Dr. Wallwin, of Barrie, is importing a good brace of Bulldogs from Miss Knowles, of England.

Another Barrie breeder that is going the same way is Mr. H. M. Dymont, who has purchased a good Bull puppy from Dr. Charles Morris, of Hartford, Conn.

Mr. H. M. Dymont, Barrie, has sent the red Cocker bitch Nellie Blye, by Squire, ex Red Cleopatra, to Captain D. J. Colwell, Port Hope.

Mr. Dymont is also a claimant for business for his red Cocker Red Sammie 6684, a son of Red Ross and Red Molly. He is a 21½ pound solid red dog, eleven inches in height, of excellent type and a winner as a puppy at Montreal in 1903.

Mr. Miller, through the Gazette columns, places that sterling Irish Terrier Fiscal Fighter at stud, at a very reasonable fee for a dog of his quality and breeding. Fiscal Fighter is a young, vigorous dog, scientifically bred, and comes from the best strain extant. He has already proved himself to be a worthy son of that illustrious sire Champion Colin, not only as a prize winner, but also as a producer of high class winners. Doubtless he will greatly improve the breed here.

The Oxford Fox Terrier Kennels of Ottawa, owned by A. N. Palmer and S. Hillsdon, have lately added to their kennels a very promising young dog, Warren Cairns, by Ch. Warren Drastie, ex Warren Clannish. Shown only twice his wins are first novice and reserve winners, White Plains, first novice, and

winners Madison, N.Y. Others are Warren Daze, a litter sister to that excellent bitch Mrs. Dandle, also a bitch from Sabine, by Ch. Result, ex Ch. Lady Fearless. This bitch has not been shown, but comes to Ottawa with a big reputation; also a bitch from the Aldon Kennels by Aldon Captain, ex Aldon Truth. These, with Oxford Blue, should form a fairly good kennel to work on.

The death of that grand Fox Terrier bitch Champion Dame Fortune removes one of those few Terriers that go to make history. Born in January, 1894, she had reached the ripe old age of twelve when an internal tumor caused her death. Even then an autopsy showed that she was in whelp to her own grandson, also a grandson of Dark Blue. Dame Fortune was the dam of the illustrious Donna Fortuna, who has never been beaten, and of Durham, the sire of Duchess of Durham. Champion Don Cesario is also a grandson.

Mr. Jos. A. Laurin, Montreal, evidently intends keeping his position clear in the Airedale fancy, as he has bought in England the grand pair Master Royal and Mistress Royal, both championship winners at the late Crystal Palace show. The English Stock-Keeper, in noting the transfer, says pointedly: This, perhaps, is the most important deal in this grand breed of Terriers that has taken place for a long time, and we must congratulate the purchaser on his great pluck, as the price paid must have been a formidable one.

Mr. Meadows is now offering his winning Boston Max Boy at stud. Full particulars of the dog will be found in

his business announcement. His wins are as follows: Three seconds at Brantford under Mr. Thomas, being beaten there by Schuyler Bob; under Mr. Mortimer at Toronto he took three seconds again, and in addition reserve in winners class, Schuyler Bob being lower down this time. At Ottawa, under Mr. Lacy, he won right through to winners and beat his kennel mate, that good bitch Blue Bell, for best in show.

Mr. Goebel's Boston bitch Kimberly has been bred to Max Boy, also Mr. Robertson's Floss, the dam of Lord Nelson. Mr. Meadows has sold Little Joe to Dr. Gordon Maclean, Toronto, and a nice 16-pound dog to Dr. Frewin, of Oshawa, so that the medical faculty must take kindly to this smart little dog that makes such a good house watch and companion.

Devonia Kennels, Vancouver, B.C., have certainly got out a "mixed lot" lately, consisting of a smooth Fox Terrier bitch in whelp to Dark Blue; a Clumber bitch in whelp to a good Hempstead dog, and an English Springer bitch also in whelp.

Another Clumber that has reached this kennel is the dog Bruce, a descendant of old champion Johnny. Mr. Anthony tells us that the Clumbers are greatly admired in British Columbia, and are such good workers that they must become popular.

Mr. A. D. Wilson, Namao, Alta., is congratulating himself on the litter of Collies he had some time since from W. Hero and Holyrood Queen. One bitch that "stays at home," is particularly promising, having an excellent long clean head and indeed is good all round.

Mrs. Bradley Dyne has again been unfortunate in the loss of the sire of a nice litter of Scottish Terriers, the good dog that resulted from the mating of Scottie O'Brave and Crimson Rambler. On November 8th he ran off to the mountains at Saturna, hunting on his own account, and has not since been seen. It is feared that Bravo, as he was called, became the prey of an eagle.

Mr. F. T. Stephens, Toronto, a Boston enthusiast, suggests the division by weight of this breed at the next Toronto show. Mr. Stephens feels sure the resulting entry would more than pay the extra outlay on prize money, and as Bostons are proving so popular in Canada we feel inclined to agree with him. We should be glad to hear from other breeders, and a requisition signed by all Boston owners would doubtless aid the Dog Show Committee in coming to an intelligent decision.

Saskatchewan Pointer Kennels report the arrival of eight puppies, of which five are dogs, by Angus Pointer 7912, ex Rose A 8300. They are a fine lot and nicely marked.

C. H. Hall & Son have sold Mr. W. W. Wells, Toronto, a really good young Bloodhound, Bronze Plate. He has abundance of wrinkle, is heavy in bone with sound, sturdy legs and feet. His muzzle is square and ears well set and low.

Mr. James Stewart has sold the English Setter bitch Judy Brady and reports a fine litter from Lady Minto.

A correction has been made in the Scottish Terrier awards at the late Toronto show, caused by the disqualification of Dr. E. C. Kirk's Lansdowne Duchess, that being bred in England, was not eligible for the novice class. Mrs. W. P. Fraser's Jock Elliott now takes first place in novice dogs or bitches bred in Canada or the United States.

This is a world of change and of progress. We hope this change in the size and appearance of the Canadian Kennel Gazette will be looked upon as a step in advance. We think it is. Of late years the improvement in illustrations of all kinds has been so great that we for some time have felt handicapped by the limitations of the smaller, the

old style page. Portraits have been offered us that we could not use although we desired to do so.

The use of the very best paper stock procurable in Canada, added to the enlarged size of page, will do away with this difficulty. We hope to make portraits a feature—the times call for them. No other means so readily depict the qualities of the dog. The photograph is the next thing to life.

From time to time other features will be added as opportunity occurs. The love of the dog is increasing in Canada and we hope to both foster that love and benefit by it. Canada is showing independence in all matters of state, business, art and agriculture. Why not be independent in our sports, and the love and care of the dog is a sport and a legitimate and healthy one.

Help us with your advice, items of news, a share of your business. Our desire is to aid our readers. To do so the aid must be mutual.

The beautiful New Year's card sent out by the President of the Canadian Kennel Club has been greatly admired. The Collie head in colors is a model. It may be of some interest to know that these cards were especially imported from England for Mr. Kent's use.

We have no fight with the American Kennel Club. If they, in their wisdom, say that Canada is not part of America, well and good, they but deceive themselves. No one on this side, nor many in the United States, will attempt to sustain such a contention.

If Canadians are breeders of dogs and those to the south of us are not, why not admit it? We do not attempt the position of millionaire purchasers. If we had the money we might lose the fun. Isn't it a case of dollars against dogs? We predict the dogs will win in the end.

The high protective fence Uncle Sam has seen fit to build about his domains has fostered commercial business in Canada in a way that would not otherwise have happened. Some years since "reciprocity" was the watchword in many parts of Canada. Is it ever heard of now? Never, it is dead and buried. Canadians have developed their own mar-

kets for their own products. It will be the same in dogs. Canadians will purchase Canadian-bred dogs. A change in classification will foster this, and, mark us, the change will come.

It may be thought that one notice of motion would have covered the object Mr. H. B. Donovan had in view in his endeavor to Canadianize the puppy, novice and limit classes. It would have done so if the notice of motion had carried. But there may be some who still think half measures best, and would vote for say the first two changes but might not be prepared to restrict the limit class. We believe the whole three will meet with favor, but if not, then they are so arranged that the death of one need not necessarily mean the demise of all.

With the endorsement of these three notices the open class would still remain what it was always intended to be, and now is, an "open" class, open to all comers.

If America (?) is for the United States, then most certainly no objection can be taken to "Canada for the Canadians."

After all, what is this line of demarcation that the A. K. C. in its arrogance claims divides "America" from "a foreign country." Isn't it purely imaginary, non-existent, except politically and geographically? Canadians are as much Americans as residents of the United States, bred from the same stock, with the same ideals, aims and hopes. Then why let the supposed personal grievances of a very few individuals sever the pleasant relations of dog owners and breeders in both countries, relations that as the years go by have become closer and closer, and that in future years must surely grow in the same direction. In this phase of sport there should not be, nor need there be, any division of aim or effort to advance the interests of the dog. If personal aggrandizement is the goal or the intrusion of low grade politics, then for all our sakes keep the dog out of it. He, at any rate, is innocent and it is his welfare that both clubs are supposed to safeguard.

The King Edward Collie Kennels, Toronto, purpose operating extensively this season, several of the matrons of

this kennel now being either away or having recently returned from the most prominent sires in the United States. Southport Sarah has been mated with Southport Sculptor of the Greystone Kennels, Yonkers, N.Y. Marvel to Southport Pendragon of the Revere Collie Kennels, Boston, Mass., and another bitch from this kennel has been sent to Wishaw Clinker of the Cragstone Kennels, Highland Falls, N.Y.

That sound stud Fox Terrier Aldon Tipster is now in Mr. Clark's care. He is the sire of winners, and his location in Toronto is convenient for most breeders. Mr. Macdonald is spending the winter at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, and prior to shipping bitches he should be communicated with.

Mr. McEwen is offering something special in Collies this month—a show bitch nearly a year old, and several good puppies.

Mr. Frank Britton, Toronto, has made an important purchase in assuming all the dogs in the Crow Gill Kennels, including the imported stud Irish Terrier, Crow Gill Michael. As a sire he has been most successful, and has produced several winners, both in this country and in England, as a glance at Mr. Britton's business announcement will show. The dog is a winner, too, possessing as he does a long, punishing head, with small ears and excellent coat, legs and feet. Withal he is very much of a Terrier, and possesses that distinctive character so desirable in the Irishmen. THE COLLIE CLUB OF AMERICA—CANADA INCLUDED IN "AMERICA."

Chambersburg, Pa., Jan. 1, 1906.

The Westminster Stake, which is to be decided at the Westminster Kennel Club show, New York City, in February, 1906, is for American bred Collies born on and after June 30, 1904. The stake will be divided by sex and there are four prizes for each sex, the first being 50 per cent., the second 25 per cent., the third 15 per cent., and the fourth 10 per cent. The guaranteed value of the stake is \$100, but it has always exceeded that amount and its possibilities are unlimited.

Last year the stake was changed from an open to an "American bred" stake and that the change was appreciated was shown by the increased entry. This year the conditions governing the stake are the same and there is no reason why this year's entry should not be a record one.

I would urge special effort on the part of the members seeing our president, Mr. M. M. Palmer has been chosen to officiate.

Note.—The Collie Club of America's definition of "American bred" is, "A Collie born on the continent of North America and bred by a resident of that continent." It is not necessary that the entry be bred by the exhibitor.

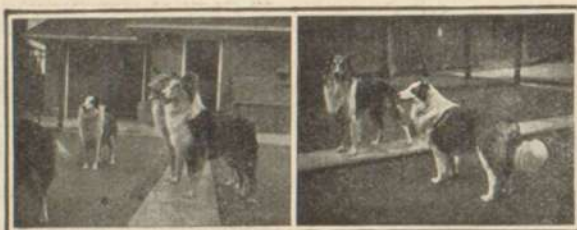
Hoping you will kindly answer these two questions and oblige a beginner.

1. On the whole it is better to breed but one litter each year, especially if the litter consists of a large number of vigorous puppies.

2. It is very difficult, indeed, to keep nursing bitches in coat, and the trouble you complain of is not at all uncommon.

— Kennels, breeder of Manchester Black and Tan Yorkshire and Boston Terriers, and upon calling upon the said kennels in search of a good Boston found that all the man had was a white docked-tail dog and the poorest apology for a Boston that I have ever seen.

Now I would like to know what you people over there term the word breeder, as here in this city, and in fact any other American city that I have been in, any breeder that I have called on could generally show his stock that he breeds from, and to my way of thinking it is a mighty poor policy for a man to try and dupe the public into thinking that he has and is a "breeder" of a class of dog that we have on inquiry found that he does not know the least thing about, or has ever had any other than the one above mentioned. That class of men, I think, should be shown up as it only hurts the trade and gives people in general a very poor opinion of dog men, of which there are so many decent fellows. Needless to say I was disappointed, as I had heard that you folks over there had some very good dogs and I would like to have seen them, but

I feel sure that the one in question is not a sample of what you have on your side of the line.

Whenever the term "American bred" is used, it is to be construed as meaning a dog or bitch whelped in the United States OR CANADA, and in case of a bitch served out of the United States or Canada, she must have been owned in the United States or Canada, prior to such service, to make her produce eligible to compete.

The American Kennel Club Decides that Canada is not in America and says in effect that Canadians are "Foreigners."

At the quarterly meeting of the American Kennel Club, held in New York on December 21, 1905, the delegates present, or a majority of them, decided that a dog bred in Canada was not a dog bred in America. They also proved that the feeling that prevailed some years ago is still existent. The whole of the American continent is none too large for the A. K. C. to rule, even though they now say that Canada is not a part of America. Logical, isn't it?

Mr. Mortimer was right when he said that Canadians "were breeders essentially," and for this we owe him thanks. He took an eminently fair view of the question. But we give part of the report verbatim. Some of the delegates are prejudiced. It is simply a revival of the old plaint, but with a good deal of prejudice added.

American Bred Dogs.

The Secretary: I have only one more matter to bring to your attention. I would like it to be determined whether the rule as to American bred dogs can be interpreted in this way: That if an American purchases a bitch in any foreign country, and after it becomes his property, if he sees fit to mate that bitch to a dog in any foreign country, and the bitch comes to this country and whelps, whether the nationality of the breeder will determine whether the dog is American bred or foreign bred.

Mr. Brooks: Do you want the dog to follow the flag?

The Secretary: At present that would be an American born dog, but a foreign bred dog. The present rule is that a bitch owned in this country and sent to any foreign country to be bred and returned to this country in whelp, her progeny shall be considered American bred. Now, whether that rule means, if an American living in this country purchases a bitch on the other side, we change the present rule because she cannot be sent to a foreign country to be bred, but if purchased in a foreign country and is bred there, after he becomes the owner, and then the bitch comes to this country and whelps, whether the nationality of the breeder will determine whether that dog is not

only American born, but also American bred.

Mr. Carnochan: I would like to add to what Mr. Vredenburg has said by reading Rule 7. "The breeder of a dog is the person owning or leasing the bitch at the time of her being bred. A bitch owned in this country and sent to any foreign country to be bred and returned to this country to whelp, the progeny shall be considered as American bred." There the rule stops; there is nothing in that rule, except by inference, to prevent a person's buying a bitch in a foreign country, breeding her to a dog in that foreign country, bringing her to this country to whelp and her progeny being considered as American bred, the inference being that this being the only case stated, all other cases must be foreign bred dogs. It seems to me that the fact that the bitch being brought here to whelp, the bitch being owned by an American before she is bred, that that person has done all in his power, has fulfilled every possible requirement that he can to have those puppies American bred, and on that line I would like to make a motion that such progeny as stated by Mr. Vredenburg in his statement be considered American bred dogs. Motion seconded and carried.

The Secretary: That is, there are two facts which will determine whether the dog is American bred or not; in the first place, the breeder must be an American and in the second place, the bitch must whelp in this country.

Mr. Mortimer: I think this would be a good opportunity of deciding what constitutes an American bred dog. We

have ever since I knew anything at all about dog shows, or ever since the inauguration of specialty clubs, a number of clubs, some of whose members reside in Canada, and although the specialty clubs usually donate their prizes for American bred dogs, Canadian bred dogs have invariably been allowed to compete for those specials, and for that reason I have assumed that a Canadian bred dog was an American bred dog. I have so assumed for years past. I do not know whether there has been any rule passed to the contrary or not.

Mr. Viti: I do not see why any discrimination should be made against Mexico, for instance, but it seems to me that an American bred dog must be a dog both born and bred in America, and that his sire and dam should both be here. I think the rule of one of our members, the Bull Dog Club, on the subject, covers the ground so that there cannot be any dispute at all. The rules should be in the interest of having the very best stock in America.

Mr. Mortimer: Those Canadian members are breeders essentially. They have come down here a great many times, and they have won our special prizes that have been offered by American specialty clubs. I think if we define the American bred dog as those only born in the United States we are working a very great injury to the Canadian members of our different American specialty clubs, and for that reason I would like to ask a definition of what an American bred dog is.

Mr. Peters: I move that an American bred dog, as it is now termed, shall be a dog bred on the continent of North America. Motion seconded.

Mr. Carnochan: I can go back a good ways in connection with this matter. I was on the committee that went to London to endeavor to procure international relations between the American Kennel

Club and the English Kennel Club. That matter was entirely settled; everything was done. We were to be recognized by the English Kennel Club as the paramount power on the continent of North America, and we were to recognize them as the paramount power with the rest of the world. The document, I believe, is somewhere in the archives, and has on it the signatures of three members of the American Kennel Club and three members of the English Kennel Club, and that international agreement, which would have been for the very best interests of kenneldom all over the world, was blocked by our very good friends in Canada. They said, we are not going to be considered a part of the United States; we are going to hold our own shows and abide by our own rules. They have since affiliated with the Kennel Club of England. Therefore I see no reason why they should be treated any better than our English brothers. I see no reason why they should have special favors if we decide that a class is to be limited to American bred dogs in the sense of being born in the United States and bred in the United States. I see no reason why a colony of Great Britain should have any other rights than the parent body in England. For that reason I am opposed to admitting Canadian dogs and considering them in any way American bred.

of matters occurring in connection with this matter long before those stated by Mr. Carnochan. I was a member of the Rules Committee. On two occasions the Canadian Kennel Club came here and knocked at our door and wanted recognition. They appointed a committee of three; we appointed a committee of three, and we met in New York. We came to a conclusion satisfactory to all the members of the joint committee. We signed that conclusion. They went back to Canada. Canada repudiated the agreement. They wanted all the recognition, and gave nothing in return. That was the first slap in the face that we received from our friends the Canadians. The second time was when the Canadian Kennel Club appointed their Executive Board, giving them full power to act, to come to some agreement to reciprocity with the American Kennel Club. The Hamilton Club of Canada forced that issue and they invited me to come and meet them. I went, representing the American Kennel Club, alone, and was pitted against members of the Executive Board of the Canadian Kennel Club. We had a session for two days. We came to an agreement that I was very glad to sign, and which they signed. There was one article that said that this agreement would be rescinded on six months' notice. This was in July. The Canadian Kennel Club held its annual meeting in September and repudiated the act of its Executive Board, which it had given full power to act and served us with the six months' notice which we did not take advantage of, and said the agreement would cease on receipt of our letter. That was the second time. The third time is the time Mr. Carnochan refers to, when we had this agreement signed with great ceremony on parchment, where the English Kennel Club, in its preamble, said that the American Kennel Club is the paramount power on the continent of North America, and they repudiated that preamble by accepting Canada as an affiliated club, so that Canada would not show any allegiance to the American Kennel

Club. Why should we show any partiality to Canada or to Canadian breeders? That was one thing the committee had in mind in passing the rule concerning the novice class, that we would strike out Canada from one class. If the specialty clubs have so many Canadian members, it is very easy to arrange their specials by announcing prizes for the best dog bred in the United States or Canada. Why do you say that a Canadian dog should be an American bred dog, when it is a foreign country? When an exhibitor takes his dogs there he has to pay his duties and go through the same red tape that he would in coming from Manchester or Liverpool. They have to give a certain pedigree and deposit it with the port of entry before they will allow a Canadian dog in this country. It is another, a different flag. It is a foreign country. When we say America we mean that part of America that would control the United States, within the limits of the United States.

Mr. Peters: I cannot see why we should grind all these old axes, but I suppose the reason we made the rule barring their dogs out of the novice class was because we thought they could breed better dogs than we can. We are all equal here, and I think we ought to have that class equal, and if we are going to use the term "American bred" I should favor that they be allowed to compete with us.

Mr. Mortimer: I do not think this is a question of dog politics at all. I have no doubt that those gentlemen who are present who were engaged in that controversy with the English Kennel Club

may feel aggrieved, but as a matter of precedent for twenty years past Canadian dogs have always been recognized at our American shows as American bred dogs, and they have always competed for every special that was offered. For that reason I claim it would be only right and proper that Canadian bred dogs should be admitted.

Mr. McGuire: Have we anything which tends to show that it would be agreeable to the Canadian people to have their dogs designated as American bred? They might make a very violent objection to it. They have repudiated a couple of agreements they have entered into, and here, without any apparent request from them, without any seeking on their part, without even a representative from their club, it is proposed that we designate their dogs as American bred.

Mr. Mortimer: In answer to the gentleman who just spoke, the proof that the Canadians are very glad to come down here is the fact that they come in large numbers every year, the fact that there is a large number of Canadian members in every specialty club in existence in this country to-day.

Mr. McGuire. Even that fact does not give us the privilege of claiming their dogs as being American bred, nor does it compel them to accept our making them American bred dogs.

The Secretary: The Pacific Advisory Committee has an agreement with the American Kennel Club that any act by it shall be binding unless that act is appealed from and set aside on that appeal by the American Kennel Club. This very question has been determined by the Pacific Advisory Committee in this case. There was a special offered for the best American bred dog. The prize was awarded to a dog that was bred by Mr. J. A. Laurin, of Montreal, Canada. That was appealed from; it was brought before the Pacific Advisory Committee, and the appeal was sustained upon the ground that it was a foreign bred dog. We have got to set that aside, and how we can do it without an appeal I cannot see.

Mr. Mortimer: I think this quotation by the secretary is a very fine illustration of the tail wagging the dog.

Mr. Peters' motion that an American bred dog as it is now termed shall be a dog bred on the continent of North America was then put and lost.

next year, to be known as the "Breeders' Trophy," and to be competed for as follows: For Irish Terrier, dogs or bitches, of any age, bred and owned by exhibitor or exhibitors, resident of Canada, and to be won, with the same or different dogs, five times before becoming the property of any fancier.

CANADIAN KENNEL CLUB.

Minutes of Executive meeting held on December 28th, 1905, President John G. Kent in the chair.

It was a pleasure to have at the meeting such an old-time friend of the club, and one who came such a long distance as Mr. Fred. T. Miller, of Winnipeg, Man.

Pacific Coast Committee: The following amended rules governing the proposed committee were unanimously agreed on and the President and Secretary were empowered to finally close the agreement and sign the necessary documents:

Pacific Coast agreement, ratified December 28th, 1905.

1. That a Pacific Advisory Board be established.

2. That the Advisory Board have full discretionary powers to deal with protests, disqualifications, suspensions, etc. To receive and approve of premium lists and catalogues of clubs on the Coast giving shows under C. K. C. rules. All powers subject to Clause 5 of this agreement.

3. That the Advisory Board be made up of delegates, one from each club on the Coast holding an annual show, and of a vice-president of the C. K. C. resident in British Columbia, the latter to be the chairman of the Board and to have the casting vote in case of a tie. All delegates to be members of the Canadian Kennel Club.

4. That these delegates be elected annually from each club at a general meeting.

5. That the Advisory Board have the practical management of kennel matters on the Coast, subject to Canadian Kennel Club rules, i.e., that any question regarding kennel interests on the Coast shall be submitted to the Pacific Advisory Board and dealt with by them, subject to the approval of the Executive of the C. K. C. in Toronto.

6. That the Advisory Board have power to grant dates for the holding of shows on the Coast.

7. That the Advisory Board shall meet at least twice in each year and that due notice of such meetings be given to all clubs.

8. That a full report of the proceedings had at all meetings of the Pacific Advisory Board be sent immediately after each meeting to the Canadian Kennel Club at Toronto.

9. It is decided that nothing in this agreement shall be retroactive.

Brindle Bull Terriers: After reading letters already published in this connection and Mr. Claire Foster's report of the late Toronto show, it was moved by Mr. F. T. Miller, seconded by Mr. R. H. Trimble, and carried, "That it is the opinion of this committee that it is inadvisable to recognize any other color in Bull Terriers than white."

Win of Lord Bang, Pointer dog, at St. Thomas, 1902: This matter had been referred to the Executive from the annual meeting. The Secretary produced a letter from Mr. Collins, who was Secretary of the St. Thomas show, certifying to the correctness of the win, and, on motion, the win was verified. Lord Bang, by this win, attains his championship.

Ottawa show of 1903: Two similar cases to that of Lord Bang were brought up by the Secretary. One that of the Bedlington bitch, Moorside Nettle; the other that of the Skye Terrier, Moorland Lass. In both cases the win—unmarked in the certified catalogue—was vouched for by the Ottawa Secretary, Mr. S. Hillsdon, and both were verified. In each of these cases also the win in question meant the gaining of championship honors.

Alleged incorrect pedigree of the Bloodhound Alexandra Blackwall, 8710: Ordered to be referred to the Pacific Coast Committee on completion of the agreement officially recognizing that body as part of the Canadian Kennel Club.

Win of the Bull Terrier Butterfly at Brantford: The following letters were read:

St. Thomas, Aug. 21, 1905.

To Mr. H. B. Donovan, Toronto:

Dear Sir,—I saw a letter in the last issue of the Gazette regarding the Brantford dog show. I see Mr. H. R. Frank, Secretary, says that Butterfly was not challenged. I went to Mr.

Frank and asked him to weigh the dog when the novice class was called, and he did not want to do it. I was not showing in Class 172, so the two overweighted were judged by themselves. When it came to class 174, I asked for weights again and the judge ordered the bitches to be weighed and Butterfly was disqualified, and Dolley, too. Mollie O. won. Then in Class 175 there are only two entries, Dimple and Brantford Snowdrop. There were eighty-one entries of Great Danes at the recent New-Cross show, and after Bulldogs, with ninety-four, they were the feature of the show. New-Cross is one of the popular one-day fixtures.

Mr. Stretches' books tell him his Collies have won two hundred and fifty prizes during the past dozen months. Every winner a home bred one, too.

News not so pleasant is that that records the death of the Collie bitch champion Ormiskirk Ideal. She was grand-dam of over two hundred winners, amongst them being such notables as champions Wishaw Leader, Edna, Ormiskirk Clinker, etc.

The English Kennel Club has decided that overcrowding must not take place at shows governed by the rules of that body, and in future the following spaces must be afforded the different breeds: Terriers and other dogs of similar size, width 20 inches, depth 3 feet. Pointers and other dogs of like size, 30 inches by 3 feet. The large breeds, such as St. Bernards, Danes, etc., must have 40 inches by 3½ to 4 feet. This should be a good rule for show givers here to follow.

Descriptive Particulars.

Head.

Long; skull flat and rather narrow between ears, getting slightly narrower to-

wards the eye; free from wrinkle; stop hardly visible, except in profile. The jaw must be strong and muscular, but not too full in the cheek, and of a good punishing length. There should be a slight falling away below the eye, so as not to have a Greyhound appearance. Hair on face of same description as on body, but short (about a quarter of an inch long), in appearance almost smooth and straight; a slight beard is the only longish hair (and it is long only in comparison with the rest) that is permissible, and that is characteristic.

Teeth.

Should be strong and level.

Lips.

Not so tight as a Bull Terrier's, but well-fitting, showing through the hair their black lining.

Nose.

Must be black.

Eyes.

A dark hazel color, small, not prominent, and full of life, fire and intelligence.

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Ears.

Small and V-shaped, of moderate thickness, set well on the head, and dropping forward closely to the cheek. The ear must be free of fringe, and the hair thereon shorter and darker in color than the body. No cropped Irish Terrier, born since March 1, 1897, can compete for any prizes offered by the Club.

Neck.

Should be of a fair length and gradually widening toward the shoulders, well carried, and free of throatiness. There is generally a slight sort of frill visible at each side of the neck, running nearly to the corner of the ear.

Shoulders and Chest.

Shoulders must be fine, long and sloping well into the back; the chest deep and muscular, but neither full nor wide.

Back and Loin.

Body moderately long; back should be strong and straight, with no appearance of slackness behind the shoulders; the loin broad and powerful and slightly arched; ribs fairly sprung, rather deep than round and well-ribbed back.

Hindquarters.

Should be strong and muscular, the thighs powerful, hocks near the ground, stifles moderately bent.
