Notes and Comments.

The Montreal show is favored with a long list of specials, medals, cash, etc., and all breeds have a share. Collies are especially well looked after, and a repeat of the big entry at Toronto may be looked for.

It is clear the Canadian Collie Club appreciates Prof. Wesley Mills' services as a judge, as the following copy of a recent letter to him from the secretary will show:—

The unfortunate individual who acts in the judicial capacity has often so much to bear that is unpleasant, that such a letter must be all the more gratifying to Dr. Mills.

The Vancouver Island Kennel Club show has been extended to cover four days, the dates now being May 22nd, 23rd, 24th and 25th.

Messrs. H. B. & V. N. Lyon have chosen the word Regal for their kennel name, and have so registered it with the C. K. C.

At the Seattle show Mr. C. W. Minor's (Victoria, B. C.) English Setter, Roy Montez, was first in both limit and open classes and also took the cup for best dog or bitch. He came east to try conclusions with the cracks at Chicago, but had to give place to Barton Tory and Oakley Hill, being third in two classes to these dogs.

The St. Thomas Kennel Club has now seventy-four members in good standing. A useful work at which the Club is aiming is the reduction of city licence on registered dogs. The fee is now \$2 for each dog and \$5 for each bitch, which is excessive in the case of dogs kept under control.

A show will probably be held in St. Thomas some time in the fall.

Quebec City breeders are talking of holding a dog show some time during next winter.

Messrs. Spratts' Patent have just issued a neat little souvenir entitled "Spratt's Dog Culture with a Chapter on Cats," that will be found a handy reference for the kennel. Copies may be had free by addressing the firm at 450 Market Street, Newark, N.J.

We have no personal knowledge of the conduct of the recent show in Chicago, but cannot help admiring the American Field's outspoken

criticism of the several abuses it claims to have found in the home show. It takes courage to do this to fellow townsmen, as we know. It is frequently a necessary but thankless effort.

In mentioning the useful pedigree blanks just issued by the West Chemical Co. we inadvertently said they were extended for three generations, while as a fact they are extended for four, which makes them all the more valuable.

Chatham, N. Y., we hear is to hold a show the week following the Pan-American, the date chosen by Toronto. This is rather unfortunate for both. A fee of \$2.00 for prizes of \$10.00 and \$5.00 or \$8.00 and \$4.00 will be charged.

Hanks Gim Crack won for Mr. Taylor, at Chicago, first in novice class, but was second to Foxey Quiller in limit and third in open, Bragdon getting first here.

ST. THOMAS KENNEL CLUB.

I thought I would write and let you know how our kennel club is progressing. We have a membership of about eighty, and have succeeded in getting the municipal tax on dogs and bitches reduced from \$2 and \$5 to \$1 and \$2 and spayed bitches \$1, the same as a dog. We would have liked, if possible, to have had a distinction made between the pure bred and the mongrel, but of course the only proof of breeding is the pedigree, and unfortunately a great many members of the club own pure bred dogs which through previous carelessness can not now be registered according to the rules of the C. K. C. I would like to say right here, I believe, is an opportunity for the C. K. C. to create the greatest boom that dogdom has ever known. We have a very large number of pure bred dogs in this city which through carelessness, in the majority of cases, can not now be registered and, of course, as is well known, the same state of affairs exists in every city and town in the Dominion. Now would it not be possible for the C. K. C. to amend the rules governing this and appoint judges with the necessary qualification at prominent points throughout the country so that the owners of such dogs could take them before him to judge, and in the event of the judge finding such dog or dogs to be up to the necessary standard and the owner having complied

with all necessary requirements in the case that they be considered eligible for registration. I do not know whether this matter has ever been advocated before, but I hope it will attract the attention of some of the fanciers who, if they will, can do the subject more justice than I can.

SHIPPING ON CHAIN IN CRATE.

I wanted to send a pup to Newark, Ohio, last week and the company refused it because it was not chained inside its crate. However,

the Dominion Express Co. received same and appeared glad of the chance. For the future I will do all my shipping on the Dominion when possible. I consider it absurd to attempt to chain young puppies, say about 9 or 12 weeks of age or even older. They would twist it round and round and then choke. Last week I shipped 3 nine-weeks-old pups to Newport, R.I., and 2 rather older to San Francisco, Cal. I wonder what condition they would have landed in had they been chained?

What is your opinion on the subject? They all charge double rates just the same.

The reports in some classes of Chicago show show some amusing divergence even as to matters of fact. For instance, the Field says Perfection was "not in best condition," while the Stock-Keeper says he was "beautifully shown." The Stock-Keeper affords the information that "the show was not kept so clean and sweet as we are accustomed to nowadays, the aisles being much littered and straw uncleanly." In contradiction to this Field & Fancy writes, "the show was kept scrupulously clean." And so it goes, "you pays your money and you takes your choice."

Mr. W. A. Twigg, of Kingston, tells us he has several hot ones coming on by Red Jack, C. 4768.

In reading over the Field's report of Chicago show the criticism on Cocker Spaniels that says Standard and Perfection are both of a "nice size" does not somehow seem to fit in. Anyone who knows both dogs must be aware that if one is of a nice size the other certainly is not.

COCKER SPANIELS AT TORONTO SPRING SHOW.

Some of our Cocker breeders take exception to our report of these classes at the late show in Toronto. That we were not alone in our opinions may be taken from the judge's report in Turf, Field and Farm, which we print together with that given in the Gazette:—

OUR REPORT.

Cockers, apart from some of the winners were poor. Bayview Kennels, entries all absent. Shirly who won in puppy dogs is a taking kind, nice mover, short back, good head and is straight. He won rather easily. In the absence of Bayview Bandit and Simcoe Duke, Standard in beautiful fit, had only Persimmon to beat in the open class, which he did easily. He afterwards beat the red, Perfection, for the medal. Perfection was put down in the pink of condition, a grand bodied dog, with good bone, legs and feet of the best, nice color. His skull appears high and large in proportion to muzzle but is nicely

chiselled. We take him for an excellent type, of sensible formation for use if so needed. Tommy Atkins is good in body, legs and feet, moderate head, and about the same applies to Park Red. The bitch classes were miserable. Kola won in puppies, novice, limit, open and winners; she might have more substance, nice head and expression, decent front, good coat. Mr. Mead's team won the cup for four best Field or Cocker Spaniels, he also won the Spaniel puppy cup with Woolton Buller.

THE JUDGE'S REPORT.

Cockers were a very ordinary lot after the winners. Shirley, the winning puppy, wants more lip and better-sprung ribs, but has a nice skull and eye, nicely set ear, short back and is much better than the average in straightness of bone, in hindquarters and movement. All the Bayview entries were absent, as was also Simcoe Duke, so that Standard, in beautiful condition, had virtually a walk-over in open black dogs. In novice dogs, any solid color other than black, there were but two entries, of which Mickie was easily the better. In the corresponding limit class Tommy Atkins has a nice red coat, good body, legs and feet, but neither his head nor shoulders will do. Perfection, shown in the very pink of condition, had only Park Red and Red Kaiser II. against him. Park Red is fairly good in body, coat and color, but his skull and muzzle are not in harmony and his pasterns are weak. Red Kaiser II. is a very poor specimen. Knight of Los Angeles had a walkover in open parti-colored dogs. Kola won in

puppy bitches, also in novice, limit and open (black), and also in the winners' class, where she met the good-bodied, but weak-faced, parti-color Tick Tick. Kola has a nice head, eye and expression, good front and coat; she wants more bone, better-sprung ribs and should be shorter in body.

In regard to Collie color, the division by color was made to allow the black and tans, and black, white

and tans an opportunity of winning, which they were apparently unable to do when competing with the sables, and sables and whites, partly because of a real, or fancied, inferiority in the texture and quality of coat of the former, but chiefly, I believe, because the latter colors were more fashionable and consequently more popular. The class as we made it at the Westminster Kennel Club shows, was for "rough Collies other than sable, or sable and white." Of course an all white Collie, or an all black one, could compete in such a class, but a white Collie with slight sable markings would be debarred.

As the black and whites, and black, white and tans seem to have jumped into popular favor recently in England, many of the most celebrated winners at the present time being of these colors, it seems that such a division is no longer necessary and personally I can see no good reason for continuing it.

SOME COLLIE POINTS.

My object in the first instance as regards this paper, is to be as concise as possible, without any great description or flowery matter.

The Scotch Collie has long been held in high estimation by the general public, more from a theoretical knowledge of the breed than a practical. The Collie has the reputation for being possessed of a marvellous intelligence, displayed in feats performed in devotion to duty, that give him at once a right to our admiration and gratitude. Stories of the Collie and his wonderful sense and display of reasoning powers in the execution of deeds, showing patience, perseverance and tact exercised in loyal fidelity to the interests of his master exist in super-abundance. The intelligence of the Collie is in fact of such a

high order that our respect for it is not raised by the extravagant embellishments of those who write without practical knowledge and concoct foolish stories about the dog, which are merely the reflex of of their own love for the marvellous rather than for the truth. It would indeed be difficult to over-estimate the intelligence of a good Collie, he thinks and acts for himself under difficulties and conditions new to him. That he feels the responsibility of his charge and acts independently of special orders, all who have had opportunities of observing him must have noted. There is no doubt at the present time through clubs and exhibitions the fancy is looked at too much, and consequently we have had the handsome and useless instead of as one of our shepherds would prefer and describe "the guid and bonny." The breeding for exhibition alone is, in fact, having an adverse influence on the Collie, which view is taken in by many, the show Collie being untrained is losing intelligence and that the untaught Collie is readily distinguished from the trained,

principally through the fatuous look given by the idle life which the former developes.

Now, as regards the color of the Collie, the general supposition is immaterial and a good Collie, like a good horse, cannot be a bad color, although at the same time a perfectly and beautifully marked dog has the preference, being more attractive and therefore adds very much to the dog's general appearance. As regards the size of the Collie exhibitors here outside the Collie Club really do not know what judges want. The Collie Club issues their standard of points and size stands at minimum 22 inches at the shoulder and maximum 24 inches for dogs, and for bitches 20 and 22. Now, if you enter a show ring under one of the judges who has been at the making of above standard, they are the very first to favor dogs over the maximum.

The body and general outline of a Collie should be well balanced and typical all over. What we want is a nice continuous curve from the ears to the tip of tail. He should also show arching of neck, sloping shoulders, raised loin, with a deep chest, standing high on good legs and feet, all these points go to make up that raciness so much admired and essential, but I am sorry to say very seldom seen. You must have a fair length of body in the couplings, with ribs well sprung. The frame should have the appear-

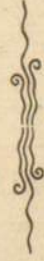

ance of being well knit together, compact and yet not heavy.

The reason I have left the head, ears, eye and expression alone is, that some fanciers in looking over a Collie just take notice of three points, head, ears and coat and forget all about the outline of a Collie as well as the legs and feet. I would just finish up in stating that a dog should not be a cripple, cow-hocked or one that moves badly, because the great essential in a sheep dog is a free and racy move-

ment and a dog which cannot move with grace and freedom is not built properly for this breed.

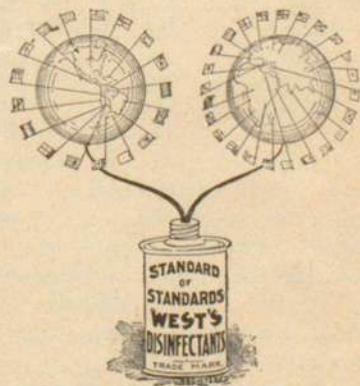

GOLDEN ROD.

The C. K. C. rule reads as follows.—Ed.

The Winners' Class at any show shall be open only to the winners of first prizes at that show, and the winner of four first prizes in this class, two of which have been won at shows either giving \$500 in cash prizes or having not less than 400 entries (in the case of Manitoba and British Columbia, \$300 in cash prizes or 200 entries), will thereby become a champion of record, be so registered by the Canadian Kennel Club, and will, if registered in the Stud Book, be entitled to a Canadian Kennel Club champion certificate. Before awarding "reserve" in this

class, the dog or dogs having been placed second to the winner in any of the regular classes must be brought before the judge for competition with the remaining dogs in said Winners' Class. No class-winner can be withdrawn or withheld from competition in the Winners' class, and no entry fee shall be charged for said competition in this class. A dog that has already won one or more first prizes in the late challenge class shall retain these wins to its credit toward becoming a champion of record, the remaining qualifying wins to be gained in the Winners' Class. The Winners' Class can be divided by sex, provided other classes are also divided by sex.
