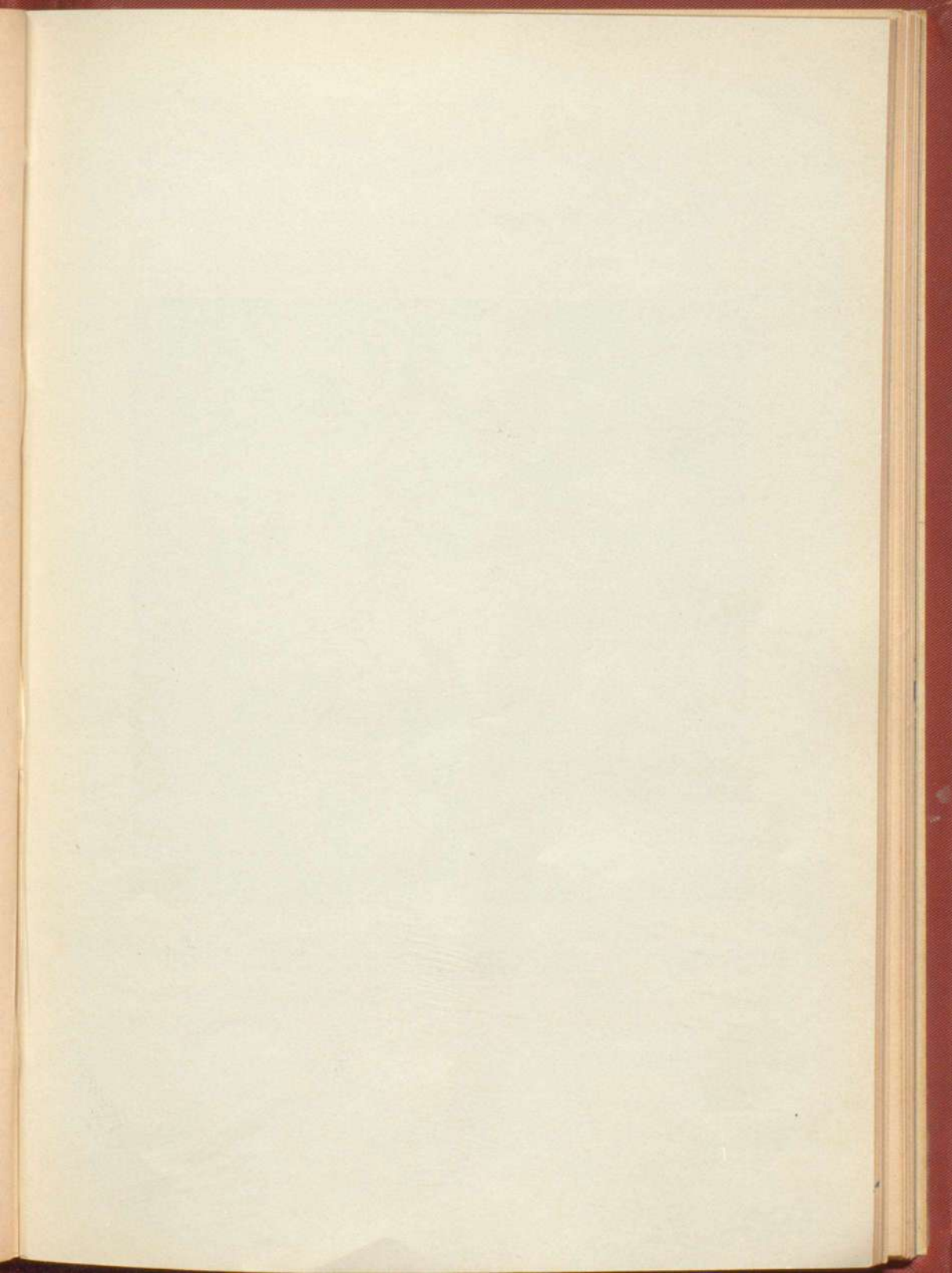

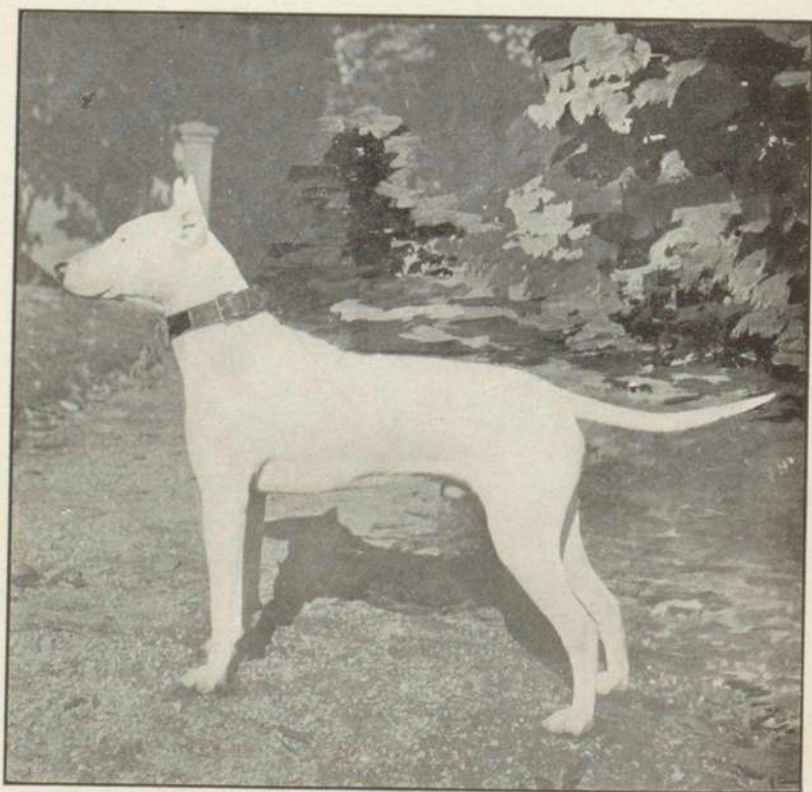

POINTS OF THE BLACK AND TAN
TERRIER, AS SET FORTH BY
THE BLACK AND TAN TERRIER
CLUB OF AMERICA.

Head—Should be narrow, almost flat, with a slight indentation up to the forehead, long and tight skinned, level in mouth, with no visible cheek muscles; it should be slightly wedge shaped, tapering to the nose, and well filled up under the eyes with tight-lipped jaws.

Eyes—Should be small, bright and sparkling, set moderately close together, as near black as possible, oblong in shape, slanting upwards on the outside, they shall neither protrude nor sink in the skull.

Nose—Should be perfectly black.

Ears—Should be button, small and thin. Small at the root, and set as close together as possible at the top of the head.

Neck and Shoulders — The neck should be slim and graceful, gradually becoming larger as it approaches the shoulders, and perfectly free from throatiness, slightly arched from the occiput. The shoulders slope off elegantly.

Chest—Narrow between the legs, deep in the brisket.

Body—Short, with powerful loin, ribs well sprung out behind the shoulders, the back being slightly arched at the loin, and falling again to the joining of the tail to the same height as the shoulder.

Legs—Perfectly straight and well under the body, strong and of proportionate length.

Feet—Compact, split up between the toes, and well arched, with jet black nails, the two middle toes of the front feet rather longer than the

others, and the hind feet shaped like those of a cat.

Tail—Should be moderately short, and set on where the arch of the back ends, thick where it joins the body and gracefully tapering to a point, and not carried higher than the loin.

Coat—Close, short and glossy, not soft.

Color—Black and tan as distinct as possible; the tan should be a rich mahogany color. A tan spot over each eye, and another on each cheek, the latter as small as possible; the lips of the upper and lower jaws should be tanned, the tan extending under the jaw to the throat, ending

in the shape of the letter V; the inside of the ear is partly tanned; the fore leg is tanned to the knee, with a black patch "thumb mark" between the pastern and the knee; the toes have a distinct black mark running up each, called the "pencil-mark"; the tan on the hind legs should continue from the pencilling on the feet up the inside of the legs to a little below the stifle point, and the outside of the legs should be perfectly black. There should be tan under the tail and on the vent, but only of such size as to be covered by the tail. In every case the tan should meet the back abruptly.

Weight—A toy should not exceed 7 lbs.; a medium sized dog, 17 lbs., and a large size, 25 lbs.

Collies and Sheepdogs

Editor Gazette:—

I have seldom seen so refreshing a criticism of a dog in a show, as that of "Ringside" on Parkhill Squire, on your page 369. It is utterly exasperating to have dogs of any breed set up as "high-class," "typical," the right sort," etc., when they are glaringly deficient in some essential. "Ringside" indicates a cloddy, chunky dog, and what under the sun good is such a dog for working sheep or cattle? A stock dog is the better, far the better, for being "racy," but what he does need, most of all, is nimbleness, and no chunky dog was ever that. But judges, and not a few fanciers, will get their heads swelled over some purely "fancy" property, and all real fundamentals of usefulness are trifles in comparison. The utter and complete folly of this view ("infernal craze" is the better, if less "politer," name) is in the evident fact that many, very many, high-class Collies have, I suppose, and had, I know, every qualification for excellent workers; Christopher, Carlyle, and Dolly, for instance; and Christopher's son, Ormskirk Charlie, was not only a most renowned and almost invincible, winner at sheep trials, but a show winner to boot.

Dogs of high show type can be bred that are good workers; many of them are and have been—I think that Carlyle was picked up driving cattle in England—but that cannot be done if a superabundance of "coat" or the muzzle of an ant-eater, with the expression of a blacksnake, is to be worshipped as "type," "character," "right sort," and such gibberish,

terms that fanciers too often use to shut the eyes of observers to condemning faults in their "cracks."

I have a sample which illustrates this, right in my yard now. My recently imported bobtail (have not got his name yet) is exactly what a bobtail should be, in the minutest point, except that he is far too large for working sheep; in conformation everywhere he is beyond improvement, and no better worker ever saw cattle. Yet his one fault is the very property that insane "fanciers" will select as his merit. If I were to show him, the comment would be, "A fine big dog; not coated enough." Yet his coat is perfection viewed from the standpoint of his work, dense undercoat, ample top coat, and decently flat, at least not one continuous tangle from root to tip, and his feet and pasterns are not coated, nor should any working dog's be so. Why should he be compelled to weary himself carrying a load of mud in his work? But then my bitch (also imported, and, I regret to say, with lots of pedigree) would be set down as just right, "excellent coat, but too small," whereas she has a coat worse than a poodle's, and is a little too heavy, perhaps five pounds or so.

The dog's size suits me perfectly, for the work I have for him. I want him to whip cows that trespass on my grounds, as well as to drive them out, and to lick any dog that comes on the place, in both of which he has proved a great success. He has thoroughly whipped one St. Bernard, and two "big, black dogs," one after the other.

Now, understand me, I am not

puffing my dog to make him a "crack." Nothing could induce me to enter him in a show; he is far too good a dog for that. But he does answer very well, to point an imbecility of fancy insanity.

Then Mastiffs have shown the same utter contempt of all sense and reason. The stumpy, short-bodied, straight-hocked "Crown Prince" was set up as a marvel, and the poison of his blood is not weeded out yet. We had the perfect Beaufort as a pattern to go by, and a long-legged, (or ridiculously short-bodied; state it either way you choose), slab-sided one is gravely said to be his superior, and the best dog ever in America! Truly, they do "make us tired!"

A PROMINENT ENGLISH SETTER OWNED IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Mr. C. W. Minor's Champion Roy Montez.

The accompanying cut is a good picture of Champion Roy Montez, 5765, C. K. C. S. B., Mr. C. W. Minor's English setter, who swept all before him at the coast shows, and, although benched out of condition, did well at eastern shows. Following are his winnings since the 10th of April, 1901: First limit, first open, first winners, special for best English Setter owned by a member of the English Setter Club, Seattle, 1901, and special for best English Setter in show; first open, first winners, and special for best English Setter, Portland, 1901; second novice, third limit, third open, Chicago, 1901. In Chicago he met the best dogs of England and America. The Sportsman's Review, of Chicago and New York, in its report of the show, said he was a very fair specimen, but shown in bad condition. The American Field said he was plain, but one that stood inspection well at all points. The fact is he had just gone

through two long shows at Seattle and Portland, and was sent from Portland to Kansas City and from Kansas to Chicago, and was among strangers and tired out. At Victoria he won first limit, first open, first winners and special for the best English Setter in the show, not only defeating Lady Howard for the special, but won the Canadian Kennel Club's bronze medal for the best Setter of any sex or breed. These wins were all made under eastern first-class judges. At Nanaimo he won first limit, first open, first winners under a local judge. The latter win makes him a champion. He is owned by Charles W. Minor and was bred by Thos. H. Hardy and raised by Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Anderson, of this city. In the Times it was stated Lady Howard won first in the limit class in Victoria in 1901. This is wrong, as the limit class was won by Gladys Montez, a niece of Champion Roy, also owned by C. W. Minor.

Mr. Cole, who judged Seattle show, stated when Roy was examined in his presence by a coterie of fanciers for the purpose of fixing in their minds' eye the type of dog selected as the winner, that in his opinion the animal possessed the best head of any dog of his breed exhibited before him in America. Roy is descended from a combination of the best bench show and field trial blood in America. Mr. Cole is a leading judge, and has an extended record as judge of bench shows, among the many being Sacramento during the last state fair; Kansas City last season; Dallas, Tex., two years ago; Milwaukee, Wis., three years ago; Cedar Rapids, Ia., four years ago; St. Louis during

1889-1900; Joliet, Ill.; Topeka, Kas., and other places.

This dog stands twenty-three inches at the shoulder; length of head from nose to occiput, nine and one-half inches; muzzle, four and one-eighth inches long. His weight in fair condition is forty-nine pounds.



THE C.K.C. AND FIELD TRIALS.

Hamilton Dog Show

Special Report by Mr. H. W. Lacy

Entries, 337; actual dogs benched, 200.

Held Nov. 8 to 9, at Hamilton, Ont.

The Gore Kennel Club must be congratulated upon scoring another success, their third annual show proving to be a collection of higher class and more entries than heretofore. The Hamilton public are evidently appreciating the good to the fancy the new club is bringing about by these shows so that the attendance was quite good, especially in the evenings, and when we left Saturday evening there was every prospect of the club saving its stakes and a bit more.

This year the club launched out into a special building, the Palace Rink, and put up its own benching. The rink is not well adapted to the purpose, being very low of roof and the windows are so arranged that one has to look for them to find daylight, consequently without the aid of electric light, and not very power-

ful at that (the kind that tickled the elephant Jumbo), most of the building would have been in semi-darkness. Two substantial rings were provided in the centre of the floor, and here the electric light was fairly good, but trying to the eyes.

Judging did not commence until after two o'clock on Friday afternoon. Mr. Lacy judged in the evening and finished up all but a few of the rough Terriers, and with Mr. Kennedy, completed everything next morning.

The show was excellently arranged in so far as the aisles, feeding, etc., were concerned. The show was kept scrupulously clean, and for this the president and secretary are entirely responsible; they were the workers of the show. They arranged everything. Mr. Geo. H. Carley, the secretary, must be given a special word of praise for the admirable manner in which he had worked up the details beforehand, the judging book being a model of neatness and arrangement, all specials being written out after every breed's classification. The ribbons and tables were all there and in fact there seemed to be nothing left to chance. A good idea of President Jackson's was the bill hook scheme to keep the ribbons separate and in order on the judge's table.

The quality was good in spots, Fox Terriers and Cockers being the main strongholds, and here some good ones came forward. While several kennels like Norfolk, Macdonald's, Otterburn, Bay View, Sid Saunders and one or two more showed, the bulk of the entry came from local kennels, and well sustained Hamilton's reputation as a stronghold of the Canadian fancy.

Among the visitors from outside we

noticed Messrs. Geo. H. Gooderham, W. P. Fraser, A. A. Macdonald, and Mrs. Macdonald, H. B. Donovan, Fred Jacobi, Charlie Lyndon, George Bell from Toronto; C. Y. Ford, from Kingston, Ont.; Geo. Dunn, Woodstock, Ont.; W. T. Collins and wife, St. Thomas, Ont.; R. Kerr, Peterborough, Ont.; Dr. Babcock, Brantford, Ont.; Sid Saunders, Guelph, Ont. Mr. Hartley, the San Francisco Fox Terrier fancier, paid a visit to the show with his bride the second day and bought Norfolk Billy. Frank Dole ran up for a few hours the last day and caught a few dark horses.

St. Bernards. The only rough puppy was a cherry nosed one. The winning novice has a good body but lacks squareness of jaw. The others were ordinary. Carlo, third, had the best head, but was in wretched shape, and dipped in back. Bay-view Baden Powell simply made the others foolish, a grand dog all over, but in poor shape; his skin needs attention. There were no bitches. The smooth has too much white, only a little color on cheeks.

The Newfoundlands were shelly and light in heads and eyes, with long ears covered with rough hair.

The one Mastiff is just fair, good skull and body; needs flesh.

The two Great Danes were also at St. Thomas, but Cleopatra showed up stronger here.

Foxhounds had two fair Americans and one half and half, Russell's Flossie, who excelled in make and shape all over.

Greyhounds. Director has gone to pieces and was well beaten by a promising pup, Deceiver, by Dictator, whom he much resembles.

Several fair Pointers came forward, the dog, Shot, being the best in head and body.

In Irish Setters, the puppies were poor, but Tipperary Young Larry shows a good type of head and color, but beaten in head, body and hindparts by Tipperary Larry in open and winners. The only Gordon was fair, lacked coat.

Spaniels formed one of the principal features in the show, but were benched in a bad light and the deep stalls, too deep, added to the gloom of their retreats, so that it was hard to see them when chained.

The Fields were big Cockers, until it came to bitches, where a daughter of Endcliffe Bishop won all through; a nice bodied sort.

Cockers showed a distinct tendency to legginess, and coarseness of head, and there was little of that compactness we look for in the male division; bone is also deficient as a rule. Union Jack, the St. Thomas winner, scored again, a trifle on the leg, very compact, good color, but light in muzzle, or he would sit on the top rail. Geneva Jack, novice, limit and open winner, blacks, is not high class, not straight in front and has a high, round skull; outside of that he will do. Hamilton Duke is also faulty in skull, and front not above reproach. The puppy winner went to the top in novice reds. Sandy's coarse head mars his handsome body and color. We liked Buller, third, a very nice little dog with a better head than either of the winners. Limit, reds—Bayview Robin and B. Beguller scored over Union Jack in heads, but not in show form. Waverley Prince is a bit on leg, but is well formed. In novice, partis, Pompey, the winner, has a coarse head, is high on leg, and long ears; High Life has a better head and is a better Spaniel. Braeside Blue Jacket easily scored in quality and shape

over Pompey in limit, partis, but looked light in body. Miles has a plain flat face and is too big, but well formed in body. Geneva Jack, as reserve winner, was lucky. In bitches, Geneva Queen has a nice head, but is a bit long cast. Blue Bird, a sweet little thing that, if it makes the minimum, will be heard from, was second; we liked Jeanne, a red, and have little fault to find with her. Dolly Varden needs to be shortened. Little Gem has a nice head, good color, but is a little on the leg. Marguerite is a very pretty buff and should have won easily. Novice, blacks, first, repeat, Nellie Bly, has a long, light muzzle; Trip is coarse; Royal Nance too big; Dora, a Field Cocker, with excellent coat. Maple Leaf spread eagled the limit and open lots, shown in rare shape; better in this respect than anything friend Dunn has yet shown us. Koto is too high on leg, and the same in skull. Josie Brooks was absent. Novice, reds—Jeanne, first; Blush, a pretty sort, second; Red Molly, third, who lost to Millgrove Maid in body and legs, but the latter is a bit wrinkled in face. Limit, first, Office Girl, a rare sort of red all round, that was a good reserve to Maple Leaf in winners. Second to her in open was Otterburn Evangeline, who lost a bit in head; in partis, a very pretty bitch, a shade long, but excellent in head was the only one in Kroydart Rose's absence.

Collies. A poor lot excepting Logan's Earl, short of coat, and the two tricolor bitches, Lady Lu and Walden Beauty, the former winning in head and undercoat. Canning Lass is a fairish puppy, beating Walden Duchess in head. Logan's Earl won the special.

Bulldogs. Otterburn Ivel, making

up in head nicely, and Duchess of Breen were the best, the other being too long all through.

The winning Dalmatian is quite a fair sort, but the other is too bowed in front, also weak.

The winning Airedale is a goodish stamp, if cleaned up a bit all through; excellent in coat, beats the bitch in head and correct size and forelegs. There was only one decent Boston Terrier, Bennie H., all white body, very fair head and stern. The others are too long faced, and Ginger has no markings; a neat little thing but snipy.

Beagles. General Garcia beat Echo in head, body and front. Bul-lard's Flute, a well-shaped dog all over, but poorly shown, won in limit. Miss Roxy scored so in shoulder, head and expression, the issue was not doubtful in novice bitches; but in open, Elora Rose had the best of it in type, coat and body.

Dachshunds were good. Sid Saunders showed a nice puppy in Satan, in fact a good little one, black and tan. In dogs, Douro is a bit coarse and faulty in hocks and too long in feet, and in head Satan beat him. In bitches, Miss Tough had the better of Polly in head and front.

Fox Terriers. These were judged in the evening and formed an interesting group. There was quality in the winners, but the general run showed lack of strain. It seems ridiculous that the breed does not grow in form when Canada contains so many crack Fox Terriers, dogs with established reputations as sires that may be had for moderate fees right at their very doors, dogs which beget winning youngsters in the hottest company anywhere. In looking over the prize list I find that not one Terrier, outside of the Nor-

folk entries, was sired by Norfolk stud dogs; therefore the Gooderham special shield for the best team of Terriers sired by their dogs went begging. This is one of the phases of the Fox Terrier industry in Canada that is inexplicable to the foreigner. The winning puppy, smooth, N. Richcraft, is by N. Richmond—N. Handicraft, a mating that we understand has nicked splendidly. Aldon Vanguard loses in head and coat and ear; Rowdy is soft in coat but better in front and shoulder and body than reserve, who is too high behind. Novice, dogs, brought out a very classy Terrier in Norfolk Billy, long, punishing head, nice ear and front; if he tightens up in body and shoulder, he will be a hammer; second, Bango II., is one of those unknowns, a well built Terrier all over, nice long head, but could be improved in shape of muzzle. Rowdy, third; reserve, repeat. Limit, repeats; third withheld from a fairly good headed one that would not move. Open, Norfolk Richmond and Bango II. Richmond won about all over. Puppy bitches. It was against the grain to show a "Carrie Nation" any favors, but she beat N. Patch in skull and body, the latter also showing very badly; something strange in this kennel. In novice, Norfolk Blue Bud showed up well. A heavily marked bitch, that could be improved on the loin; good front, very fair head, a little faulty or rather flat over the muzzle; she won easily over Carrie. Third, Dolly Varden, faulty face and front. Limit, Norfolk Quickstep, first class head, shoulders and front, scored, though in whelp, and easily beat second. In winners, though beaten a bit in bone, she excels in head and body over Blue Bud.

Wires were not very high class. In puppy dogs, a good headed one with rare bone, but spoilt in expression by big ears, won easily enough. In novices, too. In limit, Otterburn Candidate scored well in body, front and general make up. Aldon Viking seemed better in ear and size than third, who is a bit on leg. Reserve, Red Wolf, whose body dipped and muzzle looks weak. Open, 1 and 2 repeat; Aldon Vandal third, good front, but looks too "jumped up" in body. Novice bitches brought out a rare little sort in N. Vivacity, a daughter of N. Veracity and N. Vivacious; long, fine head, nice ear, and what a front! made up in body there will be some more hot stuff. Aldon Ecstasy scored in head over N. Outcast, but lost to the young bitch in front and shoulder, ear and eye, in winners.

Irish Terriers were moderate. Those that were well formed and good in coat, like Tipperary, were too big. Puppies should have been withheld. The only goodish bitch was Nora McShane. The Scottie is a commoner.

Black and Tans were good, especially in bitches, where Roche Pearl and the well known Daisy were winners, the latter getting the special.

There was a nice little competition in Skyes. Bobbie Burns is a very promising pup, but requires furnishing and exercise. He lost to Ness in muscle and body. Highland Laddie lost to both in body and head and coat. An excellent little Pug bitch, Nellie, was shown, the best marked one seen for some time, with decided trace. Yorkshires were ordinary, but two pretty Toy Terriers came forward, the winner getting the verdict in pencillings and tan. A pretty little Beagle, very

good, too, won the small miscellaneous, and a Whippet the large class. Bull Terriers were ordinary, and not representative of the town or country. One Russian Wolfhound was benched, one of Terra Cottas, therefore the right sort.

We had arranged for several photos of the officers to go with this report, but, as but part are to hand, we refrain from printing any until we receive the remainder. Hamilton cleared one hundred dollars on the show, an example of what careful management will do.—Ed.
