"A letter from Mr. Mortimer to-day draws our attention to a paragraph in the kennel press regarding the allotment of the Fox Terrier classes at Toronto this coming show, in which the writer draws attention to the fact that while excellent judges are always obtainable on this side of the water, judicial experts of the calibre of Mr. Harding Cox seldom visit us. Mr. Mortimer in taking a similar view writes to the committee suggesting that the Fox Terrier classes be added to those breeds already assigned Mr. Harding Cox, which after some thought the committee have decided to adopt, feeling confident that Mr. Mortimer's long experience in the management of shows throughout this country, makes his opinion valuable. Another change will be that at the request of Mr. H. B. Hungerford, O. E. S. dogs will be assigned to Mr. Mortimer. Many breeders who have brindle Bull Terriers wishing to demonstrate to the kennel public that their dogs are as docile as other breeds, have asked the committee to provide a class for them, which they have agreed to, making it open dogs and bitches, with same prize money as other classes."



Dear Sir,—Yours of the 14th inst. received and contents appreciated. The reason I did not reply to Mr. Donovan was that his letter did not contain anything which called for an answer. I did not see anything in it which applied to the questions asked, and the main reason was that I was waiting for your reply.

I am still of the opinion that this matter was hastily disposed of, and that it really belongs to the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club, and not to one of its paid officials. This is a more serious matter to the Montreal Collie fanciers than might be imagined. My aim in entering this protest was not so much for the sake of a bronze medal as for the principle of fair play which, from all accounts, seems a hard thing to get.

It seems a hard thing to believe that a business man who wins an event such as Mr. Roy won at the Boston show, would overlook it in making his entries (who are advertised to have amounted to some \$44). Supposing that he did, he had plenty of time to acknowledge his mistake before the show closed. His intentions could not have been so generous, when he allowed his cards to

remain posted, and if both he and the Montreal Canine Association had been anxious to see justice done, I would have been publicly credited with the wins. By referring to your marked catalogue, you may yet see (unless it has been changed since in your possession) that the disqualified dog is credited with reserve winner as best novice in the show.

I may add that I am promised the support of many of the leading fanciers in my efforts to get this ventilated through the proper channel, or otherwise if need be.

duet of kennel matters on the Coast under C. K. C. rules. Our committee met at once, and after due consideration drew up the enclosed memorandum of suggestions, and forwarded a copy to the clubs in Vancouver, New Westminster and Nanaimo, asking them to approve and to make any alterations and additions that they might consider wise. These resolutions were adopted as enclosed by the Vancouver Kennel Club at the recent annual meeting, and the committee has approved them on behalf of the Victoria City Kennel Club. So far I have not heard from either Nanaimo or New Westminster, but as we are anxious to have this matter taken up at your annual meeting, to be held, I understand, early in August, have decided to forward these suggestions from Vancouver and Victoria.

The other clubs are evidently not very active just now, but I have no doubt that if an Advisory Board is granted they will elect their delegates in due time. It is difficult to get people on the Coast to work all at once—distances are great and most of the work is done by those who have but little time at their disposal, and it is often hard to get them.

These suggestions will give you a very fair idea of what is wanted out here, and I trust the matter will be disposed of at your forthcoming meeting. I may say that the advisability of asking for certain concessions to Coast fanciers in

the way of recognition of previous wins, etc., was discussed by our committee, but the Vancouver Club has suggested that this matter be left for the consideration of the Advisory Board, if granted. Therefore, only the recommendations as to Advisory Board are being forwarded.

If there is anything further that you desire to know in this connection, I shall be pleased to serve you. Yours very truly,

Suggestions submitted to the Executive of the Canadian Kennel Club in Toronto, relative to the government of kennel matters on the Pacific Coast under Canadian Kennel Club rules:

1. That a Pacific Advisory Board be established.

2. That the Advisory Board have full discretionary powers to deal with protests, disqualifications, suspensions, etc. To receive and approve of premium lists and catalogues of clubs on the Coast giving shows under C. K. C. rules.

3. That the Advisory Board be made up of delegates, one from each show-giving club on the Coast, and of a vice-president of the C. K. C. resident in British Columbia, the latter to be the chairman of the Board and to have the casting vote in case of a tie.

4. That these delegates be elected annually from each club at a general meeting.

5. That the Advisory Board have the

practical management of kennel matters on the Coast, subject to Canadian Kennel Club rules, i.e., that any question regarding kennel interests on the Coast shall be submitted to the Pacific Advisory Board and dealt with by them, subject to the approval of the Executive of the C. K. C. in Toronto.

6. That the Advisory Board have power to grant dates for the holding of shows on the Coast.

7. That the Advisory Board shall meet at least twice in each year and that due notice of such meetings be given to all clubs. Also that in case the elected delegates from any club is unable to attend such meeting or meetings that such club have power to name some special delegates to represent it at such particular meeting.

8. That a full report of the proceedings had at all meetings of the Pacific Advisory Board be sent immediately after each meeting to the Canadian Kennel Club at Toronto.

135 Dogs at Calgary Show.

Mr. James Cole, of Kansas City, was the judge at Calgary, a C. K. C. show for the first time. One hundred and thirty-five dogs were benched, mostly local. An exhibitor says "there were a few people to be put right, and he was the man to do it."

The Alberta Kennel Club's show was held in Calgary, Northwest Territory, Canada, July 5, 6 and 7, in connection with the Calgary Agricultural and Industrial Fair. Calgary is situated in a beautiful spot south of the Bow River and west of the Elbow. These rivers are swift running streams with a ridge of hills skirting them which makes it a very attractive spot. The surroundings of this city seem to be a great ranch and cattle country.

The officers of the club are: President, W. H. Heald, Calgary; vice-presidents, A. R. Scoble, of Edmonton; Joseph Hicks, of Macleod; G. B. Borrodaile, of Medicine Hat; secretary and treasurer, Chas. Rodden, Calgary. These gentlemen all are among the best business men of the community.

The show was held in Victoria Park, which is Calgary's fair grounds, and quite near the city. The dogs benched numbered about one hundred and twenty and the quality in most cases was not of the best, still for a new country there were to be found among them some good specimens.

Too much praise cannot be given Mr. Rodden, the secretary, Mr. Adams and Dr. H. P. Walker, who took an active interest in the work and did all in their power to help the show along.

In St. Bernards (rough, dogs), Ceazer, first, is a young dog, rather small but

of very good type, with a good head. Chief, second, is a larger dog with plain head and partly clipped. St. Bernards (rough, bitches), Duchess Mable, first, alone, is of much quality.

Russian Wolfhounds.—Cyer, first, is a good specimen, but not of good color.

In Greyhounds, Don, first, is a white dog, well muzzled and looks like a runner. Paddy second, is much like first and might be a brother, being white. Victor, third, is a nice blue, but without the muzzle of the winner. In bitches, Vash, first, alone, of very good quality.

Scotch Deerhounds had Jack, alone, a good, strong dog with a hard coat, and looks like a killer. Neil, alone in bitches, is a good strong one of great size.

English Foxhounds, dogs, had Ringwood, a rattling good hound, one which can hold his own anywhere in keen competition.

Pointers.—Shot, first, is a very good dog, good enough to show anywhere. Sheriff, second, is a nice black and white dog and, outside of his being a little short in muzzle, is a good one. Joe, third, is a black and white dog, very much like the second prize winner. These were three good Pointers shown out of condition. Dina, first in bitches, is a nice liver and white with considerable Pointer quality, but was shown too fat. Flossie, second, is on the small side, with a nice lead. Gip, third, is not an extra one, but in condition would show better.

English Setters, dogs, had a class of ten and not a good one in the lot. It was very difficult for the judge to place them. In bitches there were three and they should all have been in the same class with the dogs. The first prize win-

ner, Belvidere Sport, is of some quality but was out of condition.

Irish Setters.—Rory, first, is a dog of nice color, but not right in head. Garry, second, is very short of coat and rather small. Nellie, first, a nice bitch, shown very fat.

Gordon Setters.—Dogs had Gip, first, a big dog, not good in head but otherwise fair. Heather Queen, first, a very good bitch, shown too fat.

English Retrievers (Wavy coated).—Shot, first, is a very good dog, showing age, otherwise very hard to criticize. Sweep, second, is a good big one, not quite straight in front. Berry, second in bitches, is a good one, rather small; also showing age.

Cocker Spaniels.—Dogs had nine entries. Nigger III., first, is a nice bodied dog, nice in coat, not straight in front. Nigger II., second, is not as good in body or head as the winner. Koko, third, a dog of nice size but not near so good in coat as the first and second winners.

Irish Water Spaniels.—Dogs had three shown. Duke, first, only a fair specimen. The other two prizes were withheld.

Collies (rough).—Puppies had seven entries. Donald, first, is a nice, large one, with a nice coat, too thick in skull for his age. Glenogle Tartan, second, also a large one, bad in eye and expression but a good sound Collie. Glendenning, third, is much smaller than the winner and with bad ears. Dogs had sixteen entries. Holyrood Conquest, first, was away the best of the lot; in fact, was in a class by himself, but was not in good condition. When in condition he is good enough to show anywhere. Onward, second, is a nice-sized Collie, good

in coat, nice markings, his only fault being a shortness of muzzle. Nethernall Laddie, third, very thick in skull, otherwise a good Collie. In bitches, Sosie Spoons, first, has a beautiful head and expression, but is too low on her legs and not racy enough. Scottish Queen, second, is a fair one, not good in head and is undersize. Floss, third, is a very good-bodied bitch but deficient in head.

Smooth-coated Collie bitches.—Lassie, a rather poor specimen, with a little more coat would be a rough.

Bulldogs (dogs and bitches).—First, King Edward, is a fair young dog, quite young; with age might develop into a good one. Lady Eleanor, second, a large bitch, long in body and face.

Bull Terriers (dogs and bitches).—Sackville Baroness, first, is a nice-bodied dog, uncropped. Sackville Bo'swain, second, is a good-headed dog, but crooked in front. Nellie, third, a fair bitch, uncropped.

Fox Terriers were a poor lot and outside of Venom, the smooth bitch winner, and a wire dog, Punch, the rest were an inferior crowd.

Irish Terriers were a mixed-up lot, there not being a good one shown.

Old English Sheepdogs had one dog and bitch, the dog the better of the two.

Miscellaneous class had Pekinese Spaniel, Floss, first, a nice little bitch; second, a Pug dog, Patsy, a fair one.

DIFFERENT BREEDS IN AUSTRALIA.

Sporting Breeds.

The Victoria Poultry and Kennel Club, one of the most important fanciers' societies in Australia, has just issued its annual report. Concerning the canine section the following interesting remarks on the various breeds appear:

"It is pleasing to note that there is again an increased entry to report in this section, and also most gratifying to find so many newly imported dogs entered, which augurs well for the breeds they represent. At the same time it is greatly to be deplored to see such a falling off in some of the sections that were a few years ago so well represented, i.e., Mastiffs, St. Bernards, black Newfoundlanders and Great Danes. In the four breeds named many excellent specimens used to be benched, but there was not one first-class specimen in our recent show; indeed, in the two last-named varieties the classes were blanks.

"Those grand quality and noble Hounds, the Borzoi, are steadily increasing, and are now greatly admired by the general public. Deerhounds, too, are keeping their place well, and with the Russians have undoubtedly come to stay, as both breeds are in great demand for fox extermination. Greyhounds were better represented than usual. It seems strange, with the great numbers about, that so few are shown. Pointers are in a very strong position, and, with the recently imported new blood, certainly promise to keep the first place in the sporting sections.

"English Setters showed an improvement, and it was quite refreshing to see so many excellent specimens again benched. Gordons also showed up better than of late. Irish Setters were about the same, but with the recent English pur-

chase a much more cheerful prospect is looked forward to. Retrievers were few in number, but, as usual, good in quality. This remark applies to the curlies only; the flat coats are still absentees.

"Spaniels.—Clumbers still poor, but here, again, new English blood has been introduced, and a much brighter prospect is in view. Fields, although not quite so numerous as of old, were satisfactory. Cockers still hold a strong lead in this section, where the imported sires' blood is the key to the situation. Irish waters are at a very low ebb.

Non-Sporting Breeds.

"Collies (rough coated) are on the up-grade again, and, with the recent importation and renewed enthusiasm, we may safely rely upon improved stock and increased entries in the near future.

"Bulldogs.—Although a few excellent specimens were present and the numbers much above what we had a few years ago, still the rank and file were scarcely up to expectation, when the number of imported sires of the last few years are taken into consideration.

"Fox Terriers (smooth) were again fairly numerous, and these classes contained quite a number of imported animals. Wires were, as usual, poorly represented numerically, but of even quality. Irish Terriers were about the usual standard, and had a fairly good entry. Bull Terriers were also satisfactory—the best lot we have seen for some time. Skye Terriers, although few in number, showed an evenness that should be copied by many of the other varieties. Pugs, too, were not up to the standard of a few years back, and here again there is an excellent opening for beginners who fancy small breeds—a remark that applies with equal force to Pomeranians; both could be greatly improved at a very small cost.

"Yorkshire Terriers had a few that were fully entitled to the name, and, with the several recent importations, these handsome little toys should easily occupy the premier position in the toy section at future shows. Scottish Terriers were not as numerous as expected and the number of imported animals warranted. However, the quality was there, and, no doubt, an increased entry will be seen next year, as the breed-

ing stock is here. The rough Terriers, blue and tans and sandies, were again benched in fair numbers.

"Dachshunde are still in few hands, and, fortunately in those who are enthusiasts and who are trying to improve and increase these quaint yet determined vermin exterminators. The number of sporting dogs entered for the field trials was again most satisfactory and, although financially disappointing, was most encouraging, particularly the arena trials."

DISEASE OF THE DOG'S TEETH.

The dog, like all other animals that give suck to their offspring, has two sets of teeth, the first or milk or deciduous teeth, and the second or permanent teeth. The first set of teeth are shed about three and a half to five or six months in the larger breed of dogs, and from five to seven months in the smaller or Toy breeds. Frequently Toy dogs have a good deal of trouble in shedding their teeth, and some, such as the canines or tushes, are often never shed at all, thus leaving the dog with two sets of tushes, the first being placed behind the second.

The number of teeth varies according to the class of dog. The typical number of permanent teeth is forty-two. As a rule, if there should be any variation, they are in excess in those dogs having long jaws, and are fewer in the short-faced dogs, such as Bulldogs, Pugs, Griffons, Toy Spaniels, etc. In the longer-faced dogs there may be as many as forty-four, whilst the short-faced dogs may have as few as twenty-eight, and rarely more than thirty-eight. In the hairless dogs they are usually even fewer still.

When the young puppy cuts his first teeth it does not cause any trouble, but it is the opposite when it sheds the first and cuts the second teeth. It is a critical time with him, and predisposes him to take various diseases, such as fits, skin diseases, distemper, etc. In case the first teeth are not shed, so as to prevent the shooting up of the second teeth, it may be necessary to extract them. When the temporary tushes are not shed, and the second or permanent ones are up in

front of them, the former should be extracted carefully, so that they are not broken, and the roots in consequence left in the jaw.

Between the ages of four and seven months Toy dogs should have their mouths frequently examined in order to discover if the second teeth are coming up properly and the temporary ones being shed in due order. If this is not watched an ugly mouth may result. To assist the falling of the first teeth and the regulation of the new or second teeth young puppies should have large uneven raw bones given them to gnaw and tear at.

The earliest disease of the teeth is erosion of the enamel, which causes the teeth to have a worm-eaten or cankered appearance. It is usually considered as a guide that the dog has had distemper either just before or at the time or after the second teeth have appeared. Although it may be taken that the dog has had distemper if this appearance of the teeth is present, it cannot be said that the dog will not have another or future attack of this disease, as cases are encountered with this appearance in second attacks of distemper. When the enamel of the teeth is eaten into, no treatment is of any use to restore the teeth to their proper appearance.

The commonest disease of the teeth is a collection of tartar around the neck of the tooth just above the gum, and which may after some time insinuate itself between the gum and most of the tooth, and set up inflammation of the tooth socket, and in consequence loosen the tooth. Frequently the material encases the whole of the tooth which looks blackish, greenish, yellowish, or brownish in color, often giving off a repulsive odor when the animal is suffering from some ailment. It is due to microbes settling on the teeth and manufacturing a calcareous material out of the saliva and debris of food collecting on the teeth. It originates in consequence of the animal being deprived of tearing food, such as lumps of raw meat on a bone. Dry bones or hard biscuits do not supply the absence of this tearing food. The dogs' teeth by nature are

intended for biting and tearing much more than for crushing. Nearly all pet dogs living in towns as they approach old age suffer from this collection of tartar, whereas those dogs who live in the country and are used for sporting purposes, shepherding, watching, etc., are almost, if not always, free from it. Again, if the dog does not use his teeth for chewing, the salivary glands in the mouth are limited or put out of action and in consequence proper digestion does not take place, the chemistry of the mouth is upset, the secretions form a suitable pabulum for microbes to act upon and manufacture tartar.

Therefore, from what has been said above, if one wishes to prevent the formation of tartar one must feed a dog on tearing food that gives the mouth and teeth work to do. If this precaution be neglected and tartar should form it ought to be removed by scraping off and brushing the teeth with some suitable wash or powder or soap, daily after food. When the mouth gives off a bad odor five to ten drops of dilute hydrochloric acid should be given with the food daily as it assists digestion and rectifies the faulty secretions.
