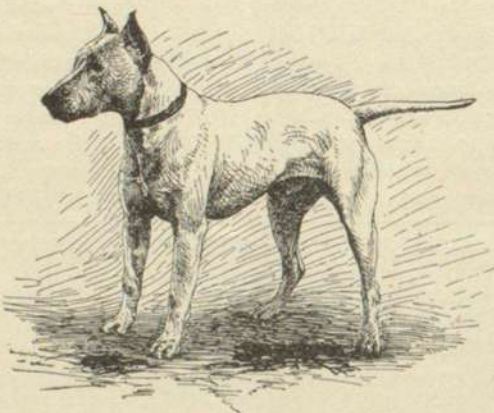

He should be mated to slim built, type-lacking matrons of the heavyweight variety. The Chief, Ch. Yorkville Belle and Richfield Girl are litter sisters and brother, a noble family of producers of winners.

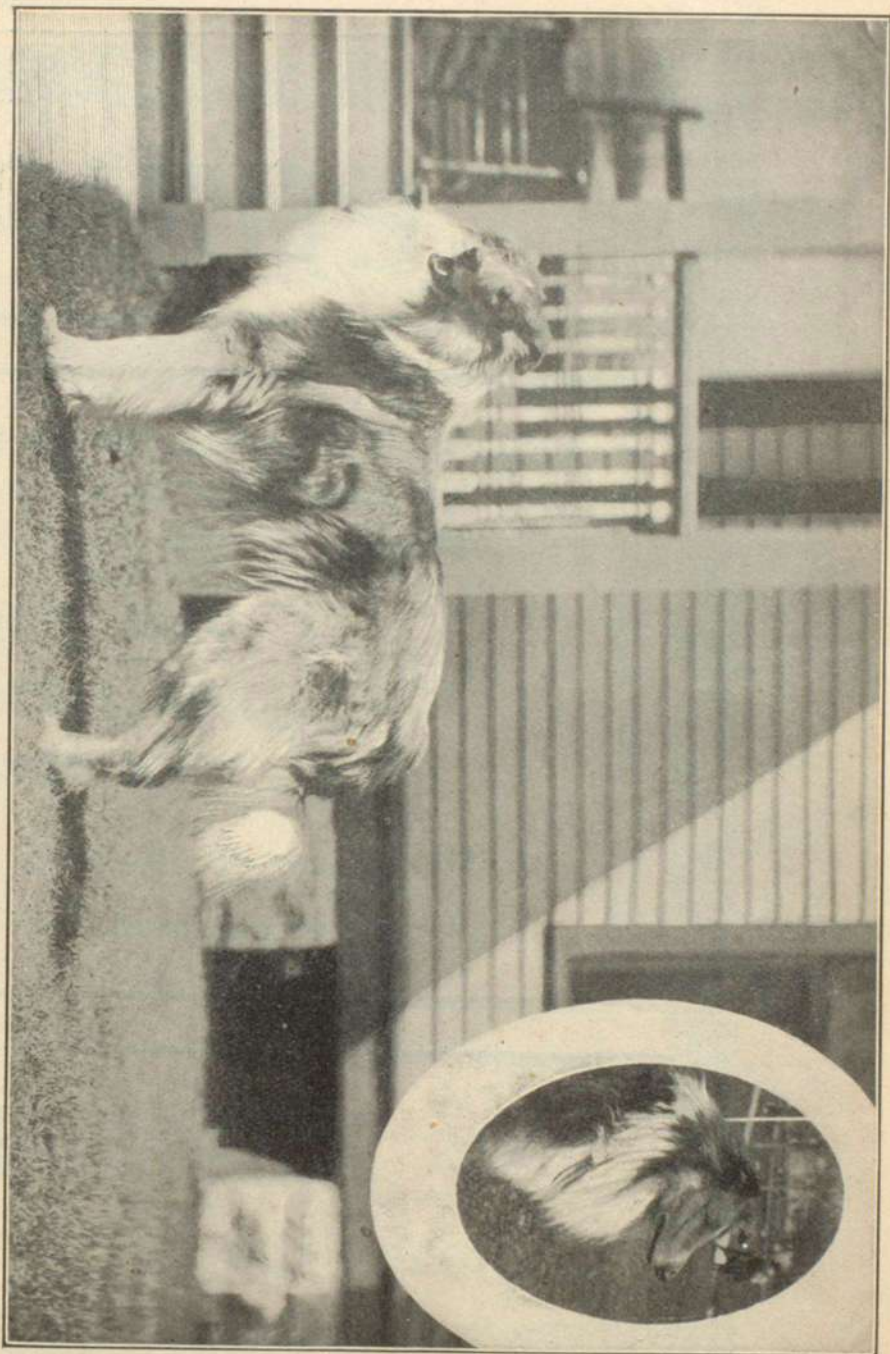

edited by those well-known philokunns, Mr. G. Muss-Arnolt and Dr. C. Motschenbacher, assisted by Prof. D. W. Lellmain, University of New York, being a committee appointed by the Dachshund Club, comes as a welcome addition to Dachshund literature.

The standard as published in this brochure, treats elaborately of the subject, though in the free translation of some words and sentences these become rather puzzling to the novice, who seeks to unravel the mysteries of type and Dachshund anatomy. In studying the latter one must always bear in mind the essential qualifications expected of a dog that goes to earth. We are not entirely familiar with Dachshund trials, but we believe it is the object in going to ground to make the game bolt, the Dachshund is not expected to kill his quarry. Of all breeds, therefore, including those that are with more or less accuracy given the name

of Terrier, none approaches the Dachshund in suitable formation for the work it has to do in a narrow burrow, or in the work of drawing its legitimate game, the badger. It requires lots of lung and heart room, for at work it has to breathe under conditions that are obviously peculiarly distressing. The outward turn of the feet serves a purpose in burrowing. The peculiar looseness of skin, a quality we do not see mentioned in this standard, but in the negotiation of tight corners and close quarters, is no doubt of great value—as the old saying goes, they should be able to turn round in their own cuticle. The medium, obliquely set eye is also a consideration in underground work, and the heavily muscled forearms and quarters serve their purpose in removing soil that is dug out in their efforts to reach the quarry, and pull it out when required to do so.

According to the standard translated

by our German friends, the general appearance of the Dachshund is dwarfy, short legged, long bodied, but still sturdy figure, with strongly developed muscles.

Notwithstanding the ill-proportioned appearance of the short limbs to the long body, nothing of a cripple-looking, nor awkward or clumsy in movement, neither weasel-like, slim-appearing, with an audacious carriage of the head, coupled with intelligent expression.

CHARACTERISTICS.

Full of life, sharp, almost reckless in attack or defense. In play, droll and untiring; by temperament, wilful and whimsical, but, with correct rearing just as faithful, affectionate and obedient as any other breed of dogs. All senses well developed—conformation and character point to pre-eminent fitness to go to earth after vermin. His love of hunt, good sight and hearing, full tongue and small size make him valuable above earth to hunt on level ground, as he also has an excellent nose for tracking wounded game. In accordance with those characteristics, the Dachshund should be typical, but built for work, alert, untiring, especially being sound of heart and lungs.

Especially interesting are the remarks about color:

(a) Solid color. Red, reddish yellow, yellow, or red yellow with black trace, although clean colors are preferable, and are held more valuable than reddish yellow or yellow. Nose and nails, black; red is permissible, but not desired.

(b) Two colors. Deep black, liver or grey, with tan or yellow thumb marks above the eyes, tan or yellow markings along the lips and jaw, on the inner side of ears, on brisket, on the inner and posterior side of legs, on feet and around anus, from where the tan runs to within half the length of underside of stern. Nose and nails, of black dogs, black; liver-colored may have them brown; grey

dogs, either body or flesh color. On solid and two-colored dogs, white is only permissible as a small spot on brisket, or a narrow strip on chest.

(c) Tigers (dappled). The colors are a light silver grey, or even white body-color, with dark irregular spots (large covering spots are not to be desired). of dark grey, liver, reddish yellow, or black.

It is desired that neither body nor marking color should be over prominent, so as to make the dog appear, at a distance, many-colored. The eye catching him easily while he is beating in woods.

The tan pencilling should be darker on darkly colored tigers than on light colored dogs; it even may appear on white body-color. Wall eyes are permissible with white-body-color. Flesh or spotted nose no fault. Dark colored tigers should have no white, though its presence is no disqualification, only a handicap.

It is undesirable to infuse tiger blood into solid or two-colored blood, as the probable appearance of white in the offspring is always to be expected, and in tigers, type being not as well fixed as in the others, no improvement of type can be expected from this infusion.

Note.—Continued breeding for color is nonsense. With black and tans, the thumb and pencil marks will disappear or get pale and also develop a tendency to semi-Albinism; the first state thereof being liver, grey and tiger. These colors again, by inbreeding to them, or even other colors, have the tendency to produce white tigers, or entire Albinos, with rose-colored skin, wall eyes and flesh-colored nose. The same weakening of the color pigment will appear by inbreeding for reds, of course, by yellow eyes, red nose and nails and yellow color. Liver, grey or tigers should only be crossed with black and tans; livers crossed with reds produce flesh-colored noses, considered bad color, and Albinism.

ence upon our shows, but it creates confidence, as well as a more personal interest in the fortunes of our dogs; five years ago the sentiment was distinctly against ladies handling their own dogs, but now it is almost the exception to find a lady owner who shrinks from the sport of showing. We see the same spirit developing at the horse shows, and I hope that all the members feel as strongly as I do on this subject. Every institution like ours should, I believe, have a mission, and this showing one's own dog in the ring is ours.

I wish to congratulate the local members upon their unfailing attendance at the monthly meetings, and for the interest displayed in the association's work; and also thank those ladies who have so kindly read papers on different breeds of dogs. These "talks" have been extensively published in the kennel journals, and have served to bring our association more prominently before the public. I would suggest that members continue this pleasing and instructive feature, and would further suggest that members prepare "talks" on other breeds than those they are directly interested in, so that we may have one every month. I would like to suggest that we thank the kennel press of this country and Canada for their kindness in devoting so much space to our doings. It has been suggested that we hold a dog show; I think, however, at the present stage, it would be wiser to confine our efforts to supporting other shows with our specials, and thus encourage ladies to exhibit and breed dogs. As Boston is, practically, our headquarters, the home show of the N. E. K. C. has always engaged our best efforts, and the very interesting displays brought out at the late show through specials donated by our association are quite as gratifying as, I believe, would be the risk and toil attending a dog show of our own. In the coming open air shows, at

Braintree, the ladies of our association have an exceptional opportunity to make of it a ladies' show; of this, I hope, they will avail themselves, both by donating specials and exhibiting their dogs.

Before concluding, I would like to suggest that we, as an association, and individually, use all our influence and efforts towards having the Legislature, at its next session, reduce the license fees of registered dogs and kennels, something on the lines of the R. I. license law secured by those interested. If the N. E. K. C., B. S. Bench Show Association, L. K. A. of Massachusetts, and the other local kennel clubs would take the matter up, I feel confident the present fees would be materially reduced. I would also like to propose that a resolution be made that, in view of the large amount of work now devolving upon the Secretary, she be exempt from payment of dues while in office, and I would suggest that this be made to date from the annual meeting of 1902.

In conclusion, ladies, I wish to thank you all for the unvarying kindness and courtesy which have made my office such a pleasure.

SMOOTH FOX TERRIERS.

By J. C. Tinne.

(Concluded.)

At Darlington Mowbray Charity was a fair winner, and later in the year ran into a place in the Oaks at the Club Show. She is nice all over, except that her ears ought to have been smaller.

The Club Show brought out several youngsters of merit, the best being Doncaster Dominie, mentioned above. Chaseley Patch won some prizes here; he is shapely, well-limbed, but not long enough in head. Bluebeard excels in head; his sister, Alkincoats Bluebell, though not quite so good in head, is better in other respects. Brockenhurst Dukedom gained some admirers, but will find no more, because he is dead. Deyne Tartar was entered in every class for which he was eligible at this show, but died before the show came off. I had never seen him, but report credits him with much excellence.

Amongst the adults shown during the past year, Donna Fortuna easily comes out at the tip-top of the tree, winning the Grand Challenge Cup at Flyde, Crystal Palace, and Cheltenham; the last-mentioned show found her in the "record" position of winning first in both open class and veteran class. This fact alone speaks volumes for her, because it establishes her as having proved herself

what all good Terriers should be, but very few have been, a laster. I understand that her owner has wisely decided to withdraw her from the show bench with her laurels fresh upon her. There are some who thought that Sandown Violet should have deposed her at Cheltenham. But really it was not a matter of opinion, and the fact was plain that, beautiful as Sandown Violet is, the other is more so. I can see no single point where Violet is the better, unless it be possibly in expression, and very slightly in size. In the matter of bone, feet and quarters, the older bitch comes right away and wins comfortably. Duchess of Durham has played a good second this past year. Other smooth bitches which have helped to fill the prize lists are Grove Venus, now gone to America; Dream, wanting in head, but otherwise an incitement to break the Tenth Commandment; Carte Blanch, a sterling good sort; Glory Quayle, and her dam, Brockenhurst Fearless. Of the other sex, mention may be made of Blizzard, who has his detractors as well as his friends; Adam Bede, who is not so young as he was; Rowton Knight-Errant, the beautiful-headed; Dukedom, who should surely become enrolled in the records of fame as a sire, if breeding counts for anything; Philip Christian, the insufficiently gifted in head, but with the most excellent coat of any Terrier before the public.

Of the new, or nearly new, judges, mention may fairly be made of Mr. Reeks and Mr. Hosker, who each took one of the most important shows of the year, and whose performances will cause them to be eagerly called upon in the future. Of the old-seasoned judges, a cordial welcome was given to Mr. Theodore Bassett at the Crystal Palace. It recalled old times of beloved memory, when we saw the same methodical, industrious, capable and impartial performance, which long ago stamped this gentleman as one of the very best of Fox Terrier judges.

The North of England Fox Terrier Club has taken new life, and gives promise of going ahead. This, with the Fylde, the London, and the Isle of Wight and New Forest, are giving good help to the parent club, the Fox Terrier Club, in the endeavor to further the interests of the breed, and to refute the unfounded carpings of some who, from time to time, be-

tray their ignorance by trying to argue that the Fox Terrier not only is sinking, but has ceased to exist as regards capability to work. Even if it be true that the best of to-day are not as good as the best of old time (and in this I am not prepared to agree), yet the fact remains that the general merit of Fox Terriers is immeasurably higher than what used to be seen at shows. Where it used to be a judge's first task on entering the ring to clear away the rubbish, it is now difficult to find really bad ones.

Tendency to breed our Terriers oversized must still be kept in mind and guarded against. But let it not be forgotten that many a Terrier, which the inexperienced critic may consider too large, can, and has been proved able to, go to ground and bolt his fox. Fox-earths vary in size; a Terrier unable to work in one earth may readily succeed in another. It goes without saying that the Terrier A who can go to ground nineteen times out of twenty is better (in this respect) than B, who can only manage twelve earths out of twenty; but it does not follow that the latter must be put right out of court. *Ceteris paribus*, a judge who knows his business would rightly place A over B. But highly important as is the matter of size, yet other points also demand consideration.

Another point requiring the care of breeders is that of hindquarters, and although I cannot join in the exaggerated expression of opinion that a majority of our Terriers are crippled behind, yet I do acknowledge that too many are weak in this respect, cow-hocked, wanting in development of second thighs, and wrong in their hind action.
