## NOTES AND COMMENTS

The report of the lamented death of Mr. S. E. Shirley, late president of the Kennel Club, London, England, is by this time probably no news to Gazette readers, having been made public through the weekly press. Dr. J. Sidney Turner, in the (English) Kennel Gazette for March, thus feelingly alludes to the sad event so unlooked for:

\* \* \*

The terribly sad and sudden death of the president of the Kennel Club, which occurred on Monday, the 7th inst., has cast a deep sense of unutterable sorrow over all who knew him as a friend or colleague, and a feeling of great loss to thousands who knew him only as a staunch supporter of all kinds of sport, especially that connected with those animals—dear to the heart of every Englishman and woman—the horse and the dog, for a truer sportsman, a keener judge, and a better example of what an English country gentleman should be could not be found.

To speak of Mr. Shirley in his connection with dogs would be to write a history of the past thirty-five years or more, when his guiding mind first conceived the idea of evolving law and order out of the nebulous chaos which then surrounded the exhibition of dogs. His personal influence enabled him to gather other workers around him, who were eventually to be the founders of the Kennel Club in the year 1873. The success which has attended this undertaking has been, and is, largely due to that tact, discretion and judgment which are so necessary to a leader of men. The extent of this work few—outside those who have been his co-workers—can realize. No measures for the alteration and improvement in the legislation of the club were ever proposed which did not receive his careful consideration, and no detail of management ever escaped his criticism. To his great experience, wisdom and foresight his colleagues owe many a debt of gratitude when difficult and delicate



questions had to be decided. That he lived to see the Kennel Club holding its present high position was, I know, a source of infinite gratification to him.

At field trials his place will be most difficult to fill, as he was one of the best judges of work done by Pointers and Setters, having assisted in a judicial capacity at many of these gatherings, both at his own demesne of Ettington and subsequently at Orwell Park, where Captain Pretymann has so hospitably entertained the club for many years past. He first judged in conjunction with Mr. J. H. Walsh and Mr. W. Lort in 1873—all three of these gentlemen now, alas! gone from us. His last appearance in the show ring, as a judge of dogs, was at the Kennel Club Show last October when he judged the flat-coated Retrievers, Bulldogs and Bull Terriers. He was an excellent judge of blood stock, and was to have officiated at the Agricultural Hall on the very day after his death so tragically occurred. As a racing man, his name headed the list of winners of flat races in Ireland last year. He was also an excellent shot, and was able to hold his own both at the Gun Club and Hurlingham.

Mr. Shirley had a seat in the House of Commons from 1868-1880, when he represented the County Monaghan. He was also a Justice of the Peace for Warwick, and also a J.P. and D.L. for County Monaghan. He had one of the finest libraries in England, which has descended to him from that great scholar and litterateur, his father. His collection of natural history specimens, including a fine collection of birds' eggs, amongst which he possessed no less than three specimens of those of the Great Auk, and his rare examples of hybrids of game birds are well known. He also possessed a supposed specimen of the Fox-dog hybrid, which was the subject of an article by the writer, published in the Kennel

Gazette of April, 1897, under the nom de plume of "Este."

Few men can boast of such ancient and noble lineage nor of such long and uninterrupted possession of a family seat, he being descended from Sewallis de Ettington of the time of Edward the Confessor, and his ancestors having resided at Ettington since the time of the Conquest.

To those of us, in the Kennel Club, who are left to mourn his loss his work is bequeathed! May we carry out this—so well begun by him—in the same spirit of truth and to the honor and welfare of all whose interests are concerned.

"Would but some winged Angel ere too late

Arrest the yet unfolded Roll of Fate,  
And make the stern Recorder otherwise  
En-register, or quite obliterate!"

"Ah Love! could you and I with Fate  
conspire

To grasp this sorry Scheme of Things  
entire,

Would not we shatter it to bits—and  
then

Remould it nearer to the Heart's desire!"

"Yon rising Moon that looks for us  
again—

How oft hereafter will she wax and  
wane,

How oft hereafter rising look for us  
Through this same Garden—and for one  
in vain!"

day, I have only three bitches in the kennels, two being for sale. I am looking forward to the Victoria show, which I see all my doggy friends are attending. Like most enthusiastic fanciers I think no one can attend to them so well as I can myself."

The summer show of the Ladies' Kennel Association of Massachusetts will be held at Braintree on June 3rd and 4th.

Gazette readers are doubtless aware that Winnipeg is to have a Dominion of Canada Exhibition this year, July 25th to August 6th, and that the Dominion Government is liberally helping the promoters. We want a dog show in connection, and the secretary of the C. K. C. wrote the manager, Mr. F. W. Heubach, urging him to give the matter consideration. Following is his reply under date of April 2nd:

"I am in receipt of your letter of the 28th ultimo with reference to holding a Dominion Dog Show in connection with the Exhibition in July. As you may be aware we have discontinued showing dogs at the fair for some few years, but I have forwarded your letter to the chairman of our Prize List Committee and will advise you in due course if anything is decided to be done in this matter. Up to the time of receiving your letter we had not considered the question of having a dog show."

There must be many breeders, those in the West particularly, who are deeply interested in the holding of a dog show at Winnipeg, not alone for this year, but permanently, and if each one would bring his influence to bear and write Mr. Heubach personally there would be a much

greater likelihood of the proposal being adopted. "Do it now!"

The Terra Cotta Kennels, of which Mr. John G. Kent, the well-known president of the Canadian Kennel Club, is owner, has just made a big sale of Russian Wolfhound bitches to the Valley Farm Kennels of Simsbury, Conn. The draft consists of Kama, Kolima, Kalamita, Kalupa and Kola, and they will be used in the brood kennel, Valley Farm having found an unprecedented demand for good puppies. Several of these bitches are in whelp.

Some radical change is necessary, too many good puppies are now shown once and then through some nervous disorder, distemper, or both, collapse. Too many cases are fatal.

the rules and Standard of the club, and request him to pay his annual dues. He shall notify officers and members of their election or appointment, and shall issue notice to members of all meetings. He shall keep a roll of the members of the club, with their addresses, and he shall be subject to the board of management. Every candidate must be duly proposed by a member, in writing, addressed to the secretary, and the name, profession and residence of the candidate shall be filed with the secretary, the latter to notify the board of management at least ten days before the balloting. Candidates for membership shall be voted for by the board of management. A majority vote of the board shall be necessary to elect. The club may be dissolved at any time, with the written consent of not less than two-thirds of the members for the time being. After payment of all the debts and liabilities of the club, its property and assets shall be divided equally among the members. The mem-

bers of the club shall hold its first annual meeting at Montreal during the spring show of the Montreal Canine Association, when the next place of meeting shall be decided on by a majority vote, and nine members shall be a quorum. ## Canadians at Buffalo Show.

After nearly two months of knocking about the country we meet pretty much the same lots of dogs, now weary and travel stained, that greeted us at New York. The "circuit," as we call it, is rapidly assuming the nature and semblance of a travelling circus. The same dogs, same judges, same managers go from show to show, and the awards are practically a foregone conclusion. The officials of so-called kennel clubs are, from lack of knowledge, powerless to give a successful show, hence some professional is engaged who sees that his "pets" are not forgotten. All this must eventually kill shows in America, for outsiders who are not millionaires have a small chance of gaining a prize with homebred specimens. There are plenty of men who have been successfully interested in dogs for years and independently capable to judge. The amateur, knowing that Judge So and So has officiated at one show after another, thinks twice before he spends his money to face almost certain defeat by dogs that have learnt to wag their tails when they, time after time, meet the same man in the capacity of judge. Many Canadians and others carried away a pleasant impression of the show, largely due to the courtesy of the superintendent, Mr. Loveland, who was agreeably free from an autocracy and omnipotence that surely don't belong to a man who is essentially the servant of the exhibitors. The place of superintendent is not an enviable one at the best, and it requires a man of tact

and evenness of temper to handle the thousand and one questions asked him. No matter who it was, Mr. Loveland always had a pleasant answer, and his kindness and thoughtfulness for exhibitors and their friends as well as visitors from a distance, made him many warm friends.

Canada supplied the Spaniel judge in the person of H. Parker Thomas, who drew the banner entry of the show and gave general satisfaction. A pleasant feature was the warm support Canadians gave their countryman. Mr. Clark showed a strong team. Lance Farewell, whom we spoke well of at New York, went through from puppies to winners. He would do with more substance. Quentien, the beautiful headed buff, won all that was asked of her. Mr. Charlesworth was out with eight entries and scored a first with a good bodied parti-color, Maid Marion. George Bell was on hand with a batch of four, but did not do as well as usual, though many thought Colored Girl badly treated with third. We were sorry to hear of the decease of Perfect Dream, the puppy that was destined to win many an honor. George Dunn came on from Woodstock with an entry of five, and was in the money in several classes. Mrs. Gammon won a third with a gay mover called Lady Dottie II., but not a patch on the first of that name. Mr. Calvin of Hamilton, won a reserve with Little Coquette, who is much too small. Mr. Haynes of Toronto, did well with Wilton Crescent, scoring a second and third. Quite a good Cocker this.

Another Hamiltonian made happy was Mr. Wm. P. Presnail, who won first limit and open with Sir Walter Scott, a good red well shown. Mr. Treblecock had an entry, but he was not to be found. All in all Canada supplied about all the prominent winners. Ch. Dainty Dot, winner of the special for best in show, originally hailed from Mr. Clark's kennel.

English Foxhounds had three good ones at least from Canada and made a veritable "killing." Mr. Williams' Belvoir Vulcan first; Messrs. Zamfield & Farmer's (Niagara Falls) Boaster second; Maple Leaf Kennel's Regulus third, tells the tale.

Pointers.—That plucky sportswoman, Mrs. Charles Waters, of St. Thomas, competing against many of the best American cracks, was a ribbon winner in every class with Lord Bang, Nellie, Canadian George and Jingo's Della. It is through the efforts of this lady that kennel affairs in St. Thomas are being put on a substantial basis. She certainly deserves the help and co-operation of all interested.

English Setters.—Mr. George Gooch, of Toronto, won the Novice class with Rock Surrey, the dog that did so well at Toronto show. Mr. R. J. Swanton, also of Toronto, came in for a second prize in the bitch puppy class with Flora M.

Irish Setters.—Another Torontonian was made happy by a blue ribbon, as

Mr. W. J. Wright's bitch puppy, Miss Elelio, scored.

Russian Wolfhounds.—As usual Mr. Kent added a victory or two to the already long list of prizes won by dogs from the Terra Cotta Kennels. Kubelik is keeping up his reputation as a sire. Narcissus, the beautiful bitch who has been winning firsts right through the circuit, was sired by Kubelik in England. He was then known as Michael Angelo.

Old English Sheepdogs.—Mr. Watts, Toronto, is holding a strong hand in this breed, and had five on view. The puppy, Sir Wallie Harkaway, had a great innings and is bound to do a lot of winning later on.

Collies.—Apart from half a dozen familiar faces the quality was poor. Winnetka Christopher, in better shape than at New York, won comfortably from Langham Tartan, a big, dark sable with a good head and ears. In bitches Winnetka Nell, a puppy with a rare sort of head and ears and a good coat, won all the way to winners. Rippowan's Revelation, second, is a high quality one with a great coat, but up go her ears when the "pinching" stops and the judging is over. Mr. Robert McEwen who, by the way, everyone was delighted to see again showing, had a nice puppy in Holyrood Dolly, the first good one of Wellesbourne Conqueror's get seen in the East. Mr. McEwen may be termed the "Dean of the Collie Fancy," as the early 80's

found McEwen & Gibson high in the prize lists of every important show.

**Smooth Fox Terriers.**—Mr. J. A. Caldwell, Jr., judged these classes in a most pleasing and satisfactory manner. Less than two hours was consumed in dispensing with both smooths and wires, and the decisions more accurate than though twice the time had been expended. The Sabine Kennels with their beautiful team won first in every class on merit. This is undoubtedly the strongest team ever put down in America, and represents the pick of many English kennels. Their handler, George Thomas, has made the extraordinary record of only having lost two firsts at all the winter shows. The runner-up was Mr. A. A. Macdonald, who is getting nearer the top of the ladder all the time and with dogs of his own breeding, has a dangerous rival to meet in Aldon Tipster, the black-headed son of the great St. Leger. It is wonderful how this dog keeps on improving. He may be safely classed in the first flight. The Warren Terriers came in for third honors and the Norfolk entries were kept at home. In wires Mr. Macdonald was again about when the ribbons were distributed and more homebred ones added glory to the "Aldon" prefix. Aldon Bencher and Aldon Brevity, puppies by Barkby Ben, are still in the rough, but scored two firsts and a second between them.

**Irish Terriers.**—Kerr Bros. did well with Rampant Rolf, who will always take some reckoning with.

**Black and Tan Terriers.**—Mr. McGaughey's team occupied their accustomed places at the head of affairs, supplying the winner in every class but novice, where Mr. J. S. Gordon, Toronto, supplied the winner with Reflector, and a good one he is. D. Carrier's good bitch Lady Faultless showed badly and was third.

**Airedale Terriers.**—The only entry from Canada was Mr. T. D. McGaw's Chestnut, second in puppies.

**Bull Terriers.**—Bayview Bo'swain, Mr. Fred T. Miller's well-known dog, was a good winner in the limit class. Mark O'Rourke got third in novice with Jimmy Britt. Mr. Thody, of St. Thomas, did likewise with Dimple, a neat bitch.

**Pomeranians.**—This breed is destined to have a boom amongst ladies in Canada with Mrs. Mark O'Rourke in Hamilton, and Mrs. A. A. Macdonald in Toronto, both actively interested; competition will be greatly enhanced. The former lady was a good winner here and in good company. Princess Carieta and Banner Girl are both good specimens.

Of the other Canadian exhibitors Mr. Carley of Hamilton blossomed out as a Bulldog exhibitor, winning a third with his useful looking bitch Hard Luck, a daughter of Shield's Rodney Stone, who is making a name as a sire. Mrs. McGaughey's well-known Dalmatian Bellefield Spot added another blue ribbon to his long list of wins. Mr. G. E. Dickens, Toronto, showed a smart little Toy black and tan, Leda, and won a second prize.

In the brief run over Canadian entries I trust I have left no one out.

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## Brantford Show a Great Success.

The members of the Brantford Kennel Club are congratulating themselves on the splendid success achieved at the show just closed, and so they may with the nice entry of 284, about double that of last year. More up-to-date management was clearly visible, though, of course, not perfect. The show was located in a store on the principal street right in the centre of the city and so the gate was exceptionally good, about five-hundred admissions being paid each day. But what else could be expected when the ladies lend their abilities and attractiveness to the working of the show. Mrs. Jno. Kerr was indefatigable in the office and Mrs. Fred Kerr practically did all the prior work and also made an efficient treasurer. 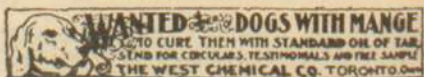
Mr. Geo. Bell's hostelry, the Woodbine, was headquarters for visiting dog owners, and they were many, and the show was graced with several lady visitors—Mrs. Waters, St. Thomas; Mrs. Gam-

mon, of Hamilton, and several local aspirants for blue ribbon honors. The dogs were benched on two flats, and quarters were, none too big, but this can't be helped, and so must, as the old adage says, be endured. The benching also is an item that will need the committee's attention, and we believe will get it before next show comes around. Dr. Babcock, Mr. Bowden, the Kerr brothers, Mr. Wilson and others whose names have escaped us were continuously on hand and lent efficient aid. Mr. Caldwell was called home from Buffalo, and so was unable to be present to judge his classes, which were very meagre. They were taken by Mr. Ed. Mack, of Toronto.

The Terra Cotta dogs were all absent, as were the Black and Tan Terriers entered.

The best of the St. Bernards was Lady Ormonde, an immense animal, very sound, good bone, active as a kitten, good skull, but a bit pinched in muzzle. She was shown thin, a condition that emphasizes her rather flat sides. This is a bitch that can win. Ivanhoe, an old friend, is typical in head, but undersized. Bruno is just a moderate dog with a mean head. Mr. Kenyon's Mastiff was alone, and added one more first to his list of wins.

But one greyhound present, a fair all round dog that might be longer in neck to advantage. Regulus, with his good legs and feet, deep chest and excellent body, had no difficulty in beating a very moderate lot of English Foxhounds. His head is plain, his worst fault. Gimerack was absent in American dogs, so the award went to Ringwood, rather nice in type, light in bone, and with a sour expression. In the bitch classes we had





something very different, four good ones turning up, litter sisters by Hank's Huntsman, ex Flossie. The winner was picked in Nancy Brant, a beautiful headed hound, grand front, nice bone. This is a bitch that can do some winning, as can the next one lower, Flossie Brant, that is a bit better in loin but is not so clean in skull. Lady Brant and Judy Brant, the latter thin and out of condition, are fairly beaten here as they at present stand.

Mrs. Waters had the winner in Pointer puppies, a very fair all round one, Canadian Jerry, that we understand leaves his native land for residence in the U. S. Highland Don's expression is spoiled by his turned-up nose, and Lord Bang, well known, had no difficulty in beating him; indeed, he was awarded the special for the best Pointer over his kennel mate, Nelly Jingo, though not as clean in shoulder as the bitch, whose eye is on the light side. Jane Kent, the winner in novice and limit bitches, is a nicely built Pointer on good lines. Lily White, that we wrote so highly of last year, was absent, as was Lady Bess. Mrs. Waters is open for congratulations on taking both winners' prizes. The Irish Setters are well-known faces, and were good, though we looked for a bigger entry here. Tipperary Young Larry and Nora Shannon won out. The Harriers are too big, and Mr. Burns' brace of Beagles win decisively in body and head. Waldmann won over Windycroft Rex in Dachshunde, and here gained his championship and a C. K. C. cup. Rex is a neat little red, low to the ground, good in body and tail, but weak in face and with small feet. The one Dalmatian could do with more size and color. The Cocker entry was certainly the feature of the show, and a lot of good stuff was present. Puppy dogs, any color, had six in which Lucky Droon, a neat black,

fair head, nice style, good body, none too good in front, took first place. Buff is a nice little Cocker, as is Speculator, rather light in bone, good body, straight front; Cub is rather coarse in head, poor front, good body and front with lots of bone. Little Pick won out with ease, a grand headed black, nice cobby body, good neck, not hunched right into his shoulders, the best of shoulders, good loin and spring of rib all that could be desired. The opinion of the judge, Mr. George Bell, is that this is the best black Cocker dog seen for years. To crown all, he is of nice size. Climax is a useful dog with a good head, a little out at elbows, and a bit long cast. Little Wonder II. is somewhat plain in head with a lightish eye, good front, long cast. Union Jack is well known, nice style, light in bone. Romany Rye II. is nice all round, beautiful front, neck and shoulders, grand head, but he is a bit too high up.

Mrs. Gammon accounted for first and second in limit blacks with Lady Helena and May F., and was a big winner in other classes, including special for largest entry in Cockers. The winning red bitch, Bell, is a grand-headed one, nice dark eye, good muzzle, sound color, all out of coat, a bitch that will take some beating. Miss Busybody is a very fair black and white, as is Queen of Snows, good in body. Bonnie Bell is rather heavy in head, otherwise nice type, good front, nice body. Doris Pickpania is a black and tan with very few faults.

There were a few good Collies, the rest very moderate. Elwyn Victor won out with some to spare, a bigish dog with a lot of coat, good head and nicely carried ears. Huntingdon Chief is quite a nice Collie. Otterburn Captain carries lots of coat, neat head of moderate length. Ingrow Ruff is a slashing black and tan, long lean head, but is unfortunate in the carriage of one ear, and was shown out of coat. Where length of head is needed he should be able to put it on. Ingrow Gem is a sweet Collie, nice head, good front, well carried ears, plenty of coat of good texture, but there is hardly enough of her. Hartington Countess a very fair one, with plenty of coat, but looking rough. Condition told against several in these classes.

Bulldogs made a surprisingly good entry for a show of this size; they gain in favor here. Calcanian is a plain, leggy dog that was fortunate in being alone. Shields' Rodney Stone, well known, was in good fit. Hard Luck is a bitch with much quality, sound, good body, face well broken up, nice tail, wide front, carries one ear badly, a credit to her daddy, Shields' Rodney Stone. Rose is fairly beaten in front and head. Radnor Minnie is a roomy bitch with many

good qualities, and won out on shape, head and bone. Mr. Carley's French Bull is grand in body, nice head, but does not get her ears up. Carcliffe Trouble, as she is named, won the special for best Bull or French Bull.

The Terrier entry was disappointing and does not say much for the drawing qualities of a "specialist judge." Mr. Mack, who took them in Mr. Caldwell's absence, had an easy task, and acquitted himself well. But four Bull Terriers. To exhibitors of dogs at the Universal Exposition of 1904: The undersigned committee, on behalf of American dog fanciers who contemplate making exhibits at the Universal Exposition of 1904, have completed extremely satisfactory and advantageous arrangements with the Department of Live Stock of the World's Fair, whereby the committee is to receive, bench, feed, care for, exhibit and return to their owners at the close of the kennel show the dogs exhibited at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, November 8 to 11, 1904, inclusive.

The committee has arranged for standard-size benching and cages for the dogs, and will provide at the Exposition grounds an ample supply of all requirements. The committee will also provide feed and water for all the dogs on exhibition and the necessary utensils for the same and furnish all needed attendants.

The committee for all the necessary accommodations other than the buildings, including cages, furniture and all services in connection with the receipt, feed, care, exhibition and return of dogs, such as are usually provided for at like exhibitions, agree to accept from exhibitors in full for first-class service and atten-

tion two dollars and fifty cents for each dog or puppy exhibited. (Note—Not entry.—Ed.)

The committee will provide for the best sanitary arrangements and the proper care and feed of the dogs during the show, which will be held under the immediate personal supervision of competent attendants of dogs and recognized authorities in such matters.

The committee will use due diligence for the care and safety of all dogs exhibited. Watchmen will be kept on duty day and night; but it must be distinctly understood by all exhibitors that the management will not be responsible for loss or damage to any dog exhibited, whether the result of accident or other cause.

The Kennel Show of the Universal Exposition of 1904 has been planned on the most advanced and satisfactory lines for the promotion of the special interests of the breeders of pure-bred dogs and has received pledges of the cordial and hearty support of the kennel clubs of this and foreign countries.

The international character of the Universal Exposition Kennel Show and the necessity for the due recognition of the registration of dogs from all countries recorded in the home and foreign stud books has made it necessary and



desirable that the World's Fair Kennel Show be held under the Exposition's own code of rules, which meets all the requirements necessary to insure competent and just awards and the best care of exhibits and is fully approved by the presidents of home and foreign kennel clubs.

It has been decided that inasmuch as the World's Fair Kennel Club is universal in character and is to be held under rules approved by the officers of the kennel clubs of this and foreign countries we will favor the proposition that the wins at the Universal Exposition of 1904 shall be published in the home and foreign kennel club stud books.

In estimating the cost necessary for the benching, feeding, care and other expenses at the show this committee have made a most careful estimate based upon the number of probable entries as indicated in correspondence with dog owners conducted by the exposition management and through other channels. While it is not thought the sum named will more than equal expenses, yet if any surplus should result this committee will apply the same for additional testimonial prizes to be awarded to the exhibitors winning prizes at the show.

#### IMPORTATION OF FOXHOUNDS.

Among the interesting passengers who arrived at Boston on the Leyland Line steamship *Lancastrian* from London, the last day of March, were twenty-two Foxhounds, coming from a well-known English kennel to the Middelsex Hunt Club at South Lincoln, Mass. They landed in

prime condition, having stood a somewhat disagreeable voyage without serious accidents.

All the dogs are well bred and full grown. They booked their passage under the names Vandyke, Dealer, Vanguard, Seaman, Prompter, Rubicon, Romulus, Shiner, Trinket, Worthless, Streamlet, Harmony, Drugget, Balance, Salvia, Value, Fickle, Gilagree, Varnish, Fealty, Needful and Warble. During the voyage the hounds were kept in a large pen where they had considerable liberty and were exercised about the ship by Captain Wood and the crew. One of the dogs, who the crew dubbed "Timber-toes" because of his abnormally large feet, showed himself particularly acute on the scent, and a game of hide-and-seek in which he played the principal part, became the most popular shipboard amusement. One of the other hounds was led about the deck by a circuitous route, and concealed in the chart room; then "Old Timber-toes" would be released, and after snuffing the deck a moment would find the scent and follow it perfectly till he came to the chart room door, where he would turn his face skyward and let out a cry that rivalled the *Lancastrian's* syren in effectiveness.

The dogs came off the ship in great good humor. They were put into a wagon with crated top and sides, and with heads and noses thrust through the openings between the slats began their long ride to South Lincoln, there to become Americanized hunters.

## NOTES FOR NOVICES.

Compared with the teeth of other animals, such as cattle or horses, it will be seen that the teeth of a dog are altogether different in form and appearance, and have obviously been made for an entirely different purpose. There is only one important difference between the way in which a cat and a dog deal with their food, and

that is in regard to their claws. The cat uses her claws to seize hold of food; the dog does not. At least, only to some little extent, as will be seen when a Terrier is dealing with a rat. The seizing is done by the jaws, and the feet are only brought into play, as it were, by way of support. On the other hand, if you watch a cat seize a mouse, you will observe that she seizes him with her claws. In spite of this difference, however, the teeth of both dog and cat are closely similar. It will be seen, however, that the teeth of a cat are better formed for purposes of mastication than those of a dog.

A cat always gnaws or masticates her food to some extent before swallowing it, but the habit of the dog is not to masticate the food at all, excepting so far as is necessary to divide up the large pieces, which he is unable to swallow whole. The disposition is to bolt food;

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such use as he makes of his teeth is mainly for the purpose of pulling food apart, and of reducing its bulk in point of size. He does not, however, do anything in the nature of mastication. Now this is perfectly natural, and as all of us know from experience, dogs will gobble up their food rapidly, and then go to sleep and digest it. For this reason a dog should be fed in a manner as closely resembling what nature intended for him as possible. Constant feeding of dogs on scraps and household dainties will ruin the constitution, and wreck the digestive power as soon as anything. If a dog's digestive organs are to be kept in good order, they must have their proper work to do. Otherwise, like machinery which is allowed to lie idle, they will, as it were, rust and become incapable of performing the duties for which they were originally intended. A dog never suffers from indigestion from having what we understand by indigestible foods given to him. What will give a dog indigestion is to give him food which is too easy of digestion, and so fail to make the demand upon his digestive organs to which they are capable of responding.

The teething troubles of puppies are a frequent source of difficulty to the amateur, and we may take advantage of the present opportunity to write a few lines on this topic, which is of interest to all those who have any puppies to rear. It is usually about the fourth month that troubles arise and then puppies are liable to have fits. These fits are due to constitutional disorders, and are practically very similar to the convulsions children are liable to at teething time. If a puppy shows signs of a fit at about this age, it is desirable to make sure, first of all, whether the fit is due to the cutting of the permanent teeth or whether it may be brought about by the presence of worms. Puppies, as we know, are almost

always subject to worms, and it is important that the owner should be quite certain that they are free from these. If they have been dosed with vermifuges, and there is not much doubt but that they are free from these pests, then it may be concluded that the trouble is caused by something connected with the teeth, and an examination should be made, so that if there be any inflammation about the gums relief can be given by judicious lancing, and then the animal can have a little alterative medicine, when, no doubt, there will not be any further difficulty. It is usually only in cases of an overfed, pampered puppy that teething fits are to be feared; when the puppy is perfectly healthy, and has plenty of outdoor exercise, there is not much cause for anxiety on this account.

As is stated in the preceding paragraphs, worms are very often a source of fits in puppies, and it is most desirable that all puppies should be treated for worms from time to time. This does not necessarily involve giving actual vermifuges of a strong nature; all that is required is that the puppies shall have a little laxative medicine, which will tend to keep the internal organs free from these pests. The reason why so many puppies die of worms is that they are allowed to get into such a state of congestion from the rapid development of these pests that there is little or no chance for them to recover. Directly a mild dose of worm medicine is given to a puppy in this state, it causes such a disturbance of the parasites that the animal has a fit of spasms and frequently dies straight off. Preventive measures with puppies are very desirable, therefore, and for this purpose we generally recommend an occasional mild powder, composed of jalap, or jalap and sulphur, combined with a little sugar, or other simple diluent which can be obtained from any pharmaceutical chemist, of suitable

strength for a particular animal. The administration of an occasional dose of this nature will have the double effect of indicating the presence of worms, by causing the expulsion of some, and at the same time will, of course, lessen their number, and preventing them from causing the congestion which is so frequently seen in the intestines of puppies that have died as the result of fits brought on by the presence of worms. If a puppy appears to be badly infested, of course it must be dosed, and the best and safest worm medicine for puppies undoubtedly is powdered arecanut. A dose of this should be given first thing in the morning, followed after an interval of half an hour by a dose of castor oil. The dose should be repeated at intervals of a week or ten days, until it is obvious that the animal has been freed entirely from its unwelcome visitors.

The treatment of lung complaints in dogs is a subject upon which we are very frequently asked questions, and it may be worth while to point out that, when a dog has any difficulty of breathing or catarrhal trouble, or a cough, or anything pointing to a derangement of the breathing organs, it is always a wise precaution in the first instance to take the animal's temperature, by means of a clinical thermometer, so as to ascertain whether any degree of fever is present. Clinical thermometers, specially marked for canine use, are regularly advertised in the col-

umns of this journal; they cost a very small sum, and there can be no mistake as to their usefulness, so every dog owner ought to have one. The reason why the temperature should be taken straight away when a dog shows any signs of trouble with his breathing organs is in order that the owner may be forewarned in case there should be any inflammation of the lungs or pleurisy (which differs from inflammation of the lungs, inasmuch as it is inflammation of the lining membrane of the lungs—not of the lung substance itself). There are a good many more cases of inflammation of the lungs nowadays than there used to be, probably because the race of dogs is more delicate, or, perhaps, we ought to say, more susceptible to that trouble than was formerly the case. This applies to some breeds rather more than to others—in particular to those breeds which have been bred for exhibition points more than for sporting purposes. Inbreeding, as it is called, tends to lower the constitutional vitality, and to predispose dogs to attacks of disease of various kinds—tuberculous and other. Of course, if a dog's temperature is normal, then there is nothing to be feared, but if it is high, the warning need not be in vain.

A simple cough without any fever or complications can best be dealt with by the use of a simple electuary, prepared by adding a hundred grains of powdered chlorate of potash and two drachms of



powdered decorticated liquorice root to one ounce of honey. An electuary of this type can easily be smeared on the back of the tongue. The dose can be varied from about as much as would lie on a sixpence for a little Toy, to a deserts spoonful for a Great Dane, and it should be administered several times a day. This electuary, or a mixture composed of equal parts of glycerine and oxymel of squills, with a few drops of chlorodyne added, will answer very well in ordinary cases of cough or sore throat; but there are some cases of cough which are really stomachic in their origin, and may be brought about by the presence of worms, or by dyspepsia. Such cases as these are easily distinguished, because the dog has a good many of the symptoms of distemper — unpleasant breath, disposition to sickness, etc. It is not of any use to give ordinary cough medicines in such a case as this. What the dog wants is stomachic treatment. A podophyllin pill will do good in a great many cases, by exciting the liver to activity. In other cases, compound rhubarb pills often have an excellent effect. The dog should be dieted and be well exercised in order to effect as much as possible without the intervention of medicine, which a dog is always better without if in that way he can be brought up to a normal state of health. Many people make the mistake of giving their dogs medicine when they would be far better without it; in fact, some dogs are physicked by their owners to such an extent that they become like human beings who are constantly taking "patent" medicines, whose constitutions become so accustomed to these nostrums that the time arrives when nothing short of a dose that would half kill an elephant would make any impression upon them. —Our Dogs.

#### TALKS TO DOG OWNERS.

##### Feeding Dogs.

The subject of feeding dogs is one upon which a very great deal might be written, but when all is said and done with the whole question resolves itself into one thing—namely, common-sense, tempered by economy. The latter qualification is essential, for if an individual entertains any idea of trying to make his kennel pay him it stands to reason that the item of expenditure

My Dear Sir,—I have again been asked by the Board of Directors of the Canadian National Exhibition to take the chairmanship of the Bench Show Committee, and now take this opportunity of thanking you for your entries as out last shown, which, owing to the generous support given it by so many



is an important one to consider. On the other hands, if common-sense is introduced into the matter, he will recognize that in the first place dogs of different varieties must require different feeding, and that even in the case of animals of the same breed a great deal must depend upon the lives they are leading. For instance, a dog which is being hard worked should be given more nourishing food than the animal which is getting very little in the way of exercise, for if the former is underfed he becomes weak and light, whilst the latter should be over-indulged is liable to break out in sores through surfeit, and will certainly get too fat to be healthy. Speaking generally, dogs kept in the house are overfed; and the same is very often the case where there is only one animal kept out of doors, especially if his feeding is not entrusted to some particular member of the family, and that a sensible one. In the cases of both these dogs there is a risk of their getting all the scraps from the table and the kitchen refuse to pick over, with the result that they select only the richest and most unwholesome morsels, and suffer accordingly.

#### The Value of Farinaceous Food.

As a general rule, the diet of all dogs should consist mainly of farinaceous foods, the best of which are biscuits and oatmeal. The latter is an acquired taste after they have become accustomed to enjoying more tasty fare; and besides this, it is, by comparison with other meals, costly; whilst, finally, until they become used to it, it causes some dogs to become very loose in their bowels, and the blood of others to become so heated that they break out into sores. At the same time oatmeal is an excellent food for the stronger breeds, and they soon become accustomed to it and relish it amazingly, if it is boiled up with the broth of bullocks' or sheeps' heads, with some of the meat added to the porridge. With regard to biscuits, there is a great deal that could be said on both sides, for if of the best quality they are excellent, but if they are manufactured of poor materials they are not only non-nutritious, but positively injurious to the dogs which eat them. The owner must therefore exercise some discretion in his purchases of biscuits; but assuming that he does so he will obtain

a very excellent material for the staple food of his kennel and one which possesses the advantage of being able to be served either soaked in broth, or dry if broken up. One occasionally hears it said that a dog will not eat biscuits; if so, the advice that should be given is leave him alone to come to his senses, for it must always be remembered that a dog is far too fond of his stomach to starve himself, whilst, on the other hand, a fast now and then will do many an animal an immensity of good. If sound ship's biscuits can be procured, they are very good for dogs, and so is bread, but both of these should be mixed up with broth and a little meat to make them tasty, and some green boiled vegetables ought to be added likewise.

#### Flesh as Food.

All dogs are fond of meat, and beyond a doubt a certain quantity of sound flesh should be given them, especially if they are in work. Indeed so widely recognized is this fact, that some biscuits contain meat in considerable proportions in order to spare dog owners the necessity for constantly purchasing and cooking flesh. Perhaps the best means that can be taken to provide a kennel of moderate-sized dogs with meat is to arrange with a butcher for a regular supply of bullocks' or sheeps' heads, and the broth from these will be found most useful for steeping the biscuits or boiling the meal in. Persons residing in the country very often procure flesh upon very reasonable terms, and when it is given dogs it is best to serve it cooked. An occasional feed of raw meat, provided always that it is sound and lean, is strongly recommended, even for small dogs and animals of delicate constitutions, but it cannot be too strongly urged upon owners that they must avoid the carcasses of animals which have died of disease. Sound horseflesh is very good indeed if procurable, and it is a kind of food which of a necessity must be a great deal used in kennels of large dogs, as boiled up with meal it is not only most nutritious, but far more economical than biscuits are for animals of gross appetites.
