Classes for French Bulldogs have also been opened, a mixed limit class and a mixed open class. In Black and Tan Terriers, one of Canada's strongest sections, the puppy class has been divided, and in Beagles a mixed puppy class has been added. It is the intention to give a large classification for Italian Greyhounds, if a sufficient entry to warrant the expenditure can be procured or promised, and the same applies to Whippets. Toy Black and Tan Terriers are increasing in favor here, and some specimens that warrant more than the usual attention have been shown during the past three or four years. Therefore, the committee has decided to open a class for this breed, open dogs and bitches, with the regular prize money.

One of the strong features in connection with the show will be the kenner prize of \$10 in each breed for four or more, provided two or more teams, the property of different owners, are entered. This will give exhibitors an extra run for their money, and will help to reduce expenses, especially in the breeds that are more largely exhibited. The entry fee for this kennel prize will be \$2. In fact, this is the entry fee in all classes.

. . .

In engaging Mr. Walter S. Glynn, of Liverpool, England, to judge several breeds at the big Dog Show to be held in Toronto in September, the management has made a master stroke. Mr. Glynn is the eldest son of Mr. Walter Glynn, of Liverpool, the head of probably the large est existing shipping firm, and is by profession a barrister, whose practice is in the Admiralty Court. Mr. Glynn is a member of the Kennel Club Committee. and a most regular attendant at the meetings of that body, and is of great assistance in its deliberations. In addition Mr. Glynn is a member of several specialty clubs, and though he does not look for judging engagements, he has

several times judged Fox Terriers and other rough Terriers at most of the principal shows. Indeed, he has officiated at at least one Fox Terrier Club Show, that held at Cheltenham. His first love was the Fox Terrier, and he has owned some good ones, though his strong kennel consists mainly of the hardy and handy Welsh Terrier. Amongst the Fox Terriers he has owned are Champion Brynhir Rags, Displacer, Deftly, etc. We are confident that this gentleman will attract a record entry of the ever present Fox Terrier at Toronto, where it is probable he will also judge Airedale, Scottish and Welsh Terriers, in all of which he is a known authority.

The other gentlemen who so far have accepted, are Mr. Jas. Lindsay, of Montreal for Irish Terriers (and he knows them from nose to tail), and Mr. W. T. Payne, Kingston, Pa., who will take all Sporting Spaniels. It is not necessary for us to say that he knows a Spaniel and will get them right. The other judges' classes have not yet been all assigned, but we may say that Mr. James Mortimer has consented to act, and will have Setters, Pointers, Bull Terriers, Chesapeakes, Skye and Bedlington Terriers, the miscellaneous classes, and possibly some others.

With an increased prize list and a judges slate that will tand criticism, Toronto may rest assured of a record entry. Canadian Kennel Club rules will govern.

Mr. Bjorkeland sends us the following information re Sherbrook Dog Show:

"The final arrangements for the third annual dog show in connection with Canada's Great Eastern Exhibition are now well in hand, and judging by the many special prizes coming in, it will be a popular show. At a meeting of the E. T. K. C. held in Compton July 6th the club gave the last finishing arrangements

to their part of the work before opening the show, only some more special prizes are expected, which we hope to have in before the 15th of July. Mr. W. M. Tomlinson expects to have prize lists out by the 1st of August. Three and two dollar prizes, first and second in all classes, and a large number of specials for a one dollar entry fee, should be an inducement to show here. Collie men, we think, will be pleased to hear that Mr. Arthur F. Gault, of Montreal, has promised to judge Collies, and equally as good is the news of Mr. James Lindsay for all Terrier classes. Mr. Jos. Kennedy, of Hamilton, who will take all other breeds, is a well known fancier, especially among Spaniel men. Dogs sent to the care of the superintendent by anyone unable to attend in person will, as usual, be well cared for, and if anyone wishes it they may write me and I will personally handle and care for their dogs. We have promised the best of management and care of dogs, and this we will stand by. We have nothing more to say now, and leave it to exhibitors whether Sherbrooke Dog Show shall be a successful show or not. The dogs we know will make it a 'howling success.' ''

Exhibitors, we feel sure, will ably support the efforts of our eastern friends, where C. K. C. rules will govern. The entry fee is low, and the money enough to pay expenses.

Vancouver's Creditable Dog Show

The Vancouver Kennel Club has every reason to congratulate itself on the success of its first bench show, which was held on Saturday, June 17th. Even those who were closely connected with it from its inception were surprised at the great success achieved. There were one hundred and thirty-four dogs on the bench, and they yelped joyously or howled dismally, according to their individual temperaments, all day, while many hundreds of Vancouver's people filed past the kennels or stood about the ring and watched the ribbons handed out. All arrangements were well made and as well caried out. To Mr. George Dyke, the secretary, very much credit must be given. Mr. J. J. Tulk, president, was also an able worker. But each member of the Bench Show Committee did nobly, the others being Mr. A. J. Mayo, C. Cocking, R. P. Forshaw, C. Hermann and E. S. Wiband. Mr. C. H. Barker made a very capable superintendent.

The showing of dogs was remarkably good. Very few people in the city imagined that Vancouver had so many highbred canines. It was a revelation and an education. It brought together some very good dogs; it showed people who were not previously aware of the fact what kind of a dog they owned—this information sometimes bringing disappointment and sometimes causing joy. It is not an immaterial fact that the club will clear a handsome sum as the result of the show, thereby having plenty of ammunition in store for the big campaign in the spring, when dogs from all along the Pacific Coast will be benched here with the local good ones.

It was pleasing to notice in this connection that at least fifty per cent. of the dogs shown are good enough to put in the circuit shows. Of course, all of them would not win, but if the dogs are in good condition, Vancouver would do very much better than any city, according to population, on the circuit. Nor did the show contain all the good dogs in town. There are always people in any town whose dogs are too good to mix with those true fanciers exhibit. There are also many that are fraid that so we dreadful disease will be contracted by their dogs when they are shown with

others, and also that class which is too lazy to prepare a dog for the bench. Had all these people taken an interest in the show, it would have been even better than it was. Particularly noticeable was the display of Collies. It was expected that this breed would have perhaps the largest representation of all, for there are many high-bred Collies in the city. What were shown were very good, but the owners of the others deserve no credit for the big step made towards improving the breed of dogs in Vancouver. Beginning to-day, you will hear these people tell how they would have skinned everything in the show if they had exhibited.

PICKING THE WINNER.

It was a pretty sight when all the winners in the different classes were in the ring at the same time to allow Mr.

Turner to decide which was the best of the lot. There was a medal presented to the one selected. It was rather a strange thing for dog fanciers to see a judge endeavoring to find out whether Mrs. Macnaughton's Bull was better than Mr. Close's Cocker, or Mrs. Willgress' Japanese Spaniel better than Mr. Seymour's Great Dane, or Mrs. McLagan's Pug better than Mr. Fitzgerald's Setter, or Mr. Cooke's Husky better than the whole outfit of them. If there was ever a judge "up against it," this judge was that judge, as Mr. Quiller would say. He let ignorance put a barrier between him and adverse criticism. He knew if he gave the prize to Mr. Martin's sterling Dandy Dinmont no one would be able to take much objection, because there was not half a dozen people at the show who knew positively whether a dog

nels also had a well-nigh perfect Irish Water Spaniel in the person of Burrard Kitty. Mr. Close's Beauty is a wonderfully good Cocker; Mr. Wolffshon's Jeannot is a very high-class Irish Setter. In fact, all the winners are dogs perhaps as good in scoring points as is the Dandy. But no fault can be found with the judge for that very reason. There was the

Danes, Mrs. Seymour's Remus was the winner. He is a very handsome dog, has a fine face, splendid legs and perfect coat, but his ears are poorly cropped. There is but one dog on the Pacific Coast that can beat him, a dog owned in San Francisco, whom Remus will meet here next April. The winners in Greyhounds and Deerhounds were very fair samples.

Oregon Lad swept everything in the Pointer class. He is a beautiful puppy perfect in everything but ears, which are somewhat large. But Oregon Lad is still a puppy, and when he fills out this fault will be less apparent. He was in grand condition. Jeannot is an Irish Setter that should hold his own in very good company. He is very well set up, has a good coat and very fine head. The Burrard Kennels have two Irish Water Spaniels that the owners should be proud of. As they raised them themselves, they no doubt are. Kitley is wonderfully well put together, while Rowdy Girl is but a little way behind. They are a brace of dogs that should be given a campaign on the eastern circuit.

COCKER CONTENTIONS.

In Cocker Spaniels there was more excitement than in any other breed. Mr. Close has a way of stirring things up in his class. If he should ever establish big kennels and enter dogs of about six different breeds, a Donnybrook fair would be a tame affair beside the favored show. Mr. Turner was afraid of him, and refused to judge the class unless the dogs were divided up according to weight. Mr. Forshaw came to the rescue and put his hands over the pretty little fellows. Beauty, the winner, is one of the finest Cockers ever put down on the Pacific Coast, in that she is up to all the modern requirements. In that respect there was not an entry within hailing distance of her except her kennel mate. They are breeding Cockers down to useless dogs, but as long as they are we must abide by the standard or stand still in breeding. There is no use kicking. Pluto is all right in quality of coat, and was put down with it in perfect condition, but in color he is woefully weak. In fact, the Close entries and Mr. Custance's very promising little puppy, were the only black ones that made weight. Pluto's litter brother, Pepper, is a very good

little fellow, and as the question of weight did not enter so strenuously into the red class, he won a good victory over Mr. Dyke's Ramona, the latter being a trifle fat and off in color.

Mrs. Maenaughton's Bull is undoubtedly one of the best of his breed in America. He attracted great attention, and was a whole show in himself. His ears, eyes and muzzle are perfect, and conformation all that could be desired. His fatness is the only thing that would score against him. He will be given a trial on the circuit next spring, and should beat everything. There were only two Airedales, both good ones. Mr. Hartley's dog was easily the better, being well boned and having the coat that is now being cultivated in America. Capt. Alexander's bitch is a good specimen of the English breeding, but is much too light and is off in muzzle. Cairnsmuir Delia is a very fine Fox Terrier bitch, scoring well up in all essentials. This class was generally well filled, and the average ran very high. First Flight is a very good wire-haired. Bad ear carriage detracts from her fine head, but she is all a Terrier. Sandy is a bigboned Irish Terrier, with a darker muzzle than he should have, but he stands up well. He had little the better of Irish

THE KENNEL CLUB'S MISTAKE.

Under the above heading Mr. James Watson, who is well known to many Canadian breeders, writes the following letter to The American Field, the one kennel journal in the U.S. that from the first mention of the new winners rule opposed the ill-thought-of change with able pen, both editorially and in its kennel column:

Hackensack, N.J.

Editor American Field: "The world do move," and very rapidly at times, when there is occasion for it and the right leader is at the head of the movement. Your editorials on the present unfortunate position of the Kennel Club have been most timely, and while your contemporaries in the east are awaiting orders or waiting to see which way the wind is blowing, the American Field has gone right to the vital point and "blazed the path."

Already we see the effect of The American Field's work, and the movement outlined as the correct one in your last issue, has been undertaken. That it will be carried to a successful issue is just as sure as that the sun will eventually shine once more upon this glorious country of ours.

This day I am in receipt of a communication upon The American Field programme. First of all, I think it well to make some facts public that do not appear in the communications which will follow. On the way home from the Wissahickon show some of us foregathered in the smoker, and I was asked by Mr. Carnochan what was the thing to be done about this Kennel Club business. To be brief, I told him, and those in the company, that the same power, a majority vote, which had caused the trouble, could undo it. It was in order to call a special meeting, or rather have Mr. Belmont call one on request of the necessary number of petitioners. When through with my little speech, Mr. Muss-Arnolt did me the compliment of saying: "For once in my life I agree with you, Watson. That is the only thing to be done. He is right, Carnochan." Then I said that if we were all of one mind we might form a committee to bring the subject before the members of the Kennel Club, show them the necessity for protecting themselves by being represented at the proposed special meeting. That there was plenty of time in which to bury the new rule, for the first of August was some little time ahead, and it would not matter a great deal whether we got into August before it was revoked. Just as we were on the point of getting down to business in the way of a committee, Jersev City was shouted into our compartment and the meeting adjourned without motion.

Acting upon what was said and done on that occasion, Mr. Carnochan has sent out over his own signature as delegate of the Duquesne Club the letter which follows. I need hardly say that the call has the approval of all who were on the return journey to New York Saturday night, June 13, and that includes Mr. Palmer, Dr. Motschenbacher, Muss-Arnolt and myself. I can also add that Mr Smith, of the Welsh Terrier Club, Mr.

Jarrett, of the Ladies' Kennel Association of Massachusetts, Mr. Bohlen, of the Wissahickon Club, and I think I can add Mr. Mortimer, of the Ladies' Kennel Association, for the reason that all of the officers of that club I have had the opportunity of speaking to on the subject want the old rule back, and Mr. Mortimer will, of course, carry out his club's wishes.

The course I took was to write Mr. Carnochan as follows:

"On behalf of the Colorado Kennel Club, I thank you most heartily for stepping into the breach and sending out the letters regarding a special meeting of the Kennel Club. I am somewhat doubtful whether Mr. Belmont will call the meeting on the wording of the request. The business of a special meeting must be specifically defined, and no business outside of that can be transacted. Your

call says "to consider the question of the values of the winners classes and take such action as may be necessary thereto." That, to my mind, is too vague for a special meeting call, and Mr. Belmont is one who always wants things done properly and in order. We do not want to upset the apple cart by a false move, and I would suggest that the request be worded somewhat as follows: "To revoke the standing rule passed at the last meeting and reinstate the old rule."

Further, I suggest that it be stated, "and to request the Committee on Constitution and Rules to incorporate the standing rule as to values into the dog show rules at the next annual meeting."

You are a delegate and also a member of the Committee on Constitution and Rules, and you are as well aware as I am that hardly ever is a rule amended in open meeting but there is a hitch in the

wording and an ambiguity. On the other hand, when we get together in committee we talk it over, twist it about, look at it from all points of view, its scope, its construction and all that and turn out a finished article. Let us do one thing at a time and get out of the present mess. If we seek to amend the old rule at the special meeting we will botch it to a certainty, so let us rest content with getting back to fair treatment to all as a first step and then let us put the subject into the hands of those who have had experience and can frame sound rules. In other words, let us do one thing at a time, and do it well.

You have, of course, read some of the suggestions which have appeared in the papers since the meeting, and can see for yourself how each man looks at the shield from his own point of view; to one it is golden and his vis-a-vis swears it is made of silver. Let them thrash the subject out a little and we may get a good idea or two, but you will, I fear, have it into the fire out of our prospective frying pan if we go to tinkering at the rule as we have it until August.

You will observe in the third paragraph above I say to incorporate "a standing rule." That gives the committee perfect liberty to recommend any rule it considers advisable, and is not restrictive as to the rule we have been working under.

Mr. Carnochan's letters are as follows:

Dear Sir,—Believing it is for the best interests of the American Kennel Club to have the resolution concerning championships, that was passed at the last quarterly meeting in May, rescinded before August 1st, when the resolution goes into effect, I write to ask you whether your club is willing to join in asking for a special meeting of the American Kennel Club, to be held in July.

If you care to join in requesting a special meeting, will you kindly sign the inclosed in the name of your club, and return to me as soon as possible?

After signing, kindly make sure that your delegate will be present to represent you at the special meeting, if one is called. Very truly yours,

"Dr. Foote-I think this is about the fourth time the Canadian Kennel Club has come to us for the purpose of mutual arrangement to govern shows. If my memory serves me right, on two occasions we came to an agreement with them, and after a short time they disregarded those agreements and went back to their present status. On the last occasion committees were appointed as they request now. Our committees met and came to terms. Our committee granted pretty much all that they requested, and their committee reported back to the Canadian Kennel Club, with the result that the whole thing was thrown down. It seems to me we have had enough of that tomfoolery, and I for one am opposed to any other arrangement with the Canadians beyond what we grant to the Pacific Coast committee. I move that the report of the Rules Committee, which was subsequently indorsed by the American Kennel Club

at the meeting of February, 1903, be adhered to and reaffirmed by the present meeting.

"Motion seconded and carried."

Permit me to suggest to every dog man in Canada who can at all do so: Show something at the approaching Exhibition, and let such gentlemen as Dr. Foote see that we still have a few good ones left over here, in spite of the fact that we sell them their best in several breeds, notably Cockers, St. Bernards, etc., etc.

For the information of those who have not followed the matter, I might say that this A. K. C. is a wealthy organization composed of rich men, who propose to keep it a close corporation and, as will be seen, "no Canadian need apply." Wake up, fellow dog men, and show them what we can do. DEATH OF CHARLES W. RODMAN, JR.

The papers on the other side are unanimous in their expression of regret at the practically sudden death of Mr. Rodman, who, it will be remembered, judged Irish Terriers at the last Toronto Industrial Show, and judged them well, even though his task was not a heavy one. At several Toronto shows he has been prominent in the ring as a steward, and his efforts in this way were appreciated. Stock-keeper, in a column notice, says that Mr. Charles W. Rodman, Jr., died on Friday last. Typhoid fever was the cause. How little we dreamed of this when we chaffed Charlie Rodman over the ropes at the Ladies' show about the new rating of winners, and he gave us just one more taste of that linguistic facility which was so characteristic and which endeared him so much to us all. And to think this was the last public utterance on a subject with which he was so intimately associated. It seems a sad coincidence that in the last number of the Gazette should appear a splendid portrait of our late friend, together with a biographical sketch of his career so far as it affects the fancy. Furthermore, his speech on the crying need of a revision of the constitution and by-laws of the American Kennel Club, was the last utterance of a delegate at the last meeting of the A. K. C., which took place but a month or so before his death. The late Mr. Rodman was a unique figure in our Kennel world.

He was a genial, whole-souled friend, the life of every fancier gathering, and he always had a good word for everyone.

Mr. Rodman had been actively connected with the A. K. C. about four years, and during that time had ever been prominent in its councils. He was accredited a delegate in 1899, and at once became a member of the Rules Committee, on which committee he had served ever since, becoming its chairman on the retirement of Mr. Bloodgood, when the latter was elected president of the associate members. Mr. Rodman in this position became a member of the Executive Board, in whose councils he was a most valued and prominent factor, and most assuredly his assiduous attention . to all matters concerning the welfare of the American Kennel Club and our kennel affairs in general, created confidence abroad, and his voice will be sadly missed. Mr. Rodman was also a prominent member of the Stud Book Committee. which entails so much dreary work upon its members. He first represented the Cincinnati Dog Owners' Protective Association, and at the time of his demise he was delegate for the Chicago Kennel Club. It is needless to say he was most punctual in his attendance to the duties this office entailed.

Mr. Rodman was a lawyer by profession, and occupied a prominent position in the legal fraternity of New York. He was a "Farman" of our fancy, having handled successfully several legal affairs of our well known dog men.

Mr. Rodman was also secretary of the Amateur Whippet Racing Association.

As a fancier, Mr. Rodman was solely interested in Irish Terriers, and he has always been prominent in the Irish Terrier Club, of which he was secretary for several years, declining a renomination at the last meeting owing to his increasing professional duties, a resolve that was received with much regret by his fellow-members. Mr. Rodman had owned several good Terriers, the most famous being Leeds Muddler, which he owned when in partnership with Mr. Singleton

Van Schaick, and later the good bitch Kinswoman, that he purchased in Ireland, when he was over a couple of years ago, as a member of the committee to confer with the English Kennel Club.

As a club judge Mr. Rodman was in great demand. He was one of the few amateurs who would put himself about to judge the breed he loved so well, and his decisions were received with the respect his study of the breed entitled. Charlie Rodman loved his dogs, he did not keep them as a fad, but because he understood them and loved them. It was always refreshing to hear him talk about his Terriers, and the way he had them trained for work and as intelligent companions. He died at his home at Queens, Long Island, N.Y., after an illness of less than a week. His many personal friends, among whom we are proud have been numbered. extend their utmost sympathy to his bereaved family. Action will be taken on his death at the special meeting of the American Kennel Club, July 15th.
