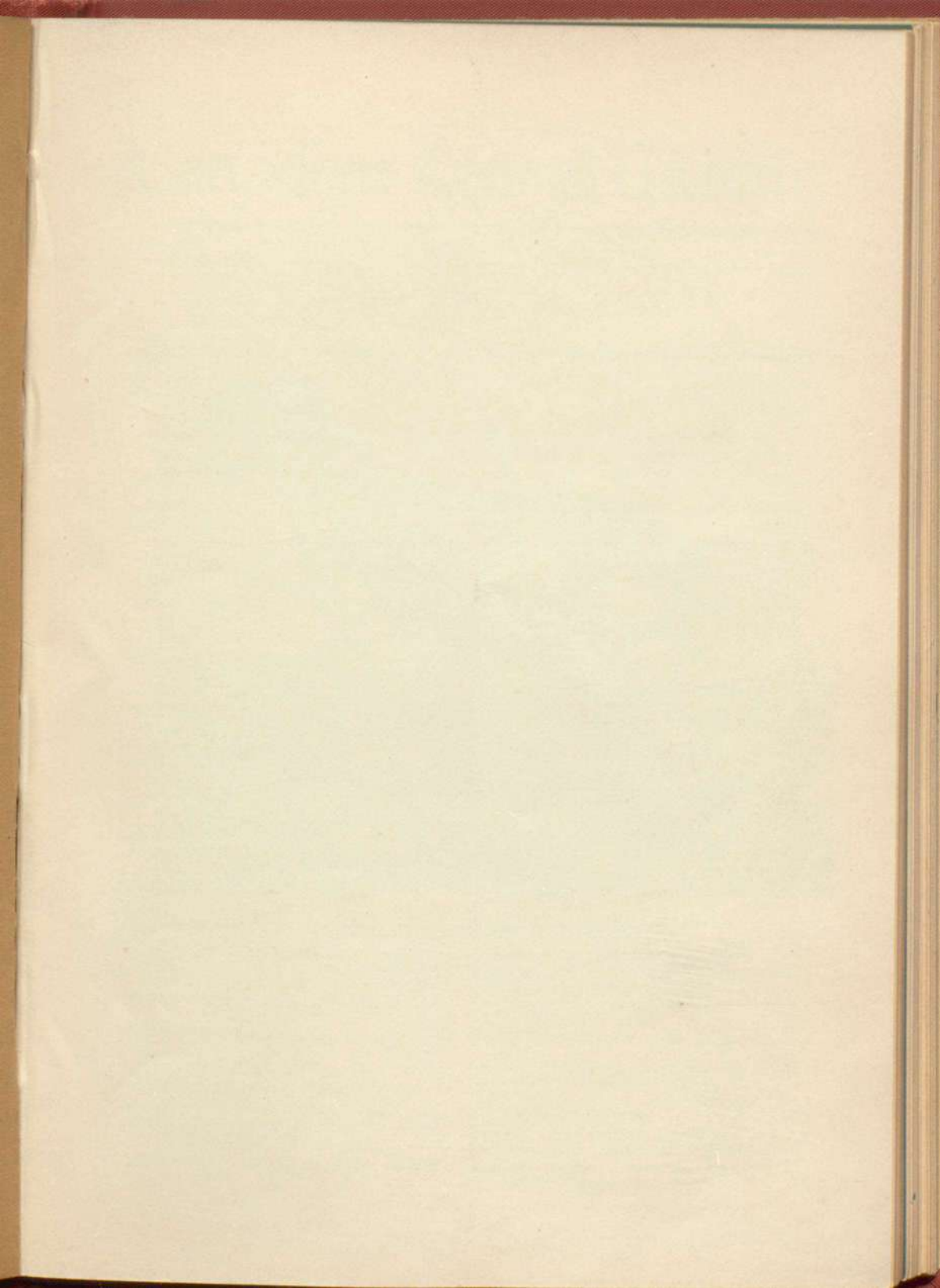

## Collies at Toronto

Lt.-Col. Robt. McEwen, better known by his many admirers as plain "Bob," judged these classes carefully, and in most cases gave general satisfaction. There are a great many good Collies in Canada, but the month of September usually finds them as bare of coat as the proverbial badger, and this year was no exception to the rule. I would like to see a show purely for Collies held each year—say New Year's Day—turn about in Toronto and Montreal. With good prizes to help cover long railway journeys and other expenses we would soon have keen competition and a general improvement of the breed. Before this could be brought to a successful issue, it would be absolutely necessary to form a new Collie Club, which would absorb all other similar organizations in Canada. However, this is another story from the subject in hand.

Puppy dogs were very moderate, so we will pass on to the novice class where Mr. Watson's new dog, Parkhill Squire, was the winner. While a taking dog in appearance, due to his immense, richly colored coat, he is not the type to be aimed at. Our idea of a Collie is a dog built on racy lines, and one capable of galloping. Squire is a short bodied one on short legs. His head lacks refinement, and his ear carriage is uncertain. Minto, second, has rather a nice head and expression, good ears, but behind that he won't do. The same criticism applies to Crawford Star, third. Mack, reserve, has forelegs that are anything but straight, and Prince, v.h.c., was in

very poor condition. The remainder of the class contained one or two dogs better suited for companions than the show ring.

Limit class went to Parkhill Squire, but Lochiel, a dog with a sweet head, ears and expression, must have made it a near thing. The latter also has a good coat, legs, and feet. He is much too short and cobby, but, nevertheless, a good type of Collie.

Open dogs. Mr. Reeve may be congratulated in bringing out our old friend, Woodmansterne Conrad, in such beautiful bloom. He looked even better than when he first landed three years ago. If he keeps in shape, and is properly shown, we know of no dog in America to beat him. Parkhill Squire was quite out-classed in this company. King Edward VII., a dog of the highest quality, was in very poor condition and should not have been benched.

Puppy bitches. Cunning Lass, the winner, has a very nice head and ears. The other entry is weedy. Novices—Blair Athol Lassie, first, is of good size and quality, but hardly gets her ears up. Lady Titan, second, a real good sort, is unfortunate in having low ear carriage. Bonny Tess, a beautiful bodied one, was third. Lady Lu, reserve, must have escaped the Judge's eye, as first otherwise must have fallen to her lot. She is a black, white and tan with quite the most typical head and ears in the show, good legs and feet and fair coat. When she fills out, with ordinary luck she certainly will make a name for herself. Highland Belle II. is not high-class.

Open—Mr. Reid's grand big bitch, Logan's Heather Blossom, was quite the best, and with just a bit better

expression and refinement in skull, absolute perfection would be attained. Bonny Tess was second, and Colla Kirsty third. In the class for other than sable and white, Lady Lu at last won a first prize.

## Toronto's Annual Fall Show

St. Bernards showed a good deal more quality locally than heretofore and were headed by Bayview Baden-Powell, who, fresh from his Pan-American wins, took all before him. An excellent headed dog, with grand body and legs, he is not so active as his litter brother, Mayor of Watford, who is sound and lively as a kitten, but whose rather unattractive color detracts from his appearance. Macks fails in head but is sound and active. Princeton Belle beats the second in head and bone. Zantha, well-known and looking well, was alone in limit bitches but went under to Lady Hereward in open. The latter is sound and active but had not the substance and depth of face of her older rival. Duke of Watford was the only smooth.

Kyula was easily the best of the quartette of Russian Wolfhounds, a bitch of much quality, beautiful outline, and nicely shown. Sir Roswald is sound, rather plain headed.

The Greyhound classes did not fill well, all old-time faces.

English Foxhounds were a representative lot, but few new ones. The Toronto Hunt Club sent five couples. Barrie Gimerack is clean in shoulders, good in front, but is on the light side, where in limit those in front of him score. Pattern, well-

known, was behind Solomon, a big, sound dog with excellent head and front. The Toronto Hunt won well in bitches with a level lot.

It is getting hard to say where English stops and American begins in the next class. Most of the American Hounds look like lightly put up English. Hank's Gimerack, well-known, won in winners, and we imagine now wins the title of champion, as does also his kennel mate, Hank's Merry Girl. The bitches were a nice lot.

The Pointer classes did not fill well. Bell's Rap, who won out, is a clean-made lightweight. Denmark is well-known; King is a bit coarse in head. The bitch classes contained but two, both rather below first-class form.

English Setters, small classes. Albert's Fleet beats Grouse II. in head and quality, the latter in good coat and condition. Dick's Lad is out at elbows. Brighton Heather, a nice style of bitch, none too good in legs and feet. Queen Kent good in body, moderate head.

Irish Setters are always good here, though there was not the number of entries this year that we expected to see. St. Elmo II., the puppy winner, has a lovely head, is good in bone and of an attractive, sound

color. Rorry O'More stands on good legs, nice head. Balance of the novice class good. Old St. Elmo, gone very grey, had but his kennel mate Shaun Rhue III., good in outline. Sig's Girl and Toronto Mollie II. were the best in the bitch classes.

The one Gordon is poor and first was withheld. Mr. Darrell showed three hardy looking Chesapeake.

Poodles, but two, both poor.

Dalmatians. Three fair ones, Walle the best in body.

We don't look for a big entry in Bull Dogs and did not get it here. Rodney Rosador won pretty well all over, a sound one good in head and body. Otterburn Ivel is a bit long in face, good in body, and should improve. Duchess of Breen, a lightweight, was the best of the bitches, a nice little one, good in head and body, that might be put down in better condition. Rodney Clematis is a bit on the long side.

In smooth Fox Terriers the winner turned up in Dusky Don II., on first appearance rather a common looking dog, but who improves on criticism. He is lower than the present winning type, coarser looking, none too

good in front, a sturdy Terrier without the "finish" needed for some years past. We had more than a good word to say of Norfolk Richmond on his debut, and he still holds his high place in our opinion. As he was put down at Toronto he must have been a surprise to those critics who said he could not last. Norfolk Blue is a grand fronted, long headed dog. He excels in shoulders but is, perhaps, a trifle off the ground. Tyke is beaten in head and shoulders, might have given place to Vanguard. There was nothing in bitches equal to Norfolk Handicraft in nice trim. Warren Venus is good in head and expression, where she beats Norfolk Blue Bud, good in front. Aldon Delight full of quality, expression spoiled with too large ears, which is also Aldon Dimple's fault, a nice bodied and fronted bitch. Norfolk Ruby was out of shape, or she would have done better. Norfolk Dame won in a mixed veterans' class.

The wire puppies were just a fair lot, of which Aldon Viking was the best, good in bone and front, fair head, where he beats Look Out. Al-



don Vandal, a big little dog, won in the novice class. Broker did not make the best of himself, a nice headed dog, good in front and coat. Hillcrest Friar won in limit class, an overrated dog put down in poor fit. Others repeats. Bank Note, looking well, stood out in open and winners. Hillcrest Fencer is a smaller dog with a good jacket. The bitch puppies were not good. Flashlight won in novice, a taking little bitch with character. Aldon Dainty wants more coat and less ear, good front and fair body. Formosa's front is none too good, good coat. Charlton Glory, undersized, light in bone. Hillcrest Facile is big enough in ear, good front, wants coat. Aldon Ecstasy, nice in head and expression, second in limit, others repeats and same in open. Champion Endcliffe Banker, looking very well, was alone in veterans.

Homewood Beauty was alone in Bostons, the only other entry being absent. The only Airedale present was put down to third.

Irish Terriers. All Blue won in puppies, looks leggy, fair head and front. The other entry present, Brigg's Muddler, a sturdy Terrier, on the large size. Bob Thorburn won in novice from Bullet Proof, a nice type, who gets an elbow out. Bob has the better body. Tremail Tullamore carries a neat ear, good body, coat not harsh enough. Pat has grown in size and temper. Open class repeats. Princess Vigilantius won in novice, limit and open, a nice type that fails to Harlem Peggie, second in limit and open in front. Mrs. Brazier showed a grand team of Scotties, and practically accounted for all there was going. Mr. Caverhill's team of Skyes are almost be-

yond criticism and were all put down in wonderful trim.

One Bedlington, a fair all round specimen.

Black and Tans, a nice little lot, mostly well-known names. Lady Dallas won in puppies, dogs and bitches, and was alone in novice bitches, none too good in head.

Beagles were a miscellaneous looking lot, all types. Lord Bobs has a typical head and excellent feet. Elora Rose is good in legs and feet with a decent head and body, and the same applies to Nigal, Cliffmead Little Ben, Cliffmead Copsewood, and most of the others fall in head though passable in body and legs.

Three nice Whippets, a French Bull Dog, a Whippet Italian Greyhound completed the list outside Toy Spaniels (two) and three moderate Yorkshires. Canada is worse off than ever for Toys; more's the pity.

Mastiffs. In this breed there were two very good specimens. Mr. Falconer's Capt. F., though in the sear and yellow age, is still a good dog.

Lord Elgin, shown by the superintendent of the show, though somewhat undersized, well deserved his prizes.

St. Bernards. Baden Powell, of



course, quite outclassed anything shown. He now requires a long rest and feeding up.

**Great Danes.** Dr. King made a good win with Fordham Cymro, a good-sized fawn, possessing soundness and quality.

**Russian Wolfhounds.** Only one, Mr. Kent's Kezada, grand neck and shoulders, but lacking in size.

**Greyhounds.** Dictator has a good neck and shoulder, a good front and body. He has a poor head, which detracts from his general appearance. Nellie and Jessie Coulter are both too fat.

**Foxhounds.** A very nice one, Flossie, won. She possesses the high quality of her sire, Gimerack.

**Pointers.** A big entry but sorely failing in quality. Quite the best of the lot was Nellie, a liver ticked bitch with few faults but a light eye.

**Setters.** Another large gathering but very little quality.

**Cockers.** These classes were well filled and were of much better quality than the Toronto lot. In puppies, Mrs. Gammon scored with Lady Dottie, a beautiful bitch, buff, whose only fault is her lack of size. Novices,—black dogs, Mr. Herbertson, of Detroit, brought out a really good young dog in Mark Hanna, a son of his old favorite, ch. Pickpania, whom we're glad to hear still retains his vigor. He is a trifle light in muzzle, but will improve. Second came Hamilton Duke, very fair head and body but a trifle oversized. Black Domino who won all before him at Toronto could only get third here. He is much too large. In the class for bitches there was nothing to stop Maple Leaf, who has few faults barring being a bit undershot. Open black dogs found Paragon to the

fore. He is heavy in head and undershot, and was very lucky to defeat Mark Hanna, a feat he is not likely to again perform. The others appeared in the novice class. No vice any other color was a very big class and rightly headed by Miss Macdonell's beautiful parti-color Braeside Blue Jacket. Like all the English Cockers, he lacks lip and depth of muzzle; apart from this it is hard to find fault with him. He should be a most useful outcross for breeders to use. A very good lot followed. In open, any other color, Mr. Mead added another prize to the already large list of Perfection, who was shown in poor condition.

**Collies.** An exceedingly poor collection, and prizes were rightly withheld.

**Bull Dogs.** Otterburn Ivel, looking much better than at Toronto, had his revenge by defeating Duchess of Breen. Both are high class.

**Bull Terriers.** Newmarket Baron II., who did so well at Buffalo and Toronto, was in superb condition. A dog with no conspicuous faults. Bayview Beryl, second, was shown hog fat.

**Black and Tan Terriers.** Maximo Gomez, first, has a beautiful body and stern; he is a trifle strong in skull. Ringcraft, second, might have won as about the only thing he falls in is distinctness of tan marking. However, Mr. Lacy certainly knows this breed.

**Bedlington Terriers.** Mrs. Coleman, whose literary fame under the nom de plume of "Kit," is widely known, spent two days at the show, and exhibited in three classes, Gipsy, a very representative specimen of this neglected breed.

**Skye Terriers.** Six very good

specimens were benched, of which Wheel of Fortune was the best. Bobbie Burns is a promising puppy.

**Irish Terriers.** The Rev. Father O'Gorman captured all the prizes with Bullet Proof and Harlem Peggie. The former has a grand long head and good ears and expression; short, compact body, and good coat. He is not true in front, barring this he is a "flyer."

**Fox Terriers Smooth.** For some unknown reason this always largely represented breed were only given classes undivided by sex. Puppies, Aldon Vanguard, well shown by Mrs. Macdonald, won easily. He has a fine front, neck and shoulders, but is undersized. Bonnimoor Regent, a son of Daddy, will never be large enough. Novices,—Vanguard again followed by Aldon Dimple, a good bitch in all but ears, which are heavy. Aldon Aurora, third, is a nice little bitch but is poor in front. Limit,—Mr. George Bell scored with Fordham, a typical son of Veracity, and probably the best dog by him in America. He scored in open and winners also.

**Fox Terriers, Wire Haired.** Puppies,—Mr. A. A. Macdonald supplied the winner in Aldon Viking, a tan-marked puppy with a grand front and good bone. He is a trifle long cast. Some undeveloped but highly bred youngsters followed, claiming for their sires Go Bang, Limefield Roderick, etc. It is to be hoped that these dogs won't have to depend for their immortality by their representatives at this show. Novices—nothing new. Otterburn Candidate, in grand form, won as he liked in limit, open and winners, also capturing the special for the best Terrier.

**Beagles.** Elora Bluebuck and Elo-

ra Maid are both good specimens, with the proper sort of legs and feet and very fair heads.

**Dachshunds.** Wellington Satisfaction, a beautiful black and tan, was an easy first. He might be a trifle leaner in head. Douro, second, was at Toronto.

## Notes for Novices

A great deal of suffering is caused among sporting dogs and sheep dogs—carriage dogs, too, for that matter—by a soreness affecting the feet, which, although it may be nothing more than a passing tenderness, will yet develop into a condition of serious inflammation if it is not properly attended to. The dog has on the tread of his foot a sort of pad of leathery material, which is apt to become worn away and tender by excessive work, and especially by such experiences as running to and fro over stubble or rough ground. Provided the general health of the animal is satisfactory, a day or two of rest will be all that is required, but it very often happens that a condition of things like this will affect the general health, and feverish symptoms may appear. The treatment will depend upon the severity or otherwise of the case. A poultice of linseed meal will usually be necessary, and if there is any formation of pus this will need to be liberated subsequently. A lotion, composed of one ounce

of tincture of arnica and one ounce of laudanum, added to a pint of water, will suffice to cure any but serious cases. It needs to be borne in mind that if a dog has been kept up for some time and has not been accustomed to hard work, he will suffer with his feet much as a man will suffer with his hands if he suddenly takes to boating. The pad of a dog's foot, like the skin of our hands, needs to be gradually accustomed to the work that it is intended to perform.

----

There is another form of foot trouble which usually affects dogs kept indoors, and especially those which are pampered with all sorts of niceties, which, as we have said many times in this column, simply shorten the period of a dog's existence—at all events, of his comfortable existence. This form of foot trouble consists in a red swelling of the toes, resembling to a large extent a chilblain. In some cases these swellings are brought

about by want of a little attention, but more often they are purely and simply due to a surfeited state of the system, and need for their treatment a few doses of Epsom Salt or some other reducing medicine. The swellings appear first on one foot and then on another, and it is not always the same toes which are affected. The best treatment to adopt externally is a hot fomentation of poppy heads, camomiles, and hops, which will usually allay the irritation—for that there is irritation as well as pain is undoubted, for the dog is continually biting and licking the places. If the foot has been freely bathed in warm water, a little carbollised vaseline can be applied, and the dog's head should be tied up for a short time so that he cannot interfere with it. Sometimes these painful symptoms are due to over-grown claws. The nails of house dogs which do not get plenty of out-door exercise are apt to curl round and penetrate the foot. When a dog is running about out of doors most of his time he keeps his claws worn down, but when he is on soft carpets and wooden floors the case is different.

---

Dogs are subject to growths of various kinds, which cause them a great deal of inconvenience, and are best removed, if possible. We do not advocate the use of hot irons and other barbaric methods, such as are generally in use, for removing excrescences like lip warts, but, of course, a great deal depends upon the conditions under which the excision is carried out. A few days ago, we assisted in the removal of a large, fleshy growth which had appeared on the middle of the back of a Dandie Dinmont. It was decided

to perform the operation under chloroform, and the dog having been sent off comfortably to sleep without much trouble, the growth (which was about the size of half a walnut) was cut clean away, and the skin was sewn up. When a growth of this kind is not malignant and does not appear underneath the skin, its removal is by no means serious, and excision is by far the best and most satisfactory means of dealing with it. In this case, two days after the operation, the dog was running about as well as ever. It is said that dogs do not take chloroform very well, but a great deal depends upon the way in which it is given. The best way to give chloroform to a dog is to put a wire cage muzzle on him first, and then administer the chloroform by means of a cloth or piece of lint, which can be wrapped round the muzzle. By this means the dog receives the chloroform diluted well with air, and there is less risk therefore of a fatal ending to the operation.

---

A great deal of mystery surrounds the origin of many distemper outbreaks—mystery, at least, so far as the amateur mind is concerned. Many people declare that it is quite impossible for their dogs to have "caught" distemper, and that an outbreak in their kennels must be due to some internal or constitutional cause. This is the unscientific manner of enunciating the doctrine of spontaneous generation. But spontaneous generation will hardly account for an outbreak of distemper. The term "spontaneous generation" can better be applied to such a thing as heat, which is a condition of matter, not matter itself. You cannot produce some-



thing from nothing, and distemper, being a disease dependent for its origin upon microbes, is not likely to break out unless one or more distemper microbes be present to start it going. You may pour water on to lime, and chemical action ensues, by which heat is generated, but if you wish to generate microbes you cannot do that by any chemical process; you must begin with a small living cultivation, and develop from that. There is no doubt whatever that one real cause of distemper is contagion. By contagion we mean contact—not necessarily that a dog in health must come into actual contact with a dog suffering from distemper in order to take it—but that he (the dog in health) must come into contact with distemper microbes.

----

Scientists tell us that the atmosphere by which we are surrounded is filled with all sorts of germs — germs of health and germs of disease. These germs are always on the look out for suitable spawning ground, if we may apply that term to the matter. In other words, a diseased germ will fix itself upon a subject who is in a state of health favorable for the operation of disease germs. We see this quite plainly in a disease like typhoid fever, which, in most cases, affects people who are run down and debilitated in health. The same principle applies to the spread of distemper. A kennel which is in a dirty, unwholesome condition exposes its occupants to disease to a greater extent than does a healthy, well-ventilated kennel. The first rule, therefore, to be observed for the avoidance of distemper is the rule of cleanliness and sanitation. We are well aware that

distemper often breaks out in kennels which are perfect so far as their arrangements are concerned. An outbreak in such places as these must be due purely and simply to actual contact, and so we come to the second rule to be observed for the prevention of distemper, i.e., the rule of quarantine; whenever a new purchase is made, or a new animal is acquired, or comes for any reason to a kennel of healthy dogs, he should invariably be quarantined. A month is not too long to ensure immunity. The disregard of this most elementary precaution has proved a very expensive piece of negligence to many a dog owner.

----

Then there is a third rule, which we will call the rule of isolation. Whenever a dog is seized with distemper, or, indeed, with any illness that may develop into distemper, or with any ailment the nature of which is not apparent, the proper course is to remove him at once from the other dogs, and keep him from communicating with them in any way until he has quite recovered. If he should develop distemper, he should be attended to by some person other than the man in general attendance, or he may just as well not be isolated at all. The germs of disease would be carried at once from him to the other dogs. The attendant who looks after a dog with distemper should on no account come anywhere near the other dogs; and if any of the others sicken after the commencement of an outbreak, they, too, should be at once removed. Under this same heading we may classify the subject of disinfection, for, in using the word isolation, we mean the isola-

tion of the disease germs as far as possible, and their destruction by that process. Now, if distemper breaks out in a kennel, and it is necessary to remove one or more of the dogs, matters should be arranged, if possible, so that the kennel in which the outbreak occurred can be emptied of all its occupants immediately, and be thoroughly disinfected before it is again tenanted. As regards disinfection, we have more faith in the burning of sulphur than in anything else. The fumes of sulphurous gas which are produced by the combustion of sulphur in air are most poisonous and penetrating. A stable or kennel or room, for that matter, should be cleared of anything that will be spoilt or discoloured, such as clothing, but all furniture should be left in it, because it is quite useless to disinfect a place if you first of all take out the furniture and then, immediately that the disinfection is over, put the furniture in again, thereby bringing back the contagion as likely as not. Clothing and things of that sort can be disinfected by washing, and as regards furniture, that is best left in the place where the disinfection is carried on, so that the whole contents of the premises are subjected to the same poisonous vapour.
