that the executive were obliged to make up a deficit from their own pockets, we use strong arguments in asking for a greatly increased entry, which we trust they may get. Mr. Mutchmor has something to say elsewhere in this issue and we will give a list of specials, etc., in next month's paper.

The last show in St. Thomas was such a pronounced success that the committee of the St. Thomas Kennel Club has been encouraged to venture again, and will hold their second show on September 23rd, 24th and 25th next. It is an encouraging sign and indicates the greatly increased and healthy interest taken in dogs in Canada.

At our last meeting we appointed our show committee, which consists of our president, W. Ross; secretary, Mr. Collins, and assistant secretary, J. S. Ferguson. We intend to start out on a crusade next week and get all the specials we can from our local friends, and where we cannot get specials we must get names for members. We have already over sixty new members this year, and at our last meeting we elected two lady members. The Black and Tan Terrier Club have promised us that the International Cup (value \$100), presented by Messrs. Foote, Mitchell and McGaughey for the best kennel of four, will be competed for at St. Thomas.

Since writing the paragraph referring to the proposed show in Sherbrooke we

have a long letter from Mr. James Lindsay, Montreal, who is taking an active and entirely disinterested part in promoting its advance. We hope that Western breeders will not overlook the fact that these Eastern shows, Ottawa and Sherbrooke, are being carried on under great difficulties, and to lighten their burden by a bumper entry. There is also another side to this question, and that is that in these newer locations, as far as doggy matters are concerned, there is a market for surplus stock that most breeders are desirous of disposing of.

The following selections from Mr. Lindsay's communication are of general interest:

The Sherbrooke people intend to have another dog show at their coming fair in September, the week before Toronto dog show. Last year, when I was in Toronto, the breeders I spoke to all promised to support it another year. What are the prospects, do you think, for it? They are new at the game, and need some help. They will make it an annual event if they get encouragement and can show some increase this year, but otherwise I think the thing will drop. Sherbrooke holds a fine fair, and you know their poultry exhibit is good, and I understand it worked up from a very small beginning at first. They want to work the dog show on the same lines. I have advised them to cater only for classes that will fill up, say Collies, Cockers and Terriers, with some others, and drop some that only have one or two, or no entries.

I would like to see the Western men take hold of it, and help on any new shows that come along. I think Sherbrooke should have as good a show as Ottawa with proper management and good feeling all around.

A friend of mine tells me he recently was at a dog show in Paris, and speaks of it as the most smoothly managed dog show he ever saw. He says far ahead of anything he ever saw in London or New York, in some lines.

Mr. Lindsay can't get away from Sherbrooke, and winds up with: Certainly I know it is a long way to send dogs to Sherbrooke, but some of us will be there and can take an interest and see the dogs are cared for. Mr. Tomlinson had a really good man last year in charge of them, and they were well looked after.

The Ottawa Kennel Club's Fall Show.

The Ottawa Kennel Club have definitely decided to give another show (as will be seen by the advertisement in another column) and the dates decided on are August 27th, 28th and 29th. This time it will be given in connection with the Central Canada Exhibition, and that association has very generously granted us the use of a very suitable and commodious building. The club will be at some expense in fitting same up, and it is also to be hoped that fanciers will do their best in supporting us with entries. We have the experience of the last show to improve on, and although it could be counted a success so far as entries were concerned, yet we look for a larger show to partly cover the expense that will be necessary on account of the cash prizes and specials we are giving. Our last show was not a success financially, and the executive had to

meet a large deficit. We will have the crowd visiting the exhibition to draw from for gate receipts, and this we will not have at any other time during the year, so that the executive think it a very fitting occasion to make it a test as to whether a dog show in Ottawa will pay its own way when given under the most favorable circumstances. If we do no better financially than we did at the last show I am afraid that it will settle for some time to come the question of a dog show here. Our success will largely depend upon the number of entries we receive, as of course, this will be a drawing card for gate receipts. As we are again showing under C. K. C. rules we think we deserve the support of members and friends of that club in sending us a good entry.

Our class list is much the same as at our last show, but in the open classes

that then supported us best we are giving \$4 for first, \$2 for second and ribbon third. In open classes that had but a medium entry we are giving \$2 for first; and on all other classes (puppy, novice and limit) we are giving a club medal.

Mr. Charles H. Mason, of New York, will attend to the judging, and exhibitors can rely on getting all that is coming to them.

As stated before we are giving this show as a test, but we intend leaving nothing undone to make it a success, and although we expect a deficit (which we have provided for) yet the future of dog shows in Ottawa will depend upon the amount of this deficit.

We are not publishing our list of specials with premium list, as several individuals, as well as specialty clubs, have

not been heard from, but a full list will be published and mailed to all about August 1st, and we expect that the list will be a good one.

I trust that Canadian fanciers will show appreciation of our effort by sending us a good entry and thus advance the interest that has already been awakened here in the fancy. If we have a good show this time the Exhibition Association will, no doubt, come to our aid, and in future our show will be a better one. Our entry fee is very small compared with other shows.

Kindly use your influence in securing us a good entry from the West, so that in future Ottawa can be counted on for a show.

Sherbrooke Show and C.K.C. Membership.

Permit me to ask if a person can send in application for membership in C. K. C. now for next year, and, if so, can they have dogs registered at reduced fees before the beginning of the year, the 1st of September. I expect to get six or eight new members, and they have dogs that they want registered before Sherbrooke dog show.

When I came to Compton six years ago there was not a registered dog nor any well bred ones, and no one knew what breed my Collie bitch Fanny was. I bred her and gave the pups away on condition that receiver was to pay one dollar for registration. I have held the registration back on purpose, and now we have several Collie breeders, and to them I put the proposition that they pay me one dollar for registration of one bitch or \$2 for membership and get one free registration and others for fifty cents each. They prefer to be members, and there is a great deal of interest in dogs

and keen competition. We have in Compton one Scottie kennel, one Mount St. Bernard breeder, five Collie breeders and a number of pure bred Fox Terriers, Cocker Spaniels, etc., and the latest addition, I hear, is a brace of Airedales. The Sherbrooke dog show has done much good for the interest of dogs.

I was much amused last year in reading Dr. Milles' report of the show in giving credit to the promoters of this. The fact is that in 1899 Mr. E. T. Browning and myself asked Mr. Fraser (then superintendent of Canada's Great Eastern Exhibition), for a space to hold a dog show, and at our own expense we fitted up space and collected sixty-eight well bred dogs. This again we repeated in 1900, and in the fall of that year tried to organize a kennel club, but were not strong enough, wherefore we amalgamated with the poultrymen under the name of Eastern Townships Dog, Poultry and Pet Stock Association. This body pe-

Parties who do not get stock in proper manner must put up with after trouble, which is bound to come.

The Gift of "Auchairnie," the Nucleus of a Strong Fox Terrier Kennel.

The Dundee Courier contains a long and interesting account of the successful career of Mr. W. J. C. Reed, whose start in the Terrier line was the gift of a Fox Terrier bitch seven years ago by "Auchairnie" Smith, now of Montreal. The following extracts make interesting reading as showing what intelligence may do in the breeding of dogs and should be an impulse to our young fanciers to "go in and win":

It is not so many years ago since he was thrown into the society of "Auchairnie," once a well-known fancier in the Howe o' the Mearns. From "Auchairnie" he received as a gift a bitch named Auchairnie Lyalla, and from this small beginning he has made a name in this special department, which is to-day known all over the country as one to conjure with when show days come round. It is not, however, as a mere show trotter that Mr. Reed's name looms largely in the eyes of Fox Terrier fanciers. His fame rests more upon the hundred and one specimens he has bred and scattered throughout the three kingdoms. "Any man who has money," he says, "may own the best Fox Terrier in Britain, but it is quite a different matter to breed a flyer." And no doubt this enthusiast is correct in his statement. There is far more in being able to mate the proper types to secure a desired characteristics than there is in simply dispensing coin of the realm and becoming the owner of the best and latest in public favor. There is an art in breeding dogs, as there is in breeding Aberdeen-Angus cattle, and it only falls to the few to attain that end. Mr. Reed is a thorough believer in the high-class sire. Blood, as his former friend "Auch-

airnie," used to say, will tell, and blood Mr. Reed goes in for as a first charge. He never mates his Terriers with a dog that cannot exhibit the true blue blood for generations past, as the record of "The Mearns Kennels" fully illustrates. When Auchairnie Lyalla was installed as his miniature kennels of that day he set about investigating how best he could utilize her. He was fortunate in putting her to a grandson of Rowton Warrant, and the result was he secured a puppy afterwards known on the show bench as Mearns Miller. This was the first Terrier Mr. Reed bred that did any winning for its owner. This was in 1896, and Mr. Gilzean, the secretary of the Scottish Fox Terrier Club, passed a check for £14 and the bitch, afterwards known as Mearns Worry, for this typical little tyke. This was a splendid start for a comparatively unknown breeder, and gaining heart from this transaction Mr. Reed determined to overshadow his maiden efforts. Since that day he has bred and sold scores of Terriers, bred in his own kennels, at prices that the uninitiated would question the truth of were I to state in cold blood the figures he has secured again and again. The dog Mearns Miller won first place as a puppy at Dumfries and Lochmaben before his breeder parted with him, while Mr. Gilzean sent him to the home of his birth and carried off the first ticket there without much trouble.

ORIGIN OF SUCCESS.

But Mr. Reed dates not a little of his success in breeding to his investment in a dog known as Limefield Rattler. In 1896 he negotiated with Dr. Marsh, and this evergreen, ever-renowned Terrier

found a home at Laurencekirk, with Mr. Reed as the proud owner of one of the best sires ever imported into Scotland. This dog was registered KCSB, 53483, and had over sixty first prizes at his credit before he came north. Mr. Reed did not use this Terrier for show purposes. He simply invested in him for his blood, and retained him in his kennels for purely stud demands. From stud fees alone Mr. Reed had returned to him the value of this Terrier ten times over. As a progenitor of the truest type, he also repaid his own a thousandfold, and "The Mearns Kennels" have undoubtedly been built upon this wise investment. Mated with Auchecairnie Lyalla, the first litter contained the undernoted, all of whom have made their name and fame in Fox Terrier circles: Mearns Quarrier (now Pirate Prince), Mearns Spinner (now Prince Patrick), Mearns Rattler, Mearns Premier and Mearns Beauty. Every one of the above has been honored with first prize tickets. At Carnoustie Mearns Spinner stood second to his litter brother Quarrier in 1897, when the dogs were judged by the late Mr. D. J. Thomson Gray. This same Terrier again took second place at Dundee under Mr. George Raper, Quarrier again being first. At Ayr he scored third place under the decision of Mr. Gresham, while his litter brother Rattler carried off the second card, and Mr. George Raper's well-known Ring Master stood in the place of honor. The famous Fox Terrier fancier, Mr. J. J. Pim, of Belfast, then became the owner of this wonderful youngster, and Mr. Reed secured in return the bitch known as Mearns Choice. In the hands of Mr. Pim the Terrier continued its success in the show ring. At Inniskilling, under Mr. Raper, he secured the undernoted tickets: First and three specials in puppy classes, first and special in novice class, and second in limit, and second in open classes. At

Cork, under the same judge, his wins were: First and special puppy class, first and special novice class, first and special open class (beating Irish Justice, who had beaten him at Inniskilling, after which he held undisputed sway in the Emerald Isle, and until he recrossed the Channel to an English kennel.

The only bitch of the litter, viz., Mearns Beauty, was never inside a show while she remained in the hands of Mr. Reed. A Carnoustie fancier secured her, for whom she won dux place at the annual exhibition there. I may say that this bitch and the dog Premier were smooths, the others being wire-haired. I question very much if we have another breeder of dogs in Scotland who can point to so much success in so short a time with one litter as I have stated above. From one success to another Mr. Reed seemed to glide. He bought a granddaughter of Carlisle Tyro, and here again he was intensely fortunate. This bitch, Mearns Fussy, was put to Limefield Rattler, and produced Preston Queen, a really sound wire-hair. Strange to say, this puppy met with little or no reward in the land of her birth, but immediately on crossing the border she gained at Northleach, Woodstock, Rugby, Kiddington and elsewhere. In the second litter, by the same sire, Fussy had the wire-haired dog known in Fox Terrier circles as Coconut, which Major De Castro secured, and exhibited at Plymouth with success. Ultimately this Terrier crossed the Irish Channel, and in the Green Isle he gave a good account of himself. In the litter first named Mearns Queenie also belongs. This bitch was not in every sense up to show form, but proved a treasure as a dam. To Mearns Rattler she gave the wire-haired puppy Mearns Mischief, who had a long list of honors before she crossed the border. To her second litter that really good dog Buccaneer belongs.

The dog is now owned by Mr. Mackinnon, Greenock, who very seldom exhibits him, but when he is trotted out he always appears in the cash circles. Another litter from the same bitch, by Mearns Professor, produced Mearns Preceptor and Mearns Preceptress. The record of the former dog is that of one unbeaten in any class in which he has competed. The

bitch Preceptress went to Mrs. Jackson, Little Eaton, Derby, as an untried exhibit. Since being located in England she has won almost in every direction, amongst these being two firsts and two specials Riddings, first Brighton, first Ilkeston, first and two specials Botanical Gardens, London, and only last month she secured 2 firsts and 3 specials at Derby.

Champion Charleville Phil.

The Irish Red Setter Champion Charleville Phil, K.C.S.B., 698B., whose portrait we give in this number, is the property of Mr. R. MacNamee, Highbury, Nairn, N.B., and was a prominent winner at all the leading shows. As will be seen from his pedigree, he combines the best strains of the breed, and his progenitors on both sides are well-known bench and field trial winners. He has won seven championships and numerous firsts, cups and specials. At the Royal Dublin's Society's Spring Show in 1898 he won the championship, etc., beating all the other Irish champions easily. Mr. T. A. Bond, the well-known breeder and field trial competitor, was judge on this occasion, and he considers him the finest specimen the breed has ever produced—high praise from one who has known every dog of note in this variety during the past thirty years. At the Kennel Club Show same year, he also won the championship, etc., and the Kennel Club £30 cup for the best Irish Setter. At the recent L. K. A. and International Kennel Club Show he won the championship and five firsts, including the Challenge Medal for the best Setter, any variety, at the end of the 19th century, as also Lord Algernon Gordon Lennox's Cup for the best Pointer or Setter, any variety, in the field trial winners' class. In addition to being bench winner of such notoriety, he was also a winner in

the "Open All-Aged Stakes" at the Irish Red Setter Club's trials last July. He is also the sire of bench and field trial winners. He was equally successful at the last Crystal Palace Kennel Club Show, winning first open Irish Championship, first field trial Setters, any variety, Kennel Club £30 Challenge Cup for best Irish Setters, and the Irish Red Setter Club's Cup ditto, repeating his victory of two years ago. At Birmingham recently he also won the championship, first field trial class, any variety Setter, first open Irish, and first winners' class. A glance at his photo shows what a magnificent dog he is, and how perfect in every respect, and renders a detailed description unnecessary. His color is the correct rich dark chestnut, and he has lovely dark brown eyes, with the true Irish Setter expression. He is a dog that is sure to make his mark in the improvement of the breed. A very large sum has been refused for him, Mr. MacNamee preferring to keep him in this country for stud, and also for field trial competition, in which during the coming season he considers he should take a prominent position, as he has a marvellously keen nose, great pace and style. Champion Charleville Phil is already a most successful sire, his daughter, Kitty Gothora, having won the championship at Belfast recently, and she is also a field trial winner. At Dublin show recently

no less than ten of his progeny were exhibited, and all were winners. The following day he himself was successful at the Kennel Club field trials. He stands 27 inches at shoulder, and his head is 10 1-2 inches long.

Champion Charleville Phil, 698B., is a first-class field dog, fast and beautifully broken. His sire, Isinglass, won first Irish Setter Club field trials; second K. C. field trials, Derby Stakes; second National Pointer and Setter field trials, Puppy Stakes; second English Setter Club trials, Puppy Stakes. Wrestler, his grandsire, won first Great Interna-

tional Challenge Stakes for Pointers and Setters, all breeds, £10 each entry; second All-Aged Stakes, Pointers and Setters, at National Association field trials, 1891; second and cup Irish Setter All-Aged Stake. His dam, Airnie, won in 1892 at Kennel Club field trials, first for Setter puppies and Derby; second Setter puppies, Irish Setter Club trials; second, St. Leger Stakes; and in 1893, second Irish Setter Club field trials. Granddam, Henmore Shotover, won second Irish Red Setter Club Puppy Stakes; second Irish Red Setter Club All-Aged Stakes, 1889.

A Breezy Letter from British Columbia.

C.K.C. Cups—Field Trials—Registration—English Setters and Other Things.

I received the C. K. C. championship cup for my English Setter, Roy Montez, by express all O.K. It is a very handsome one, elegant in design and nicely gotten up. Everyone has greatly admired it, and I am highly pleased with it, and wish to thank the C. K. C. I believe it is the first one to come to the Pacific Coast. This action on the part of the C. K. C. in donating championship cups, also cups and medals for field trials, with no other condition than the dogs be registered in the C. K. C., excepting championship, which must be won under C. K. C. rules, is a very commendable one, and ought to be appreciated by breeders and owners of good dogs. In my opinion all dogs eligible for registration should be registered, as it not only protects the legitimate breeder, but also the purchaser.

I have bred my crack English Setter bitch, Zola Montez, to ch. Roy Montez. She is due to whelp in July. This mating will be eagerly watched by English

Setter men who are familiar with both dogs. She is the dam of same owners, Gladys Montez, also Molly Montez, who at the last Seattle show won first limit and reserve winners to ch. Rory. Zola at the same show won first novice and special for novice class, also first open and winners. Roy and Zola won all the specials at the Seattle show that they were eligible to compete for. The winning puppy, Montez Cole, who won the specials for best puppy in show, was sired by Tacoma Montez, a litter brother of Roy's. He was also a field trial winner; he is now dead.

I enclose you a clipping from one of our daily papers; it is a notice of receipt of championship cup, it was also copied by one of the best sporting papers of the Coast, The Breeder and Sportsman of San Francisco. You see the C. K. C. has had some advertising through the cup. Yours truly,

Following is the clipping referred to:

In the last few years the Canadian Kennel Club seems to have taken on new life, and now they are doing all in their power to encourage the breeding of good dogs in Canada. They now give handsome cups for championships won under their rules, one of which has been received by Mr. Charles Minor for his English Setter, Roy Montez, who, by the way, is now a champion under both the American and Canadian associations. To become a champion a dog must win four times in the winners' class in shows held under the auspices of the Canadian or American associations as the case may be. Roy Montez has done this in both Canadian and American shows. In the Canadian stud book he is registered 5765. The cup received from the C. K. C. is a very handsome silver one, standing about fourteen inches high. On a shield are the words in blue and gold: "C. K. C. Championship: 5765." Around the shield is a wreath, and on the top a beaver. In a letter to Mr. Minor the secretary states that the club has decided to give cups and medals to any club holding field trials in Canada, the only condition being that the dog competing is registered.
