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

The Bulldog section at the coming M. C. A. show will be made a leading feature. Something like two dozen special prizes will be offered from Bulldog Clubs in England, Scotland and the U.S.

Both executive and general meetings of the Bulldog Club of Canada will be held during the show.

Mr. Alex. Smith, "Auchcairnie," of Montreal, has now Mr. Laurin's Airedales in charge, and would be glad to handle dogs of other breeds than the Airedale, either at Montreal show OT permanently.

Another Terrier that traveled across the continent and then made a successful accouchment is Mr. F. H. Welsh's, Vancouver, B.C., Delias, who was bred by Mr. Carnochan. She was bred to Barkby Ben, left New York on February 28th. arrived in Vancouver three thousand miles away on March 6th, and forty-eight hours after whelped four puppies, of which three were dogs. All are still doing remarkably well.

Mr. Tilley, of Peterboro, has sold the Cocker bitch Wilmotta to Mr. G. Stanfleur, of Montreal.

Musgrave Morris, Minnedosa, Man., an ardent Fox Terrier man, has sold Baden Powell to Mr. G. H. Wilson Page. Mr. Morris has also sold Pearl and her three six-months-old bitch pupples to Mr. Geo, Florence, Victoria, B.C., through his ad. in Gazette.

Mr. A. A. Macdonald is taking a good deal of interest in that uncertain quantity, the Bulldog. His recent importation has not proven in whelp, and so he has been to other kennels to supply the shortage. While in New York this month he purchased several good puppies.

Mr. Macdonald's Aldon Master was first in puppy class and won the A. F. T. C. special at Atlantic City under Mr. Lyndon. While on the other side Mr. Macdonald bred his well-known terrier Meersbrook Bristles, ex Vandalia, to Ch. Barkby Ben. He recently bred another of his Terriers, the Matchmaker bitch Aldon Desire, to the same dog, so should have a sufficiency of this blood.

The Ottawa Kennel Club will hold its next show in connection with the Central Canada Exhibition on Sept. 15, 16 and

17, 1903. Mr. Robert McAllen is the Secretary Treasurer of the club.

Mr. Hungerford was, at Chicago, honored with an entry of one hundred and thirty-five Collies, seventy-nine dogs, of which seventy-eight were present. This number of dogs makes a record. Another Canadian, Mr. McEwen, at St. Louis, had just five less, but the total entry ran up to two hundred and twenty, certainly a very handsome one. These two gentlemen surely win the brace special for largest entry.

Mr. McGaughey made several sales at Buffalo that have not so far ben reported. Amongst them are the fourteen-monthsold Russian Wolfhound Kazan, which went at a good figure, the Greyhound Champion Dictator, an old standby of the Terra Cotta Kennels, and several young Wolfhounds, which breed seems to be rapidly growing in popular favor.

Canadian Kennel Club.

Minutes of Executive Committee Meeting held in Toronto, April 14th, 1903.

The President of the club occupied the chair at the meeting held on the above date. The principal business of the meeting was to count the ballot recently sent out to the members, of which the following is a copy, and which is so plain that it needs no explanation.

> Office Canadian Rennel Club, (Incorporated) Toronto, March 24th, 1903.

To the Members of the Canadian Kennel Club:

Gentlemen,—As you are doubtless aware, we have for some time been endeavoring to come to an arrangement with the American Kennel Club, whereby we may have a mutual recognition of wins, disqualifications, etc. So far our efforts have been unavailing, and we suggest the following items as a basis of a probable agreement. I would ask you to vote on each item separately, and at once return to the Secretary in enclosed addressed envelope.

C. K. C. BALLOT, MARCH 24th, 1903.

1. Are you in favor of the mutual recognition of wins?

2. Are you in favor of the mutual recognition of suspensions and disqualifications?

3. Would you be in favor of doing away with the C. K. C. Stud Book and using that of the A. K. C. at a cost to members of the C. K. C. of \$1.00 for each registration. Cost of Stud Book extra?

4. Would you be in favor of making C. K. C. Show Rules indentical with those of the A. K. C.³ This would be necessary in the event of mutual recognition of wins, etc.

5. In the event of a majority approving the above propositions, do you authorize the Executive to appoint a committee to confer with A. K. C., with full power to act in the adoption of the agreement?

Please vote "'Yes'' or "No" in each blank.

The vote was far the largest ever recorded in the history of the club, and was not confined to any one part of the Dominion, but practically covered all of Canada from coast to coast, with many ballots from the U. S.

The result was overwhelmingly "yea" in response to sections 1, 2, 4 and 5. In section 3 the vote was exactly the other way, there being but 27 in favor, with 82 against.

The following letters and resolutions in connection with the vote were read:

WESTERN CANADA KENNEL CLUB, WINNI-PEG.

Annual meeting of the Western Canada Kennel Club, held in Winnipeg, April 6th, about sixty members present.

Whereas, this club is credibly informed that the Toronto Exhibition is contemplating holding its dog show under the rules of the American Kennel Club:

And whereas, it is the opinion of this club that such action on the part of the Exhibition Board is the result of the non-recognition of Canadian wins by American dogs at shows held under C. K. C. rules, which shows are not recognized by the A. K. C., or vice versa;

It is resolved by a unanimous vote of this club, that it is to be regretted that any Canadian club should hold its show under the auspices or rules of any club other than the Canadian Kennel Club.

And it is further resolved that this club fully approves of any arrangement that can be arrived at between the C. K. C. and the A. K. C., whereby wins in each club shall be recognized in the other;

And it is further resolved, that if any arrangement be arrived at between the clubs, that the identity of the Canadian Kennel Club be maintained, and that its present excellent and reliable Stud Book be preserved and continued under the conditions existing at present.

That we stand loyal supporters of our Canadian Kennel Club, and that, although we believe it would be beneficial to have mutual recognition of wins, etc., the C. K. C. should not at this time ask concessions from A. K. C.

Dear Sir,—I am in favor of all the items but one. I believe Canada should keep its own Stud Book, just as much as we here on the Coast should keep our own. I think if you meet them half way, they, the A. K. C., should meet you the other half way. I believe though, for the good of the dog, each club should recognize the other's wins, such as A.K.C. recognize C. K. C. and P. K. L., and this they will have to come to in the long run, and the same with the C. K. C. and the same with P. K. L. Trusting you will come out successful, respectfully,

Dear Sir,—In sending you my ballot regarding agreement with American Kennel Club, I cannot do so without making some remarks.

Personally, I do not like to have the identity of the Canadian Kennel Club effected by amalgamation with the A. K. C., but, with the fact of so many specialty clubs in Canada not keeping faith with the exhibitors, and the lukewarmness on the part of the majority of members of clubs, there seems to be no future for the Canadian Kennel Club.

It seems a pity that the fanciers of Canada cannot rally and make the C. K. C. a self-sustaining institution, and I have always endeavored in a small way to help to this end, although some members whom I have remitted dues for have never been gentlemen enough to reimburse me. I am quite willing to do what I can to help things along. The specialty clubs defai, lting in specials, etc., has had the effect of spoiling confidence in Canadian shows, and I sincerely regret that anything should happen to destroy the C. K. C., but as matters stand at the present time I think some sort of an agreement should be made with the A. K. C., but I certainly do not think that we should surrender our "birthright."

The result of the vote, the resolutions and letters read in connection therewith were discussed in every detail, and it was decided to appoint a committee of three. with full power to act as far as the vote of the members permitted, to confer with the A. K. C., and, if possible, arrange for an immediate meeting, failing this, to meet in Montreal during the show. The members of the committee appointed are the President of the C. K. C., Mr. Jno, G. Kent: Mr. H. Parker Thomas, Belleville, and Mr. Jan'es Lindsay, Montreal. The secretary of the club was appointed secretary of the committee, and was instructed to at once communicate with Mr. Vredenburgh, the secretary of the A. K. C., giving him result of the ballot, stating our willingness to reciprocate on the basis empowered by the vote, and asking for an early meeting to confer as to terms, etc.

The actual vote will be made public when negotiations are under way.

The resignation of Dr. Irving R. Johnson was accepted.

Dr. W. H. Drummond, of Montreal, was elected to fill the vacancy on the committee.

If arrangements can be made, an open meeting under C. K. C. auspices will be held in Montreal during the time of the show.

Montreal Collie Club's Show.

The show of the Montreal Collie Club, held in the Victoria Armoury, on Saturday, March 14th, was, both in point of numbers and quality, by far the best in the history of such organizations in this country. There were one hundred and ninety-four entries, representing ninetyone dogs. These were provided on this occasion with comfortable benching, and the judging was done in a commodious ring.

The attendance was exceptionally good, owing, no doubt, to a considerable extent to the presence of two such famous dogs as the wire hair Matchmaker, the property of Messrs. Lindsay and Fraser, and the Airedale owned by Mr. Laurin.

Mr. Fraser took the trouble to come from Toronto, and spent a large portion of time in showing his dog to the many interested spectators.

The Montreal Collie Club has every reason to be proud of the results of their efforts. The committee worked hard, and too much cannot be said in their praise, and especially of their president, Mr. A. F. Gault, who is unquestionably the right man in the right place. Everything was done to make the judge's duties as agreeable as possible, and he wishes to thank the exhibitors for their uniform courtesy.

No one could visit this show without being made aware of the great improvement in Collies that has taken place within the last few years in Canada, and notably in Montreal. Among the winners were those who had taken conspicuous places in the New York prize list, but there were many others to keep them fitting company. I regret that press of work does not permit of my going fully into the criticism of the exhibits. However, a few words as to certain points may, I hope, be helpful. The Collies as shown here came much nearer the true type than one could have believed it likely to see here a few-years ago. We find coarse heads, staring eyes and lack of character the exception rather than the rule. Ears and ear carriage have wonderfully improved. However, it must be pointed out that the latter and a showy style and abundance of coat does not constitute a Collie. A good many dogs still show a large, full eye, which is absolutely wrong in a Collie, and has much to do with expression which is not appropriate in this breed. Had Mr. McManus' dog been somewhat larger, less shy and altogether a better shower, so good is his head, including expression, that he might be pointed to as almost typical.

The judge was concerned on more than one occasion with a few difficult problems. In a fine class two of the best specimens had uneven jaws, were, in fact, somewhat overshot, while a third, otherwise good, had a suspiciously high ear carriage. Knowing, as I do, that uneven jaws are very apt to be hereditary, I felt it but right to give the preference to the

animal with the somewhat doubtful ear carriage.

I would like also to point out that the quality of the coat of a Collie is of even more importance than quantity, and that the coat should not stand out in a fluffy way, but should hug the dog's sides. The Collie should not suggest the sheep, but as he has to be the guardian of sheen his jaws should be good and his teeth sound and strong.

So far on now are our Canadian exhibitors, that they have only to avail themselves of the material at hand and other that will no doubt be imported, to produce Collies that will be a credit to any country.

It is unnecessary to say that the fine exhibits from the Balmoral Kennels, Ottawa, added greatly to the attractiveness of the exhibits as a whole, and in Balmoral Duchess, especially, we have a fine study.

I will conclude by congratulating all concerned on the remarkably successful show, open, by the way to all, which has just been held.

And it is further resolved: That this club fully approves of any arrangement that can be arrived at between the C. K. C. and the A. K. C. whereby wins in each club shall be recognized in the other:

And it is further resolved: That if any arrangements be arrived at between the clubs, that the identity of the Canadian Kennel Club be maintained, and that its present excellent and reliable Stud Book be preserved and continued under the conditions existing at present.

securing of pramises for next year. It was suggested in this connection that if the club could interest the other live stock associations in the project, a suitable building for the purpose might be built and used exclusively for exhibitions.

It was decided to hold the annual field trials of the club at La Salle on the last day of August and the first of September.

In this connection F. G. Simpson brought up the question of judges, and strongly urged the appointment of local men to the positions. He pointed out that while it had been the habit of the club in the past to import men from the United States at a great expense, this practice was not in the best interests of the sport. Such men as Eric Hamber, Thomas Johnston and H. S. Rolston had left the city and done judging, both on the bench and in field trials in other parts of the country, and had never failed to give satisfaction. This being the case, there was not the least reason in the world why the club should leave Manitoba to get judges. If local men were never given a chance then there would never be any good local judges, and he thought it was. a confession of weakness on the part of the club valuable assets.

to admit that it had not among its members men who were competent to judge as well as handle dogs. There was some discussion on Mr. Simpson's motion and it was finally decided that in future the club would employ none but local judges.

The secretary-treasurer read his report, which showed that there are 57 active members, three life members, and four honorary members.

The bench show showed a surplus of \$76.32 for the year.

The Field Trial Club showed a small surplus.

The committee, owing to the heavy expenses providing tents, was not able to show the usual surplus. The club has paid all back prizes, and now has a substantial surplus, besides a quantity of valuable assets.

The Victoria Kennel Club's Show.

The Victoria Kennel Club's Show was held on April 1st to 4th, and was good beyond my highest expectations. The entries numbered about four hundred, representing two hundred and twenty-five dogs. The entry fee was \$2, and if a dog was entered in more than one class, only \$1 additional was charged for each entry. A cash prize of \$1 for each dog was paid to a handler, provided that he entered more than six dogs. The only regular cash prizes were as follows:

To all dogs being judged best in limit class, \$3.

To all dogs being judged best in novice class, \$2.

Four dogs in each class or no prize money.

There were many special prizes.

That a small city of twenty thousand should hold a dog show of such importance calls for explanation. This is to be found in the character of the men that had the venture in hand. Of their energy and ability I can speak in the highest terms.

Dogs were brought from Nanaimo, Vancouver, Seattle, Portland, etc., and DURING the year 1902 we exhibit Newark, Atlantic City, Boston, Philadelphia, winning

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even as far as San Francisco. That this should have been the case was, of course, fortunate for all concerned. Naturally, only fairly good dogs at least are sent from centres in which shows have already been held, and in most instances the visitors carried off a large proportion of the prizes.

The show was held in a hall that for the present suffices, but could not accommodate any very considerable increase in the number of exhibits. Fortunately, immediately adjacent to the building there was a large vacant lot, and, as is well known, I have long advocated large judging rings and the very free movement of the dogs shown. On this occasion I was gratified to the fullest extent, the ring included a space of fully twenty yards in length, and to be able to catch a view of competing animals standing at a considerable distance from the judge is, I hold, of importance second only to a very close scrutiny. The show was well managed. and the judging was put through with as much celerity as was consistent with thorough examination. The work of placing the awards was begun at 2 o'clock on April 1st, and was concluded, except for specials, on the following day. The attendance at the show was excellent throughout; one of the special attractions which may have accounted in part for this good attendance was the drawings each evening for tombola prizes. Human nature dearly loves to take a chance.

A marked catalogue was published on the third day of the show.

Fortunately the weather was so favorable that outside judging was not only possible, but highly desirable. British Columbia's mild and beautiful climate is well known.

Turning to the classes themselves, three excellent specimens worthy of any show graced the St. Bernard benches. The best of these was Grand Master II, from Nairod Kennels, San Francisco. He is a dog with a magnificent head, and there was no question of his supremacy. From the same kennels there was an excellent specimen of the opposite sex. The best local exhibit was W. F. Hall's His Highness, a puppy of only eighteen months, but large and typical; unfortunately, however, lacking white markings. The other specimens were of a lower class.

While the Great Danes as a whole were superior to the exhibits at Toronto a few years ago, only two were first-class. Of these a spotted bitch from California was distinctly the best, showing that lithe gracefulness and true Great Dane character for which we so often look in vain.

Dr. Milne, of Victoria, showed two, fairly good Greyhounds. The dogs had an exceptionally fine head, and was in hard condition, but the bitch was superior in type and general symmetry.

One Chesapeake Bay Dog of fair quality turned up.

Among the Pointers the best were those of Mr. Zeisler, of Oregon. He exhibited a puppy which quite fascinated me by its character and quality, and his Minnesota Joe was easily the best Pointer of the exhibit.

There was a very large, and with the qualification presently to be noticed, a very fine exhibit of English Setters. I would like to point out in criticizing this breed that the English Setter standard has remained substantially unchanged for twenty years at least, and states distinctly that the skull is not flat, but has "moderate dome, " and that " the brows should be raised at a sharp and decided angle" from the nose; nor should the eyes be either deep-set or small in any Setter. I found that while the local dogs were upon the whole excellent in body, legs and feet, the head did not conform to the standard, speaking generally. There were, to my mind, only three or four Setters out of this large exhibit with heads of the propertype, and chiefly because of a very wide-

spread defect in the muzzle where it joins the skull, which, taken with a certain lack of "stop" and smallness of eyes and a rather flat skull, gives the animal an uncharacteristic expression. I felt that as judge I was obliged in the interests of the true type to put back dogs that I hear have won under others. I can only say that if this be true, and that if the competition was as keen as at this show, such judges must have had in mind some other standard than that which has been recognized for a quarter of a century. After simple honesty there is no duty of the judge so important as deciding what specimens conform to the standard and which do not. Among the dogs I considered the first prize winner Real John, bred by Joe Lewis, and the second prize winner Victor L., the most typical, but the bitch Victoria Bell II., owned in Victoria and bred by W. C. Kemerly, White Post, Va., seemed to me superior to both; in fact, this is a most beautiful animal, and, I think, should not fail to be placed at any show. It would be a great pity if the western breeders continue to believe in such heads as I have felt called upon to condemn as so distinctly contrarv to the standard.

The exhibit of Irish and Gordon Setters, while good and superior to that of many shows in the east, was not on the whole equal to that of the English. The first Irish dog has been a beautiful specimen, but he is getting old, and must soon give way to others. In the Gordons I could find no dog quite so typical as even the best Irish Setter, not to mention such a grand specimen as the English bitch Victoria Bell II. It is not to be forgotten that color, and especially the tan, must be largely taken into account in judging Gordons.

I was surprised to find several very fair Irish Water Spaniels, including one bred by T. A. Carson, of Kingston, Ont.,



but there is use for them as well as the Setter in this part of the country.

Of Field Spaniels, I can say little that is laudatory, for though not so bad in head, they fall short in body, and first prizes were withheld, except in one instance.

Another surprise was finding a really typical Clumber Spaniel, a dog owned in Victoria. Several were shown, and none of them really bad.

Cocker spaniels made the largest exhibit of the show, and competition was often exceedingly keen. Certainly Cocker of to-day is of a far more sensible type than that of ten years ago, but we must be careful that in getting better legs, feet and movement, we do not lose the cobbiness on which so much stress has always rightly been laid. Among the local dogs this lack of compactness was especially noticeable in the exhibits of one enthusiast; on the other hand by far the most typical specimens of the whole show were those exhibited by another local exhibitor, Mr. Goodwin, and his wife. Their black Cockers would, I think, not fail to be placed at our best eastern shows. That they are of high quality in the estimation of others was shown by the fact that one of their winning puppies was purchased in the ring for \$50 by, I believe, the secretary of a western Cocker Club; but in reality the specimen was cheap at twice that price.

Time will not permit of my noticing many of the exhibits of the Cocker classes, but I would point out that some dogs, good in body, have heads that too much resemble that of the Setter, and one of the worst faults a dog can have is to suggest another breed; and it is never to be forgotten that the head is the most characteristic part of any dog.

There were at least three good Collies among those shown. One, Tricolor, from Seattle; another, a dog owned in Victoria but bred by Mr. Reeves, of Toronto, and a third, which I consider the best of the trio, a Seattle bitch. One of the novelties of the show was an exhibit of white Collies, fairly good in body, but not nearly equal to the above in head properties.

The California Kennels sent up some excellent Bulldogs, notably one, Jock Damon, that would be a winner at any show, and with a vivacity and activity,

Bulldog character and abounding good nature than won him many friends. There was only one fairly good Bull Terrier.

Two or three Boston Terriers were exhibited, but were much too large, with the exception of a puppy which at present has an excellent head and lots of character.

The Fox Terriers on the whole made a capital exhibit, even after several dogs, too large and coarse, had been weeded out. A Veracity puppy got reserve, and would have been higher but for being to large. The California Kennels sent up three excellent specimens, and the competition for winners lay between two of their exhibits, one Wandee Revelry and one Wandee Jester. The latter is the better balanced and the nearer correct in size; the other dog is not as good as he might be back of the ribs, but he is so fine in front and manifested so much character that he seemed to have the advantage; nevertheless I can understand that on another occasion, or under another judge, this award might be reversed. . One of the delightful surprises at this show was finding a local specimen that was a perfect gem as a Fox Terrier. She is owned by Mrs. Bostock, of Victoria, and was bred in London, Eng. In condition, showing and character, as well as general make-up and symmetry, this little bitch is nearly perfect; were she larger there would be few "to equal her anywhere. She won the special for hest Fox Terrier in the show.

Of the wire-hairs I can say little that is good, probably in part owing to the fact that they had been so poorly prepared for exhibition, and, I may add, so indifferently shown in the ring. I would like to point out to the western exhibitors and others if I may that every dog which is to be exhibited should be given some training to that end. With the exception of Mr. C. W. Minor, who is a most accomplished expert at handling, and a young lady, Miss Davie, hardly an exhibitor seemed to know anything about properly handling dogs in the ring.

It will be as well perhaps to pass over the three or four Irish Terriers exhibited with a discreet silence. On the contrary, a Scottie exhibited by Mrs. Ward, of Victoria, was a wholly characteristic specimen, and I regret that more of his kind were not to be seen.

It was a gratifying surprise to find a good exhibit of Airedales, both as to quantity and quality, the winning bitch especially being of a commendable type.

Some two or three Retrievers turned up, but they were not up to the best type. However, I can speak in better terms of a couple of Old English Sheep Dogs, both of which were fairly good.

In the miscellaneous class I was delighted by finding a thoroughly highclass Dachshund exhibited by Mrs. (Justice) Martin, of Victoria, and by his side, a first-rate Japanese Spaniel. I recommended the management to give a special for each of these as being in every way worthy of prizes in a class of their own breed, had such been made.

If I may be permitted, I will make one suggestion to the Victoria Kennel Club and others similarly situated, viz., to employ all round judges instead of specialists on some one breed, who must of necessity be very indifferently prepared to judge the majority of the dogs on exhibition. Specialty judging is at the best not without its risks and dangers, and I could name breeds that would have been much further on to-day had they been less frequently handed over to the specialist judge, who so often lays undue stress on certain minor and often purely fancy points.

The Victoria Kennel Club's show may in almost every respect be pronounced a complete success, and I have to thank both the management and the exhibitors for their uniform courtesy and kindness. Wesley Mills,



ST. VITUS' DANCE, OR CHOREA.


Being a constant reader of your valuable paper, I read with interest in your November number Dr. Wesley Mills' article on the treatment of St. Vitus' dance, or chorea.

I had a red Cocker Spaniel about nine months old, which took distemper, followed by chorea. He had no use of his hind legs, could not get up on them. When I lifted him up he would stagger a few steps and then fall down. I had never used arsenic in larger doses than four or five drops a day, and the dog not being my own, I was a little afraid, but I made up my mind that he would be as well dead as in the condition he was in. So on January 23rd I gave him eight drops of Fowler's solution of arsenic. On the 24th I gave him nine drops, on the 25th eighteen drops, on the 26th twenty drops, on the 27th twenty-four drops, on the 28th twenty-eight drops, on the 29th thirty-two drops, on the 30th thirty-six drops, or one hundred and seventy-five drops in all. The dog was showing the effects of the medicine by having a cough, so I left off. His appetite was good all the time. I gave him all the fresh meat he would eat three times a day, such as Hamburg steak and mutton, and all the sweet milk and bread he wanted.

Now the dog is all right. On March 1st I had him follow my cart from Sunnydale to South Park and return, a distance of twelve miles. On March 6th he did the same distance, and kept up with me just as well as any of my Collies can.

Buffalo Dog Show.

We can certainly offer nothing but the warmest congratulations to the Buffalo Kennel Club on the magnificent success achieved at the show held last month in Convention Hall, Buffalo. The entry of over seven hundred was evenly distributed over all classes, and there were practically no weak spots. The hall in which the show was located is an ideal one, ample room, wide aisles, hardwood floors and sufficient ventilation gave all that could be desired. In the centre the light was none too good, but over the judging rings there was a plentitude. There are many hard workers on the committee, headed by President "Dachshund" Bleistein, and the secretary, Mr. Sharp, ably filled his post. Mr. Mabee and Dr. Johnson we of course look on as "oor ain." The Stars and Stripes was in full evidence, but the "boys across the line'' were not forgotten in the way of Union Jacks, which is a compliment that is appreciated. Of course, Spratts benched and fed, and this means it was done as it should be. At all times the building was free from unpleasant odor, and benches and aisles were kept scrupulously clean. Whoever had this in charge deserves a special mention. The Canadian entries made probably about one-third of the show, and, needless to say, took their proportion of the good things going. Many Canucks were present in person, including the president of the C. K. C., Mr. Jno. G. Kent; Mr. Geo. H. Gooderham, who in his usual way made an indefatigable ring steward; Mr. A. A. Macdonald, Dr. C. Y. Ford, Mr. McGaughey, Mr. Lyndon, Mr. Trebilcock, Rev. Father Carberry, Mr. A. Benzie, Mr. Colvin, Dr. Hutton, Mr. Jackson, Mr. Maroney, Mr. Watts, Mr. Bell (Collies), Mrs. O'Rourke, Mr. Farewell, Mr. Dunn and many others that we failed to note. The attendance was all that could be asked for, even by the greediest tollkeeper, and we believe the show came out a good deal ahead, and made some money for its promoters, in which exhibitors are next year to share, as Buffalo is now to be one of the regulars.

Proceedings opened with a recherche lunch, at which the usual felicitous speeches were made. We do not propose to give more than a running commentary on the dogs. Mr. Fraser, whose careful judging was admired, well unheld Canada's record for efficient and careful judging.

Opening the catalogue, we are first introduced to St. Bernards, where we greet an old friend in Bayview Col. Steele, that won all asked of him right through to winners. He well outclassed the rest, not a very good lot. The young Dane that won out was easily ahead of a poor lot outside of Marco II., the Toronto winner. Monrad possesses a beautiful front, excellent clean neck and head. He is a bit flat in rib, but age should fill him out and give him the rounding-out he needs.

Russian Wolfhounds a good class, where Devorak, bad at both ends, very deep chest, and in "Lewis" condition won. We favored Kubelik, who has greatly improved under Mr. McGaughey's charge. He moves better, has lost the limp he had in hind leg, and with a more abundant coat will change places. His son Kazan promises to be a big dog of correct type, with a grand lean head and powerful jaw.

Mr. Lewis' brace of Greyhounds were rather easily one, two.

Foxhounds were just an average bunch, and not a Canadian average at that.

Pointers had a nice entry, and some good ones, though the general run was but fair, and about the same applies to the English Setters, which were relieved

by the presence of Rumney Racket and Ulverstone Rap. Pera and Mad Cap were the best in bitch classes, which were not large entries.

We had better stuff in the Irish Setters, where Canadian dogs made a good showing.

Field Spaniels had nothing new, and outside of half a dozen, the Cockers were just fair. Mr. Trebilcock won in puppies, novice and limit (black) with a Simcoe Duke dog, and a good one. He stands true, has an excellent body, good legs and head, and excels in muzzle. He should have won through, but was beaten by Colonist, hopping round on three legs, in open and winners. If the Cocker is a sporting dog, this decision cannot be endorsed. The parti-colors made a nice We greatly admired them in showing. The others are mostly familiar names.

Collies turned out well, and contained a good deal of quality. The judge, Mr. Lacy, penalized, and justly, the overshot ones. Bobs Perfection did not find the favor here that he did in Montreal. A nice dog, with free action and heavy coat and long head. There was nothing but Moreton Hebe to stop Mr. Cox's Balmoral Duchess, a lovely bitch, and it is open to question if the latter should not have won, as she made much more of herself than Hebe, who plainly wants a rest.

Bulldogs a good entry and a good lot, especially open classes. The same will apply to Bull Terriers, where Mrs. O'Rourke had an entry or two, and did well with them. Mr. Dole's entries were well put down, and he made a good sale of a young bitch. French Bulldogs were a big and good entry, as were Boston Terriers as far as the entry goes, but there were few good ones.

Dachshunds made better classes than we expected, and there was a lot of good stuff too, but almost an endless variety of types. The best won out. Beagles did not pay their way with not more than two in a class, and seven classes were provided.

There were two or three good specimens in Airedales, the rest but moderate.

Black and Tans made up a nice lot, and some of the classes were unusually well filled. The Canadian entry did not do so well as usual. College Girl's bad hind parts and lack of style here met their deserts. She is grand in front, head and eye. Parliament Dime was absent, as was Ringeraft, shown by Mr. Mitchell. We should like to have seen the relative positions of the two Canadian bitches, P. Dime and C. Girl, under Mr. Lacy, though as C. Girl went down to V.H.C. in open class there seems to be little doubt as to what the result would have been. At Brantford Mr. Joe Kennedy put C. Giri over P. Dime.

Yorkshires, Poms and Toy Spaniels made up a nice little show, and in the latter especially there was lots of quality. Mr. Watts' entry in Old English Sheep Dogs had to succumb to the more mature charms of the famous Wilberforce. With age and size the puppy will make a good one.

The judging, we thought, was delayed too long, or rather extended over too great a length of time. While it may be true that the dogs in the ring are an attraction to a good many visitors, it cannot be denied that the great majority like to see the winners' cards up in completion and exhibitors have some cause for complaint if kept too long on the qui vive. Then the question of these unfortunately placed specials, "best dog in show," etc., is another cause for grievance. If the judge's slate is a large one, it is likely that, as was the case here, some will have left for home, and again, as was the case at Buffalo with the Fox Terrier judge, have no opportunity of casting a vote for his choice.

Such a special led to some unpleasant-

ness here that might otherwise have been avoided. The special for best in show simmered down to two, the Bobtail Wilberforce and Norfolk Kennels' True Blue. Three judges were present, one of whom, in addition to his own vote, cast one for an absentee judge. Each dog received two votes. Objection was raised to the absentee vote, and a meeting of those who were present of the committee was held, who decided in favor of Mr. Gooderham's grand Terrier. At a latter full committee meeting the decision was the same. We understand that an appeal 's to be made to the A. K. C. for a decision. The peculiar part of the matters to us is that the judge of Fox Terriers, Mr. Fraser, who placed True Blue at the head, had no opportunity to express an opinion.

The Fox Terriers, both in numbers and quality, were the feature of the show, the smooths particularly being a very much more than ordinary lot. Smooth puppies-Sweet Sixteen, in the absence of Norfolk Blue, won. A tan marked dog showing quality, could be improved in texture of coat, bone and feet. Novice-Norfolk Royalist, a very nice puppy, not entered in preceding class, nice head, ear and expression, excelling in front, coat must handle better; second, Aldon Deserter, capital head and expression, rather long cast and wider in front than we like; third, only fair specimen. Limit was redeemed by Sabine Brightlight, a nice Terrier, although a bit stilty behind. Norfolk Invader was absent. Open gave us three cracks, placed in the order named, Champion Sabine Result, Norfolk Huntsman, Champion Norfolk Richmond. Result scores in cleanness of skull and expression. Hunstman has the cleaner neck, but Result is slightly better in front and ankles. Then the winner has it in "top" and thighs. The Huntsman moved the better of the two, both nailing good Terriers. Richmond, an oll friend,

Norfolk Truest, a black-headed bitch, sister to True Blue, on very sound lines throughout, little to choose between these two. The Norfolk bitch may turn the tables later; third, Blemton Hale, faulty in legs and feet, in a different class to first two. Novice, first two repeats; third, Aldon Rumour, a recent importation of Mr. Macdonald, a very pretty bitch which showed well. Reserve, Cairnsmuir Hostess, a more masculine type than third, which must have pressed her closely. Limit, first another lovely Terrier in Sabine Fearless, with Norfolk Truest second again, with Sabine Beldia beaten in shoulders and pasterns. Aldon Rumour reserve. Open, Norfolk True Blue, first, scores over Sabine Fearless in head, expression and shoulders. Winners, Norfolk True Blue, with Sabine Vietory, the puppy, reserve. Placing Sabine Victory over her beautiful kennel companion, Sabine Fearless, is indeed trying her highly. Still, we thought the puppy better in body and certainly cleaner in shoulder. Wires-Cairnsmuir Barkeeper, a natty Terrier of good type, beat Aldon Master, placed second, in ear, body and size. Novice, the Cairnsmuir Terrier again first, in better condition than Selwonk Tapper, otherwise perhaps Tapper has it. Both, however scored over Aldon Master. Limit, Selwonk Banker first, a Terrier of class when in tiptop condition, with Cairnsmuir Barkeeper and Aldon Master in order named. Open and winners classes followed placing in limit class. Puppies, Norfolk Toss Up, a remarkably typical Terrier, decisively beat Border Princess. Novice class, Aldon Dominie first, a nice sort, but too close to the ground, was placed over Monogram, all over a nice Terrier, but heavy

in whelp, which caused her to stand very wide and show indifferently. Limit, Norfolk Toss Up, with a very nice white bitch in Selwonk Fidget second; Monogram third. Open, Champion Hot Stuff first, one of our very best wires; Norfolk Toss Up second, and Selwonk Fidget third. Winners class followed open.

Irish Terriers brought out two grand dogs from Canada of two very different types. Celtic Badger, Rev. Father O'Gorman's grand Terrier, has a wonderful head, is built on racy lines, grand coat, all over a good one, a splendid shower in the ring, and full of Irish character. Kerr Bros.' dog, Rampant Ralf, that we wrote so favorably of at Brantford, is of different cast. He is shorter in body, has grand bone, where he excels, good head and powerful muzzle that is not quite clean in color. A very short dock adds to the appearance of shortness given his body. A sterling Terrier that will please many. Doctor Casey looked a bit light all through, Selwonk Mixer, the good one that came out at Toronto last fall.

The ladies were not as good a lot as the dogs, though Raynham Surprise is a nice type all over.

The Scottie classes filled just fairly well. Bobbie Black is a nice little black, with a good deal of character, a little light in eye. Sandown Garnet is none too good behind, but won in present condition with ease over Clydeford Baronet, whose coat is loose and soft, and whose gay tail⁹ carriage does not add to his appearance. Brandywine Joek is long east, with but a moderate jacket.
