

THE POMERANIAN.

A GREATLY increased interest is at present being displayed in the Pomeranian, especially in the United States, where many importations of high class dogs have been made. The "Pom" is most popular in England, and as a ladies' dog is unexcelled, being fairly hardy, sprightly, wise and "jolly."

The following is the standard and description drawn up by the club devoted to the breed:

"Appearance.—The Pomeranian in build and appearance should be a compact, short-coupled dog, well knit in frame. His head and face should be fox-like, with small crect ears that appear sensible to every sound. He should exhibit great intelligence in his expression, docility in his disposition, and activity and bouyancy in his deportment.

"Head.—Somewhat foxy in outline, or wedge-shaped, the skull being slightly flat (although in the Toy varieties the skull may be rather rounder), large in proportion to the muzzle, which should finish rather fine, and be free from lippiness. The teeth should be level, and on no account 'undershot.' The head in its profile may exhibit a little 'stop,' which, however, must not be too pronounced, and the hair on head and face must be smooth or short-coated.

"Eyes.—Should be medium in size, rather oblique in shape, not set too wide apart, bright and dark in color, showing great intelligence and docility of temper.

"Ears.—Should be small, and carried perfectly erect or pricked, like those of a fox, and, like the head, should be covered with soft, short hair. No plucking or trimuing is allowable.

"Nose.—In black, black and tan, or white dogs the nose should be black; in the colored Pomeranians it may often be brown or liver colored, but in all cases the nose must be self, not parti-colored, and never white.

"Neck and Shoulders. — The neck, if anything, should be rather short, well set in, and lion-like, covered with a profuse mane and frill of long, straight, glossy hair, sweeping from the under jaw and covering the whole of the front part of the shoulders and chest as well as flowing on the top part of the shoulders. The shoulders must be tolerably clean and laid well back.

"Body. — The back must be short, and the body compact, being well ribbed up and the barrel well rounded. The chest must be fairly deep and not too wide.

"Legs.—The forelegs must be perfectly straight, of medium length, not such as would be termed either 'leggy' or 'low on leg,' but in due proportion in length and strength to a well-balanced frame, and the forelegs and thighs must be well feathered, the feet small and compact in shape.

"Tail.—The tail is a characteristic of the breed, and should be well twisted right up from the root tightly over the back, or lying flat on the back, slightly on either side, and profusely covered with long hair, spreading out and flowing over the back.

"Coat.—Properly speaking there should be two coats, an under and over coat, and the other a long, perfectly straight and glistening coat, covering the whole of the body, being very abundant round the neck and fore part of the shoulders and chest, where it should form a frill of long, flowing hair, extending over the shoulders as previously described. The hindquarters, like those of the collie, should be similarly clad with long hair or feathering from the top of the rump to the hocks. The hair on the tail must be, as previously described, profuse and flowing over the back.

"Color. - The following colors are admissible: White, black, blue, brown, black and tan, fawn, sable, red and parti-colors. The whites must be quite free from lemon or any color, and the blacks, blues, browns, black and tans, and reds free from white. A few white hairs in any of the self-colors shall not absolutely disqualify, but should carry great weight against a dog. In parti-colored dogs the colors should be evenly distributed on the body. Whole colored dogs with a white foot or feet, leg or legs, are decidedly objectionable, and should be discouraged, and cannot compete as whole colored specimens. In mixed classes, i.e., where whole colored and parti-colored Pomeranians compete together the preference should, if in other pointne, they are equal, be given to the whole colored specimens.

"N.B.—Where classification by weight is made the following scale, the most suitable division, should be adopted by the Show Committees:

"1. Not exceeding 8lb. (Toys.) "2. Exceeding 8lb.

"Where classification by color is made, the following should be adopted:

"I. Black.

"2. White.

"3. Any color other than White or Black."

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mostly in the North, for the past fifty years, though only recently acknowledged as a distinct variety. In the early days of his existence he was known as the Bingley, or Waterside Terrier. The valley of the Aire (in Yorkshire) being the chief centre of his popularity, it was at last decided that he should be called the Airedale or Waterside Terrier.

Birmingham provided him with a class at the National Dog Show in 1883 under this title. The second name, however, was soon dropped, and in 1886 he was given a place in the Stud Book as the Airedale Terrier, by which name he is now universally known.

Of late years he has been most carefully bred, and a high-class Airedale is to-day as perfect a "terrier" as can be found. This was proved when at one of the Oldham shows Rustic Kitty beat several well-known prize-winning Black and Tan Terriers for the special prize given for the best Terrier, Black and Tan or Airedale, in the show. And, again, when in 1891 the Airedale Terriers divided the honor of winning the cup for the best team of Terriers at the Crystal Palace Show, beating Fox, Irish, Scotch and other old-established breeds of Terriers.

The Airedale has come rapidly to the fore of late years, and now, in England, after the Fox Terrier, which comes first in numbers, he certainly appears to divide favoritism with the Irish Terrier. He has his admirers in America and on the continent, and is especially a favorite in Holland and Germany. He owes his popularity to his adaptability to almost every kind of sport.

A capital water dog and retriever, he is a first-rate workman on shore, and when hunting along the banks of a river there are few dogs that can equal him, for his close, wiry jacket enables him to withstand the effects of the wet; whilst, being such a big dog, he is more than a match for any sort of vermin he may fall across.

Rats they will destroy as quick as one can wink, being almost as rapid in their movements as a mongoose; they will hunt rabbits with the zeal of a fox-hound or beagle. tree a coon and kill him when he drops, and to muskrats, water rats and weasels they are sure death. No hole is too deep in the water for them to follow their quarry; for hours they will work indefatigably, and woe betide the object of their search when found. In England, in addition to being used on vermin, they are taught to retrieve ducks, geese and swans, and on account of their size and strength no sea is too rough for them when in persuit of wounded wild fowl. They are also easily broken to gun for covert shooting, and will drive sheep and cattle better than Collies, and when a badger is to be "induced" to come out of his box, the Airedale either brings him out, or is a dead dog.

In point of disposition no dog could be possessed of more qualities that endear him to his owner. He is far from guarrelsome with other dogs, is inclined to shun them when at walk; yet, let another dog dispute his right to advance, he is up and at it in a moment. Then his opponent must look to himself, however big or strong he may be. The Airedale's jaw, of wonderful length and punishing power, soon does its work, and he will die ere he turns tail. At home he is docile in the extreme, fond of children, and a good guardian and

obcdient to a wonderful degree, which, coupled with an intelligence almost human, make him a most enjoyable companion.

The Airedale, moreover, possesses another great recommendation in the eyes of many dog lovers, this being the possession of a very hardy constitution, which causes little trouble to his breeders during the earlier stages of his career; and in this respect he certainly compares favorably with many other varieties. He stands any climate and is now established in India and the northern parts of Europe.

Altogether, he is one of the most useful dogs living and has a personality all his own.

The following are the points laid down by the Airedale Terrier Club in 1892: Long flat head, narrowing slightly to the eve; deep and powerful jaw with tight lips: black nose; small,dark eyes, not prominent; level teeth; long shoulders, sloping well into back; deep chest, but not broad; strong and straight back; perfectly straight legs, plenty of bone; small, round feet; high set-on tail (docked); hard, wiry coat, black or badger grizzle on back; dark markings on cach side of skull; head and legs tan; ears darker shade of tan. Size, dog 40 to 45 pounds; bitch, 35 to 40 pounds.

THE NEW BEAGLE STAN-DARD AND RUNNING RULES ADOPTED BY THE NATIONAL BEAGLE CLUB.

HERE there are so many Beagles bred and used as in Canada it has always been a surprise to us that field trials for this useful little

hound have not been inaugurated. The following standard and running rules just passed by the committee of the National Club are complete and little fault can be found with them.

STANDARD.

Head—The skull should be fairly long, slightly domed at occiput, with cranium broad and full.

Ears.—Ears set on moderately low, long, reaching when drawn out, nearly, if not quite, to the end of the nose; fine in texture, fairly broad—with an almost entire absense of erectile power at their origin—setting close to the head with the forward edge slightly inturning to the cheek—rounded at tip.

Eyes.—Eyes large, set well apart -¬soft and houndlike—expression gentle and pleading; of a brown or hazel color.

Muzzle.—Muzzle of medium length—straight and square cut the stop moderately defined.

Jaws.-Level. Lips free from flaws; nostrils large and open.

Defects .- A very flat skull, nar-

row across the top; excess of dome; eyes small, sharp and terrier like, or prominent and protruding; muzzle long, snipey or cut away decidedly below the eyes, or very short. Roman nosed or upturned, giving a dishface expression. Ears short, set on high or with a tendency to rise above the point of origin.

Neck and Throat.—Neck rising free and light from the shoulders, strong in substance yet not loaded of medium length. The throat clean and free from folds of skin, a slight wrinkle below the angle of the jaw, however, may be allowable.

Defects.—A thick, short, cloddy neck carried on a line with the top of the shoulders. Throat showing dewlap and folds of skin to a degree termed "throatiness."

Shoulders and Chest.—Shoulders sloping, clean, muscular, not heavy or loaded—conveying the idea of freedom of action with activity and strength. Chest deep and broad, but not broad enough to interfere with the free play of the shoulders.

Defects. — Straight, upright shoulders. Chest disproportionately wide or with lack of depth.

Back, Loin and Ribs.—Back short, muscular and strong. Loin broad and slightly arched, and the ribs well sprung, giving abundance of lung room.

Defects.—Very long or swayed or roached back. Flat, marrow loin. Flat ribs.

Fore Legs.—Straight, with plenty of bone in proportion to size of the dog. Pasterns short and straight.

Feet.—Close, round and firm. Pad full and hard.

Defects .- Out at elbows. Knees

knuckled over forward, or bent backward.

Fore legs crooked or dachshundlike.

Feet long open or spreading.

Hips and Thighs.—Strong and well muscled, giving abundance of propelling power.

Stifles strong and well let down. Hocks firm, symetrical and moderately bent.

Feet close and firm.

Defects.—Cow hocks or straight bocks.

Lack of muscle and propelling power.

Open feet.

Tail. — Set moderately high; carried gayly, but not turned forward over the back; with slight curve; short as compared with size of dog; with brush.

Defects.—A long tail. Teapot curve or inclined forward from the root. Rat tail with absense of brush.

Coat.—A close, hard, hound coat of medium length.

Defects.—A short thin coat or of a soft quality.

Height.—Height not to exceed 15 inches; measured across the back at the point of the withers, the dog standing in a natural position, with his fect well under him.

Color.—Any true hound color. General appearance.—A miniature foxhound, solid and big for his inches, with the wear-and-tear look of the dog that can last in the chase and follow his quarry to the death.

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RUNNING RULES.

MANAGEMENT.

Rule 1.—The Field Trials shall be managed by the Field Trial Committee.

The Committee shall appoint a Marshal to carry out their orders.

FIELD TRIAL COMMITTEE.

Rule 2.- The Field trial Committee shall have the power to interpret the running rules of the club and to decide all matters not provided for in them; to refuse any entry they think proper to exclude, and to take final action on any written objection to an entry; to suspend or debar from handling or entering dogs in any field trials of this Club any person who uses abusive language to the Judges or Officers of the Club; or who has been found to the satisfaction of the Field Trial Committee to have conducted himself improperly in any manner in connection with dogs, dog shows or dog trials, or who is a defaulter for either stakes or forfeits in connection with either thereof, or for money due under an arrangement for division of winnings, or for penalties for infraction of rules, or for any payment required by a decision of the Club.

ENTRIES.

Rule 3. Sec. 1.—For all stakes the names pedigrees (so far as known), ages, colors and distinguishing marks of the dogs shall be detailed in writing to the Chairman of the Field Trial Committee at the time of making the entry. Any dog that shall shall be proven not to correspond with the entry, shall be disqualified, and all winnings and entry money shall be forfeited to the Club.

Sec. 2.—All dogs entered in any classes or stakes must be bona-fide property of the nominator at the time of making the entry.

Sec. 3.—The forfeit money must accompany every nomination.

Sec. 4.—Any objection to any entry must be made in writing and must be addressed to the Field Trial Committee.

Sec. 5.—Entries shall be mailed to the Field Trial Committee in sealed printed envelopes (mailed with entry blanks), endorsed Field Trial Entries. All entries so received to be acted upon at a meeting of the Field Trial Committee.

DRAWING AND ORDER OF RUNNING.

Rule 4, Sec. 1.—Dogs shall be drawn by lot. Each dog shall run in the first series as a brace with the dog drawn next in order, but if two dogs owned or handled by

the same person should come together in the first or subsequent series, the second dog so owned shall change place with the first dog not so owned or handled. This change shall be made in the order of running if possible. If not possible then in the reverse order of running. The running together of two such dogs may be permitted when a separation is impossible, but in no other case.

Sec. 2.—In classes for Packs, the Packs shall be drawn by lot, and shall be run separately.

Sec. 3.—The bye dog in any series shall run with a dog selected by the judges or alone as they may direct.

Sec. 4.—As soon as the drawing is completed, the Secretary of the Club shall post in a prominent place the order of running in the first series, together with the time and place of starting.

Rule 5.—After the running of the first series is finished, the judges shall announce which dogs they wish to see run again and order of running them. Discretion is given the judges to run the dogs as often and in what order they think best, until they are satisfied which are the best dogs.

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES.

Rule 6.—The judges shall measure all dogs before the drawing takes place, and shall transfer to the proper class any dog found to be incorrectly entered. The decision of the judges shall be final.

Rule 7.—The judges shall appoint a spokesman from their number, and all orders or information upon any point concerning the heat shall be given by him in a clear and impartial manner so that each handler may have full benefit thereof.

Rule 8.—Should there arise at any time during the running of a heat, questions bearing on the actual running of the dogs and not provided for in these rules, the judges are instructed to use their discretion, and so decide the matter as to give each dog equal opportunities.

Rule 9.—Each heat shall be conducted in the manner best calculated to give the competitors an opportunity to display the qualities under judgment.

Rule 10.—The judges shall give each brace in first series at least thirty (30) minutes, and shall order up the dogs as soon thereafter as they have determined which is the better; but if a dog persistently disobeys his handler, or is lost, the judges may order him up at the end of thirty minutes whether he has been seen on game or not.

Rule 11, Sec. 1.—Trailing game other than announced, if the judges deem the same excusable, shall not be considered a demerit.

Sec. 2.—The judges shall give the dog ample opportunity to discover whether he is on a true trail.

Sec. 3.—The number of times a dog finds shall not necessarily give him the preference, but the judges shall consider the quality of the performance rather than the frequency of the occurrence.

Rule 12.—In order to prevent handlers rushing or unduly exciting the dogs, discretion is given the judges to try each dog of a brace separately on game, the competing dog being kept under restraint.

Rule 13.—If competition is close the judges are requested to give greater credit to the dog that is obedient to the commands of his handler. A dog will be expected to maintain an efficient range throughout a heat and to show hunting sense in his work. Hunting sense is shown by the desire to hunt for game, the selection of likely places to hunt in, the method of hunting the places, the industry in staying out at work, and the skill in handling and trailing the game after it is found.

Rule 14 .- The judges are instructed not to place undue credit on speed, it being the desire of the Club that accuracy in trailing, voice, endurance, starting abilities, style and obedience be the principal points of merit, but nothing in the foregoing shall excuse a dog for pottering, or for failure to leave his handler in hunting his ground. Every dog will be expected to go on when ordered, to cover his ground thoroughly. to obey the commands of his handler, and to show a desire and ability to find game as well as to drive it.

Rule 15.—In the classes for packs, team work, not individual work, shall count. The dogs will be expected to hunt within easy distance of one another, to hark in quickly, and to drive at an even speed well packed.

Rule 16.—The judges shall call to order a handler for making any unnecessary noise, or for any disorderly conduct calculated to interfere in any way with an opponent's dog. In such cases an appeal should be made to the judges, but should the handler of the dog interfered with not ask for protection, it shall be the duty of the judges to call the offending party to order, and see that this rule is at all times strictly enforced. Rule 17.—The judges may announce the winners any time after the second series; provided, the first and second prize winners have run together.

Rule 18.—The judges shall not divide the first prize.

Rule 19.—The judges shall withhold any or all prizes in any class if the dogs are found deficient in merit.

A reserve shall be awarded in each class if the judges consider a dog or bitch worthy of same.

INSTRUCTION TO HANDLERS.

Rule 20. Sec. 1.—Handlers while their dogs are down shall ge together and keep within sight of the judges and each other when possible.

Sec. 2.—Each dog shall be required to hunt throughont a heat, unless ordered up by the judges. When so ordered up the dog shall be kept under restraint.

Rule 21. Sec. 1.—A person selected, when ordered by the judges, shall discharge one barrel of a gun over each dog or brace of dogs while driving. If the dog exhibits signs of gunshyness both barrels shall be discharged over him on the trial. If the dog is thus proved to be gunshy, he shall be debarred from competition in the trials.

Sec. 2.—Handlers must use blank cartridges, and guns must be carried empty.

Rule 22.—A handler may speak or whistle to his dog or work him in any way he may deem proper, if not contrary to the rules of this club, but he shall not make any unnecessary noise or interfere with an opponent's dog in any way.

Rule 23.-If any handler or owner annoys the judges after having been ordered to desist, the judges may order his dog up and out of the stake,, or may impose a fine not exceeding ten (10) dollars.

Rule 24.—Owners and handlers are allowed the privilege of asking the judges for information, or for an explanation that has a direct bearing upon any point at issue. Pending such questions the dogs shall not be under judgment.

Rule 25.—At the commencement of a heat the handlers in the next heat will be notified, and must keep together until their dogs are ordered down. Any dog absent more than twenty (20) minutes when called, shall be debarred at the discretion of the judges.

GENERAL RULES.

Rule 26. Sec. 1.—Dogs afflicted with any contagious disease shall not be permitted on the grounds.

Sec. 2.—Bitches in season shall not be permitted to compete except in classes open to bitches only.

Rule 27.—Castrated dogs and spayed bitches will be debarred from running in these trials, and any dog or bitch proven to have been so run shall forfeit to the club all prizes won and the owner or handler thereof shall be disqualified from further competition in any trial held under the auspices of the National Beagle Club of America.

Rule 28. Sec. 1. — No persons shall be allowed to accompany the judges except guides, the marshal and the handlers of the dogs. The judges may, however, allow others to accompany them as they see fit.

Sec. 2-Persons authorized to

accompany the judges under these rules will not be allowed to converse with the judges on any subject while the dogs are under judgment.

Sec. 3.—The spectators will not be allowed nearer the judges than fifty (50) yards to the rear. The marshal and judges shall strictly enforce this rule.

Rule 20 .- No dog can be withdrawn during the running of a heat except with the consent of the judges. Should a dog be withdrawn without such consent the owner or hander may be barred from further trials, and all prizes won by such owner or handler in the stake may be forfeited to the club. If any dog be withdrawn with the consent of the judges from a stake on the field, or at any time during the holding of the trial, its owner or deputy having authority shall notify, in writing, the secretary or one of the field Trial Committee. If the dog belongs to either or any of those officials, the notice must be handed to one of the others.

Rule 30.—No person shall make any remarks or give any information whatever calculated to affect the action of the handlers or result of the heat. Any person so offending shall be expelled from the grounds and points of merit shall not be allowed any dog whose handler acts upon information imparted by such person, or uses any unfair means whatever. A protest on this point must be made to the judges before the close of the heat, and their decision shall be final.

Rule 31.—An owner, his handler, or his deputy may hunt a dog but it must be one or the other;

and when dogs are down an owner must not interfere with his dog if he has deputed another person to handle and hunt him.

Rule 32.—No shooting shall be done by any person unless directed by the judges. When so done if shall be considered irregular shooting.

Rule 33.—All protests, when practicable, except as heretofore provided, must be made to the secretary of the club, or in case of his absence, to one of the Field Trial Committee, at or before midnight of the date of running the final heat.

TO OWNERS.

The club has these principles, which it desires to express, namely:

That each and every trial is simply a trial in the true sense of the word, and not a competition in which the number of points made by either dog will necessarily count in its favor. The club desires dogs to be shown to the best advantage, and assures the owners that each dog will be given a thorough test, both as to finding and hunting qualities, as the club wishes to have the best dogs placed at the front irrespective of the luck which is supposed to attend competitions of this nature.

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

R HEUMATISM again is very common amongst sporting dogs for the reason stated in a previous paragraph. It is best treated by systematic rubbing of the parts affected by some stimulating linament. Rheumatism properly so called usually affects the hindquarters. When it affects the forequarters it is known

as "kennel lameness." However this may be the dog should have as an internal medicine small doses of iodide of potassium-a drachm disolved in a pint of water, the dose of which for a twenty pound dog would be about two teaspoonfuls, and more in proportion according to the size of the animal; to be given three times a day. Some aperient medicine is also desirable at the same time, and nothing much better could be given than an occasional compound rhubarb 30. 30. pill.

One other complaint is not by any means uncommon among sporting dogs, and that is jaundice. This is a complaint which may be brought on in a number of ways. It is often caused by the animal entering into cold water or it may be due to systematic over-feeding, which causes derangement of the liver, and yet again it may be due to a hearty meal after the dog has gone for a whole day without anything. The symptoms are too well known to need description. The vellow appearance of the eves and lips point at once to liver complaint. The treatment consists in giving occasional doses of pills made with podophyllin and colocynth and in careful attention to diet, which should consist of very light food, such as mutton broth, gruel, etc., avoiding all indigestible solids and giving only light meals at frequent intervals.

Over-showing is one of the chief causes of illness at this time of the year, when shows are in full swing, and we are bound to say that in such cases our sympathies are more with the victim than with his owner. To be sent away from home for several days under even the

best of conditions is a trial to any animal, and in the case of a highlystrung nervous young dog especially it takes a good deal of getting over. A dog to be kept in show condition for a considerable time will need, moreover, a good dose of tonic treatment, which might be done without if the owner would be content to show him only now and again instead of rushing the dog about from Land's End to John o' Groats, as some dogs are which happen to be extra good specimens of their breed. Many of the best judges, fortunately, will pass over any dog that shows signs of being overshown-in fact the secret of success with many dog owners lies in the first-rate condition their dogs are always shown in.

Here is a good recipe for dogs when returning from a show or after any specially hard work. It makes an excellent pill for appetite, and, moreover, being a mild laxative, is just what a dog ought to have when he comes home. Take of:

Compound powder of colocynth-24 grains, sulphate of iron-12 grains, sulphate of quinine-12 grains, powdered liquorice root --48 grains, extract of gentiansufficient to make into a suitable mass. Divide into 16 pills (or 32 of half the size if desired). Give one of the larger size to a dog of not more than twenty, pounds every four or five hours until a distinctly aperient effect is produced. The smaller pills will answer for smaller dogs, and large dogs can have two or three of the pills according to circumstances. These pills are best prepared fresh as required.

It is usual when giving a vermifuge for the dog to be kept without food for some time-in most cases for twenty-four hours. From experiments we have made lately we have come to the conclusion that it is better not to starve a dog for so long a period as that. The better plan is simply to let the animal go without his supper one evening and then give the worm medicine (followed by an aperient) first thing in the morning. This is needful because if the stomach be full of food when medicine is given the effect is usually marred; whereas, on the other hand, if there be no food whatever the action of the medicine is rendered insufficient. A little sweet olive oil given in lieu of supper on the preceding night seems greatly to assist the action of a vermifuge. Another reason for not keeping a dog too long without food, we think, is that in many cases it produces too great exhaustion.

Many novices will appreciate a few lines upon the subject of how to determine the age of a dog. Fortunately, there is not the amount of roguery in the canine fancy as there is in the "horsey" circles, but now and again no doubt the amateur gets "bitten." To a certain extent the age can be determined by examining the teeth. A dog of mature age has forty-two teeth, and these are complete in number at the age of about eight months. This clearly indicates the age so far, but after that there is no method so certain, and a good deal of judgment is needed. As a rule the teeth of an old dog will be dark and lacking in the pearly look of a young animal's teethbut even this must not be too much relied upon, as cunning dog dealers take care to use a tooth brush freely if such be necessary, and, moreover, dogs' teeth vary a great deal, as ours do.

Generally speaking, the age of a dog can best be adjudged by a combination of appearances. Old dogs are quiet and stolid, whereas vouth carries activity with it. Moreover, curious as it may sound, grey hairs will tell a tale in dogs as well as in our own case, for it is often noticeable that a dog has become grey in the face and about the ears. So we have several points to judge by, i.e., appearance of coat as regards greyness; general demeanor; condition of teeth. To these may be added the state of the claws, which in some breeds are curled round and often disposed to be sore and festering. Finally, we may suggest as good advice that the opinion of an expert be taken in any case of doubt. The novice should never purchase a dog at a show or upon any such sudden inspiration without being guided by a competent adviser.

No comfortable muzzle has yet been invented—nor is it likely to be, since every self-respecting dog has personal objections to being constantly faced by a cage arrangement, and will soon show his distaste by rubbing on the ground and pawing, with the result that he will very soon make raw sore places. The buckle of the strap used to fasten the muzzle needs to be carefully arranged and padded to prevent this. Even though this and every other care be taken, in many cases the trouble results, and every owner of good dogs knows how difficult it is when once the hair has been destroyed to bring up appearances again to their original excellence.—Our Dogs.
