There were several nice ones in St. Bernards, the puppy class for rough dogs having Lady Thelma, a moderate-headed one, first, over Agawa Rex, by no means grand in head or in hind parts. Novice had a big, fine dog, with a very poor face, first, without competition, and in limit Alta Kennels scored an easy win with a very promising young dog that needs time to furnish. His condition was not of the best, but when in shape he should prove a hard dog to beat. Colonel Steele was second, a long way behind the winner. In American-bred, as well as in novice for bitches, Alta Kennels scored again with Miss Waldorf, an undersized one, that won comfortably over the first prize puppy. Limit had the symmetrical Queen Regent first over Lady Prudence, good in head properties, with the exception of being badly undershot. Lack of condition did not help her body and quarters any, and her feet are not of the approved sort. Lady Watford, just a fair one, was third, with the third in puppies reserve. And this was the order in the open. Queen Flora, a nice-headed one, with coat to spare, was the only smooth entered.

Two Bloodhounds were shown by C. H. Hall & Son, the bitch scoring many points in head and winning comfortably.

Newfoundlands were common, as usual, all lacking in head properties and generally in size and bone and feet as well. Nigger was easily the best, with his kennel mate, Lady Lee, second.

Two Great Danes, with Mr. Dalrymple's brindle first, over a somewhat better headed blue, that lacked in size and hind parts as well.

English Foxhounds had several nice ones supplied by the Montreal and To-

ronto Hunts. First one and then the other showed a good one, but the pick of the lot was Governess, on the small side, but properly put together, on excellent legs and feet, and with a nice quality head and keen expression. Tuncful is larger, but not so good in body or in quarters as the winner, albeit of better size. It is noteworthy that the Montreal Hunt won first in all of the classes for dogs, while the Toronto Hunt scored in all the classes for the opposite sex. Governess, with more size, would be hard to beat in any company.

In Poodles, The Rascal won for Eberhart Kennels, followed by Nig, whose coat especially is in poor shape. Nelowska, just a fair bitch, was alone in her class. All would be outclassed in Red Brook or Meadowmere company, so their owners had better get to work if they intend showing over the bridge.

Dalmatians had the old failing—black ears—but they were quite above the average in body markings, in body, in head and in legs and feet. Mrs. R. J. McGaughey supplied the limit and open class winners, as well as the first and reserve in the class that counts.

Beagles were fair, as was also the entry of 35, and none of the large United States kennels represented. Ranger B., first in puppies, may be heard from again, and so may Mr. T. D. McGaw's Twilight, that was second. The winner held his class safe in head properties, but Twilight gained some in quarters. Daily News did well for Miss Anna B. Lewis, and so did Florian for Mr. W. I. Hutchinson.

Dachshunds had a dozen entries, but quality was not conspicuous. The second in open would have been first but for lack of soundness in front.

In Pugs, Mrs. F. H. Curry showed a nice one in May Queen, that excelled in condition as well as in other points, and

easily disposed of the Eberhart exhibits, whose condition was not what it ought to have been.

The best formed Italian was a parti-color, and the second best had lost several joints of its tail, consequently King Solomon just managed to win. Prick-ears and shallow chests were very conspicuous.

Banner Sapho was the best of the Pomeranians, a daughter of Hatcham Nip. There were six entries.

Toy Spaniels were a very poor lot, as usual, at Toronto.

The first in Yorkshires, Oakland Tip, had a very easy time of it, as had also the winning Toy Black and Tan, Leda. —Man's Best Friend.

#### WHAT MR. LACEY SAYS OF HIS CLASSES AT TORONTO.

In American Foxhounds the Gimcrack blood was to the fore, Foxy Quiller showing poorly, for at Newport the week after he held himself much better, Ch. H. Gimcrack 4th is a well set up hound all over, but smacks somewhat of English. Carmen had a great go with Merry Girl, an old winner up here.

Bulldogs showed up well so far as entries went, but outside of one or two there was nothing that would do to disturb the money in the States. Toreador was the factor in the dogs, and showed up in nice form, a good honest bulldog that has no very striking features nor any striking fault; a sort of dog you feel like having for your own. Mr. Nelles seems to have forsaken the Spaniels and gone into the short faced brigade. He showed a recent importation in Master Chinasol, a good up-faced dog with a button ear. W. Excelsior is a good headed dog with lots of jowl, but buttons an ear, and is not so good in body as the winner. Mr. Gamey is rather on the leg, but a sporty sort. Wake-

field Rose having a shorter face than Royal May, won in the Canadian-bred class. A very nice comfortable sort of looking white bitch, Miss Cherubim, won in the bitch classes all through and was the best of Mrs. Cartwright's team; while not a flyer, there is lots of good about her, and she should breed something nice. Money Spinner is weak in face, but a neat sort. Hard Luck is well named, but the same owner's Carliffe Trouble belied its name by scoring for the French Bulldog, the only entry. A whitish one, rather long in back.

The Bull Terriers were a strong suit, in fact, the best lot ever gathered in Canada, so the locals say. A very nice puppy came out in Epsom Wonder, a good-topped one that is loose in feet and front yet; long, clean, wedge head with a capital small eye, correctly placed. He should go on. The novice winner, Le Prince, is a big dog with a good body

and front, could be improved before eye, which is well placed; somehow he lacks just a bit of character in head, but is well formed enough behind that; a good puppy was second, losing only in body, and a good marked son of Ch. Crystal was third. There was little to choose in this lot. Open dogs was a warm class when E. Steady could do no better than three letters. Edgewood Ideal, well built all round, for her size; and E. Jean III. had all they could do to beat the local Vesta Tilley.

Crystal Milligan is quite a well built chap with a head that should suit the wedge shape fellows all right. Marguerite of Navarre was in better shape than her kennel mate, Talma; both handsome bitches. Vesta Tilley is a bitch that has a lot of character about her, and so had Molly from the head back.

The Boston Terriers, while excellent

in numbers for a Toronto show, were but fair in quality. Mr. McBride showed his smart pup that he brought out at Rochester, and it has come on very well if it would flatten in skull some more. He was beaten by the maturity and better head and style of his townsman, Young Spider, that also won the special for the best dog. Frank F. Dole showed a nice dog in Stubbs that did not show well enough, down behind. A very smart little bitch he had, rather generous in tail, was easily the best of her sex.

**COLLIES, SHEEP DOGS, WIRE  
HAired FOX TERRIERS  
AT TORONTO.**

The collection of Collies that faced me, while numerically strong, were, with a few exceptions, woefully lacking in quality. What becomes of the produce of all the high-class Collies we have in Canada is a mystery to me. That there are good Collies about that never find their way on to a show bench there can be no question. On my way to the show the day of the judging I saw two Collies running at large that, had they been shown, would have been well up in the money. To dwell upon the dogs shown, I am sorry to say that the present day craze for "long, lean heads" has resulted in equally long, lean bodies, with bad legs and feet to match. In several instances it was necessary to withhold prizes, pricked ears being a common disqualifying point of the puppies. The best was Dominion Duke, a handsomely colored sable and white, with a rather good head and ears, but poor legs and feet. In novice dogs, Mr. James Watson introduced a taking young tri-color in Redhill's Clinker. His head, ears, legs and feet are all good, but he is shallow in body and narrow chested. His coat and outline are of the best.

Bridge End Hope has a rather nice head and ears, but fails in forelegs. Balmoral Clinker, fairly good head and ears, but too light in build and lacks bone. Lord Quex, reserve, has a long head and fair outline, and will look better when in coat. His bad forelegs are a common fault nowadays. Ben Bolt, V.H.C., has a good coat, body, legs and feet, but fails in head. The class for sable or sable and white dogs brought out Shrubland Count, a Collie much above the average. His length of head, eye and ears are really first-class, and elsewhere he is much above the average. He well deserved his blue ribbons, and only went down before Redhill's Clinker and the crack Ch. Balmoral Baron. The latter, though not in bloom, scored well over R. Clinker in body and head, and was awarded a special he has often won since he made his debut here a year ago, namely, special for best Collie in the show.

Bitches.—Col. Robt. McEwen, who has so long been identified with Collies, we are glad to see going from puppies to winners with a really good specimen. Holyrood Rose owns a sweet head, ears and expression, and only needs size to fit her for keen competition. In color she is a light sable and white. After her came the Chicago brace, Ravenswood I Will and R. Show Me. Both of these puppies are by Ch. Heacham Galopin, and possess quality. Unfortunately they were dead out of coat. Of the "any other color" lot, the best by long odds was Lady Lee, and a good bitch she always is. With a flatter skull few would equal her. Coila Kimmer shows quality, but lacks substance. The remainder were mostly penalized for being out of coat. Old Joe Perfection, in fine fettle, easily accounted for the veterans' class. I wish to thank the exhibitors for the sportsmanlike spirit they showed in



the ring, and to also thank the gentlemen who acted as ring stewards, and enabled me to get through the judging rapidly.

#### Old English Sheep Dogs.

Thanks to Mr. Harry Watts, there was a handsome exhibit of these quaint and useful dogs. Edward Rex, the novice winner, has a well-finished head and good outlook and coat. He might be better behind. Sally Harkaway, second, looks the good brood bitch she is. Open class brought out the famous English Champion Wilberforce, in beautiful form. He had a worthy combatant in Sir Wallie Harkaway, shown in faultless condition.

#### Wire Haired Fox Terriers.

It is too bad that such an old and distinguished fancier as Mr. Maxwell, who owned the sire of the immortal Meersbrook Bristles, should have had such an inferior lot, with a few exceptions, to pass judgment upon. Wires appear to be on the down grade in Canada, in spite of men like Mr. Fraser and Mr. Macdonald doing everything in their power to keep up the standard. The winning dog puppy, Cashier, a son of Bank Note, has a good front, head and ears. His back would serve as a clothes line, and his stern is low set. Board of Trade and Oxspring Blacksmith are quite unfinished, and are not likely to figure in future prize lists. Mr. George Laidlaw's Bexley Pinto is rather plain in head, but his body, coat, legs and feet are quite above the average. Cashier was second. Sapperton Tripolio, good head, coat and front; this Terrier might have won, but he was dirty and out of condition. Limit brought out Warren Remus, a bad shower. He owns a long, lean head and good ears, bone and front. However, he is light and shelly in build, and just fair in coat. Haymaker, second, a son of Matchmaker, has lots of good about him and was in

beautiful form. Sapperton Tripolio came third. Open dogs—It was Champion Matchmaker all the way to winners. Age does not seem to mar his beautiful head, neck and expression, and he puts all the younger generation to shame at showing to advantage. Warren Remus was second and Haymaker third. The Canadian class was an enigma, and doubtless poor light and mixed numbers caused the placing of Free Tip first, Haymaker second, Sapperton Tripolio third, the Bexley Pinto reserve. Reading the other way would have remedied matters.

Bitches—Very light classes, the best of which was Donington Vixen, good neck, shoulders, legs and feet, and a hard coat. Flax, a useful brood bitch, was shown too fat. Firelight shows lots of quality and good breeding. The remainder were very ordinary for a Toronto show.

thousands more people. The dogs had a better appreciation of what was expected of them, and put the sheep through the barriers in record time. As was anticipated by the judge, Colonel McEwen, the decision of the first day was reversed, and the championship cup and first prize was awarded to Bob, the sable and white Collie owned by W. Burns of Toronto. The best time made at the first trial was 17½ minutes by Cairnsmuir Jack, owned by Mr. G. M. Carnochan of Riverdale-on-Hudson, N.Y., but the previous day this dog did the work in four minutes.

He has a genuine Scottish herdsman in John Cummings, who attributed the defeat of his dog to the unusual conditions attending the competition. He had been accustomed to working in an open field with his dog behind him, in which manner such contests are regulated in Scotland. He could not understand why he did not win the cup, after securing first prize on the previous day, and making the best time yesterday, but the judge held that he did too much of the work. His sheep worked admirably, going through the barriers and over the bridge without a hitch and the only trouble he had was getting them into the pen.

Burns' dog Bob, however, had trouble at the first hurdle, one aged sheep facing the dog and refusing to move. After passing this, however, the sheep worked well and were penned beautifully in 4½ minutes. He was awarded the championship as time counts for only a small proportion of the points, and his dog had done all the work.

In the bitches class the first prize was awarded to Fan, owned by Herbert Harris of Green River, Pickering township. Ravenswood I Will, the Chicago bitch, was started, but as her handler had had charge of her only for a week, she was

withdrawn after it was seen that she would not work well.

The trials were a decided success, and the officials contemplate holding them next year in front of the grand stand if the necessary arrangements can be made.

As the winning dog is a son of the great Woodmanstern Conrad, one of the best producing sires Canada has ever seen and a frequent winner on the bench, Mr. Reeve, Conrad's owner is laughing in his sleeve at the assertions so frequently made that the modern type of show Collie "has no sense." Bob's win certainly seems to refute such a stigma.

#### TORONTO NOTES.

The Pointer classes filled nicely and some improvement was visible in quality over the past few years. Devonshire Maxim, that came out at Montreal last spring was again placed over Lord Bang, both old friends, and Ch. Marks Rush was ahead of these Canadian owned, winning in type and head particularly. Queen Flo was the winner in bitches, followed by Nellie's Jingo.

Spot Melrose was the surprise in English Setters, a dog that had hardly had a brush placed on him prior to a day or two before the show and shown by one whoscarcely expected the dog to go from novice to winners. He seemed to fill the judge's eye despite a slight rise in back.

Bracken Aleck is a handsome Setter, very dark in color, which is not attractive; good feet and legs and excellent body. Miss Lewis' trio of bitches were one, two, three, with Mallwyd Di to the front, a beautiful type of show Setter that crowned her record here by winning special for best of any breed shown in the ring by a lady.

The Irish Setters we have seen frequently before, or rather the best of them. In the bitch classes Mr. Mason



made several reversals in Ottawa the following week. St. Elvan and Young Larry in dogs, winners and reserve, and Nora Shannon and Red Bess II. are all well known.

THE A.K.C. AND MONTREAL.  
FROM REPORT OF QUARTERLY  
MEETING.

The Secretary: The Montreal Canine Association held its last show under Canadian Club rules, during which time it was a member of the American Kennel Club, and at the last meeting of this club, held in May, they were given an opportunity to explain their position, and here is the explanation under date of June 3rd, which I will read.

(Letter not embodied in report.)

Mr. Muss-Arnolt: While I know perfectly well that the statements made there are correct, I do not see how they can ask us to help them to straddle two horses at once—being members of our club, and holding shows under another club's rules. I do not think they have any right to ask us to show any sentiment in the matter. Our rules are strict and open in every respect. Nobody would claim that we could be small enough to permit a member to slap us in the face and hold a show under other rules. I know those gentlemen who plead for clemency are our friends, but that we cannot help. We have got to act according to our rules. We would be placed in a very funny position if we permitted a matter of this kind to pass without notice or action.

Mr. Moore: I would like to ask if our rules are mandatory in regard to the punishment of clubs holding shows under other rules than our own?

The Chairman: No, we do not say anything about that. It is assumed that they would only hold shows under our rules.

Mr. Codman: Any club can hold a show, and it is not necessary that it should be held under American Kennel Club rules.

Mr. Moore: It seems to me that we should not antagonize people or clubs or dog interests unnecessarily, and while I think our rules should be enforced to the fullest extent, I believe that a certain amount of consideration should be shown to the dog world, and if these men—these friends of ours in the Montreal Canine Association—lost control of that club for one meeting, I do not think we should take summary action against them and disqualify all those officers and members. It would seem to me proper to direct the secretary to reprimand them and caution them against any repetition of the offense, and then if next year they should hold a show under our rules, it would be time for summary action. I think that the American Kennel Club desires as many friends as it can possibly get, and that it does not want to antagonize anybody unnecessarily.

The Chairman: There is this to be said: I know these gentlemen personally, and I know that they are loyal members of the American Kennel Club. They undoubtedly stood by the American Kennel Club very loyally, and they had great pressure brought to bear against them a couple of years ago to hold a show under Canadian Club rules, but they held out against that pressure and joined the American Kennel Club and they held the Montreal show under our rules for two succeeding years. I fully agree with the statement that we want to treat all our members in the dog world as fairly as possible, but on the other hand there was nothing to compel them to serve as officers of or hold shows under Canadian Kennel Club rules. If they had lost control they could have resigned. I do not think we should be very

severe in this case because it is a new situation.

Mr. Moore: It has been suggested that a fine might be imposed, but it seems to me if these officers of the club are of the right sort, a reprimand coming from this club would carry much more weight than a fine of \$25, which practically would give them the privilege of committing the same offence under penalty of another fine.

The Chairman: You want to consider another thing and that is whether or not we are going to allow our members to belong to the Western Kennel League or to the Canadian Kennel Club and continue membership in the American Kennel Club. That is what is being done; they are still members of the Canadian Kennel Club to-day. I am not expressing an opinion. I merely made the suggestion because I thought it would be well to have the subject considered in all of its branches, for I think it is apt to be a precedent for something that might happen at any moment.

Mr. Muss-Arnolt: Some of the gentlemen here feel that we should be lenient in this matter, but I do not. However, I will bow to the wishes of the majority. I move that we merely drop them. Motion seconded.

The Secretary: The facts in connection with this matter are these. I saw a statement in the Canadian Kennel Gazette that the Montreal Canine Association was going to hold its coming show under Canadian Kennel rules. Of my own volition I wrote to the secretary of the Montreal Club asking if the statement in the Canadian Kennel Gazette was true. He replied that it was; that they were going to hold their next show under Canadian Kennel Club rules. I then reported to the May meeting of this club. There were no charges preferred against them. A motion was made

to give the Montreal Canine Association an opportunity to explain why they held their show under Canadian Kennel Club rules during the time they were members of the American Kennel Club, and here is their explanation. (We are not giving in the official stenographic report the reason advanced by the Montreal people).

Mr. Cutler: It seems to me that this discussion is getting away from the real issue. We do not care what individuals there are in Canada. We may have a number of friends there, but as the chair said a moment ago, it is only clubs that we deal with. This club, as a club, as it seems to me, infringed this Article 9 of our Constitution, namely, did something which is detrimental to the best interests of the American Kennel Club—held a show under the rules of our competitor, and as a club we must deal with them, especially in view of the fact that a majority of their members voted to do this after being warned by our proper officer, and it seems to me that we clearly stultify ourselves if we do not live up to our own rules. I do not think that the fact that some of its members, and its most influential members are friends of ours ought to weigh in this question. The club must be disqualified. If they want to form a new club, they will have that opportunity.

Mr. Moore: Does that carry a disqualification of all the officers of the club and the members?

The Chairman: Not in my opinion.

Mr. Caldwell: It only deals with the club.

Mr. Muss-Arnolt: Then why isn't this the easiest way out of it, and I repeat my motion, that we drop them.

Mr. Dale: Just a word for information. Dropping the club or expelling it, what does that carry with it? It does not make any difference whether those



individual members are members of the American Kennel Club or not?

The Chairman: No. These members remain in good standing if they happen to be associate members here or delegate

If you wanted to go further you would have to expel them as individuals. This is a club as an organization, because the club as a body alone has membership here. Motion carried.

## Ottawa Dog Show—500 Entries and a Success.

Ottawa show is peculiar to itself in that it is simply a dog show run by a few enthusiastic dog owners and lovers for people of that ilk. There are no side shows, just a plain dog show. What can be done by an organization of this kind was plainly exemplified here, where with practically no previous effort to get exhibitors to show, and little but honor to win, an entry of practically five hundred was received. Why cannot other Canadian cities and towns take Biblical advice and "do likewise"?

The building is none too good, and was filled to its utmost capacity with the dogs present. The benching was home-made, but served its purpose. Mr. Mason, who took all breeds, got through his regular classes quickly, but the many specials consumed a good deal of time, especially those that were not confined to one breed, but had to cover many, and in some cases all classes.

Mr. Aird, as secretary, and Mr. Armstrong, who should have been in bed, and, indeed, went to the hospital at the close of the show, worked like Trojans, and were assisted by a committee, the majority of whom are not above "taking a hand in" at any work that was for the show's welfare. The gate was good, and the club made some money, something more pretentious affairs do not always, or indeed often, do.

The St. Bernards, of which there were three, all happened to be ladies, and Messrs. Stuart's Lady Watford was an easy winner. Crash repeated his Toronto win in Mastiffs, and there were no Newfoundlands. Pete is a very fair

Dane as we have them, and beats those below him in cleanness of neck and head and size. The bitch winner is also not at all a bad one, has best head in class. Beauty shows type, but is mean in muzzle. Terra Cotta Kennels' Kubelik was alone in Russian Wolfhound dogs, and we never saw him looking better. In addition to his wins in open and winners, he attained the honored position of best in show, a place that, if our memory serves us right, he almost won in 1902 under the same judge, being reserve then to the wire Fox Terrier, Matchmaker. Defender won with ease in Greyhound class for open dogs, and his kennel mate, Kitty Grey, in that for bitches. The latter was for the special adjudged the better of the two. We believe both winners in Italian Greyhounds were sold to go West. Belvoir Vulcan, that we have seen before, was the best of the English Foxhounds, Fairfax Bud, also an old friend, being ditto in the Yankees, where Ch. Hanks Gimcrack went down to third, Don, a nicely put up hound, dividing these two. In Pointers, Devonshire Maxim was again to the front, with Lord Bang second, and Mrs. Waters was also unfortunate in bitches, where Flight beat the well-known Ch. Nellie Jingo. Nothing any use in English Setters, but the Irish were better, where St. Elvan won in dogs, but was beaten for the special in eye and head by Radiant Star, that also beat St. Lambert's Molly, third open, and Ch. St. Lambert's Kathleen, second. Nora Shannon, who won at Toronto, was reserve to these. Molly in condition can

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win again. Five Irish Water Spaniels is an unusual number for a show this size, just a moderate lot, as were the Fields. There were some heartburnings in Cockers, where several reversals of the Toronto awards were made, Johnny beating the well-known Lance Farewell, and Maude winning over the equally as well-known Lady Isabel, Venice, a bitch of unknown breeding, being also placed above the Toronto entry. Balmoral Rex, a very taking dog with grand fore face, but heavy in brow, was the winning Collie dog, and that sweet Collie, Balmoral Jessie, the best bitch. The Jog beat the bitch for the special, and handily. Sir Wallie Harkaway was alone in Bobtails, looking well, and Bellefield Spot in color and type won out in Dalmatians, of which breed there were no less than eight. In Bulldogs it was Ben Jordan, Bichester Envoy and Mr. Gamey, we thought a bit hard on the latter, and in bitches Mrs. Cartwright's Royal May won with ease, and as readily beat her kennel mate of the sterner sex. We look for good Bull Terriers in Ottawa, and are never disappointed in them. winning. Bayview Bo'swain, that went the rounds last spring, was next to him, and nine-year-old Epsom Candidate third. Another of Mr. Walter's, Epsom Jean II., was best bitch, and again another, Epsom Sally, reserve winners. Lucky Baldwin's big and staring eye and bowed leg did not suit Mr. Mason, and good dog as he is, he had to give place to his own daughter, Colne Nut Brown Maiden, who beats him easily in these two points, is of nice size, and was put down fit to win. Lord Nelson was the best Boston, though he hadn't much to beat, several entered being absent. Not much in Beagles, and in Dachshunds Windycroft Rex was alone. There was little of merit in Fox Terriers, and least in smooths. Barney isn't a bad puppy, very fair head and good coat. Sapper-ton Tripolio, if shown in half decent condition, would look far better, rather good foreface, but long in body and a bit overdone in ear. Donington Vixen, very much of a Terrier, beat him with ease when the special came on. The Irish were poor. Brynhir Barber, far best in muzzle, beat Heather Jock in Scotties. The latter has one Dachshund leg, and was hairless in parts, though he shows character.

We wonder what other city in America could show three teams of Black and Tans, and all good ones. Ch. Selwank



Imperial won out in dogs and also took all in sight for the best dog or bitch, and was reserve to Kubelik for best of any breed in show. Nothing could stop the wild Irishman once he got going, and his win, with black and tan team, consisting of Imperial, S. Pearl, Wellesbourne and Duchess of Cornwall, was a popular one. Mr. Walters' Bull Terriers giving him the hardest rub. Of the Black and Tan teams he certainly had the levellest lot. Mr. McLean's were not in their usual condition, and some wanted hair and "vim," and while Mr. Montgomery had the bitch winner and several other "credits," he had two small ones and two larger Terriers in, and old Ch. Daisy did not help his chances. Some surprise was expressed at the sweet little bitch Topsy winning out in bitches, but if not barred out for weight, why shouldn't she? Mr. Mason liked her two years ago, and placed her over No Trouble, that took the reserve. Some of the old timers say we are getting the B. and T.'s too big and too high off the ground. A division of the classes by weight, if advisable, might settle all contention. 'Tisn't the big good ones that are so extremely hard to get. Half a dozen Skyes, with the Montrealers well to the fore, the Toronto Bedlington, and a very decent Welsh bitch, completed the Terrier classes. The four Pugs a very moderate lot. Mrs. O'Rourke's good little Pom, that won for best shown, etc., by a lady, and the Yorkshire Tiny comprised the Toys, always woefully weak in Canada. Kubelik was best sporting dog, a decision that was questioned by some. We can't see why, as surely a Wolfhound is a sporting dog. If it is desired to confine such a special to Pointers, Setters and Foxhounds, the prize list should so state.

#### COMMON DISEASES.

The ills that dogs are heir to are unfortunately for themselves and their owners, very many, but there is comfort in the reflection that a great number of them are not necessary evils, but rather the result of improper feeding and over-coddling. It would be obviously impossible to attempt upon issuing a series of instructions regarding the treatment

of all canine diseases within the scope of this series of talks; but remembering the old adage that prevention is better than cure, and being profoundly impressed by the truth of the saying, we are tempted to offer a few general hints upon the prevention of disease.

#### Distemper.

Commencing with the commonest and one of the most dreaded of all canine maladies, the opinion may be most confidently expressed that dogs suffer more severely from it than they need, simply because their constitutions have been undermined by injudicious treatment. In the old days, distemper was not the scourge it has become, and yet the leading breeders did not bestow the absurd attentions on their animals which has become the fashion. Such absurdities as stoves in kennels were unheard of luxuries, but the dogs were well bedded, wholesomely fed, and usually given a fair amount of healthy exercise. Fresh air never killed anything but the most delicate or unhealthy animal, on the contrary, it is directly conducive to robustness of health, and the hardier a dog is bred, the less likely he is to suffer severely from distempers. On the other hand, a dog that has been reared in a stuffy kennel is far more liable to contract the disease, especially if any of his companions are sickening of it, as distemper *malgre* the opinions of some professional men, is both infectious and contagious.

In treating a dog for distemper, no matter what remedies are used, it is most desirable that fresh air should reach the patient, and what a trial this must be to an animal that has been brought up like a hot-house plant, and has been accustomed to a stove in his kennel. The admission of fresh air, however, does not necessitate a draught, which is always a bad thing, even for the healthiest man or beast, and an even tempera-

ture of about 60 degrees should be maintained as far as possible by night and day. Clothing may be worn, of course, and the dog should be comfortably bedded; in fact, everything that is possible should be done to ensure his comfort, for distemper is especially a disease that is amenable to nursing. A most important thing, too, is to spare no effort to keep up the strength of the patient, for if the dog with a severe attack of distemper on him once begins to lose ground, it will be a very difficult matter to get him on his legs again, and recovery is doubly slow. Solid foods should be avoided, but the stronger the slops are the better, and for the purpose there is nothing to equal good beef tea, with which he should be drenched if his appetite fails him, or he becomes too weak to partake of it in the ordinary manner. In bad cases an egg beaten up in port wine or a little brandy may be administered with beneficial results at intervals, but no matter how desperate the case may appear to be, hope should never be abandoned, as the most marvellous recoveries have been known. When convalescent some fresh haddock's heads, or other fresh fish, may be simmered down gently over a fire until all the bones have become absorbed and soft, and the jelly which forms when the mass can be given the patient with most satisfactory results.

The strictest attention, moreover, should be paid to cleanliness, and all the soiled bedding and sawdust on the floor should be removed and a fresh supply substituted as soon as possible, whilst the shed or room in which the dog is kept should be frequently disinfected. In selecting a disinfectant every precaution should be taken to ensure a reliable and effective one being selected; and it must be remembered that to be effective a disinfectant need not neces-

sarily emit the abominable odor which some absolutely worthless compounds possess. It is desirable, too, that the invalid's bed should be made up on the floor, on boards for choice, with a liberal supply of straw over them, as if great weakness supervenes he will not be able to get upon his bench, and perhaps may have to lie upon the cold floor all night with probably fatal results.

It may be repeated that an even temperature of about 60 deg. should be maintained in the distemper hospital, and to ensure this of a night, or in cold weather, it may be necessary to have a fire, or a gas or oil stove in the apartment. In such cases every precaution against fire should be taken, the fireplace or stove being securely wired off, and the bed removed from it as far as possible, so long as the dog is not compelled to lie in a draught, which would probably kill him.

Certain common superstitions prevail on the subject of distemper amongst those uninitiated in the mysteries of doggy lore. One of these is that every dog must have distemper; a second is that a dog cannot have it twice in his life; a third being that any young animals are liable to it, and that, therefore, an adult is certain to escape the disease. All these are fallacies pure and simple, though there are reasonable grounds for an owner hoping that his dog will not suffer from a second attack after having had one, just as in the case of the human race when a child has had scarlet fever. Moreover, an old dog is not so likely to contract the disease as a puppy is, but experience has

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proved that in both instances it is possible that they may.

One further general reference to distemper may be made, and that deals with the question of preventative measures, which take the form of inoculation performed upon puppies in order to secure them immunity from the disease, or a mitigation of an attack in the hereafter. Masters of Foxhounds have been particularly assiduous in their efforts to ensure satisfactory results from the experiments that have been made, but, it is to be feared, without much success. It is not an uncommon proceeding, however, on the part of some owners of large kennels to place all their young dogs, when they reach a certain age, in the infected kennel, so that they may all contract distemper, and thereby reduce the chances of their giving trouble in the hereafter, after they have been reared to maturity. This need not be regarded as proving the allegiance of the owners in question to the theory that all dogs must suffer from the disease once and once only, but rather shows, as there are not many dogs which have distemper twice, that the owners desire to be over the suspense as soon as possible.

#### NOTES FOR NOVICES.

In rearing puppies—particularly those belonging to the larger breeds, such as Great Danes and Deerhounds, and to some extent Retrievers and Collies, but most of all the very large breeds, like the Great Dane—beginners are apt to make the mistake of feeding such puppies on foods which go to make flesh, rather than to make bone; and this is how it is that so many of these animals grow up to be, if not actually rickety, unshapely in their limbs. Perfect limb development depends mainly upon three

considerations. There must first of all be good parentage (for it is useless to expect to breed a large, sound-limbed dog from poor parents). Then there must be food of the right kind, and thirdly, there must be ample exercise in the open air. If a dog is to grow strong and straight in bone, he must be fed on bone-forming foods; and amongst these, there is nothing better than a diet of lean meat and oatmeal—a little bone meal can, of course, be added always when soft food is given, and this will help to build up and strengthen the frame. Lime water is sometimes recommended in cases where there is a distinct tendency to rickets—but this ought only to be given sparingly, or it may cause difficulty in other ways. One cause of puppies becoming rickety is that they are reared, or attempted to be reared, by a delicate parent. A bitch very often is expected to rear more puppies than she is capable of rearing, and very much depends often upon the provision of one or more foster mothers. Where there is a big litter of puppies of one of the large breeds, it is often an advantage to have one or more foster mothers, and distribute the pups, so that each one gets an ample supply of milk. There is nothing like nature's food as long as it can be supplied, for milk contains all the ingredients required for the building up of the frame of a puppy during the early stages of its existence. Then after weaning time, consideration must be had to the provision of suitable foods of the kind described above, and the same thought must be kept in mind until they are actually fully developed; for until a puppy has become a full grown dog there is a possibility of improving the structure of the limbs by a plentiful supply of nitrogenous or frame forming food, aided by plenty of health-

ful open air exercise. There is another point that deserves to be mentioned in the same connection, and it is this: that on no account should close breeding—that is, breeding between parents closely related to each other—be allowed where size and strength of limb are desired. The tendency of inbreeding, as it is called, is always in the direction of reducing size, lessening strength, and consequently producing an inferior type of animal. There is not much need to point out these things to anyone who has had experience, but the novice will do well to bear them carefully in mind. Many beginners in the fancy are attracted by the larger breeds, which may appear at first sight to need comparatively little consideration, as they are popularly supposed to be very hardy, and so forth. Success, however, is, if anything, more difficult to attain with them than it is with the medium-sized breeds. It may be said that there is more trouble with the very large breeds and the very small breeds than there is with those of medium size.

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One of the most frequent symptoms of feverishness in dogs is an enlargement of the third eyelid, or, as it is sometimes termed, the haw. The third eyelid is the membrane which expands over the ball of the eye, and its use, of course, is to cleanse the eye ball from small particles of dust or other foreign matter which may have lodged there. When it is fully expanded, the dog presents the appearance of having gone blind; but this is not really the case, and a little careful treatment, even with cold water, or with some simple eye lotion, such as is usually made with sulphate of zinc, than being of an astringent nature, will effect a cure. Why this third eye-lid should become enlarged when a dog is feverish is not quite clear,

but it is probably due to the disordered condition of the nervous system generally, and it very frequently occurs, of course, during distemper. Sometimes the first symptoms of distemper are obvious feverishness, shown by the animal being very thirsty, and by a bloodshot appearance of the eyes, which is almost invariably followed by the enlargement of this under, or third, eye-lid. We frequently meet people who think that their dog has gone blind, and we have even known some cases in which foolish attempts have been made to interfere with the expanded haw. It is needless to say that any interference of this kind is highly dangerous, and any ignorant person who professes to know how to deal with a case of this kind should be prevented from any such rash enterprise as "removing" the inflamed part. Of course there are cases from time to time of cataract, but these are confined to very old animals, and are due to entirely different causes, although, like the enlargement of the haw, cataract may develop as the result of an accident. An accident, however, such as a scratch or the effect of a spark, would immediately cause the enlargement of the third eyelid, whereas a case of cataract would be of slow and gradual development. No doubt a competent oculist would be the best authority on a matter of this kind, and he is the man to consult in the event of any opacity being noticed which is obviously of a permanent nature and interferes with the animal's sight. Otherwise, occasional opacity caused by the enlargement of the third eye-lid is a temporary matter, and under the lotion treatment referred to will usually disappear when the irritating cause, be it distemper or what, has previously disappeared. In distemper, it may be remarked, there is always a tendency to



the enlargement, which can be materially reduced by constant attention to the eyes, with a view to preventing the upper and lower eye-lid from sticking together, as they do in many cases, unless they are sponged several times a day. Milk and water is very good for this purpose, as the small quantity of oily matter in the milk serves the purpose of an ointment, and prevents this sticking together to some extent, besides soothing the inflammation that is present.

Now and again we come across a case of sore throat in dogs. The most natural cause of this is, of course, excessive barking, particularly when the animal is suffering from cold or exposure. The hoarseness will then appear, just as it would in the case of a human being. Dogs which are given to excessive barking ought to be cured of that by being thoroughly tired out with exercise. The dog that does so much barking is usually the dog which is kept tied up in a yard, and is never allowed to exercise himself sufficiently. This animal naturally becomes the midnight howler, which is a source of nuisance to everybody in the neighborhood, and is the cause of any amount of ill-feeling and difficulty between neighbor and neighbor. The dog which is allowed to run about all day or for the greater part of the day, instead of being kept in this unnatural condition of restriction, rarely gives trouble at night, and more rarely still inflames his own throat by excessive barking. But apart from these cases of sore throat, brought about by barking and by cold, it very often occurs that a dog suffering from distemper has a sore throat, which needs treatment, and as a dog cannot be got to gargle his throat, it is necessary to have recourse to some form of medi-

cament which will have the effect of clearing and cooling the throat, whilst at the same time it must be a medicament which can readily be given. There is nothing better than what is known as an electuary—a medicated paste that is sweet and pleasant to the taste, which the dog will lick out of a spoon, or which can be placed on the back of the tongue, and will melt quickly, so that it cannot be swallowed, so to speak, in a lump. The basis of electuaries, of which there are a good many kinds known to chemists, is honey or a mixture of honey and treacle, and the following formula is a good one for husky throat: Take of honey 2 oz., treacle 1 oz., chlorate of potassium in fine powder 1 oz., and powdered liquorice sufficient to make a soft paste. Mix all these ingredients together, so as to make a smooth product, and of this from half to two teaspoonfuls may be given (according to the breed and size of the dog), morning and night. External applications, such as hartshorn and oil or turpentine liniment, or any good embrocation of a similar nature, can also be used, if necessary, externally, and the dog should be allowed to drink something of a mucilaginous nature, such as barley water or barley water and milk, which will have a soothing effect upon the back of the mouth.

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
