of the Victoria Kennel Club which closed on the night of Saturday Sept. 30th, may pass into history as one of the most successful (outside of San Francisco) ever held on the Pacific Coast. Canadian Kennel Club rules prevailed. It is impossible to say too much in praise of the hard work done by Mr. E. Pferdner who discharged the laborious and very tiresome duties of Secretary and Superintendent in a manner rarely, if ever, equalled. He was at all times on hand, and if only the Victoria Kennel Club can be certain of his invaluable services in the same role, there may be no hesitation in at once beginning the arrangements for the anticipated show in the spring. Nor must the genial and ubiquitous President Mr. Geo. ay be forgotten. His affable manner, energy and farsightedness, impressed everybody most favorably, especially the visitors from the American side of the border, chief amongst whom were Mr. C. G. Gandell, Mr. Julius Redelsheimer (President and Vice-President respectively of the Seattle Kennel Club) Mr. Oscar Jones, Mr. Geo. Tinto of Seattle, and Mr. L. Haaf of the Redwood Cocker Kennels, San Francisco.

One of the great difficulties against which the management had to contend was the usual one, of procuring a suitable building, the Philharmonic Hall being altogether too small. Had the crowd of visitors been as large as was expected, great inconvenience would have been experienced, but rain fell in torrents on Friday and part of Saturday, so a crush was avoided, but of course the gate receipts fell to about half of those in 1897. This was very unfortunate, but it is thought that the gross taking will at any rate be equal to the expenditure.

The entries totalled 211. The benching was of new lumber dressed (which will always be a useful club asset) and the limited space was used to the best advantage. A special cook was engaged to look after the dogs' food, which consisted of boiled meat and vegetables, and soup and bread, and certainly the dogs relished it, better than the usual biscuit.

Dr. S. F. Tolmie and Dr. R. Hamilton acted as Vetinary Surgeons, and each dog had to submit to a very critical examination before being allowed in the building. Their honorary and valued services

were much appreciated.

Mr. Headley Chapman (at one time the owner of the celebrated Plinlimmon) judged St. Bernards, Mastiffs and Newfoundlands, and had not much difficulty in placing the awards. The last two named classes had only one entry each, and they were liberally served with a second. St. Bernards while not very numerous showed off well, some out of the fourteen entries exhibiting much quality, especially Mrs. C. G. Saxe's "Princess Sherberazade," a bitch of fine size, very good hind quarters, good head and muzzle, nice coat and typical expression. Seattle Chief, the winner in open dogs has good size, poor coat, and might move better behind. Mr. E. Pferdner brought out a nice nine months old puppy, already scaling 160 lbs., and if he succeeds in keeping his legs has a future before him. Very little fault can be found with him, except as regards ears, which at present he carries thrown back.

Mr. H. T. Payne, editor of Field Sports, San Francisco, judged all other classes with consummate ability, his impartiality being beyond question. The keenest competition was in English Setters, there being a large number of entries, with not a poor one in the lot. Indeed Mr. Payne who as a connoiseur of the English Setter ranks "facile princeps," stated that at no show on the whole continent, could such a level lot be found, while those receiving v. h. c. (and they were many) were quite equal to those that would get

firsts and seconds in San Francisco.
Irish and Gordon Setters, and
Pointers also made a good showing.
In the latter class Lord Buster was
rather badly treated with a third.

In Collies the competition was principally between the Kennels of of Mr. Geo. Tinto of Seattle and Mr. T. B. McCabe of Victoria. Capital undoubtedly should have been placed over Ganges Fox, being better in head and legs and feet. The Collies as a rule were not in good coat.

Mr. H. E. Padmore of Vancouver, showed a rattling good bull dog in Jorrochs, he had no difficulty in beating Peter Jackson, who is under nine months, and looks like developing into a good one if he

only gets wider in front.

Bull Terriers had two good ones in Bob and Larrie, but Mr. Payne very properly declined to judge the bitches as they were of the wrong color.

In Cockers most of the winning was done by the Redwood Cocker Kennels of San Francisco, who showed among others, Champion Havoc, Dufferin Pastime, Champion Colorado, and Champion Tootsie. Mr. J. W. Creighton of local fame, came in a good second, his dogs as a rule being a trifle snipy in muzzle, and coats having a slight suspicion of curl.

In Fox Terriers Aldon Artist captured the silver cup for best of either sex, and afterwards secured the special for the best Terrier any breed. He has very much improved since his appearance at New York and San Francisco, having filled up in loin-his weak place. To-day he would take a lot of beating anywhere, although he is on the large side. Aldon Radiance is too well known to need any description. Filey Beauty-not nine months oldquite properly won in all her classes, except open. She might be stronger in muzzle, and a shade longer in head, but in neck, shoulders, front, body, legs and feet she is excellent, and has capital hind quarters, and is brimful of character. Filey Flash,

her litter brother, is also a good one, and might have been placed reserve in winners. He is very much after the same style as Beauty, with better muzzle. Warren Sage, outside of being bitchy in head, is a capital sort.

Irish and Scotch Terriers must have been new to the judge, as it was inexcusable to put Dolly Day Dreams over Mixhit, who beats her at every point except coat. Perhaps the judge did not like his slightly dark shadings. He has capital head and ears, good legs and feet, fair coat, and shows lots of character. while the bitch is undershot and has a very poor head. In Scotch Terriers Dinah had certainly no business to be placed over Nipper, who has a capital head and coat, good body and perfect ears. He turns his feet out too much certainly, where Dinah scores, but she loses to him in head and coat. It is a very good thing that these two excellent varieties are being brought to the front, by such an enthusiastic fancier as Mrs. Bradley Dyne, and when her three new bitches arrive from England in whelp to the best of thier kind, there should be some future winners that will exercise a beneficial influence for future breeding.

Mr. J. Redelsheimer showed two very nice Bedlingtons. They might

be better in coat.

The very handsome lot of silver cups and medals were publicly distributed to the successful contestants on the closing night of the show. (For awards see last issue).







A FEW GENERAL IMPRES-SIONS OF TORONTO SHOW.

HE question ever to be asked is, Are we advancing? As compared with five years ago my impressions are briefly as follows:

While Mastiffs are few and weak, St. Bernards are of a better type than formerly, and some of the best are shown by Canadians. Great Danes are not as bad as they once were though still poor.

The exhibition of Fox Hounds is a record one not only for Canada but for America.

Beagles are of a much better type than formerly, but still not equal to the Foxhounds on the whole. Pointers and Setters have, on the whole, declined both in numbers and quality.

The type of the Irish Setter is much improved especially in head. At last the domed skull has been reached.

Spaniels, especially Cockers, are nearer what nature demands in a dog to be used for hunting. But in some of the winners even there is a form of muzzle that is suggestive of the Setter or Field Spaniel rather than the Cocker. This is not in accordance with any standard present or past, and should be eradicated.

Collies have not improved as they should. More judicious breeding and more elimination is called for still.

Bull Terriers are doing fairly well, but there is still room for great improvement.

Irish Terriers are much nearer the general type and size to what they should be than a few years since.

Skyes have improved.

Dachshunds are better, being more even in quality and nearer to

the correct type.

Fox Terriers are wonderfully good. It is as hard to find a poor one now as a good one a few years since. This breed is now in a condition that would be a credit to any country. Most of the winners are of a decidedly sound type. The breeders of this variety of dog deserve unlimited credit for their enterprise, study and perseverance.

In the other terriers and in the toy dogs Canada is still very weak.

The management of the show was excellent, and the superintendent obliging and courteous.

FIELD DOGS.

SETTERS, POINTERS, HOUNDS AND BEAGLES.

TO FOXHOUND ADMIRERS.

HAVE often thought, while perusing the GAZETTE, in quest of doggy lore, Hound news in particular, why it is no one individual or the readers in general, Foxhound fanciers particularly have no information to impart in any shape or form, in reference to their own or their neighbor's Hound. Why is it? Surely they deserve recognition!

The Terriers, Collies, Spaniels, even the little Dachshunds, not omitting the larger breeds, all have their advocates or clubs, who manage to keep those breeds before the public, not only by words, but by actions.

Why should the grand old Foxhound, the only breed of dogs that trace their pedigree back for over one hundred years, be without active admirers?

We fanciers, know the Foxhound

is rapidly coming to the front in Canada. A visit to any of our dog shows will fully convince one as to the substantiation of this fact. have reference here, to the quality, as well as numbers. Although we have the usual nondescript in hundreds, the general average of improvement is very marked. The Foxhounds of half a dozen years ago, with a few exceptions, would fare very badly with the present class of Hounds, both English and American, and speaking metaphorically, the nearer one breeds to the English Foxhound the nearer one is getting to the American Hound.

All this improvement has not come about of its own accord, time, trouble and a great deal of expense, has wrought the change.

It must be a great pleasure to those few individuals who have been, and are to-day, the mainstay of the breed, to feel a great deal is due to their efforts.

The general idea with a great breeders who are not exhibitors, is to breed for head and long ears, and from this cause more particularly than any other, we have the nice Hound to look at but so awfully disappointing to the novice, after he has been induced by some enthusiastic fancier (of some other breed certainly), to exhibit it at the local dog show. Then of course he finds out the good qualities and more particularly the bad, which are so numerous to the judge, that the exhibitor usually comes to one of two conclusions, he either accepts the verdict graciously, feeling he has learned something from comparison, or he thinks that the judges are crazy, and don't know a Foxhound from a short eared Pointer.

I have been through the mill, and I might say right here, that with a few exceptions without a good standard, it is hard for almost the best of judges to give entire satisfaction, the same as in other breeds. However judges and judging are foreign to that which I wish to write about

I had the pleasure of speaking to most of the Foxhound fanciers whom I met, exhibitors and non-exhibitors, at the Industrial exhibition show this September, re a Foxhound Club, and it seemed to all feasible and desirous if it could be got into working order. That's the trouble, the ball has to be started rolling, and it devolves on some one or a few to give it the impetus.

I think the fancy would be pleased to hear from Guelph, that is and has always been a good Hound town, headquarters of Mr. Jack Gibbs, an old and experienced breeder, also Mr. W. H. Williams, Pembroke; Mr. Wm. McEwan Jr., Hull, P.Q.; Mr. Patterson Jr., Barrie; Mr. Fred Habart, Toronto: or any other fancier. The villages, towns and cities of Canada, Ontario particularly, are full of Hound fanciers, what do you say for a Foxhound Club? Let's hear from you, gentlemen. I would like my friend Dr. Robinson's opinion. He has been very unfortunate, through circumstances over which he has had no control and he has had to part with all his Foxhounds, but I know his love for them remains the same, and it may be possible to see him surrounded with his favorites again.

I feel assured the genial editor of the GAZETTE will give us a corner in his interesting journal to air our views and by doing so, help further the interests of the good old Fox-hound.

Any discourtesy by the attendants should have been promptly reported to the Superintendent. It is bad policy to seek to advance one breed by decrying others and "J. J. B." alludes to a private supper, that should not be made a matter of public controversey.—Ed.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

IOW that the sporting season is in full swing it will perhaps be useful if we give some hints in this column upon the different troubles which are met with amongst field dogs. The averaged dog that is shot over does not by any means have an easy time. He not only has to run the risk of stray shots, but he is liable to a good many little injuries caused by thorns and other obstacles which will necessitate proper treatment unless the animal is to become incapacitated. Spaniels especially are liable to ear canker, which is caused often by thorns which penetrate the ear and set up inflammation. On arriving home at night the Spaniel should be carefully examined, and all foreign matter should be removed from his coat; if there is any sign of injury the place should be carefully washed with some antiseptic lotion and a

little suitable ointment be applied afterwards. This ear canker is not infrequently caused by the very cruel practice of pulling the Spaniel by the ears. We need hardly say that such treatment should be strongly discountenanced, as not only is it very painful to the victim, but apart from that it is likely to permanently destroy the dog's hearing, consequently he would be rendered useless for field purposes.

Lung troubles are very often caused by dogs being neglected after a wet day's work in the field. A dog should never be allowed to return home after a day's work in bad weather without being thoroughly dried and groomed before being sent to his kennel. This is especially the case in regard to asthma. The dog is allowed to turn in at the end of a soaking damp day without the least attention. What wonder then if he becomes a victim to asthma or to rheumatism or to some other complaint in consequence? A little time devoted at evening to the wants of the Spaniel will not only keep him free from asthma and other complaints, but will also improve his general appearance, which is reduced to roughness and raggedness by working in hedge bottoms.

The ordinary cough should not be neglected, as it is the most common precursor of asthma; and the dog who begins to cough should not be allowed to do field work nntil he has quite got rid of the complaint. If he be, it is quite certain that he will soon be incapacitated, and it is a wise economy, therefore, if the dog

be valuable, to deprive onself of his services for a short time, instead of running the risk of losing him altogether. A good mixture which will always relieve an ordinary cough in dogs can be made as follows:-Glycerine two parts, oxymel of squills four parts, paregoric elixir one part. To be well shaken. Dose (for a Spaniel), a small teaspoonful when required. Some dogs have a continual cough, which is more in the nature of a stomach cough, often left by distemper. This is best treated by giving stomachics such as rhubarb and ginger, and it must not be confounded with a cough caused by colds or lung disease.

An established case of asthma must be treated by placing the animal in a moist warm atmosphere, which is best managed by transferring him to a room where a bronchitis kettle can be kept steaming. A teaspoonful of strong carbolic acid should be put into the bronchitis kettle before it is set boiling. Medicine similar to the cough medicine named above can be given as often as necessary to afford relief; but we have more faith in the careful keeping up of the moisture than in any medicines. Should the dog appear very feverish (it would be evidenced by great thirst) a little "mindererus spirit" should be obtained, a few drops of which in a little water will act beneficially, as will also a small quantity of the Homoeopathic tincture of aconite. In some cases it may be well to resort to poultices on the front and sides of the chest, or in lieu of poulticing flannels dipped in hot water and sprinkled with a little turpentine may also prove serviceable. It may be as well to add that we are using the word "asthma" in a very broad sense; as a matter of fact it is more likely to be bronchitis in the case of a sporting dog—asthma being really a chronic form of bronchitis caused by oft-repeated attacks rather than by a sudden cold. However, the treatment both for asthma and bronchitis is similar, and we need not differentiate between them here.

COLLIE CHAT.

R. R. S. KELLIE reports that one of his Collie bitches was killed by being run over by the electric cars a few days ago. That makes three in two years, and as he thinks this is a little too much he intends to test the case in court.

Messrs. Bicknell and Whiting, of Buffalo and Darien, N.Y., have bought the imported Collie dog Tartan, winner of third at the late Toronto show. Three good bitches are inmates of this kennel and Tartan will be used as a mate for them.
