N. W. TERRIERS—EXPRESS MAT-TERS.

I am rejoicing in a litter of six, five dogs, of which the sire is Ch. Bull's-Eye, the young son of Barkby Ben, and a dog which many consider to be the best wirehaired show dog in the States at the present time, he having won his championship when only nine months old. Cairnsmuir Lesson, the dam, is a nice little bitch of the right size. So I hope to have some nice pups in the litter, and already they look very promising. She was shipped from the Cairnsmuir Kennels, New York, on July 27th, arriving in Brandon on July 30th. I was not notified by the Express Co. of her arrival until four days afterwards, and it was only by chance that I heard she was in Brandon through a friendly official on the train, who told us the customs were holding her for duty. We gave invoice and other papers to this man, showing that the dog was pure bred, and he delivered them to the customs officials in Brandon. We also wired for them to send her by the next day's train, but even then they wanted further evidence of purity of blood, etc., before letting

her go, and she did not finally arrive till August 5th, nearly a week after her arrival in Brandon, and ten days after she was shipped from New York. I had also \$1 to pay in addition to the express charges for her feeding at Brandon.

It certainly does not seem right that live stock, more especially a bitch in whelp (which fact was printed in large letters on her box), should be held over like this by the customs, and if it had not been that I got all the paners, pedigree, etc., beforehand, and so had them ready to send immediately on being notified of the dog's arrival, I should probably not have got her for ten days more owing to the time it would take to communicate with Mr. Carnochan at New York, and obtain the necessary papers from him. The bitch whelped ten days after her arrival, and two or three days before she should have, and I was afraid at first that I should lose some of the pups-there were seven, and they did not seem very strong. However, one only died, and the others are growing nicely, and seem quite healthy and nourishing now. Yours faithfully,

A FEW WORDS ABOUT COLLIES.

Written for the Montreal Collie Club, by Mr. A. H. Megson, Manchester, England, August, 1903.

As an old enthusiast, I have been asked to write a few lines about the Collie dog, but as so many articles have already appeared upon this subject, there is little more to say about it; and, although the breed has not (in my opinion) improved within the last few years, this may be accounted for by its having reached the zenith, though for my own part I am inclined to think that it has been somewhat on the wane, for the simple reason that we have no specimens to breed from to-day equal to some of the veterans, such

as Southport Perfection, Sefton Hero and Rightaway; again, breeders do not mate their stock with sufficient judgment. A dog that creates a sensation on the show bench is always in great demand for stud purposes, with the result that his progeny is seldom above the average. A breeder, to be successful, must discriminate, and select the sire that will correct the faults which the dam possesses, for instance, mate a long bodied dog with a cobby bitch, a short head with a long head, low ears to prick ears, and so on; and do not use the dog that is overworked at stud. It is true that sometimes a fluke appears from an alliance that was never expected, as in the case of the most successful Collie that ever lived (either as a show or stud dog), Champion Metchlev Wonder. Although his breeder repeated the cross again and again, he never produced another good one, and yet Metchley Wonder was the means of making the breed what it is to-day.

The question now comes, What are the real points of the Collie? and it is one that so many judges differ about. My own opinion is, that unless he combines those points that are essential to the purpose for which a Collie was intended, viz., a worker of sheep, he is not a Collie at all. It is a great error to try to breed Collies for beauty and the show bench only. Color should not go for anything. One of the first considerations is straight and strong forelegs, well loaded shoulders, and the thicker the soles are padded the better. Unless a Collie is a free mover, he is useless as a sheep dog. His hind legs must be sickle shaped, or he cannot gallop, and when running should keep his tail low; ears should be small and carried outwards, and his head should be big enough to hold plenty of brains and not of the Greyhound type. I like a level mouth and fairly long muzzle.

A point that receives too much attention from our English judges is coat; in the eyes of some a Collie has no chance of winning a prize unless he owns a very profuse coat. I certainly like a fair amount, but quality should precede quantity; a close under-coat is essential, but a preponderance of soft outer-coat is a decided mistake, as in working (and that is how to judge a dog), it impedes the speed, especially in bad weather, hence the smooth coated variety generally produces better workers than the rough. And lastly, as to size, I much prefer a medium size to a giant, such as we often get at

exhibitions. A medium size Collie will get over more ground, turn sooner and last longer than the larger dog; and i prefer a long bodied one (especially in bitches) to a cobby one; they invariably produce better stock.

The breeders who have been most successful in Great Britain are the Rev. Hans Hamilton, Mr. Stretch and Mr. Ainscough, for the simple reason that they have selected suitable sires, and not gone for big prize winners only.

Canadian Kennel Club.

Minutes of Annual Meeting Held Sept. 9, 1903.

The president of the C. K. C., Mr. Jno. G. Kent, occupied the chair at the largely attended meeting of that body held on Sept. 9th in the Dog Show building, Toronto. The session lasted for about three hours, and practically all present took part. Several ladies, members of the club, honored the meeting by their presence, including Mrs. Coleman ("Kit" of The Mail), Mrs. Waters, St. Thomas, and Mrs. Gammon, Hamilton.

Mr. Kent, in opening the meeting, expressed his appreciation of the large attendance, and hoped that the business to come up would be transacted with care and in order.

Dr. A. W. Bell and Dr. William Mole, V.S., were appointed scrutineers to count the immense ballot cast for the election of officers.

In calling on Mr. Walter S. Glynn to address the meeting, the chairman alluded in most flattering terms to the good impression that Mr. Glynn had made on fanciers on this side of the water, both by his personality and by his careful method of judging. He was assured of a hearty welcome at any time that he might return.

Mr. Glynn, in responding, said that he felt quite at home in Canada, which he looked upon as a big part of our great

Empire, and he thanked, as individually, all who had made his visit such a pleasant one. In Welsh Terriers we had made a remarkably good start. He found many grand Fox Terriers, and noted especially Warren Daunt; he did not know of a better living. But, and Mr. Glynn, emphasized it time and again, too many with very bad feet had passed before him. In fact, the majority were deficient in this point. He would advise breeding for good feet, the opposite being an extremely bad fault that no competent judge could overlook. England was absolutely friendly to both the C. K. C. and the A. K. C. He would like to see a worldwide union of all kennel clubs. A point dear to him was the affiliation of the

Mr. Glynn had here to leave to catch his train, and again thanked those present for the response his hurried remarks had met with, and for all that had been done to make his visit such a pleasant one.

The secretary's report, as follows, was then acted on:

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

As is the usual custom, I again present my report of the year's business. Printed copies are here for your perusal. It should be remembered that our year ends on August 31st, so report is up to that date. The minutes of each meeting have been fully reported, but I may be permitted to touch briefly on some matters that have been passed on. For the first time in its history, the club was compelled to suspend the officials of a show for non-payment of prize money, as was the case at St. Thomas.

Championship cups may be claimed on wins made entirely outside of C. K. C. shows. This has been made a precedent by the action of the Executive at its meeting of February 6th last. The rule, I submit, should be changed so as to make this impossible.

A Rules Committee was appointed at the same meeting to report at the proposed Hamilton Show, but as the latter fell through, no report was presented. Action might now be taken, if judged desirable.

Reciprocity with the A. K. C. Correspondence in this matter has been published, and the committee appointed to confer with A. K. C. has been discharged, the A. K. C. having refused to consider any move towards a return of our original relations. It remains for this meeting to say what further action, if any, shall be taken.

Pedigree.—The acceptance of a pedigree in which a Harrier (Foxhound bred) is the sire and the dam a Foxhound, is left to this meeting. The following relates to the case:

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of yours of the 28th inst., and in reply would say that the point I wish to make out in this case is that Hanks Huntsman was not, in my opinion, entitled to be registered as a Harrier, as he is bred from Foxhounds, and such being the case, I cannot see why you were justified in refusing to register my bitch as a Foxhound.

I will in all probability be at the annual meeting of the C. K. C., when I hope to hear this matter thrashed out.

If Foxhounds and Harriers are not interbred—here is the point in question—then Hank's Huntsman's registration should be cancelled. As he has several times won as a Harrier, the case is not clear. Several breeders that I have personally spoken to claim that a Harrier is nothing but a lightly built, undersized Foxhound. It is for the meeting to decide the question.

The letter of the Montreal Canine Association, dated June 16th and printed in minutes of Executive meeting of Aug. 6th, is before you for action.

Registrations for the year number 534, those for the same period of 19J1-1902 496. The total number recorded in Stud Book is now 7,058. Membership for the year is 273, an increase of 34, or about 12 per cent. Members already paid for 1904 number 52.

Championship Cups.—On motion of Rev. Thos. Geoghegan and Mr. T. G. Davey it was decided that at least two of the wins to qualify must be won under C. K. C. rules. This ruling not to be retroactive.

No action was taken as to a Rules Committee.

C. K. C. and A. K. C.—Mr. James Lindsay did not think we should take any further action. Mr. Jos. Reid was quite impartial, but would not advise the continuous changing of the rules. Mr. Williams was in full accord with Mr. Lindsay's ideas. We had done all we could to promote fuller relations without effect, He complimented the committee on the dignified manner in which the negotiations had been carried on; nothing in the least had been said derogatory to the interests of the C. K. C. Dr. Ford was persuaded the C. K. C. had done everything in its power. Further effort would simply be a waste of time and money. Mr. T. A. Armstrong did not believe we needed affiliation with any other club, and Mr. F. C. McLean felt and spoke in the same strain. Mr. T. G. Davey was entirely against any arrangement with the A. K. C. It was finally moved by Dr. C. Y. Ford, seconded by Mr. T. A. Armstrong, and unanimously carried, that no further action be taken, except on the imitiative of the A. K. C.

Mr. Tulk, who was down from British Columbia, spoke with enthusiasm on kennel affairs in that western portion of the Dominion. He did not, however just see how C. K. C. rules would benefit shows in British Columbia, but some possible solution might arise in the future.

Harrier-Foxhound Pedigree.—This is a matter that gave rise to a good deal of discussion. On motion of Messrs. Williams and Armstrong, it was finally carried that Hanks Huntsman's pedigree be recognized, and that the get of a Harrier and Foxhound may be registered.

Financial report was accepted subject to audit.

The prefixes and kennel names for registration, of which application had been made, were accepted, together with Fairfax Kennels, by Mr. G. Easdale, Ottawa, and Rockcliffe Kennels, by Mr. R. H. Elliott, Ottawa.

On motion of Mr. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. McLean, it was decided that in future all applications for prefixes, affixes and kennel names must be published in two issues of Gazette before being considered. Affiliation with the (English) Kennel Club.—The president had sent out a ballot on this question, that resulted in practically a unanimous vote in favor of affiliation, many expressing an opinion that this should have been one of the first steps undertaken by the C. K. C.

On motion of Messrs, Geoghegan and Lindsay, the president, secretary and Mr. James Lindsay were empowered as a committee, to ascertain just what affiliation would entail, and to carry the matter to a completion.

The following letter was read from Mr. Adam, of Monte Creek, B.C.:

Please find enclosed two dollars (\$2) for my membership fee. I am sending ballot in separate envelope with the answer "Yes." I would like very much if there were closer connections between the C. K. C. and P. K. L. It would benefit the western members very much in many ways. If possible, would you please try and do what you can in this matter? I remain yours faithfully,

While expressing a desire to aid Mr. Adam in his suggestion, the meeting felt that in recognizing all wins made outside of Canada under P. K. L. rules that we were doing all possible at present.

Mr. Richard Gibson wrote, suggesting the election of a younger and more prominent fancier as hon, president, but the meeting felt that as one of the founders of the C. K. C. and one who has done much for dogs in Canada, Mr. Gibson be urged to retain the position for at least the present term.

Toronto Show.

Spaniels-Collies-Fox Terriers.

As usual, the exhibit of the heavier variety of Spaniels was limited to a few, but representative, specimens. In Fields, King Bruce led, though many preferred the blue roan, Woolton Dagmar, whose high quality can never be denied. Of course, Mr. T. A. Carson won his usual blue ribbon with Dan McCarthy, and a good Irish Water Spaniel he is. Cockers made a handsome total for Mr. Payne, who judged his classes with a cool decision that was a satisfaction to himself and others alike, inasmuch that losers and winners alike felt that their dogs were being scrutinized by a man who knew his work. Puppies brought out nothing sensational, the winner being found in Mr. Dunn's Dundee, a nicely balanced puppy. It was in the novice class that the oldtime breeder, Mr. Boyle, brought out Lord Rugby. His owner evidently underestimated the merits of his dog, as he was satisfied to keep him under cover of the Lovice class alone. This dog has a lot of good about him. His bone, legs, and feet are above the average, although a trifle light in middle piece, his body is fair. In head he is a trifle heavy—a desirable quality in a stud dog. Mr. Clarke's Digby Bell was second, being outclassed in front and bone. The remainder were fair. Novice dogs, any other color-The good fancier, Miss Eleanor Macdonell, began a winning career with Knoydart Garnet, a fairish red, who is overdone in skull. Waverley Chief, second, has a good body, but coarse head. Red Bob, third, has more quality than the winners. Limit and open black dogs found the same dogs, with the addition of Black Domino, who must be dangerously near the weight limit. Any other color dogs were below the standard, and it looks as though a red dog of merit was next to impossible to produce. Parti-color dogs found Ch. Brae-

side Blue Jacket winning all the way in open and winners, and a handsome Cocker he is. Bitch puppies brought out nothing of especial merit. Novice, black-Lady Isabel, first, was a good selection for the place, a position she held all through her classes. Her head, eye, bone and body are all good. Second came Tuppence. whose head and eye are the sort we used to see in bygone days. Were she not out at elbows, few would rival her. Girlie, third, has quite a good head, and bone enough. Her fault is a rather long body. The reserve, Covedale Lassie, has a good head and body, but a light eye. Colored Girl, V.H.C., seemed a peg too low in the prize list. Any other color, novice-A real good one in Duchess won. Bo Peep, second, has a coarse skull, and should have given way to Knoydart Olga, a really good liver and white and a grand mover. Any other color, limit-Though getting up in years and gone in the mouth, Ottawa Nellie quite outclassed the others. Her head, eye, expression and body remind one of the days when there were some reds-alas! where are there any now? Miss Ruby, second, is of good, sound color, and is much above the average. San Toy is plain in head and eye. Lamit, particolor-This class brought out a lovely bitch in Selwonk Mignon. She is a good bitch all over, and easily won special for best Cocker in the show. It seemed as though we would have to look to old England to resuscitate our once famed Cockers, as unquestionably they are on the wane. There are altogether too many thick-skulls and light eyes being shown, and straight heavy bone with good feather are not qualities belonging to present day Cockers.

Collies.—These classes were judged by Dr. Henry Jarrett, of Chestnut Hill Farm, and to say they were judged well

would be analogous to "painting the lily." Canada now has some stock second to none, and we shall watch Mr. Cox's breeding operations with interest. The best dog was the recently imported Balmoral Baron. He owns a lovely head and ears, and good body, legs and feet. At present-having just come off shipboard -he is a bit light of coat and flesh. When in shape it will take a flyer to beat him. Coila Laird, second to him in puppies, is also a handsome tri-color, but marred by crooked forelegs. Novices found Donald in third place, a very showy dark sable and white, with lots of coat and frill. Apart from a bit too much brow, he is a really good specimen. Balmoral Duke, reserve, though his head might be described as being "long, clean," does not possess the head typical of the Collie, but rather the Wolfhound. Oh, that this fatal error might be stamped out by judges and breeders alike! In the open class for sable or sable and white, appeared a good, sound Collie, Logan's Earl. Bar a rather light eye, he will take some beating. The best of the bitches was Balmoral Beatrice (formerly Old Hall Beatrice). The last time I saw this lovely bitch was at an English show, where she had taken the measure of Moreton Hebe, Ormskirk Alexandria, Wellesbourne Fane, etc.-all champions. She was then exhibited by the Princess de Montglyon. It will suffice to say that she is a good one, and when in coat will make it interesting for aspirants of "best in show" specials. Mr. Cox, of

Ottawa, is the happy, or, I may say, plucky, possessor of this lovely bitch-a black, white and tan. Novice bitches found the winner in Donvale Minnie, who has a good head and ears, but light bone. Sunnyhurst Rose II., a rather nice one, but out of coat. Rosedale Vic, third, might well have occupied first place had she showed well. The remainder were quite out of form, except Lady Lu, a bitch who will always take some stopping. In closing, I may say that breeders must pay more attention to soundness, as erooked forelegs and straight hocks surely don't belong to a Collie, whose vocation in life demands plenty of liberty and ability to gallop over hill and dale.

Fox Terriers.-These classes were of especial interest, as they were judged by Mr. Walter S. Glynn, who came all the way from London, England, to give us his opinion. Mr. Glynn is quite the coolest judge yet imported. His painstaking, methodical manner must have pleased those inside the judge's ring as well as out of it. Though there may be many differences of opinion as to which dogs ought or ought not to have won, I am sure one and all must have felt that they were showing under a sportsman and a gentleman. Mr. Glynn, unlike many judges, did not consider length of head of paramount importance, but rather soundness, especially as regards to legs and feet. Smooths, puppy dogs-The first surprise that made the talent all look at one another, was the winner being found in a dog of the type of Warren

Deacon. It is true he has good bone, legs and feet, but his short neck and coarse head seemed to put him well behind aldon Tipster, second. This puppy is of genuine quality all over, but though a bit slack in body and open in feet, he seemed to hold the winner safe. Norfolk Brilliant, third, has a grand coat, but is light all over. Sabine Bandit, reserve, has bad feet and a light eye. Novices-Again Mr. Rutherford scored with Warren Voucher, who also captured the winners class. Though a dog with good legs and feet, his plain head and very bad condition, did not entitle him to championship honors, and he may be termed the lucky dog of the meeting. Limit-The winner, Norfolk All Blue, is a show dog all over, and apart from rather sluggish ear carriage and the lack of a close-fitting jacket, he is a hard one to beat. Warren Drastic, second, was lucky to beat the two Norfolks, Parader and Invader. The former in rather long coat and the latter a bit big, but both are of the highest class. A number of useful Terriers made up a meritorious exhibit.

Smooth bitches, puppies-Norfolk Busbody, first, is a nice one, but rather low in ear carriage, and strong in skull. Warren Ruby, second, is of nice style, but has a soft, open coat. Clifton Truelove was poorly shown, otherwise she must have won. Her good bone, legs and feet, close jacket and Terrier character are her possessions. Aldon Gossip, reserve, is of high quality, but her uneven mouth kept her back. Novices-Warren Daunt, first so charmed Mr. Glynn that he accorded her the Grand Challenge Cup for best in show. Certainly she is a workmanlike Terrier, with a good front, legs and feet and a body and coat to match. She is just a trifle strong in skull and heavy in ear. Norfolk Truest, second, has a grand coat and good legs and feet. She was shown much too fat-a failing this year with the Norfolk contingent. Limit-Sabine Beatrice managed to slip into second

place. A really good one, a bit long cast. After Truest came Sabine Lavender, lovely quality all through, only failing in loin and feet. Veterans again brought out that wonderful old matron, Norfolk Dame (Brockenhurst Dame). As the dam of Ch. True, etc., she will always be of interest to Fox Terrier breeders.

Wires,-These classes were ahead of the smooths both in quality and quantity, the very best being present. Eleven dog puppies faced Mr. Glynn, and it did not take long to find the winner in the Matchmaker puppy, Makeup. Miss Eadie has a Terrier with a long head, keen expression and a lovely neck, shoulders and front. His coat is of good hard texture. A rather enthusiastic stern carriage detracts from his appearance. Second, but not within striking distance of the winner, came Cairnsmuir Eve Opener, a goodcoated one, wrong at his pasterns. Cairnsmuir Bub, third, has a phenomenal head and keen expression. His bone would do justice to a Foxhound. A weak middle piece is his fault. The balance of the

Toronto's One Thousand Entry Dog Show.

A Success from Start to Finish, in Entries, in Management and in Attendance.

That was a notable entry that Toronto secured from all parts of Canada and the United States; 1,014 entries with 647 dogs beats anything heretofore benched in the Dominion, and stands well out as a Canadian record. Liberal management, attention to details and a low entry fee all helped to build up this grand total.

Dr. A. W. Bell, the new superintendent, proved just the right man for the position. Though possibly unknown to many dog men, to others he is a familiar figure, as he has for many years been assistant secretary of the Industrial Exhibition, and this year took the dog show into his particular care. He uses his brains more than his mouth, a good trait in a dog

show superintendent.

To Mr. Jno. G. Kent, the chairman of the Dog Show Committee, all interested are very greatly indebted. For weeks he gave practically his whote time to the show and its conduct, and as he is a busy man, this is no mean sacrifice. No effort was spared on his part to have every detail thoroughly looked after, and that he succeeded results amply proved. Other members of the committee worked long and well; again, others didn't. Mr. Gooderham, with his usual hospitality, entertained the judges and others to a recherche dinner that was creatly enjoyed. Writing of dinner, always a prominent question with John Bull and his whelps, what a wretched place the Toronto Fair grounds are to get anything to eat. Poor food, worse cooked, is the rule, and served as if to four-legged animals. It is a blot the management will do well to erase, and quickly. It was certainly worse this year than ever, caused, we presume, by the increased at-

The doo show "drew the crowd" as an attraction, on Monday alone about 13,000 passing through the turnstiles at 10e each. This is again a record-breaker, in fact the building on that day was uncomfortably crowded. The attendance on the first two days of the show was greater than the entire week last year, and there is also a nice balance accruing from the cat show held the previous week, and which was under the control of the same committee. Neat badges were used, instead of plain ribbons, cards being handed the winners in the ring. The card

feature is a failure; plain ribbon is far better, with badges later if thought well. Large numbers were used in the ring, denoting the number of the dog. This is a distinct advance. We think the press appreciated the inter-leaved catalogues and the plentiful supply of them. The aisles and benches were kept clean and sweet without overdoing the disinfectant. A spade and basket kept handy to each ring would about complete this equipment. "Spratts," of course, was the food used, as it always is here, and there is nothing better. We believe Mr. Kent has an idea on ice whereby for next year the water tins will be so fixed that the dogs cannot tip them over.

Mr. Lacy had the pleasant outside ring for his big doos, and so had Dr. Jarrett for the Collies, the judging of which, owing to rain, had to be deferred till Tuesday. Mr. Lacy's quarters upstairs were not so pleasant, as the light is none too good, owing to the erection of a ladies' room in charge of a matron and where light refreshments were served. Mr. Glynn gave the Terriers lots of time, and Mr. Lindsay got through his Trishmen in time to enjoy a ringside view of part of the other judges' work. Mr. Codman made short work of what he classed as "the worst lot of Bulldogs he ever saw together." However, he must not be too hard on us here; we are but creeping into the Bulldog fancy, and have made distinct advance each year for several years. He, however, was in love with the Black and Tans, which were hardly up to the usual Toronto entry, and stated any of the four bitches could win.

Mr. Payne spared no pains with the big Cocker classes, and he had some rummy classes amongst the reds, which ran all the way from midget to giant, and Mr. Mortimer in his usual methodical, careful way, worked through his big lot. We have never seen a prettier picture than Lewis, Senior and Junior, with the big team of grand English Setters they had in on the team prizes. The Foxhounds, too, were a splendid lot, and in numbers that are only seen here.

But we must stop. We think that everyone enjoyed the show, and if they didn't, it was their own fault. We shall not attempt to report all breeds this issue, but Dr. Ford has covered the three principal sections pretty fully.
