You will understand what I mean by dew claws, that is, extra toes on leg or just above the foot. Some have one, some two, and others none. I will be very much obliged to you for the information through the C.K.G. if I am not asking too much

This is a question that need not trouble our correspondent. Dew claws have no significance and the sooner removed the better, as "babyhood" is the period of repair. Remove with a pair of sharp scissors when the puppies are about one to three weeks old. If allowed to remain on some dogs they become positively injurious and tend to the cultivation of an ugly gait.—Ed.

## CANADIANS AT PHILADELPHIA.

It seems evident that Philadelphia show left much to be desired in the way of management, if all accounts are true, and the Stock-Keeper does not hesitate to say so.

Mr. W. P. Fraser's debut as a Fox Terrier judge was a success and in him we have a man whose judgement is not likely to be led astray by extremes of any type, and who will also give full value to condition, as, for example, the putting back of Bank Note in winners, for the reason that his coat was not in proper show shape.

Bay View Kennels' grand St. Bernard, B. V. Baden Powell, was fourth in limit and open, and might have gone at least one step higher. Mr. Clarke's Kimo won in pup-

ples, Cocker dogs, and also in novice. He was second to Geo. Douglas' Fritz in limit, where Paragon was third, and Bay View Beau fourth. In open dogs Douglas had 1st and 2nd with Fritz and Black Duke Jr. and first and reserve with the same brace in winners. In the other color novice class Mr. Miller won with Bay View Golden Prince, third going to Dunn's Waverly Shamrock. In solid other than black, Canada was first, second and third, with Robin Hood, Waverly Prince and B. V. Beguiler. Waverly Prince was second in open parti colors, and Topmost second in open. Res. in winners went to Robin Hood. The awards in the bitch classes were as follows:—

Puppies, bitches, any color—1, Brookside Kennels Brookside Coquette; 2, Clark's Dainty Dot; 3, Douglas' Rose Hill. Novice bitches, black—1, Douglas' Morette; 2, Clark's M'Liss; 3, Dunn's Maple Leaf; 4, Brookside Coquette. Limit bitches, black—Ditto. Open, ditto. Winners, bitches, black—1, Morette; res., M'Liss. Novice bitches, other than black—1, Clark's Quentine; 2, Bay View Kennels' Bay View Bonny; 3, Dunn's Waverly Gyp. Limit bitches, any solid color except black—1, O. B. 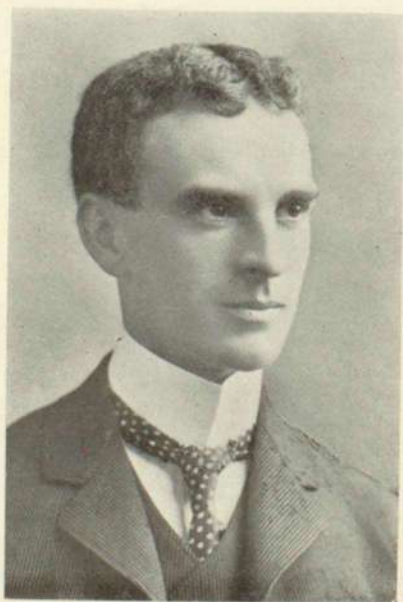

3. Any person favorable to the objects of the club is eligible for membership.

4. Every candidate for membership shall be proposed and seconded by two members in good standing.

5. The name of the candidate shall be forwarded to the secretary, and by him entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and the committee shall have full power to accept or refuse the proposed member.

6. The secretary shall, on the election of a member, notify him of his election, and request him to pay his dues, and on payment of same, and not till then, shall he become a member of the club. If his dues are not paid within thirty days from the receipt of the notice, his election shall be void.

7. The annual dues, which shall be two dollars, shall be payable on the first of September of each year, and if any member allows his dues to remain unpaid for thirty days he shall

be notified by the secretary, and his name is liable to be struck off the roll of members at the first meeting of the committee thereafter.

8. The executive committee of the club shall be vested in the president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and two other members.

9. All meetings of the club and of the committee shall be presided over by the president, and in his absence the vice-president, and, failing him, by a chairman to be chosen from the meeting.

10. The secretary-treasurer shall keep a book wherein he shall copy these rules and by-laws, and enter the name, address and calling of each member, and shall keep proper books of account containing full and true statements of the sums of money received and expended by the club, and the matter in respect of which such receipt or expenditure takes place, and of the credits and liabilities of the club, and shall also keep a book containing minutes of all the proceedings and notes of the club and of the committee, and shall keep a record of all the winnings of the club, prizes and stakes. The secretary-treasurer shall also have charge of the correspondence of the club and the issuing of notices to members of all meetings.

11. The committee shall meet once in every three months at a time and place to be named by the president, and at the request, in writing, of two members stating their reason or object, the president may at any time call a special meeting of the committee.

12. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

13. The committee shall have sole power to consider the expenditure

of the club funds, and the general management of the club, arranging shows, appointing judges, and giving special prizes; the committee shall also have power to remove any officer or member of the committee for neglect or violation of duty, and to fill the vacancy.

14. The committee shall cause to be prepared annually a detailed statement of the financial condition of the club, showing the receipts and expenditure for the past year, the number of members and other matters of interest to the club. The fiscal year shall terminate on the 31st of August each year.

15. The committee shall have power by a two-thirds vote of the whole club to forfeit the membership of any person for conduct likely, in the opinion of the club, to endanger the welfare or character of the club.

16. The interpretation of these rules and by-laws, and of the terms and conditions of the club, prizes and stakes shall be left to the committee, and their decision shall be final.

17. The members of the club shall hold an annual general meeting during the Toronto Industrial Bench Show, and five members shall form a quorum.

18. The president shall call a special general meeting of the club upon the written request of five members.

19. The members shall elect the president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and two other members to form the executive committee for the ensuing year in the following manner. As soon after the first of August as convenient, the secretary shall prepare a list of the members in good standing, and shall send a copy to each member with a request that he vote for one man for presi-

dent, one for vice-president, one for secretary-treasurer, and two other men. The member must mark the word "President" against the man he wishes for president, and "Vice-President" against the man he wishes for vice-president, and "Secretary-Treasurer" against the man he wishes for secretary-treasurer, and an "X" against the names of two others whom he desires to vote for as officers and committee respectively. The voting papers shall be opened at the annual general meeting of the club, and the five men receiving the highest number of votes for officers and committee, shall form the committee for the ensuing year, and the man receiving the highest number of votes for president shall be president; and the man receiving the highest number of votes for vice-president shall be vice-president, and the man receiving the highest number for secretary treasurer shall be secretary and treasurer.

20. At the meeting of the club the order of business so far as the character and nature of the meeting may permit shall be as follows:

- (a) Calling of roll and reading of minutes.
- (b) Reports of committees.
- (c) Elections.
- (d) Treasurer's statement.
- (e) General business.
- (f) Adjournment.

21. The rules and by-laws may be amended only by a two-thirds vote of the members present at a general meeting.

22. All resignations must be made in writing, addressed to the secretary, but no member can resign while his annual dues are in arrear.

23. The interest of each member in

the property of the club shall cease with the termination of his membership, and on the dissolution of the club, which may take place with the consent in writing of two-thirds of the members, the assets of the club, after payment of all debts and liabilities, shall be divided among the members equally.

24. A Canadian bred Black and Tan

Terrier shall be understood to be a Black and Tan Terrier dog or bitch born in Canada. An American bred Black and Tan Terrier shall be understood to be a Black and Tan Terrier dog or bitch born in Canada or the United States.

25. All complaints or suggestions as to the management must be made in writing to the committee.

new to judging work, at least at such an important show, but the appointment of Mr. S. E. Shirley, the doyen of the kennel world, for the wire-hairs, was almost universally adversely criticized. The older hands know that the past chairman of the Kennel Club is a good, sound judge of almost anything on four legs, but they feared that an experience gained in the "long ago," and a knowledge certainly not up-to-date with modern developments, would be the origin of awards that would not "go down" with the wire-haired men of the day. As far as Mr. Thorold was concerned, the War Office stepped in and prevented that gallant officer from fulfilling his engagement and a most efficient substitute was found in Mr. W. S. Glynn, who judged very well indeed. On the other hand, we may say that Mr. Shirley's awards were not accepted, but they were made according to "his lights," and there was a consistency about them after all that carried us back to the days of Birch, Spike, and a Muir of that ilk, now long numbered with the past, when a cloddy dog, with a keen head, varmint expression, and a hard coat was what was wanted in a wire-haired Terrier.

If the awards were not up-to-date the fault could certainly not be laid upon Mr. Shirley's shoulders. The committee that appointed him is alone to blame. Although we may be almost alone in our championship of Mr. Shirley's awards, it is some satisfaction to be able to state that the challenge cup went to the best wire-haired Terrier in the show, for Dusky Reine is a gem of gems, a shade on the small side maybe, but otherwise almost perfect, and, certainly, a Terrier "down to the ground."

Curiously enough, the same theory worked out in the smooth division, for in Duchess of Durham and Avon Minstrel, two of the little "big 'uns" came in for the trophy. Whether this show may prove to be the first nail in the coffin of the "giraffes" we know not, but good must come from these particular awards, and that, as a result, the Fox Terrier of the future will be a low-set, heavily boned little dog, with a long head, clean shoulders, and a short back and keen, varmint expression, and we are sure that those losers of today who are loudest now in their condemnations, will come to bless the two judges who "stopped the rot" now rapidly setting in, and which would in time have entirely altered the conformation and character of the Fox Terrier.

It was with a decided feeling of relief that we noted that the old venue, the Winter Gardens, Cheltenham, was the appointed place in which the show was to be held. There can be no better spot in England for the purpose, and we thought the arrangement of the benches this year was a decided improvement, for they were along the centre of the long hall, which left the two large spaces at the ends at liberty for most capacious judging rings, so whatever mistakes were made, the judges could not possibly lay the fault upon the want of light and room.

It was rather too late, remembering that the day was mid-November, when a start was made; however, when things were set going, there was no time cut to waste. In the smooth ring we found good stewards attending upon Mr. Glynn. Messrs. Crosthwaite, and Bradley had the business in hand, and the judge officiated before quite a select audience.

Mesdames Tinne, Marshall, Bennet, Edwards, Miss Powell, Miss Crum—whose brother's exploits with the oar for the Dark Blues will be remembered—the two Miss Evelyns, and one or two other ladies took their seats early. Amongst the non-exhibiting contingent we noticed Messrs. F. L. Evelyn, C. Leach, V. B. Johnstone, L. P. C. Astley, R. B. Lee, E. Powell, Jr., etc., all greatly interested in the proceedings. Mr. Gerard Clay was very busy, and seems none the worse for his campaigning experiences. Mr. F. Evelyn was taking a good look at the cracks as they came out, and wondered if the Fox Terriers had really improved in as great a degree as has been claimed for them, and, of course, other well-known faces were legion, for what Fox Terrier man that can possibly be present is ever absent from this, the event of the year?

A casual glance round the benches, whilst the judges were getting ready, made it evident that there was but little new of any great merit, although both Mr. Tinne and Mr. Redmond had youngsters of merit of both sexes, the former gentleman's Pete Quillan striking us as being something quite out of the common run. This preliminary inspection also made it certain that whilst dogs were but fair, the bitches were really an extraordinary lot, and would take a lot of sorting out.

Passing on to the wire-haired division, we found very little new. True, there were some old faces in better form and generally improved almost beyond recognition, but certainly the many recent shows had exhibited the "sensations." That good breeder and old fancier, Mr. Charles Bartle, had one or two new ones to show, and Mr. Brumby also had a "good

thing" or two, or thought he had. As usual, Mr. Raper's team was trained to the hour, and so was Mr. Enfield's. Mr. Redmond's little lot were also fit, and the Duchess of Newcastle's Terriers were just as fit as Mutter could make them, and that is saying a lot. We came across Mr. G. W. Mason, with one of his little team, attending to its toilet with as much care and judgment as if it had been one of the loved Curly Retrievers, and with good effect, as our prize list will show. Miss Hadfield, getting ample and valuable assistance from Miss Armstrong, was very busy with her nice team—assiduity also to be duly recompensed later on.

There were not many lady onlookers in the room when Mr. Shirley started work with Mr. Arnold Gillett, Mr. Lohead, the secretary of the Cheltenham Show proper, in attendance as stewards.

In the very first class Mr. Shirley gave a clear indication of the direction in which he would steer by putting Don't Go Bang first, a dog distinctly of the old type; and with a very great amount of consistency, this type prevailed to the end.

A gratifying feature was the success of that plodding but keen fancier, Mr. A. H. Enfield, who did very well indeed, and ultimately won the challenge cup with his charming bitch, purchased, by the way, from Mr. Redmond, the runner-up being Don't Go Bang, before mentioned. The result was highly popular, and undoubtedly the best Terrier won.

We naturally took the opportunity of asking Mr. Shirley what he thought of the modern wire-hair as compared with the dogs of his exhibiting days. His answer was: "I don't think they have improved, for



the majority of these dogs are too big." Verb. sap.

A notable feature in the wire-hair section was the successes of the progeny of Cackler of Notts, the Duchess' dog being the sire of all three winners in the Birthday Stakes, a very big performance indeed. In the latter classes we noticed a few of the awards were reversed; the results were mostly unimportant, and certainly excusable under the circumstances.

We were pleased to find Mr. J. R. Whittle once more in his post of manager and assistant secretary. The veteran's absence last year we remarked upon at the time, and congratulate him upon his return to office.

Mr. Mayor has sold to Mrs. Bradley-Dyne, of British Columbia, the successful Scottish Terrier, Dopper, who has won prizes at the Crystal Palace, Birmingham, and Sandy. This lady, we understand, has about the leading Scottish Terrier kennel on the Pacific coast. Dopper was shipped by the Dominion Express Company.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. J. O. Bennett, which occurred on December 14th at his home in Parkdale, a suburb of Toronto. Mr. Bennett was well up in years and had been ailing for some time, so that his demise was not unexpected. Mr. Bennett was one of the first members of the Canadian Fox Terrier Club, and though he never owned a flyer was the possessor from time to time of some very fair specimens that some years since were able to get in to the award list somewhere.

The Rev. gentleman considers this the best Terrier he has yet owned.

## ST. JOHN, N.B., SHOW

Mr. H. W. Lacy, who judged all breeds, breezily recounts his experience in his paper, the American Stock-Keeper. St. John should hold its next show under C. K. C. rules, when it is likely that at least many of our Quebec friends would help out, if only to gain a win towards the cups that the C.K.C. is now giving to champion dogs.

It is some fifteen years since the New Brunswick fanciers held their last dog show, when it is said the judge who officiated at that show was so severe on the exhibits that the life was knocked out of the game for the years that followed. No doubt there was, judging from what we saw last week, good cause for withholding prizes in many of the breeds, but some leniency should be expressed in these cases, as a sort of encouragement for the future. To kill the spirit for exhibiting is worse than to give a mediocre dog recognition, at least in the majority of cases. Naturally, this depends a good deal upon circumstances and the judge's discretion and tact must be exercised.

St. John as a dog show quantity is entirely in the embryo. With the exception of, perhaps, two, none of the exhibitors had ever seen a dog show, or dogs which are acknowl-

edged as good examples of their breed. These are the very worst sort of dog shows to judge, for, by the majority the adjudicator is looked upon as an interloper and one whose knowledge of dogs is extremely limited when set up in opposition to the opinion the owner has formed of his dogs. This sort of thing, of course, would be disturbing to the amateur, but to the callous "all rounder" it is taken as a matter of course. In a community like this, there are always one or two "sea lawyers," who boast of knowledge experienced people try to forget, and St. John is no exception. He turned up in the Cocker division. The judge threw out a number of liver and white, and some black dogs, that were too high for field Spaniels and far too heavy for Cockers in the Cocker classes. One individual led the disgruntled in a protest to the committee, giving as his reason that the "London" standard called for a maximum weight of 32 lbs. Not being familiar with the London standard (Leadenhall probably), Mr. Lacy, for the sake of the committee, modestly stated in writing the three best known Spaniel Club standard weights, Canadian, English and American, either of which barred their dogs, even if their general build and



conformation had been correct. Another gentleman could not see how a Collie that sometimes curled his tail a little gaily, but quite a nice sort all over, could beat his goggle-eyed, broad skulled, cheeky dog with down carried ears, but was bigger and had a little more top coat.

The trouble is, they have very few really good dogs up there to judge by, but if the Association will join either the C. K. C. or A. K. C. and continue to hold shows, offering inducements to outside dogs to compete, the situation will soon change, and the very owners who felt upset because we withheld here and there a prize, will understand the justice of the judge's position. It is all a case of spare the rod and spoil the child, over again. The same state of affairs applies, perhaps in less degree, to the poultry fancy. They are both about a score of years behind the times.

The show was held Nov. 20, and two following days, in the St. Andrews rink, a splendid building had it been heated, but bearing in mind the raw cold which prevails on the shores of the Bay of Fundy at this time of year, one can imagine what an ice box time we had of it in this great building. The benches for the dogs filled three sides of the rink, while two rows of pens up the middle accommodated the poultry.

There were no catalogues. The dogs numbered about 160 and there were no duplicate entries. The benches were well set up and very roomy. The show was entirely local, and, considering the interest exhibited by fanciers and the public, especially after the show opened and became an acknowledged fact, suggests a promising future. Some 40 dogs were refused the first day of the show.

To Mr. T. McCullough belongs entirely the credit, at least of the dog show, and he was all important in the conduct of the poultry show. Had it not been for his efforts no dog show would have been held. He drummed up entries, saw to all the arrangements and induced this or that visitor or member to handle the dogs, kept the books and took down the awards. Afterwards he took the scores of the birds from judge Felch. Mr. McCullough ran the show and kept it clean and tidy, and still had time to tell us how it all came about and how difficult it had been to drum up interest, and what they intended to do in the future.

It will not take us long to go over the dogs.

In St. Bernards there was as good a lot as we have seen at some Canadian shows, in years past (happily). The winning dog, E. McKay's, shows some quality, is nicely marked but lacks massiveness in head; second, J. Walsh's, is too crooked in forelegs and short in body, but has the better skull and muzzle. The others were mediocre. The only Great Dane was too fat, small sized and snipy.

Newfoundlands were very good in coats, and, though leggy, had very nice heads.

The winning Pointer is a fairly well formed black, one of the Pope strain; a little coarse all over. Bitches were not so good, one, nearly all lemon, very snipy and wide in front, getting a second; quite a nice liver and white dog pup was first.

English Setters. The dog winner is a bit heavily built all over, but showed some glimmer of type, while the other two were just racy Setters lacking in character. G. Kearn's Irish Setter dog is a very

fair sort, with quite a typical head and good color, beat second in head and front. The pup is promising. The Gordon was a fairly good headed one, should be richer in tan.

Field Spaniels were an odd collection, some docked, some not, and of all colors. A rather leggy black got a second in dogs and two fairly good bitches rather short in back went the limit. Two or three would make good English Water Spaniels. The winning Cocker has quite a nice head, is a little leggy; second is a bit wide in front, and third is snipy and rather small. The parti-colored dog pup is quite promising; should be straighter in front.

The winning Greyhound is too big and coarse all over but a rarely well built one, is grand shape; third is too fat and "jumped up" in back. The bitch is too small but the dog pup is very good from the head back, but not straight in front. A capital Foxhound bitch, one of the Heffenger pack, was a good first, although alone.

Fox Terriers were really poor, something surprising in an English community. Barring a wire puppy, said to be by Bank Note, a little down faced and on the leg, there was really nothing of show form, if we would except a good old-fashioned sort that won in wire dogs, a smaller edition of Meersbrook Bristles, but never having heard of dog shows he had paid no attention to his waist line and cleanness of shoulders.

Irish Terriers. Third in dogs was given to Col. A. Blaine's little prick eared (cut) Terrier, one of the old waterside ratter stamp of twenty years ago. The winning bitch had a good coat but was fine in muzzle; of a nice size.

Bull Terriers were a weird lot of

business dogs. The winning dog was a well formed big chap, but very savage, and his head looked as if it had been well pummelled; second is too deep in stop and short in muzzle; the others were just Terriers. A nice bitch puppy won the special, that is, nice in comparison. Several prizes were withheld.

Collies were worth considering, though the best would not get higher than letters at a show in the States. The winner is quite good in head and ear, a racy dog all over, lacking in coat just now, he is a grandson of Southport Perfection; second is a handsome looking dog, but full and round in eye, not placed obliquely, is heavy in ear, and wide in brow and skull. The third was a nice black, tan and white, with a splendid body and coat, but its ears were very slovenly; the others were mostly prick eared or chunky; the reserve was small but had a fairish little head, the best v.h.c. dog had a great coat, but his ears were solid prick and he was very shy about them.

Miss Thomson showed a big, fine Russian Wolfhound, Ivan, that has seen New York benches. He was a bit over done in flesh but easily took the special for best in show, with a bobtail reserve, a really nice one, if a bit truer in front and harder in cut. A very nice medium sized black and tan bitch came forward; beautiful tan thumb marks, very fair head but breeched and showing too much vent tan.

Some fair Dalmatians were shown, though the spots were not distinct enough. The only Toy Terrier was of the average sort, the others in this division were merely toy Fox Terriers, and the Yorkshires were just little, rough Terriers. A very



pleasing Skye Terrier, Miss Clinch's, came forward; a little soft in coat and should be longer in back. A very fair Dandie Dinmont was also a surprise, with more coat it would have made a bid for specials.

## BRANTFORD'S INITIAL SHOW UNDER C.K.C. RULES

The first bench show of dogs given by the Brantford Kennel Association was held on Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 27th and 28th.

The show committee had arranged for the Drill Hall, but, owing to some misunderstanding, it could not be obtained, and they had to fall back on the large skating rink. The place was roomy, the benching new and clean, the stalls large and were kept tidy, and plenty of fresh straw available. The temperature was the great drawback. The weather, unusually cold for the season of the year, and the strong wind blowing through many openings kept it cold in spite of the two big stoves which were kept at full pressure.

Dr. Babcock, the secretary and the superintendent, and the committee under him, worked faithfully and deserved better treatment at the hands of the Brantford public, as the attendance was small.

One large ring in the centre of the floor was used for judging, which commenced at three o'clock Wednes-

day afternoon. Mr. Thomas continued during the evening, and finished his classes, Mr. Watson and Mr. Jeffery completing theirs the following morning.

The entry no doubt was smaller, owing to the Philadelphia show falling on the same dates, but the 180 entries, with something over a hundred dogs benched made a fair showing.

The quality in Fox Terriers was good, thanks to the Aldons, Irish Setters, Collies, Irish Terriers and Skyes, and the Elora Kennels' Beagles made a nice display.

Among the visitors from out of town were Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Macdonald, F. W. Jacobi, R. H. Trimble, Harry Taylor, Geo. Bell, of Toronto; W. T. and Mrs. Collins, St. Thomas; G. G. Duncan, Norwich; Mrs. Gammon, Geo. H. Carley, Rev. Thos. Geoghegan and Jos. Kennedy, Hamilton.

Lord Elgin was alone in Mastiffs; quite a fair sort.

In Danes, Fordham Cyreno easily



disposed of MacLeta and Blue Violet, a pair of undersized blues.

The Bloodhound, Sound, lacks wrinkle and expression.

Spaniels. One overgrown Cocker who made up in width what he lacked in length was the only entry in fields.

In Cockers the red puppy Union Jack, that has been winning of late, was 1st, not a high-class one, leggy and boundy in head. Black dogs were poor. In black bitches Geneva Queen, that won at Hamilton, was easily the best. A good, sound little bitch that can always get near the top. Lady Dottie, the little buff, that won at Toronto, is improving. Queen of the Snows, a nice headed black and white, won handily from Tremail Dorathae. The winner has good head, muzzle, eye and ear, straight front and fair body.

Duchess of Breen was the only Bull Dog, the balance of entries being of the street variety.

Bull Terriers were a bad lot.

Boston Beans was the best of a very good entry in Bostons. Rodi Jr. and Miss Rodi represented the long and low, both well known.

Fox Terriers, smooth puppies; Aldon Vanguard beats Advance Guard in front, body and stern, and showed himself to better advantage. Tremail Minto was the best of the bitches, long, punishing head, keen eye, small, well carried ear, grand front, short body and a good shower. She is faulty in hind quarters and badly docked. Brant Enterprise, a nice type, but has gone wide in front and was too flat. Dolly Varden plain in head, and loses in body to other two. Aldon Dimple absent. The wires were all Aldons and put down in their usual good condition.

Irish Terriers brought out Rev.

Thos. Geoghegan's recent importations. Teddy, the smaller of the two dogs, has a good head but is poor in front and tucked up in body. Tim, who won in open and winners, is a better stamp, with a beautiful front, good, long head, well carried ear, good body, coat and color, both were very low in flesh. Tremail Tullamore, well known, was 1st in limit and reserve winners. ## OAKLAND DOG SHOW

The G.K.C. President tells of his visit.

It was my good fortune to be in San Francisco during the last two days of the Oakland Bench Show, and I can assure you it was with a great deal of pleasure that I availed myself of the opportunity to visit it and see what the coast was doing in the way of matters doggy.

A very enjoyable sail across the bay and a short railway ride brought me within a couple of blocks of the building where the show was being held in connection with a poultry and pet stock exhibition of considerable merit.

When I got inside I was somewhat disappointed to find that there was such a small number of dogs benched, for I had expected that on account of its being, to all intents and purposes, a San Francisco show and under A. K. C. rules, there would be a large entry. They numbered only, however, according to catalogue, one hundred and thirty-five, but when I discovered some time later a large entry fee was charged (I was told it was three dollars) for the pleasure of a medal if by lucky chance you had the best dog, I thought surely the coast fanciers are a long suffering people, though it seems to me they will not endure it much longer, and even now are ready, waiting and anxious to be led out of the wilderness by some Moses if only some such an one can be found to do it, for they are certainly in a tangle 'twixt A.K.C., P. K. L., Advisory Board, etc., etc. It is a great pity that in some way or other the whole matter could not be threshed out and settled once for all, for it is quite evident that the present arrangement is not

working at all satisfactorily to but a very few if any of the best fanciers of the coast—and there are some good ones, as we all know, out there. Let us hope the good time is near.

I am sorry I did not get to the show until the judging had been completed; but the awards were evidently very satisfactory as I failed to hear even a fair average of kicks. The judges, with one exception, Mr. Chas. R. Harker, of San Jose, who judged Mastiffs and Saint Bernards, were all San Francisco fanciers, and the greater number of the classes were passed on by Messrs. Chute and Klein.

In all of the breeds there were some very nice specimens, but California and the Pacific States can do better yet, and will do so just as soon as they awaken to the fact that they can have things as they want them if they only insist on their rights. There is room for a good, strong, healthy organization there and it ought to come soon.

One very gratifying feature to me was in looking over the catalogue to find in a large number of breeds so many dogs of Canadian breeding, or from Canadian stock. More especially was this noticeable in Fox Terriers, Cockers and Bull Terriers. In Fox Terriers alone out of some twenty-four or twenty-five dogs benched I counted, roughly, some fifteen as having at some time or other owned Canada as their home, or had sire or dam from there, while it goes without saying they acquitted themselves well and firsts appeared to be their luck.

While on the whole the quality was



not of quite so high an order as our shows in the East, there were some exceedingly good ones shown in some of the breeds, amongst them being Mr. Newman's R. C. St. Bernard Lester C., a very fine dog, sound and good in every way you looked at him, and who succeeded in beating Le King. Mr. O. J. Albee, D. G. S., who, by the way, we were glad to shake hands with as a member of the C. K. C., showed a very fine Collie of his own breeding that when in good shape would make some of our Eastern cracks stand on their best behaviour until the judge got through with them, and perhaps even then might have to go away without the blue. Mr. Morgan's Nicola Daddy, lately arrived from the East, did the trick in Fox Terriers and at the same time covered his owner with glory. This same gentleman has a very good thing up his sleeve in the shape of a wire hair puppy that if nothing happens may take a trip across the continent to cross swords with some of our best ones. It is certainly an exceptionally nice one now, and if luck stays with him will take a lot of beating.

Mrs. Bradley-Dyne, of Sydney, B. C., had the distinction of being the only Canadian exhibitor, and I was glad to see had the honor of carrying off firsts with each of her two entries in the Scotties, and in addition to which an Irishman of her breeding landed the ribbon for Mr. J. W. Stetson, of Oakland. A long way to come for glory, but showing the true spirit, and 'tis a great pity we have not more like this lady.

It goes without saying that I had a very pleasant time and my only regret is that days were not months. The first man I met was our own Mr. L. A. Klein, and it was not long before I was introduced to Mr.

Bradshaw, the superintendent, Messrs. Harder, Morgan, E. Courtney Ford, Hall, Bonannan, Newman, Halley, Norman, Albee, Steers and many others whose names at the present time I cannot recall, but who are all good dogmen, nevertheless, and who felt that though many thousands of miles separated us, and different flags waved over us, we all had the same love for the tyke, and many was the invitation and many was the time that "I could have if I wanted to, but I didn't, so I wasn't," but for good-heartedness and hospitality I want nothing better than can be had here, and Mr. Klein I must specially thank for all the trouble he took to make my stay a pleasant and agreeable one.

I would like to say something about my visit to the Union Coursing Meet, but I am afraid I have already written too much so will perhaps take it up some other time.

## NOTES FOR NOVICES

Many dog owners have experienced a difficulty in dealing with animals which, although they suffer from no specific skin ailment, yet are in a continual state which can best be described as "scurfy." It is often a cause of considerable trouble and no treatment appears to have a permanently beneficial effect. Some of these cases undoubtedly arise from an overheated state of the blood; others are brought on by want of suitable attention to the skin in the way of grooming; yet again there are plenty of cases in which the skin has been, one might say, almost ruined by the use of improper lotions for skin complaints, which leave the skin itself in a constant condition of peeling. So that the first thing we want to determine before we can successfully treat a dog for scurf, is what is the cause of it—it is due to the internal state of

the animal, or has it been induced by some unwise or improper treatment on our part? Having ascertained this we shall know better how to proceed, because if it appears that a poor condition of the blood has something to do with the ailment it will, of course, be necessary for us to give suitable internal medicines, which are of more importance in such a case as that than the application of any external remedies that we can devise. If the dog appears to suffer from irritation of the skin, which leads him to scratch himself, it will be safe to assume that he is in need of blood medicine; but if, on the other hand, the scurfy state of the skin is not accompanied by any signs of irritation it is probable that suitable external treatment will be all that is required.

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There is a large variety of drugs from which a selection can be made for any cases of blood trouble. Iron in some form or other is recommended by most well-known writers upon canine diseases. The simplest form is that of sulphate, which can be obtained in the form of crystals, which can be powdered up and be added to the drinking water; but, as a rule, iron always develops a brackish taste, and dogs will not take it very well in that form, and it is better for it to be given in the form of pills. Any chemist will supply two-grain sulphate of iron pills, one of which is a sufficient dose for a dog of 25 to 30 pounds weight. Iron, like most mineral remedies, requires to be given in small quantities regularly, and a sulphate of iron pill should be given twice a day, at least, for a space of time varying from a fortnight to a month before any very marked change may be expected. It is also desirable to bear in mind that iron has a constipating effect, and this will have to be counteracted by the administration of aperients as often as may seem necessary to keep the system regular. A compound rhubarb pill, or a podophyllin liver pill, given occasionally, will probably be found to answer all requirements in this direction. Another form in which iron can be given is that of the citrate. But cit-

rate of iron is in flakes, which, on exposure to the air, rapidly become deliquescent, and, moreover, it is stronger in taste than the sulphate, so that, on the whole, the latter is to be preferred for most purposes.—“Our Dogs.”
