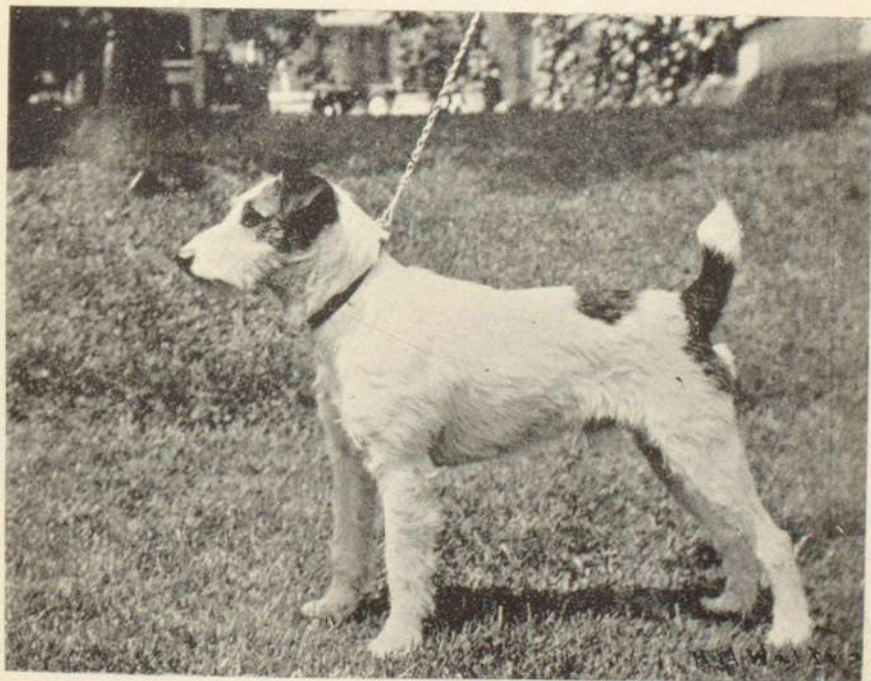

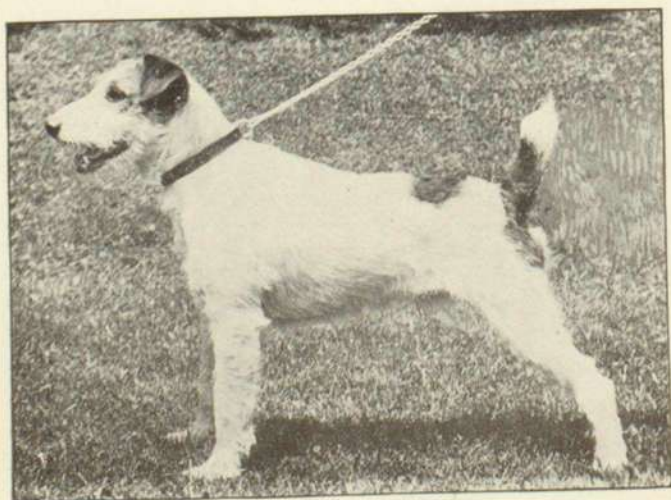

Mr. James Lindsay, of Montreal, has already been secured as one of the judges and the secretary is now corresponding with other well known men with a view of securing their services.

The Little World building will be utilized to accommodate this department and will shortly be converted into a thorough bench show building where the canine aristocracy attending the fair will be afforded every accommodation and comfort during exhibition week.

The prize list, which will comprise 68 sections, besides a number of special prizes, is now in the hands of the printer and will be issued by the 1st of August. Prizes to the amount of \$360 will be offered, the prizes in each section being 1st \$3, and 2nd \$2. An entry fee of one dollar will be charged, which will entitle the holder to free admission to Canada's Great Eastern Exhibition during the entire week.

It is the aim of the directors to make this bench show a permanent feature of their exhibition and no trouble will be spared to make the inaugural effort a complete success, and they hope to be favored with the support that such a show merits.

The St. Thomas Kennel Club has chosen for its show dates September 10th, 11th and 12th.

. . .

We regret to learn from Messrs. F. & A. Stuart, Montreal, that their good rough St. Bernard, Earl of Shrewsbury, died a few days ago. The only cause they can assign for his death is the extreme heat we have been having. He was really ill but two hours, vomiting, followed by convulsions, being the immediate cause of death. Messrs. Stuart are now after a young dog on the other side that will likely soon claim Montreal as his home. A young bitch of quality and breeding is also expected over soon.

. . .

Messrs. F. & A. Stuart have bred their rough St. Bernard, Rosy O'Grady, to the smooth Duke of Watford.

. . .

We regret to hear of the death of Rev. Father Duffy, P. P. of Stayner, Ont., who passed away on July 8th, after a lingering illness. The late Father Duffy was essentially a dog lover, and was beloved by those who knew him for his gentleness of manner and broad Christianity. He showed a good black and tan Terrier at the last Industrial Exhibition show in Lord Chesterfield, and won second with him in novice class.

. . .

In last issue we had but space to give the list of judges who will officiate at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition's big Dog Show in September. Comparisons may be odious, but a reference to the lists of

other shows will but prove that Toronto this year has outdone all previous efforts in this direction. No better men could be procured in America.

* * *

The classification has been very liberal in past years, especially when the low entry fee, two dollars, is considered, and little change can be made in that of 1900. The committee have, however, added several classes where it was thought desirable, and are willing to do better still if guaranteed a liberal entry in the extra sections.

* * *

Classes have been added for Harriers, of which breed we have several lovers in Canada. Irish Setters will have puppy class for both sexes. Smooth Collies have been added, and in the rough variety there are now no less than four open classes, i.e., open dogs, sable and white; open dogs, any other color, and two like classes for the ladies. Dalmatians have hitherto been relegated to the "variety" class; they will now have a class for this breed alone, and as there are many in Toronto, Hamilton and other places, we hope to see a big turn out of the breed. Airedale Terriers, that are becoming so popular, will have novice, limit and open classes; Skye Terriers, puppy, novice, limit and open. Black and Tan Terriers are well looked after with puppy, novice, limit and open classes. The toy classes remain as before with the exception that a separate class has been added for Blenheim. In other breeds of toys the committee will act liberally where a decent entry is assured; don't hang back and say you can't show because there is no class. Work up an entry amongst lovers of your favorite breed and classification will be made.

We can add little to the foregoing. Toronto is a pleasant place to visit, there is plenty to see apart from the dogs, and many make an annual holiday of the show week. Many more might do so with profit. Lists will be published in a week or so, and application to the superintendent, Mr. W. P. Fraser, will bring one by return of mail, when every intending exhibitor can see the good things offered, for himself. Several valuable cups, medals and specials will be given, but these we must leave till next issue.

* * *

Mr. W. H. Levett, of Exeter, Ont., has sold to Mr. Geo. Douglas, who knows a Cocker, a young dog by Black Knight out of Eclipse, who is a full sister to Ono. He was bred by Mr. F. C. Hessel, of London, who still owns his dam, and is being conditioned for the Pan-American and Toronto shows.

* * *

Mr. A. E. Fields, of Kingston, has a lot of young stuff coming on now in Cockers. Lady Cora is nursing one red and four blacks, Lady Cora Jr. has two reds and four blacks, while Queen Annie has six black and tans, an assortment as to color.

* * *

The A. K. C. has advised that the entry fees of Mr. A. B. Koenig, of St. Louis, Mo., who made eight entries at Chicago, supposing that the club would carry out its programme, which announced that Dr. J. S. Niven would judge Cockers, be returned to Mr. Koenig. The decision, a sensible one, is based on the facts that Dr. Niven was publicly announced as judge, that he was present at the show and ready to judge, and that the classes were assigned to another than the advertised judge.

London Fox Terrier Club's Show.

On the 15 and 16 of May the above show was held at the Crystal Palace. The dogs were benched in an aisle of this huge structure, and unlike most shows, counter attractions were many, inasmuch that an organ recital, band concert and acrobatic performance were going on near by. This only tended to make the ever vivacious Terriers bark the louder. Though I arrived at the show quite early, the hour was not too early for Mr. Francis Redmond, who was carefully going over the exhibits, evidently on the look out for a likely debutante. It was not long before things were in running order and all the celebrities and lesser lights were ready for the judging. A stalwart, broad shouldered athletic man, easily recognized as the one-time great Oxford stroke, Mr. J. C. Tinne, was busily engaged in giving his entries a warming up. Amongst others at the ring side, were Mr. J. J. Pim, The Duchess of Newcastle, and many others whose names are so well known to the Canadian fancy.

Before saying anything about the dogs, I would like to comment on a most unfair and objectionable feature, which also promises to be quite as obnoxious in America. I refer to the practice of showing dogs on leads long enough to exercise a horse. If there is any etiquette in dog showing, it certainly is infringed on, in absolutely having no regard whatsoever for anybody else's exhibit. At this show it was practised by men who should have known better. It is high time that this letting out reef after reef of lead, so that the dog shown may "have a go" at another, should be stopped by a strong

and fast rule. The ordinary bench show chain—or lead of equal length—is quite sufficient for all practical purposes.

Mr. A. H. Clarke, the judge of the smooth Terriers, is a name that might be called historical, as it dates back to the time almost before dog shows were known in America. The first class to face the judge was the open one, and taken on the whole, I have seen a much better lot in the ring at Toronto. After the usual sorting out the winner was found in Mr. Vicary's sturdy Velocipede by Velocity. This dog bears a strong resemblance to Veracity, but loses to him in head, eye and expression. He is on the large side, grand front, bone, legs and feet, a compact body and rare hard jacket. His faults are that he is a bit big in eye, and his ears are a trifle gay. Second came Blizzard, who must have made it uncomfortable for the winner. He makes the most of himself in the ring, and is perfection in head, ear and expression, and equally good in everything but a tendency to be a trifle heavy in shoulders. Another high quality in Braggart was third, the reserve going to Donington, who is very coarse and common in head, and none too good in coat. Legs, feet and front perfection, and typical of Mr. Redmond's strain. A lot of just useful dogs followed. This order was maintained through the remaining classes, till Avor Minstrel, a high class Terrier in all but coat, had a look in, in novice.

Bitches were very disappointing, with the exception of Duchess of Durham, who is grand in front, body, bone and feet; she is quite small and cobby, and would not have

a look in with two or three from the Norfolk Kennel. Brockenhurst Fear-naught, second, is very toyish and weak in face. In limit, Dusky Dimple, shown by Mr. Redmond, has great quality, but is also much too light all over. In novices, Battle's Merry-weather seemed to create a furore; she has lots of quality, but is quite small enough and has a very open coat.

Wire Classes. These were judged by Mr. A. E. Clear, another old-time exhibitor, who certainly lived up to his antiquity in his judging.

Open wire dogs saw the best in the land, of which ch. Cackler of Notts seemed to win right enough. He has a good, long head, and fair ears, immense bone and a good front and shoulders; he has a rare hard coat, and is of nice size. Second came King Elf, whom I thought very lucky. He has a long head, but a nasty, round, coarse skull, and very little whisker. His coat and front are good, and he is a big one all over. Third came Belfield Baronet, another old-fashioned one. Westoe Ben was reserve. His ears are big, and his front none too true. Then came two very hardly treated dogs in ch. Royston Remus, v.h.c., lovely type of head and ear, grand front and short, compact body, a bit wrong in coat, and ch. Matchmaker, also hardly treated, in fact, shockingly so, only got h.c. His head, eye, ears and expression are simply perfection; his coat A1. He has immense spring of ribs, which no doubt accounts for his tendency to be wide in front, not bad by any means. He has grand straight bone, and had he been first it would not have been doubted. He is a bit long in body, and a trifle high behind. Mr. Redmond was lucky to get a

commended card with Don't Go Bang, a tovisish little white dog by Go Bang.

In bitches, ch. Appleby Jane once more won. She has a very long head, but lacks whiskers, and is dish-faced. Her front and coat are good, but she is low to the ground. Ch. Mischief Maker I like best, as she has more finish in head and is good all over, though a trifle undersized. Geo. Raper showed a high quality puppy in Richmond Matchless, by Match Maker.

Status of Dogs sent into the United States for purposes of Exhibition.

An enquiry from the secretary of the C. K. C. caused by the imposition of duty on dogs sent over from Canada to U. S. shows on the coast, brought forth the following reply:

Washington, May 31, 1901.

Sir,—In reply to your letter of the 25th instant, I have to state that under the provisions of paragraph 474 of the act of July 24, 1897, animals brought into the United States temporarily for a period not exceeding six months may be so imported without the payment of duty, whether registered or not, for the purpose of exhibition or competition for prizes offered by any agricultural or racing association. I enclose for your further information a copy of a letter addressed to the Collector of Customs at San Francisco, under date of the 27th of December last, in the matter. Respectfully,

Sir,—In reply to your letter of the 17th instant, I have to state that the privilege of the free importation of animals for exhibition or competition for prizes under the provisions of paragraph 474 of the act of July 24, 1897, is confined to cases of prizes offered by an agricultural or racing association, and cannot be extended to dogs or other animals imported for other exhibitions or racings.

As we advised coast breeders, we think the difficulty may be overcome by turning the show building into a bonded warehouse, as is done in the case of dogs from the U. S. at Toronto.

BOY BITTEN BY A DOG.

His Father Sues the Owner of the Canine—How it All Happened.

The Toronto Telegram reports a case of dog bite in its issue of July 11th, that once more strengthens the old adage that every dog is privileged for at least one bite. It is evident also that dogs give warning, at least, in most cases, and that those who do not heed must blame themselves if provocation is given. The evidence is as follows:

One day last February little Walter, son of Charles Rathbone, saw Willie Martin and Sammy Reed at a sleigh to which a collie dog was hitched by a rope. When Walter went out the dog turned and bit him, he says, "in the leg, one big bite and some little bites." He went home and his parents treated the wounds with poultices; he became worse and a doctor was called in; there was danger of blood poison and the boy was sick ten weeks.

To-day Mr. Rathbone sued William Martin, Willie's father, to get \$40 for the doctor's bill, \$15, and other expenses in connection with the biting. The case was in the Division Court and was introduced by Judge Morson saying, "You know 'every dog is entitled to one bite,' don't you?" Walter denied that he did anything to cause the dog to bite him.

Charlie Quinn swore that once he was in Martin's yard, and the dog bit him in the leg; he was only petting it, he said.

George Armstrong, who was once a gas inspector, had a wholesome fear of all dogs, engendered doubtless by an extensive experience in cellars and back yards while inspect-

ing meters. He was a witness for the Rathbones and said that Mrs. Martin thought he'd better be careful, as the dog doesn't like strangers.

The court must recall painful memories of gas meters and inspections for when Armstrong was sworn his Honor said: "Before you get to the dog can you tell us how meters work?"

When Willie Martin went into the witness box he put an entirely new phase upon the matter. He is a bright, handsome and evidently frank and truthful little fellow. His story was this: "Sammy Reed was jumping on the sleigh and pushed it against the dog's leg. I was on the sleigh. Then Wallie tried to jump on and push the sleigh; the dog growled and I told them not to do it again or he would bite them. Wallie pushed again and the dog turned around and bit him." The dog bit Quinn because he hit him over the nose.

Judgment was reserved on some little technical point, but it will doubtless go against Rathbone because the court remarked that the dog gave warning, so did young Martin and the evidence showed exactly how boys would act under such circumstances. "I don't think it will help you any, but I will reserve judgment," was the closing sentence in the case.

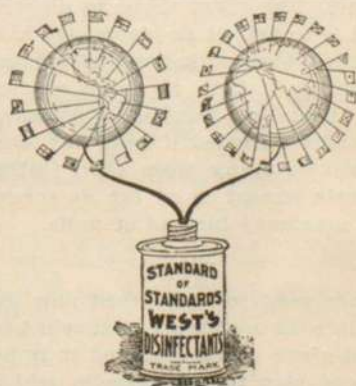

NOTES FOR NOVICES

If we were asked, what is the greatest trouble the dog owner experiences in summer, we should probably answer parasites—parasites internally and externally; so that now we will give a few hints on getting rid of parasites, external parasites—which have been proved to be some of the sources by which worms are produced. It is said by scientists that the flea swallows the egg of a tapeworm, and, being in turn himself swallowed by the dog, the egg, which has meantime become what is called a cryptocyst, is liberated in the dog's stomach, and from it a tapeworm is again developed. If this be the case then it is surely desirable that kennels should be kept quite free from fleas. The fewer fleas there are about, the fewer external parasites there are likely to be about, the less will be the trouble caused by internal parasites. Now, of course, fleas and other insects are most numerous during the summer months, and under the best conditions it is difficult to keep animals free from them; so that unless energetic steps are taken to keep them in check, the dogs will suffer in proportion to the extent to which they have been neglected.

The dog is subject chiefly to three different kinds of skin vermin—the flea, the tick and the louse, the flea, of course, being by far the commonest and the most troublesome, inasmuch as he possesses powers of locomotion that enable him to move about from one host to another, and to escape capture accordingly. The dog owner who would keep his kennels free from fleas must take steps

in advance to deal with these pests, without waiting for their appearance in the summer weather. The larvae of fleas develop in dust, and therefore it is safe to assume that the likeliest place for fleas to hatch out will be in crevices between boards and in walls, and in other places where the cleansing brush does not usually find its way. If a kennel is built of brick it is a good plan to put a coating of size all around the walls after thoroughly clearing the floor. This size will block up all the crevices. If need be a second coating should be given, and then a good coating of lime wash on the top of it will thoroughly do

away with any possibility of fleas, and it may be taken for granted that any fleas that do appear in that kennel subsequently will be imported fleas, not natives. To make this even more certain, before the size is put on the walls, let the floor be thoroughly cleared of all straw, sand, dust, etc., and let the place be fumigated with sulphur. Close the window and door, and burn some sulphur on the middle of the floor. A few live coals will start this going, and the deadly sulphurous acid gas will penetrate into every nook and crevice, leaving no living creature behind it. If this be done as a preliminary, then sizing, then lime-washing, we may be quite sure that there is no breeding ground for fleas left there. In the case of a wooden kennel, the best thing to do with that is to take it to pieces—we have a great idea of kennels which can be easily taken to pieces so that each board can be thoroughly washed and disinfected if need be; they do not cost any more than other kennels, except in so far as screws are necessary instead of nails.

Dogs need to be washed now and again with something that will keep them clear of vermin, and it is not a good plan to use carbolic acid as that is rather dangerous for dogs—a fact we have pointed out over and over again in this column. A soap containing eucalyptus is as good as anything, and it is also very important that the bed should be changed frequently and the old bed on removal should be burnt. If the bedding be changed and the dogs be washed both at the same time, it will be pretty safe to surmise that any fleas that may be about have been got rid of in one way or the

other. As regards lotions for external application there is nothing better than a lotion made of quassia, which has been proved over and over again invaluable both for dogs and for birds as an anti-parasite application. We do not regard ordinary insect powders as at all to be relied upon—there are so many kinds and qualities now on the market, but no doubt many of them are effective, although we are bound to say that we think they are rather more effective as preventatives than as exterminators. There is a great difference in the qualities of the ordinary insect powder sold—some of it is prepared from the unexpanded flower heads, and this is the best, but the better qualities are made by grinding flowers and leaves and stems, altogether, when, of course, the active principle is proportionately diluted. There is no necessity whatever to use paraffin and other objectionable things to a dog's coat when a solution such as quassia will have an equally good effect, and at the same time be clean and convenient to use and gives no discomfort to the dog. Some people seem to think it is necessary to cover dogs with all sorts of objectionable things—but this is not the case. Two or three-pence worth of quassia wood steeped in a little water—cold water—makes an excellent lotion to apply

to dogs as a preventative against the inroads of skin vermin.

So much for the treatment of fleas. Now in regard to ticks—these are, happily, of comparative infrequency, and they only, as a rule, trouble dogs which are not kept under proper conditions as regards cleanliness. The sort of dog that becomes worried with ticks is the animal which is kept tied up in the back yard, spending half of his time inside a dirty kennel and the other half outside it. There are dogs kept under these conditions even in the present -enlightened age—they live from year's end to year's end scarcely ever having a run, never groomed, usually sleeping on the hard floor of their kennel, with no chance of keeping themselves in proper health

or their skins free from vermin. Ticks never trouble a dog that is nicely looked after, because they are only bred by filth. In appearance they are not unlike the ticks that are to be seen on sheep, varying in size and capable of fastening themselves on to the hide whilst they suck the blood of the unfortunate dog. We hope that none of the readers of this column are in possession of dogs - suffering from such a scourge; but in case a new-comer may be found to be afflicted with ticks we may as well say that a thoroughly good sousing with soap and hot water is the best means of getting rid of such vermin as these. One or two baths will soon put the dog into a better state, and if a little sulphur be rubbed into the hair in the meantime that will also have

a good effect. Other precautions, such as thorough cleansing of the kennel and frequent change of bedding, are very necessary. It may be necessary to do something to bring the dog's skin up to its proper condition, as it will most likely be left sore and inflamed in parts after the ticks have been working upon it, and for this purpose the best treatment would be to sponge any parts that are inflamed with a weak coal tar lotion diluted for preference with hot water, and after each time of bathing wipe the places dry with a towel and then anoint with a little carbolised vaseline. In fact one might almost say that a dog which has been suffering from ticks can be treated to a large extent just as we should treat one which has been afflicted with mange—another trouble brought about by neglect and want of proper attention.
