THE DACHSHUND

We Need More "Character" in Our Dogs, and a fuller idea of "Fitness." The Dachshund is a Terrier and not a Hound, and should be looked on as such.

THE writer has long been waiting for an opportunity to write upon this breed, as he was impressed by it in the land in which it has been most successfully cultivated, but press of work has hitherto prevented, and must now restrict, this communication within very narrow bounds. However, the illustrations will speak largely for themselves, and, next to the actual specimen, will serve as the best means of teaching the main truths. What impressed me most in Germany was the regularity of type, the generally rather small

size, and the spirit and workmanlike appearance of the dogs one sees at shows. Of size more later. There the shy, and still more, the nervous dog is extremely rare. In

fact the way in which the German Dachshund walks up to the largest dog, as though quite his equal in importance, is very striking, and one quality frequently wanting in dogs of this breed on this side of the water. Perhaps nothing so strongly cries out for improvement as the '' character'' of our American Dachshund.

I saw very few dogs at German shows benched in that horribly thin condition too often painfully evident with us. They were generally "fit," as the English say, in an eminent degree. Among It is in connection with such animals that the specialist judge is apt to go astray from excess of admiration of certain parts. This specimen is high-class in legs, tail, neck and especially head, but as

the illustrations Figs. 1 and 2 are meant to represent typical dogs, and are taken from the illustrated German Stud-Book.

They show in an admirable way the manner in which dogs that are "sound" stand. Now as this is of vital importance, and not infrequently fails to be realized, these cuts should serve a good purpose. In all the other illustrations the dogs show this soundness in an eminent degree. The ideal types also show that muscular development and tention (tone) so frequently lacking in our dogs.

The head illustrates well the flat skull and high placed ears, in which till lately we were much at fault.

Fig. 3 gives us an idea of an afterwards celebrated dog when young and imperfectly developed.

seen now he is lacking in symmetry, and his grand head should not in itself suffice to put him over better proportioned dogs, a procedure which, I am afraid, is frequently illustrated in both English and American judging. One would admit that such a specimen is likely

to become possibly even phenomenally superior, but a dog should be judged as he is, not as he may become.

Fig. 4 represents a fine compact specimen, and a winner of many prizes. The photo might be happier. As one sees the dog the neck is rather thick, there is slight throatiness, and the hind parts are somewhat too rugged for perfect symmetry ; but the animal is sound,

workmanlike and with plenty of character. An excellent form for a brood bitch.

Fig. 5 illustrates a dog that is almost a model. We would prefer him a little stronger in muzzle and slightly deeper in body, and perhaps a little more arched in loin. In grace and elegance of form he is unusually excellent. His tail is perfect, and he is, so far as one can judge from the illustration, perfectly sound.

Not a single specimen illustrated lends the slightest support to the view that the Dachshund is a hound. The word itself simply means badger dog. The German Dachshund is in fact a Terrier with somewhat hound-like ears, so far as their form is concerned. This fact is the key to the standard. His peculiar conformation enables the dog to burrow more rapidly than any other Terrier, and though no coward he understands how to keep out of unnecessary trouble. Indeed, he has few equals in looking after Number

One. He is worthy of more care and study than he has received in America.

A LADDER-CLIMBING ST. BERNARD.

Bull Terriers at Stud.

FIELD TRIALS AND THE C. K. C.

THE ADVICE OF TWO NORTH-WEST BREEDERS- THE BORZOI AS A WOLF-KILLER.

I have been trying to solve the much-vexed problem of "How to draw field trial sportsmen in closer relationship with our National Club." Have consulted several of our field trial men in this district, and can set no satisfactory solution of the subject. There should be some method to bring this matter to a satisfactory decision, for both the C.K.C. and the field trial men. Both would reap a benefit.

If a field trial club could be defined and recognized by the C.K.C., which gave \$300 in cash prizes or more, and with an entry fee of not less than \$10 in an open or Derby event. Then let the C.K.C. recognize the wins of any one dog that has won three times in all age open events in trials that conformed to the above conditions, by issuing a certificate declaring such a dog a champion. If a dog winning more than twice in a bench show is entitled to registration, why should not a dog winning twice in such a trial as above would be, not be entitled to registration? "Blood will tell," and a dog without the qualities we seek in a brood bitch or stud dog, would not be qualified to even a place in the money of a large field of starters at a field trial. Methinks that a dog that has made

three good wins, is a better dog in the majority of cases than one that has a pedigree of three or more straight generations, and still could never win in a trial. Why cannot we recognize a worthy dog by declaring him a champion? I would like to see considerable discussion on this matter, and a plan finally decided on. What I have laid before you is only a suggestion. There is much more to be considered. The selection of competent judges for one thing perhaps. Then, I think the C.K.C. should get some recompense if the trials were run under their sanction.

Let us hear from more of those gentlemen who are intimately acquainted with field trial matters, and all who may have a single view, and give the C.K.C. all the assistance possible to bring about a closer relationship with the field trial clubs all over America.

The gap between bench shows and field trials, in this country, seems to be widening alarmingly, although at the Brandon Kennel Club's annual dog show, sporting dogs were much in prominence. Yours very truly,

No. 2. Ightfield Rill, litter sister to Ightfield Ripple, winner second open, Winnipeg, '99, and first open, Winnipeg, 1900. With only one month's training last year she ran into the third series in the Western Canada Open Stake. I consider her the best I have ever owned.

No. 3. Ightfield Ripple on point Rill backing.

No. 4. Ightfield Rill on point Ripple backing.

I notice in the December number of the GAZETTE, you would be glad to hear from others interested in the C.K.C. and field trials. We have within 100 miles of Winnipeg three field trials held every year, in which, this year, nine stakes were run. I would suggest the C.K.C. offer a medal (or whatever they choose), to be known as the Western Canada Championship Stake, eligible to dogs having won first or second place, and must be Canadian bred (that is whelped in Canada). Arrangements could be left to the W.C.K.C. as to place and time.

My Russian Wolfhounds have only killed nine wolves this year. We have had too many thaws, and this has turned the snow into ice, making it very sharp for the dog's feet. But with Jack rabbits we have had more than our share. I have discarded the Deerhound in favor of the Russian Wolfhound for sport. Competition in the field trial Derby this year will be very keen. Every other man has a puppy and Pointers are in the majority. Yours truly,



TRAIL HUNTING AND TRAIL, HOUNDS.

Concluded from last issue.

At this last fence should be placed as many stewards as there are prizes given, and an additional one or two as reserves. Each steward is allotted his particular duty. A. spots the first dog through the fence, which is the winner, and fixes his attention on that alone till it is caught; B. takes the second; C. the third, and so on.

The usual number of starters at an ordinary fixture varies from half-a-dozen to a dozen or more, but at some of the principal meetings as many as twenty-two have competed. An entry fee is usually charged. varying in amount according to the value of the prizes offered, which sometimes are of considerable value, \pounds 10 and even more being given for the first prize in many cases.

The enthusiastic trail hunter is not particular about seasons. Any part of the year is good enough for him so long as a fixture can be arranged; but the principal events take place in the summer, amongst which those at Grasmere, Cartmel, Windermere, Pooley Bridge and Whitehaven are the most popular.

Of course, the Lake District has not a monopoly of this particular sport, there being many other localities in Lancashire and Yorkshire which vie with it in enthusiasm, if they cannot wrest from it the laurels of victory. Holcombe, for instance, the home of a noted pack of Harriers, which claim the proud distinction of being the oldest pack in the world, which has been hunted without intermission since its original formation, some centuries ago, and where Trail Hounds are bred to a considerable extent, and at Mottram in Longendale, on the borders of Derbyshire, and Cheshire, also, the sport is very popular, and in this locality many venerable hunters are to be found.



ing winners right along. Only last December 20th, at Huddersfield, one of his progeny won. "Our Dogs." says :-- "Some really splendid dogs were shown, the winner Newbold Bondsman, (son of Willow Nut) being one of the best. Although only eleven months old, he won all before him. He has good head, ears and eyes, straight in legs, good color and coat of the right sort about as good a specimen as could be found. He also won special for best in Show." Not too bad after all !" Mr. Laurin now has orders with three of the leading and most reputable breeders in England for bitches in whelp to the cream of Airedale stock (and as he looks very closely to what they have done

at stud), he only orders sterling Terriers and of the best blood, and those which strike him as most suitable to his dogs. He wants to give them a chance of continuing their good work. The last is surely best when we learn that Mr. Laurin cabled for Champion Dumbarton Lass, who will be over for the New York Show. He adds "No doubt, you know that she is considered by the foremost judges to be the best specimen living. She has an unequalled record, 14 championships and an innumerable amount of firsts, cups, specials, etc. Last time, out at Shrewsbury, she won first, championship and special for best in show, defeating amongst others of note, Champions Master Briar, Tone Jerry, Arthington Tinner, etc., etc., and the Otley sensation Clonmel Monarch who had cleared out all dogs. This was admitedly, the very best Airedale collection ever benched. As soon as she reaches me, she will join Briar Ranger and Colne Princess which are at Hamilton, Mass., in charge of George Thomas, who is handling them at the shows this season. Princess and Lass are at their debut in America ; of course, there is nothing to touch the latter. and the former will take a lot of stopping."

NOTES FOR NOVICES.

Good wholesome dog biscuits and hound meal make the best staple food for all dogs other than Toys. For Toys, pepsinated puppy biscuits and fine hound meal scalded with hot water form the best staple dietary, with scraps from the table, a little rice pudding, etc., as a change.

All dogs, like human beings, require change of food, however, and a feed or two each week of raw, sound lean flesh meat and uncleaned butchers' offal is most beneficial to the health.

A

Dogs suffering from mange or eczema are much more easily cured when fed largely on raw flesh meat. It is more nourishing, too, in the case of a dog recovering from distemper, but in such a case should be minced, and the greatest care should be taken to have it fresh, sound, and free from fat.

All dogs should have bones now and then to gnaw at, but fowl or fish bones are dangerous, and should be discarded, especially in the case of small dogs.

A

The less cooking there is in the kennel the better, but a warm feed now and again is good for dogs. Hound meal and brown bread, scalded in sheep's head broth, and a little boiled cabbage added makes a toothsome meal. A boiled cod's head is a good thing for dogs.

A

For all large dogs and Terriers one meal per day is better than two, and it should be given at night. If the dogs are sporting dogs, a dry dog buscuit should be given in the morning. It is natural for a dog to bolt his food. He only breaks up biscuits and bones to such a size that he can swallow them.

The best kennels are brick-built kennels, with cemented floors and

2

runs, and loose wooden benches, so arranged that the animal cannot get underneath. Clean, dry, wheat straw makes the best bedding for a dog. Where brick-built kennels are not available, wooden kennels, with cemented floors and zinc roofs are next best, and the greatest care should be taken to have all kennels fixed with a south or south-west aspect.

All dogs should have constant and free access to pure water and grass, if possible. If it is not possible to have free access to grass, they should be given a run in a grass field as often as possible. Certain blades of grass are the dog's natural antidote for disease, and just as necessary for his health as salt is for that of the human being.

Dogs can hardly have too much outdoor exercise, and that exercise is best that they can take of their own free will. Ninety per cent. of dogs have far too little outdoor exercise, and ninety per cent. of the disease in the kennel is due to want of exercise, cleanliness and injudicious feeding.

All dogs should be well groomed once a week, and their kennels kept clean and sweet, if their health is to be secured. No dog owner should be without a plentiful supply of disinfectants.

2

Puppies can rarely be properly reared in kennels. After they are weaned from the dam, they should be separated, and drafted out at walks in couples to cottages in the country. Puppies thrive best when they have their full liberty, and can romp and play, eat and drink, rest and sleep, at will. The more often puppies are fed the better. They should be fed not less than three times a day until they are six months old, then twice, until one week old. Full-grown Toys should be fed twice a day.

Dew claws on puppies of all breeds should be removed when two or three days old, or as soon after as possible; and those breeds that require docking, should be docked at about the same age.

2

Puppies of two or three days old may be docked with the thumb nail and fore-finger failing which a sharp pen-knife is best. A sharp pair of scissors is best for removing dew claws.

2

Bitches usually come in season twice a year. Their period of heat (œstrum) varies from five to fifteen days. The best time to mate a dog and bitch is directly the coloured discharge in the bitch has quite ceased.

A dog and bitch that are to be mated should never be kept together previously, and before mating both should be fasted for twelve hours, and allowed a short run before the service.

After the visit they should both be fed and put away in a separate kennel. A bitch that has visited the dog should not be sent on a railway journey the same day.

A

It is a good plan to treat the brood bitch thoroughly for worms before being put to the dog; and stud dogs should be periodically treated for these pests. Young puppies should undergo a course of tteatment for them just before leaving their dam. Worm medicines in capsule form are not only easier of administration, but more likely to be effectual, since the requisite dose is insured.

A

A stud fee is for the service of the dog to the bitch, irrespective of whether any puppies result from the union or not, unless special arrangements have been previously made between the owner of stud dog and brood bitch, varying that accepted custom, or the dog should be proved a non-stock getter, in which case the latter may claim back any fee paid.

×

All young dogs intended for exhibition should previously be taught to go in a collar and chain. As this is the usual method of securing dogs, some owners are so stupid as to think that a dog should fall into the arrangement automatically and as if to the manner born. It would be just as sensible to expect a raw, unbroken colt to adapt itself to harness and pull a vehicle. The collar and chain has been intended for the dog, but not the dog for the collar and chain. In accustoming a dog to a collar and chain this fact should be kept well in view, and greatest kindness and forbearance exercised.

2

The sooner a young dog is taught to go in a collar and lead the better. It is best to begin when the puppy is three or four months old, first by letting it wear a collar for a week or two, then tie a piece of thick string to the collar, and let it go about with this for a few days. At the end of this period substitute the string for a chain, catching hold of the chain with one hand every now and then, and giving it a dainty bit with the other. In this way it will get quite accustomed to what the dog, no doubt, thinks a strange method of depriving it of its sweet liberty.

It is not at all an infrequent occurrence to see terrified puppies being dragged through the streets by their thoughtless owners, who have stupidly expected them to go in a collar and lead right off. To make matters worse, they invariably thrash the puppies in such circumstances, which means that the puppies are most likely ruined for life. In fact, such spectacles are not unknown in the show ring, by which the otherwise bright future of many a good dog is blighted. — *Our Dogs*.

DR. JAMES SIMPSON NIVEN.

There is no better known man in Canadian canine circles than the subject of this sketch, Dr. I. S. Niven, London, Ont. The genial medico must surely possess the secret of the elixir of perpetual youth, as in the eighteen years the writer has known him personally, he has changed but little, in appearance or temperament. Dr. Niven is one of those all round men that are produced nowhere outside the British Islands. He has a keen eve for a good mount, has been M.F.H. of the London Hunt, has had more than a passing interest in "feathers," and is now one of the continent's acknowledged authorities on fancy pheasants.

Dr. Niven has been a lover of dogsduring his whole life, and began importing Gordon Setters, in 1878, Blossom being the best he ever owned, who was followed by a worthy son, Argus, whose dam was Moll III. These dogs made history at the time.

In 1879, the doctor's fancy turned to Irish Terriers, when he imported a team, and has seldom since been without one or more. Cocker Spaniels then received his attention, his Lass of Breda being acknowledged the best in existence about 1883. Another good one and the ancestor of good ones was Black Bess.

To Dr. Niven, as one of the founders of the Canadian Kennel Club, and as its President for some turbulent years is due the thanks of the members who are now reaping where he helped to sow.

Dr. Niven's professional career has been a successful one, and he is in the enjoyment of a large medical practice, which all who know him will join us in hoping he may live long to retain.
